#### NAM protests at draft resolution on situation in Myanmar submitted to UNSC

It is the US administration that has been resorting to a number of means since 1988 to interfere in the internal affairs of Myanmar. In 2006, with a lame excuse that the situation in Myanmar posed a threat to regional and international peace and security, it speeded up its attempt to put Myanmar on the agenda of the **United Nations Security Council.** 

Nonetheless, internal organizations and international community expressed their disapproval of its plot to submit the Myanmar affairs to the UNSC through slanderous accusations.

The Non-Aligned Movement objected to the draft resolution co-sponsored by the US and Britain to put to vote at the UNSC Myanmar's issue that did not constitute a threat to international peace and stability.

In that regard, the NAM Bureau Coordination meeting after seeking the opinions of the member states sent a letter of objection to the UNSC president, saying, "In view of the abovementioned considerations, the Non-Aligned Movement reiterates that the decision by the Security Council to initiate formal or informal discussions on the situation in any Member State of the United Nations on any issue, like human rights, that does not constitute a threat to international peace and security is contrary to Article 24 of the Charter".

The Movement urged once again the Security Council to uphold the primacy of and respect for the Charter in connection with its functions and powers.

The objection of the world nations including the Non-Aligned Movement to the foolish attempt of the US and Britain, two of the UNSC permanent members, squeezing the Security Council to intervene in the Myanmar issue represents the victory of national people who love and cherish world peace and security.

## China says it always supports peaceful use of space

Beijing, 24 Jan-China opposes the weaponization of space and any arms race in space, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Liu Jianchao said here on Tuesday in response to questions concerning China's space experiment recently.

"What needs to be stressed is that China has always supported the peaceful use of space," Liu said.

China has never participated and will never participate in any arms race in outer space. This test was not directed at any country and does not pose a threat to any country, he said.

The spokesman also revealed that China has informed some countries including Japan and the United States about the experiment.— MNA/Xinhua

## Man arrested for smuggling 500 parrots at Kazakh-Uzbek border

Almaty, 24 Jan-Kazakh border guards arrested a man trying to smuggle 500 parrots in his car from neighbouring Uzbekistan, media reported on Tuesday.

"Border guards discovered a live cargo of 500 parrots in his car," Kazakhstan Today news agency quoted a KNB security service official as saying.

It was unclear how the parrots fitted into the Kazakh man's Audi. Trade in wild parrots is banned around the world, according to the UN Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora.— MNA/Reuters

## US senator sees large vote against Bush Iraq plan

WASHINGTON, 24 Jan—The chairman of the US Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Tuesday predicted the Senate would overwhelmingly reject the Bush Administration's plan to send more

"My guess is there will be an overwhelming rejection, on the record, of ... 'stay the course' with 20,000 more," Senator Joseph Biden, a Delaware Democrat, told the committee.

Biden noted there were now two bipartisan proposals in the Senate - one drafted by himself and several other senators, and a second by Virginia

Republican Senator John Warner and others—that said "almost the same thing" opposing Bush's plan to add 21,500 troops to Baghdad and Anbar Province.

Biden's committee was due to bring the first of the resolutions up for a vote on Wednesday. Warner, the former chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. unveiled his proposal on Monday. Both are nonbinding on the President but represent the opinion of the Senate.

Outside the hearing, Biden told Reuters his staff was working with Warner's staff to try and craft a joint proposal. -MNA/Reuters

## More Republicans oppose Bush's plan

WASHINGTON, 24 Jan-As US President George W Bush is preparing to sell his troop increase in Iraq during his State of the Union address Tuesday night, more Republican lawmakers have voiced opposition to the plan.

In the Senate on Monday, John Warner of Virginia, former chairman of the Armed Services Committee, joined fellow Republicans Susan Collins of Maine and Norm Coleman of Minnesota in producing non-binding legislation expressing disagreement with Bush's Iraq plan, and their announcement brings to five the number of Senate Republicans publicly opposed to the plan.

The proposal by Warner, Collins and Coleman, along with Ben Nelson, Democrat of Nebraska, was offered as an alternative to an Iraq

resolution backed by Democratic leaders and is to be debated this week by the Foreign Relations Committee.

"The American G I was not trained, not sent over there - certainly not by resolution of this institution - to be placed in the middle of a fight between the Sunni and

the Shia and the wanton and just incomprehensible killing that's going on at this time," Warner

"We've had four other surges since we first went into Iraq," said Collins. 'None of them produced a long-lasting change in the situation on the ground. So I am very

skeptical," she said.

