"Health is wealth", as a saying goes, the government has been striving for promotion of health, fitness and education standards of the entire nation.

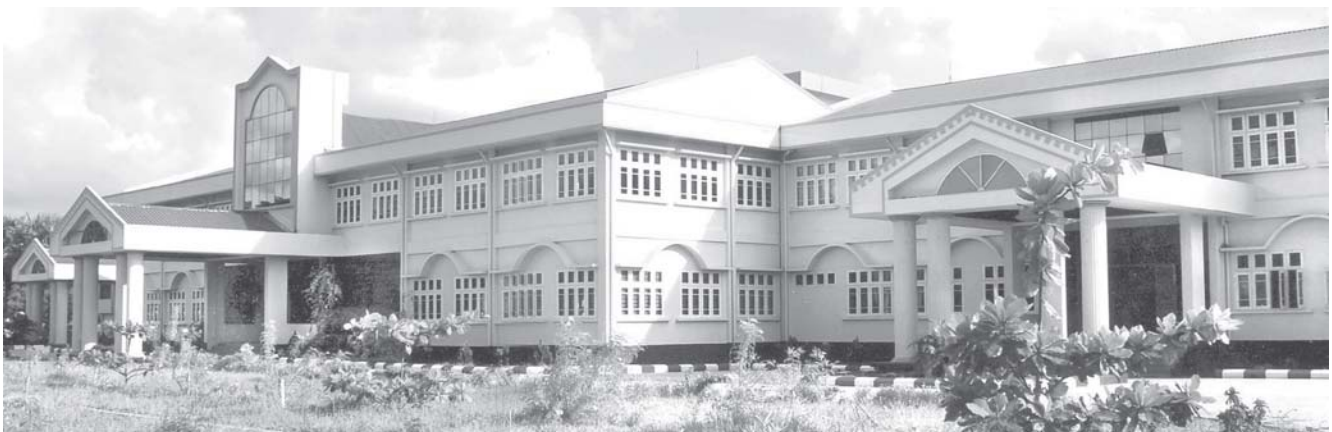

Vietnam, US still in conflict over Agent Orange

CAM TUYEN, 23 May— Her children are 21 and 16 years old, but they still cry through the night, tossing and turning in pain, sucking their thumbs for comfort.

Tran Thi Gai, who rarely gets any sleep herself, sings them a mournful lullaby. "Can you feel my love for you? Can you feel my sorrow for you? Please don't cry."

Gai's children—both with twisted limbs and confined to wheelchairs—were born in a village that was drenched with Agent Orange during the

Vietnam War. She believes their health problems were caused by dioxin, a highly toxic chemical in the herbicide, which US troops used to strip communist forces of ground cover and food.

Thirty-five years after the end of the Vietnam War, its most contentious remaining legacy is Agent Orange. Eighty-two percent of Vietnamese surveyed in a recent Associated Press-GfK Poll said the United States should be doing more to help people suffering from illnesses associated with the

herbicide, including children born with birth defects.

After President George W Bush pledged to work on the issue on a Hanoi visit in 2006, the US Congress has approved \$9 million mostly to address environmental cleanup of Agent Orange. But while the US has provided assistance to Vietnamese with disabilities—regardless of their cause—it maintains that there is no clear link between Agent Orange and health problems.—Internet

Militants attack NATO's southern Afghan base

KABUL, 23 May— The Taliban claimed responsibility on Sunday for a nighttime assault on NATO's biggest base in southern Afghanistan, militants firing rockets, mortars and automatic weapons tried to storm Kandahar Air Field—the second such attack on a major military installation this week. Several coalition troops and civilian employees were wounded in the assault on Saturday night, but there were no reports of deaths, officials said.

A Canadian Press news agency report from Kandahar said artillery and machine gun fire reverberated through the base, about 300 miles (500 kilometres) southwest of Kabul, several hours after the attack began. Militants unleashed rockets and mortars about 8 pm (15:30 GMT) and then tried unsuccessfully to storm the northern perimeter, officials said.

Arab League urges dialogue on Nile water row

CAIRO, 23 May—The Arab League (AL) urged on Saturday the Nile Basin countries to work together to bridge their differences over Nile River water use. Head of the AL secretary general's office Hisham Youssef expressed in press statements that the body hoped understanding could be reached through dialogue.

Four Nile basin countries, namely, Ethiopia, Rwanda, Tanzania and Uganda, signed on 14 May the cooperative framework agreement on the usage of Nile River water in Entebbe, 40 km south of Ugandan capital Kampala, despite boycotts from Egypt and Sudan. Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo and

Kenya promised to sign the agreement later, saying the riparian countries should have equal rights to use the Nile water.

