Staff members and the Guard of Honour took position at designated places. Next, the Prime Minister arrived at the venue and took position at the designated place.

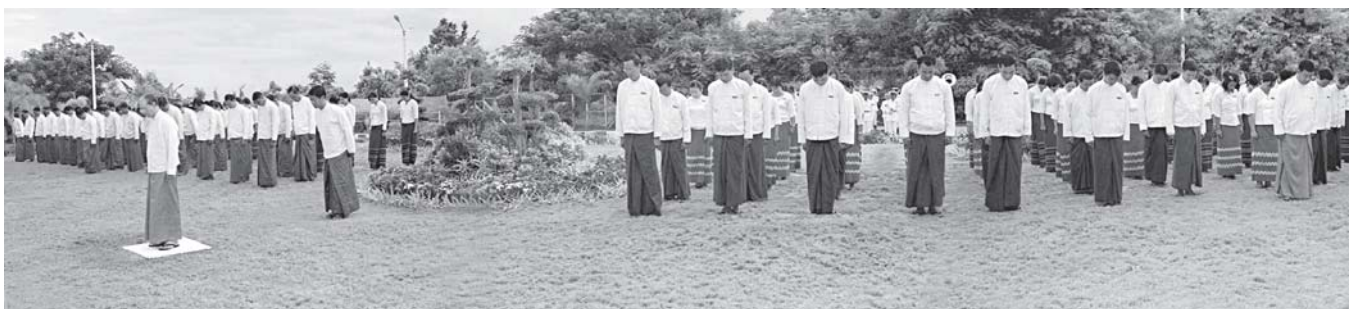
State Flag was hoisted atop the mast according to the schedules.

Upgrade roads through Yoma mountain ranges

Smooth transport is a determining factor in the drive for national development as well as improvement of an infrastructure. Only with secure and smooth transport, will the socio-economic status of the people get high. The government has been implementing new roads and railroads to form transport networks across the nation with this objective in view.

As a result, people can travel between Putao in the northern part and Kawthoung in the southern part of Myanmar. And Muse, Lashio and Kengtung in the eastern part are accessible by car from Sittway in the western part of the nation at any time.

US soldier charged with killing troops in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 21 Oct—An American soldier was charged Wednesday with killing two fellow US troops and wounding a third after an argument last month in a former Iraqi militant stronghold turned deadly. Army Spc Neftaly Platero was charged with two counts of murder and one count of attempted murder in a 23 Sept shooting in Fallujah, about 40 miles (65 kilometres) west of Baghdad.

A statement issued late Wednesday by the US military in Baghdad described the killings as premeditated but offered no other details.

Earlier, a US military spokesman said Platero was accused of shooting the three soldiers after a verbal altercation. The spokesman, Col Barry Johnson, did not know what the argument was about. Pfc Gebray Noonan, 26, of Watertown, Connecticut, and Spc John Carrillo Jr, 20, of Stockton, California, died the day after the shooting. The name of the wounded soldier has not been released, and the statement Wednesday said the criminal investigation of the incident is ongoing.

Platero, 32, from Houston, Texas, is being held in pretrial confinement in Kuwait. He will be tried by a military court.—*Internet*

Iraqi border guard and family members shot dead

MOSUL, 21 Oct—An Iraqi border guard and four members of his family were killed at their house in the restive northern city of Mosul on Sunday evening, police said.

“Two brothers, including a border guard, their wives and a sister-in-law were shot dead at their home in the city’s Al-Wahda quarter by unknown gunmen who managed to escape,” said a police official.

Separately, a Kurdish “mukhtar,” or notary, Ahmed Farej Samed was killed in the street in the ethnically divided city of Kirkuk, also north of the capital.

On Tuesday morning, a huge bomb tore through the home of an Iraqi police officer in the northern city of

Tikrit, killing eight members of his family as they slept.

The blast destroyed the house of lieutenant colonel Qais Rashid, killing his father, brother, brother-in-law and sister-in-law and three other women, as well as a two-year-old girl.

Roadside bomb blast kills 10 Afghan civilians, injures four

ZARANJ, 21 Oct—At least 10 Afghan civilians were killed and four others injured as a roadside bomb struck a minibus in Afghanistan’s western Nimroz Province on Wednesday, provincial police chief said.

“The gruesome incident occurred on the main road from provincial capital Zaranj to Dil Aram District around 2 pm local time as a result 10 civilians including women and children were killed and four others injured,” Abdul Jabar Purduli told *Xinhua*.

No groups or individuals have yet to claim responsibility for the attacks while Taleban militants have often in the past been blamed for planting mine on roads to target security forces.

Earlier in the day, a similar incident left three civilians including a woman dead in the country’s southern Ghazni Province.—*Xinhua*

China urges US commission to stop interfering in internal affairs

BEIJING, 21 Oct— China on Thursday urged the US Congressional-Executive Commission on China (CECC) to stop interfering in China’s internal affairs.

Asked to comment on the commission’s 2010 annual report on China, Foreign Ministry spokesman Ma Zhaoxu said the commission repeatedly distorted facts and gratuitously criticised China’s social systems and policies.

