Vice-President Thiha Thura U Tin Aung Myint Oo inspects Yasagyo Multi-purpose Dam Project, development undertakings in Kalay

NAY PYI TAW, 18 Jan—Vice-President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Thiha Thura U Tin Aung Myint Oo, accompanied by Union ministers, the Sagaing Region Chief Minister, the Chin State Chief Minister, the commander of North-West Command, deputy ministers, the Indian Ambassador to Myanmar and officials, visited construction site of Yasagyo Multi-purpose Dam Project at Nerinzara Creek, two miles north of Yasagyo Village in Kalay Township yesterday.

At the briefing hall of the project, Deputy Agriculture and Irrigation Minister U Khin Zaw explained that project is located near Yasagyo Village in Kalay Township, Kalay District, Sagaing Region and is being constructed by damming up Nerinzara Creek and reported to the Vice-President on main task of dam construction.

The Vice-President stressed the need for harmonious implementation of irrigation facility construction and hydropower generation as the project is

Always be alert

Full of roses is the life when the world is in peace and tranquility. Full of thorns is it when the world is amidst armed conflicts and disputes. This explains the efforts for bringing human-induced tragedies to an end.

The impact of natural disasters has been topping in the destructive causes of human society. Natural disasters can be categorized into flood, storm, fire outbreak, etc. Naturally, unstoppable they are, but prevention can be made to avert the catastrophic consequences. In 2008, the cyclone Nargis claimed lots of lives and inflicted widespread damages in riparian regions of Myanmar and cyclone-shelters and communication links were constructed since its aftermath.

Moreover, it needs to run more and more fire prevention campaigns. In 2011, the nation saw a total of over 900 fire outbreaks, resulting in massive loss and damages. Some fire outbreaks even led to casualties apart from damages to properties. There are a number of occasions for fire outbreaks such as negligence, electric shock and arson but negligence accounts for the most.

The number of fire outbreaks has increased year by year with some causing enormous damages. Over-10000-gallon-capacity water tanks should be constructed on the top floors of skyscrapers and large markets. Fire is a good servant but a bad master. Ethiopia gunmen 'kill five foreign tourists'

ADDIS ABABA, 18 Jan — Five foreign tourists have been killed in Ethiopia in an attack by unknown gunmen, state TV reports. The attack was carried out late on Monday in the northern Afar region of the country by gunmen who had crossed from neighbouring Eritrea, the TV said. Two other tourists were seriously hurt and a third is said to have escaped the attack unharmed. The nationality of the victims was not given.

Afar is regarded as a haunt of both Ethiopian and Eritrean rebels. Ethiopia and Eritrea have been bitter adversaries since their 1998-2000 border war. Ethiopian Television (ETV) said the two injured tourists had been taken to a clinic by defence forces. "The group of foreign tourists was attacked by gunmen late on Monday by members of a group that was trained and armed by the Eritrean government," Ethiopian government spokesman Bereket Simon told *Reuters*.



"It is the usual terrorist activity by the regime." A Western diplomat also told *Reuters* that German nationals were among those killed, but that has not been confirmed. However, reports in the German media said the tourists had been near the Erta Ale volcano. Eritrea has so far not commented on the attack. Eritrea gained independence from Ethiopia in 1993 but the two countries soon became embroiled in border disputes.—*Internet*

MoD announces details of 4,200 job cuts

LONDON, 18 Jan — The Ministry of Defence has announced 4,200 job cuts in a second round of armed forces redundancies. The Army will see up to 2,900 job cuts, including 400 Gurkhas, while the RAF will lose up to 1,000 members and the Royal Navy up to 300. The job losses will account for some of the cuts announced under the defence review - intended to help plug a £38bn hole in the defence budget. Ministers said there was "no choice" but to axe the posts.

Under the terms of the Strategic Defence and Security Review, announced in 2010, the navy and the RAF have to cut 5,000 jobs each by 2015, the Army 7,000 and the Ministry of Defence 25,000 civilian staff. Last September 2,860 people were selected for the first tranche of redundancies, with the Army and RAF each losing 920 posts, and 1,020 cut from the navy.

Defence Secretary Philip Hammond said the government had "no choice but to reduce the size of the armed forces - while reconfiguring them to ensure they remain agile, adaptable and effective". Mr Hammond said: "As we continue with the redundancy process we will ensure we retain the capabilities that our armed forces will require to meet the challenges of the future."

Mexican navy seizes huge haul of precursor chemicals



MEXICO CITY, 18 Jan — The Mexican navy says it has seized 195 tonnes of chemicals which can be used to make the drug methamphetamine. The navy found 12 shipping containers full of the precursor chemical in the Pacific coast port of Lazaro Cardenas. They said the chemical had been shipped from China and was destined for

Guatemala and Nicaragua. The authorities said that Mexican drug cartels have been expanding their methamphetamine operations to Guatemala. Mexican officials said the chemical, methamphetamine, could be used to make the synthetic drug methamphetamine, and also to produce cocaine.

Over the past six weeks, the Mexican security forces have seized nearly 900 tonnes of precursor chemicals, almost all of them bound for Guatemala. Estimates by the security forces in the United

States indicate that Mexico has in the past been the main supplier of meth used in the US, but recent seizures of precursor chemicals suggest Guatemala may be producing more. A 2011 report by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime said amphetamine stimulants had become the second most widely used illegal substances. According to the report, the main producers of synthetic drugs remain the Netherlands and Burma, but manufacture has spread to Latin America.—*Internet*

Yahoo co-founder Jerry Yang resigns from its board

NEW YORK, 18 Jan — Jerry Yang, the co-founder of Yahoo!, has resigned from its board. Mr Yang founded the online company in 1995 with David Filo and was its chief executive from June 2007 until January 2009. His resignation comes two weeks after the company hired former PayPal executive Scott Thomson to be its new chief executive.

Mr Yang annoyed some shareholders by turning down a \$47.5bn (£31bn) takeover offer from Microsoft in 2008. The company's current market value is about \$20bn.

Mr Yang has also resigned from the boards of Yahoo Japan and Alibaba Group and said in a statement: "The time has come for me to

pursue other interests outside of Yahoo!". He also expressed support for the company's current management. "I am enthusiastic about the appointment of Scott Thompson as Chief Executive Officer and his ability, along with the entire Yahoo! leadership team, to guide Yahoo! into an exciting and successful future," he said. Yahoo! shares rose 3.4% in after-hours trading.

