NAY PYI TAW, 4 June—Chief Operating Officer Mr Sebastiaan Savren of Navigat Group of Indonesia and party paid a call on Union Minister for Electric Power No (2) U Khin Maung Soe at Yangon City Electricity Supply Board (Headquarters) this morning.

Also present on the occasion were the chairman of the YESB and personnel concerned. The guests proposed to produce electric

power with BOT system using GE gas engine and turbine and conduct feasibility study for total generation of 280-megawatt electricity with GE gas engine and four GE gas turbines through combine cycle technology.

The Union Minister then met departmental personnel and businessmen at the meeting hall of YESB and clarified progress in paving of roads and supplying potable

Deadly car bomb attack rocks Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 4 June—At least 26 people have been killed and dozens wounded in a bomb attack in Iraq's capital, Baghdad, officials say.

A suicide bomber reportedly detonated an explosives-packed car outside the offices of the Shia Waqf (Endowment), which looks after Shia religious sites. As many as 190 people were injured by the blast in the Bab al-Muadham area.

Violence has fallen in Iraq since the height of insurgency in 2006 and 2007, but militants still frequently attack security forces and civilians. The latest attack comes less than a week after a spate of bombings killed 17 people in Baghdad.

Officials say the explosives-rigged car was parked in a car park near the Shia Waqf building. The front of the three-storey office reportedly collapsed from the impact of the blast, which also shattered windows in surrounding buildings and damaged cars in the area.

An employee at the nearby health department also felt the impact of the blast.

"The ceiling fell on my head and I was slightly wounded in the head and fell down," Adel Ahmed told the Associated Press news agency. He described the scene of the explosion

as "horrific", with wounded people on the ground screaming for help.

Security forces cordoned off the scene and barred anyone from approaching the area, while firefighters continued to search the debris for survivors. The deputy chief of the Shia Waqf, Sami al-Massudi, has appealed for calm following the attack.

"We call on the Iraqi people and especially on the sons of our religion to bury the strife because there is a plan to launch a civil war between the people, and between the Iraqi sects," he said. Al-Massudi claimed the Shia Waqf had received threats in recent days as a result of a dispute over the al-Askari shrine.—Internet

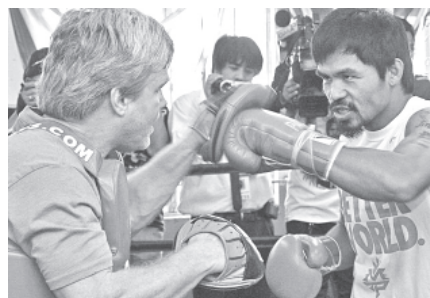

Pakistan and US: allies without trust

ISLAMABAD, 4 June—As Washington fumed over the jailing of a Pakistani doctor who helped the CIA hunt down Osama bin Laden, an educated Islamabad business-woman voiced her own outrage—at the United States. “All we ever got from the Americans is instability and violence,” she said, echoing what many Pakistanis believe is Washington’s contribution to their country and region over three decades. “Didn’t you know Osama bin Laden was a CIA agent?”, she asked at a dinner attended by Western diplomats, referring to his role in US-backed resistance to the Soviet occupation in

Afghanistan in the 1980s. “Then he was on the same side as Washington.” In Pakistan, public opinion increasingly views the United States as a fickle, selfish ally despite the billions of dollars in aid that flow to the cash-strapped South Asian nation. It is a view that has only deepened since US troops killed bin Laden on Pakistani soil in May 2011. The raid, kept secret from Pakistani authorities, was a humiliation for the powerful military and raised searching questions about whether it was harboring militants. Relations have soured further after a court last week

imprisoned for 33 years the Pakistani doctor who helped the CIA find the al-Qaeda chief and mastermind of the 9/11 attacks.

“Most people in Washington are upset with Pakistan. Dr (Shakil) Afridi goes to jail, this guy should be a hero, instead you (Pakistan) are treating him like a crook,” said one US official.

Pakistani officials told the media Afridi was jailed for treason for his ties to the CIA, but a court document released later said he was guilty of aiding a banned militant group. Rising antipathy towards Washington makes it tougher for the

government — already unpopular because of its failure to tackle poverty, power cuts and corruption—to do anything that might be

seen as caving in to US demands, especially ahead of general elections expected early next year.

Iran’s new space centre to be launched

TEHRAN, 4 June—Iran’s Defence Minister Ahmad Vahidi said that Iran’s new space centre, named Imam Khomeini Space Centre, will be launched in the future, local daily *Teheran Times* reported on Sunday. This new space centre which is 80 percent complete will be used for sending satellites made by Iran and other Muslim countries into space, Vahidi was quoted as saying on Saturday.

The Iranian scientists and experts from the Aerospace Industry Organization of the Defence Ministry, will send into orbit new generation of the Islamic Republic’s satellites from this centre,” said the minister. As the first step, Vahidi said, the Tolou (dawn) satellite will be launched into orbit from the Imam Khomeini space centre in the future, according to the report.

Iran, a founding member of the United Nations Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space, launched its first domestically-made data-processing satellite, the Omid (Hope), into space in 2009. Iran has frequently said that it will push ahead with its space programme in the coming years.

Colombian President applauds capture of criminal group ringleader

BOGOTA, 4 June — Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos on Sunday praised the capture in Venezuela of Diego Perez Hena, or “Diego Rastrojo,” head of the criminal group “Los Rastrojos.” In Twitter, Santos confirmed Perez’s arrest, and greeted the Venezuelan and Colombian authorities who took part in the operation.

Earlier, Venezuelan Interior and Justice Minister Tareck El Aissami said Perez

was arrested in Rojas region in Venezuela’s western state of Barinas, near the border with Colombia. El Aissami said Perez was arrested together with three others.

Colombian Police Director Jose Roberto Leon said the capture was “a hit” against all criminal groups in Colombia. Leon thanked Venezuelan authorities for Perez’s capture, adding the ringleader pretended to be an estate’s foreman in Barinas and his guards be

The police director said rewards would be paid to the informers of Perez’s capture, adding the US government had offered 5 million US dollars and the Colombian government had offered 1.2 billion Colombian pesos (about 660,000 dollars) to the ones who provided information leading to Perez’s capture. The United States had requested Perez’s extradition.

5.1 magnitude quake hits Italy, some buildings collapse

MILAN, 4 June — No casualties were reported but some buildings collapsed in central-northern Italy as a magnitude-5.1 quake on Sunday evening shook the same area that was hit by two powerful fatal quakes on 20 and 29 May. The latest shake occurred at 9:20 pm local time and was centered in the town of Novi di Modena at a depth of 9.2 km, according to Italy’s Institute of Geophysics and Volcanology (INGV). The so-called “Clock Tower”, a centuries-old building in the historical centre of Novi di Modena, as well as other buildings that had been partially damaged by the previous quakes, totally collapsed.

Carlo Marchini, mayor of the nearby small town Concordiasulla Secchia, told Rai State television that fortunately there were no further dead nor injured people as all residents were already living inside city tents outside the historical centre. “I was in a city tent at the moment, and there were scenes of panic. But fortunately all homes had already been evacuated so

no one was injured,” he said. Yet, several people were reported to feel faint due to fright.

“The situation had slightly improved in the past few days, as no powerful shakes had been recorded, but tonight I saw panic-stricken people again. Every new quake is a blow to the heart,” said Rudi Accorsi, mayor of another town in the area, San Possidonio. “This is not life anymore. We are continuously feeling something moving under our feet, and we can just hope it will stop one day. It is just exhausting,” a local resident told Sky channel. At least 16,000 people in the hit-area have been out of their homes since 20 May, when the first powerful quake of the long sequence that killed 24 people and injured hundreds others.

