

Three US soldiers killed in Iraqi blasts

A roadside bomb ripped through a US military convoy north of Baghdad, killing three soldiers

A military vehicle was destroyed in the blast that occurred at around 9 am (06:00 GMT) near the town of Samarra, 100 km north of Baghdad, a US military statement said. In the northern city of Arbil, four peoplewere killed and 20 others injuredin a car bomb explosion,our correspondent reported.

The explosion took place at the entrance of the Interior Ministry headquarters at 08:50 GMT, setting the building ablaze and killing the security guards.

The blast also shattered the windows of nearby residential buildings. The cause of the explosion was not immediately known. The policecordoned off the area

BAGHDAD, 25 Dec-Eight people, including three US soldiers, were killed in Irac on Wednesday, in three separate incidents.

In the third incident, one person was killed andfour, including a child, were injured when a landmine exploded under neath a car, near al-Shurta flyover in Baghdad, the correspondent reported.

Baghdad bombing Meanwhile, US aircraft and artillery units blasted suspected rebel hideouts in Baghdad overnight. Dozens of explosions were heard across the city in one of Baghdad's heaviest bombardments since the end of the US-led war. Tokyo hesitant to grant Iraq debt relief

Токуо, 25 Dec—Tokyo was a strong backer of the U.S.led invasion, is a top contributor to reconstruction and just approved a plan to send troops to the region. But when it comes to the recent US campaign for debt relief for Iraq, top

creditor Japan is so far keeping its hands on its wallet. While war-critics France, Germany and Russia have voiced support for reducing Iraq's crushing debt burden during recent visits by US envoy James A Baker III, Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi's administration has been quiet on whether it's willing to join the effort.

Japan estimates its Iraqi credit at \$4.54 billion, saying the figure rises to \$7.76 billion when penalty fees are included. That puts it in competition with Russia - owed an estimated \$8 billion - as the top holder of Iraq debt in the 19-nation Paris Club.

'Japan has not made any decisions concerning that matter," said Yu Kameoka, a spokesman for Koizumi

The former American secretary of state has already visited Paris, Rome, Berlin, London and Moscow to call for help in reducing Iraq's crushing debt.-Internet

Explosion rocks Sheraton Hotel in Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 25 Dec - A huge explosion rocked a luxurious hotel, which houses western journalists and merchants, in Iraq's capital city of Baghdad late Wednesday, witnesses said.

The witnesses said they saw a projectile hit the Sheraton Hotel in central Baghdad around 8:30 pm (1730 GMT).

There was no report of casualties or source of the bombing. "We have nothing about the explosion.

All we know is that it is in central Baghdad," said a US spokeswoman.

The same hotel was hit by at least one rocket fired from an automatic launcher carried by a donkey cart last month.

Heavily fortified by concrete walls and US tanks, the hotel is one of several hotels favoured by most foreign reporters and contractors.

The suspected guerillas attack highlighted the fresh wave of violence on eve of the first Christmas in post-Saddam Iraq

Three US soldiers died when guerillas detonated a roadside bomb near their convoy near Samarra early Wednesday.

A suicide bomber exploded outside an Iraqi government building in the northern city of Arbil midday, killing at least four people and injuring 20 others.

Meanwhile a roadside bomb detonated in a busy area in western Baghdad around noon resulted in one Iraqi dead and at least two others wounded.-Internet

China enforces intellectual property protection

BEIJING, 25 Dec — China's State Intellectual Property Office (SIPO) organized Tuesday an inter-agency consultation for strengthening administrative enforcement, together with law enforcement, to effectively protect intellectual property.

Since China gained access to the World Trade Organization (WTO) in 2001, more intellectual property disputes have occurred. Against this backdrop, the SIPO decided to coordinate with other agencies to further enhance intellectual property protection. Wang Jingchuan, commissioner of the SIPO. said that the Chinese still lack

awareness of intellectual

property protection. Disorder in markets and protectionism impedes healthy mechanisms for safeguarding intellectual property.

