Russia slams US sanctions against arms firms

Moscow, 27 Jan — Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said on Friday that US sanctions against Russian arms firms for weapons sales to Iran were unfounded, *Interfax* news agency reported.

Lavrov, speaking in the Far Eastern city of Vladivostok, said Russia's delivery of TOR-M1 anti-aircraft

missile systems to Iran had breached no international laws and that Moscow had asked for an explanation from Washington.

Senior Russian officials said this month that Russia had delivered the missile systems to Iran, drawing criticism from Washington, which said it was disappointed that Moscow



US Army describes Iraq abductions

BAGHDAD, 27 Jan —The US military in Iraq has given new details of an attack last week in which five US soldiers were killed.

Four of them were abducted by militants posing as an American security team.

Theytravelledinthekind of vehicles often used for US government convoys, wore US-style uniforms and carried US-style weapons. Initially the military said all five soldiers were killed repelling an attack on an Iraqi government compound in the Shia holy city of Karbala.

According to the new account, US military officers were attending a meeting in the compound when the convoy of at least five sport utility vehicles impersonating Americans entered and killed one US soldier. There was a series of explosions and in the melee, the attackers then set off again with four captured US soldiers.

They drove into a neighbouring province and then abandoned the SUVs.

Iraqi police, by now in pursuit, found the vehicles.

Two US soldiers were found handcuffed together in one of the SUVs, shot dead. A third American soldier lay dead on the

ground. The fourth was still alive despite a gunshot wound to the head but died shortly afterwards.

Such a brazen attack is believed to be unprecedented, and the US military say the militants bypassed Iraqi police to reach their goal. The Americans say they are not only trying to determine who carried out the attack but also the reason for the breakdown in security at the government compound.—Internet

At least seven US soldiers killed

Baghdad, 28 Jan — At least seven US | the Tarmiya region north of Baghdad soldiers were killed in separate combat incidents, the US military said Saturday, amid a steady swirl of violence against American troops and Iraqi civilians.

Nationwide, at least 60 more Iraqis were killed or found dead Saturday as US and Iraqi officials struggle to calm sectarian passions and reduce the American troop presence. Three US soldiers were killed north of Baghdad on Saturday when an improvised explosive device detonated near an Army vehicle conducting a security escort mission. One other soldier was wounded in the attack.

The US military disclosed no further details about the attack, but a farmer in

described an incident in which a roadside bomb struck a U.S. Humvee, destroying the vehicle and setting it ablaze.

Two of the soldiers were killed Friday in separate bomb attacks northeast of the capital in Diyala province. One was assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division. Another was killed in an attack that injured three others, the military said.

Another two were killed in eastern Baghdad on Thursday in a bomb attack on a combat patrol that also left two soldiers wounded. The deaths brought the total number of US military personnel killed in Iraqi to 3,075, according to the Web site icasualties.org. Internet

Mass US protest against Iraq war

Washington, 27 Jan—Tens of thousands of protesters have demonstrated in Washington to demand the withdrawal of US troops from Iraq. The rally comes days before Congress is to discuss President George W Bush's new strategy for Iraq including the despatch of 21,500 additional troops.

The protesters, chanting "Bring the troops home", were joined by Vietnam War-era protester, actress Jane Fonda. Violence continued in Iraq on Saturday, with at least 15 killed in a suicide bomb attack in a Baghdad market. The BBC's James Coomarasamy in Washington says this anti-war rally at the foot of the US Capitol was a marked shift away from the White House and on to Congress. The protesters want Congress, now run by the Democrats, to block funding for the president's new strategy, our correspondent says. —Internet

Two Americans slain in Nairobi

Nairoвi, 27 Jan —Two Americans, including an elderly woman, were shot to death Saturday by heavily armed carjackers in Nairobi, Kenya's capital, according to US and Kenyan officials.

The two victims were relatives of a US Embassy employee and were traveling in an embassy car along with three other Americans when a truck suddenly swerved in front of them and cut off the road, Kenyan police officials said.

Four men jumped out with Kalashnikov assault rifles and ordered all the passengers out of their car.

"Apparently, the driver and an elderly woman sitting in front did not move fast enough," said Gideon Kibunjah, a police spokesman. "So the bandits shot them."

The attack happened around 3 pm on a busy highway, and police officials said one by stander was injured.

The gunmen escaped in their truck along with the US Embassy car, a Toyota Landcruiser marked with diplomatic plates.