Local experts recommended to all residents not to get close to their homes as other shakes may occur in the next days. They also noted the epicenter was slightly moving towards northern Italy. “We have registered hundreds of aftershocks in

the past days, so this last shake although powerful can be considered as normal part of the sequence,” a seismologist of INGV, Alessandro Amato, told Rai. According to earlier reports, the 5.8-magnitude earthquake on Tuesday claimed 17 lives and the 6-magnitude quake on 20 May killed seven people.

Vietnam to open restricted sites for MIA search: Pentagon

HANOI, 4 June — The Vietnamese government has agreed to open three previously restricted sites to help the search for and excavation of the remains of US servicemen listed as missing in action, a Pentagon spokesman said on Monday. The agreement was unveiled at a meeting between visiting US Defence Secretary Leon Panetta and his Vietnamese counterpart Phung Quang Thanh, spokesman George Little said. He gave no details about the sites.

“The Department of Defence believes these sites are critical to locating missing-in-action troops from the Vietnam War and that JPAC research teams will strongly benefit from access to these sites,” Little said, referring to the Joint Prisoners of War, Missing in Action Accounting Command mission in Vietnam. At the meeting, Panetta and Thanh also exchanged artefacts taken by Vietnamese and US soldiers during the war, which ended in 1975, Little said. The exchange, involving the diary of a Vietnamese soldier killed in 1966 and the personal letters of a US Army sergeant killed in 1969, is the first of its kind between the two defence ministries. On Sunday, Panetta became the most senior US official to visit Cam Ranh Bay in central Vietnam, a former US logistic hub during the Vietnam War, since the end of the war.

The United States wanted to expand defence ties with Vietnam following a memorandum signed last year on defence co-operation, the Vietnam Defence Ministry-run *People’s Army* paper quoted Panetta as saying at a briefing there on Sunday.—Reuters

Japan PM announces new Cabinet lineup

TOKYO, 4 June—Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihiko Noda on Monday announced his second Cabinet reshuffle since he took office last September, replacing five ministers out of 18, in a move to win support from the opposition parties for his tax raise bill.

Defence Minister Naoki Tanaka and Transport Minister Takeshi Maeda, who were both censured in April by the opposition-dominated Upper House of parliament, were replaced by Satoshi Morimoto, a 71-year-old professor at Takushoku University, and Yuichiro Hata, the Democratic Party of Japan’s Diet affairs chief in the upper house, respectively.

Morimoto became the country’s first non-parliamentarian defence chief since World War II. Senior Vice Justice Minister Makoto Taki was named to replace Justice Minister Toshio Ogawa.—MNA/Xinhua

How Internet use may indicate depression

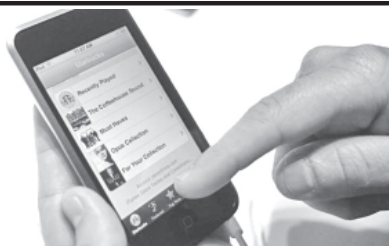
ROLLA, 4 June — Internet data indicates students with signs of depression tend to use the Internet differently than those with no depression symptoms, US researchers say.

Lead researcher Sriram Chellappan, an assistant professor of computer science at Missouri University of Science and Technology, and colleagues identified nine fine-grained patterns of Internet usage that may indicate depression.

“The study is believed to be the first that uses actual Internet data, collected unobtrusively and anonymously, to associate Internet usage with signs of depression,” Chellappan said in a statement. “Previous research on Internet usage has relied on surveys, which are a far less accurate way of assessing how people use the Internet.”

The researchers collected a month’s worth of Internet data for 216 Missouri undergraduate students anonymously and unobtrusively with the students assigned pseudonyms to keep their identities hidden.

The study found depressed students tended to use the Internet in a more “random” manner — frequently switching

among applications, perhaps from chat rooms to games to e-mail.

Chellappan said the randomness may indicate trouble concentrating — a characteristic associated with depression.

Chellappan’s research has been accepted for publication in a forthcoming issue of IEEE Technology and Society Magazine.—*Internet*

Study: Birds resemble juvenile dinosaurs

Texas at Austin and elsewhere said their study was sparked by the realization that skulls of modern birds and juvenile dinosaurs show a surprising degree of similarity.

That’s because while many dinosaur species took years to reach sexual maturity, birds sped up the clock — some species reach maturity in a little as 12 weeks — allowing them to retain the physical characteristics of baby dinosaurs, a UT Austin release said on Wednesday.

“What is interesting about this research is the way it illustrates evolution as a developmental phenomenon,” Harvard researcher Arkhat Abzhanov said. “By changing the developmental biology in early species, nature has produced the modern bird — an entirely new creature — and one that, with approximately 10,000 species, is today the most successful group of land vertebrates on the planet.

“That you can have such dramatic success simply by changing the relative timing of events in a creature’s development is remarkable,” he said. “We now understand the relationship between birds and dinosaurs that much better, and we can say that, when we look at birds, we are actually looking at juvenile dinosaurs.”—*Internet*

Senator calls Facebook IPO specious

WASHINGTON, 4 June — US Sen Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn, says Facebook’s initial public offering is the “poster child,” for practices on Wall Street that favour big investors.

“This IPO is a poster child for all that’s wrong with current practices,” Blumenthal said in an interview, *The Washington Post* reported on Saturday.

The Securities and Exchange Commission has not confirmed or denied that it is conducting an investigation into the Facebook IPO that was marred by technical problems, including a 30 minute delay and difficulty for traders to confirm transactions on the day of Facebook’s public debut.

Areas of concern include underwriter Morgan Stanley giving one set of information on Facebook’s revenue forecast to one set of investors and holding that information back from others, the *Post* reported.

“You wonder, isn’t there something wrong with this picture? Where the underwriters selectively pick (who should receive) information, then the public is not only permitted but encouraged to participate?” Blumenthal asked.

Morgan Stanley’s Chief Executive Officer James Gorman has insisted that the firm followed established rules throughout the IPO. Some, however, say the case provokes new questions, including whether or not the recently passed JOBS Act went too far by allowing companies with under \$1 billion in revenue a separate set of rules about what must be disclosed before an IPO compared to larger companies.

The law was supposed to make it easier for smaller companies to go public.

“I voted against the JOBS Act, and the Facebook IPO may be Exhibit A why we need to revisit some of the issues that were given so little attention,” Blumenthal said.—*Internet*

Weather forecasters to use fastest supercomputer

TOKYO, 4 June — Japan’s Meteorological Agency is to introduce a new supercomputer that it says is the fastest of all machines at weather organizations in the world.

The agency has used supercomputers since 1959

to forecast local downpours, paths of typhoons, and other phenomena.

The new system that starts on Tuesday in Tokyo can perform 847 trillion calculations per second. The speed is 30 times that of the

New material to aid in terrorism fight

WASHINGTON, 4 June — A new standard reference material will aid in the detection of two explosive compounds known to be used by terrorists, a US government agency says.

The National Institute of Standards and Technology has designed the new test samples to simulate the size and behaviour of residues that remain after handling the explosives PETN (pentaerythritol tetranitrate) and TATP (triacetone triperoxide).

Instrument developers, academic researchers and government labs can use the standard reference material, or SRM, to test, refine and validate their new detector designs, an NIST release reported on Wednesday.

Both PETN and TATP, relatively difficult to detect in the field, were used in failed terrorist attacks by the “shoe bomber” in 2002 and the “underwear bomber” in 2009.

