Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar striving for ensuring comprehensive social protection benefits

NAY PYI TAW, 1 May—A ceremony to mark the Workers' Day-2012 was observed at Myanmar International Convention Centre (MICC) in Zabuthiri Township, Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, at 9 am today, with an opening address by Vice-President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Dr Sai Mauk Kham.

It was attended by Union Ministers, Chairman of Pyithu Hluttaw Peasants, Workers and Youths Affairs Committee and members, Chairman of Amyotha Hluttaw Peasants and Local and Foreign Workers Committee and members, deputy ministers, ambassadors, departmental heads, resident representatives of the United Nations agencies, representatives from labour organizations, employers' organizations and NGOs at home and abroad, prize-winning workers and guests and delegates.

Speaking on the occasion, Vice-President Dr Sai Mauk Kham said: I would like to say I am very pleased and have an honour to be with the representatives from Labour Organizations and Employers' Organizations joining in today's May Day Ceremony. Labour organizations and employers' organizations are partners that have to work hand in hand. Employers have to enable workers to enjoy their rights and benefits and workers also have to make efforts to progressively boost production and services at various factories and establishments in which they are working. The economics of the nation will develop and entire people and all future generations are entitled to enjoy the benefits of social protection.

Generally, social protection is policy adoption required, such as to enable people including workers and employers, to enjoy equitable development, not to encounter uncertain socio-economic lives and to reduce the livelihood of those who are difficult to stand because of their financial condition. Such protection is a key mechanism that could address family income issue, meet a minimum of adequate socio-economic lives for those who are difficult to stand because of their insufficient financial condition, discrimination against gender, age, religion and ethnic groups.

In Myanmar, there are still main challenges to

social protection policy such as unemployment or a collapse of income, income insecurity, or overpriced for household commodities, economic and financial problems, social issues. Besides, problems stemming from natural catastrophes and environmental issues and health incidents are also included.

Although Myanmar has implemented the social security system, it is not a comprehensive one. It offers some types of benefits and its coverage of workers is limited. So, efforts are being made to be able to enact a new

Social Security Law in order to implement a social security system that covers the whole population.

After enactment of this new Social Security Law, all citizens will be able to access better comprehensive social protection benefits. For example, social security benefits such as medical care benefit after retirement, family grant benefit, retirement benefit, survivors' benefit, unemployment benefit, social security housing benefit, and ownership will be enjoyed.

NAY PYI TAW, 1 May— Union Minister for Science and Technology U Aye Myint, accompanied by Deputy Minister for Construction U Soe Tint, inspected the Kyweshin-Panting road section of the Nay Pyi Taw-Taungnyo-Chaungnet-Taungwingyi Road yesterday.

For road safety, the

road section which is 7 miles and two furlongs long is being upgraded to the two lanes road which would be 24ft wide. Upon completion, the road section would link between the Yangon-Nay Pyi Taw-Mandalay Highway and Nay Pyi Taw and would become the main entrance from Mandalay, Magway and Rakhine State.

During the tour, the Union minister and party inspected road works and construction of drains and conduit pipes along the road section.

In the afternoon, they visited Ayeyawady Bridge (Malun) construction project. Ayeyawady Bridge (Malun) is 3215 ft long and it is a rail-cum-road bridge. The iron beams produced by the steel mill under the Myanmar Economic Corporation are used to construct the bridge. The bridge would link the Patheingyi-Pakokku Railroad on the west bank of Ayeyawady River and the Yangon-Pyay-Taung-dwingyi-Bagan-Myingyan Railroad on the east bank of the river. During the visit, the Union minister and party inspected pillars, the approach road on Malun bank and road works. They also inspected the installation of iron beams on the main portion of the bridge.

KIA (Kachin) armed group blasts Myitkyina-Mandalay railroad again

NAY PYI TAW, 1 May— About one and a half miles from Hshamaw railway station on Myitkyina-Mandalay railroad, about two-foot rail tracks and nine sleepers of east and west rail tracks were destroyed in double mine blasts plotted by KIA (Kachin) Armed Group at 1.05 am today.

Fifteen 200-gram TNTs,

13 detonators, six eight-inch tripwires and two intensification explosives were found near the damaged rail track and 18 200-gram TNTs and related items 75 yards from the scene by the officials who deactivated the explosives.

A Kachin national who is in service in Nay Pyi Taw said he doubted whether KIA

are doing the good for the people as they proclaimed because of such destruction of non-military targets and public places—railways, motor roads and bridges—and firing heavy weapons to villages, undermining transportation and socio-economic standards of national people in Kachin State.—MNA

US-Japan alliance cornerstone of security, peace in Asia-Pacific

WASHINGTON, 1 May — US President Barack Obama said on Monday that the US-Japan alliance will remain a cornerstone of peace and security in the Asia-Pacific region. Obama made the remarks at a joint Press conference with visiting Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihiko Noda, during which he announced that the two countries have agreed on a new joint vision that will guide their alliance in the future. "We recognize that the US-Japan alliance will (not only) remain the foundation of the security and prosperity of our two nations, but also a cornerstone of regional peace and security," he said.

He cited the agreement that the two governments reached last week, which will relocate some 9,000 US Marines off Okinawa to Guam and other locations in the Asia-Pacific. "This reflects our effort to modernize America's defence posture in the Asia-Pacific with forces that are more broadly distributed, more flexible and more sustainable," Obama told reporters, adding that it will also reduce the impact on residents of Okinawa. — *Xinhua*

18 Qaeda militants killed in Yemen fighting

ZINJIBAR, 1 May — Fierce clashes killed at least 21 people, including 18 al-Qaeda militants, on Monday near the southern Yemeni town of Loder, which al-Qaeda is trying to capture, a local official said. The other dead were an army officer and two tribal volunteers aiding the military.

