Mitt Romney wins Maine caucuses

WASHINGTON, 12 Feb—The Republican Party in US state of Maine announced on Saturday that former Massachusetts governor Mitt Romney had won the

state's caucuses, giving his campaign a much needed bounce after embarrassing losses earlier this week.

According to state Republican Chairman Charlie Webster, Romney won 2,190 votes, 39 percent in the state's non-binding caucuses, while Texas Congressman Ron Paul, whose campaign has a strong presence in the state, got 1,996 votes, about 36 percent.

Only 194 votes separate the two candidates. Behind the two frontrunners, Rick Santorum, the former Pennsylvania senator, got 18 percent. Newt Gingrich, the former House speaker, got 6 percent.

Maine's caucuses began 4 February and runs throughout the week. But the results announced on

Saturday accounted for just 83 percent of all precincts in the state. Webster said any caucus results that come in after Saturday wouldn't be counted no matter how close the vote turned out to be.

Although the Maine caucuses were non-binding and being described as a "beauty contest," both Romney and Paul badly need a win here. Romney lost Colorado, Missouri and Minnesota earlier this week to Santorum, handing over the political momentum and risks being seen as a fragile frontrunner.

Romney, who originally hadn't scheduled any event, made appearances in Maine earlier in the day, and that might have helped him.

Iran adds two news subs to navy fleet

TEHERAN, 12 Feb—Iran said it has added two light submarines to its navy at a time when the country is threatening to block the strategic Strait of Hormuz.

Rear Adm Habibollah Sayyari said the two Ghadir-class submarines were designed and manufactured by Iranian experts, the *Islamic Republic News Agency* reported.

The 120-ton submarines are extremely maneuverable, well-suited for missions in shallow waters and equipped with at least two torpedo tubes, *RIA Novosti* reported.

The Iranian navy now has 16 of the subs, first commissioned in 2007. Iran has threatened to block the Strait of Hormuz, a critical shipping route for oil, in response to a Western embargo on Iranian oil exports.—Internet

Canada pulls out of NATO surveillance project

OTTAWA, 12 Feb—Canada has decided to pull out of a NATO project that collects strategic information through unmanned aerial vehicles.

"NATO has been informed of these decisions. The details of our withdrawal are still under discussion with NATO," said Kim Tulipan, spokeswoman for the national defence department. The full withdrawal will be effective this spring, she added.

The Alliance Ground Surveillance project was conceived in 1992. Canada signed a memorandum of understanding with 13 other countries, including the US, Germany and Norway, in 2009, *Xinhua* reported on Friday quoting the Canadian Broadcasting Corp.

The programme, with its main operating base in Italy, provides NATO the ability to have "eyes on target" at strategic ranges to help monitor weapons of mass destruction and military force build-ups, evacuation operations, civil unrest and anti-piracy. Meanwhile, Tulipan stressed that Canada's commitment to NATO remains firm.—Internet

Judge killed, four family members injured in E Afghanistan attack

JALALABAD, 12 Feb—Unidentified gunmen shot dead a judge and injured four of his family members Saturday night in an attack in the country's eastern Province of Nangarhar, a district chief said on Sunday.

"Unknown armed men broke into the house of Judge Mohammad Basir in Khogyani District on Saturday night, killing Basir on the spot and injuring four of his family members," administration chief of the district, Mohammad Hassan, told *Xinhua*.

He said Basir was serving

as a judge in neighbouring Kunar Province but was visiting his family in Khogyani District.

The official said the attackers fled the scene, adding the injured included two children and two women.

Motive behind the killing was not known. No group claim responsibility for the attack so far. Civilian casualties have increased for a fifth successive year as a total of 3,021 Afghan civilians were killed in 2011, a 8 percent rise over the same period of 2010, according to a UN annual report released earlier

this month.

The report attributed 77 percent of the civilian deaths last year to the attacks of Taliban militants and other armed groups opposing the Afghan government. Another 14 percent of the deaths were attributed to Afghan and NATO-led forces and 9 percent were unattributed.

Targeted killings of civilians by anti-government militants also increased in 2011, as the UN mission in Afghanistan recorded 495 such killings across the country last year.—Internet

Roadside bomb kills five Afghan police, wounds another

TRINKOT, 12 Feb—Five policemen were killed and another sustained injuries as a roadside bomb struck a police van in Uruzgan Province, 370 km south of Kabul on Friday evening, a police official confirmed on Saturday.

"A mine planted by anti-government militants struck a police vehicle outside provincial capital Trinkot yesterday evening, leaving five policemen dead on the spot," deputy to the provincial police chief Gulab khan told *Xinhua*.

Another police was injured in the incident, he said.

He also blamed the enemies of peace, a term used by Afghan officials against Taliban militants for organizing the attack; but the outfit has yet to make comment.

Car bomb seriously wounds Iraqi police chief

BAGHDAD, 12 Feb—Iraqi officials say a car bomb south of Baghdad has seriously wounded a local police chief. Police officials say Lt Col

Salman Kadhim was badly hurt when the bomb that was hidden in a parked car in the town of Jbala detonated on Saturday. Jbala is about 60

miles (95 kilometres) south of Baghdad.

Two of Kadhim's guards were also wounded in the explosion. A local health official confirmed the injuries.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they are not authorized to talk to the media.

Iraqi security forces have long been targeted by insurgents seeking to highlight instability in the Shiite-dominated government and its efforts to protect people from violence without US help.

Seven militants killed, 18 arrested in Afghanistan

KABUL, 12 Feb—Afghan forces, backed by NATO-led coalition troops, have killed seven armed militants and detained 18 other suspects over the past 24 hours, the Afghan Interior Ministry said on Sunday. "Afghan police, army and coalition forces launched nine joint operations in Kabul, Helmand, Uruzgan, Ghazni, Khost, Paktia and Herat provinces over the past 24 hours," the ministry said in a statement. "As a result of these operations, seven armed militants were killed, two wounded and 18 others were arrested," it said.

The joint forces also seized a handful of weapons in the operations, it said.

US-style alcohol tests to be used for problem drinkers

LONDON, 12 Feb — Problem drinkers in London are to be given American-style sobriety tests aimed at keeping them dry. The pilot scheme has been given the go-ahead by the Ministry of Justice to use a concept copied from South Dakota, US. Those convicted of serious drink-related offences, like assault or criminal damage, will be offered the 24/7 Sobriety Programme as a sentencing option instead of prison. Electronic tags will be used to monitor alcohol in the blood.

