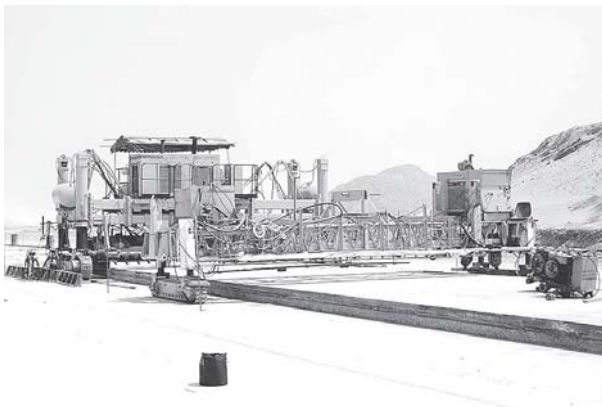

SHANGHAI, 1 May—The Shanghai World Expo has got underway Friday evening with a dazzling display of artistic performances, fancy fireworks and high technologies at the opening ceremony.

After years of planning and preparation, the ceremony, featuring indoor performances and outdoor celebrations, began at around 20:00 in the Expo Culture Centre of the Expo park, which spreads across 5.28 square kilometres along both sides of the

Huangpu River.

Chinese President Hu Jintao declared the opening of the World Expo 2010 in the futuristic seashell-shaped venue.

International dignitaries, including French President Nicolas Sarkozy, Republic of Korea President Lee Myung-bak, Mongolian President Tsakhia Elbegdorj and European Commission President Jose Manuel Barroso and other 16 heads of state and government were in attendance at the ceremony.

The evening would

be recorded in the 159-year-old World Expo history, with thousands of people watching, while hundreds of thousands more enjoying lights, fountains and fireworks that lit up the waterfront promenade, the Bund.

The indoor performances starred China's piano prodigy Lang Lang, famous for his dramatic countenance and gestures, who played the New Shanghai Concerto, the event's theme music.

2 killed in market blast in western Iraq

BAGHDAD, 1 May—Two people were killed and nine wounded when a roadside bomb exploded in a market in western Iraq on Friday, a local police source said.

The blast struck a popular market in Fallujah, some 65 km west of Baghdad, the source told Xinhua.

Iraqi security forces have cordoned off the blast site and are hunting for the attackers.

Fallujah was once a stronghold of insurgency after the 2003 US led war toppled former President Saddam Hussein's regime.—Internet

Mayor Annise Parker said in a statement that the officers' duties will remain limited pending an investigation into how Chinese diplomat Yu Boren was injured last Saturday.

Officials in China's Foreign Ministry released a statement on Friday saying police harassed and beat a deputy consul-general while he was

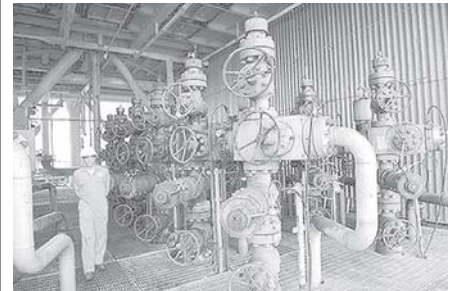
driving to the consulate. The statement said a family member also was involved, but did not say if that person was injured.

The consulate in Houston did not immediately return a message left by The Associated Press. Houston police and the US State Department are investigating the incident.

"China urges the US ... to quickly investigate the details of this incident and to look into the persons responsible to ensure that the Chinese diplomatic and consulate personnel and premises are not violated," Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Jiang Yu said in a statement.

Militant group claims oil pipeline attack

LAGOS, 1 May—A militant group claimed on Friday to have attacked an oil pipeline in Nigeria that is operated by a subsidiary of Royal Dutch Shell PLC, which said no such assault took place.

A statement sent by a group calling itself the Joint Revolutionary Council of the Niger Delta said it carried out the attack on the pipeline at Buguma. A Shell spokesman, though, said oil production in the region showed no signs of a disruption.

The group also threatened to strike again in the coming days. "We shall strike in a way that the international community will be forced to come into this conflict," it said in the statement. Militants in the troubled Niger Delta have attacked pipelines, kidnapped petroleum company employees and fought government troops since January 2006. Even claims of attacks have affected global oil prices in the past. Nigeria exported almost 1 million barrels of crude a day to US in January alone, more than Saudi Arabia.—Internet

Burkina Faso offers Niger 5,000 tons of cereals to help fight famine

OUAGADOUGOU, 1 May — Burkina Faso has offered 5,000 tons of cereals to Niger to help fight famine, which is threatening nearly half of its 11 million population, according to the government.

The humanitarian aid is a token of friendly relations and good neighbourhood between the two African

countries and is part of efforts to save the Sahelian children and women being affected by hunger, a cabinet report said on Thursday. Niger also donated food and other kinds of relief worth 50 million FCFA to help victims of floods in Burkina Faso in September 2009.