Describing the report as “ignorant and biased,” Ma said, “China urges the commission to correct its behavior, stop issuing such reports and interfering in China’s internal affairs.” —*Xinhua*

Four militants killed in landmine blast in Pakistan tribal area

ISLAMABAD, 21 Oct— At least four militants were killed and several others injured when they ran into a landmine in Kurram tribal area in northwest Pakistan, local sources said.

The vehicle they were riding was damaged in the blast, they said.

On Wednesday, another landmine explosion injured at least six troops and destroyed an army vehicle in the nearby Mohmand tribal region.

Earlier on 7 Oct, two patrolling troops were also killed in a landmine blast in the tribal belt.

The troubled Kurram tribal agency is bordering Afghanistan and is a frequent target of insurgent militants. Government officials, property and schools are frequent targets of militants. Orthodox militants have also destroyed many schools in the region so far.

Comet Hartley 2 makes closest pass by Earth in 24 years

PASADENA, 21 Oct—A comet passed silently by Earth coming closer to our planet than it has since 1986, when astronomers first discovered the icy wanderer.

Comet Hartley 2 passed within 11 million miles (17.7 million km) of Earth at about 3 pm EDT (1900 GMT) today much closer than the Earth is to the sun (about 93 million miles, or 150 million km).

The close Earth pass comes just two weeks ahead of another flyby for the comet. NASA's Deep Impact spacecraft is chasing Hartley 2, gearing up for a Nov. 4 comet flyby, during which the probe will come within 435 miles (700 km) of the cosmic ball ice and rock.

"It's unusual for a comet to approach this close," said Don Yeomans, head of

NASA's Near-Earth Object Office at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., and a member of Deep Impact's mission science team, in a statement.

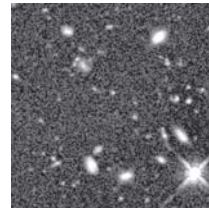
"It is nice of Mother Nature to give us a preview before we see Hartley 2 in all its cometary glory with some great close-up images less than two weeks later."

Astronomers say they've found oldest galaxy so far

WASHINGTON, 21 Oct—Astronomers believe they've found the oldest thing they've ever seen in the universe: It's a galaxy far, far away from a time long, long ago.

Hidden in a Hubble Space Telescope photo released earlier this year is a small smudge of light that European astronomers now calculate is a galaxy from 13.1 billion years ago. That's a time when the universe

was very young, just shy of 600 million years old. That would make it the earliest and most distant galaxy seen so far.

By now the galaxy is so ancient it probably doesn't exist in its earlier form and has already merged into bigger neighbors, said Matthew Lehnert of the Paris Observatory, lead author of the study published online Wednesday in the journal *Nature*.

"We're looking at the universe when it was a 20th of its current age," said California Institute of Technology astronomy professor Richard Ellis, who wasn't part of the discovery team. "In human terms, we're looking at a 4-year-old boy in the life span of an adult."

NASA fixing fuel leak on space shuttle Discovery

NEW YORK, 21 Oct—NASA engineers are replacing fuel line seals on the space shuttle Discovery to staunch a small leak in time for the spacecraft's final blastoff on 1 Nov.

Shuttle technicians are replacing two suspect seals in a fuel line for the twin orbital maneuvering system engines near Discovery's tail. The repairs should be complete by Monday (25 Oct), just one week before Discovery is due to launch on its last spaceflight from a seaside pad at NASA's Kennedy Space Centre in Cape Canaveral, Fla. The minor shuttle fuel leak was found in a rear compartment on the shuttle where two propellant lines converge to feed the vehicle's aft-mounted engines.—Internet

Apple Freshens and Lightens MacBook Air

CALIFORNIA, 21 Oct—"Insisting it hasn't turned its back on its signature Macintosh line of computers and notebooks, Apple on Wednesday unveiled the next version of its operating system, new programs, and two new MacBook Air laptops. "We love the Mac, we're investing heavily in it," Apple CEO Steve Jobs said at the Back To The Mac event, which was carried live via the company's online Events forum from its headquarters in Cupertino, Calif. "It's about one-third of our business."

The latest version of the Mac operating system will be called Lion, in keeping with its long line of cat-themed names, including Jaguar, Panther, Tiger, Leopard and, most recently, Snow Leopard.

Australia warns of iPhone security risk

SYDNEY, 21 Oct—A senior Australian crime official has raised serious security concerns over popular smartphones such as Apple's iPhone, which he warned was particularly vulnerable to hacking and information theft.

John Lawler, head of the Australian Crime Commission, said the virtual world had brought "boundless opportunities" for crime gangs and mobile technologies were giving criminals "previously unimaginable" reach.

He singled out the iPhone as especially at-risk, explaining that it was the "third most used system in the world" for businesses and "deployed or piloted by more than 70 percent of Fortune 100 companies".

"Yet IT managers are swimming against the phone's tide of popularity because they can't centralise installation and security updates as with other software," Lawler told a criminology conference on Tuesday.

"This overwhelming desire for instant services (comes) at the expense of security safeguards."

Lawler said organised criminals could breach unprotected devices or fool users into giving access to malicious programs which planted viruses or could harvest lucrative information for fraud.—Internet

Windows Phone 7 a new start for Microsoft

SAN FRANCISCO, 21 Oct—When it comes to smart phones, Microsoft is itching to get back in the game.