Kenya joined the signatories on Wednesday and became the fifth upstream nation to have agreed with the pact. "Is the signing of the agreement (by the five countries) the end of the way? ... there are other steps to develop understanding in some way," Youssef said.

Meanwhile, AL Secretary General Amr Moussa said on Saturday the pan-Arab body is ready to play whatever role in contributing to solving the Nile water dispute within the framework of African-Arab relations.

Three foreign troops killed in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 23 May— Three service members with the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) were killed in southern Afghanistan on Saturday.

The ISAF in a Press release confirmed the casualties, noting that two of the foreign troops were killed in "an militants and the other in an improvised explosive device (IED) attack."

One civilian working with the international force was also killed in the first incident, said the ISAF Press release.

The Press release failed to provide any further information, as the ISAF policy defers identification procedures for casualties to the relevant national authorities.

Japanese cargo ship stranded in waters near Miyazaki, three dead

TOKYO, 23 May— A cargo ship ran on rocks early Sunday in waters near Hyuga, Miyazaki Prefecture, leaving three of its four crew members dead and the other missing, local media reported, citing the coast guard in Miyazaki.

The three crew members on the Katsu Maru No 8 ship were confirmed dead after being found by the coast guard and taken to hospital, and the search and rescue operation is still under way for the missing.

According to the reports, Miyazaki local observatory issued a strong wind and high surf warning for waters off Hyuga when the accident occurred.

Solar power manufacturing makes good business sense for governments, study finds

KINGSTON, 23 May—Canadian and provincial governments could spend \$2.4 billion to build a large scale solar photovoltaic manufacturing plant and then give it away for free and still earn a profit in the long run, according to a

financial analysis conducted by the Queen's University Applied Sustainability Research Group in Kingston, Canada.

Queen's University Mechanical Engineering Professor Joshua Pearce conducted the study — to be published in the August edition of the academic journal *Energy Policy* — to find out if it makes economic sense for governments to support solar cell manufacturing in Canada. He was surprised to discover the answer is an overwhelming yes even in extreme situations and feels governments should be aggressively supporting this industry to take advantage of the financial opportunity.

"This study uses hard financial numbers. Everything we did is transparent and all our equations are in the study," says Professor Pearce.

Danger in the internet cafe? New computer security threat for wireless networks

NEW YORK, 23 May — There's a potential threat lurking in your internet café, say University of Calgary computer science researchers. It's called Typhoid adware and works in similar fashion to Typhoid Mary, the first identified healthy carrier of typhoid fever who spread the disease to dozens of people in the New York area in the early 1900s.

"Our research describes a potential computer security threat and offers some solutions," says associate professor John Aycock, who co-

authored a paper with assistant professor Mea Wang and students Daniel Medeiros Nunes de Castro and Eric Lin. "We're looking at a different variant of adware — Typhoid

adware -which we haven't seen out there yet, but we believe could be a threat soon."

Adware is software that sneaks onto computers often when users download things, for example fancy tool bars or free screen savers, and it typically pops up lots and lots of ads. Typhoid adware needs a wireless internet café or other area where users share a non-encrypted wireless connection.

Activities ranging from "walking with wolves" to dragonfly spotting will help people to join the worldwide action on a local level, say organizers.

The event is part of a campaign to highlight the loss of species and ecosystems due to human activity.

It marks the highlight of a collection of events this year, the UN International Year of Biodiversity.

Five race-against-the-clock events, or "BioBlitzes", invite people all over Britain to find and identify as many grasses, mammals, insects, trees and birds as they can in 24 hours.

Shuttle and space station photographed crossing the sun

WASHINGTON, 23 May—An eye-popping new snapshot taken by a Florida photographer has caught the International Space Station and shuttle Atlantis in silhouette as both spaceships crossed in front of the sun.

Photographer Thierry Legault took the stunning photo on 16 May from Madrid, Spain at 13:28 GMT (9:28 am EDT) shortly before Atlantis docked at the space station.

In the photo, the shuttle and space station can clearly be seen as two separate spacecraft.

They appear as dark silhouettes in the upper right region of an otherwise bright yellow sun. Even the wings of Atlantis can be discerned along with the station's expansive solar arrays as both flew 200 miles (354 km) above earth.

When Legault took the photo, Atlantis was flying below the space station and about to perform an orbital back flip so astronauts inside the station could snap high-resolution photos of the thousands of heat-resistant tiles lining the shuttle's belly.