It involves technology that has never been used before in the UK. Those behind the scheme say if offenders do not curb their drinking they will receive a short prison sentence. The idea has been criticised both in the UK and the US as being draconian and an ineffective way of treating genuine alcohol issues.

The plan has been supported by the Deputy Mayor of London, Kit Malthouse, who heard about the programme and has been looking at how to adapt it for UK use. — *Internet*

Men can inherit a form of heart disease from father via Y chromosome

LONDON, 12 Feb — Men can inherit heart disease from their father say scientists who have tracked the condition to the Y chromosome that dads pass to sons. By studying the DNA of over 3,000 men they found a particular version of the sex chromosome increases the risk of coronary artery disease by 50%. As many as one in five British men carry this version of Y. And the risk it confers is in addition to other heart risk factors like cholesterol, *The Lancet* reports.

Experts already know that men develop heart disease a decade earlier than women, on average. By the age of 40, the lifetime risk of heart disease is one in two for men and one in three for women. Lifestyle

factors like smoking and blood pressure are important contributors. This latest work suggests the male Y chromosome can also play a role in coronary artery disease — a common form of heart disease that kills thousands each year in the UK. Dr Maciej Tomaszewski, from the University

of Leicester, and colleagues studied 3,233 biologically unrelated British men who were already enrolled in other medical studies investigating heart disease risk. When they carried out genetic tests on the men they found that 90% possessed one of two common versions of Y chromosome — named

haplogroup I and haplogroup R1b1b2. And the risk of coronary artery disease among the men carrying the haplogroup I version was 50% higher than in other men. The scientists say they now need to pinpoint precisely which genes on the Y chromosome are responsible. But they believe they already know how they exert their effect — by upsetting a man's immune system. — *Internet*



Kindergartners who can pay attention may reap benefits later

MONTREAL, 12 Feb — Children who are attentive in kindergarten are likely to have “work-oriented” skills in higher grades, which provides lifelong benefits, according to a new study.

It included more than 1,000 children whose attention skills were assessed in kindergarten.

As they moved from first to sixth grade, the children were rated on how well they worked alone and with others,

their levels of self-control and self-confidence, and their ability to follow directions and rules.

Over time, the children were categorized into three groups: high, medium or low classroom engagement. Boys, aggressive children and children with lower cognitive skills in kindergarten were much more likely to be in the low group, according to the University of Montreal

researchers.”

There are important life risks associated with attention deficits in childhood, which include high-school dropout, unemployment and problematic substance abuse,” study author Linda Pagani said in a university news release.

“Our findings make a compelling case for early identification and treatment of attention problems, as

early remediation represents the least costly form of intervention.” The study was published online recently in the *Journal of Abnormal Child Psychology*.

“For children, the classroom is the workplace, and this is why productive, task-oriented behavior in that context later translates to the labor market,” Pagani said.

Japan's Fanuc to build machine tools factory

TOKYO, 12 Feb — Japan industrial robot maker Fanuc Ltd plans to build a new factory near Tokyo to double its domestic output capacity of machine tools to produce parts of smart phones by the end of the

year, the *Nikkei* financial daily reported on Sunday. Fanuc will boost domestic output aimed at meeting rising global demand for smartphones, the *Nikkei* said.

The company hopes to raise price competitiveness by concentrating its

production operation in Japan, the newspaper said, doubling production of a machine tool that can make frames for smart phones to 5,000 units per month by December, the *Nikkei* reported without citing sources.

British Airways and Virgin Atlantic escape Nigeria fine

LONDON, 12 Feb — Nigerian authorities have thrown out fines totalling \$235m (£149m) against British Airways and Virgin Atlantic. Nigeria's Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) accused the two airlines of overcharging for flights to

the nation and colluding over fares. In November, it fined the carriers, but that punishment has been overturned by a judicial panel set up to review the case.

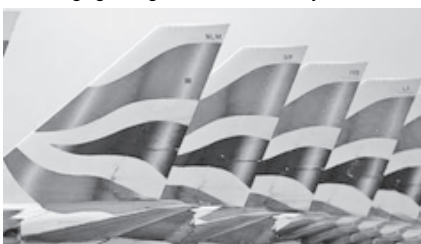
The airlines have denied the allegations. In a statement British Airways said: “We are

pleased that the appeal has been allowed.” “We have been flying there [Nigeria] for more than 75 years and pride ourselves on offering competitive fares, a choice of products and connections to our Nigerian customers.” But the head of Nigeria's CAA, Harold Demuren, said he would pursue the case.

“As far as we are concerned, the two airlines are guilty,” he said.

Under the original punishment, British Airways was due to pay \$135m and Virgin Atlantic \$100m. Under an agreement between the two countries, BA and Virgin share 21 return flights a week from Britain to Nigeria.

Watery alien planets might be stripped dry by gravity

NEW YORK, 12 Feb — Alien planets might experience tidal forces powerful enough to remove all their water, leaving behind hot, dry worlds like Venus, researchers said. These findings might significantly affect searches for habitable exoplanets, scientists explained. Although some planets might dwell in regions around their star friendly enough for life as we know it, they could actually be lifelessly dry

worlds. The tides that we experience on Earth are caused by the gravitational pull of the moon and sun. Our tides are nothing compared to what we see elsewhere in the solar system — the gravitational pull Europa experiences from Jupiter leads to tidal forces roughly 1,000 times stronger than what Earth feels from our moon, flexing and heating Europa. Heat is a major factor in how capable a planet might be of supporting life as

we know it. What scientists call the habitable zone of a star is defined by whether liquid water can survive on its surface, given that life exists virtually wherever there is liquid water on Earth.

NASA eyes plan for deep-space outpost near the moon

HOUSTON, 12 Feb — NASA is pressing forward on assessing the value of a “human-tended waypoint” near the far side of the moon — one that would embrace international partnerships as well as commercial and academic participation, SPACE.com has learned. According to a 3 Feb memo from William Gerstenmaier, NASA’s associate administrator for human exploration and operations, a team is being formed to develop a cohesive plan for exploring a spot in space known as the Earth-moon libration point 2 (EML-2). Libration points, also known as Lagrangian points, are places in space where the combined gravitational pull of two large masses roughly balance each other out, allowing spacecraft to essentially “park” there. A pre-memo NASA appraisal of EML-2, which is near the lunar far side, has spotlighted this destination as the “leading option” for a near-term exploration capability.