The new NIST SRM, while not itself explosive, contains meticulously measured concentrations of the two explosives that can be used to test and validate the ability of machines and methods to detect the explosives’ presence, the agency said.—*Internet*

Flying drone copies bat flapping

“Bat wings are highly articulated, with wing skeletons very similar to those of human arms and hands,” said Julian Colorado of the Polytechnic University of Madrid. “The way bats change the shape of their wings has great potential for improving the maneuverability of micro air vehicles.”

Colorado and colleagues in Madrid and from Brown University in Rhode Island have built a drone with an 18-inch wingspan inspired by a type of bat called the gray-headed flying fox, capable of changing the profile of its wing between the downstroke and upstroke, *NewScientist.com* reported on Wednesday.

On the downstroke a large wing surface area is required to generate lift and propulsion, but on the upstroke a large area creates drag, so a bat folds the wing inwards on the upstroke.

In the “Batbot,” the extension and contraction of the wing is controlled by shape-memory alloy wires that switch between two shapes when different currents are applied, pulling in to slim the wing profile on the upstroke.

conn, an electronics giant with plants in Shenzhen and Zhengzhou on the Chinese mainland, released a statement saying, "The welfare of our employees is without a doubt our top priority and we are working hard to give our more than one million employees in China a safe and positive working environment." CNN reported on Friday. The company also makes electronics for Sony, Microsoft and Nokia.

Rights group Students and Scholars Against Corporate Misbehaviour said it interviewed 170 Foxconn workers and found many employees were subjected to long working hours, unpaid overtime, humiliation by management, CNN said.

"Some workers felt the

most pressing issue is their treatment by management, while others felt pay was the main issue. But most agreed they had witnessed no significant improvements," SACOM's Debby Chan Sze Wan told CNN, referring to pledges made by Foxconn since 2010.

Workers recently received raises but said they were actually worse off because paid overtime was reduced. Foxconn said it is working with the Fair Labour Association "to carry out a remediation programme to continuously improve the working environment for our employees and to ensure they are treated with respect."

UN Secretary General's message on World Environment Day

5 June, 2012

As the world gears up for the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (Rio+20), World Environment Day is an opportunity to highlight the need for a paradigm shift towards a more sustainable world. This year's theme, "Green Economy: Does it include you?", underscores the need for everyone to play their part in keeping humankind's ecological footprint within planetary boundaries.

The world's population stands at 7 billion and may rise to more than 9 billion by 2050. This means greater pressure on already crowded cities – where more than half of all people now live – and on natural resources, as demand for food, water and energy rises. It also means more people in search of decent jobs. Globally, 1.3 billion people are currently unemployed or under-employed. An estimated half billion more will join the job market over the next decade.

Sustainability entails providing opportunity for all by balancing the social, economic and environmental dimensions of development. We have to rebut the myth that there is conflict between economic and environmental health. With smart policies and the right investments, countries can protect their environment, grow their economies, generate decent jobs and accelerate social progress.

Rio+20 is our opportunity to deepen global commitment to sustainable development. In Rio, we should agree that measuring growth and wealth by Gross Domestic Product alone is inadequate. We should agree that the world needs a set of sustainable development goals that will build on the Millennium Development Goals. And we should make progress on some of the building blocks of sustainability – energy, water, food, cities, oceans, jobs and the empowerment of women.

Sustainability is gaining prominence on the public policy agenda in both developed and developing nations. The UN itself is working towards climate neutrality and sustainable management of our offices and activities. In Rio, we must mobilize the partnerships we need to shift the world onto a more sustainable trajectory of growth and development. On this World Environment Day, in advance of this historic conference, I urge governments, businesses and all members of society to make the holistic choices that will ensure a sustainable future – the future we want.

Opting for plain water might prevent diabetes

NEW YORK, 4 June—Women who chose plain water, instead of sweet drinks such as sodas or fruit juice, had a slightly lowered risk of developing diabetes in a large new study. The results, based on more than 80,000 women followed for more than a decade, suggest that adding water to the sugary beverages a person drinks throughout the day won't make a difference, but replacing sweet drinks with water could help stave off the metabolic disorder. "It is essentially not that water helps, except with hydration, but that the others hurt," Barry Popkin, a professor at the University of North Carolina School of Public Health who was not involved in the study, told Reuters Health. It's well established that sugary beverages are bad for diabetes risk, said Dr Frank Hu, a professor at the Harvard School of Public Health and the senior author of the study.

People have recommended drinking plain water instead of sugar-sweetened beverages, he said, "and the question is whether this kind of substitution has any impact on diabetes." Hu and his colleagues collected data from the massive Nurses Health Study, which tracked the health and lifestyle of tens of

thousands of women across the US.

The new study included 82,902 women who answered questions about their diet and health over a 12-year span.

Overtime, about 2,700 of them developed diabetes. The amount of water women drank didn't seem to influence their diabetes risk. Those who drank



more than six cups a day had the same risk as women who drank less than one cup a day.

However, sugar-sweetened drinks and fruit juice were tied to a higher risk of diabetes—about 10 percent higher for each cup consumed each day. The research team estimated that if women replaced one cup of soda or juice with one cup of plain water, their diabetes risk would fall by seven or eight percent.

While it's not a huge reduction in the risk, "because

diabetes is so prevalent in our society, even seven or eight percent reduction in diabetes risk is quite substantial in terms of the population," Hu told Reuters Health. About 10 percent of women, or 12.6 million, have diabetes in the United States. A seven percent reduction would mean that instead of 10 out of every 100

women having diabetes, the number would be closer to nine out of every 100. Hu's study, published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, also found that unsweetened coffee or tea might be a good alternative to sugary beverages. The researchers estimated that replacing one cup of soda or fruit juice with one cup of coffee or tea could reduce the risk of developing diabetes by 12 to 17 percent.

Health Tip: Don't spread germs

Your mother's plea to cover your mouth when you cough was sound medical advice, says the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention.

The agency suggests how to prevent the spread of germs:

- * When you sneeze or cough, use a tissue to cover your nose and mouth.
- * Always throw your used tissue in the trash.
- * Sneeze or cough into your elbow (not your hand) if you don't have a tissue.
- * Frequently wash your hands with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds.
- * Use a hand sanitizer if you can't wash with soap and water.

US investor suspected of TEPCO insider trading

Tokyo, 4 June—Japan's Securities and Exchange Surveillance Commission has asked US authorities to

They say the unidentified investor obtained confidential information about planned TEPCO share offerings in 2010 and made a profit by short-selling the shares.

Nomura Securities Company was involved in TEPCO's share offerings. The investor is thought to have obtained the information about the offerings apparently through his agent in Japan.

The Securities and Exchange Surveillance Commission asked the Financial Services Agency in May to fine Sumitomo Mitsui Trust Bank and another firm for insider trading.

The commission is also investigating the role of brokerages in such insider trading cases and their information management systems.

UN says 21 million forced labourers worldwide

TOKYO, 4 June—The United Nations' International Labour Organization estimates that nearly 21 million people worldwide are victims of forced labour, and 25 percent are below 18 years of age. The organization released its latest report on Friday, which covers various forms of modern slavery. According to the report, many victims are coerced into doing long hours of hard work. Such exploitation poses a serious problem, especially in developing countries.

The report says that out of 20.9 million forced laborers, 14 million, or about 70 percent, are exploited in activities including agriculture and construction work. About 4.5 million people are victims of sexual exploitation.

By area, the Asia-Pacific region has more than half the total at 11.7 million. This is followed by 3.7 million in Africa and 1.8 million in Latin America. The UN organization says the global economic slump may further increase the number of forced labourers. It calls on governments worldwide to step up efforts to eradicate such practices.—NHK

However, with sincere truth from the bottom of my heart I wrote this article in connection with the two leaders who in fact are our hope and who are so rare that such persons are exceptional.