Microsoft was sick of watching consumers flock to Apple's iPhone and smart phones running Google's Android software as its own Windows Mobile software floundered. So the world's largest software maker started from scratch with its new phone operating system, Windows Phone 7, which wireless carriers are rolling out on smart phones starting next month.

I tested three of them to get a feel for Microsoft Corp.'s latest work. The Samsung Focus and the HTC HD7 will be

available 8 Nov from AT&T and T-Mobile, respectively, while the HTC Surround is coming to AT&T by late November.

On its face, Windows Phone 7 is unabashedly consumer focused and pleasantly easy to use.

The phone's main screen features a wall of bright tiles that you tap to open applications. You can make tiles for everything from websites to Facebook friends. There are plenty of fun features, such as the ability to connect to the company's online game service, Xbox Live, and to download music, apps and games through Microsoft's Windows Phone Marketplace. If you pay \$15 per month for a Zune Pass, you can listen to as much music as you want right on the phone.

The operating software should also appeal to business users, as it integrates with e-mail and calendars from corporate Exchange servers and allows you to set up several different Exchange accounts. If you want to do work on the go, it includes mobile versions of Microsoft Office applications such as Word, Excel and PowerPoint.

There's no doubt that breast-feeding benefits baby in ways that bottled formula can't, the American Academy of Pediatrics says. Breast milk is unrivaled in nutritional benefit and in its ability to help prevent infection.

The academy offers these suggestions to women who are about to begin breast-feeding:

- * Try to breast-feed as quickly as you can after the baby is born, as long as mom and baby are healthy and ready.
- * Seek the advice and help of hospital staff, and consult online and community resources when you get home.
- * First, concentrate on getting your baby to "latch" to your breast correctly.
- * Improper latching is unacceptable, as it can frustrate baby and become painful for mom.

New tumour marker may improve cancer detection

NEW YORK, 21 Oct—A hormone receptor normally confined to the reproductive organs has been detected in malignant tumors in many parts of the body, researchers report.

Researchers from the Mt. Sinai School of Medicine in New York City, working with French government scientists, say this common link may offer a new target for the early diagnosis and treatment of cancer.

They evaluated tumour tissue samples

from 1,336 men and women with 11 common cancers, including prostate, breast, colon, pancreatic, lung, liver and ovarian. The analyses revealed the presence of the follicle-stimulating hormone (FSH) receptor in the blood vessel cells of the tumors.

This receptor is not found on blood vessels in normal tissue, with the exception of the reproductive organs, where it is present in much lower concentrations than in tumors, said the American and French researchers. (In

women, FSH, which interacts with the FSH-receptor, normally helps control the menstrual cycle and egg production; in men, FSH normally helps control the production of sperm.)

Activating the FSH receptor contributes to the signaling of a protein (VEGF) that stimulates the growth of blood vessels, including those in tumors. Blocking the action of the FSH receptor may also block the signaling of VEGF.

Some with once-deadly leukemia can take a break from Gleevec

NEW YORK, 21 Oct—A small group of people with chronic myeloid leukemia (CML) who decided to stop taking the cancer drug Gleevec (imatinib) have remained cancer-free two years later, French researchers report.

The study, published online 19 Oct. in *The Lancet Oncology*, is the first to raise the possibility that the drug might go beyond long-term cancer control and offer some patients a possible cure. "We've never really told patients that we have a therapy that can provide a cure for this disease," said one expert, Dr John Cole, chairman of the department of hematology/oncology at the Ochsner Clinic Foundation in New Orleans. "We've simply never used the 'cure' word." Gleevec a highly targeted member of a class of drugs called protein-tyrosine kinase inhibitors was first approved by the US Food and Drug Administration for use against CML in 2001.—Internet

Toyota to fix 1.53 million Avalon, other cars worldwide

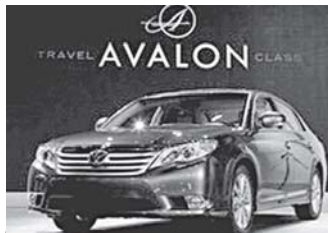
TOKYO, 21 Oct—Toyota Motor Corp (7203.T) will repair about 1.53 million Avalon and other vehicles globally for problems with the brake master cylinder seal and fuel pump wiring, with most of those to be recalled in the United States and Japan.

The announcement comes less than two months after a recall of 1.3 million Corolla and Matrix cars in the United States and Canada carrying defective engine control modules that could cause the vehicles to stall.

Toyota, the world's biggest automaker, has already recalled more than 10 million vehicles in the past year, mostly for unintended acceleration, denting its reputation for quality and attracting intense scrutiny from US safety regulators.

Toyota said in a filing with Japan's transport ministry on Thursday that about 600,000 vehicles spanning 11 models including the high-end Crown sedan and Lexus IS and GS models were subject to the recalls, either for the faulty cylinder seal, the fuel pump wiring or both.

Toyota's US sales unit said separately it would recall 740,000

Fed survey points to uneven growth across US

WASHINGTON, 21 Oct—The US economy grew unevenly in early fall, with more than half the regions of the country expanding modestly while others struggled to grow.

A survey by the Federal Reserve released Wednesday found that seven of the Fed's 12 regions reported moderate improvements in business activity. Three regions Philadelphia, Richmond and Cleveland described economic activity as mixed or steady. Only two regions Atlanta and Dallas suggested economic growth was slow.