EML-2 could serve as a gateway for capability-driven exploration of multiple destinations, such as near-lunar space, asteroids, the moon, the moons of Mars and, ultimately, Mars itself, according to NASA officials. A capabilities-driven NASA architecture is one that should use the agency’s planned heavy-lift rocket, known as the Space Launch System, and the Orion Multi-Purpose Crew Vehicle “as the foundational elements.” — Internet

Future of long-distance love is cool but creepy

NEW YORK, 12 Feb — It’s 2025 and your boyfriend has been temporarily posted to Tokyo, while you’re still stuck in the Boston-Atlanta Metropolitan Axis. How will you keep in touch? Well, maybe hug shirts and larger-than-life videoconferencing will help you out.

As communication technology has improved over time, it’s helped long-distance couples stay in real-time contact and enjoy conversations almost as if they were sitting face to face. There aren’t good studies on whether more people maintain long-distance romantic relationships now than in the past, said Linda Young, a relationship counselor and board member of the Council on Contemporary Families, a nonpartisan, nonprofit group that aims to educate the public about family and relationship science. Young’s anecdotal experience, however, is that there are more separated lovers now. “The impression I get is that yes, it’s true,” she told *InnovationNewsDaily*.

The possible increase in the number of far-flung lovers isn’t just a result of better tech, she said, but also of the poor economy in the US. “Because of job opportunities or lack of opportunities, people are going where they have to go,” she explained. — Internet

Kodak to stop making cameras, digital frames

ROCHESTER, 12 Feb — Picture it: Save for a few disposable point-and-shoots, Kodak is exiting the camera business. Eastman Kodak Co said Thursday that it will stop making digital cameras, pocket video cameras and digital picture frames in a move that marks the end of an era for the beleaguered 132-year-old company.

Founded by George Eastman in 1880, Kodak was known all over the world for iconic cameras such as the Brownie and the Instamatic. For the last few decades, however, the Rochester, New York-based company has struggled. It was battered by Japanese competition in the 1980s, and failed to keep pace with the shift from film to digital technology. The company sought bankruptcy protection from creditors last month in a case that covers \$6.7 billion in debt. It has a year to devise a restructuring plan. Citigroup Inc was approved to lend the company \$650 million to continue operating.

Exiting the digital camera business is especially poignant for the Kodak. In 1975, using an electronic sensor invented six years earlier at Bell Labs, a Kodak engineer named Steven Sasson created the world’s first digital camera. — Internet

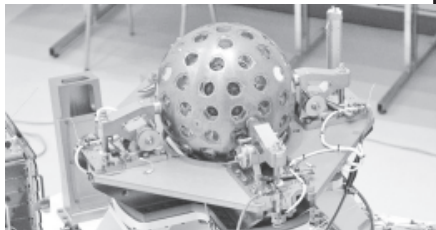
Italian satellite is a laser disco ball for science

WASHINGTON, 12 Feb — If Albert Einstein were alive to witness Italy’s Laser Relativity Satellite (LARES) in action, he might just start dancing. That’s because the tungsten sphere, just over a foot in diameter, is meant to orbit the Earth and help scientists prove part of the genius’s general theory of relativity — by firing lasers at it.

Due to be launched later this month, LARES is covered in 92 reflectors designed to

bounce laser light fired from ground stations back to its origin, thus allowing scientists to measure its precise distance and orbit. Using these measurements, it’s hoped that they’ll see proof that the satellite’s orbit is being altered by a warping of space-time around the Earth as it rotates. This effect is called frame-dragging, and should be present if the concepts of general relativity hold true.

Conclusive proof that



the frame-dragging is taking place may take several years to confirm, as it’s possible for variables such as tall mountain ranges to affect the satellite’s orbit as it passes over them. With an expected accuracy of 99%, however, the LARES will provide

Facebook ‘defriending’ led to double murder in Tennessee

NEW YORK, 12 Feb — As reported by *Reuters* this week, 36-year-old Billy Payne Jr and his 23-year-old girlfriend, Billie Jean Hayworth, were both murdered after removing and blocking a woman previously on their Facebook friend’s list named Jenelle Potter. The parents of an 8-month-old baby boy named Tyler where allegedly shot and killed within their own home by Marvin Enoch “Buddy” Potter Jr, the 60-year-old father of the blocked woman, as well as 38-year-old Jamie Lynn Curd who has a romantic interest in Jenelle Potter. When police discovered the victims, Payne also has his throat slashed open and 8-month-old Tyler was found unharmed laying in the arms of the deceased mother.

When asked how Facebook played a role in the murder, Johnson County Sheriff Mike Reece stated “That’s basically what sparked it. Her life is spent at that computer. She’s had some health problems, and she wasn’t working.” Reece continued “It’s just a senseless thing. She’d been blocked on Facebook by Billy Jean. Once you cross her, it’s a big thing to her father, too. And he’s something to deal with.”

Canada and China deepen trade ties

OTTAWA, 12 Feb — Canada and China have reached government deals in uranium exports and other sectors, as the two countries deepen trade ties. Canada said on Thursday it would allow the sale of uranium to China for energy generation.

Canadian businesses also signed deals with Chinese enterprises worth \$3bn (£1.9bn) in Beijing. Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper's delegation is on a four-day visit to China. The trip is aimed at attracting Chinese investment in Canadian natural resources, as well as shifting the focus of energy sales towards Asia.

Canada is home to one of the largest producers of uranium, Cameco, and the deal announced on Thursday allows it to sell uranium from its Canadian projects into China. "This agreement will help Canadian uranium companies to substantially increase exports to China, the world's fastest growing market for these products," Mr Harper's office said in a statement.

In 2010, Cameco agreed deals with China to supply more than 29 million pounds of uranium over 15 years. "We couldn't deliver Canadian uranium here until this agreement was signed so it

opened the door for us to do that," said Tim Gitzel, chief executive of Cameco, who is part of the trade delegation. China is the world's biggest energy user.— *Internet*

Nigeria recaptures Boko Haram 'Christmas Day bomber'

ABUJA, 12 Feb — A man suspected of masterminding the deadly bombing of a Nigerian church on Christmas Day has been recaptured, Nigeria authorities have said. Officials say the suspect, Kabiru Sokoto, was captured in the eastern state of Taraba. He is accused of being a member of the Islamist sect, Boko Haram, which has said it carried out the attack.

