## Agricultural and livestock breeding tasks inspected in Heho

The commander reported on agriculture and livestock breeding tasks. Lt-Gen Aung Htwe, the commander and party inspected agriculture work and breeding of poultry and pigs. Lt-Gen Aung Htwe gave instructions on carrying out agriculture and livestock breeding tasks on a commercial scale, and presented gifts to families outstanding in livestock breeding work.

Next, they inspected the pre-primary school of the regiment. The commander presented K 30,000 for the children.

They proceeded to the agricultural and livestock breeding farm of the station near Inkhaung Village. At the briefing hall, officials reported on work being done. LtGen Aung Htwe gave instructions on minimizing loss and wastage, efforts to be made for achieving greater success, and speeding up livestock breeding tasks by applying the methods disseminated by the departments concerned.

They inspected the breeding of layers, pigs, horses and mules and left necessary instructions.

They proceeded to the agricultural farm of Myanma Agriculture Service in Heho Township. At the briefing hall, officials reported on agricultural tasks being carried out on the 175 -acre land, distribution of quality strains
and requirements. Lt-Gen Aung Htwe gave instructions on pilot plantation of the strains suitable for respective regions, and extended cultivation of quality strains of potato and vegetables. He inspected the plantations of soya bean and orange and vineyard and attended to the needs.

At the briefing hall of Letpanpin agricultural farm, they heard reports presented by officials concerned on cultivation of maize and pigeon pea on 160 acres in 20022003, cultivation of pigeon pea on 90 acres and maize and paddy on 200 acres in the previous year, target for cultivation of niger on 50 acres, the crops cultivated, and future tasks. ## US troops attacked again in Iraq

Baghdad, 2 July - Six more American soldiers were wounded in Iraq on Tuesday and a fatal blast at a mosque fuelled Muslim anger toward US forces, all within hours of Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld insisting Iraq was no new Vietnam.

Three soldiers were hurt near Baghdad's university when a makeshift bomb exploded by their vehicle, a military spokesman said. Their Iraqi interpreter was missing. Bystanders saw troops drag four seemingly badly wounded people from the burning wreck.

Three others were wounded in two separate grenade attacks. In Falluja, a Sunni Muslim stronghold near Baghdad where Americans and Iraqis have been involved in fatal clashes, a US commander denied troops had caused the overnight explosion which locals said killed eight people, including clerics.

But thousands of Iraqis chanted angry slogans as they buried the dead: "America is the enemy of God! Avenge the killing!!"

Exactly two months after US President George W Bush declared a formal end to the major combat operations that ousted Saddam, troops are hunting what Rumsfeld said were "terrorist" remnants of Saddam's Sunni-dominated

Baath Party administration.
Operation Desert Sidewinder began on Sunday with infantry backed by aircraft and armour. Battles would "go on for some time", Rumsfeld said. But he hit out at suggestions that almost daily attacks and the deaths of 22 US and six British soldiers since May 1 meant Iraq was sliding into prolonged guerrilla war.

Rumsfeld insisted this was no new Vietnam: "It isn't. It's a different time. It's a different era. It's a different place." Echoing his confidence, Paul Bremer, the US administrator in Iraq, dismissed recent attacks as the predictable and increasingly desperate response of die-hard Saddam loyalists to American success in winning the support of the Iraqi people.
"Those few remaining individuals who have refused to fit into the new Iraq are becoming more and more desperate," Bremer said. "They are alienating the rest of the population." - MNA/Reuters

## Over 100 Italy-bound illegal emigrants arrested in Sri Lanka

Colombo, 2July—Over 100 Sri Lankan and Pakistani nationals have been nabbed in Sri Lanka for attempting to travel illegally toItaly, police said Tuesday.

A ship with a Mongolian flag and an accompanying fishing trawler with 180 Italy-bound illegal emigrants on board were found by the Sri Lankan Navy off the coast of the southern fishing port of Tangalla, some 190 kilometres southeast of capital Colombo.

The trawler had 30 men on board, all of whom were Pakistani nationals, local police said.

The Sri Lankan naval authorities said that the ship was manned by a Norwegian and Baltic crew at the time of interception by the Navy on Tuesday morning. MNA/Xinhua

## Blast at Iraq ammunition dump kills 30 residents

Baghdad, 2 July-At least 30 Iraqis were killed and scores injured on Saturday when an ammunition dump they were looting blew up, local residents said on Monday.