US diplomats in Kenya said the two victims, both women, were dependents of an embassy employee. Nairobi has been plagued by violent crime, and US officials said Saturday that they did not believe the attack was related to terrorism or otherwise targeted. —Internet

First Thai observation satellite to be orbited in October

Bangkok, 27 Jan — Thailand is doing the final preparations for the launch of its first earth observation satellite called THEOS into orbit in October, Thai Science and Technology Minister Yongyuth Yuthavong said Friday.

The THEOS project is expected to be completed in August or September and be launched into orbit in October as scheduled, the minister was quoted by Thai News Agency as saying.

The French company EADS Astrium, a leading European satellite producer, was contracted by the Geo-Informatics and Space Technology Development Agency (GISTDA) under Thai Ministry of Science and Technology in 2004 to build

and deliver THEOS. Thai engineers working for the project have been trained in France.

Indonesia seeks to enhance economic ties with Laos

JAKARTA, 27 Jan— The Indonesian Government said Friday concrete actions were needed to enhance economic cooperation with Southeast Asian neighbour Laos, to which the bilateral trade volume averages a mere 12 million US dollars a year.

"By contrast, the bilateral volume between Laos and other countries in ASEAN (the Association of South-East Asian Nations) reaches 550 million dollars a year," presidential spokesman Dino Patti Dialal told reporters here.

Dino made the remarks after a meeting between President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono and visiting Laotian Prime Minister Bouasone Bouphavanh.

"The President called on

the joint commission between Indonesia and Laos to define concrete programmes to enhance cooperation in the areas of economics, investment and trade," he said. Dino said both countries marked the 50th anniversary of diplomatic relationship in 2007. — *MNA/Xinhua*

Japan confirms fresh H5 bird flu outbreak

Токуо, 27 Jan—Japan on Thursday confirmed another case of H5 bird flu at a poultry farm in the southwestern prefecture of Miyazaki, a farm ministry official said.

Further tests were needed to confirm if the virus was H5N1, she added.

Tests had so far confirmed the presence of H5 subtype influenza at the farm, where more than 1,300 birds had died as of Wednesday.

Earlier this month, Japan suffered its first outbreak of H5N1 bird flu in poultry in more than three years. No cases of human infection have been reported.

The Agriculture Ministry said in a statement that it had ordered poultry at the farm to be killed and the site to be disinfected. Movement of people and goods within a 10-kilometre (six-mile) radius of the farm was to be restricted, it added. — MNA/Reuters

Over 1 b mobile phones sold globally in 2006

Paris, 27 Jan— More than one billion mobile phone handsets were sold around the world in 2006, an increase of 25

per cent on sales recorded a vear earlier, according to a study published on Thursday in Paris by research company

Strategic Analytics.

The Finish manufacturer Nokia maintained its leading position with a 34.1 per cent market share compared to 32.4 in

The second position is held by the American company Motorola which also improved its performance with 21.3 per cent market share in 2006

compared to 17.9 per cent in 2005.

These two companies sold 347.5 million and 217.4 million handsets respectively in 2006.

The study forecasts a growth of 12 per cent in sales for 2007 thus establishing a new record of 1.14 billion units in mobile handsets sales.

Navy copter crash in Pacific kills at least one

San Diego, 26 Jan—A US Navy helicopter crashed Friday near San Clemente Island in the Pacific Ocean, killing at least one of the four people aboard, a Navy spokesman told CNN.

Cmdr Jack Hanzlik said the MH 60 Sierra Seahawk helicopter was conducting a routine training mission off the USS Bonhomme Richard with four aboard. It crashed at 2:30 pm (5:30 ET).

Search and rescue efforts are under way for the other three, he said.

He said the cruiser *USS Chosin* and destroyer *USS* Chung-Hoon were participating in the exercise and the rescue effort. The Coast Guard is also assisting in the rescue effort.

No other aircraft were involved in the mishap, Hanzlik said.

The Bonhomme Richard is a multipurpose amphibious assault ship whose primary purpose is to deploy Marine landing forces, according to a Navy Web site.

Hanzlik said the names of the crew members are being withheld pending notification of next of kin. The incident is under investigation.—Internet

Eighteen hurt in psychiatric ward fire in Finland

Helsinki, 27 Jan— Eighteen people were hurt, four seriously, when a fire broke out in a psychiatric ward in southwestern Finland on Thursday night, officials said on Friday.

