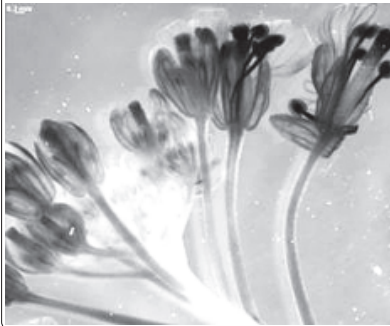

Plant protein discovery could boost bioeconomy



SCIENCE DAILY, 14 May — Research groups from Iowa State University and the Salk Institute for Biological Studies have uncovered the function of three plant proteins, a discovery that could help plant scientists boost seed oil production in crops, thereby benefitting the production of food, biorenewable chemicals and biofuels.

The analysis of gene activity (by the Iowa group) and determination of protein structures (by the Salk group) independently identified in the model plant thale cress

(*Arabidopsis thaliana*) three related proteins that appear to be involved in fatty-acid metabolism. The Iowa and Salk researchers then joined forces to test this hypothesis, demonstrating a role of these proteins in regulating the amounts and types of fatty acids accumulated in plants. The researchers also showed that the action of the proteins is very sensitive to temperature and that this feature may play an important role in how plants mitigate temperature stress using fatty acids.

looming in the region when demand peaks this summer, the central government has been trying to win approval from towns and prefectures that host reactors. All 50 reactors are off-line since the last one shut down for maintenance on 5 May.

Businesses and consumers in Kansai Region, served by Kansai Electric Power Co's Ohi plant in western Japan can be cut electricity use by 20 percent this summer compared to 2010 levels, according to a government draft document released on Monday.

The government will consider whether to issue a mandatory power cut order for corporate users in Kansai, which includes the vast

Osaka metropolitan area, or impose rolling blackouts in several regions, the document also showed.

It will reach a conclusion in about a week.

Mandatory restrictions were imposed in some regions last year after the Fukushima crisis, the worst since the 1986 Chernobyl explosion, with three reactors suffering meltdowns after the plant was hit by a huge earthquake and tsunami.

Kansai Electric's service region, which relied on nuclear power for more than 40 percent of its generation before the Fukushima crisis, may see a 14.9 percent shortage in August, a government panel concluded on Saturday.—Reuters

But further discussion lies ahead before reactors No 3 and No 4 at Kansai Electric Power Co's Ohi plant in western Japan can be reconnected to the grid.

Maybe Europe should abandon euro: Flaherty

OTTAWA, 15 May—If European countries are not prepared to bail out fellow euro zone members, maybe they should just abandon the whole concept of a common currency, Canadian Finance Minister Jim Flaherty said on Monday in some of his most direct remarks on the issue.

"This is a time of crisis in the euro zone. The whole future of the euro zone is up for grabs, and this is very important for many of the euro zone member countries, given the history of Europe in the last 100 years or so," Flaherty told CTV television.

"So they have to show courage. They have to do the

right thing, use some of their taxpayers' money to bail out some of the weaker members of the euro zone—or start moving away from the euro zone and just say this was an experiment that has not worked."

Flaherty, who has been a harsh critic of what he calls European incrementalism, also predicted a disorderly restructuring of the euro zone if Greek voters reject their country's recent bailout.

"If the voters of Greece reject the deal that was signed that involves austerity for the Greek government, which doesn't exist right now, then they will demonstrating a

choice," he said in a separate interview with CBC television. "And that choice to me means that there would have to be some restructuring of the euro zone. We don't exactly know

how that can be accomplished. It's certain to be disorderly. And that's not good for markets. It's not good for the banking system around the world."

He said it was not clear to him that the Spanish and Italian governments would "be able to manage what needs to be done given the unwillingness of many voters to go along with that kind of economic reform."

Canada's banks, budget and economy came through the 2007-09 financial crisis in better shape than those of most other major developed countries, and Flaherty has often been blunt in urging swift and comprehensive action by Europe.—Reuters

IAEA, Iran hold fresh round of nuclear talks in Vienna

VIENNA, 15 May—Senior officials of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) on Monday called on Iran to allow inspectors access to sites, people and documents the agency seeks to address concerns that the country might have been working on nuclear weapons.

Delegates from Iran and the IAEA met at Iran's permanent representative office in Vienna, where the two-day talks were reported to be less about concrete questions regarding Iran's nuclear facilities, and more

about the terms on which the inspectors should be able to work.

IAEA safeguards head Herman Nackaerts said during the talks that inspectors should be allowed to talk with employees of suspected sites and collect information, according to an *Austrian Press Agency (APA) report*.

"It is important for Iran to give free access to people, documents, information and locations," Nackaerts said.

Western countries have long suspected Iran of seeking

nuclear weapons capabilities, an allegation strongly denied by Iranian officials who insist the country's nuclear programme is purely for energy needs and medical research.

One issue figured prominently in recent IAEA-Iran talks is the agency's demand for access to Iran's Parchin military site southeast of Teheran.

An IAEA report on Iranian nuclear issue cited information that Iran had built a large containment chamber at Parchin to conduct high-explosives tests suspected of relating to nuclear weapons research works.

Message on the International day of Families

15 May 2012

This year's International Day of Families highlights the need for work-family balance. The aim is to help workers everywhere provide for their families financially and emotionally, while also contributing to the socio-economic development of their societies.

Current trends underscore the growing importance of work-family policies. These include greater participation by women in the labour market, and growing urbanization and mobility in search for jobs. As families become smaller and generations live apart, extended kin are less available to offer care, and employed parents face rising challenges.

Millions of people around the world lack decent working conditions and the social support to care for their families. Affordable quality childcare is rarely available in developing countries, where many parents are forced to leave their preschool children home alone. Many young children are also left in the care of older siblings who, in turn, are pulled from school.

A number of countries offer generous leave provisions for mothers and fathers. Many more, however, extend few comprehensive benefits in line with international standards. Paternity leave provisions are still rare in the majority of developing countries.

Flexible working arrangements, including staggered working hours, compressed work schedules or telecommuting, are becoming more widely available—but there is much room for improvement everywhere. I am committed to this in our own organization, where we are currently looking at our own arrangements, and seeing what we can do better.

We need to respond to the ever-changing complexities of work and family life. I welcome the establishment of family-friendly workplaces through parental leave provisions, flexible working arrangements and better childcare.

Such policies and programmes are critical to enhancing the work-family balance. These actions can also lead to better working conditions, greater employee health and productivity, and a more concerted focus on gender equality.

Work-family balance policies demonstrate both a government's commitment to the well-being of families and the private sector's commitment to social responsibility.