His escape last month was a huge embarrassment for the police, whose head was sacked shortly afterwards. Boko Haram has staged a series of increasingly deadly attacks in recent years—last month 185 people were killed during a series of bombings in Kano. Dozens of people died when a church

on the outskirts of the capital, Abuja, was bombed on Christmas day.

Mr Sokoto was first arrested last month, but escaped the next day while being escorted by police. "He was re-arrested this morning at Mutum Biu in Taraba State by the [secret police]," a security source told *AFP*. "He's being flown to Abuja now by the Nigeria air force."

Authorities say Mr Sokoto planned the 25 December bombing of St Theresa Roman Catholic church in Madalla, just outside Abuja. He fled last month while police took him for a search of his house. Police said their convoy was attacked by suspected Boko Haram members.— *Internet*

Vega rocket set for maiden voyage

PARIS, 12 Feb—Europe's Vega rocket is finally set to make its maiden flight on Monday. The 30m-tall vehicle, first conceived in the 1990s, will launch on what is termed a qualification flight from the Kourou spaceport in French Guiana. It will carry nine satellites into orbit but the object of the mission is really to prove the rocket's systems all work as designed.

Vega has been developed to assure European access to space for payload classes weighing less than 2.5 tonnes. At the moment, these smaller satellites tend to ride converted Russian ICBMs to get into orbit and they can sometimes wait many months to get a launch slot.

Vega should allow European operators to have more control over the schedules of

their space projects. It also means that the value of what it is an immensely high-tech enterprise will return to the European economy, not to foreign industry.

"Vega gives Europe the ability to launch small satellites," said Jean-Jacques Dordain, director general of the European Space Agency (ESA).

"New technologies—and in particular the miniaturisation of technologies—are making for more and more small satellites.

This is particularly true of scientific satellites such as Earth observation spacecraft. So, Vega has a fantastic perspective in front of it provided we succeed," he told me. The launch in French Guiana is scheduled to take place between 10:00 and 12:00 GMT.

Will halt US drone strikes: Imran Khan

ISLAMABAD, 12 Feb—Head of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) party Imran Khan has said his party will stop US drone strikes in the country if it comes to power.

PTI will "free the nation from American slavery and US drones would be shot down", the *Dawn* quoted Khan as saying. It will "not let the US attack Pakistan via drone strikes".

He was speaking at a public rally in Swabi in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province on Friday.

Those in power should be embarrassed about the ongoing drone attacks that violate Pakistan's sovereignty and kill innocent people, he said. Khan declared: "We won't beg, we won't take loans and will generate our own funds."

LOS ANGELES, 12 Feb—Several US Marine snipers in Afghanistan posed for a photo in front of a flag bearing the symbol used by the Nazi SS, the Marine Corps confirmed.

The photograph of the sniper corps team, deployed to Sangin district in southern Afghanistan's Helmand Province in 2010, showed up on the Internet, the *Los Angeles Times* reported.

The Marine Corps said Thursday the Marines, based in Camp Pendleton, Calif, had been assigned to one of its scout sniper teams, the newspaper said. The photograph showed them in front of a US flag with a flag bearing the Nazi SS symbol below.

A statement by Lt Col Stewart Upton said those involved are not currently

part of the unit.

"Those involved acknowledged that the symbol could be misinterpreted and is not in keeping with our Marine Corps ethos and values," the Marine Corps said. Marine officials were quoted as saying those involved were not Nazi sympathizers.

The Military Religious Freedom Foundation has written Marine Corps Commandant Gen James Amos and US Defence Secretary Leon Panetta, urging the photograph be removed from the Internet and those involved in the incident be court-martialed, the *Times* reported.

Col John Guthrie of the 1st Marine Expeditionary Force's office of inspector general said his office became aware of the

photograph in November and got confirmation from a commanding officer in Afghanistan that the personnel were part of the 1st Reconnaissance Battalion out of Camp Pendleton, the *Times* said.

Separately, the Marine Corps is investigating an incident in which a video showed some Marines based at Camp Lejeune, NC, urinating on the dead bodies of Taliban fighters.

Iran, G5+1 talks likely in near future

TEHRAN, 12 Feb—Iranian Foreign Minister Ali-Akbar Salehi said on Friday that it is possible that nuclear talks between Iran and the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council plus Germany (G5+1) are to be held in near future, the official *IRNA* news agency reported. The G5+1 have some ambiguities and Iran is trying to clarify on those ambiguities, Salehi said, according to *IRNA*. But he did not elaborate on the nature of the ambiguities and Iran's mechanisms to solve them.

Salehi said that Iran's chief nuclear negotiator Saeed Jalili's letter to EU Foreign Policy Chief Catherine Ashton has either been sent by now or it is going to be sent, therefore it is expected that the negotiations will be held in the near future, according to the report. Earlier this month, Salehi said that "Preparatory work has been done to go ahead with nuclear talks and consultations are underway to take next steps. I hope negotiations with the G5+1 will be held in the

near future." On 1 Feb, Salehi told the semi-official *Fars* news agency that Iran was ready to resume negotiations with the G5+1 and announced that Tehran would soon send a letter to the six world powers to announce its readiness for talks. "Mr (Saeed) Jalili as Iran's chief nuclear negotiator had earlier announced his readiness to hold talks with the G5+1 and he will announce this once again," Salehi said, adding "We hope that the meeting will be held not in a far future."

Nuclear talks between Iran and the G5+1 in Istanbul in January 2011 failed to reach any agreement as Tehran rejected any notion of suspending enrichment in exchange for trade and technology benefits, as called for by several UN Security Council resolutions passed since 2006. The International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) said, on 1 Feb, that another meeting between the UN nuclear watchdog and Iran over its nuclear programme would take place in Teheran on 21 to 22 Feb.