World Economic Forum, a new step of Myanmar

Recently news on the Pyithu Hluttaw representative and Chairperson of National League for Democracy Daw Aung San Suu Kyi attending the World Economic Forum for Asia and Pacific in Bangkok, Thailand, has become the headline and breaking news of domestic and foreign media. Especially, it was significant news in the United States of America where I live. It would not be an overstatement if I say that the whole world was focusing on the forum.

The forum was interesting for Myanmar expats, because we heard that both President U Thein Sein and Daw Aung San Suu Kyi would attend it. Another fact is that it was Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's first trip abroad as she had never left the country for abroad since she came back to Myanmar in 1988. The US media were saying that it was a test of the democracy path paved by President U Thein Sein. The more heartening fact is that next year's forum will be held in Myanmar. In my view, it proved that Myanmar was advancing step by step towards the global stage. Besides, I felt so much joy to the level of having goose pimples. Nowadays, our country has been changing its image through reforms.

Anxieties of a person from afar

I listened carefully and seriously to the words of both Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and Minister of Energy U Than Htay, as the tendency of international investors for Myanmar depends on their words. What's more, the two leaders, President U Thein Sein and Daw Aung San Suu Kyi, have already made a mutual agreement to set aside differences for the common interest of the nation and the people. What worried me then was that if the words of the two were contrary to one another the hard-won trust (including international confidence in Myanmar in addition to the mutual trust between the two leaders) would vanish.

I was relieved. I found basic similarities in their words. They called for investments in labour-based industries to generate job opportunities soonest. While Daw Aung San Suu Kyi focused on job creation investment, Energy Minister U Than Htay gave priority to inviting labour-intensive industry.

But my anxieties remained. I heard news saying that the President had postponed his visit to Thailand after the end of the forum. A friend of mine from the State Department asked me by phone. His question was "Why?" Columnist Thomas Fuller of *The New York Times* made a comment saying it seemed that President U Thein Sein felt irritated. I was worried about it. It is not long since we have been seeing the dawn in our country after waiting for many years. We have just started to see national reconciliation a long-awaited dream of our people throughout the past successive eras. Our democracy has not yet mature in all aspects, and our society still has much to do to reach the level of the US society.

Not to be haunted by nightmare

Even before the 2010 elections, some of my close friends of the State Department and the Congress asked why our government was so bitter about the word "Burma". I explained our history and nationalism. So they told me that we need to differentiate between the term and the reality. So I said, "OK Mitchell I will not call you Mitchell, instead I will call you Clinton that is not your name. Can you accept this?" My clarification made them understand the matter. Then I explained the close relationship between the Tatmadaw (Armed Forces) and Myanmar history; the

true nature and traits of Myanmar soldiers; and the need to stay away from words that may be haunting like a nightmare if there is wish to establish good relations with Myanmar and to understand that the word "Burma" reminds us of the colonialists.

Like us the United State had also faced civil war, but with different historical background. Moreover, they do not have the American race, but only the American citizen. We both drove out the British colonialists, but under different situations. I also explained that their country with constant strong citizenship and our country with constant strong nationalism were not in a parallel trend. When both President U Thein Sein and Daw Aung San Suu Kyi said that Bamar was just a race of the many ethnic races, we were incredibly inspiring and happy. At that time, there sprouted up a belief in my heart: "Once in a blue moon we have seen two leaders with impressive background. We have also witnessed the two have a lot in common in the way they think and work in politics. Both of them have unclenched their fists for the common interest which has been like a pipedream for our nation. Our nation would never be united again if it could not be united in such a rare time never before in history. Our nation would be able to restore national consolidation again for sure."

Bring about the rule of law

Our nation has endless works to be done. For this, the two leaders have to work hard, no doubt about it. What comes the first and foremost here is the rule of law to which both of the leaders attach great importance. Looking back the history, it was the British colonialists who introduced bureaucracy to our nation along with the judicial system. I do not mean to point a finger at the entire system, but they had in fact practised the judicial system designed for the benefits of the ruler as the way colonialists behave. Jury system is exercised in US in which I am living. Jury system does not vest judicial power in a single judge, instead of the judge has to deliver the verdict based on the decision the members of the jury who judge whether the defendant is guilty or not. Unfortunately, our judicial system has definitely been a system under the thumb of the rulers.

In US, every citizen understands the constitution very well. They know the laws issued and also observe the actions of legislature and MPs in detail. Meanwhile, they also fulfil the citizenship duties. All the politicians, MPs, and senior government officials have learned the constitution and existing laws almost by heart. So far as I know, civic education there is at the extremely high level whereas in our nation, we still have to promote civic education and capacity building as well. We still have to walk a long way to reach such a stage and it is sure the road toward is not paved with roses.

It would be required the combined efforts of the government, political leaders, MPs and the entire civil society for the higher-standard civic education of our citizens. Politicians are responsible for leading the people. The beginning can be said fairly good as the democratic transition has gone far to such extent. Frankly speaking, most of us did not expect such much. Negligence is inseparable part of wisdom and thus I have said these words that odds and ends should be given attention too. Because the government, parliament and political parties are obliged to make sure our citizens adhere to the constitution and enjoy the full rights invested by the constitution. Besides, the leaders themselves have to set an example to the people.

The reason why I have clarified so much is that the Article 2 of the present constitution of our nation clearly states that "The State shall be known as the Republic of the Union of Myanmar." Constitution is a set of rules prescribed for the communication between the government and the people, between the government and the parliament, between the government and political parties and between political parties and the people. Another fact is that as constitution is the highest prescription in every State, it is the bonding law every citizen of respective State including the president and prime minister has to abide by. I do not want to see a small mistake resulting in great remorse and am deeply worried that it would harm mutual trust and cooperation.

Create job opportunities

Expats like me could more understand homesickness. We, the citizens who are working odd jobs in neighbouring countries, each have the will that our country stands higher than these countries. This is the love of the country and the nationalist fervour. If we could enjoy wages and salaries these countries pay, guarantees these countries offer and living standards these countries provide in our native land, nobody would take risks working away home. We would be working in our own country peacefully with our parents, relatives and community. Now our country is having bright prospects thanks to the two leaders' bid to find common ground. To draw abreast of the neighbours, it is just enough if we work tirelessly (in Bogyoke Aung San's words). We the citizens are in a hurry. Our country should be developed in good time.

While both Daw Aung San Suu Kyi and the Energy Minister invited investments that would create employment opportunities in Thai Forum, international investors gave a nod of approval and prepared the ground. Nobody should raise doubts and uncertainties of investors in such time. The confidence of the investors is worthier than gems and jewels. Protests for energy insufficiency and low wages spark in our country made headlines. An American businessman asked me about that. His question is, "Should we establish factories in your country with inadequate electricity and workers coming out on strike?"

I answered that these things do not arise overnight and have been underlying the country for years and they arise now because the people are granted more rights in improved political system. It is because of the opening up by the new government led by the incumbent President. He accepted my reason that such peaceful protests are usual in democratic nations. Though, I am concerned. They are doubted. They start to lose confidence. I do not want to blame the government nor the protesters. These are unavoidable. The energy issue could be resolved. It is possible with effective action and sustainable energy strategy. Also the salary dilemma could be settled in line with the law. But I am concerned that these would undermine the confidence of investors in Myanmar. I felt that any one or any organization should not block the investors in this situation.

Most of those who were present at the forum were from multinational corporations. Most of them were interested to do businesses and invest in Myanmar. There were also entrepreneurs who were following the forum news despite their absence. I am really worried that warning them to be not optimistic about Myanmar and speaking that there is no rule of law that could guarantee safety of their investments would shut the door on purpose. I firmly believe that the leaders love the country and people more than I do. The feeling of the one inside the country would not be the same with that of the one outside. I am ready to accept the blame if anyone says me, "What are you worried about, living abroad?" But, our hope is the present time Myanmar is passing.