On this International Day of Families, let us renew our pledge to promote work-family balance for the benefit of families and society at large.—UNIC/Yangon

Hollande to be sworn in as new French president

PARIS, 15 May—Francois Hollande will be sworn in as France's first Socialist president in 17 years in a hurried ceremony on Tuesday before a dash to Berlin to challenge German Chancellor Angela Merkel's focus on austerity policies.

Hollande, whose election comes as the euro zone is teetering back into crisis with fears about Greece's future in the single currency, will give his first presidential news conference in Berlin in the evening, flanked by the centre-right Merkel. His first words as president will be keenly watched by financial markets eager for reassurance that his push to tack pro-growth instruments onto Europe's budget discipline treaty will not sour the start of his relationship with Merkel.

Any indications on initial economic policy moves will also be scrutinized both outside France and inside,

where frustration over rampant unemployment and a sickly economy were key factors behind conservative Nicolas Sarkozy's defeat.

Hollande, who said on the night of his election that the weight of events in Europe forced him to keep his celebrations short, said on Monday he knew he would be judged on how he starts his presidency.

Anxious not to lose the

"Mr Normal" image that appealed to voters tired of his showman predecessor, Hollande has asked for his 10 a.m. (0800 GMT) inauguration ceremony to be kept as low-key as possible.

In a break with tradition, he will invite just three dozen or so personal guests to join some 350 officials at the event and neither his nor his partner Valerie Trierweiler's children will attend.—Reuters

Billions of life bearing planets float in the milky way

LONDON, 15 May—A few hundred thousand billion free-floating life-bearing earth-sized planets may exist in the space between stars in the Milky Way, says a study.

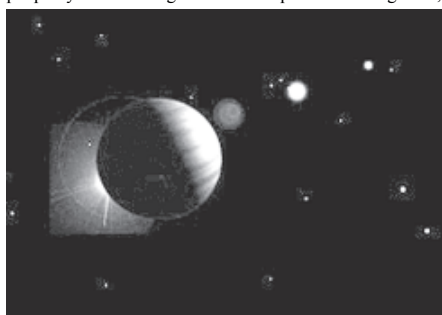
The idea is being propounded by an international team of astronomers led by Chandra Wickramasinghe, professor and director of the Buckingham Centre for Astrobiology at the University of Buckingham.

They have proposed that these life-bearing planets originated in the early universe within a few million years of the Big Bang, and that they make up most of the so-called “missing mass” of galaxies, the journal *Astrophysics and Space Science* reported.

The scientists calculate that such a planetary body

would cross the inner solar system every 25 million years on the average and during each transit, zodiacal dust, including a component of the solar system’s living cells, becomes implanted at its surface.

The free-floating planets would then have the added property of mixing the



products of local biological evolution on a galaxy-wide scale, according to a statement of Buckingham University.

Since 1995, when the first extra solar planet was reported, interest in searching for planets has reached a feverish pitch. The 750 or so detections of exo-planets are all of planets orbiting stars,

and very few, if any, have been deemed potential candidates for life.

The possibility of a much larger number of planets was first suggested in earlier studies where the effects of gravitational lensing of distant quasars (most distant objects) by intervening planet-sized bodies were measured.

Recently several groups of investigators have suggested that a few billion such objects could exist in the galaxy.

Wickramasinghe and team have increased this grand total of planets to a few hundred thousand billion (a few thousand for every Milky Way star) — each one harbouring the legacy of cosmic primordial (beginning) life.—*Internet*

‘Macintosh crashes were Microsoft’s fault’, says Apple co-founder Wozniak

SYDNEY, 15 May—Tech giant Apple’s co-founder Steve Wozniak has said that Microsoft was responsible for Macintosh’s constant programme crashes.

Wozniak, who is in

Australia for a seminar on the company’s business philosophy and the legacy of Steve Jobs, said he had discovered a flaw in Internet Explorer in 1996 that caused programmes in the Macintosh to crash. “Everyone who ran Internet Explorer you would have several crashes, every day,” News.com.au quoted Wozniak, as saying.

“Move something into folder, it would crash, and you’d have to restart. Type something, crash restart,” he said. “Everyone thought it was the OS (Apple’s operating system). I guess it kind of was because it was allowing all this to happen. But in reality it was Microsoft Internet Explorer,” he added.

Wozniak said he found that people who ran Netscape or another programme from Germany called ICAP, never experienced crashes. He, however, acknowledged the fact that once a computer got a bad name, it stayed bad forever.—*Internet*

Low cost metallic paper touchpads ‘offer high-tech functionality’

WASHINGTON, 15 May—Present day computer touchscreens, which are nearly ubiquitous on laptops, tablets and smartphones, are often made of glass or plastic that is heavy, inflexible and even breakable. But now, researchers have devised a way to make computer touch-screens out of paper, which is lightweight, flexible and cheap. Use of paper touchscreens could range from electronic devices to nutritional labels and price tags.

The paper, created by a team of researchers led by Aaron Mazzeo, a mechanical

engineer at Harvard, starts with a process already used to make shiny labels for beer bottles: Paper is coated with a very thin layer of aluminum, which is then covered in a thin film of transparent polymer, *Discovery News* reported.

“We are interested in designing systems that use low cost materials to provide high-tech functionality,” said Mazzeo.

Aluminum conducts electrical charges. Putting two sheets of the metallic paper next to each makes a capacitor, a device that stores an electrical charge. With the help of an external circuit, the metallized

paper becomes a surface that can detect charges. When a person touches the paper layer, the amount of charge in the paper goes up — just like it does on a glass or plastic touchscreen.

To build a keyboard, the researchers used a laser to etch cuts into the metal-coated paper. The paper is fairly cheap, approximately 25 cents per square metre, which implies that a nine-digit keypad the size of those on a calculator could be made for a few cents.

The work has been published in the journal *Advanced Materials*.

Calif bill would protect password privacy

SACRAMENTO, 15 May—California lawmakers say they’re taking action against employers demanding access to Facebook accounts of employees or job applicants.

If a bill in the California Legislature is successful, the state will become the second, after Maryland, to ban the practice of employers asking for access to social media accounts of workers or applicants, ZDNet.com reported on Sunday.

The bill, which was introduced in late February, passed the House unanimously and has now moved onto the Senate floor. Democratic Assembly member Nora Campos of San Jose, the bill’s author, says there must be social media privacy laws to protect employees.

“I am proud to have received this overwhelming show of support for the protection of our privacy rights,” Campos said in a statement. “I look forward to working with the Senate and the governor to ensure that this bill is enacted into law.”

Similar measures are being considered in many other states and lawmakers in the US House and Senate are working on legislation that would ban the practice nationally, the report said.—*Internet*



Colourful birds evolve faster

SYDNEY, 15 May—Researchers have discovered that bird species with multiple plumage evolve into new species faster than those with only one colour form, confirming a 60-year-old evolution theory.