The source said the al-Qaeda militants were forced to retreat in the

direction of Amini, 12 kilometres (7.5 miles) south of Loder. Witnesses said the fighting lasted for several hours, and that air force planes had bombed militant positions in the mountains southeast of Loder, from which columns of smoke could be seen rising.

A tank in the hands of the militants, as well as two vehicles mounted with

machineguns and ammunition stocks were destroyed, other sources said. al-Qaeda seized Loder in August 2010, but the army eventually drove it out. Loder lies 150 kilometres northeast of Zinjibar, capital of Abyan Province, which was seized last May by the Partisans of Sharia (Islamic law), an affiliate of al-Qaeda in the Arabic Peninsula. — *Internet*

White powder packages sent to Wells Fargo NYC branches

NEW YORK, 1 May — A rash of incidents on Monday afternoon involving envelopes sent with suspicious white powder had police scrambling around New York City and forced the nation's fourth-biggest bank, Wells Fargo & Co. to shut down five branches around the city. In one of six cases identified by the New York Police Department, the substance turned out to be corn starch, a police spokesman said. The substance has not yet been identified in the remaining five cases, the spokesman said.

The Wells Fargo branches will remain closed pending further investigation by the police, bank spokesman Ansel Martinez said. The branch locations include Third Avenue and 47th Street; Madison Avenue and 34th Street; and Broadway and 85th Street. More than 500 protesters demonstrated at the bank's annual shareholder meeting in San Francisco last week to express anger over foreclosures, executive compensation and corporate taxes. Among other large banks, spokesmen

for Bank of America Corp and JPMorgan Chase & Co said they had not closed any branches on Monday due to suspicious envelopes. A Citigroup spokesman had no immediate comment. According to a website called maydaynyc.org, demonstrations are planned in New York City on Tuesday against "the corporations who rule our city." — *Reuters*

At least eight killed in suicide bombings in Syria's Idlib

DAMASCUS, 1 May — At least eight people were killed, including an officer, and a hundred of others injured when two suicide bombers riding booby-trapped cars blew themselves up in two districts in Syria's northern province of Idlib Monday, state-run SANA news agency reported. SANA said the two

"terrorist" bombings rigged the Hanano Square and the Carlton Street in Idlib, adding that most of the injured were civilians. It said the blasts caused serious damages to near buildings and left two big craters at the scenes, and that two members of the UN observers' teams have patrolled the two sites to get familiar with the traces of the "two terrorists bombings" and the damages caused to residential areas nearby.

One blast targeted a military security compound, while the other hit an aviation intelligence headquarter in Idlib. Unconfirmed report said the blasts, caused by two booby-trapped car, killed the chief of the aviation



intelligence and six other security forces. The information could not be independently verified, but SANA also said an officer was among the killed but did not disclose his position. Meanwhile, a pro-government news website

said at least 52 people were reported to have been killed and wounded in the incidents. It said that the blasts wrecked five surrounding buildings, and even caused damages to places about one kilometre away from the site.

Officials say Iraq violence kills seven

BAGHDAD, 1 May — Violence killed seven people in Iraq on Monday, including a mother and her three children who were stabbed to death in their home and an army major killed by a bomb, officials said. A mother, her 13-year-old boy, and girls aged five and seven were killed in the Baghdad neighbourhood of Kamaliyah after the woman's husband, who works at the ministry of health, left for his office, security and medical officials said.

It was unclear why they were targeted, an interior ministry official said, adding that the killings in the predominantly Shiite neighbourhood did not

appear to have sectarian motives. Just days earlier, a Sunni Muslim mother and her three children were shot dead in an apparent sectarian attack in a village in central Iraq, after twin bombings killed eight people, mostly Shiites. Also in Baghdad, a magnetic "sticky bomb" attached to a car in the commercial Karrada neighbourhood in the centre of the capital killed two people and wounded five others.

The victims were all civilians, security and medical officials said. And another sticky bomb on a car in the Latifiyah, south of Baghdad, killed Major Qais Saadun and wounded two soldiers, the interior ministry official said.

India, Japan hold 6th round of strategic dialogue

NEW DELHI, 1 May — India and Japan have announced fresh dialogue mechanisms for maritime and cyber security during the 6th round of strategic dialogue between the two nations on Monday, local media reported on Tuesday. The meeting was co-chaired by Indian Foreign Minister S M Krishna and his

visiting Japanese counterpart Koichiro Gemba. The two countries said they are preparing for a joint naval exercise off the coast of Japan in June. Indian Navy and Japan Maritime Self-Defence Force will take part in the exercise, said local daily *The Times of India*.

India and Japan also

decided to take forward negotiations on civil nuclear energy cooperation, but Japanese sources later said that there were "certain elements" that needed to be addressed before entering into this partnership, said the report. New Delhi and Tokyo will expand cooperation in counter-piracy operations off

the coast of Somalia and the Gulf of Aden, the newspaper quoted Gemba as saying.

At a joint press conference with Gemba, Krishna said Indian and Japanese governments have instructed "negotiators on the way forward" on civil nuclear talks. Gemba said that he "asked for understanding on Japan's strong desire for nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation" during talks with Krishna. — *Xinhua*

Habitable planets more abundant than stars

SYDNEY, 1 May—Determining the habitability of rocky, earth-like planets will be crucial for us as a species, but the good news is that they are probably more abundant than stars, says a new study.

“Determining whether these planets are habitable has become the new holy grail of astronomy,” said planetary scientist Charley Lineweaver, from the Planetary Science Institute, Australian National University, who led the study.

“The new-found abundance of planets,

combined with the much larger range of inhabited terrestrial environments suggests that habitable planets are common. This increases the probability of finding some kind of extraterrestrial life,” said Lineweaver, the Annual Reviews of Earth and Planetary Sciences reports.