They said US forces arrested several looters after the blast at the ammunition dump in a desert area north of the town of Haditha, 260 km ( 160 miles) northeast of Baghdad, and handed them to Iraqi police in the town.

There was no comment from the US military
The residents said looters had been at the abandoned Iraqi army depot to seize casings of artillery shells that they could sell. It was not known what caused the blast.-Internet

## Experts say US needs foreign help in Iraq

Washington, 2 July - Two months after President George W Bush declared major combat over in Iraq, the United States needs more troops on the ground and should accept any foreign help it can get to crush resistance and start real nation-building, military analysts said on Tuesday.

Since May 1, at least 25 US troops have been killed in hostile circumstances in Iraq, in a conflict experts say is fast becoming a low-level guerrilla war-a description rejected by Defence Secretary Donald Rumsfeld.
"The war has moved into a disturbing new phase, a guerilla, counter-insurgency phase. We need to adapt," said retired Army General Dan Christman, a former Pentagon planner. Six more US soldiers were wounded on Tuesday and a fatal blast at a mosque fueled Muslim anger toward US forces. At home, US confidence in the war has plunged, according to a new poll that showed 56 per cent of respondents said things were going well for US troops in Iraq, compared to 70 per cent a month ago and 86 per cent during the week of 7 May.

Christman and other military analysts said the United States needed to adapt by getting more boots on the ground to deter attacks and to enable politicians to focus on nationbuilding and win over a distrustful Iraqi population.
"Our Army is absolutely stretched thin and we ought to be reaching out to all of those countries who are offering to send troops - the Bangladeshis, Pakistanis, the Indians, and NATO - I'm not sure why we have been reluctant to pick up a NATO offer," said the retired general.

NATO's role in Iraq so far has been agreeing to provide logistics help for up to 7,500 Polish troops scheduled to deploy to Iraq this summer. - MNA/Reuters

East peace moves
Beljing, 2 July - Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Kong Quan said here Monday that China welcomes and supports the positive measures taken by Palestine and Israel in support of the Middle East peace process.

Kong made the remark when asked to comment on the statement of the Palestinian factions of Fatah, Hamas, Islamic Jihad on suspending military operations against Israel, and Israel's withdrawal of troops from parts of the Gaza Strip.

## US must prepare for more attacks in Iraq

Baghdad, 2 July - A group of senior US senators visiting Iraq said on Tuesday there could well be more deadly attacks on US troops before Washington can declare the war over. "The war is still on, the risks are still there and casualties could well be taken," senior Republican Senator John Warner said.

But he said there was no need for more American troops in Iraq for now, despite the escalating violence which has killed at least 22 US soldiers and six British soldiers.
"The boots on the ground as of now are adequate," said Warner, head of the Senate's Armed Services Committee.

He noted more than 30 foreign countries had promised to send troops or security forces to Iraq, where American troops have struggled to impose security after a US-led invasion toppled Saddam Hussein on April 9.

US troops have come under attack mostly in central Iraq. American military officials blame the violence on Saddam loyalists who they say are bent on destabilizing oilrich Iraq.

Warner said US military commanders would call in more soldiers if increasing attacks threatened the US-led military presence in the country.

Carl Levin, the senior Democrat on Warner's committee, said Washington could send some of its troops home if other countries sent in back-up forces. "It is not weakness to invite other countries in.that is just wisdom," Levin said.

Another Democrat, John Rockefeller, said briefings by military commanders in Iraq had driven home the message that US troops could be in Iraq "for the long run".
"There is a probability that the American people are going to need to adjust, as Congress will also, to the fact that things could get worse before they get better," said Rockefeller, vice chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence. Pat Roberts, the Republican heading the committee, said information from Iraqi informants that had been scant before the US-led invasion had now become "almost like a fire hose". - MNA/Reuters

## Iran to invite IAEA chief to talk after rebuff

Teheran, 2 July - Iran will shortly invite nuclear watchdog chief Mohammed EIBaradei to Teheran for talks after rebuffing calls for tougher inspection of its facilities, the official IRNA news agency reported on Monday.