Senegal to donate 10,000 tons of cereals to Niger

DAKAR, 1 May — Senegal will donate 10,000 tons of cereals to Niger to help it cope with famine that is affecting almost half of its 11 million population.

The announcement was made on Thursday on state television by the minister in charge of humanitarian affairs, Lamine Ba, after a

coordination meeting with humanitarian organizations.

According to Senegal's Agriculture Minister Fatou Gaye Sarr, suppliers have already been asked to deliver 10,000 tons of cereals to Niger through humanitarian organizations.

Icelandic tourism industry struggling to get on feet after volcanic eruption

REYKJAVIK, 1 May — The tourism industry in Iceland is struggling to get on its feet after falling to victim of a volcanic eruption more than two weeks ago, with both private tourism operators and government tourism agency trying hard to restore confidence among tourists from across the world.

The tourism industry occupies the third place

in the export sector of the Icelandic economy, which is yet to emerge from a roughly two-year old crushing financial crisis.

After the volcano under the Eyjafjallajökull glacier started eruption on 14 April, the tourism industry in this tiny Nordic country took a heavy blunt to the face immediately as lots of trip bookings were canceled.

Petrobras rated as Brazil's most valuable brand

RIO DE JANEIRO, 1 May — Petrobras, the state-owned oil and gas giant of Brazil, is the country's most valuable brand, according to the results of a survey released on Friday. The survey conducted by consulting company Brand-Analytics puts Petrobras' brand value at 19.3 billion reais (11.1 billion US dollars), up 735 percent from the estimate by a similar survey last year.

Petrobras said the results are a recognition of the trust the company has among various social sectors in Brazil.

"Petrobras is always looking to

improve its processes, products, and to invest in technology and environmental responsibility to meet the expectations of all Brazilians," said Wilson Santarosa, the company's executive manager for corporate communications, upon receiving the Most Valuable Brazilian Brand award.

Bradesco bank came second in the survey with a brand value of 14.8 billion reais (8.5 billion dollars), followed by the Itau bank, which is worth 13.3 billion reais (7.6 billion dollars).

French warship destroys pirate mother ship off Somali coast

NAIROBI, 1 May — A French warship has destroyed a pirate mother ship, some 480 nautical miles east of the Somali coast, EU Naval Force said on Friday.

Naval Force spokesman John Harbour said the French warship Nivose on Thursday boarded and searched the vessels but the pirates were found to have disposed of pirate paraphernalia. "The EU NAVFOR warship Nivose found stopped and searched a mother ship and two supporting skiffs, some 480 nautical miles east of the Somali

Coast.

The 11 Somali crew of these vessels were taken on board the Nivose, as were the two attack skiffs and the mother skiff was sunk," Harbour said in a statement. He said the EU Naval Force will continue with its aggressive stance against piracy and the intention to interdict and disrupt pirate activity. Harbour said over 40 pirate action groups have been disrupted in the last two months showing that the new strategy is working.

Tornadoes kill 3, injure 25 in south-central US

WASHINGTON, 1 May — Tornadoes on Friday hit the south-central US state of Arkansas, killing at least three people and injuring 25 others, local authorities said.

The deaths were reported in Van Buren County, where tornadoes also destroyed several mobile homes, said the state's Department of Emergency Management spokeswoman Renee

Preslar.

Tornadoes also tore down trees and power lines in the county about 120 km north of Little Rock.

Preslar said rescue teams were searching for people who might still be in their damaged homes.

"There are people possibly trapped there," she said. "Search and rescue is going in for a possible missing person." —Xinhua

Exercise may slow osteoporosis

AUGUSTA, 1 May— US researchers say exercise helps to forestall osteoporosis in women.

Researchers at the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta found study participants who exercised more than 180 minutes a week retained greater bone density.

“Our work provides more evidence that physical activity is important for maintaining bone density. It’s a case of ‘use it or lose it,’” principal investigator Dr Joseph Cannon says in a statement.

Cannon and colleagues measured 36 women between the ages of 20 and 50 for bone mineral density and levels of follicle-

stimulating hormone — an ovary regulator released by the pituitary gland.

They correlated higher levels of the hormone with lower bone mineral density and found the hormone combined with white blood cells stimulated production of interleukin-1, which also correlated with lower bone mineral density.

Exercise, the researchers suggest, may help keep bone breakdown under control by inhibiting factors promoting interleukin-1.

The findings were presented at the Experimental Biology conference in Anaheim, Calif.

Vitamin E effective for liver disease

NEW YORK, 1 May—Vitamin E appears to be more effective in treating obesity-associated chronic liver disease than a prescription drug, US researchers found.

Dr Joel Lavine, now a faculty member at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons and of New York-Presbyterian/Morgan Stanley Children’s Hospital, in the 1990s began vitamin E research for non-alcoholic steatohepatitis, a liver disease that can lead to cirrhosis, liver cancer and death.

The placebo-controlled randomized trial randomly assigned 247 non-diabetic adults in nine medical centres with biopsy-confirmed non-alcoholic steatohepatitis to take either vitamin E, the drug pioglitazone or a placebo.