Catching the scene is can be extremely tricky, Legault said.—*Internet*

Jupiter's disappearing cloud stripe mystifies scientists

NEW YORK, 23 May — The disappearance of a giant cloud belt around the southern half of Jupiter has transformed the appearance of our solar system's largest planet and left scientists scratching their heads over what caused the huge brown stripe to vanish.

Photos taken 9 May by Australian amateur astronomer Anthony Wesley revealed that the huge rusty-hued band of clouds, known as the South Equatorial Belt (SEB), has faded from view. The trick for

scientists now is explaining how it happened.

"This is a big event," said Glenn Orton, a planetary scientist at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, in a statement. "We're monitoring the situation closely and don't yet fully understand what's going on."

Jupiter is wrapped in cloudy yellow, brown and white stripes, created by winds that blow at various latitudes and in different directions. The colours of the cloud bands reflect slight differences in chemical

composition. Propelled by strong wind, these clouds can whip around the planet at hundreds of miles per hour.

High-elevation clouds can be found in the "belt" regions of Jupiter's atmosphere. Belt clouds are darker than those in the relatively low-elevation "zone" regions. The winds in belts and zones flow in opposite directions.

Jupiter's trademark Great Red Spot, a massive storm that could fit two Earths inside, is typically found along the edges of the planet's SEB.

Summer sounds can lead to hearing loss

INDIANAPOLIS, 23 May — Some of the most common sounds of summer can expose listeners to permanent hearing loss, one researcher warns.

The cautionary note was sounded by David Coffin, director of Ball State University's audiology clinic in Indiana.

Risky noise, he says, can come in the form of the pop of fireworks, the snarls of traffic, the buzz of lawn mowers, or the percussive tones of marching bands.

Such sounds are typically within the range of 90 decibels to 140

decibels, said Coffin, but any noise above 80 decibels can cause long-term hearing damage.

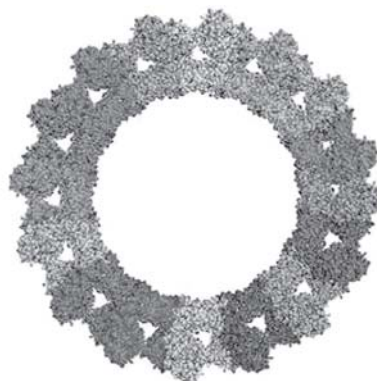
"We are living in a society that gets louder every year," Coffin said in a news release from Ball State. "Now that the weather is warmer, we are exposed to all sorts of sounds that can lead to permanent hearing loss. The average person will wear a helmet when riding a bike, or a seat belt in a vehicle, but doesn't even think about ear protection when going to watch a rock band, a fireworks display, or even an auto race."

According to the

National Centre for Health Statistics, almost 15 percent of Americans below the age of 19 suffer from some measure of hearing loss.

Signs of hearing loss due to unsafe sound exposure include not being able to comprehend somebody talking from two feet away; hearing muffled speech; experiencing pain or ringing in the ears following exposure; and needing others to speak louder in conversation.

Treatment with rituxan may reduce recurrence of follicular lymphoma

PARIS, 23 May — The final phase of a drug study finds that two years of treatment with rituximab (Rituxan) cuts in half the risk that follicular lymphoma patients who respond to chemotherapy will suffer a recurrence of the disease.

"These findings provide hope for the way we manage this disease. Rituximab maintenance therapy is likely to become a new standard of care for these patients," study author Dr Gilles Salles, a professor of medicine at the University of Lyon in France, said in a news release. Typically, he noted, patients often relapse within a few years of their initial treatment.

Checklist cuts death rate for urgent surgery

NEW YORK, 23 May — A simple checklist helps surgical teams avoid mistakes and cuts deaths by more than half during urgent surgery, a new study shows.

The checklist tested in the new study was introduced in 2008 by the World Health Organization as part of its Safe Surgery Saves Lives program.

It had already been shown to cut complications across all types of surgery, but there had been concern that when time is of the essence, running through a checklist might waste life-saving minutes.

But that wasn't the case, said Dr. Atul A. Gawande, a surgeon at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts, who worked on the study. Gawande has also written about checklists for The New Yorker magazine, where he is a staff writer, and in his 2009 book *The Checklist Manifesto: How to Get Things Right*.

"It has a kind of counterintuitive feel to it," he said. But in fact, "the teams did better when they took those two minutes to run through the checks."

Gawande and

colleagues tested eight different hospitals around the world before and after they introduced the WHO checklist. Of the more than 1700 patients who had urgent surgery — for instance, for open fractures — the number of deaths dropped by almost two-thirds, from 3.7 percent to 1.4, they report in the *Annals of Surgery*. —Internet

Scientists sport real 'smoking gun' in prostate cancer

NEW YORK, 23 May — The primary cause of prostate cancer could be the fusion of two genes and the subsequent abnormal prostate cell growth that results when receptors for the hormone androgen get blocked, a new study reveals.