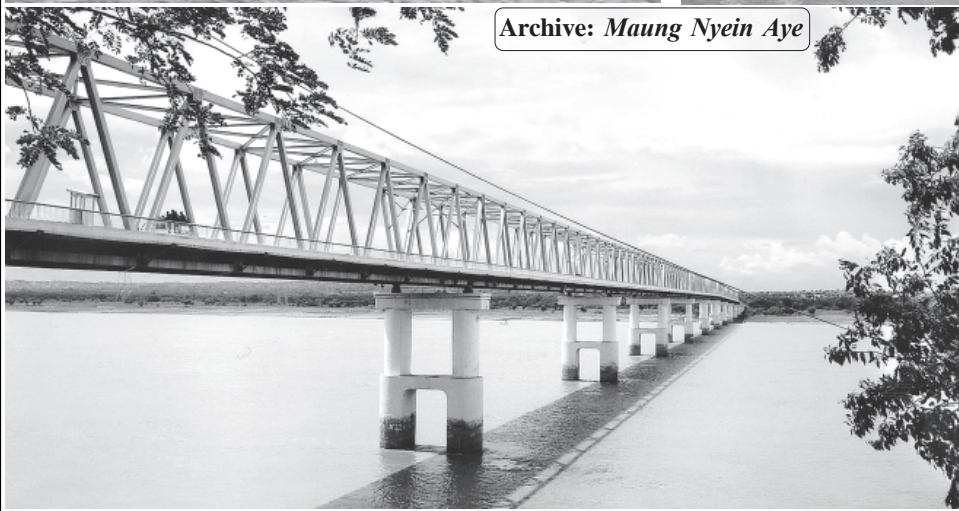

1. The total length of the bridge is 5191 feet with the 4191 foot-long main bridge and the 1000 foot-long approach structure.
2. The upper part of the main bridge is of steel truss type and the lower part is of reinforced concrete piers.
3. The upper part of the approach structure is of reinforced concrete floor and the lower structure is of reinforced concrete piers.
4. It is complete with 28 feet wide motorway flanked by two six feet wide pedestrian lanes. The water clearance of the bridge is 350 feet and it can bear 60 tons of loads.
5. The construction of the bridge started on 26-7-1996 and completed on 10-3-2001.

Russia to suspend children adoption by US citizens

Moscow, 12 Feb—The Russian Foreign Ministry on Saturday signaled that Moscow may temporarily suspend adoption of Russian children by US citizens following a series of mistreatment allegedly committed by American adoptive parents. In a statement posted on its website, the ministry listed a string of cases about US adoptive parents' abuses of Russian children, saying that it is necessary to make some

amendments to Russian laws to introduce stricter criteria for foreign adopters. "Regarding incessant series of crimes in the United States against adopted Russian children, Russian Foreign Ministry believes that the adoption procedures for the US citizens should be suspended until the Russian-US adoption deal, signed on 13 July, 2011, comes into force," the ministry said.—Xinhua

HAVANA, 12 Feb—Former Cuban leader Fidel Castro had a nine-hour meeting on Friday with intellectuals invited to a book fair, the country's official website Cubadebate reported on Saturday. Russian engineer sentenced for spying

MOSCOW, 12 Feb—A Russian engineer convicted of selling the CIA information on testing of strategic missile systems was sentenced in Russia to 13 years in prison for treason.

Lt Col Vladimir Nesterets had worked as a senior testing engineer at Plesetsk Space Centre, used mainly for launches of military satellites and tests of ballistic missiles, *RIA Novosti* reported.

“Nesterets has pleaded guilty on charges of selling information about testing of new Russian strategic missile systems to CIA officers in exchange for money,” the Russian Federal Security Service said in a statement.

Nesterets, sentenced to a high-security prison by a military district court, also was stripped of his rank, the FSB said. *RIA Novosti* said details about the closed-door trial were not available for national security reasons.

President Dmitry Medvedev said on Tuesday Russian

counterintelligence operations exposed 199 foreign spies in 2011. Medvedev did not provide details on the spies' home countries but said some of the agents were Russian nationals.

Nazi surgical set withdrawn from auction

LONDON, 12 Feb—A set of surgical tools once used by a Nazi war criminal was withdrawn a day ahead of its scheduled auction on Saturday following phone and e-mail threats.

The wooden box of tools belonged to Anton Burger, a Major in the German dictator Adolf Hitler's paramilitary organization Schutzstaffel (SS), who worked at the Theresienstadt concentration camp between July 1943 and February 1944, the *Daily Mail* reported.

An estimated 140,000 Jews were held and 33,000 of them killed at the camp and it is believed that the tools were used in the Nazi's brutal experiments on prisoners.

The set was to go under the hammer at Villa Hall Auctions in Bude, Cornwall.

The police said the messages prompted safety concerns for staff and there would be a police presence at the auction even though the controversial lot has been withdrawn.

Disguised as a music box, the set contains instruments that would have been used in amputations, including a saw and scalpels. It belonged to the late Jewish man whose wife is the current owner.

The kit's case contains scissors, scalpels, and saw-like knives. The equipment was originally made for Anton Burger, the commandant of World War II concentration camp Theresienstadt.

'Stolen' \$9m jewels found in drawer

THE HAGUE, 12 Feb—Five years after their disappearance, jewels thought stolen from the wife

of the US ambassador to the Netherlands in 2006 have been found in The Hague. Dawn Arnall realised her 7m euro (£5.9m; \$9.3m) gems were missing months after staying in a Dutch hotel.

Unknown to her, the jewellery had been found and was held for safekeeping by the hotel, *AFP* reports, before being given to an employee as unclaimed.

The employee, assuming the items were costume jewellery, forgot about them. Only after she recently found them in a

drawer and took them to a jeweller for valuation did their true worth emerge.

They were then handed in to police and have since been returned to the US. Mrs Arnall, whose husband Roland was the US ambassador to the country prior to his death in 2008, had received an insurance payout for her loss.

It is not known if the Dutch hotel employee can expect a finder's reward from the insurance company for returning the jewellery.

Local media reported that the hackers claimed to be linked with the international hacker group named "Anonymous," which carried out the attack in protest of Croatian President Ivo Josipovic's supporting for the controversial Anti-

Counterfeiting Trade Agreement (ACTA), the global anti-piracy and anti-counterfeiting agreement. The "Anonymous" threatened to attack again on Saturday. The Presidential Office said it would take necessary steps to protect the website.

Italian small towns cut off, at least 53 killed by cold snap

ROME, 12 Feb—Italy's winter woes continued on Friday when snow fell heavily in much of central and southern Italy, cutting off a number of remote towns, amid forecasts over worsening weather in coming days.

Rome remained on high alert, with schools and public offices closed and snow-removal crews in place, although most of the city endured rain and sleet during the daytime on Friday rather than a repeat of white covering that paralyzed the capital last weekend, according to the ANSA news agency.