IRNA quoted Iran's Supreme National Security Council Secretary General Hassan Rohani as telling visiting British Foreign Secretary Jack Straw that Teheran intended to invite the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) boss for talks.
"Iran is going to invite ElBaradei soon to visit Iran to hold talks to remove technical problems," IRNA quoted Rohani.
The Iranian Government rebuffed Straw's insistence, on a brief Sunday and Monday trip to the oil-producing country, that Teheran sign up to tougher IAEA inspections of its nuclear facilities immediately and uncondi-

## tionally.

Iranian officials said they had not ruled out signing the IAEA's Additional Protocol for tougher inspections, but insisted Iran should also be allowed access to Western technology to develop its nuclear energy programme.
"Iran accepts cooperation with the IAEA but raises the question of why the members (of the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty) have not helped Iran in this respect," President Mohammad Khatami told Straw on Monday, state television reported.

The IAEA's ElBaradei has stressed that only by signing up to tougher inspections can Iran dispel doubts that it
may be secretly seeking to build nuclear weapons.

Straw told Iranian officials that failure to agree to more intrusive checks by UN inspectors would damage international confidence in Iran and may scupper a potential trade deal with the European Union. Iran insists its nuclear ambitions are limited to diversifying its electricity generation sources.
Rohani said that in order to remove any doubt about its peaceful nuclear intentions Iran was "ready to accept the participation of other big industrialized countries in its (uranium) enrichment projects," IRNA reported.

## Blast sets US vehicle

## on fire in Baghdad

Baghdad, 2 July - A US military vehicle blew up in central Baghdad on Tuesday, and one witness said US troops pulled four badly wounded soldiers from the burning car.

The armoured car exploded near al-Mustansiriyah University in the heart of the capital.

A Reuters reporter who arrived on the scene shortly after the 9.55 am ( 0555 GMT ) attack said an American and an Iraqi car were on fire. The cause of the blast was not immediately clear. Some witnesses said the Iraqi car blew up next to the US vehicle while others said a rocketpropelled grenade was used in the attack.
"We were sitting at a cafeteria near the university when we heard a large explosion. We rushed to the site and found two cars burning, one American and one Iraqi," Ya'aroub Abdulillah, a resident, told Reuters. "US troops pulled out from the vehicle four soldiers."

US soldiers cordoned off the area and began to investigate. They refused to comment on the incident.

Earlier in the day, a US soldier was lightly wounded when a military convoy was attacked by a rocket-propelled grenade near Baghdad Airport, the US military said.

US forces have come under fire almost daily in recent weeks in mainly Sunni Muslim central Iraq, a stronghold for ousted president Saddam Hussein when he was in power.

At least 22 US and six British troops have been killed by hostile fire since US President George W Bush declared major combat in Iraq over on 1 May.

The US military, which has about 156,000 soldiers in Iraq, has launched several operations to stamp out attacks. The latest, Operation Desert Sidewinder, began on Sunday with infantry soldiers backed by aircraft and armoured vehicles. - MNA/Reuters

## Jordanians refuse cooperation with Israel in Iraq's reconstruction

Amman, 2 July - Jordanian businessmen have rejected offers from American companies to cooperate with their Israeli counterparts to get contracts in Iraq, an

A Jordanian businessman who preferred not to be named told Al-ArabAl-Yawm that Jordanian companies can participate in the reconstruction of Iraq depending on their accumulative experience and the close relations with the Iraqi private sector.

The newspaper reported that representatives of American and Turkish companies had visited Israel to seek possibility for Israeli companies to play a role in rebuilding Iraq.

A meeting is expected to be held next month by American, Turkish and Israeli companies to study the projects in post-
meeting will be arranged by a Israeli exporting institute.

A senior US official declared last month that Iraq would be open to Israeli companies, which possess advanced technology to produce competitive commodities, to contribute to the reconstruction and investment in Iraq. Jordan last week grouped some 1,500 political and business leaders across the world in an extraordinary meeting of the World Economic Forum, hoping it could give a chance for Arab private sector to get a share in rebuilding Iraq. Iraq used to be Jordan's biggest market, which consumed 20 per cent of its exported products

# US forces grab 180 in latest Iraq raids 

Baghdad, 2 July— US forces in Iraq said on Monday they had detained 180 people in two ongoing operations to crack down on armed resistance to their occupation. Troops from the 1st Armoured Division detained 148 people in Baghdad as part of Operation Desert Scorpion, an effort to stamp out guerilla attacks launched several weeks ago, US Central Command said in a statement.

In Desert Sidewinder, a new mission which began on Sunday, soldiers detained 32 people and confiscated weapons including 10AK-47 automatic rifles and a mortar, the military said.

Soldiers from the Army's 4th Infantry Division are conducting that operation, which aims to crack down on opponents of the occupation to the north and east of Baghdad.