“There is an increasing prevalence of nonalcoholic steatohepatitis in this country, something that is directly related to the obesity epidemic,” study co-author Lavine said in a statement.—Internet

Baby’s breath may help cure cancer

SOUTHAMPTON, 1 May— Extract from the baby’s breath flower may improve the efficiency of anti-leukemia drugs by up to 1 million times, a British doctor says.

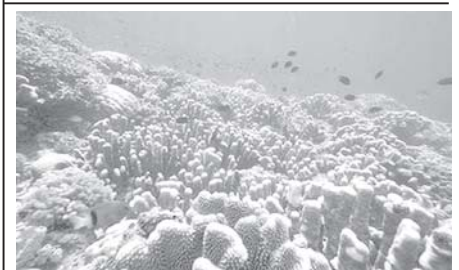
“I am usually careful about the words I use with things like this but this discovery could truly revolutionize the way these antibody-based drugs work and it will save lives,” Dr. David Flavell said of the findings by researchers with Leukemia Busters, the charity he and his wife started following the leukemia death of their son.

“And this doesn’t just apply to leukemia. There is a really big possibility this can be used for many cancers too.”

The Sun reported on Thursday clinical trials, which could take three to five years, are being prepared.

The researchers say molecules called saponins from *Gypsophila paniculata*, the small, white-blossomed flower commonly known as baby’s breath, appeared in trials to break down the membrane of cancer cells, making it much easier for drugs to attack the cancer, the British tabloid said.

“This is a potentially very important discovery that could allow us to kill leukemia cells in the patient much more effectively with much lower doses of immunotoxin,” *The Daily Telegraph* quoted Flavell as saying. “The challenge now is to establish how best to apply this laboratory discovery to the treatment of patients.—Internet

Gene test may replace some heart biopsies

NEW YORK, 1 May — US medical researchers say “a blood test can safely reduce the need for invasive heart muscle biopsies in heart transplantation patients.”

The genetic test was co-developed by New York-Presbyterian Hospital/Columbia University Medical Centre physician-scientist Dr Mario Deng in 2005. Now a multicentre study has determined the gene expression test called AlloMap molecular expression testing is safe and results in significantly fewer biopsies.

Discovery on how breast cancer may spread

SAN FRANCISCO, 1 May— US researchers say they have discovered how to predict if the most common form of breast cancer may later spread.

Lead author Karla Kerlikowske of the University of California, San Francisco, and the San Francisco Veterans Affairs Medical Center, says the most common form of breast cancer — ductal carcinoma in situ — rarely leads to death, but approximately 11 out of 100 women treated by lumpectomy develop invasive cancer within eight years of the initial diagnosis.

In this group of women, 1 percent to 2 percent of women die of breast cancer within 10 years of diagnosis, Kerlikowske says.

“Women will have much more information, so they can better know their risk of developing invasive cancer,” Kerlikowske says in a statement. “It will lead to a more personalized approach to treatment. As many as 44 percent of patients with ductal carcinoma in situ may not require any further treatment, and can rely instead on surveillance.”—Internet

NEW YORK, 1 May—Weill Cornell Medical College researchers say they have

determined a single gene is responsible for obsessive-compulsive disorder behaviors in mice.

The scientists at the college's Ansary Stem Cell Institute and department of psychiatry said they discovered mice with a gene called *Slitrk5* developed repetitive obsessive-compulsive-like behaviors.

"Overall, our data suggest that *Slitrk5* may have a central role in the development of the core symptoms of OCD — self-injurious, repetitive behavior and increased anxiety," said Drs. Shahin Rafii and Francis Lee. "Very few psychiatric disorders have been linked to a single gene, and it will be important to find out if patients with the disorder have an alteration of *Slitrk5*." Rafii is director of the stem cell institute and Lee is an associate professor at the college. "This work is an unexpected offshoot from stem cell science into the realm of psychiatry, and could potentially have major application for treatment of neuropsychiatric diseases," Rafii said.

distinguishable by the different colours of the glacial rocks below and the carbonate rock above. New data from a Princeton University-led team of geologists suggest that an episode called

"snowball Earth," which may have covered the continents and oceans in a thick sheet of ice, produced a dramatic change in the carbon cycle. This change in the carbon cycle, in turn, may have triggered future ice ages.

Pinpointing the causes and effects of the extreme shift in the way carbon moved through the oceans, the biosphere and the atmosphere the magnitude of which has not been observed at any other time in Earth history is important for understanding just how much Earth's climate can change and how the planet responds to such disturbances.

Scientists look beyond diamond for quantum computing

SANTA BARBARA, 1 May—A team of scientists at UC Santa Barbara that helped pioneer research into the quantum properties of a small defect found in diamonds has now used cutting-edge computational techniques to produce a road map for studying defects in alternative materials. Their new research is published in the online edition of the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS)*, and will soon be published in the print edition of the journal. The findings may enable new applications for semiconductors — materials that are the foundation of today's information technology. In particular, they may help identify alternative materials to use for building a potential quantum computer.