The fire started in a clothing rack in the hospital in Nokia, 190 kilometres (120 miles) northwest of Helsinki, but its cause was still unknown, officials said.

"The hospital staff evacuated more than 10 patients, but conditions soon became unbearable," fire chief Seppo Mannikko told Reuters, adding that rescue workers had to

save the others.

Seventeen patients and a member of staff were treated in nearby hospitals. Four suffered lung damage from inhaling smoke.

Hospital spokeswoman Leena Kuupakko there were 18 patients and three staff in the ward when the fire broke out.

At 114, US woman becomes world's oldest person

Boston, 27 Jan — A Connecticut woman born to former slaves in the decades following the US Civil War has become the world's oldest person, at 114, according to GuinnessWorld Records.

Emma Faust Tillman, born near Greensboro, North Carolina, on November 22, 1892, became the world's oldest person on Wednesday, following the death of Emiliano Mercado del Toro, of Puerto Rico, Guinness said on its website.

Longevity is common in Tillman's family. Though none of her 23 siblings have matched her 114 years, three sisters and a brother lived past 100, her greatnephew John Stewart Jr, said on Thursday. — MNA/Reuters

Plane crashes into truck in France, killing driver

Paris, 27 Jan — A passenger plane carrying 54 people crashed into a small truck in the south of France on Thursday, killing the driver, the transport ministry said.

The incident happened at the Pau-Pyrenees Airport after a bird flew into the

Regional Airlines plane's engine as it was taking off, forcing it to make an emergency landing.

The 50 passengers and four cabin staff on the Fokker 100 were not injured and were evacuated from the plane, which was flying for Air France between Pau and Paris' Roissy Airport.

"The aircraft, which was taking off, had to carry out an emergency landing next to the runway after a

bird flew into one of the engines," a statement from the ministry said.

The plane then hit the public works truck travelling on a road around the airport and the driver died in the accident, it said. In a separate statement, Regional Airlines said a second person was in the vehicle and was injured.

The plane came to a stop several hundred metres later.

"I was shocked to see such a huge python," orchardkeeper Ali Yusof told the New Straits Times in an article published beneath a picture of the captured snake, which was almost long enough to span the width of a tennis court and as thick as a tree trunk.

warns there is an increased risk of catching amoebic meningitis.

The department's Llew Withers says amoeba grow in pools, lakes and dams when temperatures reach 27 degrees for three days.

He says it is a rare and potentially fatal disease, but it can be prevented.

"You should be testing your pool twice a day, if you're using a wading pool you should tip that out after every use as it's the only really sure way to ensure that you're not going to attract it and if you're using a spa you should ensure your pool is properly chlorinated ... at all times," he said.

Global immunization initiative avoids 2.3 m deaths

Davos (Switzerland), 28 Jan — A global immunization initiative has saved the lives of nearly 2.3 million children in poor countries in the past seven years, according to new data released by the World Health Organization (WHO) on Friday.

The GAVI Alliance initiative, launched in 2000, is a global partnership aimed at increasing access to children's vaccines. It includes the WHO, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the World Bank, certain research and technical agencies, as well as NGOs.

In 2006 alone, some 600,000 children's lives in developing countries may have been saved due to immunization programmes funded by GAVI, according to the

WHO data, which were released at the ongoing World Economic Forum annual meeting in Davos, Switzerland.

Bill and Melinda Gates, who co-chair the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation that funds the initiative, called the new data a highly encouraging sign of progress in global health. "GAVI has demonstrated that with the right resources and leadership, it is possible to make dramatic health gains in poor countries," Bill Gates, also chairman and founder of Microsoft

Corporation, told reporters at a Press conference.

"We need to build on this success. No child should be denied access to lifesaving immunizations," said Gates, a frequent guest at the World Economic Forum meeting in Davos. The Gates Foundation has up to now committed a total of 1.5 billion US dollars to support GAVI's immunization programmes. GAVI has also received funding from 17 donor governments.

American Air jet makes emergency Caracas landing

Caracas, 28 Jan —An American Airlines plane made an emergency landing in Caracas on Friday after an electrical fire during a flight from Miami to Brazil, an official at the Venezuelan National Institute of Civil Aviation said.

None of the 245 passengers on board the *Boeing* 777 was injured, said American Airlines spokesman John Hotard.