The implication is that standard efforts to treat the disease by targeting the androgen receptors might be missing the real "smoking gun," a University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Centre team suggests.

"We need to begin to think about targeting prostate cancer by targeting the gene fusion, and not confining our approaches to androgen receptors," study author

Dr. Arul Chinnaiyan, director of the Michigan Centre for Translational Pathology, said in a news release. "If we're going to find a more durable therapy, we need to get at the gene fusion."

Chinnaiyan and his colleagues report their

findings in the 18 May issue of *Cancer Cell*.

The authors note that typical prostate cancer treatments focus on drugs that attempt to slow production of androgen, the male hormone that regulates healthy prostate growth. However, such

efforts usually become less effective over time as cancer cell resistance mounts, making recurrent cancer much less amenable to similar treatments. —Internet

Sea sponge-derived drug treats several cancers

WASHINGTON, 23 May — An experimental new breast cancer drug made from sea sponges helped in a range of cancers, from breast cancer to sarcoma, researchers report.

Three studies show the drug, Eisai's eribulin, was effective and tolerated in patients with breast cancer, colon cancer and urinary cancer, according to brief data released on Thursday by the American Society of Clinical Oncology. Sarcomas are cancers that

grow from muscle or bone.

A fourth study of patients with advanced breast cancer will be detailed in a "late-breaker" session at ASCO's annual meeting in June.

The drug is not yet approved, but Eisai has filed with relevant agencies in Japan, the United States and Europe.

The drug works on the same principle, but with a slightly different mechanism as older cancer drugs such as the taxanes and is infused intravenously.

Only a few details are available in the abstracts of the research published ahead of the meeting.

Foreign tourists to Cambodia increase by 10.55 pct in first 4 months

PHNOM PENH, 23 May— Foreign tourists to Cambodia increased by 10.55 percent to 884,657 in the first four months of this year compared to 800,243 at the same period last year.

According to the statistics released by the Ministry of Tourism on Sunday, Vietnam and South Korea listed No 1 and No 2 foreign tourist arrivals in the January-April period of this year, increased by 38.39 percent to 138,945 and 31.81 percent to 106,347 respectively, compared with corresponding period of 2009.

Chinese tourists to Cambodia increased by 30.25 percent to 63,396 in the four-month period, ranking the third among the top ten market arrivals, compared to the same period of last year that had only 48,672.

For the month of April alone, Chinese tourists to Cambodia rose by 41.66 percent to 14,455 from 10,204 in April last year, while tourists from Vietnam and South Korea increased by 65.05 percent to 46,340 and 33.09 percent to 22,285 respectively in the month.

Air Arabia Egypt flights to begin in June

DUBAI, 23 May— UAE-based low cost airline Air Arabia (AIRA.DU) will begin flights on its new Egypt-based carrier in June after it received an operating certificate from Egyptian authorities, the company said on Saturday.

Air Arabia, the Arab world's largest listed airline, said that commercial flights on Air Arabia Egypt would commence from the Egyptian Mediterranean coastal city of Alexandria to Khartoum and Kuwait.

"Air Arabia is continuously expanding to offer a wider segment of customers the best value for money choice for air travel," Sheikh Abdullah Bin Mohammad Al Thani, Chairman of Air Arabia Group said in a statement. "We are confident that Air Arabia 'Egypt' will pursue the success path that our hubs in the UAE and Morocco have followed, by complementing our ever growing network of destinations."

Nokia Siemens sees quarterly profit

FRANKFURT, 23 May — Telecom equipment venture Nokia Siemens Networks (NSN.UL) aims for an operating profit margin of up to 3 percent on revenue of between 3.1-3.4 billion euros (\$3.88-\$4.25 billion) in the current quarter, according to a Sunday newspaper.

"The development in new orders and revenue here (in Western Europe) in the current quarter have so far been better than expected," said NSN manager Hermann Rodler in an interview with the Euro am Sonntag.

The company made a surprise operating profit of 15 million euros in the previous quarter.

In Southern Europe, Rodler said he expected cancellations

or delays in some orders following the austerity programmes in place to reduce burgeoning fiscal deficits.

Customers which are partly owned by indebted euro zone governments will likely have difficulty refinancing their projects due to a knock on effects to their creditworthiness, as debt ratings of countries like Greece or regions such as Navarre and Basque in Spain deteriorate.