"Our results are likely to have an impact on experimental and theoretical research in diverse areas of science and technology, including semi-conductor physics, materials science, magnetism, and quantum device engineering," said David D. Awschalom, UCSB physics professor and one of two lead investigators on this project. "Ironically, while much of semiconductor technology is devoted to eliminating the defects that interfere with how today's devices operate, these defects may actually be useful for future quantum technologies."

Scientists uncover transfer of genetic material between blood-sucking insect and mammals

AUSTIN, 1 May—Researchers at The University of Texas at Arlington have found the first solid evidence of horizontal DNA transfer, the movement of genetic material among non-mating species, between parasitic invertebrates and some of their vertebrate hosts.

The findings are published in the April 28 issue of the journal *Nature*, one of the world's foremost scientific journals.

Genome biologist Cédric Feschotte and postdoctoral researchers Clément Gilbert and Sarah Schaack found evidence of horizontal transfer of transposon from a South American blood-sucking bug and a pond snail to their hosts. A transposon is a segment of DNA that can replicate itself and move around to different positions within the genome. Transposons can cause mutations, change the amount of DNA in the cell and dramatically influence the structure and function of the genomes where they reside.

50/0 is 12 feet wide pebble facility. Some parts of alignment from mile posts 79/0 to 96/0 passes through the paddy field and plains. The road section from mile posts 57/0 to 79/0 is on the hilly region and from the posts 79/0 to 96/0 on the plains. The section from mile posts from 50/0 to 96/0 is now earth road. At present, the 96 miles long road is under construction as a 12 feet wide motor road on 34 feet wide embankment for the use of 40-ton vehicles. The road will have nine feet wide pedestrian way on either side inclusive of earthen road shoulder.

It can be said that Public Works shows off its brilliant and concerted efforts in construction tasks. All-out efforts of 27 construction groups namely Maubin District and Pyapon District Public Works, Hlinebone Group, Special Road Group 2, Hinthada District Public Works, Special Airport Group 2, Special Road Group 15, Thayawady and Patheingyi District Public Works, Special Bridge Group 1 and Special Bridge Group 13, Bago, Yangon East, Yangon West, Myaungmya District Public Works, Special Road Group 4, Special Road Group 16, Mandalay District Public Works, Special Bridge Group 2, Special Bridge Group 5, Meiktila District Public Works, Special Road Group 7, Special Building Group 3, Special Building Group 5, Special Road Group 13, Special Bridge

Group 3 and Special Bridge Group 11. 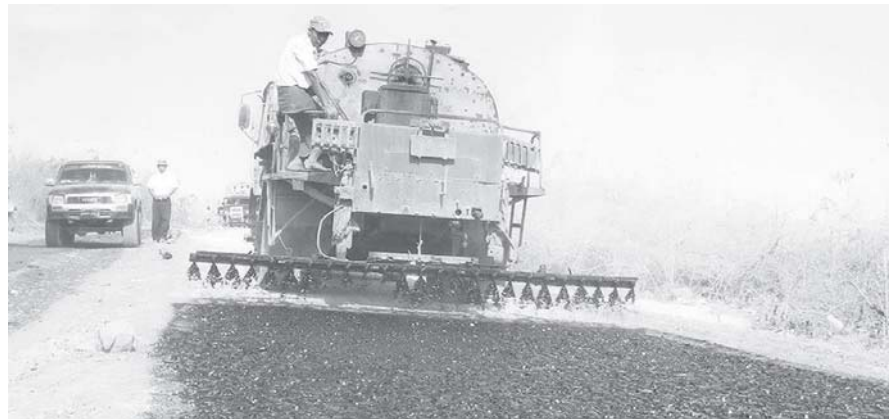
tar used in the road. For ensuring durability of the road, the quality road construction materials should be used as well as the vehicles should carry the commodities in accordance with prescribed limit. Before 1988, the total weight of commodity and vehicle was 13 tons. However, the vehicles carry over load commodities from 60 to 70-80 tons of loads after 1988. Patheingyi-Thalakhwa-Mawtinsoo Road can withstand 40-ton load of vehicle plus commodity. So, I would

like to request the road users to abide by the law."

In the past, the roads linking upper and lower parts of the nation along the east bank of Ayeyawady River. At present, the roads are linking all parts of the nation in the east, west, north and south. As necessary roads and bridges have been built in Ayeyawady Division, the waterways and motor roads are reliable transport facilities in the region. Patheingyi-Thalakhwa-Mawtinsoo Road is one

of the roads implemented in the Ayeyawady Delta Region Road Network Project after the storm Nargis had hit there. The road will be used as a rescuing route to provide assistance for Ayeyawady Division in a short time if cyclone would hit there. of water is 1600 acre-feet. Still water area is 180 acre-feet and water storage area is 56 acres.