Wang said that all these existing deficiencies endanger the innovative ability of inventors and affect foreign investment into industries rich in intellectual property rights. The Chinese Government has already listed intellectual

property protection as a key area for regulating the market economy. In an order issued to local intellectual property watchdogs, the SIPO urged a focus on restricting intellectual property violations in large-scale commodity fairs. technological and investment exhibitions and in industries that make medicines, food, and construction materials

Indian Govt to divest 10% equity each in ONGC and GAIL

New Delhi, 25 Dec — Indian Government on Tuesday night decided to divest 10 per cent equity each in oil Public Sector Undertakings ONGC and GAIL, valued at 125 billion rupees at current market prices, during the current fiscal, a move that would help meet the disinvestment target set for 2003-04.

Announcing the decision taken at the meeting of the Cabinet Committee on Disinvestment (CCD), Disinvestment Minister Arun Shourie told reporters that "market is buoyant and the Prime Minister and the Finance Minister wanted retail investors to share the buoyancy in the market."

The equity sale in the domestic market would be completed during the current financial year and an inter-ministerial Committee comprising Ministers of Finance, Law, Petroleum and Disinvestment would take day-to-day decisions including procedural issues and quantum of equity to be earmarked for retail investors. Shourie said. Asked about the value of the equity to be sold in the market. Shourie said at current prices, the equity to be offloaded is valued at 107 billion rupees and 18 billion rupees (totalling Rs 125 billion).

On whether government could consider divestment through overseas ADR issue, he said the Committee of Ministers would have to approach the CCD with such a proposal in case it does not find depth in the market (domestic).

The CCD meeting was chaired by Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vaipavee. - MNA/PTI

Polish President describes situation in Iraq as unstable

WARSAW, 25 Dec— Polish President Aleksander Kwasniewski said on Tuesday that the situation in Iraq is extremely unstable.

Poland will face a difficult task to stabilize Iraq in 2004, the President told a Press conference here after a surprise pre-Christmas visit to Polish peacekeepers in Iraq on Monday. He added that the number of multinational peacekeeping troops in Iraq is expected to be reduced in 2005 if everything goes well.

Kwasniewski said there are 2,400 trained Iraqi soldiers to assist the peacekeepers in the Poland-run stability zone in Iraq and 3,700 Iraqi police officers will also be trained for work in the zone. — MNAXinhua

Italy cancels Zambia's debt

LUSAKA, 25 Dec — The Italian Government has cancelled Zambia's external debt amounting to 28 million US dollars.

An agreement to the effect was signed Monday between Zambian Finance Minister Ng'andu Magande and Italian Ambassador to Zambia Tullio Guma, in the Zambian capital Lusaka.

The Paris Club agreement gives Zambia a 100per-cent write-off of all debts due during the period between January 2001 and March 2003.

Magande said this means that Zambia did not make any debt service payments to Italy during this period. *MNA/Xinhua*

Dozen explosions rock southern Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 25 Dec— Explosions and machinegun fire rocked a neighbourhood in south Baghdad on Tuesday where US forces involved in Operation Iron Justice encountered gunmen, witnesses said.

Helicopters and explosions could be heard from the south of the city several kilometres away in central Baghdad. "We don't see any flashes of impact, we're just hearing sounds," a *Reuters* witness said from the centre of the city.

The blasts were the most sustained in some time in the Iraqi capital.

Residents near the explosions said US forces were engaged in a heavy firefight with gunmen in a neighbour-

Blix optimistic about restricting spread of banned weapons

LONDON, 25 Dec — Former chief of the United Nations weapons inspector Hans Blix still remains optimistic about preventing the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, the British *Financial Times* newspaper reported on Tuesday.

Events in Iraq would not in any way subvert the value and credibility of future weapons inspections around the world, Blix Blix said terrorists have so far failed to

Blix said terrorists have so far failed to launch any devastating attacks with them.

In the interview, Blix also claimed that "everybody is becoming convinced that there are not any weapons of mass destruction in Iraq and in all likelihood have not been for a long time."

US mum on talks to explore UN role in Iraq

UNITED NATIONS, 25 Dec — UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan will meet with Iraqi officials next month to explore a UN role in guiding Baghdad's return to selfgovernment, but the United States is keeping silent on whether it will attend the talks, a UN spokesman said on Wednesday.

While President Bush told Annan by telephone that he thought a three-way meeting was "a good idea," the US-led Coalition Provisional Authority administering Iraq has not responded to a UN invitation for the meeting, set for Jan 19 in New York, said chief UN spokesman Fred Eckhard.

Iraq's Governing Council has accepted the invitation and will be represented by Massoud Barzani, Abdul Aziz al-Hakim and Adnan Pachachi, the United Nations said.