NSN competes with rivals like Alcatel-Lucent (ALUA.PA), Ericsson (ERICB.ST) and low-cost Chinese vendor Huawei (HWT.UL).

South Korea, China, Japan trade chiefs meet

SEOUL, 23 May—South Korea – Trade ministers from China, Japan and South Korea met on Sunday to discuss issues including a possible three-way free trade agreement, amid worries over the world economy sparked by Europe's debt crisis.

South Korean Trade Minister Kim Jong-hoon, Chinese Commerce Minister Chen Deming and Japanese Economy, Trade and Industry Minister Masayuki Naoshima began one day of talks at a Seoul hotel with handshakes.

The three countries, which represent 18.6 percent of the global economy as measured by gross domestic product, have been holding regular trilateral meetings at the trade minister level since 2002, according to South Korea.

Japan is Asia's largest economy with China close behind. South Korea ranks No 4 behind India.

The ministers were expected to discuss general issues, including an ongoing joint study for a possible three-way free trade agreement as well as stalled efforts to reach a new global trade deal within the World Trade Organization, Kim Sung-soo, an official at South Korea's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, said Saturday.—Internet

US Abbott buys Indian pharma unit for \$3.7 bln

MUMBAI, 23 May— US healthcare group Abbott Laboratories has announced a 3.7 billion-dollar buyout of the generic drugs unit of India's Piramal Healthcare, as it moves to boost its presence in emerging markets.

Abbott, which announced the acquisition in a statement late Friday, said the deal would make it the leading pharma company in India with a market share of seven percent. The US firm has agreed to pay 2.1 billion dollars as a down payment, with the remainder to be paid in annual installments of 400 million dollars over the

next four years.

Abbott said the deal would accelerate its growth in emerging markets "giving it the number one position in the Indian pharmaceutical market".

Pharmaceutical sector analysts called the deal a "benchmark", which could see more Indian firms selling out businesses to multinationals who are keen to expand in one of the world's fastest-growing markets. India's pharma sector is growing at between 12 to 15 percent each year, compared to about three percent for Western countries.

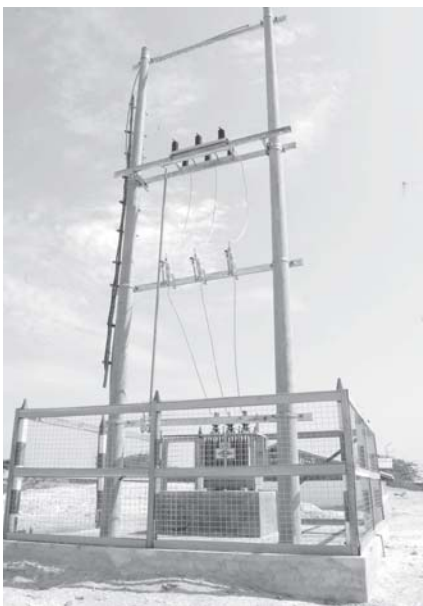

efforts of the Township Development Affairs Committee.

There were many tube-wells in Wundwin. Many lakes were dug with the collaborative efforts of Township Peace and Development Council and Township Development Affairs Committee. However, the water levels of the lakes and wells fell due to daily consumption and high temperature. With regard to the efforts for supply of potable water, Executive Engineer U Myo Min Thant of Township DAC conducted us around the water supply facilities.

In Sethmu Ward of Wundwin, we saw a 300 feet deep and 8-inch diameter tube-well.

"This tube-well was sunk recently. Before doing it, we conducted feasibility study for availability of potable water meeting set standard in all places of the town. We will sink five more tube-wells around this place," explained U Myo Min Thant.

We witnessed a transformer, 20,000-gallon radial collector well and water pumping station near the tube-well. Although the tube-well is located 1.5 miles from the hub of the town, it is a facility to supply the best quality water for the dwellers.

A water supply tank was built in Thein Hill, south of Wundwin. We had bird's eye view of the town from 80 feet high Thein Hill where the water supply tank, 30 feet long, 20 feet wide and six feet high, is located.

"The water tank can store 20,000 gallons of water. The water from the tube-well of Sethmu Ward will be pumped to the water tank on the hill. After that, the water tank will supply potable water to the whole town," explained U Myo Min Thant.

While in Wundwin, we saw laying of water pipelines for providing drinking water to the residents through the water taps. On completion of repairing

public water tanks and water pipelines, over 100,000 gallons of potable water can be supplied to the local people daily. That is why the residents of Wundwin will overcome the difficulty of water shortage soon.

Near Wundwin lies over 80 feet high Thein Hill as a natural gift. The hill can be used as a natural water supply base for the whole town. On completion of the project, all the local people will enjoy the fruits of water supply through the taps.