Italy's Civil Protection Department, however, warned that snow is expected to continue over the night in Rome. Lots of Romans stocked up on food stuffs on Friday in anticipation of

possible shop closures or shortages, leaving many supermarket shelves empty and prompting price rises.

"There is heavy snow from Emilia Romagna down to the northern part of Calabria," Paola Pagliara of the Civil Protection Department was quoted as saying by ANSA.

The current cold snap has caused at least 53 deaths in Italy since the start of the month, including a 42-year-old homeless Romanian woman who was found frozen to death in Rome on Friday, ANSA reports said.

While forecasts have varied, as much as 30 centimetres of snow were expected to fall in Rome, prompting the mayor to order drivers to put chains on their tires in an effort to thwart a repeat of last week's massive

traffic jams that trapped thousands of motorists for hours.

"Rome is already prepared and we are hoping for the best," said Rome Mayor Gianni Alemanno, who has been sharply criticized for the city's response to roughly two feet of snowfall last week that brought the capital to a standstill for days.

The city has increased its stock of salt and snow plows and recruited more personnel, including inmates from Rome's Rebibbia prison to disperse salt around local government offices at the Capitoline Hill.

According to local media, Rome has redoubled efforts to guarantee continued bus, metro and taxi services and has made more shelter available to the homeless.

LONDON, 12 Feb—The snow that fell in England and Wales overnight will turn to ice later, causing potentially hazardous driving conditions, the Met Office has warned. Snow fell in many areas, while other parts of the UK mainly had rain. Dozens of schools in England closed, including 30 in Staffordshire and Cheshire, one in Wiltshire, four in

Lincolnshire and two in Cambridgeshire. Temperatures will drop to -10C (14F) in rural areas and -4C (25F) in towns on Friday night, said BBC forecasters. The Met Office has issued "yellow" warnings, telling people to "be aware" of ice between 17:00 GMT on Friday and midday on Saturday across England and Wales.

Motorists should be aware that driving conditions could become hazardous, it said.

A "level three" cold weather alert, issued by the Met Office on behalf of the Department of Health, also remains in place for England, telling people to "be prepared" for severe cold weather and icy conditions until Monday morning. The largest amount of snow overnight fell in Lincolnshire, which had up to 8cm (3in), and the coldest temperature, of -7C, was recorded at Houghton Hall in Norfolk.

Mexico marines find 15 bodies in two graves in Veracruz

MEXICO CITY, 12 Feb—A suspected member of Mexico's Zetas drugs gang has led authorities to two graves in Veracruz state holding 15 bodies, the Mexican navy says. Marines unearthed the decomposing corpses on two ranches near the town of Acayucan, in the south of the state.

The suspect gave details of the two sites after being arrested when he tried to evade a military checkpoint. Veracruz has seen a rise in violence in recent months, blamed on feuding between the Zetas and their rivals.

Hundreds of bodies

have been found in mass graves in the last few years, many of them in the northern state of Durango and Tamaulipas.

Marines went to the reported grave sites after a suspect identified as Juan

Francisco Alvarado Martagon gave information to the authorities. Initially 10 bodies were found but officials later said a total of 15 victims had been recovered.

Husband dies soon after wife of 65 years

WESTMONT, 12 Feb—A Pennsylvania husband and wife married more than 65 years died just 88 minutes apart—their granddaughter said they couldn't live apart from each other.

Marjorie Landis, 87, died at Laurelwood Care Centre in Johnstown after a long illness on Monday, and her husband, James Landis, 89, suffered a fatal heart attack 88 minutes later, *The (Johnstown) Tribune Democrat* reported.

When his wife died, James Landis was at her side, the newspaper quotes granddaughter Erin Miller as saying.

"The last thing he said to her was, 'It's OK. I love you. We had many good years together. I will see you real soon,'" Miller said. "I just think he died of a broken heart. I don't think they could have lived apart from each other."

James Landis, who had been an Air Force pilot, met the former Marjorie Engelbach at a Johnstown dance in 1946. He earned an engineering degree and went to work for Bethlehem Steel. She raised the Westmont couple's children, Gary and Gail.

People who knew the couple said they were almost always together, whether bird-watching, playing board games, making Christmas cookies together or taking cruises to Alaska, Hawaii and elsewhere. At church, he was a deacon, and she was a Sunday school teacher. The Rev Douglas Stevens, pastor of Westmont Presbyterian Church, said he had no trouble coming up with a theme for the homily at the couple's funeral.

"I'm going to talk about the bonds of love because that really is what held them together and it was so obvious for all to see," Stevens said. He said they were "inseparable" and one was always talking about the other. "That's the kind of marriage all of us would want to have," Stevens said.—Internet

50,000 people remain stranded in snowbound Serbian villages

BELGRADE, 12 Feb—With the discovery of six bodies on Saturday, the death toll in Serbia climbed to 20 that could be attributed to the freezing temperatures which have gripped the region for more than a month.

Meanwhile an estimated 50,000 people in isolated and remote villages remain cut off despite intensified efforts by the government to clear snow-packed roads, according to local media.

The bodies of four people in the northern Serbian city of Novi Sad were discovered in

unheated homes, the death of a man near Ljig, just south of Belgrade, was attributed to the sub-zero temperatures, while the body of a 68 year-old woman was discovered in a snow bank about 500 meters from her home near Kraljevo.

When the Serbian government announced a state of emergency almost a week ago, an estimated 70,000 people were stranded, mainly in mountainous regions in the south of the country. Since then, roads had been cleared to about 20,000 citizens, leaving an estimated 50,000

Overfishing 'costs EU £2.7bn each year'

LONDON, 12 Feb—Overfishing of EU fisheries is costing £2.7bn (3.2bn euros) a year and 100,000 jobs, a

report has said. The research, by the UK-based New Economics Foundation, said a third of Britain's fish consumption could be met if stocks were allowed to recover. Separate research suggests that half of fishermen would not be willing to give up their livelihoods.

Last week, a report said there were reasons to be optimistic that fisheries could recover from past exploitation. "Overfishing is bad for the economy," said report author Rupert Crilly, environmental economics researcher for the foundation's Ocean2012 initiative. "With the stroke of pen, European fisheries

ministers are wiping out millions of pounds and thousands of jobs each year by allowing overfishing to continue."