Some analysts had seen Mr Yang as an impediment to the sale or restructuring of the business.

"This is clearly a positive. It provides a more objective and unemotional approach to strategic alternatives," said Brett Harris at Gabello & Co. "It's also good for the new CEO. He has one less entrenched legacy board member to resist his vision."

In addition to leaving the board, Mr Yang is also giving up his title of "Chief Yahoo!". "While I and the entire board respect his decision, we will miss his remarkable perspective, vision and wise counsel," said Yahoo! chairman Roy Bostock.

Iraqi policemen killed at checkpoint in Anbar

BAGHDAD, 18 Jan — Five policemen have been killed in an attack on a checkpoint in Iraq, close to the Jordanian and Syrian borders. Gunmen in the western province of Anbar targeted policemen who were guarding a highway that links Iraq to Jordan just after midnight on Tuesday. One report said an attacker was killed in the ensuing clash.

The attack, in the town of Rutba, came two days after gunmen stormed a government compound killing seven in the provincial capital of Ramadi. Violence in Iraq has been steadily on the rise in the past few months. Security forces have been one of the main targets of recent attacks, in addition to Shia

religious processions. There has also been a marked deterioration in Iraq's fragile political process since the withdrawal of US forces from the country at the end of last year.

An arrest warrant was issued for Vice-President Tariq Hashemi, the country's most prominent Sunni politician, on terrorism

charges. He fled to the Kurdish-controlled region of northern Iraq, and denied the accusations against him. But the warrant triggered a political crisis, as the biggest bloc in parliament accused Prime Minister Nuri Maliki of using the law to consolidate his grip on power.

Mexico police chief killed by unidentified gunmen

MEXICO CITY, 18 Jan — Unidentified gunmen have killed the police chief of the central Mexican town of Zacatepec. Juan Manuel Zamudio was shot by three men who ambushed his car as he was travelling alone in Morelos State. Seven alleged hitmen were shot dead by security forces in a separate incident in Morelos.

There have been a number of shoot-outs in the state in recent months but Morelos had escaped the high levels of

violence seen in some other regions.

It is not known who was behind Monday's violence in Morelos but the authorities have blamed the shootings on organised crime.

Early on Monday, police and suspected hitmen exchanged fire near Mexico, close to the city of Cuernavaca. Reports said the alleged gunman had run a police checkpoint on the Cuernavaca-Mexico City motorway and officers gave

chase. In the ensuing shoot-out, "seven alleged criminals who were armed" were killed, a statement from by the Morelos prosecutor's office said.

Later in the day, gunmen said to be on motorcycles opened fire on Mr Zamudio as he stopped at a petrol station.

The police chief was taken to hospital but died soon after from his injuries.

Babies try lip-reading in learning to talk

WASHINGTON, 18 Jan—Babies don't learn to talk just from hearing sounds. New research suggests they're lip-readers too.

It happens during that magical stage when a baby's babbling gradually changes from gibberish into syllables and eventually into that first "mama" or "dada."

Florida scientists discovered that starting around age 6 months, babies begin shifting from the intent eye gaze of early infancy to studying mouths when people talk to them.

"The baby in order to imitate you has to figure out how to shape their lips to make that particular sound they're hearing," explains developmental psychologist David Lewkowicz of Florida Atlantic University, who led the study being published Monday. "It's an incredibly complex process."

Apparently it doesn't take them too long to absorb the movements that match basic sounds. By their first birthdays, babies start shifting back to look you in the eye again — unless they hear the unfamiliar sounds of a foreign language. Then, they stick with lip-reading a bit longer.

"It's a pretty intriguing finding," says University of Iowa psychology professor Bob McMurray, who also studies speech development. The babies "know what they need to know about, and they're able to deploy their attention to what's important at that point in development."—*Internet*

India reports new TB strain resistant to all drugs

MUMBAI, 18 Jan—Indian doctors have reported the country's first cases of "totally drug-resistant tuberculosis," a long-feared and virtually untreatable form of the killer lung disease.

It's not the first time highly resistant cases like this have been seen. Since 2003, patients have been documented in Italy and Iran. It has mostly been limited to impoverished areas, and has not spread widely. But experts believe there could be many undocumented cases.

No one expects the Indian TB strains to rapidly spread elsewhere. The airborne disease is mainly transmitted through close personal contact and isn't nearly as contagious as the flu. Indeed, most of the cases of this kind of TB were not from person-to-person infection but were mutations that occurred in poorly treated patients.

What's more, there's a debate within the public health community about whether to even label TB infections as totally drug resistant. The World Health Organization hasn't accepted the term and still considers the cases to be

what's now called extensively drug-resistant TB, or XDR. However, Dr Paul Nunn, a coordinator at the WHO's Stop TB Department in Geneva, said there is ample proof that these virtually untreatable cases do exist.

The Indian hospital that saw the initial cases tested a dozen medicines and none of them worked, a pretty comprehensive assessment. A TB expert at the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention said they do appear to be totally resistant to available drugs.

"It is concerning," said Dr Kenneth Castro, director of the CDC's Division of Tuberculosis Elimination. "Anytime we see something like this, we better get on top of it before it becomes a more widespread problem."

Ordinary TB is easily cured by taking antibiotics for six to nine months. However, if that treatment is interrupted or the dose is cut down, the stubborn bacteria battle back and mutate into a tougher strain that can no longer be killed by standard drugs. The disease becomes harder and more expensive to treat.—*Internet*

Toll from pedestrians wearing headphones triples

MARYLAND, 18 Jan—The number of US pedestrians who have been killed or badly injured while wearing headphones has tripled in six years, according to a study published Tuesday.

The annual tally rose from 16 in 2004 to 47 in 2011, bringing the total of cases to 116 over this period, say the authors.

More than half of the incidents involved pedestrians who were run down by trains.

Two-thirds of the victims were males and under the age of 30.

The research, published

in the *British journal Injury Prevention*, was headed by Richard Lichenstein of the University of Maryland Hospital for Children in Baltimore.

The paper warns of "inattentive blindness" when wearing headphones, meaning a distraction that lowers the resources the brain devotes to external stimuli. The tawl of US accident statistics covered iPods, MP3 players and other musical devices. It did not include mobile phones.—*Internet*

Canadian stocks drop despite Chinese economic growth boost

TORONTO, 18 Jan—Canadian stocks lost early momentum at the end of the day on Tuesday even as commodity prices rose sharply in the wake of data indicating that China is managing to avoid an abrupt economic slowdown. The S&P/TSX Composite Index was down 25.77 points, or 0.21 percent, at 12,232.83 while the S&P/TSX Venture Composite Index lost 1.21 points, or 0.08 percent, at 1,537.72.