Fellow researcher and doctoral student Aditya Chopra said our best estimates of habitability come from the planet we know best: Earth, according to a statement of Planetary Science Institute.

“By comparing the inhabited and uninhabited regions of Earth, we can identify the most important factors that determine habitability. For terrestrial life, those factors are liquid water, a narrow range of temperature, and an energy source,” he said.

Lineweaver added: “Planetary habitability is a complex and confusing concept that we are only beginning to get our heads around, but as a species that wants to survive, it is in our interest to get our heads around it soon.”—*Internet*

Australia says koalas are threatened

CANBERRA, 1 May—Australian officials say they’ve listed the koala as a threatened species in some parts of the country because of its dwindling population.

Habitat loss, urban expansion, vehicle collisions and disease have made koalas in Queensland, New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory “vulnerable,” Environment Minister Tony Burke said.

The numbers have fallen by as much as 40 percent since 1990 in New South Wales and Queensland, Burke said, and the decision to list the koala “follows a rigorous scientific assessment.”

“We’re talking about a

species that is not only iconic in Australia, but is known worldwide, a species that has taken a massive hit over the

last 20 years and we can’t wait any longer before we turn the corner when the scientists are telling us the evidence is in,” he said.

The listing does not cover all areas of the country, as population numbers for koalas are holding in the states of Victoria and South Australia.

Some conservationists, such as Deborah Tabart from the non-profit Australian Koala Foundation, said the listing of koalas as threatened should have been national, the BBC reported on Monday. “The koala is such an important tourist icon and such an important symbol to Australia,” she said.

Ikea introduces cardboard camera

STOCKHOLM, 1 May—Swedish furniture company Ikea says it’s introducing an eco-friendly camera made mostly of cardboard that can be recycled.

After users have taken 40 photos, the company said, they can dispose of the camera with their other recyclable materials.

The camera, which will not be sold but rather given away in selected Ikea stores, is aimed at getting Ikea customers to share images of their furniture on the chain’s Web site.

The device, which used two AA batteries, can connect to a computer with help of a swing-out USB connector to download its photos.

Offering the camera, dubbed Knappa, was not “a move into selling any digital equipment,” an Ikea spokesman told the BBC.

“It is part of the launch activities for the new furniture collection,” he said.

Ikea has introduced other green initiatives in the past, including installing solar energy panels on one of its stores in California.

Tests of aviation jet biofuel to start

MORRISTOWN, 1 May—US tech firm Honeywell says it is starting one of the aviation industry’s first comprehensive test programmes for aviation biofuel.

Honeywell subsidiary UOP will carry out the programme in cooperation with the National Research Council of Canada and Agrisoma Biosciences, earthteching.com reported on Monday.

Blends of Honeywell green jet fuel will be tested at higher ratios than used in previous demonstration flights, which to date have not exceeded a 50/50 blend

of biofuel and petroleum-based jet fuel.

The biofuel being tested has been produced from a new non-food, industrial oilseed crop produced by Ottawa-based Agrisoma from Brassica carinata, belonging to a family of flowering plants that also includes cabbages and turnips, Honeywell said.

The crop can be raised in semi-arid areas usually not utilized for good crop production, Honeywell said, so it would not compete with food crops for land resources, a common criticism raised by opponents of biofuel source crops.

Since aviation regulators first approved the use of biofuels in commercial flights last summer, several major airlines have conducted trial flights using a mix of petroleum-based fuel and fuel derived from crops.

AeroMexico began using the Honeywell biofuel last November, at an 85 percent petroleum/15 percent biofuel level, on a regular passenger service between Mexico City and San Jose, Costa Rica, one of the first uses of renewable fuels in everyday airplane passenger service.

UK court orders block on Pirate Bay file site

LONDON, 1 May—Britain’s High Court has ruled five of the country’s Internet service providers must block the file-sharing site The Pirate Bay for copyright violations.

The British Phonographic Industry, Britain’s music industry trade group, said that under the court’s order ISPs Sky, Everything Everywhere, TalkTalk, O2, and Virgin Media must block the Web site within the next few weeks, *PC Magazine* reported on Monday.

In July, BPI demanded

The Pirate Bay stop infringing on its members’ content, but got no response. When ISPs refused BPI’s request to act voluntarily, BPI asked the court in December to require blocking.

In February, court decided The Pirate Bay violates copyright regulations, saying the site goes “far beyond merely enabling or assisting.”

This week’s ruling goes one step further by actually requiring ISPs to block The Pirate Bay.

The Web site had not yet

responded to the ruling on its blog or Facebook page, although after the February

the site argued the High Court was corrupt and “technically uneducated.”—*Internet*

Meshing medical records to telemedicine

WASHINGTON, 1 May—Full integration of telemedicine services is an essential element in establishing meaningful use of computerized medical records, US officials say.

Jonathan Linkous, chief executive officer of the American Telemedicine Association, said electronic medical records and related health information technologies lead to greater provider and payer administrative efficiencies. More importantly, electronic medical records are a vehicle for improving healthcare quality, increasing access and reducing costs, Linkous said.

“Electronic records and information technology systems mean little to the healthcare consumer if they aren’t integrated into the delivery of actual patient services,” Linkous said in a statement. “The government has its own definition, but for patients, ‘meaningful use’ means telemedicine.”

A survey of healthcare consumers by Deloitte found 55 percent wanted to communicate with their doctors by e-mail, while 68 percent were interested in remote monitoring devices that allow self-monitoring of their condition and electronic reporting of results to their physician, Linkous said.—*Internet*

Social networking dominates cellphone use

SAN FRANCISCO, 1 May—Social networking has risen to rival gaming as an app category dominating usage of consumers’ cellphone minutes, a US research company says. Mobile analytics firm Flurry, measuring the average time smartphone users spent across app categories in the last year, found gaming dropped by 4 percent — down to 24 minutes per day — while social networking increased by 60 percent — up to 24 minutes per day, Mediapost.com reported.