Told by a reporter that coalition officials were insisting they had not been contacted about the meeting, Eckhard said Annan had personally extended the invitation to Bush.

"I don't think the secretary-general feels that he needs to extend an invitation directly to the CPA when he has already done so to President Bush," Eckhard said.

In Washington, State Department spokeswoman Brenda Greenberg said the United States knew about the meeting and understood the coalition had been invited. "We have not formally accepted the invitation to attend the meeting," she told Reuters.

Eckhard said Annan would prefer a single meeting with representatives of both the coalition and the Iraqi Governing Council but would meet separately with the two groups if a coalition representative could not make it on 19 January.

Annan suggested the meeting after Iraqi Foreign Minister Hoshyar Zebari appealed to the United Nations on 16 December to immediately return to Iraq and assume a leading role in guiding the country's reconstruction. Internet

China supports Afghanistan reconstruction

BELING, 25 Dec — China will try its best to support Afghanistan's reconstruction, said Chinese Foreign Ministry Spokesman Liu Jianchao here Tuesday.

According to Liu Jianchao, Chinese Vice Foreign Minister Lu Xinhua started his visit to Afghanistan on 20 December and held meetings with Vice- President of Afghanistan's interim government Nimartullah Shaharani and Afghan Foreign Minister Abdullah Abdullah.Shaharani said Afghanistan valued its relations with China and thanked China for its assistance ever since, hoping China would continue to help boost economic development.

Arab League's chief calls for Arab involvement in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 25 Dec — Arab League chief Amr Mussa called on Arab nations to back efforts to rebuild war-torn Iraq after talking with members of the Governing Council, amid ongoing US efforts against anti-coalition guerillas in Operation Iron Grip.

The US-led coalition that administers Iraq also warned its members to be on heightened alert against attacks over the holiday season, as Christians in Baghdad celebrated Christmas Eve mass amid security fears.

"Coalition members are cautioned to be especially alert over the next 10 days and to take appropriate steps to increase their security awareness," said a notice from the Coalition Provisional Authority (CPA) Regional Security Co-ordinator.

"We are seeing continuing indications following the capture of Saddam Hussein that elements are planning actions against CPA and Iraqi interests in order to demonstrate that they are still a significant force," the notice said.

The Arab League meanwhile was entreated to play a key role in rebuilding wartorn Iraq Wednesday, by Governing Council member Iyad Alawi.

In response, Mussa, speaking at the opening of the 20th session of the Arab council of ministers urged "attending ministers, Arab companies, state and private, to join in force in the international competition for Iraq's reconstruction".

"The door is open to Arab companies to enter the Iraqi market," said Mussa, adding that "there is no reason to fear the competition of conglomerates, because they could not drive the reconstruction alone."

Earlier in the day, Mussa had warned that foreign troops in Iraq would come under attack for as long as they remain in the country despite Saddam's capture.

"As long as there are foreign troops (in Iraq), there will be resistance," he told the BBC.—*Internet*

Thai Cabinet approves \$3.43b budget

Ванскок, 25 Dec- The Thai Cabinet Tuesday approved a budget of 135.5 billion baht (3.430 billion US dollars) aimed at stimulating the economy and providing compensation for civil servants taking early retirement.

Announcing the budget after Tuesday morning's Cabinet meeting, Deputy Prime Minister Somkid Jatusripitak said that the budget had been divided into five parts.

The first part of 33.04 billion baht (0.836 billion US dollars) has been earmarked for civil service pensions, while the second part of 14.59 billion baht (0.365 billion US dollars) has been earmarked for early retirement programmes. The third part of 16.57 billion baht (0.419 billion US dollars) will be given over as compensation to state officials. the fourth part of 59 billion baht (1.493 billion US dollars) will be used to boost national competitiveness, and the final part of 12.3 billion baht (0.311 billion US dollars) will be given to local administrative organizations

UN approves two-year budget topping \$3b

UNITED NATIONS, 25 Dec - The General Assembly has approved a two-year UN budget topping three billion US dollars, but inflation and currency market volatility are expected to eat up all the increased funding, UN officials said on Wednesday.

The budget, adopted by the 191-nation Assembly by consensus late on Tuesday, would authorize the world body to spend 3.16 billion US dollars in 2004 and 2005, or 1.58 billion US dollars annually.