The Bank of Canada announced on Tuesday that it was going to leave its key rate unchanged at one percent. The bank observed that the Canadian economy did better than expected in the last half of 2011, but it expects the pace of growth going forward to be more modest than previously forecast, largely due to deteriorating economic performance outside of Canada. China reported its economy grew 8.9 percent in the final quarter of last

year, down from 9.1 percent in the third quarter and the slowest in two and half years. But markets had been expecting growth to come in at 8.7 percent and the data also showed that December retail sales and factory output accelerated. The Chinese government moved to slow its economy last year to deal with high inflation. But leaders have recently started easing lending to encourage growth in the face of plunging export demand from the US and Europe. There have been worries that Chinese officials would be unable to engineer a soft landing for the economy. A growing Chinese economy has been an important source of support for a struggling global economy and, in particular, has boosted prices for oil and metals and in turn energy and mining stocks on the resource-heavy Canadian stock market.—*Xinhua*



India to consider foreign investment in airlines

NEW DELHI, 18 Jan—India's government will consider a proposal allowing foreign airlines to buy stakes of up to 49% in India's airlines, Minister Ajit Singh has said. Five of India's six main airlines have reported losses in recent years. They

have been particularly badly hit by fuel price rises. Foreign airlines are currently not allowed to invest in Indian carriers.

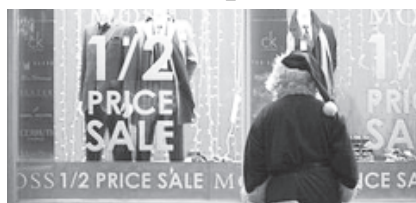
Correspondents say that allowing foreign investment will bring much-needed cash for the ailing airlines. India is one of the fastest growing aviation markets in the world with the number of passengers increasing at between 15% to 20% a year. But its airlines may lose a total of \$2.5bn (£1.63bn) in the year ending March 2012 because of high fuel costs, an economic downturn and price wars, according to a study by the Centre for Asia Pacific Aviation, an industry body.

A group of senior ministers met late on Tuesday and agreed that foreign airlines be allowed to buy stakes in India's domestic airlines. "The question was to allow foreign airlines to participate in foreign direct investment (FDI)," Aviation Minister Ajit Singh told reporters. "I discussed it with the finance minister (Pranab Mukherjee) and he has agreed."—*Internet*

'Worst' December for Scottish shops

EDINBURGH, 18 Jan—Scottish shopkeepers have reported their worst December since at least 1999, according to the Scottish Retail Consortium (SRC). Although sales last month were up by 1.6% compared with the previous year, it was the weakest December since the survey began in 1999. Like-for-like sales, which discounts new store openings, were up 0.4%. Scottish shops performed worse than the rest of the UK where total sales grew by 4.1% last month. Although Scottish sales showed some growth, the consortium said the true picture was much worse because the latest figures are compared to December 2010 when heavy snow affected many shops. David McCorquodale, head of retail in Scotland, KPMG, said: "A slight uplift of 0.4% appears to have brought some cheer at the end of what has been a wretched year for retailers."

"However, we should not forget that for two weeks of December last year the country was under a hefty blanket of snow and, with Christmas falling on a Saturday that year, there wasn't a full week's trading during that critical period. As a

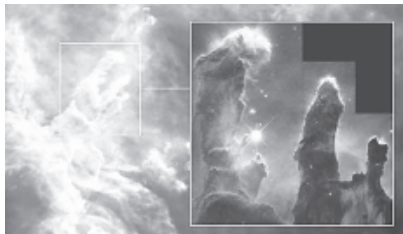
result this slight uplift in like-for-like sales is illusory." He added: "Christmas this year came at a real cost to retailers as the discounting was deep, impacting margins, and opening hours were longer, costing more in wages. Several retailers have not made it into the New Year and more shop closures are anticipated in the coming months."—*Internet*

Herschel telescope revisits cosmic classic

LONDON, 18 Jan — Europe's Herschel space telescope has produced a majestic new version of a classic astronomical target — the Eagle Nebula (also called M16). This dense region of gas and dust some 6,500 light-years from Earth hosts copious numbers of bright new stars. Radiation from these objects is sculpting the clouds of gas and dust, producing in places great columns and curtains of material. The picture is being featured on the BBC's Stargazing Live series. Brian Cox and Dara O'Briain are presenting the popular programmes this week from Jodrell Bank radio observatory in Cheshire. Look just below the centre of the image and you will see the columns that were famously dubbed the "Pillars of Creation" when they were pictured by the Hubble telescope in 1995. But Herschel and Hubble see distinctly different things in the

nebula. Hubble is sensitive to optical light, the kind of light we detect with our eyes. This is easily blocked or scattered by the dust, and shows us merely the shape of the billowing clouds of material.

Herschel, on the other hand, is sensitive to much longer wavelength radiation, in far-infrared. This enables it to detect the emission coming directly from the cold gas and dust that cloaks so much of the region. It is a powerful ability that enables Herschel to look inside the columns and curtains, at the places where dense gas is collapsing under its own weight to trigger the nuclear reactions that give rise to new stars. Herschel's is a false colour image in which the bluer material is relatively warm and the redder material is relatively cold. It is "relative" because these are temperatures below minus 200C.—*Internet*

Time for decision on removing leap seconds

GENEVA, 18 Jan — Experts have recommended eliminating leap seconds from the time scale used by most computer systems, but governments are split on the issue, to be decided this week, the International Telecommunications Union (ITU) said Tuesday. Leap seconds, introduced in 1972 as part of Coordinated Universal Time (UTC), are added some years to reconcile

the difference between atomic time used by computer systems and time as defined by measuring the movement of the earth around the sun and the earth's rotation. The latter, known as Universal Time, fluctuates due to the earth's irregular rotation, tides or earthquakes.

"This will be an important decision because the problem of introducing the leap second will disappear and we will be able to have a more standard time than the one we have today," Vincent Meens, who headed an ITU experts' group that recommended removing leap seconds, told reporters.