Games have long dominated smartphone minute use, but that is changing, Flurry found.

“The most significant trend is that for the first time in the history of applications ... another app category is rivaling games,” Peter Farago, vice president of marketing at Flurry, said.

“We take the rise in social networking apps as a signal of maturation for the platform,” he said. “As game demand may be hitting its saturation point, consumers are also discovering other apps — namely social networking.”

Social networking has also surpassed gaming in terms of advertising revenue in apps, Farago said. “This is the first time in Flurry’s history that any category has surpassed games in ad revenue generated,” he said, noting Flurry has been tracking that number since 2008.—*Internet*

Euro zone inflation cools but ECB sees holding rates

BRUSSELS, 1 May—Inflation pressures in the euro zone eased slightly in April from March but were still above expectations, giving the European Central Bank little room to lower interest rates to help revive economic growth across the continent.

Consumer price inflation in the 17 nations sharing the euro moderated to 2.6 percent year-on-year in April from 2.7 percent in March, the EU's statistics office Eurostat said on Monday. Economists polled by *Reuters* had forecast inflation of 2.5 percent.

Euro zone leaders are rallying to a call by ECB President Mario Draghi to reignite the bloc's economy with policies that focus on growth—not just debt and deficit reduction—as the euro zone heads into its second recession in just three years.

But the ECB's strong focus on containing inflation at a time of high world oil prices means politicians cannot expect a rate cut to lower the cost of borrowing any time soon.

While inflation is below last year's peak of 3 percent, economists and the ECB had expected prices to fall steadily as the economy stumbles and to offer some relief to households at a time of rising unemployment and sharp spending cuts.

But the rate of consumer price inflation rose in March

from February and is now only back at February's level, according to Eurostat, driven up by persistent worries of a crude oil supply disruption in the Middle East.

The ECB meets on Thursday for its May rate decision and economists overwhelmingly predict a rate freeze until at least the end of this year, according to a *Reuters* poll.

"We do not expect a significant decision on rates or operations (on Thursday), with the key rate to remain at 1 percent," Barclays Capital said in a note to clients.—*Reuters*

Scientists find new developments to treat heart diseases

SINGAPORE, 1 May—Scientists at Singapore's Institute of Medical Biology (IMB) have made a discovery that could lead to the development of new treatments for heart diseases.

They discovered that they can dramatically increase the life span of mice with progeria premature ageing disease and heart disease caused by Emery-Dreifuss muscular dystrophy by reducing levels of a protein called SUN1.


The IMB, which is a biomedical sciences institute of the Agency for Science, Technology and Research (A*STAR), worked with the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases in the United States and the Institute of Cellular and System Medicine in Taipei.

A*STAR said on Monday that their findings provide an exciting lead into developing new methods to treat premature ageing and heart disease.

The findings were published in the prestigious scientific journal, *Cell*, on 27 April 2012.

Children with progeria suffer symptoms of premature ageing and mostly die in their early teens from either heart attack or stroke.

Individuals with Emery-Dreifuss muscular dystrophy (AD-EDMD) suffer from muscle wasting and cardiomyopathy, a type of heart disease that weakens and enlarges the heart muscle making it harder for the heart to pump blood and deliver it to the rest of the body leading to heart failure.



Both diseases are caused by mutations in Lamin A, a protein in the membrane surrounding a cell's nucleus which provides mechanical support to the nucleus.

SUN1 is a protein also found in the inner nuclear membrane, but there have been no previous studies to show how SUN1 interacts with the Lamin proteins.

The scientists wanted to investigate if SUN1 had any involvement in diseases caused by mutations in Lamin A, so they inactivated SUN1 in mouse models developed for progeria and AD-EDMD.

These mouse models for progeria and AD-EDMD usually thrive poorly and have markedly short life spans.

The mouse models for progeria die from premature ageing and while those for AD-EDMD die of heart failure.

The scientists inactivated SUN1 and reduced SUN1 levels in these mouse models and found that the life spans of the mouse models for progeria doubled while that of AD-EDMD tripled.

Principle Investigator at IMB, Professor Colin Stewart, said the heart muscle of the mice was restored to near-normal function.

He said cardiac function improved when the levels of SUN1 were reduced.

"This opens up a possibility that from these observations, reduction in SUN1 maybe of therapeutic use for other forms of heart disease. We are very excited about this discovery and look forward to further pursuing this lead which could potentially lead to development of new treatments for heart diseases," he said.

Van plunges more than 50 feet from highway near Bronx Zoo, killing seven, police say

NEW YORK, 1 May — A van flew off an elevated portion of New York's Bronx River Parkway on Sunday afternoon, falling more than 50 feet before landing in a horrific crash that left seven people dead, multiple news outlets reported. The accident, near the Bronx Zoo, happened at about 12:30 pm local time, authorities said. It's not clear what caused the crash.

S Ala campus locked down after armed robbery

MOBILE, 1 May—The University of South Alabama locked down its campus for several hours on Sunday following an armed robbery in a college dormitory, but officials say no one was hurt. University spokesman Keith Ayers said Sunday evening that the Mobile campus issued a crime alert to students at about 3:30 pm CDT.

The school used loud speakers, emails and a dial-in phone system to advise

students to seek shelter and stay indoors.

"We did in fact do a campus lockdown," Ayers said. Ayers said officials issued the alert after receiving a report that two armed male suspects robbed students in campus housing. Campus police were "working the case right now," Ayers said.

"It was an armed robbery on campus...No one was hurt," Ayers said he's not aware of any shots having been fired.

As of early Sunday evening, no arrests had been made and the alert remained in effect. Campus police were continuing to investigate.