Witnesses said the area appeared
quiet on Monday afternoon, with no sign of major military activity.

US troops in Iraq have been coming under almost daily attack in recent weeks from rocket-propelled grenades, hand grenades and automatic rifle fire despite toppling Saddam Hussein and his government on 9 April.

At least 22 US and six British soldiers have been killed by hostile fire since US President George W Bush
declared major combat in Iraq over on 1 May.

US officers blame fragmented elements of Saddam's old power structure for the attacks. But many Iraqis say some assailants are not necessarily connected to Saddam but feel strongly their country should not be occupied and that the occupiers have failed to provide basic services and security.

## Tropical Storm Bill lashes US South

New Orleans, 2 July - Heavy rains and high winds swept across the US South on Monday after Tropical Storm Bill slammed into the Louisiana coast, then moved quickly inland.

The storm, with winds up to 60 miles per hour toppled trees, flooded coastal areas and bayous and spawned at least two tornadoes, one of which injured four people when it struck a mobile home in Reserve, Louisiana. Five to 10 inches of rain fell across the area, while forecasters warned of tides five feet above normal.

Hardest hit was Pascagoula, Mississippi, near the Alabama border, where at least eight inches fell. Radar indicated that up to 15 inches may have fallen in nearby rural areas, in Mississippi, a National Weather Service meteorologist said.

Streets in New Orleans' French Quarter filled up with water, forcing Bourbon Street bars that seldom close to shutdown. Evacuations were ordered in coastal Mississippi, while residents of Grand Isle, Louisiana, got cut off from the mainland by tides rising over the lone highway outbound.

As Bill rushed inland from landfall near Morgan City, Louisiana, its effects spread into Alabama, Florida, Georgia and Tennessee.

In a 7 pm CDT (2100 GMT) advisory, the National Hurricane Centre said Bill's centre was 15 miles west of Slidell, Louisiana near Latitude 30.4 north, Longitude 90.3 west. Slidell is 25 miles northeast of New Orleans across Lake Pontchartrain.

## Iraq black market oil trade spawns product shortage

Baghdad, 2 July- The political demise of Saddam Hussein has given rise to a lucrative black market trade in oil products that has deepened Iraq's gas oil and gasoline shortfall, Iraqi oil officials said on Monday.

More oil products than ever before are draining out of Iraq as smugglers-turned-entrepreneurs route up to three million litres a day of gas oil and two million litres a day of gasoline into Jordan, Turkey, Syria and the Gulf, said a senior Iraqi oil executive.

The black marketers are practiced hands, having smuggled about two million litres a day of gas oil and one million litres per day of gasoline for Saddam and his cronies under United Nations sanctions.
"We have never had such a problem," said another Iraqi oil industry, source. "If this keeps up we will have to import even more product." Oil-rich Iraq has already been forced to bring in gasoline and liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) as power cuts and sabotage play havoc with refinery operations. With UN sanctions removed and security broken down, black marketers are out to turn a profit for themselves. Diesel trade is particularly brisk.
"At one point we had enough gas oil stockpiled to sustain a semi-normal level of operation for six months," said a top Iraqi oil official. "Where did it go?"

To hard currency buyers in the Gulf, is the answer. Gas oil, used to fuel truck, buses and generators, is being drained out of refinery storage tanks and trucked down to the Gulf. But US and Iraqi officials have started to crack down in the south, hoping to avoid the import of gas oil.
"There has been a tightening of the screws," said the Iraqi oil executive. "But the Iraqi border is not patrolled and the situation there is much more difficult."-MNA/Reuters

## Iran has no intention of manufacturing nuclear weapons <br> Teheran, 2 July- Iranian President Mohammad

 Khatami on Monday told visiting British Foreign Secretary Jack Straw that Iran has no intention of manufacturing nuclear weapons.Khatami said Iran's national policy is to make use of nuclear energy for peaceful purposes and opposes weapons of mass destruction.

Iran's nuclear programme has been under regular international inspections and the country has full cooperation with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), Khatami said.

He urged the international community to acknowledge Iran's peaceful objectives in developing nuclear energy, and called on

## all countries pursuing a nu-

 clear energy programme without discrimination.The United States, the European Union and IAEA have repeatedly urged Iran to sign an additional protocol to the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, which would allow IAEA experts to pay surprise visits to Iran's nuclear facilities.