"Time is very, very important for synchronization



of all the radio communications systems. For instance, a lot of systems are using GPS time just to synchronize themselves and that would be very important for everybody to have the same time," he said, referring to satellite navigation systems. The Geneva-based ITU is the UN agency responsible for coordinating international communications standards. Its radio-communication assembly is due to debate the issue on Thursday, but clear divisions remain, officials said.

SpaceX delays trial run to space station

CAPE CANAVERAL, 18 Jan — Space Exploration Technologies, a startup space transportation firm hired by NASA to fly cargo to the International Space Station, is delaying a planned 7 February test flight to allow more time to prepare for the mission, a company spokeswoman said on Tuesday. The launch of the company's Falcon 9 rocket and Dragon capsule from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station has not yet been rescheduled. "We believe that there are a few areas that will benefit from additional work," said Kirstin Brost Grantham, a spokeswoman for the company, also known as SpaceX.

"We will continue to test and review data. We will launch when the vehicle is ready," she said. The flight will be the second and possibly last test flight before privately owned SpaceX begins delivering cargo to the station under a \$1.6 billion NASA contract.

The firm, based in Hawthorne, California, and founded by Internet entrepreneur Elon Musk, hopes to combine its two remaining test flights into one with a berthing at the space station, pending NASA's approval.—*Reuters*

Facebook Koobface worm 'hacker gang named'

LONDON, 18 Jan — Alleged cybercriminals behind an internet worm, which spread via Facebook and other social networks, have been named. The suspected gang were tracked down to St Petersburg after an investigation by Facebook and cybersecurity researchers. The worm gave the gang control of hundreds of thousands of computers. While not the largest such network of hijacked machines or "botnet", the so-called Koobface worm is notable for its targeting of social networks.

The security company Sophos published details of an extensive investigation into Koobface on its blog. The report,

connected to Koobface. The BBC attempted to contact members of the group via a business linked to the gang but was unsuccessful. became active in 2008. The worm spread through social networks, presenting users with bogus links to online videos.

The links encouraged users to install a copy of the Koobface malware masquerading as a Flash update. The worm was even able to create fake social networking profiles able to propagate the malware. "It can create Facebook accounts and then use those accounts to start sending links to people," Mr Cluley said. Researchers believe that up to 800,000 machines could have been infected by the worm. Facebook is expected to share details of the gang with security and internet companies later.

Soon, 'smart vehicles' to communicate with each other to boost road safety

WASHINGTON, 18 Jan — Automakers and government agencies are teaming up to lay the foundations for a future in which smart vehicles will be able to communicate with one another to improve road safety.

Many new cars today can connect to the Internet, but most of them use their connectivity for "infotainment" purposes like navigation or streaming music. What car companies like General Motors envision for the future is much more ambitious, as not only will cars be able to connect with cloud-based services, they will also be able to talk to other cars, with the smartphone in the driver's pocket, with the toll booth or traffic

light up ahead or with the electric charging station to determine when and how long it needs to be fully juiced up. "The vehicle whose DNA was set 100 years ago - four wheels, mechanically driven, internal combustion engine - cannot be the DNA for the 21st century," LiveScience quoted Alan Taub, GM's vice president of global R and D as telling this year's 'CES' show. In such an auto-connected world, what one car sees or senses could be made immediately available to other cars on the road. The result of all this interconnectivity, automakers say, will be safer roads because drivers will no longer be limited to only what they can see or what their vehicles can sense.

"We want vehicles to have the equivalent of 360-degree situational awareness," Taub said. "We accomplish that today with onboard sensors ... but we can see a world where a vehicle-to-vehicle communication system can first augment and then replace many of those onboard sensors," he said.

According to Clint Steiner, the senior manager of Automotive OEM at Garmin, if the vehicles can talk to each other, "your car could look at the other car's route ahead of time, and determine that, yes, that car is going to change lanes based on the route that the driver has programmed into their GPS."

However, before a world where networked cars are a reality, there are a lot of hurdles to be overcome first. For instance, the more data that smart cars receive, the more drivers will be inundated with notifications. If you think distracted driving is a problem now, imagine if your car alerted you to every potential hazard on the road. If not designed the right way, the notifications themselves could become a danger by distracting drivers.—*Internet*

LONDON, 18 Jan — Sherlock will return for a third series, its creators have revealed after a dramatic conclusion to the second run of the BBC One drama. Ahead of series two, co-creator Steven Moffat told *BBC News* there was “no guarantee we’ll be bringing him back”. But on Sunday night, Moffat

wrote on Twitter: “Of course there’s going to be a third series - it was commissioned at the same time as the second. Gotcha!” It was watched by an average audience of 7.9 million overnight figures show. That compared with the 8.8 million average audience of the opening episode on New Year’s Day. The modern take on Sir

Arthur Conan Doyle’s detective tales stars Benedict Cumberbatch in the title role. Moffat’s co-creator Mark Gatiss also wrote on Twitter: “Gotcha! And of course there’ll be a third series!” Conan Doyle’s *The Final Problem*, published in 1893, ended with Holmes and his arch-enemy Professor Moriarty apparently falling to their deaths at the Reichenbach Falls in Switzerland.

Conan Doyle later resurrected his hero. Sunday night’s episode was called *The Reichenbach Fall*. In interviews in December to promote the show - which also stars Martin Freeman as Holmes’ sidekick Doctor Watson - Moffat, Gatiss and cast members had hinted the second series could be the last. — *Internet*

Somalia oil exploration: Drilling begins in Puntland

MOGADISHU, 18 Jan — Oil exploration has begun in the arid north-east of Somalia, which has been wracked by civil war for two decades. The Canadian firm Africa Oil behind the project said its two wells are the first to be drilled there in 21 years. The semi-autonomous Puntland region where the drilling is taking place says it is an

opportunity for peace.

“It’s a new beginning - if oil is found it will change Somalia for the better,” Issa Farah head of Puntland’s Petroleum and Minerals Agency told the BBC. Speaking on the BBC’s Focus on Africa programme, he said it was an important development not only for Puntland, but the whole of Somalia, which has not had a functioning central government since 1991 and has been convulsed by fighting between militias.

“I think in 10 years’ time - if oil is found, we will see a better country, a stronger country that lives in peace and prosperity with its own neighbours and hopefully that produces what we have been all looking for - peace, prosperity, development and progress,” he said. In the area where the two wells are being drilled to a depth of 3,800m (about two miles), there is an assumption that “there will be about 3bn to 4bn barrels of oil”, he said.