The school initially posted a crime alert on its website Sunday that said "there have been reports of someone on campus armed with a weapon last seen in the housing area." The alert went on to advise the university community to "remain inside until further notice."

New DNA testing may free convicted Colorado killer

DENVER, 1 May—A man sentenced to life in prison for raping a Colorado woman and strangling her to death with a dog leash could be freed on Monday based on advanced DNA testing that is believed to exonerate him of the crime. Robert "Rider" Dewey, 51, who has been imprisoned since his 1996 conviction, is scheduled to appear before a Colorado judge on Monday in Grand Junction for a post-conviction hearing in his case, according to the county's court docket. The DNA testing, which was requested by Dewey's current lawyer, exonerates him and he is expected to be released from prison, a legal source who said he had seen a memo related to the case told *Reuters* on condition of anonymity.

Local media also reported his release was likely. Dewey was convicted and sentenced to life without parole for the rape and murder of Jacie Taylor, 19, in the western Colorado town of Palisade. Taylor's partially clothed body was found in her bathtub in June 1994. She had been beaten, sexually assaulted and strangled with the leash. Dewey's lawyer, Danyel Joffe, would not comment on what the DNA tests may have revealed ahead of Monday's hearing. She said she submitted the case to the Colorado Justice Review

Project, a programme established in 2009 with a \$1.2 million federal government grant that allows convicted felons to apply for DNA testing in their cases.

The programme is administered by the office of Colorado Attorney General John Suthers, who lauded it as a way for advanced DNA techniques to affirm convictions or clear the innocent. A spokesman for Suthers referred questions about the Dewey case to the Mesa County District Attorney's Office, which couldn't be reached for comment over the weekend. Dewey has maintained his

innocence throughout the case. Questions arose during his trial about whether blood on his shirt belonged to the victim, according to local news accounts. A defence expert disputed the prosecution's contention that the blood matched Taylor's, the reports said. The semen found on the victim did not match Dewey at the time of his conviction, but no other suspect was ever arrested for the crimes.

Under Colorado law, a first-degree murder conviction carries an automatic life sentence without the possibility of parole.— *Reuters*

Mom's stress during pregnancy can affect baby's iron status

WASHINGTON, 1 May—Newborns whose mothers are under stress during the first trimester of pregnancy may be at risk for low iron status, which could lead to physical and mental delays down the road, according to a study

presented on Sunday at the Pediatric Academic Societies annual meeting in Boston. Iron plays an important role in the development of organ systems, especially the brain. Well-known risk factors for poor iron status in infants are maternal iron deficiency, maternal diabetes, smoking during pregnancy, preterm birth, low birthweight and multiple pregnancy.

This study, conducted by researchers from Ashkelon Academic College and Barzilai Medical Centre in Israel and the University of Michigan, is the first in humans to suggest that maternal stress early in pregnancy is another risk factor for low iron status in newborns. Researchers recruited pregnant women who were about to give birth at Barzilai Medical Centre. The first group of women (stress group) lived in an area where there were more than 600 rocket attacks during their first

trimester of pregnancy. The control group lived in the same area and became pregnant three to four months after the rocket attacks ended. Women were questioned briefly at the delivery room reception desk to determine whether they were healthy and without pregnancy complications. Eligible women who agreed to participate in the study were interviewed one or two days after delivery about their background and health during pregnancy. They also filled out questionnaires about depression and anxiety, and rated their stress level during pregnancy. Cord blood was collected from newborns, and serum ferritin (iron) concentrations were measured. Results showed that the 63 babies whose mothers were in the stress group had significantly lower cord-blood ferritin concentrations than the 77 infants in the control group.— *Xinhua*

Hiker survives 4 days in Utah desert without food

CEDAR CITY, 1 May—A hiker who endured four days with a broken leg and no food and shelter in the remote southern Utah high desert says her faith and medical background helped her pull through the ordeal. Victoria Grover, 59, a physician assistant from Wade, Maine, was recovering in a Utah hospital after being rescued on Saturday in a rugged section of Dixie National Forest, north of the town of Escalante. Grover set out on a short day hike on Tuesday from Hell's Backbone Road, and broke her leg on the return hike while jumping off a 4-

foot ledge about two miles from the trailhead. She then holed up along a creek at an elevation of about 4,500 feet.

"I prayed a lot and derived comfort from it," the Mormon church member told reporters on Sunday. "I thought God would do everything possible to help me overcome my stupidity. I learned from my mother that things can always be worse." Grover said while she experienced hunger and severe pain, the worst part of the ordeal was the boredom and freezing nighttime temperatures she confronted. The veteran outdoor enthusiast survived by

sleeping in shade during the day and staying awake while curled up in a poncho at night. The poncho helped save her life by serving as a windbreaker, she said, adding it was the only extra warm clothing she carried.

"The hunger is something that comes in waves. You get hungry and want to eat everything and then it goes away," Grover said. "The worst thing is the cold. It never warmed up except for a few hours in the afternoon." By the final day, she was suffering from hypothermia after shivering uncontrollably for several days.— *Internet*







Creative ideas on display at Maker Carnival

BEIJING, 1 May—Having trouble getting up even when your alarm clock rings? Liu Zhuming's "Angry Beds" alarm clock might be able to give you the jolt you need to get up in the morning. The clock is equipped with a sensor-activated belt that yanks the blanket off the bed after the alarm clock rings, forcing the bed's occupant to rise or go without cover. "I believe products are emotional, and they will get pissed off if you ignore them," joked Liu, an industrial design major at the Central Academy of Fine Arts (CAFA).