Wundwin is making greater efforts in implementing drinking water supply project. The local authorities and staff of Township DAC are exerting their utmost efforts to supply potable water to the residents.

Truck-bus collision kills 32 in China

BEIJING, 23 May—A head-on collision between a truck and bus in northeastern China killed 32 people and another 21 injured early on Sunday.

Canadian minister says to boost trade links with China

VANCOUVER, 23 May—Canada is confident of attracting Chinese investments as the two countries are strengthening their trade links, a Canadian minister said on Friday.

Stockwell Day, Canadian minister for the Asia-Pacific Gateway, has ended his eight-day trip to China and returned home. During his visit, he discussed trade links between the two countries with senior Chinese officials,

including the benefits of quickly passing Chinese products through Vancouver ports into North America's heartland and thus shop floors.

Canada has invested more than 2.3 billion Canadian dollars (2.16 billion US dollars) in the past two and a half years to increase the ports' efficiency and improve supporting infrastructure such as road and rail lines, he said.

The major challenge

of improving trade between the two countries was "just continuing to get the story out about what Canada has to offer," he added.

"It's something China is more and more aware of," Day said.

He pointed out that the countries represented in the Shanghai Expo were sending a message that they expected to attract Chinese investments by participating in the Expo.

Pasabana came to Nepal in 1998 to climb Mt Dhaulagiri when she was only 23 years old, but she could not make it due to heavy snowfall. However, brave and courageous Pasabana did not give up and came back to climb Mt. Qomolangma in 2001.

Pasabana, who is an engineer, wife and mother, is so keen on adventures that she is ready to give up her professional career in engineering and start new work such as conference on motivation, skill development and mountaineering.

Bangladesh plans to build third seaport

DHAKA, 23 May— The Bangladesh government has planned to build third seaport in the country to ease growing cargo-handling pressure and bolster its regional economic development activities, a senior official said on Sunday.

"The seaport has been planned to be constructed in southern Patuakhali District, some 204 km away of capital Dhaka, aiming to ease pressure on our main Chittagong seaport and hasten economic development in southern region of the country," the Shipping Ministry official told Xinhua on Sunday.

Requesting to be unnamed, he said, "Steps are underway to appoint consultants soon for carrying out a feasibility study for building the seaport."

Pilot of doomed Air India jet tries to take off again before crash

NEW DELHI, 23 May— The Serbian pilot of the doomed Air India jet which crashed on Saturday apparently tried to take off the plane again before the final crash, said analysts on Sunday.

The throttle of the plane has been found by search workers on the site of the crash in a gorge by the side of the runway of the Mangalore Airport. The throttle is on forward position, meaning the

pilot was accelerating the plane before the crash took place, said analysts.

A survivor of the crash told local media that the pilot tried to take off the plane again after touchdown.

One of the wheels of the plane did not touch down on the runway when the plane landed, which could have led the plane to get out of control, said civil aviation sources.—Xinhua

Nine killed in road accident in western India

NEW DELHI, 23 May— Nine people, including three children, were killed and eight injured when a truck overturned in Nandurbar District in the western Indian state of Maharashtra early Sunday, reported the Indo-Asian News Service.

Seventeen people were travelling in a truck that was going to Surat city in Gujarat from Sakri village to attend a wedding ceremony. The truck skidded off the road and the driver lost control, the report quoted police as saying. Police officers and villagers went to rescue the victims, most of whom were buried under sacks of onions loaded on the truck, according to the report.—Internet

Sherpa, who first scaled Everest in 1990 and has been dubbed the "super Sherpa" for the apparent ease with which he climbs the mountain, dedicated his latest expedition to the impact of climate change on the Himalayas.



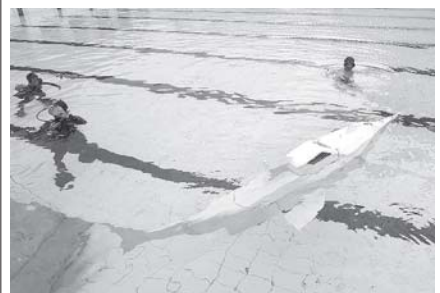

A 29-year-old pregnant woman, Xiu'er, was protected by a ring of sympathetic souls on the morning of 13 May as she gave birth on the sidewalk outside their apartment in Chongqing Municipality after an ambulance called by her husband, Tan Bing, 40, failed to arrive after two hours.