During his two-day visit, Straw again pressed Teheran to sign the protocol, saying a step by Iran toward that direction would boost international trust in Iran.

 justification of Iraqi warTокуо, 2 July — About 57 per cent of Japanese do not think the US-led war on Iraq is justified, said a leading Japanese newspaper on Monday. The opposing side almost doubled the supporting side, which accounted for 29 per cent of the respondents, said the Asahi Shimbun.

The United States and the Britain launched attacks against Iraq in March on the ground that Iraq had been hiding weapons of mass destruction which have not been found as yet.

Sixty-seven per cent of respondents said they did not support the war, while 22 per cent said they did, according to the newspaper.

As for Prime Minister Junichiro

Koizumi's support of the war, 50 per cent of the respondents opposed his decision while the supporting group stood at 36 per cent, it said. On whether the government should send the Self-Defence Forces to Iraq in participation of postwar rebuilding, 43 per cent expressed their disagreement while 46 per cent voiced their approval, according to the newspaper. -MNA/Xinhua

will give the economy a boost. Head of State Senior General Than Shwe has given guidance on greater crop yield and laid down the four means - the right agricultural methods, the cultivation of high-yield crops, the combined use of inorganic and organic fertilizers, and the extension of sown acreage. He continued that the combined use of inorganic and organic fertilizers is vital for high yield of crops. As the use of organic fertilizers has become common in world nations, gradual deterioration of soil can be detected. Therefore, it is necessary to apply combined use of inorganic and organic fertilizers so that the richness of soil can be saved. The methods of making EM (effective micro-organism) organic fertilizers will help not only boost the crop yields but also keep the urban and rural areas clean and pleasant and make it free from bad smell, resulting in better health improvement and the disappearance of environmental pollution, he added. # Assessment of the attitude of US and western European nations concerning Myanmar's anti-drug drive

Similarly, since 2001, a ground survey was conducted under the joint programme of the Central Committee for Drug Abuse Control of Myanmar and the UNODC to check the illicit cultivation of opium poppy. The programme recorded an estimated yield of 1,097 metric tons for 2001. Its estimation for 2002 was 828 metric tons. This year's INCB report also said that there was 24 per cent decrease in the nation's poppy cultivation. The records released by the US and the INCB show the significant decline in illicit poppy cultivation and production in Myanmar. And it is a fine result of the harmonious efforts of the nationals under the leadership of the State and international cooperation.

Myanmar has been torching and destroying the seized narcotic drugs annually since 1990. And since the 16th destruction ceremony in 2002, the nation has been incinerating and destroying large hauls of seized drugs on the day marking the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking. Till the 16th destruction, all the specially invited ambassadors of foreign missions in Myanmar, charges d'affaires, military attaches and resident representatives and heads of UN agencies had attended the ceremonies without fail. However, sadly, officials of the US, Britain and some western European embassies in Yangon failed to attend the 17th destruction ceremony. The menace of narcotic drugs is not the problem of a single nation; it concerns with the entire world. Thus, all the peoples around the world have the duty to harmoniously cooperate in solving the problem. With might and main, Myanmar, a developing country, took part in the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking that was held throughout the world under the leadership of the Union on 26 June. The failure of the developed nations, America, Britain and some western European nations, to participate in the ceremony clearly shows their double standard stance and nature when their interests are involved.

I will now present some examples of their doubtful attitude. America presented US \$ 1 million for Wa Alternative Development Project for fiscal 2003-2004. But now, the country has withdrawn its US $\$ 1$ million from the funds. The project is being implemented in Hotaung region, southern Wa region, with the cooperation of the UNODC.

Executive Director Antonio Maria Costa of the UNODC held a meeting at the UNODC Head Office on 18 June 2003. At the meeting, the official explained UNODC's estimate of Myanmar's poppy cultivation and opium production in 2003. However, only four or five journalists attended the meeting. In reality, the scourge of drug problem is concerned with the entire world. In addition, it is a meeting of the UNODC, the main UN body responsible for the international narcotic problem, explaining the poppy cultivation and opium production of the Southeast Asia region including Myanmar. Thus, the media has the duty to distribute the UNODC announcement in detail, in addition to informing the world nations about the situation of the region and to making cooperative efforts for finding an answer to the problem. Because of the acts of the western media to give priority to featuring only a part of the whole story in accord with their wish, there emerges an obstacle to the sector of the international cooperation. And it is one of the examples of the west's negligence.