Liu's clock is one of many innovative gadgets on display at the 2012 Beijing Maker Carnival, which opened on Saturday at the China Millennium Monument Museum of Digital Arts (CMoDA). The event features more than 50 gadgets invented by 80-plus designers from all over the world, according to Justin Wang, curator of the event and co-founder of Beijing Makerspace (BM), a laboratory for "makers," or technology enthusiasts who enjoy building their own homemade devices. The carnival will be

open to the public until 12 May and visitors will be allowed to try out some of the devices for themselves, Wang said.

Wang's own multi-touch table, a type of "intelligent furniture" featuring touchscreen controls that can be used by several people at once, is also on display at the event. "The carnival serves as an amusement park built by makers for the public. It brings people into the world of makers to brainstorm, to design and to do," said Wang. Thirty to 40 of the devices on display were created by Chinese makers, Wang said.

"China has long been considered to be lacking in innovation, but we actually have many creative ideas. All we need to do is make these ideas reality," he said. Mitch Altman, a renowned hacker and inventor based in San Francisco, said the Beijing Makerspace and Maker Carnival have provided a community for creative people to gather. The carnival has brought China into a worldwide movement of makers and introduced it to hacker culture, he said.—Xinhua

British tea scion hopes India will embrace the bag

NEW DELHI, 1 May—Stephen HB Twining, the 10th-generation descendant of the Twinings tea-making family, is an unimpeachable brand ambassador. It is early afternoon and he is already on his 12th cup of the day. "My usual daily intake is about 15 cups, so I'm a little ahead of myself, but tea drinking is a huge passion with me," he says, sipping a light infusion of green tea in New Delhi. Twining, director of the British company which opened the first tea shop in London over 300 years ago, was in India to promote his range in a country where Twining's buys a lot of tea—but sells very little.

Like every other global company, Twining's is seeking growth from India's

1.2 billion people, whose tastes are becoming more upmarket and sophisticated. "There's huge potential for growth in places like India and China—throughout Asia," Twining says. The easy part in India for Twining, part of the giant Associated British Foods conglomerate, is that people all over the country drink tea every day. The tough part is that teabags, which are Twining's core product, are not used much by Indians, who like their tea boiled loose in a strong, milky brew.

Instead, Twining is aiming at the upper end of the market by packaging each teabag in an air-tight individual envelope to keep the tea fresh for months. At 600 rupees (\$11.40) for a box

of 100 bags, the price of one teabag is roughly equal to that of a freshly-made street-side cup of "chai" served in a small earthenware pot or plastic cup and often spiced

with cardamom or ginger. "We are unabashedly a premium tea and our customers seem to appreciate that fact," Twining says.

TransCanada profit falls; eyes new oil pipeline

CALGARY, 1 May—TransCanada Corp reported a 14 percent drop in quarterly profit on Friday as the natural gas-transport segment of the country's biggest pipeline company was hurt by the depressed state of North America's gas industry.

Chief Executive Russ Girling said the company is looking at several regulatory

and operational measures to deal with pressures on its Canadian gas mainline after an unusually warm winter slashed demand for the fuel, cutting volume on the system to less than half its roughly 6 billion cubic foot a day capacity.

The measures include studying the possibility of taking one of the pipelines on the 14,101 km (8,762

mile) system and changing it into an oil pipeline to transport crude to refineries in Eastern Canada, which now pay a premium for imported crude, Girling said. TransCanada, which decided recently to chop its Canada-Texas Keystone XL oil pipeline into two pieces to get the controversial project started, made the switch to oil from gas for the Canadian portion of the initial Keystone line, which started up in 2010.

"Early days, but the refineries that import crude oil today in Canada are the refiners that are inquiring," he told reporters after the company's annual meeting. "I'm not sure you could touch them all with a new-build pipeline, but certainly there's nothing excluded from the analysis at the current time."

He said the company does not have a timetable or even a potential size for a

new oil route to Eastern Canada, saying different pipe diameters would mean flow rates of as low as 300,000 barrels a day or as high as 800,000.

"It's way too early to talk about timing," Girling said. "Obviously there's technical feasibility, there's regulatory process, there's right-of-way, there's a whole host of things that are way too early for me to predict." TransCanada's rival, Enbridge Inc, is also trying to advance plans to get Western Canadian crude to refineries in the East, by reversing the flow of a pipeline between Montreal and Samia, Ontario. It has met with resistance from environmental groups.

TransCanada has been struggling since the middle of the last decade with falling volumes on its gas mainline, which was the foundation of the company when it was established in the 1950s.

Dentist pulls out all of her ex-boyfriend's teeth after split

VIENNA, 1 May—If you're planning a trip to the dentist, it might not be the wisest decision to make your appointment with the person you just broke up with. A Polish woman is facing three years in prison after she removed all of her ex-boyfriend's teeth during dental surgery just days after their breakup. "I tried to be professional and detach myself from my emotions," Anna Mackowiak, 34, told the *Austrian Times*. "But when I saw him lying there I just thought, 'What a bastard' and decided to take all his teeth out."

Marek Olszewski, 45, reportedly showed up at Mackowiak's dental office complaining of toothache just days after he broke up with her. She then allegedly gave him a "heavy dose" of anesthetic, locked the door and began removing all of his teeth one at a time. "I knew something was wrong because when I woke up I couldn't feel any teeth and my jaw was strapped up with bandages," Olszewski said.

"She told me my mouth was numb and I wouldn't be able to feel anything for a while and that the bandage was there to protect the gums, but that I would need to see a specialist," he said. "I didn't have any reason to doubt her, I mean I thought she was a professional." Adding to his trauma, Olszewski said his new girlfriend has already left him over his now toothless appearance. "And I'm going to have to pay a fortune on getting indents or something," he said. Mackowiak is currently being investigated for medical malpractice.—*Internet*

Tornado injures four in S China

BEIJING, 1 May — Government-led emergency relief efforts are helping a city in Guangdong Province that was hit by a tornado rise from the rubble. A tornado struck Jiangmen on Saturday, injuring four people and damaging more than 100 factories. Twenty-two workshops collapsed, but no deaths have been reported. Two people suffered bone fractures, one person complained of an ear injury and another person's abdomen was pierced by a steel bar. All four were in stable condition after they received medical treatment and

necessary surgery at Wu Yi traditional Chinese medicine hospital and *Xinhui* People's Hospital in Jiangmen. Authorities in the Jiangpeng district have set up a fund of 2 million yuan (\$318,071) to help factories rebuild and resume production.