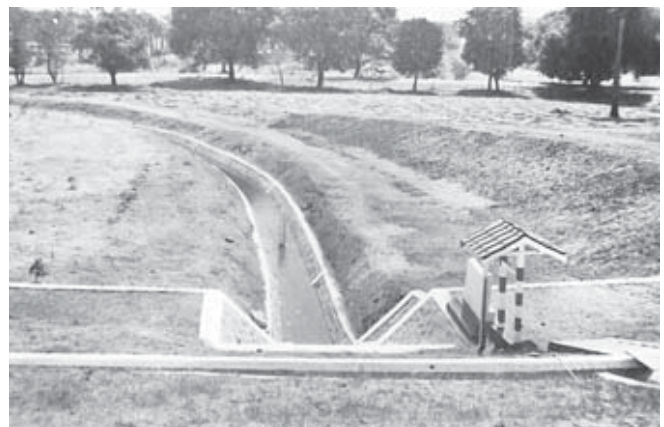
Conduit is of two feet diameter RC type. The spillway is 80 feet in

Brazilian Amazon sees record low deforestation rate since 1988

BRAZILIA, 1 May—The Brazilian Amazon saw a record low annual deforestation rate since the country started monitoring the region with satellite in 1988, the National Institute for Space Research (INPE) said on Thursday. Between August 2008 and July 2009, the Amazon region lost 7,464 square km of forest, with a fall of 42 percent compared with the previous 12-month period, an INPE report said.

The results coincide

with the institute's forecast in December 2009, estimating that devastation between August 2008 and July 2009 had reached a little over 7,000 square kilometres.

The INPE report was based on 400 images taken by three satellites under the PRODES (Project for Monitoring Deforestation in the Amazon) detection system.

According to the institute, devastation began to slow down five years ago, when the government launched

plans for prevention and control measures.

"A substantial and consistent decline in deforestation has been observed since 2004," said INPE. The biggest drop in deforestation was registered in the central-west state of Mato Grosso, with a reduction of 68 percent.

At the Copenhagen climate change conference last December, Brazil presented a target of reducing deforestation rate by 80 percent by 2020.

Severe drought could affect China's coffee industry

KUNMING, 1 May—The once-in-a-century drought that has parched southwest China would affect the output of 60 percent of the coffee farms in Yunnan Province, says a report by the Coffee Association of Yunnan (CAYN).

And industry analysts say the persistent drought would also threaten coffee bean output in the next three years as well. Yunnan, with 32,000 hectares of coffee plantations, accounts for 98 percent of China's total 490,000 mu, or 32,700 hectares, of coffee plantations, according to the CAYN.

The report was compiled after a CAYN special team investigated the effect of the severe drought in the province in April.

"Coffee seedlings planted in the past three years were affected the most," said CAYN Vice President Liu Biao. "According to our conservative estimate, two fifths of the newly planted coffee seedlings in Yunnan last year have withered during the persistent drought."—Internet



Authorities rescue 2 stranded Mexican journalists

OAXACA, 1 May—Mexican authorities rescued two journalists Friday who had been stranded for nearly three days among feuding militants after a caravan of rights activists was caught in a deadly ambush.

Photographer David Cilia, who was shot in the attack, and reporter Erika Ramirez were escorted by police out of a remote Triqui Indian community, the scene of a violent

dispute between rival political factions.

Cilia described how the two reporters and two other caravan members took refuge in the brush, and spent days listening to constant gunfire, not knowing whether the gunmen would hunt them down.

"There in the brush, because they kept firing, we had to go deeper into the woods," Cilia said in an interview posted on the

website of his magazine, Contralinea. "We heard the gunshots getting closer."

After fleeing the initial assault, they knew fellow members of the convoy were still in the bullet-ridden vehicles, but gunfire prevented them from going to their aid. They did not know that a Finnish rights observer and a Mexican activist shot in the initial attack Tuesday were probably already dead.

Kurdish rebels kill four Turkish soldiers, wound seven

ANKARA, 1 May—Authorities say Kurdish rebels have raided a Turkish military outpost in eastern Turkey, killing at least four Turkish soldiers and wounding seven others in the largest attack on troops in several months.

Authorities say the commander of the outpost near the town of Nazimiye in Tunceli province was killed in the overnight attack. Saturday's attack follows a surge in attacks by autonomy-seeking rebels.

Thursday), southern army spokesman Malaak Ayuen Ajok told AFP.

"We managed to push back the attackers, but there are seven dead and nine injured among the troops," Ajok said.

"Several attackers also lost their lives," said Ajok, a senior member of the former rebel Sudan People's Liberation Army (SPLA).

The army said it had

captured some of the attackers who said they had acted on the orders of George Athor Deng, an SPLA member who ran as an independent for the post of governor in the southern Jonglei state but was defeated by Kuol Manyang. "He's very angry to have lost. We have no other explanation for this attack right now," said Ajok.

SHEFFIELD, 1 May—Australia's Neil Robertson opened up a 15-9 lead over Ali Carter on Friday to move closer to the world snooker championship final.