The passengers are being flown back to Miami, where they will board another plane that will take them to Sao Paolo, the flight's destination.

"All things considered, it was faster to get them back to Miami and then down," said Hotard, citing regulations that place limits on flight crews' working

The diversion to Caracas was likely caused by an electrical short in the captain's audio panel, said Hotard. The plane will later return to Miami. — MNA/Reuters



Queen of Jordan named UNICEF's eminent advocate for children

Davos (Switzerland), 28 Jan— Queen of Jordan, Rania al-Abdullah, was named on Friday by the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) as its first eminent advocate for children, said the fund.

"Her Majesty Queen Rania has been a tireless champion for children," said UNICEF Executive Director Ann M Veneman, who signed an agreement with the Queen at Davos on the sidelines of the annual meeting of the World Economic Forum.

Queen Rania will work together with UNICEF and other partners to mobilize resources and develop policy to improve the lives of children, said UNICEF in a statement.

"For the millions of children whose voices are not being heard, let us commit to take a stand, and take a step, and make real strides for child survival and education," said Queen Rania.

"I am convinced

that transformational change is just the sum of many small steps — footprints marking a path ahead where none existed before."

Queen Rania is an active supporter of UNICEF and its programmes in Jordan, in the Arab world and globally, said UNICEF.

Rocket blast shakes US Embassy in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 28 Jan—A rocket was fired into the international Green Zone in Baghdad on Saturday and a witness said it appeared to have landed in the US Embassy grounds.

US Embassy spokesman Lou Fintor said a rocket landed in a sparsely populated area of the Green Zone and that two people were slightly wounded. He said he could not confirm that it landed within the US Embassy compound.

"The Embassy is functioning normally," he said, adding that the two injured were not embassy staff.

Loudspeaker warnings urged people to take cover. "This is not a drill," the warning said.

The witness who was inside the US Embassy, a large complex within the Green Zone centred around one of Saddam Hussein's former palaces, had no details on whether there were casualties.

The US military had no immediate information.

Several people in the Green Zone said they had heard what may have been a mortar or rocket go past, but could not say where it landed.



Top legislator says China needs harmonious world

Davos (Switzerland), 27 Jan— China needs a harmonious world so that it can have a favourable environment for development and at the same time bring benefits to people all over the world, said a top Chinese legislator on Thursday.

"My answer is simple: China needs a harmonious world... It means we want to make friends with all countries," Cheng Siwei, vice-chairman of the Standing Committee of China's National People's Congress, told a panel of the annual meeting of the World Economic Forum.

He said a harmonious world can be achieved if China and other countries try to seek common ground while shelving differences. Another panelist, a Singaporean academic, said China's international ambition is moderate.

"China, in a very profound way, is a 'status quo' power," said Kishore Mahbubani, Dean of Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy. "It does not want to shake the world. It wants to work with the

world as it is."

He explained that China has intentionally avoided playing a leading role in world affairs as its greater role is easily interpreted as a threat by the outside world.

"If China tries to exercise greater leadership in the world order, it will be seen as threatening (others)." Former US trade representative Robert Zoellick said China faces "staggering internal challenges" despite its tremendous achievements.

Therefore, the primary interest of the Chinese leadership is a benign

external environment so that they can focus on internal challenges, he explained.

"At the same time, China expects some additional respect and recognition of its interests." He said there is recognition in China that it needs a strategy for international integration.

China's goal is security stability, energy stability, and access to raw materials, markets, technology and knowhow, argued Zoellick, who is now vice chairman of Goldman Sachs International.

Cheng said the outside world is getting incrementally less negative about China's rapid growth.

Five to 10 years ago, some people talked about China's collapse because they did not believe China could sustain its development; three to five years ago, some people talked about China threat because they were fearful of China's development; today people are talking about China's responsibility. This is progress in people's perspectives of China, he said.

Phnom Penh, 27 Jan — Cambodian and Japanese government officials here on Friday held their first round of talks to hammer out a bilateral investment agreement which aims to pick up the latter's investment speed in the kingdom.

"We want Japanese investors to invest in the sectors of copy machines, television sets, spare parts for cars and others, which they have already invested in other Southeast Asia countries," said Sok Chenda, Secretary-General of the Council for Development of Cambodia.