The survey indicated that the economy isn't weakening but is growing too sluggishly to drive down high unemployment, now at 9.6 percent. The jobless rate has been at or above 9.5 percent for more than a

year.

"Hiring remains limited, with many firms reluctant to add to permanent payrolls given economic softness," the Fed survey concluded.

High unemployment is one of the Fed's biggest concerns. That's why Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke and his colleagues are widely expected to launch a new programme at their Nov. 2-3 meeting to bolster the economy. The Fed is expected to buy Treasury bonds in a bid to drive down interest rates on mortgages, corporate loans and other debt.—Internet

Novartis says Q3 profit up 17 percent to \$3.15 bln

GENEVA, 21 Oct—Swiss pharmaceutical company Novartis AG posted a 17 percent rise in third-quarter net profit Thursday thanks to strong sales of new products and the acquisition of eye care company Alcon.

The maker of hypertension drug Diovan and anticancer treatment Glivec known as Gleevec in the United States said net profits reached \$3.15 billion compared with \$2.68 billion in the same period of 2009.

HK upgrades warning level as Typhoon Megi approaches

HONG KONG, 21 Oct—Hong Kong Observatory upgraded its warning signal to No 3 Strong Wind Signal on Thursday morning, as severe typhoon Megi approached the city.

The No 3 signal, raised from No1 Standby Signal issued Wednesday evening, means that winds with mean speeds of 41 to 62 kilometers per hour are expected.

Hong Kong Observatory estimated that severe typhoon

Megi would be about 470 kilometers southeast of Hong Kong at 9 am, and would move north at about 8 kilometers per hour across the northern part of the South China Sea and gradually edge closer to the south China coast.

The No 3 signal would remain effective for some time before the possible issuing of more serious warning signal, said the Hong Kong Observatory.

India to construct observatory to study particles

NEW DELHI, 21 Oct—In what is said to be one of its biggest scientific projects, India is to build a multi-million dollar underground facility to study particles called neutrinos, according to local media reports Thursday.

A clearance has been given to the Department of Atomic Energy by the Ministry of Environment and Forests to build the observatory in the Bodi West hills in the southern Indian state of Tamil Nadu, said the reports.

The facility costing 270 million U.S. dollars will be only the fifth of its kind in the world. Some 90 scientists from 26 organizations will be involved in the Indian Neutrino Observatory, said the reports.

Honduran police foil massive prison break

TEGUCIGALPA, 21 Oct—Honduran police on Wednesday thwarted a massive attempt to escape from the National Prison, the country's biggest jail, the Security Ministry said on Wednesday.

About 200 policemen, special agents and police dogs participated in the operation, during which four cluster grenades, two guns, 20 explosive tubes, 24 detonators for explosives, a charger with four dynamite charges and many bullets were seized, said Leonel Saucedo, spokesman of the Security Ministry.

The prison break attempt was organized by the notorious Mara-18 gang, and was carried out after many weeks of intelligence work, said Saucedo.

The Mara-18 was created in 1960 in Los Angeles, the United States and is considered the most aggressive street gang. The group mainly operates in Central America, southern Mexico and the United States.

Honduran prisons face an overcrowding problem, with a total population of 12,128, far exceeding their designed capacity of 8,230.

Netflix customer growth eclipses 3Q earnings miss

SAN FRANCISCO, 21 Oct—Netflix Inc's video subscription service won another horde of new fans in the third quarter, overshadowing a rare earnings shortfall.

The addition of 1.9 million subscribers seemed to matter far more to investors than an earnings figure that was a penny below analyst estimates. Netflix shares surged by more than 9 percent after the numbers came out.

Netflix earned \$38 million, or 70 cents per share. That's up 26 percent from \$30.1 million, or 52 cents per share, at the same time last year.

Analysts, on average, had projected third-quarter earnings of 70 cents per share, based on a Thomson Reuters

Alarms over radiation from thyroid cancer patients

WASHINGTON, 21 Oct—Reports of thyroid cancer patients setting off radiation alarms and contaminating hotel rooms are prompting the agency in charge of nuclear safety to consider tighter rules.

A congressional investigation made public Wednesday found that patients sent home after treatment with radioactive iodine have contaminated unsuspecting hotel guests and set off alarms on public transportation.

They've come into close contact with vulnerable people, including pregnant women and children, and trash from their homes has triggered radiation detectors at landfills.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission is considering new rules to address the problem, in particular curbs on sending patients to hotels after treatment, a spokesman said

Wednesday.

"The assumption was that patients would be going home," said David McIntyre. "Now that we see there are some who are not, we are developing new guidance." It's unclear whether the radiation exposure occurs at levels high enough to cause harm.

The agency is also looking to make sure that risks of exposing pregnant women and children are more clearly communicated to patients, McIntyre said, after a commission meeting on the issue.

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., says the problem stems from a decision years ago by the NRC to ease requirements that thyroid cancer patients remain in the hospital a few days after swallowing doses of radioactive iodine to shrink their tumors.