The report, *Lost at Sea*, concluded that the restoring 43 of the continent's fish stocks to their "maximum sustainable yield" (largest annual catch that can be maintained over the long-term) would result in an additional 3.5m tonnes of fish reaching markets, "enough to meet the annual demand for almost 160m EU citizens". It added: "Overfishing is the single most destructive force in the marine environment."

Father forces son to run naked in snow

NEW YORK, 12 Feb—A man who made his young son run around and do pushups in the New York City snow in his underwear has incited outrage from people who say he is cruel.

The father, He Liensheng, 44, a Chinese businessman vacationing in New York last month, posted a video of his

son, He Yide, begging him to pick him up, the *New York Post* reported.

Instead of taking his son inside, He urged him to run faster through the snow.

He said he is taking an "eagle dad" approach to raising his son, who was born prematurely with several health problems.

"When the old eagle teaches its young, it takes the young eagles to the cliffside, beats them, and pushes them to teach them to use their wings," He told a Chinese newspaper.

"I believe I am helping my son in this way—to force him to challenge limitations and exceed his own expectations," He said.

Viewers of He's video have voiced concern about his parenting tactics.

"You are torturing your child," one viewer commented on the video.

"Why didn't you run with your son naked too?" said another.

Morocco opens North Africa's biggest car plant

TANGIERS, 12 Feb—The biggest car factory in North Africa has been officially opened in Morocco by the French firm Renault. The plant is in Melloussa, a small town on the Mediterranean near Tangiers, in an area close to Europe which offers tax benefits to manufacturers.

Low-cost cars will be produced under the Dacia brand for emerging markets and Renault executives say up to 10% of the production could be sold locally. It employs about 2,000 local staff and intends to triple production by 2015. The BBC's Nora Fakim in

Tangiers says this could boost staff numbers to 6,000 and create up to 35,000 jobs indirectly.

In recent years, Morocco's economy has been expanding thanks to free trade deals with international partners, but unemployment remains an issue—especially for graduates, who hold weekly protests outside parliament. Morocco's King Mohammed VI attended the inauguration in Melloussa, along with the country's trade minister and the head of Renault.

Secretary George Little said on Friday the defence budget proposals will have a topline request of \$525 billion for fiscal year 2013, set to begin in October, with \$88.4 billion more for overseas contingency operations, mostly in Afghanistan.

Defence Secretary Leon Panetta and Chairman of Joint Chiefs of Staff Martin Dempsey will spend time next week in Congressional testimonies, providing details and answering questions

regarding next year's defence budget after its scheduled rollout next Monday.

The budget is based on a strategy that reflects the \$487 billion spending cuts the Budget Control Act set for defence spending over the next 10 years. It calls for a smaller military, focused away from future protracted ground campaigns and supporting US national security priorities of the Asia-Pacific and the Middle East regions.

Three Gorges Dam to work at full capacity in May

YICHANG, 12 Feb—The Three Gorges Dam, the world's largest hydropower project, will work at full capacity by the end of May, when the last two power units will become operational, Chen Fei, general manager of the China Three Gorges Corporation, said Saturday.

Including the four 700,000-kilowatt power units starting to generate electricity last year, the six units are situated inside the

mountain on the right side of the river bank.

Construction on the underground hydropower station in central China's Hubei Province began in July 2001 to harness the power of the water discharged during flood season on the Yangtze River, China's longest waterway.

The Three Gorges Project, launched in 1993 with a budget equivalent to 22.5 billion US dollars, consists

of a dam, a five-tier ship dock and a total of 32 hydropower turbo-generators.

The 26 generators on the two sides of the dam had gone into operation as of October 2008, with each unit having a generation capacity of 700,000 kw.

The project generates electricity, controls flooding by providing storage space and adjusts shipping capacity on the river. Last year, it generated 78.29 billion

kilowatt-hours of electricity.

It also withstood three major floods last summer, taking the edge off the fierce flows by holding back the majority of the flood water in its reservoir to ease the flood's impact on the river's lower reaches.

The dam reservoir releases water in the dry season to ease droughts, particularly in downstream rice-growing areas.

Puppy rescued from basement drain

Animal rescuers in Detroit said a puppy spent 12 hours stuck in a basement drain before it was rescued.

Kevin Hatman, a spokesman for the Michigan Humane Society, said the group received a call around 8 am Thursday from a homeowner who said the dog, believed to be a dachshund mix about 1-2 months old, apparently crawled into the basement drain sometime Wednesday night and found itself unable to wiggle free, the *Detroit Free Press* reported Friday.

Hatman said Michigan Anti-Cruelty Society rescue crews responded and worked with a plumbing company and Aaron's Excavating Inc of Waterford Township. They dug a 7-foot-deep trench to free the canine, which travelled about 15 feet from the drain opening and became wedged within the pipe that connects to a storm drain line beneath the house.

The spokesman said the puppy was freed around 5:30 pm and was "a little cold, a little hungry but in good condition considering his ordeal."

The women said they have taken DNA tests that determined they were not genetically related to the people they thought to be their parents.

Store shutting down over BBQ smell

The owners of a boutique in a Chicago suburb said they are being forced to close down due to odors from the barbecue restaurant next door.

Honor Lorenzini and Mary Kral, owners of the Urban Sole boutique in La Grange, said they are shutting down the shop, which sells shoes, clothes and accessories, due to the constant odors from the Q BBQ restaurant next door, the *Chicago Sun-Times* reported.

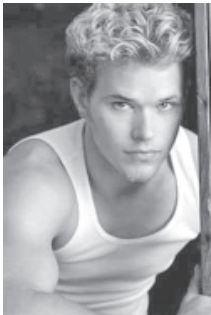
"Everything smells like smoke or barbecue. We can't dry clean clothes before we sell them," Lorenzini said. She said some customers have even returned items as a result of the odor.

Guardiola says Barcelona at Real Madrid's mercy now

BARCELONA, 12 Feb — Barcelona coach Pep Guardiola admitted his side's sinking hopes of hanging onto their La Liga crown were at the mercy of bitter rivals Real Madrid following the shock 3-2 defeat at Osasuna. The loss left Real with the chance to open up a 10-point gap at the top if Jose Mourinho's side beat Levante on Sunday. "Win the title? Well, we will try to defend our Champions League crown and then attempt to negotiate each match in La Liga," said Guardiola on a freezing night in Pamplona. "We will see

what happens. But we are a significant distance behind which I guess will increase on Sunday. The league will be more difficult for us now.