Clearing the clouds of doubts

Only after President U Thein Sein and Daw Aung San Suu Kyi worked together in the common interest of the people, could we feel such hope and dream such dream. It is once-in-a-lifetime opportunity in the history of the country. I am also concerned that this golden opportunity will be lost. We have to wait for many years to have such a dream. Looking back to the history, our country was subject to internal insurgency and miseries due to suspicion and illusion. It is not so long that the country has been able to stand tall among the international community. I have become old already. I wish to be in my native land with peace of mind till my last breath if I have a chance to serve my country again. Here, I would just like to make suggestions to make public the laws, rules and regulations that guarantee Myanmar citizens abroad like me to come back with complete peace of mind.

In the world history or Myanmar history, a country under the good leader was prosperous. Now we firmly believe that there emerged our two good leaders. Our hope and reliance lie totally on the two leaders. The future of the country depends completely on cooperation of the two leaders on the basis of mutual trust and understanding.

Three murderers who raped, stabbed a woman to death to be brought to trial soonest

NAY PYI TAW, 4 June—On her way from tailoring work to home, Ma Thida Htwe, 27, daughter of U Hla Tin, of Thabyechaung Village, Kyauknimaw Village-tract, Yanbye Township, was stabbed to death by unidentified people at the mangrove near a rain tree beside the embankment road leading to Kyaukhtayan Ward of Kyauknimaw Village and Chaungwa Village at 5.15 pm on 28 May.

A complaint over the case was lodged to Kyauknimaw Police Station by U Win Maung, a brother of the victim. The police station opened the case under Section 302/382 (murder/robbery) of Criminal Procedure Law. The head of Kyaukpyu District MPF and party went to Kyauknimaw Village on 29 May morning and reconstructed the related clues and interrogated three suspects, namely, Htet Htet (a) Rawshi, son of U Kyaw Thuang (Bengali/Islam), of Kyauknimaw (south ward), Rawphi, son of Sweyuktamaw (Bengali/Islam) of Kyauknimaw (Thaya ward) and Khochi, son of Akwechay (Bengali/Islam), of Kyauknimaw (Thaya ward).

The investigation revealed that Htet Htet (a) Rawshi knew the daily routine of the victim who commuted between Thabyechaung Village and Kyauknimaw Village for tailoring. He, in badly need of money for marrying a girl, plotted to rob her of her valuables she wears. Together with Rawphi and Khochi, Rawshi waited at the rain tree near the scene. Seeing her returning home alone, the three pointed her with a knife and took her to the woods where they raped and stabbed her to death, taking away five kinds of gold jewellery including MC gold chain.

In order to avoid racial riots and threat of villagers to the suspects, the Township Administrator and the head of the Township MPF were monitoring the situations and sent the three to Kyaukpyu Jail on at 10.15 am on

30 May. At 1.20 pm the same day, about 100 Rakhine nationals of Kyauknimaw arrived at Kyauknimaw Police Station and demanded to return the three to them who were explained by officials concerned that the three had already been sent to Kyaukpyu Jail. However, the group, unsatisfied with it, was attempting to enter the police station which in return had to fire five shots to disperse them. At 1.50 pm the same day, about 100 Rakhine nationals of Kyauknimaw Village left for Yanbye and the Kyaukpyu District Deputy Commissioner and the head of Kyaukpyu Police Station also went to Yanbye to prevent disturbance and ensure prevalence of law and order settling the problems with the villagers.

At 4 pm on 30 May, the District/Township level departmental officials and Yanbye Township Pyithu Hluttaw representative U Ba Kyi made clarifications to avoid disturbance at Yanbye Township Administrator Office, and the villagers left the office at 5.40 pm. At 9 am on 31 May, they left Yanbye for Kyauknimaw Village with two boats. The Villagers accepted K 1 million donated for the village and K 600,000 for the victim's funeral by the State Transportation Minister U Kyaw Khin and five sets of robes and K 100,000 by the State Hluttaw representative U Than Naing for the victim's funeral.

At 3.5 pm on 31 May, the State Security and Border Affairs Minister, the deputy head of the State Police Station, the Kyaukpyu District Deputy Commissioner and the head of the District Police Station participated in the victim's funeral and held discussions with the villagers. At 9 am on 1 June, the State Chief Minister and party left for Kyaukpyu and held discussions with the Kyaukpyu Township youth organization over the murder case. The discussions mainly touched upon handing down deterrent punishment on the murderers soonest and helping prevent riots when they are being brought to trial.

10 Muslims killed in bus attack

NAY PYI TAW, 4 June—In relation to the case of Ma Thida Htwe who was ruthlessly assaulted on 28 May, a group namely Wunthanu Rakkhita Association, Taunggup, handed out leaflets around 6 am yesterday to locals at crowded places in Taunggup, bearing a photo Ma Thida Htwe and describing a "Notice" making the people in Taunggup to take notice the intentionally assault of Muslims to Rakhinese women.

Around 4 pm yesterday, the news that Muslims were on board a car spread to the town and local people crowded the bus from the Yoma Thitsar Bus-line enroute from Thandwe to Yangon while it stopped in Ayeyeknye in Bus Terminal as passengers embarked and disembarked.

An official of the terminal ordered the bus to leave for Yangon immediately as the bus was crowded. Some people riding motorbikes followed the bus and made the bus to turn back to the town. When the bus

arrived at the junction of Thandwe-Taunggup on its way back to Thandwe, around 300 local people who were waiting there besided the bus and pulled the Muslims out of the bus. In the clash, ten Muslims were killed and the bus were also destroyed. The crowd dispersed around 6.50 pm after Taunggup Township Administrative Board, Myanmar Police Force and Hluttaw Representative, members of War Veterans Organization and townselders arrived at the scene and controlled the situation.

The victims were on their way back to homes after staying in Thandwe for religious purposes. The victims include six from Taungdingyi, two from Myaungmya and two from Thandwe. The bodies of the victims were buried in the Muslims Cemetery in Thandwe today. The attack is under investigation in conformity with the law and officials concerned and townselders are working together to maintain prevalence of community peace and stability.—*MNA*

Crowd destroy Sittway police station

NAY PYI TAW, 4 June—Aung Kyaw Soe and three others lodged a complaint at Sittway No (1) Police Station that, the tea shop at the corner of Setyonesu ward street in Sittway, they had a quarrel over collecting market tax with U Aung Than Wai, 45, son of U Sein Hla, who later fled them at 5.10 pm yesterday, threatening them with the knife he had already brought.

There were 50 persons gathering together at the police station when Daw Aung Than Mya, wife of U Aung Than Wai, accompanied by other nine women informed No (1) Police Station that her husband was missing at 7.30 pm.

The number of people gradually arose to 200. As Chairman of Sittway Township Rakhine Nationalities Development Party U Auns Mya Kyaw promised the crowd at 7.45 pm that he would search for U Aung Than Wai, an RNDP member, the crowd dispersed and U Aung Than Wai's wife left the police station.

As the crowd of 300 gathered again in front of the police station at 9 pm, U Aung Mya Kyaw said he would brought Aung Than Wai and urged the crowd to disperse and left the police station.

RNDP Chairman Dr Aye Maung, State Agriculture and Breeding Minister U Kyaw Thein arrived at the police station at about 10 pm. U Aung Mya Kyaw brought Aung Than Wai to the police station at about 10.40 pm and requested the crowd to split up. The crowd did not separate and threw pieces of

broken glasses and stones into the police station. The roofs of the police station building and staff quarters were torn and windbreakers of two vehicles owned by the police force were broken.