Chinese scientist re-examines source of Indus River

BEIJING, 21 Oct—More than 100 years after Swedish explorer Sven Hedin announced the discovery of the origin of the Indus river, a Chinese scientist has challenged the claim with the help of high-resolution, remote-sensing satellite images and a field investigation to come up with a new finding.

The new point of origin is said to be located in a valley, northeast of Kailash, the highest peak of the Gangdise Mountain, in the west region of Tibet, southwest of China, according to Liu

Shaochuang, a researcher with the Institute of Remote Sensing Applications under the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

"The headstream, called Banggokong by local Tibetans, is about 30 kilometers away from the place that Sven Hedin believed was the source of the river," said Liu.

Liu used remote-sensing images, with a resolution of up to 2.5 meters, provided by the French SPOT satellite system, to find the longest headstream of the Indus River.

Top Mexican university to host Int'l chemistry championship

MEXICO CITY, 21 Oct—The state-run National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM), the largest of its kind in Latin America, has won the right to host a chemistry championship, the Mexican Academy of Sciences (AMS) said in a statement Wednesday.

The competition, called the Ibero-American Chemistry Olympiad, attracts students from all over Latin America, Spain and Portugal. Each nation holds a national contest to prepare for the Olympiad. Winners of the Olympiad often become leading researchers.

The privately-funded AMS is working with UNAM and the National Council for Science and Technology (Conacyt) to run the event. It is the third time a Mexican university is hosting a competition of this kind.

OECD commends US efforts to fight transnational bribery

WASHINGTON, 21 Oct—The US efforts to fight transnational bribery were commended by the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), a joint statement by the Departments of Justice, Commerce and State, and the Securities and Exchange Commission said on Wednesday.

The statement said the OECD, in an official review, applauded US enforcement efforts and high-level support for the fight against the bribery of foreign officials.

The statement said OECD highlighted a number of best practices developed by the United States in its efforts to combat foreign bribery, while also noting areas for potential enhancement.

Since 2002, 71 individuals and 88 enterprises have been held accountable in the United States for transnational bribery and related offenses, according to the statement.—Xinhua

Prince Harry at centre of British TV kidnap drama

LONDON, 21 Oct—The head of Britain's armed forces has written to Channel 4 pleading with the broadcaster not to air a drama fictionalizing the capture of Prince Harry in Afghanistan.

In "The Taking of Prince Harry," due to air 21 October, the third-in-line to the throne is seen being held captive at gunpoint and forced to take part in Taliban propaganda.

Air Chief Marshal Sir Jock Stirrup has written to Channel 4 chairman Sir Terry Burns warning that the broadcast would be distressing for the families of armed personnel serving in the region and could potentially impact morale.

Prince Harry served in Afghanistan for 10 weeks in 2008 under a media blackout that was subsequently broken, provoking a debate about whether his presence put

soldiers serving alongside him in the field under greater threat.

Channel 4 said it replied to Stirrup's letter, and insisted that it was a legitimate subject to explore.

"The film is rooted in expert testimony and is a serious journalistic examination of a current issue. It treats the subject matter sensitively," the broadcaster said.

Bomb hits Afghan school bus, kills at least nine

HERAT, 21 Oct—At least nine people, including eight children, were killed when a school bus carrying female students was hit by a roadside bomb in southwestern Afghanistan on Wednesday, police and military officials said.

The NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) gave this death toll after Abdul Jabar Purdeli, police chief of southwestern Nimroz Province, had earlier said 13 people had been killed, including five women, and at least 10 wounded. ISAF said the bus had been hit by a roadside bomb planted by militants in Nimroz's Khash Rod District.

Four infant deaths prompt recall of strollers in US

LOS ANGELES, 21 Oct—The US Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) announced on Wednesday that about two million strollers are being recalled across the country due to entrapment and strangulation hazards.

The agency said it has received four reports of stroller-related infant deaths between 2003 and 2005, along with five reports of entrapment in the strollers, resulting in cuts and bruises. "Entrapment and strangulation can occur, especially to infants younger than 12 months of age, when a child is not

harnessed," the agency said in a statement.

"An infant can pass through the opening between the stroller tray and seat bottom, but his/her head and neck can become entrapped by the tray. Infants who become entrapped at the neck are at risk of strangulation."

The recall includes Quattro Tour strollers and travel systems made before November 2006 and MetroLite stroller and travel systems made before July 2007.

The strollers were made by Graco Children's Products Inc, of Atlanta, Georgia.

Four soldiers hurt in Ohio parachuting accident

COLUMBUS, 21 Oct—Four soldiers parachuting from a plane during an airborne training operation were injured Wednesday when they caught a wind gust and hit the ground hard, officials said.

Three of the soldiers suffered possible mild concussions, while the fourth complained of a strained neck muscle after landing at Rickenbacker International Airport, said David Johnson, a spokesman for the Army Reserve 412th Civil Affairs Battalion in Columbus. The injured soldiers were taken to local hospitals.

The three Army Reserve paratroopers and one Ohio National Guard special forces paratrooper were taking part in a routine monthly jump that had 56 soldiers parachuting 1,250 feet from a C-130 military cargo plane, Johnson said.

The Ohio National Guard said the men jumped at about 1 pm from a plane that had flown from Pittsburgh.

The injured men "caught some extra wind and landed hard," Johnson said. "The wind will catch it and the parachute won't deflate, and the paratrooper keeps going," getting dragged.