The district, which has evacuated 50 people, suffered an estimated economic loss of 100 million yuan over an area of 1 square kilometre, *Jiangmen Daily* reported on Monday. Large quantities of fuel worth hundreds of thousands of yuan from Dongrun industrial fuel

company were buried under one of the damaged buildings. Anxious to move the fuel to a safe place, the company asked district officials for help on Sunday. More than 20 employees arrived on Monday morning to help remove the fuel but were turned away, said a company saleswoman surnamed Fan. The 22 workshops in Xinhui District that collapsed during the tornado were razed. The damage was estimated at 15 million yuan. District officials plan to redesign and rebuild the industrial zone. The buildings were too weak to

New Zealand gas research to help farmers' bottom line

WELLINGTON, 1 May—Scientists have long accepted that gas from farm animals is a major factor in climate change, but how do you stop cattle and sheep from doing what comes naturally? That's the question consuming researchers in New Zealand who hope that by measuring every belch and bleat of their sheepish subjects they can come up with a solution. Researcher Peter Janssen says the project, in which the animals are kept in perspex boxes so that their emissions can be measured, has the potential to make a real

difference in the fight against global warming.

"The renewed emphasis on climate change, plus new technologies, have given us hope that we can do something that wasn't possible before," said Janssen, who is working on a vaccine to stop livestock producing methane. Global livestock numbers are being driven higher due to increased demand, particularly for beef and dairy products as a result of human population growth, leading to increases in emission levels. The UN estimates 18 percent of the

global greenhouse gas emissions blamed for climate change come from livestock. But the figure is even higher in New Zealand, where about 35 million sheep and eight



million cows account for half the greenhouse gas emissions in an economy heavily reliant on primary industry.

In a nation which prides itself on its "clean, green" image, New Zealand is keen to minimise the problem and has established a NZ\$50 million (\$41 million) programme aimed at curbing agricultural emissions. "It is probably the largest and certainly the most comprehensive in the world," said Janssen who is the principal investigator at the New Zealand Agricultural Greenhouse Gas Research Centre. The problem is the animals are ruminants, meaning they partially digest

Man arrested for bomb threat hoax at Shanghai airport

SHANGHAI, 1 May — A man who allegedly made a hoax bomb threat at Shanghai Pudong International Airport last Friday was captured in the southwestern Sichuan Province Sunday, local authorities confirmed on Monday.

The airport received an anonymous phone call at 6:30 pm on last Friday saying that a bomb was onboard flight CA406, according to the local police.

Police evacuated the passengers to inspect the plane and later discovered the threat was a hoax and there was no explosive device. The flight, scheduled to take off at 6:30 pm, took off at 11:23 pm after a delay of about 5 hours.

The Shanghai police launched an investigation into the case and eventually detained the suspect, surnamed Pu, in the city of Guangyuan in Sichuan Province Sunday night. Pu confessed he gave false information so as to extort some money, the police said.

As part of the programme, scientists house cattle and sheep in perspex boxes for two days at a time to find why some tend to produce less gas than others and measure how different foods affect gas levels. The centre in the North Island town of Palmerston North uses genome sequencing—determining an animal's hereditary information—to try to minimise the large amounts of methane gas that sheep and cows naturally produce.

The Mandelbaums said they found the snake Sunday behind a computer desk and a Riverside County animal control officer soon arrived to cart the reptile away.

Authorities said the snake was released back into the wild.

Cazes said he initially thought local children were behind the thefts and installed an infrared camera to catch them red-handed, but he was surprised to find the camera instead recorded a local fox walking away with his sporting goods. Cazes said he was surprised to see the fox so interested in the balls while ignoring a nearby henhouse.

'Cancer' turns out to be fruit seed

A Florida woman got some good news when she learned a dark spot on her lung was a seed that had been lodged there for almost 30 years. Blanca Riveron, 62, of Seminole Heights, was convinced she had lung cancer, WTSP-TV in St Petersburg reported. Riveron said her daughter Melody, who lives in Cuba, reminded her on the telephone she inhaled a seed from a fruit called rispero in 1984. Riveron said she could not believe the seed would

still be there after all that time. But she discovered the truth while sitting in a traffic jam when she had a bad coughing fit and the rispero seed came out. The seed also explains why she has suffered from a bad cough for decades that doctors diagnosed as asthma or pneumonia. Riveron's breathing has improved remarkably. "She's even been able to blow up a balloon for my son. She had never been able to do that," another daughter, Dayana Noda, said.

Man dies after bullet in head for 94 years

A California man who lived for 94 years and six months with a bullet in his head has died at the age of 103. William Lawlis Pace, who was certified as a Guinness World Record holder in 2006 when he had lived for 89 years with the bullet in his head, died on Monday at the Covenant Village retirement home in Turlock, *The Modesto Bee* reported on Friday.

Pace said in 2006 the bullet entered his skull when he was accidentally shot by his brother, Marvin, in October 1917. He said doctors decided surgery would be too risky and left the bullet in place. Guinness said Pace, who is survived by two sons, had a final record of 94 years and six months with the bullet in his head.

find no way back in this match. Kompany's strike was the only goal of a fraught, passionate and at times ragged and wild derby that distilled all the unpredictability of a remarkable season into 90 minutes of a match that swung

Madrid was the only club that failed to praise Guardiola's achievement of winning 13 titles in 4 years, with assistant coach Aitor Karanka graciously saying on Friday that the league had existed without Guardiola and would continue to do so when he had gone. When asked about that response, Guardiola showed rather more class.