Indonesia concrete balls combat ‘train surfing’

JAKARTA, 18 Jan — Railway staff in Indonesia have started hanging concrete balls above train tracks to try to prevent commuters from riding on carriage roofs. The first balls were installed just above carriage-height near a station outside the capital, Jakarta. More will be put up elsewhere if they are found to keep people off the roofs.

Previous attempts to deter roof riders included spraying roofs with paint, spreading oil on carriages and hiring musicians to perform safety songs. Correspondents say those initiatives have failed. Officials hope that the latest move will prove to be the ultimate deterrent. Roof riders also face the possibility of imprisonment.

The balls - which can deliver a severe blow to the head - will be suspended a few inches above the tops of carriages at points where trains enter or pull out of stations, or where they go through crossings. Officials told the BBC that “roof surfing”

can be extremely dangerous. In 2008 at least 53 passengers died in an accident while travelling on a train roof. In 2011, 11 people were killed. Most victims are electrocuted by overhead power cables, but some fall off train carriages while trains are moving. — *Internet*

Ethiopia Airlines rejects Lebanon report into air crash

ADDIS ABABA, 18 Jan — Ethiopian Airlines officials have bluntly rejected the findings of a Lebanese investigation into an air crash off Lebanon in January 2010. The Lebanese report blames pilot error for the crash of flight ET409, in which 90 people died, sources say. But Ethiopian Airlines officials say the plane exploded, which they say points to sabotage, a lightning strike or shooting down. The Lebanese report was due to be released on Tuesday.

The Addis Ababa-bound flight crashed minutes after take-off from Beirut in stormy weather on 25 January 2010, with no survivors. Lebanese Transport Minister Ghazi Aridi told *AFP* news agency it was “clear” that “there were errors on the part of the pilot and co-pilot who are entirely responsible for the plane crash”. According to *AFP*, the Lebanese report says the pilot and co-pilot had been working non-stop for 51 days and were exhausted. Mr Aridi said the plane was sound and transcripts of the exchanges between the crew and air traffic control on takeoff had not indicated any problem.

Other officials say the report accuses the pilot of ignoring instructions from the control tower. Similar claims were made by Lebanese officials at the time of the crash. But Ethiopian Airlines has vigorously denied the Lebanese findings in a statement, in which it insisted the crew was rested in accordance with regulation and the pilot had made appropriate efforts to control the aircraft. — *Internet*

Vietnam’s navy unveils first home-made warship

HANOI, 18 Jan — A high-ranking navy official said it would patrol the country’s territorial waters. The new ship is 54m long and has an operational range of more than 2,000 nautical miles.

Vietnam has said that it intends to build more warships in the future. At the moment most of its vessels come from Russia and the former Soviet Union.

The ship’s design was reportedly bought from an unnamed foreign company. *Internet*

World Bank warns developing world to prepare for shocks

LONDON, 18 Jan — The World Bank has warned developing countries they need to be prepared for shocks as global economic growth slows. The organization has slashed its growth forecasts, and is now predicting a 0.3% contraction for the eurozone in 2012. “Developing countries need to evaluate their vulnerabilities and prepare for further shocks, while there is still time,” said World Bank chief economist Justin Yifu Lin.

“Escalation of the crisis would spare no-one,” the report’s author warned. Referring to the eurozone crisis and its potential to impact growth in rich and poor countries, Andrew Burns said: “Developed and developing-country growth rates could fall by as much or more than in 2008/09. “The importance of contingency planning cannot be stressed enough.” The World Bank is predicting growth of 5.4% for developing countries in 2012 and 1.4% for high income countries, down from its forecasts of 6.2% and 2.7% respectively in June.

The World Bank’s Global Economics Prospects report says that slower growth is already visible in global trade and commodity prices. It said that declining commodity prices were better news for the developing world, although food security for the poorest countries was still a major concern. Food prices are down about 14% from their peak in February 2011. Andrew Burns, manager of global macroeconomics at the World Bank, told the *BBC* there was a danger that the downturn could be longer lasting than the one which followed the collapse of Lehman Brothers in 2008.

“This time, going in, [developing countries] will be in much better condition than high income countries, but that said, we are concerned,” he said. “They are going to be operating in a situation where the high income countries aren’t going to be able to offer the same type of counter fiscal policy and the same type of support to the financial system as they did in 2008/9.” — *Internet*

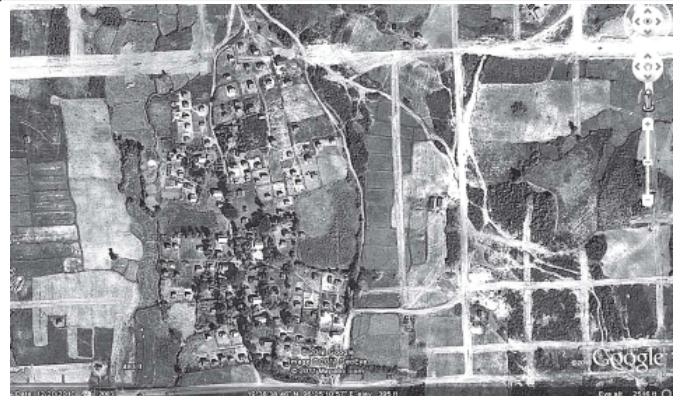

Groundwater overuse, climatic change threaten lives of 60 mln in Bangladesh

DHAKA, 18 Jan — Unplanned withdrawal of groundwater and adverse impacts of climate change pose dangerous threat to the lives and livelihood of about 60 million people in Bangladesh, state-run news agency BSS reported on Monday, quoting leading water and environment experts. Water table of groundwater is declining rapidly due to its excessive use for irrigation in agriculture sector, which causes salinity water intrusion, posing a serious threat to the ecosystem and biodiversity of the southern part of the country, said Md Efekharul Alam, Agriculture, Water and Environment Engineer of Bangladesh Agricultural Development Corporation (BADC).

He said in Bangladesh, 80 percent of irrigation water and 98 percent of drinking water is collected from underground sources without proper study and planning. "The groundwater is the most valuable natural resource of the country. If this resource is polluted by saline water intrusion, it will destabilize the food security, the ecosystem and biodiversity of the southern part," he added. — *Xinhua*

Researchers find new indicator to identify patients with increased risk from throat cancer

WASHINGTON, 18 Jan — Researchers at the University of Michigan Health System have found a new indicator that may predict which patients with a common type of throat cancer are most likely to have the cancer spread to other parts of their bodies.