The two-year budget has grown by about 15 per cent over the past 10 years and was nearly flat between 1994 and 2001, but most of the decade's increases reflect adjustments for inflation, the officials said.

The new budget compares to 2.97 billion US dollars for 2002-2003.

UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan requested 3.01 billion US dollars for 2004-2005, but the extra funding approved by the Assembly was again limited to adjustments required to keep up with inflation and the cost of the falling US dollar, said Warren Sach, the UN programme planning and budget director.

"In real terms, the budget remains at the same level,' Sach told reporters.

To help cope with future

dollar fluctuations, the Assembly authorized Annan to seek dues from some countries in currencies other than US dollars over the next three years. The Assembly also approved 62 of the 117 new posts that Annan requested and gave him new powers to shift staff and funding to deal with changing priorities.

The budget provides more money mainly for development programmes and particularly for the special needs of Africa, hit hard by civil wars, poverty and soaring AIDS caseloads. It also funnels extra money to crime prevention, and humanitarian aid.

The United Nations is funded primarily through dues from member nations and the Assembly extended for three more years an assessment scale adopted in 2000 despite complaints from some developing nations that their dues had jumped under the new scale. Assessments were revised in 2000 at the insistence of the United States, which wanted its dues cut.-MNA/Reuters Syria on the defensive at summit with Egypt

While the BCP's headquarters at Bago Yoma was under attack from all sides by the Tatmadaw hand in hand with local national races during the period from 1966 to 1975, the central committee in exile set up Shan State Base at Intawkyaukgu region as the liberated strategic area. After forming the BCP headquarters (branch) in Shan State, the five-year Moelonhein Plan was drawn during 1966 to occupy the whole country through the penetration of the mainland. The five-year Moelonhein Plan was designed to bring Shan State under control first and then the mainland. Owing to the offensives launched by the Tatmadaw. Mekauk Hla Maung, secretary of the headquarters (branch), and seven enemies were captured dead in a battle on 27 July 1970. And five enemies including Thakhin Tin Tun, chairman of the headquarters (branch), were also captured dead on 8 September and 38 assorted arms seized.

Later, the northeast military region of the BCP moved from Mongya region to Kokang region in November 1970 and settled there so as to expand the areas on the east of Thanlwin river.

The BCP with the strength of over 3,000 attacked Kunlon for forty days from 19 November to 28 December 1971. When it comes to the effort to ensure the perpetuity of independence and sovereignty of the State, Kunlon battle is of historical importance in that the Tatmadaw, sacrificing their lives, blood and sweat, had to engage pitched battles with the BCP which came to threaten the territorial integrity and sovereignty of the State.

In that battle, the Tatmadaw, with the strength of one mobile tactical operation unit and four regiments, No 77 Light Infantry Division and five regiments, put up strong resistance against the enemies. Members of Kokang defence units, police forces and the entire people of Kunlon assisted the Tatmadaw. It was on 19 November that the BCP entered Kunlon using its massive manpower and weapons at its best. As of 20 November, they started attacking Mankha base. The Tatmadaw resisted them tooth and nail. The fight was so intense that there broke out eight bayonet fights.

Moreover, the BCP

shelled heavily Lwemankha base on a 4,000-foot-high mountain range on 22, 25 and 26 November and Shaungtilin base on a 6,000foot-high mountain range on 26 November. And they started attacking wellknown Haitkanna on 30 November. While the BCP regiments were attacking Haitkanna, the other two regiments were tasked to block the Tatmadaw reinforcements. The BCP launched severe attacks on Haitkanpa base because the base overlooked Kunlon and served as an area of strategic defensive with geo-

of Kunlon. Throughout the Kunlon battle. the Tatmadaw fought with bravery the enemies, although more than ten times stronger in manpower than it was, for forty days with patriotism and love for the country That was a historical milestone in discharging the national duty. The infantry fought Kunlon battle with the effective support of Myanma Air Force. In fact, the Kunlon battle turned out to be the historical battle of the Tatmadaw because it could not only break into pieces the military fang of the

During the 12-year period from 1962 to 1973. 9.478 Tatmadaw officers. rankers and privates sacrificed lives for perpetuation of independence and sovereignty of the State in safeguarding the nation. Moreover. 21,640 enemy troops were killed in the battles and altogether 48,039 were captured alive and had surrendered. Those were the en-

graphical advantage for military purpose. From the point of military strategy, the capture of Haitkanpa base would amount to the capture of Kunlon. Haitkanpa battle being the decisive one, the BCP used its strength all out. Therefore, the Tatmadaw had to withdraw temporarily.