The Needs Assessment Mission comprising the programme experts of the UNODC, staff of the Japanese Embassy, buckwheat specialists, WHO officials and personnel concerned of the departments toured Wa and Kokang regions from 21 March to 7 April 2003 to gather information and data. The aim of the Mission was to implement an alternative programme in Wa and Kokang regions under the leadership of the Japanese Embassy in Yangon and UNODC. The Mission held a meeting at the Japanese Embassy in Yangon on 10 April to explain and discuss its finds during the expedition. Diplomats of 13 foreign missions in Yangon, and officials of ten UN agencies, government bodies and 12 NGOs attended the meeting. Altogether 55 members of the Mission took part in the discussions.

The discussions covered a wide array of sectors
including the five-year plans that would be implemented in three stages for 15 years to ensure an alternative income source in Wa and Kokang regions; implementation of four projects under the title "Emergency and Pre-Emergency Relief and Assistance" during the first two years from 2003 to 2005 of the first five-year plan, and 17 projects under the heading "Preparatory Work" during the period from 2003 to 2008; and the arrangements to implement the second five-year plan during the period from 2009 to 2013, and the third five-year plan from 2014 to 2018.

The title "the Emergency and Pre-Emergency Relief and Assistance" covers the following projects: (a) Monitoring Cash and Food Crop Production in Kokang

Concerning the plan, Mr Jean-Lue Lemahiew, the resident representative of the UNODC Office in Yangon, expressed his intention to implement the entire plan with the funds of Japan, the main contributor to the plan, and the collective contribution of Germany, Italy, NGOs, the Myanmar government, Wa region authorities and Kokang region authorities. However, America's withdrawal of its fund of US \$ 1 million from the WADP and the absence of the representatives of America, Britain and western European nations at the ceremony to observe the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking in Myanmar as a show of cooperation clearly indicate that the projects which will be implemented in the Kokang and Wa regions will surely face financial difficulties.

All in all, the destruction of the narcotic drugs and precursor chemicals at the 17th ceremony held on the day marking the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking clearly highlights the fact that Myanmar is playing a vital role in cooperating with the international community in the fight against the narcotic drugs. The failure of the big nations, America, Britain and European countries, to render cooperation caused doubts about their will to totally root out the problem of narcotic drugs. The examples I have stated in the above paras clearly express that their changes in attitudes are just to serve their interests rather than to actually drive out the drug problem. Anyhow, Myanmar has already made a firm resolve to root out the narcotic problem as a national task under the guidance of the Head of State. In addition, the nation will make constant efforts in accord with the motto of the year 2003 "Let's talk about Drugs".

## Costa Rican authorities seize 1.31 tons of cocaine

San Jose, 2 July - A the Pacific with eight crewColombian boat carrying 1.31 tons of cocaine has been captured by Costa Rican and US vessels, a security official said Monday.

## Laos jails European reporters, American for 15 years

Bangkok, 2 July - A Laotian courthanded 15 -year prison sentences on Monday to two European journalists and an American citizen who had been reporting in a conflict zone where a security guard was murdered, a Lao diplomat said.

The ruling prompted widespread condemnation, with Paris-based media support group Reporters Without Borders (RSF) saying it was profoundly shocked by the sentences and called the trial a farce.

Belgian Thierry Falise, Frenchman Vincent Reynaud and Naw Karl Mua, an American pastor of Laotian origin, were handed the jail terms in a court in remote northern Xieng Xhouang Province.

They were also fined
to pay combined compensation of about 8,080 US dollars to the family of the dead man, Laotian ambassador to neighbouring Thailand, Hiem Phommachanh, told Reuters.

The foreigners and three local Hmong men were convicted of obstructing officers, possession of war weapons and explosives, possession of drugs and being involved in an incident that caused the death of a local militiaman, the ambassador said.

The three Hmong men received 20-year jail terms.
"All six defendants have the right to appeal within 15 days," the ambassador said.
"Whether to deport or pardon them depends on if they appeal, and negotiations

Lao Government and the three countries of the men," he said. It was not immediately clear how the three pleaded in court.

## Singapore spends $\$ 178 \mathrm{~m}$ in anti-SARS battle

Singapore, 2 July-Singapore Minister for Health Lim Hng Kiang told the Parliament Monday that the government has spent about 178 million US dollars in the battle against SARS.

In breaking down, Lim said that about two thirds or 108 million US dollars was spent on protective gear like gloves, gowns and masks for healthcare staff and patients.