Patients with oropharyngeal squamous cell carcinoma who had "matted" lymph nodes — nodes that are connected together — had a 69 percent survival rate over three years, compared to 94 percent for patients without matted nodes, according to a study published online Monday in *Head & Neck*.

The oropharynx is an area that includes the back of the tongue, soft palate, throat and tonsils.

"The spread of cancer throughout the body accounts for about 45 percent of the deaths from oropharyngeal carcinoma," says the study's senior author, Douglas Chepeha, an associate professor at the U-M Medical School. "Our findings may help doctors identify patients who are at higher risk for having their cancer metastasize and who would benefit from additional systemic therapy." — *Xinhua*

London's Science Museum to scan visitors' faces in 3D

LONDON, 18 Jan — Visitors to London's Science Museum are being invited to have their faces scanned in 3D. The Me in 3D stand at the museum uses a series of cameras to build a virtual image visitors can then view and manipulate. Data from participants will be used by Great Ormond Street Hospital, University College Hospital and Eastman Dental Hospital and Institute to provide better treatment and surgery for patients with disfigurements and congenital conditions.

"It's a very simple process using simultaneous photography by nine cameras and then some software modification to produce a 3D image," says Dr Chris Abela, a senior craniofacial fellow at Great Ormond Street Hospital.

"Any visitor to the stand will be able to spin their image around, look at themselves from behind their ear or from the worm's eye view as we call it and really see themselves in another dimension." Visitors, who must first sign a consent form so that their data can be used for research, will also have the option of rendering their 3D faces in zebra and crocodile skin, just for fun.

The more faces scanned, the better we will understand the human face in all its great variety, the researchers say, and that could mean better facial surgery for children born with disfiguring disorders or for patients requiring reconstructive surgery. "We know a lot about the bones in our faces but

little is known about what makes our face the shape it is and about the skin and muscles that make up our face," says Dr Abela. "By collecting as many 3D face photographs as we can we will have a greater understanding of our complex faces, and have greater knowledge to plan and perform the best facial surgery in the future." — *Internet*

Aye aye 'heats up' middle finger

LONDON, 18 Jan — Madagascar's mysterious aye aye warms up its extra-long finger when searching for dinner, scientists have found. The lemur, the world's largest nocturnal primate, taps its specialised middle finger on tree trunks to find nutritious beetle larvae. Studying thermal images, researchers found that the digit was colder than the others but warmed by

up to 6C during foraging. Scientists suggest that the aye aye saves energy by keeping the digit cool.

The findings are published in the *International Journal of Primatology*.

The team from Dartmouth University in New Hampshire, US, wanted to investigate the surface temperature of sensitive structures.

The aye aye's unusual middle finger has already been found to be super-sensitive to vibrations, so provided the perfect subject for their study.

"It was striking to see how much cooler the third digit was while not in use and how quickly it warmed to [match] the other digits when engaged in an active foraging task," said graduate student Gillian Moritz, who carried out the study under the guidance of her supervisor, Dr Nathaniel Dominy.

When not in use, the finger appeared black on thermal images. This indicated a large difference in

temperature between it and the white (hot) ears and eyes. But when the animal was looking for food, the finger rose in temperature by up to 6C. "We think the relatively cooler temperatures of the digit when not in use could be related to its [long, thin] form," said Ms Moritz.

"This form results in a relatively high surface-to-volume ratio [but] such a ratio is bad for retaining heat." In order to sense the vibrations of beetle larvae through the bark of a tree, the finger is "packed with sensitive nerve endings", the scientist explained. — *Internet*

Passenger train derailed by truck in Taipei, train driver dead

TAIPEI, 18 Jan — A passenger train collided with a truck which carried sandstone and intruded into the rail track in the northern part of Taipei Tuesday morning. The train's driver died from wounds.

The collision occurred in Taoyuan county when the train was coming from central Changhwa County to eastern Hualien County at a speed of 130 kilometres per hour in the island.

The locomotive was derailed and the driver was taken to hospital but died. More than 20 train passengers were slightly injured. The truck's driver was missing.

China's urban population outnumbers rural for first time at end of 2011

BEIJING, 18 Jan — The number of people living in China's cities for the first time exceeded those in the country's rural areas at the end of 2011, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) said on Tuesday.

The number of urban dwellers increased by 21 million to hit 690.79 million at the end of 2011, accounting for 51.27 percent of the country's total, the NBS said. Meanwhile, the rural population fell by 14.56 million to 656.56 million at the end of 2011, the NBS noted.

Beirut rescue operation at collapsed building ends

BEIRUT, 18 Jan — The rescue operation at a collapsed building in the Lebanese capital, Beirut, has been called off after the authorities ruled out the possibility of finding more survivors. The five-storey block of flats in the Ashrafiyeh district collapsed suddenly on Sunday evening, killing 27 people.

Ukraine declares measles outbreak, 883 people infected

KIEV, 18 Jan — The Ukrainian Health Ministry on Monday declared an outbreak of measles, with 883 cases of the infectious disease so far reported. "It is still too early to talk about the epidemic, but we have recorded outbreaks of measles in some Regions of Ukraine," said Sergey Platov, chief expert of the ministry's Public Health and Epidemiological Welfare Department.

Platov told a Press conference here alerts had been issued in the country's western and central regions and in Kiev, Ukraine's capital. The expert also urged people to be vaccinated against the disease immediately.

Measles is not usually life-threatening but can cause complications in people with weak immune systems and in pregnant women.—Xinhua

WHO chief proud of achievements made in public health

GENEVA, 18 Jan—Given the state of world affairs, many significant achievements have been in public health since the start of this century, director-general of the World Health Organization (WHO) Margaret Chan told the WHO Executive Board at its 130th Session on Monday.

In her opening speech, Chan said the WHO and its member states should be especially proud of their consistent ability to reach agreement on global governance instruments that provide collective protection against shared threats.

Since the turn of the century, WHO has been successful in achieving consensus among member states in areas such as tobacco control and influenza preparedness to name a few. "We have stayed the course, steadfast and surefooted," the WHO chief said. "This is an outstanding achievement at a time when international negotiations keep breaking down in so many other areas," she added.