Last year the 28-year-old also reached the semi-finals, but this time he is ideally placed to go one step further and needs just more frames on Saturday to clinch a shot at either Graeme Dott or Mark Selby in the title match. The last man from outside the British Isles to reach a World Championship final was Canadian Cliff Thorburn, who lost to Steve Davis in 1983.

Thorburn won the world title in 1980, becoming the only player from outside the UK and Ireland to ever triumph at Sheffield's famous Crucible theatre.

Transitional housing slowly getting built in Haiti

PAPETTE, 1 May—Unlike the vast majority of earthquake victims still crowded into squalid camps, the simple farmers of this hard-hit village have reason to hope as hurricane season looms.

Transitional housing now rises on the foundations of cinderblock homes pulverized by the 12 Jan quake, framed in pressure-treated yellow pine, roofed in rustproof paint-coated galvanized steel and anchored in newly poured concrete.

The Dutch relief group, Cordaid, expects to finish 150 of the dwellings with sturdy tarpaulin walls by next week in this village overlooking a mango-lined lagoon. They are among the first of more than 130,000 semi-permanent shelters that international relief groups hope to put up in the

earthquake zone in coming months.

But construction of the shelters—more than a tent but less than a house—has been excruciatingly slow, with barely 400 or so completed.

Two major factors impede the rollout: the crawling pace of rubble removal in Port-au-Prince,

where a third of the city is still buried in quake debris, and Haiti's vexing land issues.

Relief agencies can't build shelters in the jammed tent camps that sprung up after the quake on every available inch of public land in Port-au-Prince, as well as on the private property of schools and businesses.

Germany launches push into offshore wind

BORKUM, 1 May—The blades began turning on Germany's first offshore wind farm this week—the starting signal for the construction of hundreds of additional sea-based turbines.

Erected 28 miles off the North Sea coast, the Alpha Ventus farm consists of 12 wind turbines—each nearly as high as the Washington Monument—that are to generate enough power for nearly 50,000 households. German utilities Eon and EWE as well as Sweden's Vattenfall invested \$333 million in the project, which is to pave the way for similar farms to be built near Germany's coastlines in the coming years.

Bystander halts bank robbery

Police in Florida praised the courage of a 62-year-old man who used his handgun to foil a bank robbery.

Ruben Torres, 62, an off-duty security guard, said he was at the Space Coast Credit Union in Palm Bay on Thursday when a man entered and began behaving suspiciously, the Palm Beach (Fla.) Post reported on Friday.

"He wasn't disguised or anything.

But he put a Wal-Mart bag on his head, walked to the counter and gave the teller a note ... He even took the bag off his head and gave it to the teller to put the cash in," Torres said.

Torres, who has a concealed weapons permit, said he quietly left the bank to get his gun from his car.

Torres showed the man his gun and ordered him to lie on the ground until police arrived.

"The whole thing lasted 3 to 4 minutes," Torres said.

Floyd Francis, 23, of Palm Bay, was arrested and charged with robbery.

"Torres' actions, while not encouraged, are appreciated and were very courageous," police Lt. Mark Renkens said. "He took action to stop a crime in progress and fortunately made a positive difference in the outcome."

Designer axes sell for up to \$500

A Canadian company is creating designer wood-chopping axes starting at \$200 and selling for up to \$500 at a New York outlet.

Graeme Cameron, 38, and Peter Buchanan-Smith, 38, the New York-based designer who paints, varnishes and stains the axes, said the tools are specially designed to cut through even the most difficult pieces of wood, the *Toronto Star* reported on Friday.

"Anyone who thinks it is just art is very wrong," Cameron said. "These are very powerful axes."

The pair, who founded the company in May 2009, said their products, available only at Partners and Spade in New York, have been featured in design magazines, *The New York Times* and an upcoming design show in London.

Cameron said they have sold about 500 of the axes thus far.

Maria Challis, 36, of Ness, England, said the cutout of her late husband, Paul, 38, was made for his funeral in July 2009 and she could not bring herself to throw it away after the service, the *Daily Record* reported on Friday.

Challis said she keeps the cutout in the family home she shares with children Jack, 7, and Molly, 9. "When you lose someone you love, you worry you'll forget them and this is our way of remembering Paul and keeping our precious memories of him alive," she said. "He was due to go to a friend's wedding some weeks after he died. He didn't make it but his cutout did. Some people might raise eyebrows but who is anyone to say what is the right and wrong way to deal with grief?"

Drug kingpin buried in gold coffin

A former Australian drug kingpin, killed in prison last week, was buried on Friday in an oversized gold casket valued at \$30,000.

Carl Williams, who was beaten to death last week in Barwon Prison where he was serving the third year of a life sentence, was buried Friday in the gold casket at Keilor Cemetery in Essendon, the *Sydney Morning Herald* reported on Friday.

British blind boy 'sees' like a dolphin

LONDON, 1 May — A blind British boy, 4, uses echo-location to "see" the same way dolphins navigate murky waters. *The Sun* said Jamie Aspland, from Kent, makes clicking noises with his tongue to find his way around objects, after he was taught the revolutionary technique by a US expert. "It's amazing," his mother Deborah Aspland said. "Since learning the skill we can walk to the park and Jamie no longer has to hold my hand."