Bomb explodes inside passenger bus in S Philippines, kills eight people

COTABATO CITY, 21 Oct — A bomb exploded inside a passenger bus Thursday in the southern Philippines killing eight people, a military official said.

Colombia foils FARC car bomb plot

BOGOTA, 21 Oct— Colombian authorities have foiled a car bomb plot by the rebel group Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC) here, officials from the Ministry of Defence said Wednesday.

The act was reportedly plotted in revenge of the death of FARC's military chief Jorge Briceño Suarez, known as "Mono Jojoy," who was killed in the rebel stronghold La Macarena in central Colombia during a raid by the Colombian military last month.

BOGOTA, 21 Oct— Five people died in a small plane crash Wednesday, transportation authorities said.

The Special Administrative Unit of Civil Aeronautics (Aerocivil) said the *Cessna 206* plane of the Nautica de Oriente Company crashed on a hill in the northwestern city of San Antonio de Prado.

The plane took off from Olaya Herrera's airport in the northwestern province of Antioquia and headed for the town of Vigia del Fuerte. It crashed four minutes after it was reported missing at 09:40 am local time (1440 GMT).

All the five people on board the plane, including the pilot and four passengers, were all killed, the Aerocivil said. The cause of the accident is still under investigation.

'Spider Dan' faces trial for Climbing San Francisco Skyscraper

Penalties for misdemeanor offenses range from probation to a year in county jail and a \$1,000 fine.

Fiat makes Q3 profit of \$267M, raises outlook

MILAN, 21 Oct— The Italian automaker Fiat Group SpA says net profits rose to euro190 million (\$267 million) from euro25 million a year earlier due to higher sales of trucks and tractors.

As a result of the strong results, Fiat raised its 2010 targets, saying revenues would top euro55 billion—euro5 billion more than previously stated. It also said trading profit would be at least euro2 billion, nearly double previous guidance.

Fiat shares rose 3.1 percent to euro12.08 in Milan trading.

Panama destroys 9.5 tons of drugs

PANAMA CITY, 21 Oct— Panamanian authorities Wednesday destroyed over 9.56 tons of drugs, most of them cocaine, which were seized last month.

The drugs were burnt at a waste dump of Patacon Hill, on the outskirts of Panama City, during the third

drug destruction effort within two months.

Among the destroyed drugs were 9.471 tons of cocaine, 78.65 kg of marihuana and 7.69 kg of heroine. The seized drugs were incinerated in the presence of witnesses from the Drug Prosecutor's Office, the National Police, as

well as observers from the National Assembly of Deputies, and the Lab of the Judicial Investigation Direction. In 2009, Panama confiscated more than 54 tons of drugs, and it has already seized more than 80 tons of drugs so far this year.

Two inmates shot as some 120 brawl at Calif prison

CALIPATRIA, 21 Oct—Two inmates were shot and a dozen others injured as guards used pepper spray and gunfire Tuesday to break up a brawl among about 120 inmates at a Southern California prison, authorities said.

Calipatria State Prison remained on lockdown some six hours after the violence broke out among the general prison population, spokesman Lt Jorge Santana said.

Ten inmates were taken to outside hospitals with injuries ranging from moderate to serious,

Santana said. He said all the inmates were expected to survive, but one of the gunshot victims had to be airlifted to a hospital.

Guards used pepper spray on prisoners, then fired four rounds from a Ruger Mini-14 shotgun. Two of the rounds hit prisoners, Santana said.

No staff members were hurt.

Prison officials said the facility with about 4,000 men some 120 miles northeast of San Diego near the Salton Sea has not seen a significant disturbance for some time.—*Internet*

A *Xinhua* reporter at the scene said strong black smokes could be seen and an explosion was heard.

The fire broke out at about 7:40 am and is yet to be put out, witnesses said.

Israel lays foundations for world's largest underground hospital

JERUSALEM, 21 Oct—Israel's Rambam medical center in Haifa is digging in as part of a massive project to fortify the centre against what officials hope the emergency facility will never have to endure, a direct conventional, chemical, or biological attack.

The 1,000-bed hospital came under several Katyusha rocket attacks by Hezbollah in Lebanon during Israel's month-long war against the organization in the summer of 2006, and the hospital management admit that they weren't prepared.

"This is not something we took into account. In fact, the hospital itself could be vulnerable... that we were saving lives on the one hand, but at the same time, were vulnerable to loss of life because of deadly missile attacks," said Professor Karl Skorecki, who directs medical and research development at the centre, according to a statement sent to *Xinhua*. Rambam is the country's largest and most comprehensive center of its kind in the north, and serves some 75,000 people annually, and a half a million more as outpatients, including trauma treatment, oncology, and neurosurgery. The centre, which boasts 45 medical units, nine institutes, six laboratories and 30 administrative and maintenance departments, is also Israeli Army's principal medical facility for the Northern Command.—*Xinhua*

Two rail cars overturn in Saudi, killing five Asian workers

RIYADH, 21 Oct—Five Asian railway workers were killed in Saudi Arabia early Monday when two rail cars of a passenger train flipped over and crushed them, a statement by the kingdom's state railway company said.