Cambodia needs the investment from Japan to increase its employment and speed up the economic growth, said Chenda, adding that both prime ministers have been pushing the technical officials to reach the agreement as soon as possible. Currently, Japanese investors have over 20 projects like bank, hotel resort, mansion construction, trade company and island development in Cambodia, Chenda told reporters after Friday's talks were wrapped up in the Council of Ministers.—MNA/Xinhua

Folic acid supplements "cut risk of cleft lip"

London, 27 Jan — Women who take folic acid supplements in early pregnancy can reduce the risk of cleft lip in their baby by up to 40 per cent, researchers said on Friday.

Folic acid, a synthetic compound of a B vitamin found in green leafy vegetables, has been recommended to prevent neural tube disorders such as spina bifida. But its impact on cleft clip has been less clear.

"Folic acid supplements during early pregnancy seem to reduce the risk of isolated cleft lip (with or without cleft palate) by about a third," said Allen Wilcox of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences in Durham, North Carolina.

Cleft lip or palate occurs when the tissues that form the palate, or roof of the mouth, and the upper lip do not join correctly.

Boys are more affected than girls and the disorder is also more common in Asians. Surgery is often carried out to repair the condition. In a study published

online by the British Medical Journal, the scientists studied the effect of taking folic acid supplements in Norway, which has the highest rate of facial clefts in Europe.

They questioned the mothers of 573 children born in Norway with cleft lip or palate from 1996 to 2000 and 763 women with healthy children.

The mothers were asked whether they took folic acid supplements early in their pregnancy and how much. After adjusting for smoking

and other confounding factors, the researchers found that folic acid supplements reduced the risk of cleft lip by 40 per cent. Eating a diet rich in fruits and vegetables without taking folic acid supplements cut the risk by 25 per cent in the women. — MNA/Reuters

Exercise may relieve chronic prostatitis symptoms

New York, 27 Jan -Men who have chronic prostatitis or pelvic pain syndrome may derive significant relief from aerobic exercise, Italian researchers report.

Chronic inflammation of the prostate can lead to constant pain that is hard to treat. While it affects millions of men, the cause of so-called chronic prostatitis/chronic pelvic | note in The Journal of

pain syndrome is unclear. It is most common among men between the ages of 36 and 50. Symptoms include pelvic, testicular, penile, or rectal pain and inflammation. Frequent urination and sexual difficulties are also common symptoms.

Dr. Gianluca Giubilei, of Careggi Hospital in Florence, and colleagues Urology that these patients have a poor quality of life and most do not get significant long-term benefit from treatment.

To investigate the impact of aerobic exercise on patients with chronic prostatitis or pelvic pain syndrome, the researchers recruited 231 men between 20 and 50 years of age who were unresponsive to conventional treatment and able to take part in moderate-intensity physical exercise.

Warming will raise seas for 1,000 years

Oslo, 27 Jan — World sea levels will keep rising for more than 1,000 years even if governments manage to slow a projected surge in temperatures this century blamed on greenhouse gases, a draft UN climate report says.

The study, by a panel of 2,500 scientists who advise the United Nations, also says that dust from volcanic eruptions and air pollution seems to have braked warming in recent decades by reflecting sunlight back into space,

scientific sources said.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) will publish its report, the most complete overview of climate change science, in Paris on 2 February after a final review. It will guide policy

makers combating global

warming. The draft projects more droughts, rains, shrinking Arctic ice and glaciers and rising sea levels to 2100 and cautions that the effects of a build-up of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere will last far longer. Still, the report has good news by quoting six models with central projections of sea level rises this century of between 28 and 43 centimetres (11 and 16.9 inches) — compared to a far wider band of 9 to 88 centimetres (3.5 to 34.6 inches) in a 2001 report, they said. Sea levels rose by 17 centimetres (6.7 inches) in the 20th century. Rising seas would threaten lowlying Pacific islands, coasts from Bangladesh to Florida and cities from Shanghai to Buenos Aires.— MNA/Reuters

Thai officials observe virus mutation in pigs

BANGKOK, 27 Jan — Thailand's provincial public health officials have been alerted to keep a close watch on the possibility of the mutation of viruses in pigs following the deaths of two people from H3N2 human influenza.


Thawat Sunthrajarn, director-general of Disease Control Department, said on Friday that pigs have been proven to be capable of contracting bird flu virus known as H5N1 and H3N2 human flu virus without showing any symptoms. "This provides an ideal place for the two strains of virus to mix and mutate," Thawat was quoted by the Bangkok Post's website as saying.