The Warner proposal and the resolution introduced last week by Democrat Senators Joseph R Biden of Delaware and Carl Levin of Michigan, Chuck Hagel, Republican of Nebraska, are similar in many

#### Residents rescued after Russian building collapses

YEKATERINBURG (Russia), 24 Jan—Rescuers called to a collapsed apartment building in Russia's Ural Mountains on Tuesday said they believed they had brought out all the victims alive.

Several residents, including children, were trapped under the rubble when a domestic gas explosion caused part of their three-storey building to collapse in the town of Kushva. "No dead have been found," said Alexander Sorokoletskikh, an official with the Emergencies Ministry in the Sverdlovsk Region that includes Kushva.

"Five people, including two children, have been taken out (of the rubble)" with minor injuries, he said. Rescuers will continue to search the building to make sure no one is still trapped, he said. — MNA/Reuters

### Looters' day as British ship washed ashore

London, 24 Jan Branscombe Beach in southwestern England was heaving with hundreds of looters, salvagers or beachcombers, one day after cargo of the 40 containers from the stricken ship Napoli was washed ashore, local media reported on Tuesday.

While a rescue operation was underway to try to prevent ecological disaster a mile off the

Devon coast, usually deserted at this time of year, a scramble of a different kind was taking place after the 62,000-ton cargo ship was strickeninlastweek's storm.

Motorbikes, steering wheels, carpets, beauty creams, shoes, golf clubs, oil paintings and camcorders which had fallen off the back of the MSC Napoli became the trophies of the locals.

scavengers, carried, dragged and hauled what they could find from the beach. Some even brought their own tractors for transporting their booty.

Some items from the beach were soon appearing oneBay. Ten steering wheel airbags advertised as coming from the MSC Napoli were up for auction before the end of the day.

The free-for-all began in the early hours on Monday, when word got out that a crate of BMW motorbikes, worth 12,000 pounds (about 23,783 US dollars) each, was among the 100 or so containers that had been washed ashore, according to the Guardian.

By dawn, visitors were being directed to what they wanted, with the police apparently powerless to stop them.

## Iran says still cooperating with IAEA

Teheran, 24 Jan—Iran said on Tuesday it was still cooperating with the IAEA, the UN nuclear watchdog, a day after announcing it was barring 38 inspectors from working in the country, which the West accuses of seeking atomic bombs.

Iran, which insists its atomic plans are peaceful, said on Monday it was barring the inspectors from the International Atomic Energy Agency after Parliament demanded retaliation for UN sanctions imposed on Teheran last month. The IAEA said this would not handicap its monitoring of a plant where Iran plans soon to expand its output of nuclear fuel from an experimental to an industrial-scale level in defiance of a UN Security Council resolution.

"We have no problem in connection with the IAEA and we will continue our cooperation in the

framework of our past cooperation. The IAEA's activities in Iran go on," government spokesman Gholamhossein Elham told a news conference.

IAEA inspectors regularly check Iran's atomic sites to try to verify it is not diverting materials into bomb production in violation of the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty.

The West accuses Iran of wanting to build atom bombs under the cover of a professed civilian nuclear energy programme, while Teheran insists it aims only to generate electricity.

Iran has a legal right to reject any inspector it wants since such a step is not prohibited by its safeguards accord.

## Fresh bird flu outbreak suspected in Japan

Токуо, 24 Jan—A fresh outbreak of bird flu was suspected in Japan on Tuesday after 250 birds died at a poultry farm in southwestern Japan, Kvodo news agency reported.

Kyodo said the birds had died at a farm in Mivazaki Prefecture. where earlier this month the government confirmed a case of the lethal H5N1 strain of the virus Japan's first such case in three years.

Local officials were conducting tests to see whether the deaths were from bird flu. Kvodo added. Even if an initial test proves positive, confirmation could take days.

Neither agriculture ministry nor prefectural officials could confirm the Kvodo report.

Renewed fears over the disease have rippled across Asia recently. Hong Kong confirmed on Monday that three more dead birds found in the city carried the H5N1 virus, the third such case this month in the

Miyazaki on Japan's southernmost island of Kyushu is the country's top breeder of chickens.

In 2004, Japan had four outbreaks of the H5N1 type strain in poultry

between January and March, including an outbreak in Kyoto in western Japan that led to the disposal of about 240,000 chickens and 20 million eggs.

## Australian diver says partly swallowed by shark

Sydney, 24 Jan—An Australian abalone diver told rescuers on Tuesday he was partly swallowed headfirst by a Great White Shark but managed to fight his way free, suffering a broken nose and bite marks around the chest.