The link between having more than one colour variation

(colour polymorphism) like the iconic red, black or yellow headed Gouldian finches, and the faster evolution of new species was predicted in the 1950s by famous scientist Julian Huxley. The global study used information from birdwatchers and geneticists accumulated over decades and was conducted by University of Melbourne scientists Devi Stuart-Fox and Andrew Huggall (now at Melbourne Museum), the journal *Nature* reported.

By confirming a major theory in evolutionary biology, we are able to understand a lot more about the processes that create biodiversity said Stuart-Fox, zoologist from Melbourne.

“We found that in three families of birds of prey, the hawks and eagles, the owls and the nightjars, the presence of multiple colour forms leads to rapid generation of new

species,” Stuart-Fox said, according to a university statement.

“Well known examples of colour polymorphic species in these families include the Australian grey goshawk which has a grey and pure white form, the North American eastern screech owl and the Antillean nighthawk, each with grey and red forms,” said Stuart-Fox.

“We looked at five bird families with a high proportion of colour

polymorphism and compared their rates of evolution with those with only one colour form,” Stuart-Fox said.

Study co-author Andrew Huggall said: “Using many decades of natural history information and 25 years of genetic sequence information we were able to generate the massive family trees, such as a tree of more than four thousand songbirds, needed to model rates of bird evolution in this study.”

Bacteria seen as biofuel production key

LIVERMORE, 15 May—Understanding the makeup of a bacterium found in the soil of a tropical rainforest may lead to more efficient production of biofuels, US researchers say.

The production of liquid fuels derived from plant biomass offers a promising technology for reducing greenhouse gas emissions and dependence on fossil fuels, but toxic chemicals, especially salty solvents, used in the first steps in the process are often harmful to bacteria then used to break down the biomass, they said. Now scientists led by researchers at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California have discovered how certain bacteria can tolerate those man-made toxic chemicals used in making biofuels. “Discovering microbes naturally tolerant to salty liquids and understanding their mechanisms of tolerance should significantly enhance biofuel production,” Lawrence Livermore’s Michael Thelen said.

Microbes in natural environments such as decomposing forest soils produce highly efficient enzymes to degrade biomass and are often able to adapt to stressful changes in their environment, the researchers found. The researchers focused on enterobacter lignolyticus strain SCF1, a bacterium that can degrade biomass, and found SCF1 grows well in the presence of relatively high concentrations of the salty liquids used in a pretreatment step in biofuel production. “Vigorous efforts to discover and analyze micro-organisms with properties similar to those of SCF1 have the potential to greatly benefit industrial processes,” Thelen said.—*Internet*

Fat turns into flab three hours after big meal

LONDON, 15 May—An average person can virtually add two to three teaspoons of fat to his or her waistline in a matter of hours after eating. Fat from meals eaten later in the day is more likely to be stored around the middle.

The finding that it is possible to 'become fat' within three hours contradicts the widely-held belief that weight gain is gradual. It had been thought that fat from food was transported from the gut into the blood, where it could be used by the muscles as needed.

Any excess was thought to be slowly removed and stored in the fatty, or adipose, tissue around the waist, hips and legs. However, the Oxford University research suggests a more complex - and rapid - process, the *Daily*

Mail reports.

In the experiments, volunteers ate fat which could be traced around the body. This was found to take around an hour to be broken down in the gut and then enter the bloodstream as tiny droplets.

The droplets are then whisked around the body — but not for long — before they are 'caught' and stored. "The process is very fast," said Fredrik Karpe, professor of metabolic medicine at Oxford. "The cells in the adipose tissue around the waist catch the fat droplets as the blood carries them and incorporates them into the cells for storage."

Only a small amount of the fat found in breakfast takes this route. But, by dinner, the amount rises to

half.

This is due to hormonal changes that occur later in the day which make it easier for the stores in the waistline to trap passing fat droplets. In a dinner with 0 grams of fat, two to three teaspoons will quickly gather around the waist.

The good news is the storage system is temporary, with the fat deposited quickly drawn on, or mobilised, to feed our muscles. But when we overeat, it is a different story, Karpe warns.

"If you eat too much, you don't get into this phase of starting to mobilise it," he said. "There will just be constant accumulation and you will start to put on weight," concluded Karpe.

Fruit and veggies can help protect against cancer risk

LONDON, 15 May—Millions of people do not eat enough fruit and vegetables putting themselves at risk of cancer, a new survey has revealed.

Only one in five people in Britain consumes the recommended five portions a day, according to the research carried out for the World cancer research Fund.

"A diet based on plant foods, such as wholegrains and pulses as well as fruit and vegetables, can reduce cancer

risk as research shows they protect against a range of cancers. Recent research has confirmed that foods containing fibre reduce the risk of bowel cancer," the *Daily Express* quoted Kate Mendoza of the fund as saying.

The YouGov survey of 2,128 adults was commissioned by the charity to coincide with cancer Prevention Week.

It found that only 22 percent of the British adult

population consume five or more portions a day while only 17 percent of lower income households get the right amount.

Fruit and vegetable consumption levels were lowest in the north of England, where just 18 percent said that they had five or more portions daily.

Highest levels of consumption were in the south where 26 percent said they ate at least five portions.

Vitamin K2 found promising in Parkinson's treatment

BRUSSELS, 15 May—Vitamin K2 has shown promise in the treatment of Parkinson's, a condition characterised by lack of movement, tremors and muscle stiffness. Using vitamin K2, Patrik Verstreken, from the Flanders Institute for Biotechnology (VIB) and colleagues from Northern Illinois University, succeeded in undoing the effect of one of the genetic defects that leads to Parkinson's.

"It appears from our research that—ministering vitamin K2 could possibly help patients with Parkinson's. However, more work needs to be done to understand this better," adds Verstreken, the journal *Science* reports.

Mitochondria at the heart of each cell is the source of energy for cellular activities and their movements. They generate this fuel by transporting electrons, according to a VIB statement.

In Parkinson's patients, the activity of mitochondria and the transport of electrons suffer a disruption, which slows down the process of producing sufficient energy for the cell. Consequently, certain neurons or brain cells start dying off, disrupting

communication between them, which produce typical Parkinson's symptoms - lack of movement, tremors and muscle stiffness.

One of the genetic mutations found in Parkinson's patients, includes the so-called PINK1. Researchers also found it in fruitflies. Mitochondria in these insects were just as defective as in Parkinson's

patients, rendering them too powerless to fly.