Officers and other ranks of the Tatmadaw had already realized that there was no other alternative except to fight to the death as Kunlon might be lost if they failed to recapture Haitkanpa base. Therefore, the Tat-madawmen engaged in the fight attacked the BCP enemies most intensely with the support of heavy weapons. At last, the enemies fled in disarray for their lives, leaving the bodies and the wounded of their fellows The Tatmadaw thus crushed the enemy's offensives and recaptured Haitkanpa base. While the enemies were in disarray, the Tatmadaw went after them launching offensives. At 12.15 pm on 1 December 1971, the main column of the BCP collapsed and fled.

On 18 December, the BCP enemies all withdrew from the whole battle field Mongla regions.



Besides. one Vampire aircraft of the Defence Services (Air) was lost. The battles that broke out in Chushwe and Pankauk are in fact a historical victory that cost the Tatmadaw dear

As the Air Force gave air support for the ground forces, 100 members of the BCP's force of 1.300 men were killed and many others wounded in the battles. The insurgents had to flee in disarray. Forty-one Tatmadaw members sacrificed lives for the nation, and 48 were wounded.

Although the BCP insurgents were forced to withdrew with a large number of casualties during the 40-day Kunlon battle and also in their second offensive, they thought Tanyan as a strategically important place. Thus, they launched attacks on Nonghlaing, Paphant and Point 6041 in Lwesant areas in Tanyan region. As the Tatmadaw members gallantly fought back the insurgents there occurred fierce battles in the region. During the battles which continued for 20 days from 6 to 25 March 1978. Over 500 insurgents were killed and many others wounded. Ninety officers, rankers and privates of the Tatmadaw sacrificed lives for the nation, and 176 were wounded. As the Tatmadaw was driving out and crushing the BCP, the latter was seeing a decline on the political and military fronts. In order to save itself from the decline on the two fronts, the BCP attacked Mongyawng region in the Eastern Command area with a large number of men on 19 April 1980 and again in July the same year. In the first battle, the Tatmadaw seized seven weapons and captured 81 insurgents dead. In the second battle 91 insurgents were killed and another 115 were wounded. Sixty-eight officers, rankers and privates of the Tatmadaw sacrificed lives for the nation, and 72 were wounded.

About 8,000 BCPs

der the command of the North-East Command No 33 Light Infantry Division and No 99 Light Infantry Division launched a major offensive against the enemy to recapture the camps. The Tatmadaw columns were able to retake all the camps on 3 January 1987. On 6 January the same year. the Tatmadaw seized Mvintan village and Kyugok (Pansai). Tatmadaw members totalling 175 sacrificed lives for the nation during the battles. The Tatmadaw captured 591 insurgents dead and 10 alive. Another 109 enemy troops surrendered.

The BCP launched all-out attacks on Mongyawng region for eight days from 23 to 30 September 1988. The BCP's scheme was to grab power by launching attacks on both political and military fronts, while trying to take the military and political advantage. The BCP's plot was that if it won the Mongyawng region, it would continue to seize Muse, Namhkam and Kyugok (Pansai), and after that to slice the whole Shan State from the Union, and to blackmail the Tatmadaw Government.

However, the Tatmadaw daringly and fiercely fought back the BCP insurgents to stop and crush their offensive which began on 23 September 1988. There were 14 major battles and 23 minor ones and 30 bayonet fights. Fifty-one Tatmadaw members including four officers sacrificed lives for the nation and 124 their limbs. The BCP casualty was 202.

Because of the weakness of the BSPP at central in many aspects, its organization activities in lower party ranks and in the public began to decline. And the consequences had led to occurrence of a general discontentment among the public. Moreover, the repercussions from

Indonesia eyes higher investment in oil, gas


JAKARTA, 25 Dec — The Indonesian Government is confident that investment in oil and gas sector will increase next year in line with the climbing crude oil price in international market, an official said here Wednesday.

"The oil and gas sector provides a bright future because oil price stays high and will keep climbing," lin Arifin Takhyan, directorgeneral of oil and gas department under the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources, was quoted as saying by Detikcom online news service.


He claimed that investment in the sector rose to 6 billion US dollars this year from 5 billion in 2002.