Father appeals to find daughter's killer

LONDON, 18 Jan — The father of a Kent schoolgirl stabbed to death in an

alleyway exactly 19 years ago has made an appeal from his nursing home to find her killer. Cliff Tiltman, 62, said it would "mean everything" to him to find out who murdered his daughter Claire in Greenhithe, in 1993. "It's been a long time but I've never given up hope and never will," he said. "I can't be put into words how this has affected our family. She would have been 35 now. I miss her to bits." Claire was murdered just

off the A226 London Road while on her way to see a friend. The Dartford Grammar School for Girls pupil was stabbed more than 40 times, in an apparently motiveless attack, four days after her 16th birthday. No-one has ever been charged with the murder. Two years ago, Kent Police investigated after a handwritten sign claiming to name the killer was found next to a plaque in memory of the teenager.—Internet

Microsoft inaugurates first tech centre in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, 18 Jan—US software giant Microsoft inaugurated a major technology center in Brazil's largest city Sao Paulo on Tuesday. With an area of 1,300 square meters, the new Microsoft Technology Center (MTC) is the largest of its kind in Latin America, and will operate as a tech simulation center. The MTC will be open to Microsoft's partners, corporate clients, NGOs, and students.

The investments in the new technology center amounted to 10 million US dollars, and several partners of software companies such as AMD, Dell, HP, Nokia, and Hewlett-Packard participated. Microsoft plans to inaugurate five other MTCs in Brazil. Three cities have already been chosen including Rio, Salvador and Recife. The MTC in Rio will be located in the port area, which is undergoing major renovations to be completed by the beginning of the 2016 Summer Olympics. The Sao Paulo MTC is the second one to be built in Latin America. The first was inaugurated last year in Mexico City. According to Microsoft, it is the 17th centre outside the United States.—Xinhua



26 killed in Port-au-Prince

PORT-AU-PRINCE, 18 Jan — At least 26 people have died and some 56 have been injured after a lorry's brakes failed on one of the busiest streets in the capital of Haiti. The lorry, carrying gravel, hit street vendors, motorcyclists, cars and a small bus as it tore through Route Delmas in Port-au-Prince on Monday.

The accident happened in front of national TV

headquarters at about 22:00 local time (03:00 GMT on Tuesday). President Michel Martelly visited the scene of the crash, his office said. "It's the worst accident we've ever experienced in our city," police official Will Dimanche told AFP news agency. Some 10 cars, including taxi cabs, were completely destroyed in the pile-up, officials said.

Cuba's electricity generation increases tenfold in 50 years

HAVANA, 18 Jan—Cuba currently generates over 4,000 megawatts of electricity, 10 times as much as 53 years ago, an official from the National Electric Company (UNE) said on Tuesday. In January 1959, the island produced only 475 megawatts of electricity, and only 60 percent of the population had access to it. But today, 96 percent of the population has electricity, the official daily *Granma* quoted UNE's Commercial Director Ramon Lopez as saying. Since 1998, the country has generated electricity not only from ordinary feedstocks like oil and accompanying gas from oil wells, but new energy sources like photovoltaic cells, wind farms and sugarcane biomass as well. Lopez said the "Energy Revolution" was started in 2005 by former leader Fidel Castro to guarantee a high electricity supply. Current leader Raul Castro is also trying to achieve energy independence, though half of the country's oil supply for electricity still comes from Venezuela.—Xinhua

Fake iPad 2s made of clay sold at Canadian stores

As many as 10 fake iPad 2s, all made of slabs of modeling clay, were recently sold at electronic stores in Vancouver, British Columbia. Best Buy and Future Shop have launched investigations into how the scam was pulled off.

The tablet computers, like most Apple products, are known for their sleek and simple designs. But there's no mistaking the iPad for one of the world's oldest "tablet devices." Still, most electronic products cannot be returned to stores. For the stores and customers to be fooled by the clay replacements, the thieves must have successfully weighed out the clay portions and resealed the original Apple packaging. Future Shop spokesman Elliott Chun

told CTV that individuals bought the iPads with cash, replaced them with the model clay, then returned the packages to the stores. The returned fakes were restocked on the shelves and sold to new, unwitting customers.

"Customers don't expect to receive this kind of product from Future Shop, so it's a very serious matter and something we are addressing right away for anyone who has been impacted," Chun told CTV British Columbia. "It really saddens Future Shop that people stoop to be this opportunistic and make money in this kind of organized way."

Thirty-pound cat too fat to jump on bed

The Canadian foster mother of an abandoned 30-pound cat named Tiny says she's using a laser pen to get the lazy critter moving more than a few yards.

The male cat was abandoned in a box at an animal shelter before the New Year in Fredericton, New Brunswick, and fostered out to Nancy Garon, the Toronto Star reported.

For five days, Tiny refused all food, which workers attributed to stress. Tiny lost three pounds, but concerns arose the cat could go into liver failure because of the sudden loss of appetite.

Garon said she's experimented and found Tiny will eat anything unhealthy from her

hand, but isn't particular about fish and chicken unless there's some gravy involved.

She said the green-eyed gray tabby needs help getting onto her bed, but she's had success with getting Tiny active by having him chase a dot from a laser pen and swatting at a toy swung from a little fishing pole. Once a week, she takes Tiny for a weigh-in as part of a fundraising weight loss challenge for Canada's Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Meanwhile, she told the Star she's leaning to changing from a foster role to outright adoption, as Tiny is "growing" on her.

Escaped bomb-sniffing dog captured

A retired bomb-sniffing dog that worked at the White House was captured Tuesday after escaping from handlers and biting two officers at a Detroit Airport.

Arco, a 5-year-old Belgian shepherd, had arrived on a flight Monday from Arizona to be united with new owners, but got loose when the owner let him out to relieve himself, the *Detroit Free Press* reported.

Arco bit two Romulus police officers when they attempted to grab him by the collar around 5:30 am near Detroit Metro Airport. One officer required stitches to a bite on his hand.

Animal control officers and police captured the dog Tuesday afternoon using a looped leash. Arco will be quarantined for 10 days at the Romulus Animal Shelter before being released to the new owners.

Arco had been at Rescued Helpers Inc for the past seven months, but founder Nadine Karsevar told the newspaper he was not an aggressive dog.

"He's not vicious," she said. "We have had him at events. We have had him in parades."

Arco was retired because he killed a cat that came into the backyard in Virginia where he worked as a bomb-sniffing dog.