The sum also covered payment for medical screening at Tan Tock Seng Hospital, which was designated to treat SARS cases, fever tents at polyclinics, contact tracing and the administration, and enforcement of home quarantine orders, Lim added.

The rest, about 59 million US dollars was spent on isolation wards and retro-fitting medical facilities, Lim said, noting the financial impact is not a one-off.

He also warned that hospital operating costs have to be adjusted to factor in the continued infection control measures, and so patient fees may have to go up.

## Study says abstinence not vital for fertility treatment <br> Madrid, 2 July - Couples undergoing fertility treatments do not need to abstain from sex for up to a week to

 improve their chances of success, Israeli researchers said on Monday, in findings challenging some standard medical advice.Men are usually advised to avoid sex for two to seven days before some types of fertility treatment, to increase semen volume and sperm count.

But scientists at Soroka University and Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, Beersheba, said this was unnecessary.
"Our data challenge the role of abstinence in male fertility treatments," Dr Eliahu Levitas told a meeting of the European Society of Human Reproduction and Embryology.

Infertility affects about one in six couples because of a problem with the woman, the man or both partners. Male infertility results when no sperm, or not enough, is produced or if their shape or movement is abnormal.
"What we have found is not so relevant to (treatments) where only a single sperm is injected into the egg, but for those treatments where we are trying to get the best possible sperm quality for intra-uterine insemination," Levitas said, referring to a fertility technique in which sperm is injected into the uterus.

The World Health Organization recommends sexual abstinence for two to seven days before fertility treatment to improve the chances of success.

The researchers tested more than 7,200 semen samples for sperm concentration and shape and counts of motile, or active and moving sperm.

About 6,000 samples were from men being tested or treated for infertil-
ity and had avoided sex for up to two weeks. More than 4,500 had normal sperm counts. The rest had reduced counts ranging from mild to severe.

The study found the volume of semen increased after 11 to 14 days of abstinence but the shape and the form of the sperm deteriorated.

In men with low sperm counts, the proportion of motile sperm fell from day two onwards and reached a low at day six.
"Semen volume was directly and significantly correlated with duration of abstinence, while sperm motility was inversely and significantly related to abstinence in oligozoospermic (reduced sperm count) samples only," Levitas said. - MNA/Reuters

## NASA releases e-mail to doomed "Columbia" crew

Washington, 2 July- Shuttle Columbia commander Rick Husband and pilot William McCool knew that insulating foam hit the craft after liftoff, but were told it was "not even worth mentioning," according to an e-mail released on Monday.

Investigators have said the foam strike seconds after launch is the most probable cause of the 1 February disaster, in which the craft disintegrated over Texas as it reentered the atmosphere, killing all seven astronauts aboard.

The message from Steve Stich, a space shuttle flight director at NASA's Johnson Space Centre, sent on 23 January, aimed to prepare Husband and McCool for any possible media questions about the foam strike.
"There is one item that I would like to make you aware of," Stich wrote. "This item is not even worth mentioning other than wanting to make sure that you are not surprised by it in a question from a reporter."

Stich went on to say that photo analysis showed that foam insulation from the shuttle's external fuel tank had fallen onto the shuttle's left wing "in the area of transition from Chine to Main Wing" - where the shuttle's shape flares from nose to wing but was no cause for concern.
"The impact appears to be totally on the lower surface and no particles are seen to traverse over the upper surface of the wing,"

Malaria broken out in the hill districts in southeastern Bangladesh in an epidemic form recently, and over 100 people died of the disease in two districts mostly due to lack of proper medicare.

In Khagrachhari District, a total of 3,700 malaria patients were admitted into health complexes in the last three months, and of them 68 died. A total of 2,125 malaria patients were admitted into hospitals in Rangamati District in the same period, and of them 36 died.- MNA/Xinhua

## Agassi defeat rains on US parade

London, 2 July-A new name will be engraved on the Wimbledon men's singles trophy this year after Andre Agassi, the last former champion in the draw, suffered a shattering five-set defeat by Australian Mark Philippoussis on Monday.

Unseeded Philippoussis unleashed an astonishing 46 aces, equalling the all-time Wimbledon record for a single match, to beat the second seed and world number one 6-3, 2-6, 6-7, 6-3, 6-4 in a fourth-round epic on court one.
"To finally get him, and the way it happened, I'm just very pleased," said the Australian, who had lost his previous six matches against Agassi.