"What he says is obvious. The league has existed before me and will continue to do so afterwards. Congratulations," he said, before admitting that the result had merely served to put back Madrid's inevitable title celebrations. Tiger says he has fixed Masters swing woes

NEW YORK, 1 May — Tiger Woods said he has solved the swing problems that led to his worst professional Masters finish in a video posted on his website Monday in which he answered questions from fans.

Woods accepted questions on his Twitter and Facebook pages, and answered a select few in a 14-minute video, with one of his responses touching upon the troubles off the tee that doomed his bid at Augusta National three weeks ago.

Woods, a 14-time major

champion chasing the all-time record of 18 majors won by Jack Nicklaus, said he and swing coach Sean Foley have solved his problem entering his start this week at Quail Hollow.

"At the Masters, I was kind of struggling with my ball-striking a little bit," Woods said. "Sean and I fixed it. It had to do with posture. My setup wasn't quite right as well as my takeaway. I just needed to do hundreds of reps. I'm getting dialed in."

Woods, who has not won a major since the 2008 US Open, finished on five-over par 293 to share 40th place at the Masters — his worst pro finish and 72-hole pro score at Augusta National, where he has won four times.

The 36-year-old American said he has changed his swing over the years to ease the strain on his left knee, which has been surgically repaired four times. "Let's just end it at four and have a nice, healthy happy life," Woods said.

LISBON, 1 May—Record-breaking goal-machine Cristiano Ronaldo is at the peak of his career but the world's most expensive player still has one unfulfilled ambition - to win a major international trophy for Portugal.


The 27-year-old Real Madrid forward's trickery, pace and ferocious shots will be highlight for soccer lovers at Euro 2012 where he hopes to captain his country to a long-awaited success.

Like his nemesis, Argentine Lionel Messi of Barcelona, Ronaldo has chronically underperformed at international tournament finals.

His determination to do well will be stronger than ever after Real Madrid's failure in the Champions League this season despite their almost certain title success in La Liga. At Euro 2004, when Portugal still relied on the declining powers of Luis Figo and Rui Costa, Ronaldo came agonisingly close to glory but Greece shocked the hosts in the final.

A young Ronaldo was left in tears and, though he was picked for the team of the tournament, he scored only twice. If that was a personal disappointment, it was deepened in the three major tournaments that followed when he scored just once at

"Octomom" files for bankruptcy in California

Nadya Suleman, 36, gave birth to eight babies as a single mother in 2009. But goodwill turned to anger in the media after it was revealed Suleman had undergone fertility treatments when she already had six children, and questions were raised about her ability to provide for her family. Her children became

only the second set of octuplets known to have survived birth in the United States. Suleman, who lives in the Southern California suburban community of La Habra, has less than \$50,000 in assets and owes between \$500,000 and \$1 million, according to legal papers submitted to US Bankruptcy Court for the Central District of California and posted at entertainment website E! Online. Suleman told ABC News last week that she had received \$4,000 to \$5,000 a month in public assistance.—Reuters

Liverpool swoop for Elm

The Anfield club have reportedly finalised an £8-million deal for Rasmus Elm

LONDON, 1 May—Liverpool have reportedly agreed an £8million deal with AZ Alkmaar for midfielder Rasmus Elm, according to The Sun. Why bigger animals aren't always faster

SCIENCE DAILY, 1 May—New research in the journal *Physiological and Biochemical Zoology* shows why bigger isn't always better when it comes to sprinting speed. "Typically, bigger animals tend to run faster than smaller animals, because they have longer legs," said Christofer J Clemente of Harvard University, who led the research. "But this only works up to a point. The fastest land animal is neither the biggest nor the smallest, but something in between. Think about the size of an elephant, a mouse and a cheetah."



Clemente and his team studied monitor lizards to show that that the same principle applies within species as well as across species, and to identify why this is the case. Because adult monitor lizards vary substantially in size, they are

an ideal species for testing how size affects speed. The researchers timed and photographed monitors ranging from two to 12 pounds, as sprinted across a 45-foot track.

The researchers found that the midsize lizards were fastest and they discovered why. Using high-speed cameras and markers placed at key spots on the lizards' bodies, the researchers created computer models

comparing characteristics of the lizards' running strides.

"We then looked at how the mechanics of the stride changed with body size, and we found that the changes in the stride were consistent with the changes in speed," Clemente said. "Above a certain size, lizards were changing the way they ran, perhaps due to a decreased ability of the bones and muscles to support a larger body mass."—Internet

Arsenal seal deal for 'top-class' Lukas Podolski

LONDON, 1 May—Lukas Podolski is determined to take his second chance at "one of the top clubs in Europe" after it was officially confirmed he would join Arsenal next season.

The worst-kept secret in football was finally out in the open yesterday afternoon as the Gunners and Cologne announced Germany striker Podolski was moving to the Emirates Stadium after this summer's European Championships.

Despite being feted as a world-class talent thanks both to his exploits on the international stage and for his hometown club, Podolski will have a point to prove at Arsenal after flopping in a three-year spell at Bayern Munich.

However, he had no qualms about testing himself at another of Europe's giants, saying: "I'm so happy to be joining Arsenal Football Club

and to play in the Premier League.

"Arsenal is one of the top clubs in Europe, with a huge history. There are many top-quality players at Arsenal and the style of football which

I'm proud to become an Arsenal player and am looking

Wenger said: "We are delighted to secure the deal for Lukas Podolski and see him as an important part of our future."

He is a top-class player, a very good finisher and a proven performer at club and international level."