The technique works by rebounding the clicking sound off objects — creating a flash of light "mind map" of the obstacle. Jamie is among only a handful of children worldwide to be taught how to copy dolphins by Californian Daniel Kish, who is himself blind. Kish calls his echo-location skill "flash-sonar".

He said: "It provides one with information of a fair amount of detail at distances of dozens of metres."

Deborah Aspland said her heart was in her mouth on their first trip to the local park when Jamie walked towards a wall. "He just went round it. I didn't think it would be possible."

Sunshine link to baby's risk of MS 1in later life

LONDON, 1 May — Babies born in sunnier months are at higher risk of developing multiple sclerosis (MS) in later life, researchers said on Thursday. Pregnant women who fail to get enough sunshine — thereby cutting off their main source of vitamin D — could increase the chances of their offspring developing MS, a study found.

Researchers believe variations in exposure to sunlight in pregnancy could affect how a baby's central nervous and immune system develops. MS is caused by damage to myelin, a protective sheath surrounding the nerve fibres of the central nervous system.—Internet

Conjoined twins successfully separated

RIYADH, 1 May — A team of Saudi doctors led by the country's health minister has successfully separated two baby boys from Jordan conjoined at the stomach in a seven-hour operation. Ten-week-old Amjed and Mohammed Taim, born sharing a liver and other tissues, were separated in an operation at King Abdulaziz Medical Centre in Riyadh that was televised live back to Jordan.

"Five, four, three, two, one," Dr Abdullah Rabeeah, the Saudi health minister, counted down after using a laser knife to divide the boys' liver and then finally separate the remaining tissue between them. "The operation is complete, both twins are now in separate beds, both are stable," he announced. Two paediatric surgery teams then sewed the boys up and transferred them to the intensive care ward to recover.

The boys' parents were on hand for the operation, which was paid for by Saudi King Abdullah, who has sponsored most of the 27 successful operations to separate conjoined twins carried out at the Riyadh hospital.

OKLAHOMA, 1 May — An elderly driver in the US who backed his car through the seventh-floor wall of a car park has had a lucky escape. Sixty-seven-year-old Ralph Hudson burst through the car park's exterior wall after getting his foot stuck between the brake and accelerator pedal of his Mercedes.

Mr Hudson, who was manoeuvring in the garage in Tulsa, Oklahoma when the accident happened, had a narrow escape when the car stopped just in time. Its boot and part of its back wheels were left hanging precariously out of the building but staff were able to safely drive it back inside. Mr Hudson was not given a summons over the incident, police said.—Internet

Doctors will be able to predict women's risk

LONDON, 1 May — Thousands of women could be spared unnecessary treatment for breast cancer after a breakthrough in screening techniques, scientists have claimed. They have identified a way to predict whether some cancerous cells will go on to become dangerous.

The discovery could help women who have been diagnosed with a common form of the disease called ductal carcinoma in situ (DCIS). Women with DCIS have cancerous cells in the channels in the breast that carry milk to the nipple, but these cells have not spread to other parts of the breast, meaning that the condition is occasionally referred to as "pre-cancerous".—Internet

Exxon Mobil posts 38% profit rise in first quarter

HOUSTON, 1 May—US oil giant Exxon Mobil said Thursday its first quarter profits jumped 38 percent over the year-ago period, thanks to rising oil prices in the first three months of the year.

During the first three months of this year, Irving, Texas-based Exxon posted a profit of 6.3 billion US dollars, compared with 4.55 billion in the same period last year.

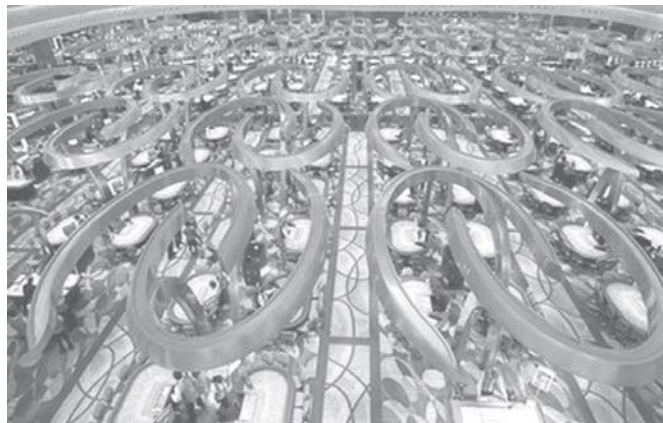
"Exxon Mobil achieved solid results from its worldwide operations," said Exxon chairman Rex Tillerson.

However, the results are still short of meeting analysts' expectations. Amid high oil prices of around 85 dollars a barrel, analysts have expected the company to post slightly stronger profits.