The angry mob attempted to break into the police station from the front door at 11.10 pm and the policemen tried to disperse the mob firing gunshots into the air. However, the mob did not break up and attempted to enter into the station again from the front door at 11.15 pm, breaking down the front lamp of the station.

The policemen did the same to disperse the mob which spread to both sides of the police station. But, the mob was still surrounding the police station, the police force members discharging duties had to use riot weapon and tear gas bomb at 1 am on 4 June to disperse the mob. The mob set fire on PCO building in front of Yoma Bank at the Junction of Main Street and U Ottama Street at 3 am.

In the incident, 12 civilians were wounded and were sent to Sittway Hospital. Nine out of the mob have been detained for investigation.

At present, a law has been enacted for peaceful gathering and procession for the sake of democratic and human rights. Nonetheless, such anarchic and lawless organized acts are totally unacceptable. So, necessary investigations would be made into the case and punitive measures would be taken under the law.—*MNA*

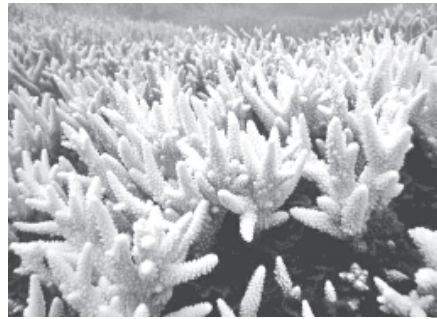
Boy confirmed with bird flu in Hong Kong

HONG KONG, 4 June—Hong Kong health authority said on Saturday that a two-year-old boy has been confirmed with H5N1 Influenza A and urged the public not to panic. The Centre for Health Protection said the boy's condition has changed from stable to serious after testing positive for the deadly avian influenza, while his parents' tests for influenza were negative. "The boy's parents are all along asymptomatic, which means that the chance of a human-to-human transmission is slim," said a spokesman of the centre in a statement. The boy was put to intensive care treatment while his parents were in quarantine in the same hospital.

A native of China's southern city of Guangzhou, the boy went to Hong Kong with his family on 26 May to seek medical treatment after running a fever for weeks. After reporting the influenza case, the city government raised its bird flu alert level to "serious" and tightened control on live chickens imports, and strengthened supervision of local farms and markets. The authority has intensified disease monitoring and infection control in public hospitals. Hospital staff will keep close watch over visiting patients and enforce triage assessment and appropriate segregation at waiting areas in line with clinical guidelines.

Besides, all 30 local

chicken farms will be inspected within two days to ensure that their chickens are healthy and biosecurity and health measures are followed strictly. The Centre for Food Safety has contacted with its mainland counterparts in search of the infection source. Once the source is located, an area within 13 km radius will be declared an import control zone. Imports of live poultry and poultry products will be suspended for 21 days in the zone. "At the moment, it is an isolated case. We feel that there is no need for panic among Hong Kong citizens," said York Chow, the Secretary for Food and Health of the city government, while addressing media earlier in the day.—Xinhua

After stop at NYC airport, shuttle goes to sea

NEW YORK, 4 June—The prototype space shuttle that arrived in New York City by air earlier this spring is on the move again, this time by sea. The Enterprise has been parked at Kennedy Airport since it flew from Washington to New York atop a 747 jet. The shuttle was placed on a barge Saturday and readied for a slow journey through the harbor to the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum on Manhattan's West Side. The barge is scheduled to be taken Sunday across New York Harbor to Port Elizabeth, NJ.

Then, on Tuesday, a tugboat is to move the Enterprise to the Intrepid, a decommissioned aircraft carrier.

Plans are in place for a floating crane to lift the spacecraft onto the flight deck.—Internet

One person killed in plant blast in Texas, US

HOUSTON, 4 June—One person was killed and another was injured in a plant explosion, which occurred early Saturday in Houston, a city in the US state of Texas, local media reported. According to local TV channel ABC13 reports, a welding machine malfunction should be blamed for the accident, which happened at an Oiltanking Partners facility in Channelview.

The person who died in the accident was an employee of an independent contractor and the injured man was also a contracted worker, who has been taken to a hospital for medical treatment. The

company said in a statement there was no fire, environmental or health threat that occurred, and a thorough investigation was underway. Firefighters at the blast site also confirmed that the blast did not pose a threat to the public as no hazardous material was released.

The company, which is engaged in the storage and transport of crude oil, refined petroleum products and liquefied petroleum gas, is part of the Oiltanking Group, which is the world's second largest independent tank storage provider for products, chemicals and gases.

China's non-manufacturing sector expands slower

BEIJING, 4 June—China's non-manufacturing sector grew at a slightly slower rate in May as the world's second largest economy showed signs of further moderation.

The Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) of the country's non-manufacturing sector, a key economic indicator, dropped 0.9 percentage points to 55.2 percent in May, according to data released by the China Federation of Logistics and Purchasing (CFLP) on Sunday. It was the second consecutive month of decline, after the index fell 1.9 percentage points from March

to 56.1 percent in April.

A PMI reading above 50 percent indicates expansion from the previous month, while readings below this mark indicate a contraction. "The non-manufacturing economy has maintained steady and strong growth as the PMI in May remained on a high level despite a small retreat," said CFLP Vice Chairman Cai Jin. The figure followed Friday's release of the PMI for the country's manufacturing sector, which ended five consecutive months of growth and dipped to 50.4 percent in

May from 53.3 percent in April.

Analysts expect China's economy to downshift further in the second quarter as Europe's sovereignty debt crisis sags export and a flagging property market dampens investment. The country recorded an 8.1-percent annual growth in the first quarter, the slowest expansion in almost three years. In May, the sub-index for new export orders of the non-manufacturing sector decreased by 2.2 percentage points month-on-month to 50.5 percent, the CFLP data show.

Web China: young netizens worry Chinese parents

BEIJING, 4 June—Playing with dolls or building blocks may be the favourite pastime for Chinese kids in the past, but now they are being challenged by the attractive cyberspace.

A recent survey report says more than 70 percent of kids had experience of Internet surfing at or before the age of 10, and 10 percent of them began accessing the Internet before three years old. The report, released by the Chinese Young Pioneers Business Development Centre in March, was based on a survey of 11,000 elementary and high school students and 5,500 parents across the nation.

According to the report, what the kids do online are mostly playing games and

using social media like twitter-like Weibo, or QQ, a popular online chatting tool in China. According to a similar survey report released by the Guangdong Academy of Social Sciences on 30 May, 82 percent of the more than 3,000 children respondents surf the Internet everyday.

These reports aroused heated debate on Weibo.com. Parents worry that addiction to online games may affect children's academic performance, as well as their physical and mental wellbeing.

These worries are well-founded. According to the centre's report, 72.5 percent of the children surveyed have viewed information online considered as "harmful" by

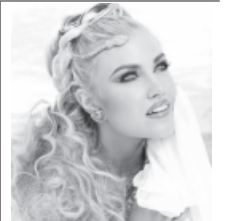
parents, such as sex-explicit pictures and videos of violent content. For nine-year-old Yi Fan, the biggest fun getting on line is playing games. "I feel happy when playing games...thrilling," said Yi, who has at least 30 minutes surfing online everyday after finishing homework. In the eyes of grade-five pupil Little Hao (nickname), playing online games on computers is a trend.

"All of my classmates play online games on computers, and most of them have played for two years," said Little Hao. Playing computer games at an early age has negative effects," said Wang Xiangnan, a researcher from the Beijing-based Sentian Psychological Institute.