The 25-year-old diver said he was underwater off Cape Howe, near Eden on Australia's southeast coast, when the shark attacked on Tuesday

"He stated that he was head-first into the shark" a spokeswoman for Snowy Hydro SouthCare rescue service told *Reuters* after airlifting the diver to hospital.

"When he came to us he was conscious and alert but had a broken nose and lacerations to both sides of his torso and chest - bite marks all the way around," the spokeswoman said.

"He believed it was a 9-foot (3-metre) white pointer. He said he fought it off," she said.

Attacks by Great White Sharks are usually fatal because of the massive size of the predators, which breed in Australia's cold southern waters, and the sheer force of their bites.

Egyptian Presidential spokesman Suliman Awwad was quoted as saying that the tripartite consultative meeting focused on the current state of affairs in the Palestinian territories and Iraq along with the recent escalation in Lebanon.

The three leaders discussed an Egyptian initiative for pushing forward the Middle East peace process at the Palestinian-Israeli track and Cairo's vision on reaching a comprehensive peace in the region, Awwad said in Press statements to MENA.

President Muharak had put forth the Cairo vision at recent separate meetings with US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and EU foreign policy chief Javier Solana during their recent visits to Egypt, the Egyptian official said, without giving more details.



#### Chinese telecom giant acquires Pakistani mobile operator

Beijing, 24 Jan— China Mobile announced on Monday it has signed an agreement with Millicom International Cellular to buy the Luxembourg-based company's 88.86 per cent share of Paktel Limited, Pakistan's fifth largest mobile phone operator.

The deal, which values the Pakistani company at 460 million US dollars, requires government approval but is expected to be completed in late February.

This is the first time that China Mobile has acquired a foreign telecommunication company of "strategic significance". Last year, the Chinese telecom-munication giant acquired all shares of Hong Kong's fourth largest mobile operator, China Resources Peoples Telephone Co Ltd and a 19.9-per-cent stake in Phoenix TV.

Paktel Limited had 1.56 million mobile phone subscribers, for a 3.5-per-cent share market in Pakistan as of last October. The Pakistani telecommunication market is one of the fastest growing markets in the world, with 12.8 per cent of the population using mobile phones.

Millicom is a global telecommunication investor, providing cellular telephone services to 12.8 million people in 17 emerging markets in Asia, Latin America and Africa. — MNA/Xinhua

## FAO says many global bird flu outbreaks unreported

Bangkok, 24 Jan-Many countries are doing a better job fighting the H5N1 bird flu virus, yet many outbreaks are not reported, Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) officials said on Tuesday.

Absolute transparency about disease outbreaks, involving farmers directly in surveillance and reporting as well as compensation were key to

make the global fight against bird flu successful, they said.

"So far, many countries have managed to progressively control the virus and the global situation has improved tremendously," Juan Lubroth, a senior FAO infectious diseases official, told a news conference

"Unfortunately, at the global scale, many outbreaks remain under reported or unreported. National or international bodies are often not in a position to immediately verify rumours or reports about unconfirmed outbreaks," Lubroth said.

breaks in the first weeks of 2007 had been significantly lower than the epidemic waves of last vear despite new flare-ups of the virus so far in eight countries, including Indonesia, China, Egypt, Japan and South Korea, FAO officials said.

"The virus continues to persist in several Asian countries, as well as in Egypt and Nigeria," said Hiroyuki Konuma, the FAO's deputy regional representative for Asia and the Pacific.

"Other countries may have been affected but have yet to report.'

#### Moderate earthquake hits easternmost Indonesia

JAKARTA, 24 Jan — A 5.3 magnitude earthquake jolted easternmost Indonesia on Tuesday, but no casualty or damage was reported, Indonesian Meteorology and Geophysics Agency said.

The quake struck at 19:16 Jakarta Time with the epicentre on land at 103 kilometres northeast of Nabire of Papua Province and at 13 kilometres under the earth. an official of the agency Aprilyanto told Xinhua.

It was the third moderate quake that has hit the province since Monday.

Indonesian is laid on a vulnerable quake-hit zone that is called "the Pacific ring of fire", where continental plates meet causing frequent seismic and volcanic activities. - MNA/Xinhua

## Spanish retailers re-size to promote more realistic fashion

Madrid, 24 Jan-Spain's biggest fashion retailers have agreed to resize their clothing in an attempt to better reflect the real sizes of women and reduce pressure on them to conform to a skinny image.