To attract investment, the government next year will open tender for 10 new oil and gas blocs for any eligible investors, foreign or local, he said.

Indonesia is one of the world's major oil producers with an output of around 1 million barrels per day. It is also the only member of the Organization of Petroleum-Exporting Countries (OPEC) in Southeast Asia.

Indonesia needs infrastructure financing agency

JAKARTA, 25 Dec- Indonesia needs to set up an infrastructure financing agency to help boost private investments in the sector, which has largely been neglected, said the National Development Planning Board (Bappenas). As the state budget will continue to limit the government's spending on infrastructure, the involvement of the private sector is a must, the Jakarta Post Wednesday quoted a Bappenas report as saying.

Private investment is the only means through which the government could expect to bridge the financing gap — the margin between the real investment needs for the sector and the budget the government can afford to allocate, said Suyono Dikun, Bappenas deputy chairman. The breadth of the gon

The breadth of the gap should serve as further evi-

dence of how badly the country's infrastructure sector needs private investment. Citing a Bappenas study, the report forecast that in order to support an economic growth of between 5 per cent to 7 per cent during the 2004-2009 period, some 613 trillion rupiah (72 billion US dollars) in investment would be needed. The figures are a minimum estimate as the study only covered investment for the construction of roads, power plants, fixed and mobile phone services, and irrigation and sanitation systems.

With an estimated government spending of 346.5 trillion rupiah (40.8 billion dollars) in the sector, the financing gap will be about 266.5 trillion rupiah (31.4 billion dollars), which is expected to come from the private sector.—*MNA/Xinhua*

Cambodia's "IT" industry still faces many hurdles

PHNOM PENIH, 25 Dec— A two-day seminar was opened here on Wednesday, aimed to highlight the challenges facing small businesses and teach them practical ways to benefit from the Internet.

"We have to be more conscious, more vocal, more aggressive in pushing policy that helps the poor," Commerce Ministry Secretary of State Sok Siphana said at the seminar.

A report issued Wednesday by the International Trade Centre, a body created by the UN and the World Trade Organization, which sponsored Wednesday's seminar, showed that Cambodia has the "dubious distinction" of having the lowest Internet penetration in Southeast Asia and at the highest prices. A major reason for this,

A high reason tof this, the report said, is that the country has only 27 fixed phone lines for every 10,000 people. "Although important progress has been made in the last two years, Cambodia remains one of the least connected countries in the region and perhaps the only country in the world with mobile penetration rates double that of fixed line penetration", the report said.

It also noted that investors shy away from investing in fixed lines because of excessive bureaucracy at the Ministry of Posts and Telecommunications and the lack of a clear framework for awarding licences and setting

regulatory rules. Though the seminar re-

vealed many shortcomings of the country's information technology infrastructure, it also showcased local companies using Internet to increase sales.

Industry leaders said Phnom Penh youths were driving the IT sector here, which includes everything from computer sales to installing Internet networks to designing Web pages. But the industry still has many hurdles. For instance, the number of fixed phone lines for Internet connections remains inadequate, computers are too expensive for many families to afford and students in computer-related courses often lack essential skills. - MNA/Xinhua

Over 40% of Vietnamese men heavy smokers

Wednesday.

HANOI, 25 Dec — Up to 49.2 per cent of Vietnam men smoke cigarettes and 38.9 per cent of them are addicts, showed a latest survey by the Vietnam Association for Standard and Consumer Protection.

Twenty-one per cent of local smokers started smoking when they were juvenile, the association said on Vietnamese smokers spend a total of 30 billion Vietnamese dong (1.92 million US dollars) on cigarettes each year, said the survey.

In a bid to reduce the number of smokers, the government has decided to impose higher taxes on cigarettes from January 2004. All kinds of cigarettes will carry a value-added tax of 10 per cent in addition to fairly high existing special consumption taxes.

It has also decided not to allow investment in new tobacco factories and production expansion. However, renewing equipment to improve the quality of cigarettes is permitted.

Top German TV comedian quits despite pleas to stay on

BERLIN, 25 Dec- Germany's top comedian Harald Schmidt pulled the plug on his popular latenight television show on Tuesday, ignoring pleas from Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder and thousands of viewers to stay on the air

Schmidt's eight years of biting satire and selfhumour deprecating brought laughter into the lives of millions of Germans and he was a ratings star at the struggling Sat-1 network

Schroeder said recently he was a big admirer of Schmidt, 46, and joined other fans in urging the comedian to reconsider his shock decision to quit at the peak of his career.