But once they were administered vitamin K2, the energy production in their mitochondria normalised and they were able to fly. The energy production was restored because the vitamin K2 had improved electron transport in the mitochondria. This in turn led to improved energy production.—*Internet*

Nine killed in police, armed robbers gun battle in southwestern Nigeria

ASABA, 15 May—At least nine persons were confirmed dead on Monday after unknown gunmen attacked a police vehicle in Nigeria's southwestern Delta State.

State police spokesperson Charles Muka told reporters in Asaba, the state capital, that the divisional police officer for Abraka in Delta, Steve Chigbufue, and

four other policemen were among the victims.

The police, however, shot dead five members of the gang, suspected to be armed robbers in a counter-attack, he added.

Muka told reporters that the policemen were killed on their way to the state police command for a meeting.

According to him, the deceased ran into the

suspects who were on an anti-robbery operation at Igbodo and were killed on the spot by the gang.

The police spokesperson said the gang had earlier attacked a commercial bank and that the police had to send for reinforcement from Asaba before killing five of the suspected armed robbers in a shoot out.

Putin ally maneuvering for power in Medvedev government

With just a week to go until expiry of a deadline to form a new government following Putin's swearing in for a third Kremlin term on 7 May, the shape of the next government remains unclear.

First Deputy Prime Minister Igor Shuvalov stepped into the vacuum by calling in a high-profile newspaper interview for privatization and pro-growth spending policies, while slamming as "open hypocrisy" reports critical of his family's dealings.

"We need to cut state property in the economy by half," Shuvalov told the Vedomosti daily in an

interview that gave him a platform to expound on economic policy and to field softball questions on a series of lucrative investments by his wife.

Shuvalov, 45, came under pressure in March from reports in the Western Press that his wife, Olga, had netted over \$100 million from a series of investment deals involving Russian billionaires.

He has admitted the deals but said they were all legal and did not pose any conflict of interests.

"You can be sure that in all my years of government service I have not allowed a conflict of interests to arise,"

Shuvalov said, adding that reports suggesting otherwise amounted to "open hypocrisy".

Shuvalov was a key player in the outgoing government, coordinating economic policy and leading Russia's talks on joining the World Trade Organization, which were finally wrapped up at the end of last year.

"We would see it (his appointment) as reinforcement of Shuvalov's position, placing him in the role of Putin's representative in the new cabinet," said Alfa Bank chief economist Natalya Orlova.

MOSCOW, 15 May—A close ally of President Vladimir Putin staked a claim on Monday to stay on as the Russian government's No 2, signaling continuity on economic policy and potentially weakening Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev's future role.

Northern AZ wildfire grows, prompts evacuations

CROWN KING, 15 May—Firefighters continued to battle a wildfire on Monday in northern Arizona that has forced residents from their homes in the historic mining town of Crown King just weeks ahead of the busy tourist season.

The fire began on private land on Sunday and has burned about 2 square miles as of Monday afternoon, with zero containment. The 1,300-acre, human-caused blaze already has destroyed two buildings and one trailer, Prescott National Forest spokeswoman Debbie Maneely said.

The Crown King area remained under a mandatory evacuation order, though authorities said most of the town's 350 residents had chosen to stay in the community of mostly summer homes.

Maneely said most residents likely were staying with family and friends. An American Red Cross shelter in Mayer, which is about 24 miles north, had several evacuees, but they had left. Meanwhile, a fire south of Payson was 5 percent contained by Monday evening after charring nearly 5 square miles in the Tonto National Forest. Authorities have yet to determine a cause. The fire, and several others burning in

Arizona, follow a warning from state land managers that hot temperatures and dry vegetation have created a very high fire risk in some areas.

Crown King is a popular destination for all-terrain vehicles because of its numerous hills and gorges. It is located in the mountains more than 85 miles north of Phoenix.—Internet

Five dead, dozens wounded in Lebanon clashes

TRIPOLI, 15 May—Five people were killed and more than 70 wounded in clashes between Alawite supporters of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad and Sunni Muslims in the Lebanese city of Tripoli, medical sources said on Monday.

Fierce clashes shook the northern port city overnight and sporadic fighting continued on Monday, as fighters holed up in bullet-scarred buildings fired machineguns and rocket

propelled grenades.

Tension between the Alawite and Sunni communities in Tripoli has been fuelled by the unrest in neighbouring Syria where Assad seeks to crush a 14-month-old revolt that began with largely peaceful protests but has become increasingly militarized.

Assad is from the Alawite sect, an offshoot of Shi'ite Islam whereas the revolt has been led by the majority Sunni Muslims.

A small Alawite minority is concentrated in Tripoli, a conservative Sunni City where many residents have been enraged by the Syrian government's crackdown.

Clashes began late on Saturday and three people were killed at the weekend in the city's Alawite enclave and surrounding Sunni Muslim neighbourhoods.

The fighting in Tripoli, 70 km (43 miles) from Beirut, highlights how sectarian tensions in Syria can spill

into Lebanon. Buildings in the area are still riddled with bullet holes from similar clashes earlier in the year.

Islamist groups and officials were meeting in Tripoli on Monday to try to solve the crisis.

"So far there is no agreement to deploy the army. They are afraid of creating another conflict between the army and the fighters," said one cleric at the meeting, who asked not to be named. "I'm worried the problems here in Tripoli will only spread until they agree on doing something."

Mexico massacre highlights unknown drug war victims

MONTERREY, 15 May—Even if someone had not chopped the heads, hands and feet off the victims first, the chances of investigators identifying the 49 bodies dumped on a road in northern Mexico this weekend would have been far from certain. Catching the killers may prove an even harder task.

More than 8,000 corpses left across Mexico since 2006 have not been identified, according to the National Human Rights Commission, a government-run body.

At the same time, more than 5,000 people who have disappeared during the drug violence sweeping the country have never been tracked down, according to the commission.

The failure to find and identify victims of massacres and murders has spurred criticism of the war on drug gangs waged by President Felipe Calderon since he took office in late 2006.

The thousands of grieving families searching for lost loved-ones are also likely to haunt Calderon's successor, who will be chosen in presidential elections on 1 July.

"When you can't find your family member it completely destroys you," said Irma Hidalgo, whose 18-year old son was dragged from her home in Monterrey in 2011. "We just want to know if he is alive - or if not, then lay him to rest."

Hidalgo immediately called the Monterrey morgue following the discovery of the pile of dead outside the city on Sunday, but police told her not to come in because they said the bodies were so badly mutilated they were only identifiable with DNA. She has already given her DNA samples to state and federal police and is assured they will be compared with the victims.—Reuters

Blast kills nine in Afghan north

KABUL, 15 May—Explosives planted on a bicycle killed nine people in the relatively peaceful Faryab Province of northern Afghanistan on Monday, including a provincial council member, police said, amid an increase in violence across the country. The attack came a day after gunmen shot dead a top Afghan peace negotiator in the Capital Kabul, dealing another blow to the country's attempts to negotiate a deal with the Taliban as a means to ending the war. The Taliban denied involvement.