'Spider-Man' producers punch back at Julie Taymor

NEW YORK, 18 Jan—Producers of Broadway's "Spider-Man: Turn Off the Dark" have fired back in their legal fight with one-time director Julie Taymor, claiming the woman who they once called a visionary later failed to fulfill her legal obligations, wrote a "disjointed" and "hallucinogenic" musical, and refused to collaborate on changes when the \$75 million show was in trouble.

In a countersuit filed Tuesday in US District Court for the Southern District of New York against Taymor and her company, LOH Inc, the producers argued that the show "is a success despite Taymor, not because of her."

The lawsuit, which quotes from several private emails from members of the creative team, further exposes the deep rift that has opened between former collaborators who seemed to have reconciled—at least through forced smiles—on the red carpet this summer when the musical finally officially opened.

Taymor, who had been the original "Spider-Man" director and co-book writer, was fired from the musical in March after years of delays, accidents and critical backlash. The show, which features music by U2's Bono and The Edge, opened in November 2010 but spent months in previews before officially opening a few days after the Tony Awards in June.—*Internet*

Stars walk snowy 'white carpet' of Serbian film festival

PARIS, 18 Jan—French screen star Isabelle Huppert was among guests to walk a "white carpet" of snow at Tuesday's opening of the Fifth Kuestendorf film and music festival in Serbia.

The event is organized by Sarajevo-born director Emir Kusturica in Drvengrad, a wooden village he built as a movie set some 250 kilometres (150 miles) southwest of

Belgrade. Huppert, asked to compare the festival with the glamorous red-carpet event in Cannes, told *AFP*: "They are not comparable, that's for sure... but there is a white carpet" of snow in Drvengrad.

"There is a plethora of directors, great directors coming here. From that point of view, they (the festivals) can be compared." Kusturica, a two-time Golden Palm winner,

said the main goal of the festival was to "defend the dignity of author films that are facing the terror of the market" and praised Huppert as "one of the best actresses in the world".

Thierry Fremaux, artistic director of the Cannes film festival, said Kuestendorf was an "unique festival in times when it is difficult to invent a new form of festivity celebrations".—*Internet*



Nadal, Federer advance at Australian Open

MELBOURNE, 18 Jan — Rafael Nadal advanced to the third round of the Australian Open on Wednesday without much trouble from his opponent or his injured right knee. Rival Roger Federer got through without picking up a racket. Nadal beat German veteran Tommy Haas 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 in a 2 1/2-hour match, declaring that the twisted tendon in the heavily taped knee was not a concern.

Just before Federer was due on Hisense Arena, the Swiss found out that his scheduled opponent, Germany's Andreas Beck, had a back injury and had to withdraw. "Now, I'll just take it easy this afternoon and come out tomorrow and hit intensely, and then I'll be ready for the next match," said Federer, a four-time Australian Open winner. Nadal, asked after his match if he would have appreciated the same kind of good fortune, was pragmatic.

"Before the day started, yes," he said, smiling. "Now

that I've played and won, I'm happy. It was a positive match, but not that demanding. We didn't play four hours, five hours. Three sets, so it wasn't that tough." Nadal and Federer could meet in the semifinals next week. Top-seeded Novak Djokovic and fourth-seeded Andy Murray, the threats from the other side of the draw, play their second-rounders Thursday.— *Internet*

Mourinho says nobody plays to lose

Li ends post-Paris slump, into 3rd round at Aussie

MELBOURNE, 18 Jan—Li Na advanced to the third round of the Australian Open with a 6-2, 6-2 win over Olivia Rogowska on Wednesday, her best run at a major since her breakthrough win at the French Open. Li lost last year's Australian Open final to Kim Clijsters but rebounded at the subsequent major at Roland Garros to become the first player from China to win a Grand Slam singles title.

Her form dipped, with

losses in the second round at Wimbledon and the first round at the US Open, until she returned to Australia.

Coming off a run to the final at last week's Sydney International, Li is the first woman into the third round.

changed dramatically since last season started. "This year is much better than last year — more fans come to watch me play, not only from China but all over the world." Clijsters was to play in the following match on Rod Laver. Serena Williams advanced to the second round in a match that finished after midnight, her ankle holding up to its first test since she sprained it in Brisbane two weeks ago.

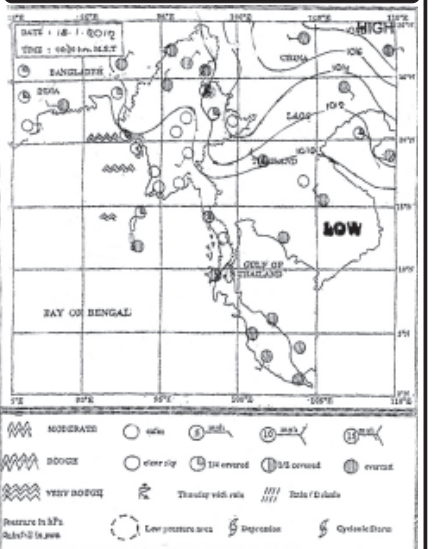

Land management under systematic supervision not to lose actual rights of deserved persons

NAY PYI TAW, 18 Jan—The Nay Pyi Taw Council Land Management Scrutiny Committee held the meeting 4/2012 at the hall of Nay Pyi Taw Council, here, this morning.

The meeting was attended by Chairman of the Committee Member of Nay Pyi Taw Council U Kan Chun and members, departmental officials and township administrators of eight townships in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area.

Today's meeting focused on illegal settlement on farmlands of Meethwayphogon Village and correct resettlement of the people.

The village is located in Shansu Village-tract of Lewe Township. The village is constituted with 17 houses according to the census in 2003 and 20 houses in the 2009 farmland census.

In October 2010, the census was collected again for undertaking the development projects of Nay Pyi Taw. At that time, the village grew up with 145 households of 133 houses.

Among 145 households, a total of 49 households comprising natives and their offspring and those who resettled on their own plots were allotted to 60x60 ft plots in Shwe Ingyin Ward 2 of Dekkhinathiri Township. Nay Pyi Taw Development Committee has given K 18.911 million as compensation for buildings, K 12 million for transport charges and K 2.087 million for perennial crop compensation to them.

Moreover, Nay Pyi Taw DC helped them transport their property to the new places.

It was scrutinized that the remaining households of the village moved from other regions bought the farmlands illegally so that they can get plots as compensation if they were moved from Meethwayphogon Village. The State gives plots, transport charges and compensations to the local people who were moved as necessary and deserved to get the compensations. In addition, the State has met transport costs for illegal settlers enabling them to return to their (See page 10)