"He's a brilliant entertainer," Schroeder said. "Sometimes he cracks too many jokes at the expense of others, especially at my expense. But in his show it's all okay. It would be a terrible shame if it quits for good."

Sat-1's share price dropped about 10 per cent in early December after Schmidt announced he was quitting. Investors were worried about the network's loss of its most recognizable name.

In 1,363 shows, Schmidt enjoyed a fiercely loyal following of welleducated and wealthy

viewers loved by advertis-

"We don't want to bore you anymore", Schmidt said with a deadpan look at the start of his final show on Tuesday.

"Final shows are often big disappointments. I feel sorry for our audience if they're expecting something special tonight."

Schmidt unabashedly copied the studio setting of American late-night entertainer David Letterman, but "The Harald Schmidt Show" had a distinctly German format tailored to German humour and developed a cult-like following.



first time via Internet BEIJING, 25 Dec- China's Foreign Minister Li

Zhaoxing answered questions raised by Chinese people through the Internet Tuesday afternoon, saying ordinary people's questions about whether China should adopt more aggressive diplomatic policies often left them deep in thought.

It was the first time that a Chinese Foreign Minister has communicated with ordinary Chinese via the Internet.

"Many of the Internet users' viewpoints are helpful for the government's diplomatic policy making," Li said. "We need help and support from our people.' The 105-minute-long

online communication via the Foreign Ministry's website and Xinhua News Agency's website was arranged at the request of the public, ministry sources said.

People asked more than 2,000 questions of the minister, including "Will China participate in the reconstruction of Iraq?" "How are diplomatic policies made?" and "Are there any shortcomings in China's current diplomacy?" Observers say the communication was a sign that ordinary Chinese are increasingly interested in discussing their viewpoints on China's diplomatic policies openly.

India, Myanmar, Thailand to take up **Trilateral Highway Project**

New Delhi, 25 Dec- Embarking on a new spell in trilateral relations, India, Myanmar and Thailand on Tuesday decided take up from early next year the first phase of the 700 million dollar 1,360-kilometre-long Trilateral Highway Project linking the three countries.

The first phase of the highway running from Moreh (India), Mae Sot (Thailand) through Bagan in Myanmar includes construction of 78 kilometres of new roads and upgrading about 400 kilometres of single lane roads into two-lane ones, External Affairs Minister Yashwant Sinha told reporters at a joint Press meet here with his counterparts from Thailand Surakiart Sathirathai and from Myanmar Foreign Minister.

Sinha said the first phase is estimated to cost 252 million dollars of which India will contribute about 100 million dollars, Thailand about 90 million dollars and the remaining coming from Myanmar.

The second phase would involve 154 million dollars and the final phase likely to cost 284 million dollars.

A decision on constructing the trilateral highway was taken by the three foreign ministers when they met in Yangon in April last year to discuss transport linkages.

Sinha said the three sides have decided to appoint a group of senior officials to continuously review the progress of the project. This will be at the level of Directors General (Joint Secretary) and the group's first meeting will be held in Myanmar in January, he said.

The three foreign ministers would meet again in Myanmar in the first half of next year to review the progress of the work. Sinha said.

He said the effort was on to bring political will to bear on administrative issues to ensure that this was translated into intensive trilateral cooperation.

With the implementation of the first trilateral project, the second project for the promotion of a highway from Kanchanaburi in Thailand to Dawei deep seaport in Myanmar and shipping links to seaports in India would be on the fast track, he said.

Both the projects are expected to facilitate movement of goods and peoples across borders and cooperation in other areas

Sathirathai said "it is a win-win situation for all the three countries and would lead to all round prosperity besides promoting tourism, trade and investments.

Researchers warn of higher cold death toll in Britain

LONDON, 25 Dec - British researchers on Tuesday warned of higher death toll from cold around the Christmas season in Britain, describing Britain as one of the worst countries in the world at coping with icy conditions.

"If we see much more of the cold weather of recent days, it is likely that as many as 50,000 people will die unneces-sarily over this winter," said Professor Sian Griffiths, president of the Faculty of Public Health said.

She noted that many of the illnesses and deaths resulted from people living in damp and cold housing.