LONDON, 23 May—A team of pet detectives is looking for a missing cat — with the help of an Indian psychic. In a search akin to an Ace Ventura film, the four detectives are carrying out a three-day search in the hope they can find Oliver, a four-year-old tabby cat. Hendra virus years away: CSIRO

VICTORIA, 23 May—A horse put down on Queensland's Sunshine Coast became this week the 41st to contract the rare virus. Nine people who potentially came into contact with the horse are awaiting the results of blood tests which are expected to be negative. CSIRO's Australian Animal Health Laboratory at Geelong in Victoria has successfully tested a Hendra vaccine in ferrets as it prepares for trials in horses. Lab director Martyn Jeggo says the lab hopes to have proof of concept within one to two years but it will then be another four to five years before there's a marketable product.

Mexican girl died by accident in bed, prosecutors say

MEXICO CITY, 23 May—Paulette Gebara Farah, 4, was found under blankets on her bed more than a week after she was reported missing. That is where she died, officials say, in a finding that exonerates her parents. Reporting from Mexico City Paulette Gebara Farah, the 4-year-old girl whose disappearance and apparent asphyxiation death riveted Mexico this spring, died by accident in her bed, prosecutors said on Friday.

The finding exonerates the girl's parents. They have been at the centre of a media storm since Paulette, who suffered developmental dis-

abilities, was found dead in her bed on 31 March, more than a week after she was reported missing. Investigators said the body had gone undetected during the initial search for the girl.

Alberto Bazbaz, attorney general for the state of Mexico, said his investigation concluded that Paulette died during the night after she turned herself around in bed and ended up at the foot.

Eruption hits 10,000 day milestone

HAWAII, 23 May—The world's longest continuously erupting volcano, which has become a major attraction for scientists and tourists since it became active in 1983, has marked a milestone. It was 10,000 days ago that Kilauea volcano began erupting on Hawaii's Big Island.

The superintendent of Hawaii Volcanoes National Park, Cindy Orlando, calls it "a biological and geological wonder". The scientist-in-charge of the US Geological Survey's Hawaiian Volcano Observatory, Jim Kauahikaua, said it is one of the few eruptions that can be studied up close every day. The east rift zone vent began erupting on 3 January, 1983, and a summit vent has been erupting since 19 March, 2008.—Internet

Alaska State Troopers say Krystal Brink was playing outside on Friday with other children and wandered into a dog yard when she was attacked by one of the dogs — even though the owner had the team tied up. The girl and her family were visiting from Kasigluk.—Internet

Two arrested with marijuana plants in car

VACAVILLE, 23 May—Two men were arrested by Vacaville, Calif, police who discovered more than 200 marijuana plants inside their car, authorities say. Police arrested Jaime Cebula, 34, of Fairfield, and Matthew Metzger, 27, of Vacaville.

At about 11:45 pm on Thursday police stopped the two men in a black Honda Accord in the area of Ambassador Place and Rio Grande Drive. After smelling a

strong odor of marijuana and searching the vehicle, they found 225 marijuana plants and a plastic bag with psilocybin mushrooms, the Vacaville Reporter said.

After detectives obtained a search warrant for a nearby residence, they said they found 100 immature marijuana plants, 10 mature plants and 1.5 pounds of processed marijuana along with a loaded shotgun and packaging material.

Two held as bomb factory raided in Ireland

DUBLIN, 23 May — A suspected dissident republican bomb-making factory has been raided by police in Ireland and two men have been arrested.

Among the items discovered in the swoop in Dundalk, County Louth, were two large modified gas cylinders fixed onto a trailer. Police believe they could have thwarted an imminent attack in Northern Ireland. The suspects, one aged in his 30s and the other in his 50s,

were taken to Drogheda Garda station for questioning.

Irish national broadcaster RTE said the two six-foot cylinders found in a trailer had their tops cut off for use either as improvised mortars to launch an attack at Northern Irish police or other targets or to make a large bomb.

Northern Irish police have increased their street presence due to increased paramilitary attacks.

They are also getting

assistance from police in the Republic of Ireland, where the militants have many of their bases and criminal activities which provide their funding.

Haiti officials warn heavy rains could hit capital

PORT-AU-PRINCE, 23 May—Haitian officials are warning that a heavy rains could trigger floods and landslides in the quake-addled country.

Disaster prevention officials issued an "orange" alert for Friday and five following days based on a weather system now forming near Cuba.

The alert is their second-highest warning. At-risk areas include Port-au-Prince, Jacmel, Leogane and others ravaged by the 12 Jan earthquake that displaced an estimated 1.5 million people.

No evacuation plans exist for the hundreds of thousands still living in makeshift camps prone to floods, torrents of mud and potential spread of disease.