Philippoussis's victory ruined an otherwise superb day for the Americans. Andy Roddick sealed his quarter-final place and the four leading American women, Serena and Venus Williams, Lindsay Davenport and Jennifer Capriati all swept through to the last eight after a rain-delayed start to the day.

British hopes of a first home men's winner since 1936 remained alive after Tim Henman defeated last year's runner-up, Argentine David Nalbandian, 6-2, 6-7 7-5, $6-3$, to reach the quarterfinals for the seventh time in eight years.

Henman will now play either Spanish third seed Juan Carlos Ferrero or Frenchman Sebastian Grosjean. Grosjean led 6-2, $4-6,7-6$ when play was stopped due to bad light.

Russia suffered as four of their five women lost, including shrieking 16 -yearold wild card Maria Sharapova, but Belgian duo Justine Henin-Hardenne and Kim Clijsters moved through to the quarterfinals as expected.

Philippoussis, ranked 48, equalled Goran Ivanisevic's 1997 record of 46 aces in a single match at the All England Club to leave 33 -year-old Agassi forlorn and exhausted after the best match so far of the men's draw.

The win ended a run of six straight defeats by Agassi and avenged his 2000 Wimbledon quarter-final defeat by the 1992 champion.
round exit of defending champion Lleyton Hewitt in the first round. It means there is no previous winner in the men's quarter-finals for the first time since 1973.

Philippoussis next plays German Alexander Popp, a quarterfinalist at Wimbledon three years ago, who made the most of his 14-inch height advantage over Belgium's Olivier Rochus to win 5-7, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

Roddick convincingly saw off 12 th-seed Thai Paradorn Srichaphan 6-4, 3-6, 6-3, 6-2, although he was made to fight by the Thai.

The 20-year-old American, seeking his first grand slamtitle, faces an unseeded player in the last eight in Sweden's Jonas Bjorkman who beat Belarussian Max Mirnyi in four sets.

Roddick is still on course for a semi-final meeting with talented Swiss fourth seed Roger Federer, who beat Spain's Feliciano Lopez 7-6, 6-4, 6-4 despite play through back pain after injuring himself warming up.

Federer's quarterfinal opponent, assuming he is fit, is Dutch eighth seed Sjeng Schalken, who ousted Australian Open run-ner-up Rainer Schuettler of Germany in three sets.

The six favourites for the women's crown - the American quartet plus Henin and Clijsters - again had an easy time of it.

Not one of them has dropped a set in the tournament so far.

Serena out-clubbed Russian Elena Dementieva 6-2, 6-2 on Centre Court and will next face Capriati, seeded eighth, after she demolished Anastasia Myskina 6-2, 6-3.

Capriati is the last player to have beaten Serena at Wimbledon. She won their epic 2001 quarter-final in three sets.

Fourth seed Venus, the 2000 and 2001 Wimbledon champion, avenged her French Open defeat by Russian Vera Zvonareva 6-1, 6-3 to set up another all-American quarterfinal against fifth seed Lindsay Davenport.

## buys Chelsea

London, 2 July-Chelsea football club is to be bought by Russian billionaire Roman Abramovich in a deal worth $£ 140 \mathrm{~m}$.

The surprise takeover - the biggest in British football history - was finalised late on Tuesday after talks with long-time chairman Ken Bates.
He bought the club in 1982 for just $£ 1$, while taking on debts of $£ 1.5 \mathrm{~m}$.
Though the club has prospered, debts have grown and it is estimated the new owner will stump up $£ 80 \mathrm{~m}$ to cover them.
On top of that, Mr Abramovich is buying just over half the shares of Chelsea Village, which owns the football club, for 35 pence each - putting the total value of the club's shares at $£ 59.3 \mathrm{~m}$.
The Russian businessman pledged to plough even more resources into the club while Mr Bates said the deal would move Chelsea onto the "next level".
"We are delighted to agree this deal to acquire what is already one of the top clubs in Europe," Mr Abramovich said.
"We have the resources and ambition to achieve even more given the huge potential of this great club."

Mr Abramovich is one of the major shareholders in Sibneft, one of Russia's largest oil companies, and "a keen follower of sport and international football," a statement said.

BBC Business Editor Jeff Randall said Mr Abramovich also has significant interests in Russia's aluminium industry, and owns stakes in Russian airline Aeroflot and a Russian television company
The TV interests were significant, "as in the modern game today TV rights are what it's all about," he said.
"Football has been in terrible trouble in this country recently - it's clocked up huge debts and the transfer market has collapsed,"