Although the government has shown commitment to tacking the problem, it has not given sufficient priority to such an important public health issue," she said, urging everyone to look out for vulnerable family, friends and neighbours. Researchers from her institute said the death toll from cold might be higher than those in Finland or Russia, Sky News reported.

An estimated 40,000 more people may die between December and March in Britain than at other times of the year. Most of the victims are elderly. More than half of the deaths are due to heart attacks, strokes and circulatory problems and a third from lung disease, researchers said. MNA/Xinhua

Bad weather leaves nearly 300 Filipinos dead or missing

MANILA, 25 Dec — The Philippine authorities said Tuesday the number of the dead or missing reached nearly 300 in the series of disasters caused by the recent spate of bad weather across much of the Philippines.

The National Disaster Coordinating Council (NDCC) said the death toll of last week's heavy landslides in the central Visayas and the southern Mindanao reached 133 persons as efforts were stepped up to account scores of others who are still missing

"A total of 133 persons were confirmed dead and numbers of fatalities are expected to increase as recoverv operations continue."

said the NDCC, adding that 109 persons remained missing in the Southern Leyte, Central Visayas, Caraga, and Southern Mindanao.

Philippine Defence Secretary Eduardo Ermita, who is also chairman of the disaster agency, said he was considering calling off search operations and declaring those missing as dead as hopes for more survivors dimmed. The official number of against the erroneously reported 120 injured on Monday in the calamity. 

Greek officials refuse to take extra measures on flu outbreak

ATHENS, 25 Dec— Greek Health Ministry staff and experts decided Tuesday against additional measures to cope with an outbreak of influenza detected in Greece. saying that the existing mobilization of health services was adequate.

In statements after a meeting, Health Minister Costas Stefanis said that hospitals and health services had already been placed on alert and no further measures were deemed necessary.

Scientists said the Greek outbreak was probably due to the fujian variety of virus that had caused epidemics in the United States and Europe but noted that its clinical image was less virulent than that seen in other countries.

Official confirmation on whether fujian was involved would be given by the Pasteur Institute within a few days, after tests on samples from 28 children admitted to hospital with flu were complete.

Doctors at the Aglaia Kyriakou hospital reported that a further 15 cases of flu were detected during Monday's all-day outpatient clinic but none merited hospitalization

WFP cuts food rations in Zimbabwe amid cash crunch

JOHANNESBURG, 25 Dec— The UN food relief agency has slashed rations for more than 2.6 million people in Zimbabwe after global donors failed to contribute sufficient funds, officials said recently.

"It's tragic that these ration cuts have come at a time when people are normally celebrating the festive season but if we're not given food or cash by donors, then we're simply unable to meet their food needs," said Mike Sackett, the World Food Programme (WFP) regional director for

Southern Africa. WFP officials said Zimbabwe food aid recipients who normally would get a monthly allocation of 10 kilos of maize meal per person were now receiving only five kilos.

They could receive even less in January as the WFP seeks to expand food distribution services to a total of four million Zimbabweans deemed at highest risk, WFP spokesman Mike Huggins said.

"It is going to diminish in January, and again in February and March unless there is a drastic cash injection from donors," Huggins said. MNA/Reuters

LONDON, 25 Dec - Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger has no plan to buy any new players in the January transfer window, local reports said Wednesday.

Everton freezes contract talks to season end

LONDON, 25 Dec- English Premiership side Everton have decided to freeze negotiations with all its players including shelving new contract talks with teenage star Wayne Rooney, who was targeted by Chelsea, until the end of the season.

It had been expected that Everton would open negotiations to improve and extend Rooney's contract when he passed his 18th birthday in November, but that did not happen. Now the cash-strapped will suspend talks with any of its players until the summer.

A statement on the club's web site says that Everton have made the decision to wait until the summer to leave boss David Moves enough time to take "fully take stock of all his options".

Chief executive Michael Dunford revealed: "All contract talks will take place in the summer. The club is unlikely to be entering into any talks before then.

Rooney still has two and a half years of his current deal left and has consistently expressed his desire to continue to play for his boyhood heroes

Contract talks are also expected to begin with Tomasz Radzinski in the summer.

The Canadian international has 18 months remaining on his current deal, while injury-jinxed Alessandro Pistone is in the same situation and wants to continue his stay at the club. — MNA/Xinhua