Police said the remote-controlled bomb killed eight civilians and council member Amanullah Shahabzai as they sat in front of a pharmacy in the Ghormach District of Faryab.

Compared with Afghanistan's restive south, where Taliban militants hold large sway and enjoy enormous popular support, the north has seen relatively little violence in the NATO-led war, which just entered its 11th year.

Afghan security officials have said they expect this year's summer fighting season to be particularly bloody as the third phase of a security handover from NATO to Afghan forces gets underway. NATO combat troops plan to leave by end-2014.—Reuters

The second round of the championship will continue tomorrow morning. The fourth and final round will be held at the same venue in conjunction with the prize presentation ceremony.—MNA

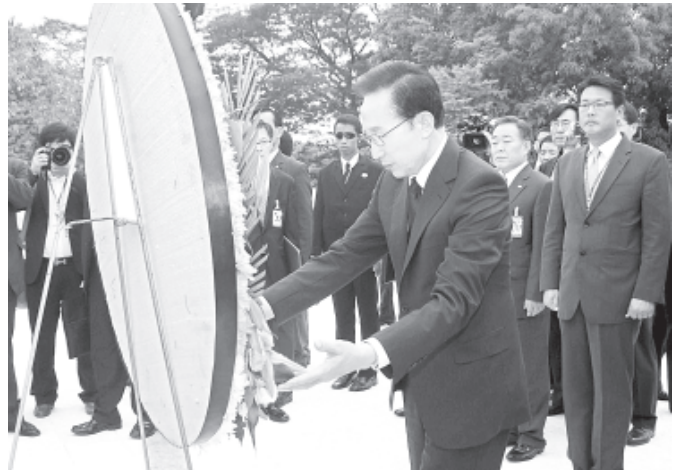

According to investigations, Than Ko Oo, a native of Petpye Village in Mawlamyinegyun Township, dropped out of Affiliated Basic Education High School of the village while in eighth standard. After the demise of his father and mother in 2008, he lived on odd jobs in Yangon a year later.

He was a teacher at the school of Save The Children

in Hlaingbon Village in 2010. He then went to Mae Sot of Thailand during August of the same year and worked on a fishing boat for a month. Then, he fled to Bangkok and arrived at Maetaw Clinic. After establishing connection with ABSDF, he completed small weapon and explosion courses. He arrived at Daungmin camp, a base of ABSDF, in October, 2011, and traveled on Theinzayat-Hpa-an-Yangon-Myanaung route from 28 to 30 October to observe the route for explosion under instructions of Lieutenant Khin Kyaw of ABSDF who instructed him to blow up government buildings in Ayeyawady on 6 November, providing him with nine grenades, six walkie-talkies, six grey packages for installation of grenades and communication equipments and K 0.1 million.

On 18 November, he arrived at Myanaung via Yangon as he traveled along

Theinzayat-Hpa-an-Myanaung from Daungmin station. On 19 November, he approached USDP Office and left the activated mine with the walkie-talkie and the timer near its fence. He then exploded the mine on 20 November with remote system. He then hid four remaining mine packages in dump at the back of Ngarmyethnar Monastery in Hinthada where he rushed by train and left for Mae Sot.

While he was in Mae Sot ABSDF Office, a man called Sonny visited him and sent him back to Hinthada with Baht 4000 to blast other government offices as he was not satisfied with no-casualty explosion in Myanaung. He left Mae Sot on 3 March for Yangon and then proceeded to Hinthada. He took mines hidden in the monastery and planted three activated mines near Hinthada GAD Office. He blasted a mine in front of the office at 10 am on 6 March and did nothing with two others. He then returned to Mae Sot and lived there at ABSDF Office.

Acting on Than Ko Oo's admissions on 12 May that a mine hidden between the water closet and septic tank in the backyard of Dhamma Beikman Dhammayon of Phayagyi Monastery of Phayagyi ward in Hinthada, a grenade, a sheet of low-grade gunpowder, a walkie-talkie, a detonator and related materials were seized.

The bomber is still under investigation and measures are being taken to arrest related culprits.—MNA

Indonesian airlines Sky Aviation delays its Sukhoi plane order

JAKARTA, 15 May— Following the *Sukhoi Superjet 100* airliner's crash, an official from the Indonesian carrier PT Sky Aviation affirmed on Tuesday that the company will re-evaluate its contract with Sukhoi Civil Aircraft over the purchase of 12 airplanes, local media reported.

Sky Aviation's safety manager, Sukanto, said on Tuesday that the accident had triggered the company to delay the delivery of the ordered aircraft.

"We will wait for the results of the ongoing investigation into the cause of the accident before we take the next step," he said as quoted by the Kompas.com.

According to Sukanto, officials from the National Transportation Safety Committee (KNKT) have confirmed that the air crash investigation would take one year to complete.

Earlier, an official statement from the Russian Embassy in Jakarta confirmed that the contract was signed

during the International Aviation and Space Salon MAKS-2011 in Zhukovsky, Russia, on 16 Aug. 2011. The contract was valued 380.4 million US dollars.

Last week, an executive at Indonesian domestic carrier PT Kartika Airlines said that the delivery of 30 Russian *Sukhoi Superjet 100* aircraft that this company had ordered would also likely be delayed following the plane crash.

Another Indonesian carrier, Queen Air, which has ordered six *Sukhoi Superjet*

100 aircraft, has yet to confirm whether they will cancel their order.

A *Sukhoi Superjet 100* jetliner crashed during a promotion flight in the slope of Mt Salak, West Java, on 9 May, to demonstrate its airworthiness to potential Indonesian customers, killing all the 45 people on board. It is the first deadly accident since the introduction of the Russian iconic passenger plane into the southeast Asian country. *Xinhua*

Employment to rise for first time in a year — poll

LONDON, 15 May— Employers plan to increase staffing for the first time in a year, a survey showed on Monday, raising hopes that higher employment may boost morale and consumer spending.

However, the Chartered Institute of Personnel and Development (CIPD), which commissions the quarterly poll, warned that a

"zigzagging economic backdrop" could make it hard to sustain any short-term recovery in the labour market.

"News of a double-dip recession may cause some employers to reassess current staffing levels, especially while labour costs are rising and productivity is falling," said Gerwyn Davies, public policy adviser at the CIPD. "The current economic

situation facing recruiters looks unusually difficult to read, which may lead to swings in confidence for the rest of the year... compared to the slow, gradual rise in unemployment recorded during the past year."