Over 4 tonnes of drugs destroyed in China

FUZHOU, 4 June — A total of 4.2 tonnes of drugs and precursor chemicals were destroyed by law enforcement officers in southeast China's Fujian Province on Sunday. The drugs destroyed included heroin, methamphetamine, ketamine, opium, marijuana, cocaine and ephedrine, all of which are illegal or strictly controlled in China.

The burning of the drugs was carried out at a solid waste treatment plant at Minhou county near Fuzhou, capital city of Fujian. By cutting off underground circulation channels and drug sources, anti-drug authorities in Fujian have cracked 7,736 cases involving illegal drugs and captured 8,406 people suspected of selling drugs since 2010, said Cai Xiaolin, deputy director of the provincial department of public security. — Xinhua

Humans remain main threat to Indonesia's endangered rhinoceroses

JAKARTA, 4 June — Human hunting has been the biggest threat to the population of the rare species one-horned Javan rhinoceros into extinction, a government official said on Monday. "For rhinos, the main threat is humans, besides natural disturbances and disease," Novianto Bambang, director of conservation and biodiversity at the Forestry Ministry said. "Humans are very strange, in my opinion, because they are interested in the rhino for its horn. There are many who believe rhino horn has properties that can increase virility. The

problem is, to get the horn, like it or not, they have to kill the rhino," he added.

According to him, there were only 35 Javan rhinos remaining at the Ujung Kulon National Park in West Java. Novianto said that the ministry planned to declare 2012 the International Year of the Rhino to draw attention to the creature's plight. The announcement is scheduled to take place on Tuesday. "The second problem is, of course, human encroachment into the rhinos' already limited habitat. It is becoming increasingly harder for rhinos to find food

in their own habitats," he was quoted by the *Jakarta globe* as saying.

One of only 11 nations where rhinos are found, including Malaysia, India and South Africa, Indonesia is lucky to have two kinds of rhinos: The one-horned Javan rhino and the two-horned Sumatran rhino, of which only 200 remain in the wild. "Indonesia has two species of rhino that are still in some of the biggest numbers in the world. In Vietnam, the rhino is already extinct. We mustn't let that happen here," Novianto said. — Xinhua

"Snow White" takes surprise win in North America box office

LOS ANGELES, 4 June — Universal's "Snow White and the Huntsman" took a fairytale-like win at the weekend North America box office with a better-than-expected debut of 56.2 million US dollars, according to studio estimates released by Hollywood.com on Sunday. This was the fourth-highest debut this year behind "The Avengers," "The Hunger Games" and "The Lorax," and above last weekend's "Men in Black 3." The film also performed well internationally in 45 territories, taking in 39.3 million dollars for a worldwide total of 95.6 million dollars. The dark interpretation of the classic fairytale stars "Twilight" star Kristen Stewart as Snow White, "The Avengers" hero Chris Hemsworth as the Huntsman, and Oscar-winner Charlize Theron as Evil Queen.

Paul Dergarabedian, box office analyst for Hollywood.com, said "there's a little

something for everyone, with a strong female lead and plenty of 'Lord of the Rings'-style action." The film attracted primarily to women, who made up 53 percent of the audience, and those over the age of 30, who made up 52 percent of the audience. "Snow White's" performance was well enough to suck big-budget "Men in Black 3," which took the throne from "The Avengers" last weekend. Sony's 3D threequel "Men in Black 3," reuniting Will Smith's Agent J and Tommy



Lee Jones' Agent K ten years after they saved the earth last time, finished a decent second place at the weekend with 29.3 million dollars and a 10-day total of 112.3 million dollars.

But the film's mega-star Will Smith, having left the big screen for three years, did not manage to beat rising female star Stewart this time. Marvel Studios' record-breaking "The Avengers," distributed by Walt Disney Co was really a huge success. Although it was in the third with 20.3 million dollars on the list of box office at the weekend, it surpassed "The Dark Knight" to become the third highest grossing film of all-time in North America, just after just 29 days of its release. The film has earned 552.7 million dollars domestically. "The Dark Knight" passed the 500-million-dollar threshold in North America after 45 days and had earned 533.3 million dollars in total.

"The bear got on scene, there was graduation going



on and he was not an invited guest," said Kim Rodriguez with Kern County Animal Control. "He felt like he was unwelcome, so he left."

The bear climbed the fence onto the empty

playground and only stayed for a brief moment before climbing back over the fence and fleeing to a nearby apartment complex, where it was captured and taken to the local Animal Control facility.

Police: Woman stole seven pregnancy tests

Police in Florida said they arrested a woman accused of stealing seven pregnancy tests and a container of lubricant from a Walgreen's store.

LONDON, 4 June — Chelsea defender Gary Cahill will miss the summer's European Championship after suffering a double fracture of his jaw while playing for England in Saturday's match against Belgium.

Cahill collided with Manchester City goalkeeper Joe Hart early in the match after a push from Belgium's Dries Mertens. He was replaced by Joleon Lescott and

taken to hospital for scans which revealed two fractures of his jaw, one on either side.

Liverpool defender Martin Kelly will now be called into the squad—subject to agreement from UEFA's medical team. All 16 teams at Euro 2012 have submitted their final 23-man squad lists—but they are allowed a replacement if injury rules out a player ahead of the start of the

tournament on 8th June. Liverpool's Kelly, 22, trained with the England players last week and was part of the group that travelled to Norway for the friendly victory on 26th May.

The news is the latest in a series of unfortunate pre-tournament injuries for England—Cahill joins teammate Frank Lampard in seeing his Euro 2012 hopes end before the tournament. Gareth Barry of Manchester City has also been ruled out, as has Norwich City goalkeeper John Ruddy.

There was some good news for England though as Chelsea defender John Terry has been given the all-clear following concerns over a hamstring injury - although will be re-assessed on Tuesday when the team regroup. Cahill will now be treated by Chelsea's club doctors. England begin their Euro 2012 campaign against France on Monday 11th June.

He was less prolific during 2011/12, scoring only two goals in the League, although he did net a key goal in the Carling Cup final which

Liverpool won in a penalty shoot-out.

In a statement on their website, the club said: "Everyone at Liverpool Football Club would like to wish Dirk all the very best for the future and thank him for his contribution to the club." Liverpool captain Steven Gerrard said: "Dirk is a great

player, a great person and was a great servant to Liverpool. "From the first day he came to the club, he was someone you could trust and knew that he would never let you down on the pitch. He added: "I will miss him around the place and I wish him and his family all the best in Turkey."

Mexicans blank Brazil in tune-up friendly

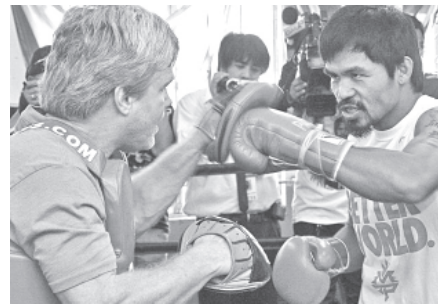
ARLINGTON, 4 June — Manchester International striker Javier Hernandez and Tottenham Hotspur playmaker Gio Dos Santos scored to give Mexico a 2-0 victory over Brazil in an international football friendly on Sunday. Dos Santos opened the scoring in the 21st minute and Hernandez converted from the penalty spot in the 32nd minute to give the Mexicans victory before 84,519 spectators at the home stadium of American football's Dallas Cowboys.

Five-time World Cup champions Brazil are testing younger talent ahead of next month's start of the London Olympics while Mexico will begin qualifying matches on Friday for the 2014 World Cup that the Brazilians will host.