"2010 is a special year for both the World Economic Forum, which is celebrating the 20th anniversary of its Africa meeting, and Africa, which is marking 50 years since the start of the independence movement that transformed the continent's geopolitical landscape," said Katherine Tweedie, Director, Head of Africa, World Economic Forum.

Russia begins oil project in Caspian Sea

Moscow, 1 May—Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin on Wednesday inspected a drilling platform at the Yury Korchagin offshore oil field in the Caspian Sea.

Putin inspected the platform to start a project that will be operated by LUKoil, Russia's largest independent oil producer. LUKoil has said annual production in the oil field could reach 2.5 million metric tons of oil, and 1 billion cubic metres of natural gas.

The company said that

it plans to produce 343,000 tons of oil at the field this year.

LUKoil has invested 34.4 billion rubles (1.2 billion US dollars) in the field that holds an estimated 270 million barrels of oil and 63.3 billion cubic metres of gas.

Between 1999 and 2005, LUKoil discovered six oil and gas fields in the northern part of the Caspian Sea, with estimated aggregate reserves of 4.7 billion barrels of oil.

China unveils regulations to boost foreign investment in central regions

NANCHANG, 1 May—Chinese Ministry of Commerce released regulations concerning foreign investment in China's central region here on Thursday.

The region - which includes the provinces of

Shanxi, Anhui, Jiangxi, Henan, Hubei and Hunan - should attract high-end green industry with policy incentives and guidance, the regulations say.

It should give priority to manufacturing while eyeing investment in other sectors like agriculture, sophisticated processing industries, trade, finance, education, culture, tourism and leasing. The region should nurture business-friendly policies and slash transaction costs to attract businesses considering moving inland from the coastal regions.

The rules call for rectifying any practices that disrupt business operation, including authorities' arbitrary law enforcement. The rules also urged a market oriented administration system consistent with international rules.

Samsung eyes record Q2, to up spending in tech rebound

SEOUL, 1 May—Samsung Electronics Co Ltd (005930.KS), the world's top maker of memory chips and flat screen TVs, forecast record results as it aims to sharply boost spending, betting on still strong demand in the second half.

Samsung is firing on all cylinders as consumers snap up gadgets and appliances, marking a steep recovery in the once-battered global technology sector, but rising industry

investments threaten to restart the chronic oversupply cycle.

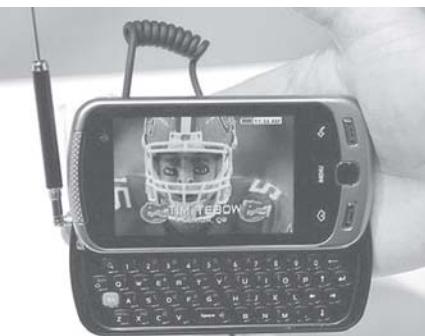
Samsung, also the world's No.2 handset maker behind Finland's Nokia (NOK1V.HE), has little traction in the lucrative smartphone markets, which could also be an earnings drag for Asia's most valuable technology firm. "I expect earnings to peak at Q3 as seasonal demand for memory chips reaches its highest...there is a gloomy air in its

telecommunication segment since it has lost ground on smartphones," said Kim Young-june, an analyst at LIG Investment & Securities.

By 0320 GMT, shares in Samsung, valued at around \$107 billion, rose 2.1 percent in a strong broader market (.KS11). The shares have slipped 4 percent after hitting a record high in early April on growing worries of oversupply in LCD and chips.—Internet

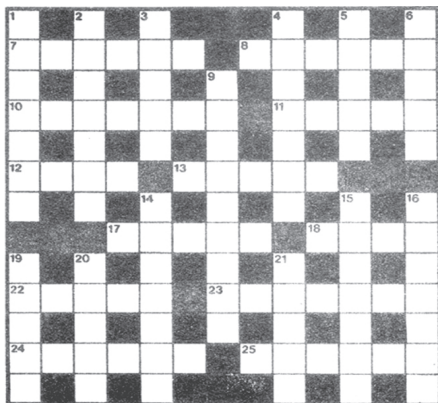
Nadal powers on as Spanish dominate Rome tennis Masters

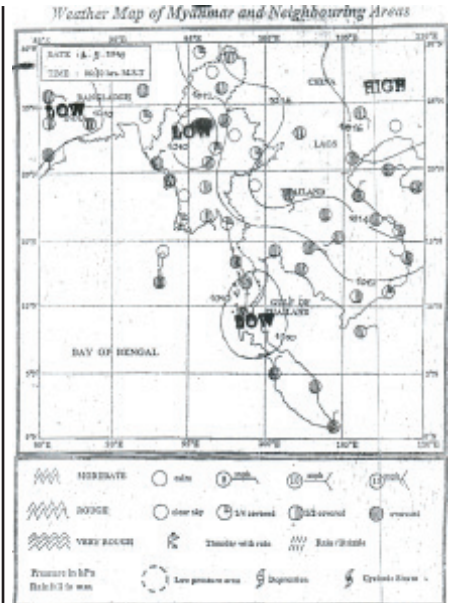