The survey of more than 1,000 employers in private, public and voluntary organisations was carried out by YouGov between 28 February and 26 March, before official data in April showed that Britain's economy had unexpectedly slipped into its second recession since the financial crisis began.

The CIPD net employment balance, measuring the difference between the share of employers that intend to increase their workforce and those that plan to reduce it in the second quarter, jumped to +6 from -8 for the previous three months.— *Reuters*

EU to lodge suit against Argentina with WTO

MADRID, 15 May—The European Union has agreed to file a trade suit against Argentina's import restrictions with the World Trade Organization (WTO), a senior Spanish government source said on Monday.

The suit is not directly linked to Argentine President Cristina Fernandez's decision to seize control of its biggest oil company, YPF, a subsidiary of Spain's Repsol.

But the move last month played a role in the EU's decision, the source told *Reuters*.

"The European Union has decided to file a complaint (with the WTO) which will mean, if the EU wins, very serious trade sanctions for Argentina," the source said.

"The EU's decisions follow from all the non-fulfillments which Argentina has built

up before the WTO. The Repsol problem has really just been the straw that broke the camel's back."

The complaint will be lodged with the WTO within the next few days, the source said. A spokesman for EU trade commissioner Karel de Gucht could not immediately be reached for comment.

The issue prompted a war of words between the South American country and at least 14 of its trading partners in recent weeks.

US Ambassador to the WTO Michael Punke led the criticism at a 30 March meeting of the WTO's Goods Council, where he said Argentina had put a blanket restriction on trade by requiring import licenses on all imported goods from 1 Feb this year. *Reuters*

Trilateral deal could balance agro trade

BEIJING, 15 May—China will work to strike a balance in its agricultural trade with Japan and South Korea by providing reasonably priced agricultural products as a long-discussed free trade agreement among the three countries is poised to come into existence, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

"China won't comprehensively charge high prices for its agricultural products when they enter Japanese and South Korean markets following the establishment

of a trilateral free trade agreement," said Sun Yuanjiang, deputy director-general of the international department of the ministry.

China, Japan and South Korea, East Asia's three leading economies, agreed on Sunday at a Beijing summit to start talking about forming a free trade agreement this year.

Sun, who is also the chief Chinese negotiator for the agreement, said Japan and South Korea overprotect their own agricultural

industries and that trade disputes over agriculture goods have put up a barrier to the establishment of an agreement.

According to a survey by the Organization for Economic Cooperation & Development—an organization that promotes world trade and helps to coordinate its members' economic policies — 63 percent of South Korean farmers' revenues come from government subsidies. For Japanese farmers, the number is 53 percent.

These are the two highest percentages for any countries in the world.

"Overprotection has resulted in the price of agricultural goods in Japan and South Korea being unreasonably high," said Bian Zhenhu, director at the ministry's China Chamber of Commerce of Foodstuffs & Native Produce. "In contrast, Chinese agricultural goods are less expensive." *Xinhua*

Watson book calls Murdoch empire a "shadow state"

NEW YORK, 15 May— "Dial M For Murdoch: News Corporation and the Corruption of Britain" is among the more provocatively titled books about Rupert Murdoch, the controversial head of global news conglomerate News Corp, owner of FOX News, the *Wall Street Journal* and other media brands.

True to its nod to the Alfred Hitchcock thriller, the book is a suspenseful tale of the ongoing phone hacking scandal in Britain from one of its key players: Tom Watson, a Labour Party member of Parliament and one of the fiercest critics of Murdoch's media empire, who co-authored the book with The Independent's Martin Hickman.

As its subtitle suggests, it also offers passionate and aggrieved claims about the power that Murdoch and News International, the publisher of News Corp's British titles, gained in recent years and about how they

sought to protect that power with an all-embracing apparatus of intimidation.

"Incompetence alone cannot explain all of these failures," the authors write, citing the failure of Scotland Yard, most UK media and many top politicians for failing to prevent or even adequately probe the phone hacking scandal that surfaced in 2009.

"Fear allowed the phone hacking scandal to happen -

fear of public humiliation for an indiscretion, fear of not winning that glowing endorsement," the book states.

The book comes as the scandal continues to rivet the UK, where on 1 May a parliamentary committee — including Watson — concluded the 81-year old Murdoch was "not a fit person" to lead a global media firm. *Reuters*

Bus accident in eastern Cuba kills five

HAVANA, 15 May—A passenger bus fell off a cliff in eastern Cuba on Monday, killing five people, including a little girl, and wounding several others, the national police force (PNR) said. The accident occurred when the vehicle overturned on a slope in the town of Rafael Freyre, Holguin Province, 735 km east of Havana, PNR officer Juan Carlos Fonseca told Cuban news media.

A team of experts was trying to determine the cause of the accident, he said, adding that the victims died on the spot.

Road accidents are the fifth leading cause of deaths in Cuba, which reported 10,553 accidents in 2011, or 1,126 more than in 2010. Drunken Driving and general recklessness among both drivers and pedestrians are the main causes of accidents in Cuba, where legislators are proposing more severe sanctions against these violations.— *Xinhua*

The fire broke out in the early hours of Friday in a family house in Derby. Five siblings aged five to 10 died rapidly from smoke inhalation, police said, while their brother Duwayne Philpott, 13, died from his injuries overnight on Sunday.

The assistant chief constable of Derbyshire Police, Steve Cotterill, said: “After further forensic examination we believe the fire was not accidental. “Initial indications are that it was deliberately set and as a result six children have been unlawfully killed.” A local man and woman who were arrested following the blaze were released without charge, police said on Saturday.

“The forensic examination is still continuing. A number of specialists, including fingerprints officers, have been examining the scene and this is likely to continue for some

Emergency transmitter found at Indonesia crash site

JAKARTA, 15 May—Search teams on Monday found an emergency transmitter from the Russian jet that slammed into a dormant volcano in Indonesia but said they are yet to locate the flight recorders that could explain the deadly crash. Russian experts and Indonesian searchers combing the remote area where the Sukhoi Superjet 100 crashed on Wednesday, killing all 45 on board, found the emergency locator transmitter (ELT) and other instruments in a deep ravine on Mount Salak.

The old-model transmitter, which sends out a distress signal in the event of a crash, would not have been able to communicate via satellite but was designed to be picked up by rescuers on the ground, or by airport control towers, rescue chief Daryatmo said.

Officials have said they did not receive a signal after the accident. Dozens of Russian experts have flown to Indonesia in recent days to join the investigation.

Some are assisting Indonesian teams at the crash site, south of the capital Jakarta, where the tail of the plane was on Sunday located in a 500-metre deep ravine.—Internet

Toxic gas kills four at China paper mill

WUHAN, 15 May— Four workers were suffocated to death on Monday while cleaning a waste pulp sink at a paper mill in central China’s Hubei Province, local authorities said.