Health Minister Elena Salgado announced on Tuesday that the National Consumer Institute will measure 8,500 women between 12 and 70 years of age with the aim of "defining standard patterns and redefining and normalizing sizes,' according to an agreement between fashion houses and the ministry.

Giants such as Inditex, which owns fast-fashion retailer Zara, El Corte Ingles, Mango and Cortefiel are behind the agreement, aimed at making fashion sizes "truthful, homogenous and comprehensible".

Mannequins in shop windows of the companies signed up will now be at least a European size 38, while size 46 will no longer be considered outsize.

The government hopes that by selling bigger, more realistic sizes, it will discourage women from trying to conform to a stick-thin ideal as presented on fashion catwalks.

In a attempt to help curb weight-related disorders such as anorexia, Spain last year barred models below a certain weight from Madrid catwalks while similar measures were taken in Italy.

#### Gonzalez halts Nadal to reach semifinals

Melbourne, 25 Jan — Chilean Fernando Gonzalez shattered Rafael Nadal's Australian Open dreams with a dazzling 6-2, 6-4, 6-3 victory on Wednesday to reach the semifinals of a Grand Slam for the first time

As Nadal surrendered his title hopes by slapping a backhand wide, Gonzalez punched the air in delight before going off to exchange high fives with some flagwaying Chilean fans in the crowd

"I'm really happy. I've been in the quarterfinal of Grand Slams a few times but never won the matches so finally I'm in a semi and I'm happy," Gonzalez, who will next meet Haas, said courtside.

The 10th seed becomes the first Chilean to reach the last four of a major since Marcelo Rios' run to the Melbourne Park final in 1998. Nadal had survived a four-set bruising encounter against Germany's Philipp Kohlschreiber and a five-set thriller against British teenager Andy Murray en route to the last eight. On Wednesday, he ran out of options against an inspired Gonzalez.

Gonzalez, who had claimed the scalps of local favourite Lleyton Hewitt and fifth seed James Blake, barely produced a loose shot as he completely outwitted his opponent with his attacking repertoire.

He unleashed 10 aces and 41 winners to destroy the world number two, who produced just seven winners in comparison.

"He was playing at a very good level. It wasn't good for me," said Nadal, who said he had injured his leg after his fourth-round victory over Murray.— MNA/Reuters

## Japanese Defence Minister says Bush wrong to start Iraq war

Токуо, 25 Jan — Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe expressed hope on Wednesday that a US troop increase would bring new results in Iraq, but his Defence Minister said starting the war in the first place had been a mistake.

"We hope that the fresh US commitment will bring new results," Abe told reporters after US President George W Bush delivered his State of the Union speech.

"The international

community recognizes the efforts of the people of Iraq. We must fulfill our responsibilities so that Iraq recovers stability and rebuilds as soon as possible," he added.

Bush had urged a

rebellious Congress to give his plan to send 21,500 more US troops to Iraq a chance and insisted it was not too late to shape the outcome.

Earlier in the day, Japanese Defence Minisrated his doubts about Bush's decision to start the

"I think President Bush launched the war in a situation as if there were nuclear weapons, but I think that decision was wrong," Kyodo news agency quoted Kyuma as telling a news conference.

Kyuma also criticized the United States for not having a gameplan to deal with Iraq after the war, unlike the case of the USled Occupation of Japan after its defeat in World War II

"In Japan's case, the United States succeeded in handling the postwar situation by leaving the imperial system intact,' Kyodo quoted him as saying. - MNA/Reuters



Summary of observations recorded at 09:30 hours MST: During the past 24 hours, weather has been generally fair in the whole country. Night temperatures were (3°C) to (4°C) below normal in Shan State, upper Sagaing, Mandalay and Magway Divisions, (5°C) below normal in Chin State, (6°C) above normal in Taninthayi Division and about normal in the remaining areas. The significant night temperatures were Lashio, Heho, Namhsan and Mogok (1°C) each and Haka (3°C).

Maximum temperature on 24-1-2007 was 95°F. Minimum temperature on 25-1-2007 was 67°F. Relative humidity at 09:30 hours MST on 25-1-2007 was 59%. Total sunshine hours on 24-1-2007 was (8.5) hours approx.

Rainfalls on 25-1-2007 were (nil) at Mingaladon, Kaba-Aye and Central Yangon. Total rainfalls since 1-1-2007 were (nil) at Mingaladon, Kaba-Aye and Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (6) mph from Southwest at (08:55) hours MST on 25-1-2007.