The director-general noted that the most scary thing is that the mutation of the two strains of virus occurs in human bodies or other mammals. He said that in the past whenever there was a bird flu outbreak, health officials would take blood samples from mammals to test for bird flu virus.— MNA/Xinhua

Real slip to first defeat against Villarreal

Madrid, 28 Jan— Real Madrid slumped to their third defeat in five games when they went down 1-0 at Villarreal in the Primera Liga on Saturday.

Villarreal, who had won once in their previous six outings, notched up their first ever victory against Real when 19-year-old midfielder Marcos clipped the ball home after a slick passing move midway through the second half.

Real, missing AC Milan-bound Ronaldo, David Beckham, the injured Raul and the out-of-favour Antonio Cassano, barely managed to threaten the Villarreal goal in a toothless performance at the Madrigal.

The result meant Fabio Capello's side remain in third place in the table, a point behind leaders Barcelona who host Celta Vigo on Sunday.

Despite the absence of out-of-favour playmaker Juan Roman Riquelme, who was looking on from the stands, Villarreal dominated against Real as they clipped the ball around the midfield and hit the visitors on the break.

They would have taken the lead on the half hour had it not been for some superb goalkeeping from Iker Casillas, who got a hand to a Diego Forlan shot, blocked a follow-up effort and closed down Matias Fernandez as he tried to blast the ball into the net.

Rooney wins it for United, Bristol hold Boro

London, 28 Jan—Wayne Rooney came off the bench to give Manchester United a 2-1 win over Portsmouth while Third Division Bristol City stormed back to draw 2-2 with Premier League Middlesbrough in the FA Cup fourth round on Saturday.

Rooney, who replaced Ole Gunnar Solskjaer on the hour mark, finished off a neat Ryan Giggs pass in the 77th minute and then chipped a spectacular second in the 83rd.

Portsmouth got an 87th minute consolation goal when a shot by Portuguese midfielder Pedro Mendes, who had earlier sparked controversy with a goalmouth clearance, took a deflection off substitute

striker Nwankwo Kanu and hit the net. Boro's draw, after leading 2-0 at halftime, was a rare surprise in Saturday's action.

Tottenham Hotspur, Blackburn Rovers, Fulham and Reading eased through after top-flight class proved too much for Second Division opponents, while Watford beat West Ham United 1-0 in the all-Premier League clash at Upton Park.

Spurs beat Southend 3-1, Matt Derbyshire scored two and made another as Blackburn Rovers trounced Luton Town 4-0, on-loan striker Vincenzo Montella engineered Fulham's 3-0 win over Stoke City and Read-

ing were 3-2 winners at Birmingham City.

The controversy was sparked at Old Trafford in the 12th minute when a header by United's Serbian defender Nemanja Vidic seemed to cross the line before being hooked back out by Mendes.

The irony of the clearance will not have been lost on United fans.

Lazio, however, took control when Siviglia headed in a 52nd-minute free kick.

Tens of thousands demand US get out of Iraq

Washington, 28 Jan — Chanting "bring our troops home," tens of thousands of anti-war protesters rallied in front of the US Capitol on Saturday to pressure the government to get out of Iraq.

Veterans and military families joined some lawmakers, peace groups and actors including Vietnam war protester Jane Fonda to urge Congress and President George W Bush to stop funding the war and pull troops from Iraq.

"When I served in the war, I thought I was serving honourably. Instead, I was sent to war ... for causes that have proved fraudulent," said Iraq war veteran Garett | stage that also held a flag-Reppenhagen.

"We need to put pressure on our elected government and force them to ... bring the troops home," the former sniper said to cheers from a signwaving crowd.

Tens of thousands of people attended the rally on the National Mall, according to a park police officer.

For more than two hours, speakers atop a

draped coffin criticized Bush and the US presence in Iraq before protesters marched around the Capitol.

In the crowd, a group of families of soldiers killed in Iraq held pictures of their loved ones, including one photo of a soldier in full dress uniform lying in a coffin.

More than 3,000 US troops and tens of thousands of Iraqis have been killed since the 2003 invasion of Iraq.

The protest was one of several held around the United States.

Protesters also planned coordinated efforts in Washington and across the country over the next week to lobby lawmakers to take action against the war.

Bush's approval ratings have dropped to some of the weakest of his presidency and polls show a majority of Americans disapprove of his plan to send another 21,500 troops to Iraq.

But Bush said he has no intention of backing off his plan.