A preliminary investigation indicated they were poisoned by toxic gas, the city government of Xiantao said in a Press release on Tuesday.

It said the accident happened at 9 am at Shengda Paper Industrial Co Ltd in Zhanggou Township.

Qiao Bencai, a temporary employee, was sent down the 2.8-metre deep sink at 8:30 am, but passed out while cleaning the waste pulp, the document said.

Three colleagues, including a workshop manager, went down to his rescue, but fainted in the sink, too.

All four had died when they were pulled out.

It said the exact cause of their deaths was still under investigation.

Many paper mills use chlorine gas to bleach pulp for white paper and dangerous pollution is often created as a byproduct.

A Kentucky man has returned two potted hydrangeas he stole from a Nashville park to give to his mom for Mother's Day in 1958.

Bill Teitleff, 72, who now lives in western Kentucky, said he was 18 and unable to afford a Mother's Day gift when he took the plants from Centennial Park and sent them to his mom in Kentucky, WSMV-TV, Nashville, reported. He said the the plans were the most beautiful, perfectly formed hydrangeas he had ever seen. "They were just perfect in rows and pots," Teitleff said of the plants he scooped up from the park.

"I knew it was wrong. I thought all along

that I was borrowing them. But this stayed with me all this time," Teitleff said. "Now it's been 54 years, and I've got the root and same flowers that they have accepted back now. This doesn't clear what I did. That's between me and him (points to the sky). But this is between me and the people here at the park, and they've accepted wholeheartedly."

Teitleff said he was glad when park officials accepted the plants and his apology.

"Sometimes it hurts when we go back and ask somebody for forgiveness, but when we do, we feel better inside and that person thinks a lot more of us," Teitleff said.

Student graduates with quadruple major

A student at the College of St Scholastica in Minnesota has graduated with a quadruple major and a 4.0 grade point average in just four years.

Brock Erdahl, who graduated from the school in Duluth, said careful planning allowed him to finish bachelor's degrees in history, political science, global culture/language studies and Catholic studies with a French minor in only four years with perfect grades, the *Duluth News Tribune* reported.

"I tried to carefully manage my time from the get-go," Erdahl said. "I plotted

out what I wanted to accomplish, what courses I needed, and how they would lead to a certain degree, instead of taking classes willy nilly."

Erdahl said his original plan was to graduate in just two years with a double major in history and political science, but his experiences at the school convinced him to stay for the quadruple major.

"I enjoyed school so thoroughly, I didn't want to rush and leave prematurely," he said.

Randall Poole, an associate professor of history at St Scholastica, said Erdahl was one of the

college's most remarkable graduates.

"I've not had a better student in my career than Brock Erdahl," he said.

Grenade found in radio; police evacuate

Police in Philadelphia said a building housing two district headquarters was evacuated after a man brought in a grenade he discovered inside a radio.

Investigators said a man in his 60s arrived at the Harbison Avenue and Levick Street building, which houses the 2nd and 15th police districts, and handed over a plastic-wrapped grenade he said he discovered inside a radio he purchased earlier in the day at a flea market, the *Philadelphia Daily News* reported.

"Once they discovered it was a grenade, safety became paramount and we wanted everyone out of the building," Sgt Leo Costello said. Costello said the bomb squad was called to dispose of the grenade, which was found to be live, and the scene was cleared in the evening.

Obscene chocolates given to schoolkids

The Australian school official who handed out chocolates shaped like breasts, penises, posteriors and copulating couples to children resigned.

The parents of students at Woodberry Public School in Woodberry, north of Sydney, said they were shocked when they spotted the provocatively shaped candies at a Mother's Day event at the school, *The (Sydney) Daily Telegraph* reported.

"I had to do a double-take," said Cassandra Lacey, whose two sons attend the school. "Every single chocolate was to do with sex. This was in the school hall, on the school grounds and in school time." A Department of Education and Communities spokesman said the chocolates were not provided by school officials.

"The school says that the gifts were prepared by parents, for parents, and the school had no knowledge of them until some of the mothers complained," he said.

School council President Jenny Gray said the official responsible for the chocolates has resigned and the Federation of P&C Associations has been called in.

Pacquiao's success foiling Filipino hopes

SINGAPORE, 15 May—The success of Manny Pacquiao is delivering a knockout blow to Filipino dreams of a first Olympic gold medal, with young boxers fast-tracking to the professional ranks in a desperate bid to

escape poverty and emulate the success of their hero.

Manny Pinol, a former governor of North Cotabato and current manager of boxers through his Braveheart Boxing stable, says the success of the eight-weight world

champion is hindering the amateur Olympic programme at home. Despite boasting a population of over 100 million and a love of boxing, the Philippines will send just one fighter to the London Olympics later this year—the same number as the tiny Seychelles—leaving little hope of adding to the three bronze and two silvers won by their boxers in previous Games.

All this while Pacquiao (welterweight), Nonito Donaire (super-bantamweight), Sonny Boy Jaro (flyweight), and Donnie Nietes (light flyweight) hold world titles in the pro ranks.

“Manny Pacquiao’s success is hurting our amateur boxing programme because every young boy now would like to become Manny Pacquiao,” Pinol told Reuters in a recent interview in Singapore.

“They don’t want to be amateur because there is simply no money in it, it is just a dream of a (Olympic) gold and it is actually more difficult to win than a world boxing title.” In the Philippines, the rags to riches story of Pacquiao, who came from a poverty stricken broken home to become the first man to win world titles in eight divisions, and then be elected a congressman, inspires a nation.—Reuters

Australia coach slams FIFA over Oman qualifier kick-off

SYDNEY, 15 May—Australia coach Holger Osieck has slammed global soccer governing body FIFA for scheduling the Socceroos’ away World Cup qualifier against Oman in the late afternoon, fearing the effects of extreme heat on his players. FIFA has listed the kickoff for the 8 June qualifier at 5pm local time (1300 GMT) in Muscat, where day-time temperatures regularly soar above 40 degrees Celsius at that time.

“We are working on it and I think it’s unacceptable to play that time of the year,” German Osieck said in a conference call on Tuesday.

“When some bureaucrats make a decision behind their desk in a climatized room and not considering the actual situation outside, I think that is a very questionable decision.”

The country’s soccer administration Football Federation Australia had previously expressed their concerns about playing a match in the heat before the time was posted, an official told Reuters, and would write to FIFA again in a bid to have the match moved back into a cooler evening slot.

When asked about the

chances of having the match moved back, Osieck struck an ironic tone. “I’ve been (dealing) with FIFA for quite a while and we know how flexible they are,” he said.