"In the second half tonight we did well on this pitch but we should have done better in the first half. It was hard for us to get into this game but we have to congratulate Osasuna."

The reigning La Liga and Champions League winners have struggled on their travels this season with just four wins and succumbed to their second defeat on Saturday.

MALABO, 12 Feb — Mali beat 10-man Ghana 2-0 Saturday in the third-place match at the African Cup of Nations for its best finish since it lost the 1972 final. Cheick Diabate scored twice for Mali, which avenged its 2-0 defeat to Ghana in the group stage. Ghana ended with successive losses after its surprising loss in the semifinals to Zambia. Diabate pounced on a rebound to put Mali ahead in the 23rd minute and then slid in for the goal that sealed victory with 10 minutes left. Ghana's Isaac Vorsah was ejected in the 64th minute. Four-time champion Ghana has finished third, second and fourth in the last three African Cups and hasn't won the title for 30 years. In Libreville, Gabon, on Sunday, Ivory Coast is favored to win its second African Cup title when it plays Zambia.

KINGSTON, 11 Feb — Jamaican world 100 meters champion Yohan Blake opened his 2012 Olympic season with a lifetime best of 46.49 seconds to finish second in the 400 meters at the Camperdown Classic on Saturday. The man seen as the major challenger to world record holder Usain Bolt's sprint titles at the London Games looked sharp as he shaved three tenths of a second off his three-year-old previous best of 46.80.

He was passed in the last 10 meters by world 4x400 relay bronze medalist Allodin Fothergill who won in 46.28 seconds. "It's a wonderful feeling because as you can see I ran a personal best, so the season is going quite well," Blake told Reuters. "I am much stronger this year and also much faster, running 46.4 in my first outing is wonderful.—INTERNET

Milan go top after come-from-behind win

UDINE, 12 Feb — Youngster Stephan El Shaarawy was the hero as AC Milan hit back from a goal down to beat Udinese 2-1 on Saturday and take over at the top of the Serie A table. The rossoneri leapfrogged Juventus, whose game at Bologna on Sunday night has been called off due to the snow, although they have played two games more than their rivals. Antonio Di Natale had given fourth-placed Udinese, who came into the game unbeaten at home this season, a first half lead but

Maxi Lopez equalised before El Shaarawy snatched the winner five minutes from time.

Milan coach Massimiliano Allegri was understandably delighted with the result, which ended a run of three games without a win, particularly given how the game seemed to be going at half-time. However, he was coy about the significance

this result would have in the title race.

"It was a great game for us, although I don't know whether it will be decisive (in the title)," he said. "Everybody played very well, like Maxi Lopez. He gave us depth and substance in attack and he also scored the equaliser.

US sweeps Federer's Swiss team out of Davis Cup

FRIEBURG, 12 Feb — Given a supremely tough draw in the Davis Cup, the United States is off to an exhilarating start. It swept Roger Federer and Switzerland in the first round, with Mardy Fish and Mike Bryan winning the doubles match on clay, a surface selected by Federer to exploit what was perceived as an American weakness.

But Fish and Bryan, paired for the first time in more than three years, were clearly up for this challenge Saturday before a Swiss crowd that at times turned angry. They defeated Federer and Stanislas Wawrinka, the reigning Olympic champions, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3, 6-3. "This is probably going down as one of the most memorable (wins)," said Bryan, who played on the 2007 winning team.

The doubles victory gave the Americans a 3-0 lead

in the best-of-five, first-round series. Fish and Bryan built on the momentum from Friday's riveting singles matches when John Isner stunned Federer in four sets and Fish outlasted Wawrinka in five. "This was a big step forward for our guys to come in here and play against a team of this caliber," US captain Jim Courier said. "Our attitude remained strong all the while and we were ready for whatever. That is what you need for any road tie."

Handling partisan fans is among those demands, and sections of the crowd of some 7,000 were not pleased in the least when Bryan hit Federer and Wawrinka with volleys at close range. The US will again be on the road for the next round of Davis Cup, an April 6-8 quarterfinal against France or Canada. France leads that match 2-1 in Vancouver British Columbia.—INTERNET

LONDON, 12 Feb—West Bromwich Albion piled on the misery for struggling Wolves as Peter Odemwingie's hat-trick inspired a 5-1 thrashing of their local rivals in the 'Black Country' derby at Molineux on Sunday. Roy Hodgson's team took the lead in the 34th minute when Nigerian striker Odemwingie sent in a tame shot from the edge of the area which trickled through goalkeeper Wayne Hennessey's weak attempted save. Wolves equalised against the run of play through Scotland forward Steven Fletcher, who fired home from just inside the area on the stroke of half-time. Another Hennessey mistake allowed Albion to regain the advantage in the 64th minute.

After Wolves failed to clear a corner, Albion defender Jonas Olsson fired goalwards and Hennessey should have saved easily. Instead he allowed the shot to squirm over the line with Jamie O'Hara slightly obstructing his view. Odemwingie got the third in the 77th minute when he hooked in from close-range and former Wolves midfielder Keith Andrews rubbed salt into the wounds when his shot deflected home in the 85th minute. Odemwingie sealed Albion's biggest win at their hated rivals' home since 1962 as he finished off a flowing counter-attack in the 88th minute. Albion are now eight points clear of the relegation zone, while Wolves slump into the relegation zone, below 17th placed Blackburn on goal difference.—Internet

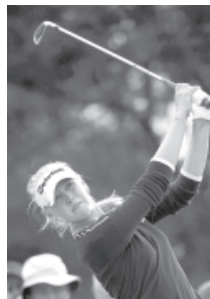

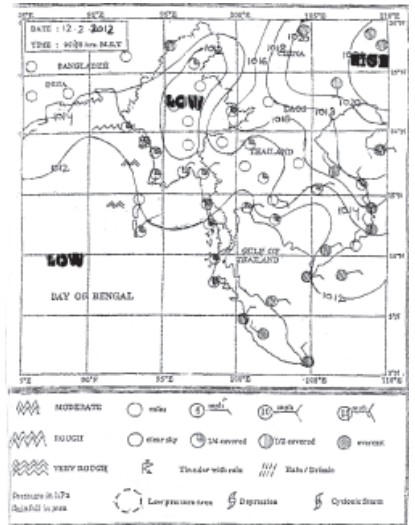