The incident occurred at 4:30 am local time (0130 GMT) on the line connecting the capital Riyadh to Hofuf in the Eastern Province, the company said. "The incident took place when the train driver tried to shunt the train, causing the flip-over of two rail cars which ploughed into a number of workers conducting maintenance works at the site," the company said in a statement carried by *SPA* news agency.

170 kids evacuated from school fire in Australia

CANBERRA, 21 Oct—Four teens and three teachers on Tuesday have been taken to hospital, after a fire broke out at a school in Melbourne's east of Australia. Three fire crews were called to Nunawading Christian College's secondary campus, about 9.50 am after a fire broke out in one of the school's art rooms.

And 170 students

were evacuated from school, while fire crews have contained the fire to the small room. Three teachers and four students, aged between 15 and 17, were taken to hospital to be treated for smoke inhalation. Paramedics treated 13 people, including three teachers and 10 students, for smoke inhalation. Metropolitan Fire Brigade

Commander Rob Dean said the fire was caused after paint vapours were ignited by sparks from a metal grinder.

"There was a mini flashover," Commander Dean told the *Australia Associated Press* on Tuesday. "It was quite frightening, a very confined space."

The room was extensively damaged by the blaze.

Japan to add 6 units to submarine fleet

TOKYO, 21 Oct—The Japanese Defence Ministry has decided to expand the Maritime Self-Defence Force's (MSDF) submarines from the current 16 units to 22, *Kyodo* News reported Thursday, citing defence ministry and MSDF officials.

The plan, scheduled to be compiled in December, is part of Japan's basic defence programme for fiscal 2011 to 2015 and aims to reinforce its vigilance capacity in nearby waters, said the report.

Once implemented, it will enable Japan to possess more than 20 submarines for the first time since the government adopted its first defence programme in 1976.

Strong winds lead to power cuts in Moscow

Moscow, 21 Oct—Massive blackouts occurred due to strong winds in the Moscow region on Wednesday evening and the city's power network company gave no more information about which towns were affected.

The northern part of the region was the worst-hit, with over 200 transformer stations switched off, according to the Moscow Regional Electricity Network Company (MOESK).

About 70 substations were cut off in the west of the region, while the total number of affected substations exceeded 300. "Unfortunately, the forecast for a storm in the Moscow region issued by weather officials proved right. Power cuts are occurring on a massive scale," Russian information services Interfax quoted the MOESK as saying.

Currently, all of the company's emergency teams were working to restore power supply.—*Xinhua*

Drinking coffee or tea may lower brain cancer risk

LOS ANGELES, 21 Oct—Daily consumption of coffee or tea may reduce chances of developing brain cancer, said a new study published in the November issue of the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*. The conclusion is based on analysis of data concerning the dietary habits of more than 410,000 men and women between the ages of 25 and 70, according to the study conducted by an international team of researchers.

The study involved participants from France, the Netherlands, Italy, Spain, Britain, Greece, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Germany. Participants were recruited between 1991 and 2000, and were tracked over the course of about 8.5 years. During that time, food surveys were completed to gauge, among other things, the amount of tea and coffee each participant consumed. During the study, 343 new cases of glioma were diagnosed, as were 245 new cases of meningioma, another cancer that affects tissue surrounding the brain and spinal cord.

Overweight dads related to unhealthy kids

SYDNEY, 21 Oct—Australian researchers said on Thursday, a father's diet and weight can increase the risk of diabetes in his children. Researchers from the University of New South Wales (NSW) fed male rats with a high fat diet until they were obese and showing the signs of diabetes.

The fat rats were then bred with healthy normal weight females and their offspring were reared in a controlled environment and on a strict healthy diet.

Despite this, researchers found the female offspring had signs of im-

paired glucose tolerance and insulin production when they reached young adulthood.

However, a less pronounced result was seen in the young males, though the researchers suspect they were lagging the females and their condition would worsen later. The study's author, Professor Margaret Morris, from the University of NSW's School of Medical Sciences, said it was the "first report of non-genetic, intergenerational transmission of metabolic consequences of a high fat diet from father to offspring"—*Internet*

Premature newborns need early help from parents to improve IQ

OSLO, 21 Oct—Premature babies can improve their IQ significantly if they can get early help from their parents, a Norwegian researcher said on Wednesday. "Premature babies have a different language than babies born at term, about which we have learnt much more in the last 20 to 25 years," said Marianne Nordhov, a researcher with the University Hospital of North Norway, which is located in Norway's northern city

of Tromsø. It is this new knowledge that has led to a method to improve the IQ of premature babies. A study shows that training for parents has improved their child's IQ as he or she grows up, Nordhov told *Xinhua*, referring to the result of a Norwegian study which was published online on 11 Oct. The study offered some parents an eleven-hour training in how to communicate with their babies.—*Internet*

trash bag of marijuana floating on the surface of the water, *The (North Andover) Eagle Tribune* reported Tuesday.

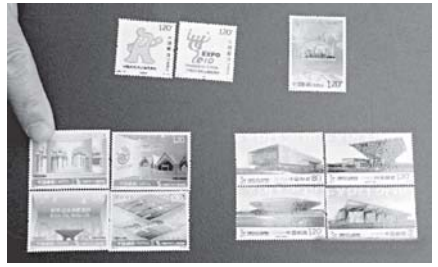
"Every day we go out on the river we never know what we'll find," Morrison said. "This was unusual."