The Socceroos’ original 9:30 pm kick-off time in their last qualifier against Saudi Arabia in Melbourne irked the FIFA, who lobbied successfully to have the match played earlier out of deference to broadcasters and fans hoping to attend the midweek match.

Osieck also named a 26-man squad for a friendly against Denmark on 2 June and the World Cup qualifiers against Oman and Japan in Brisbane on 12 June, recalling Everton midfielder Tim Cahill and striker Josh Kennedy.

Aston Villa midfielder Chris Herd, named in the squad for the first time, will have his chance to impress selectors at a training camp in Denmark in the leadup to the friendly. —Reuters

Nadal unconcerned by rankings slip

ROME, 15 May—Rafa Nadal’s chances of winning an open era record seventh French Open title next month will not be affected by his fall to number three in the world rankings, the Spaniard said on Monday.

His third-round defeat last week in Madrid meant he was overtaken by tournament winner Roger Federer, with Novak Djokovic still top of the pile. “Being number two or number three isn’t going to change my goal,” Nadal told a news conference at the Foro Italico, the long-time home of the Rome Masters, which began on Sunday.

“My goal will be the same, number two, three or

number 10. To win you have to beat the best players in the world. The only change is in the semi-finals but it doesn’t make any difference.”

Nadal could regain second spot from Federer this week but said he was more concerned with the way he is playing. “I will try my best to play my best and if I am able to do that I will have my chances to have a good result,” he said. —Reuters

Scholes to play on another season

LONDON, 15 May—Manchester United midfielder Paul Scholes will play on for another season, the Premier League club’s manager Alex Ferguson said on Monday.

The 37-year-old former England international quit at the end of the 2010-11 campaign but came out of retirement in January and played a key role in helping United finish second in the Premier League behind Manchester City.

“I am delighted, he knew

he had made a mistake,” Ferguson told MUTV at United’s player of the year dinner. “He now realises if he plays 25 or 30 games next season, they will be of real quality.”

“I think this will be Paul’s last season. We know him very well. We have had him since he was a kid. We know how to use him.”

With several United midfielders injured, Scholes made a shock return to the side as a substitute in the FA Cup third-round win at Manchester

City in January and played 21 matches before the end of the season, scoring four goals. Despite playing only half the campaign, Scholes finished third in the vote for England’s Footballer of the Year, behind Arsenal striker Robin van Persie and United team mate Wayne Rooney.

There has been speculation that he could be included in England’s European Championship squad which will be named by new coach Roy Hodgson on Wednesday.—Reuters

Barton charged with violent conduct

LONDON, 15 May—Queens Park Rangers midfielder Joey Barton was charged by the English FA on Monday with two acts of alleged violent conduct during Sunday’s Premier League match against Manchester City.

The controversial player was sent off for elbowing Carlos Tevez and then kicked Sergio Aguero and tried to head-butt Vincent Kompany before being escorted off the pitch.

An FA statement said: “Following the player’s dismissal in the 54th minute of the fixture, there followed two incidents involving Manchester City’s Sergio Aguero and Vincent Kompany. “As

Barton had already been dismissed, both of these incidents fell outside of the jurisdiction of the referee.”

Barton has until 1700 GMT on Tuesday to respond to the charges.

Playing with 10 men, Rangers took a 2-1 lead only for City to clinch the title with two late goals in the most dramatic of finales to the Premier League.

Barton has apologised via his Twitter account, saying: “Can do nothing but apologise to the players and the fans.—Reuters

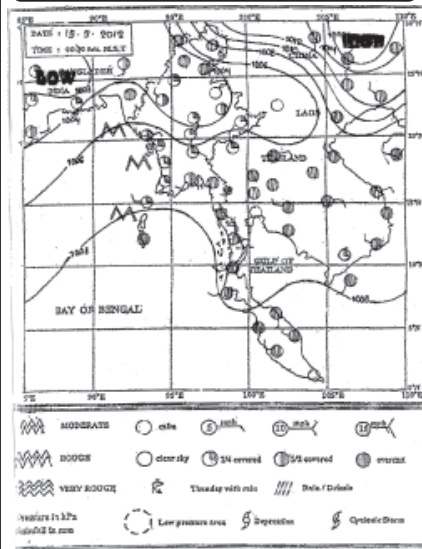

Man sets himself on fire outside Breivik courthouse

OSLO, 15 May—A man has set himself on fire on Tuesday outside an Oslo courthouse where Norwegian mass killer Anders Behring Breivik is on trial for murdering 77 people last July, police said.

The man doused himself with liquid and set himself on fire before attempting to breach the security fence around the courthouse, a police spokesman Kjell Kvernes said. The national daily VG posted



a video on its website, vg.no, showing the man with flames on his hat and sweatshirt running toward a security checkpoint and being tackled by police. Officers ripped his sweatshirt off and stamped out the flames. The spokesman said the man, who appeared to be a Norwegian, had shouted at police before setting himself on fire but officers could not make out what he said. The man, who witnesses said appeared to be Caucasian and in his 50s, was taken to hospital with serious injuries on his torso.

Mr Breivik, 33, has been on trial since last month for

bombing government offices in an attack that killed eight people, then shooting dead 69 more, most of them teenagers, at a Labour Party island summer camp.—MNA/Reuters

Bret Michaels settles case over 2009 Tonys mishap

NEW YORK, 15 May—Bret Michaels and organizers of the Tony Awards have settled a lawsuit filed by the rocker after a 2009 incident in which he was hit in the head with a set piece and suffered injuries that he claimed contributed to a brain hemorrhage that nearly killed him.

The confidential settlement also covers Michaels' claims against CBS Broadcasting, which aired the show and the mishap. The Poison frontman blamed the network for airing the moment, which became which a viral video watched by tens of millions of people online, and claimed Tony Awards producers never warned him there would be a set change after he and his band performed "Nothin' But a Good Time."

The whack initially left Michaels with a busted lip and broken nose but also caused brain bleeding, the lawsuit claimed. He was hospitalized in April 2010, and doctors found he had a brain hemorrhage and he later suffered a warning stroke, which the musician says nearly killed him.

Michaels' attorney Alex Weingarten said details of the settlement would not be released. "Mr. Michaels would like to thank

his fans for their continued support," he wrote in a statement.

Michaels sued in March 2011 in Los Angeles, but a judge later moved the case to New York City. The agreement came after a mediation session was held on Friday. Representatives for CBS and the Tonys released a joint statement saying that "an amicable resolution" had been reached but no further details would be released. The musician and reality television star did not state how much compensation he was seeking when he sued but said the injury hurt his ability to perform at later shows.—Internet