Authorities say residents should avoid flooded rivers and be prepared to move if necessary.—Internet

Kenya researchers root for consumption of indigenous vegetables

NAIROBI, 23 May—Kenyans are fast adopting Western lifestyles and in essence replacing their eating habits with Western foods. In Nairobi for instance, the number of fast foods restaurants is ever on the rise. And as people return to their homes, they quickly prepare meals that are easy to cook hence doing away with the traditional foods like cassava, sweet potatoes and traditional

vegetables.

In recent years, Kenyans have seen an increase in diet-related ailments such as heart disease, diabetes, cancer and anemia.

It is in this regard that the United Nations declared the year, 2010 as the International Year of Biodiversity to celebrate diversity of plants and animals.

Consequently, Kenyan researchers are rooting

for horticultural biodiversity such as African Indigenous Vegetables (AIVs) that used to form an integral part of Kenyan diets should be part of this celebration.

However, with the introduction of exotic temperate crops like cabbage, indigenous greens lost popularity in Kenya and were regarded as 'weeds' and 'poor man's food'.—Xinhua

EU Naval exchanges fire with Somali pirates

NAIROBI, 23 May—Somali pirates fired on an EU naval force warship, prompting the French vessel to return fire outside Somali capital, Mogadishu's harbour on Thursday, the EU anti-piracy mission announced on Friday. Naval force spokesman John Harbour said the assault against the FS Nivose immediately stopped and none of the two merchant vessels, which she were tasked to escort, were hit.

Harbour said the EU Naval Force warship FS Nivose were approaching Mogadishu, to start an escort of MS Alpha Kirawira and Petra 1, that just unloaded supply for the African Union forces in Somalia (AMISOM). "Since gunfire was heard from the town, the commanding officer (CO) and the crew on Nivose was extra cautious this morning on Friday," Harbour said.—Xinhua

Turkmenistan snubs Russia in gas pipeline project

ASHGABAT, 23 May—Turkmenistan said on Saturday it would go it alone with plans to connect its lucrative gas fields via a 1.5 billion-dollar pipeline in a project where Russia had eyed a major role.

"We will shortly start the construction of a new, East-West gas trunk pipeline relying on our own resources," President Gurbanguly Berdimukhamedov was quoted as saying by government newspaper *Neutral Turkmenistan*.

"The new gas pipeline will connect the country's eastern region, where the largest gas reserves are concentrated, with Turkmenistan's developing central and Caspian regions."

Berdimukhamedov has signed a decree ordering state energy firm Turkmengaz to carry out

the design and construction of the pipeline with a gas supply capacity of 30 billion cubic metres a year, the newspaper said.

The construction is to start this June and the pipeline is to come on line in June 2015. The announcement appears to be a snub to a host of countries but Russia in particular, which had long hoped to participate in the project. Turkmenistan sits atop the world's fourth-largest natural gas reserves and Russia, China and the West are vying to expand their presence in the resource-rich but isolated Central Asian nation.

In March 2009, Turkmenistan announced an international tender for the design and construction of the domestic pipeline and Turkmengaz has said that around 70 companies

from Russia, China and Europe expressed interest.

However, the tender's results were never publicly announced.

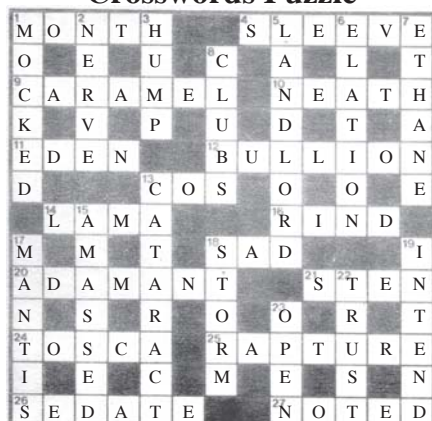

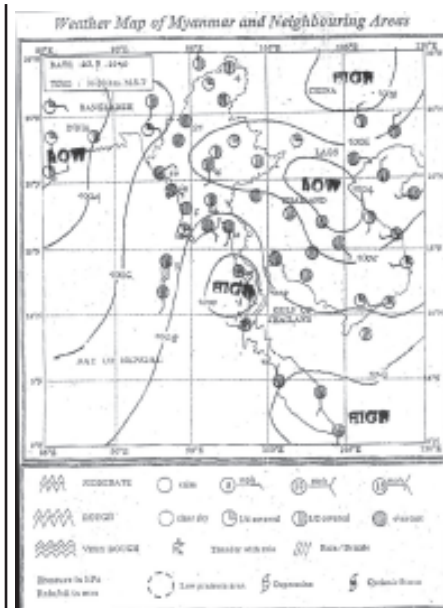