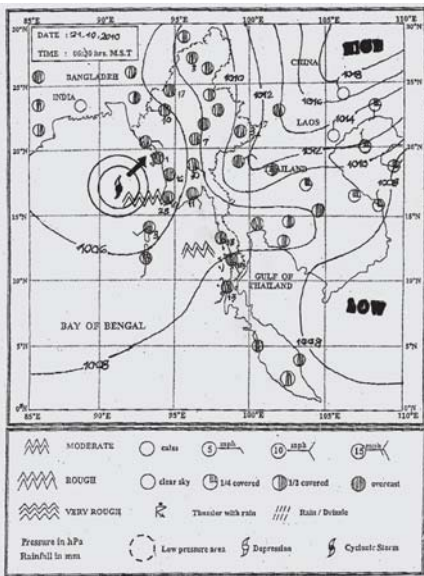

Maximum temperature on 20-10-2010 was 82°F. Minimum temperature on 21-10-2010 was 74°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 21-10-2010 was (100%). Total sunshine hours on 20-10-2010 was (Nil).

Rainfall on 21-10-2010 was (0.20) inch at Mingaladon, (0.67) inch at Kaba-Aye and (1.33) inches at Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2010 was (80.67) inches at Mingaladon, (94.29) inches at Kaba-Aye and (105.35) inches at Central Yangon. Maximum wind

speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (5) mph from South at (16:30) hours MST on 20-10-2010.

Bay Inference: According to the observations at (12:30) hrs MST today, the depression over East Central Bay is centered at about (180) miles Southwest of Kyaukpyu. It is likely to further intensified and forecast to cross Rakhine Coast between Sittway and Kyaukpyu within the next (36) hours commencing this afternoon today. Weather is cloudy in the East Central Bay and partly cloudy in the Andaman sea and elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal.

Forecast valid until afternoon of the 22nd October 2010: Rain or thundershowers will be fairly widespread in Kachin, Shan and Kayah States, Sagaing and Mandalay Regions and widespread in the remaining States and Regions with likelihood of isolated heavy falls in Rakhine State, Mandalay, Magway, Bago, Yangon and Ayeyawady Regions. Degree of certainty is (80%).

State of the sea: Squalls with moderate to rough seas are likely at times Deltaic, off and along Rakhine Coast. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach (40) mph. Seas will be moderate elsewhere in Myanmar waters.

Outlook for subsequent two days: Increase of rain in the Rakhine Coasts.

Forecast for Nay Pyi Taw and neighbouring area for 22-10-2010: One or two rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is (80%).

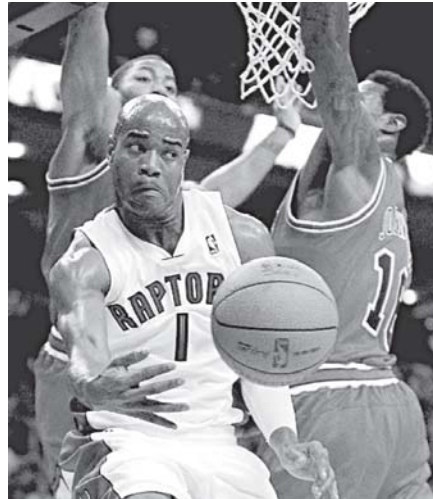
Forecast for Yangon and neighbouring area for 22-10-2010: Some rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is (80%).

Tibet to open 5th civil airport next month

LHASA, 21 Oct—The fifth civil airport in China's Tibet Autonomous Region will open early next month, civil aviation authorities said on Thursday. Xigaze Peace Airport, located in Xigaze Prefecture, 48 km from Xigaze City, is 3,782 meters above sea level. The airport terminals, decor, facilities and flight tests were completed, allowing it to officially open in early November, said Zhu Feng, secretary of the airport's Communist Party of China (CPC) branch.

However, Zhu said, no exact date had yet been set for the opening. Construction, with an investment of 489 million yuan (74 million US dollars), began on April 29 last year. The airport is expected to have handled 230,000 passengers and 1,150 tonnes of cargo by 2020, according to the Civil Aviation Bureau of Tibet Autonomous Region. Tibet has four other civil airports in Lhasa, Nyingchi, Qamdo and Ngari. In the past five years, China has invested heavily in building transport infrastructure in Tibet, pouring money into construction of highways, railways and airports to stimulate Tibet's weak economy and tourism.—Xinhua

Cyclone Giri likely to cross Rakhine State

NAY PYI TAW, 21 Oct—The Department of Meteorology and Hydrology today announced that according to the observations recorded at 9.30 pm today, cyclone Giri over the mid-east of the Bay of Bengal moved northeastwards for a little with its centre in the sea, about 140 miles southwest of Kyaukpyu. The cyclone is likely to cross Rakhine coast between Sittway and Kyaukpyu within 24 hours from this night.

The cyclone Giri is now at orange level and is forecast to move towards Rakhine coast.

Under the influence of the cyclone, squalls are likely to be widespread in the Delta, along Rakhine Coast and the offshore areas with likelihood of moderate to strong waves. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 50 mph. Trawlers and ships are therefore warned to avert possible dangers of the natural disaster.—MNA