Brazil, with playmakers Neymar and Hulk in a starting role, were coming off a 4-1 rout of the United States last Wednesday. The Mexicans were coming off a 2-1 victory over Bosnia-Herzegovina on a Hernandez goal in the third minute of stoppage time. Mexico will open their 2014 World Cup qualifying campaign against Guyana in Mexico City on Friday.—*Internet*

After struggling in his last fight against Juan Manuel Marquez, he gets a fighter who doesn't hit all that hard and shouldn't be able to match Pacquiao's speed. "He's no killer, but he tries hard," Roach said of Bradley. "Manny should eat him up as he comes forward. I think Manny should look really good in this fight."

And if he doesn't? Well, then you finally can forget about that big fight with Floyd Mayweather Jr that now seems destined never to happen.

"If he looks bad, he

retires," Roach said. "At least I'll tell him to."

And he may be the first one who will listen to me." Roach knows something about aging fighters. He once was one himself, losing five of his last six fights and taking the kind of beatings that may have led to the Parkinson's he suffers from today.

He fought on club cards and in casinos far from the Las Vegas Strip, always sure that in his next fight he would do better. The fighter is almost always the last one to acknowledge it's over and, though Pacquiao is only 33, he's been in a lot of fights and a lot of wars. Pacquiao plans to fight only a few more times anyway. But to make sure he understands when it's finally time to quit, fighter and trainer have made a pact.—*Internet*

American Lewis captures LPGA title

GALLOWAY, 4 June — American Stacy Lewis fired a final round level-par 71 to capture the \$1.5 million ShopRite LPGA Classic by four strokes on Sunday for her second tournament victory of the season. Lewis finished the 54-hole event on 12-under par 201. Australia's Katherine Hull birdied three of the last four holes to take second on 205, one stroke ahead of Japan's Mika Miyazato and Spain's Azahara Munoz.

The victory bumps Lewis from seventh to third in the world rankings, pushing her past Cristie Kerr as the top US female golfer. "I'm third in the world now and the top

American," Lewis said. "I don't even know what to say. I mean it's unbelievable. "You dream of it and you can see yourself there eventually, but for it to actually happen—it's just unbelievable."

Lewis has two victories in three starts after winning earlier this season at the Mobile Bay LPGA Classic. "I've gotten off to a really good start and just been playing some good golf," Lewis said. Lewis took her only other title last year at a major, the Kraft Nabisco, and she is on form again heading into another major, next week's \$2.5 million LPGA Championship at Pittsford, New York. Tiger Woods wins Memorial to tie Nicklaus

MUIRFIELD, 4 June — Tiger Woods birdied three of the last four holes, one with an amazing chip shot, to win the PGA Memorial tournament and match host Jack Nicklaus for second on the all-time victory list. Woods captured his 73rd career title with a five-under par 67 final round, putting him on nine-under par 279 after 72 holes, two strokes ahead of South African Rory Sabbatini and Argentina's Andres Romero.

"I hit it good today," Woods said. "That was some good stuff out there. I never really missed a shot. I hit it great. I had the pace of the

greens really nice and I made a few putts."

Added to the legend of Woods was another spectacular shot — the superstar blasting out of the rough for a 48-foot chip-in birdie on the par-3 16th hole to seize a share of the lead. "That was one of the most incredible golf shots I think you will ever see played," said Nicklaus, serving as a US television commentator.

"That was an unbelievable shot. That was the most unbelievable gutsy shot I've ever seen. If he hits it long the tournament is over. If he hits it short the tournament is over. He puts it

in the hole." Woods, a 14-time major champion chasing the all-time record of 18 major titles won by Nicklaus, pulled even with the legend in all-time USPGA wins, both now nine adrift of Sam Snead's record 82 triumphs.

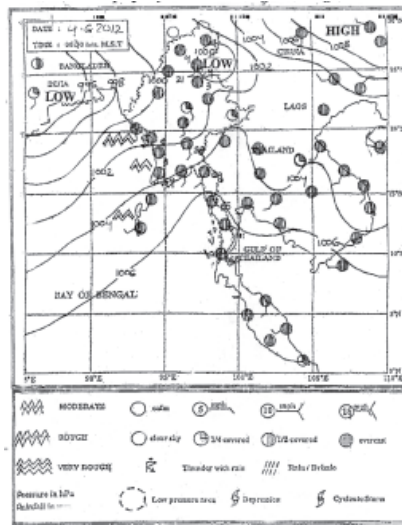

IAEA, Iran to hold nuclear talks on 8 June

VIENNA, 4 June—The UN atomic watchdog and Iran will hold a new round of talks this week to try to reach an agreement to resume a long-stalled investigation into suspected nuclear weapons research in the Islamic Republic, IAEA chief Yukiya Amano said on Monday.

Amano, director general of the International Atomic Energy Agency, made a rare visit to Tehran two weeks ago and said when he returned to Vienna that he expected a

framework cooperation deal to be signed soon with Iran.

Iranian officials have made clear that only once such an accord has been finalized will they grant UN inspectors access to the Parchin military site, where the IAEA suspects Iran may have carried out nuclear weapons development activity.

Western diplomats have voiced doubt that Iran will implement any such agreement with the Vienna-based UN agency, which says

Teheran has stonewalled its investigation for almost four years.

They say Iran may be offering increased cooperation with the IAEA to use as a bargaining chip in its broader talks with world powers which are aimed at defusing a decade-old standoff over Teheran's nuclear programme, which has seen the major oil producer subjected to increasingly tough economic sanctions.

Germans head to Euro 2012 in confident mood

BERLIN, 4 June — Germany are set to arrive in Gdansk for Euro 2012 on Monday with key midfielder Bastian Schweinsteiger having received a clean bill of health and coach Joachim Loew in a confident mood.

Germany are based in the Baltic port of Gdansk, Poland, for the duration of Euro 2012, which starts on Friday with the final in Kiev on 1 July, with all their Group B games taking place in Ukraine. The Germans have had minor set backs in their final preparations after a weakened team suffered a shock 5-3 defeat to Switzerland last weekend, while midfield star Schweinsteiger is recovering from a calf strain.

The 27-year-old is in a core group of players central to Loew's hopes of bringing home a fourth European

crown, having last lifted the title in 1996 after also winning the 1972 and 1980 tournaments.

Schweinsteiger strained his left calf a fortnight ago when Bayern Munich lost the Champions League final 4-3 on penalties to Chelsea as his missed spot-kick in the shoot-out helped the Blues seal victory. Germany are amongst the pre-tournament favourites and open their campaign in Lviv, Ukraine, on Saturday against Portugal with Schweinsteiger having been given the green light to play.

"Bastian has no problems, no more pain," German team doctor Hans-Wilhelm Mueller-Wohlfaahrt told Munich-based newspaper Tz after Schweinsteiger spent the weekend relaxing in Italy with his model girlfriend Sarah Brandner.—INTERNET

Japanese, Aussies dominate at Santa Clara swim meet

SANTA CLARA, 4 June — Australians and Japanese dominated final day of the Santa Clara Invitational swim meet with three triumphs for each nation in preparation for next month's London Olympics.

Aussie veteran Leisel Jones on Sunday won the 100-meter breaststroke in 1:07.37, 1.08 seconds ahead of American Alia Atkinson, with Aussie Sarah Katsoulis third in 1:09.08.

Aussies also swept both 100 backstroke crowns, with Emily Seebohm winning the women's race in 1:00.00 and Ashley Delaney taking the men's 100 back in 54.89, .62 of a second in front of Aussie runner-up Hayden Stoeckel.

Japanese swimmers swept the 200 butterfly with Natsumi taking the women's race in 2:07.32, 2.34 seconds in front of American Jasmine Tosky, and Takeshi

Matsuda won the men's 200 fly in 1:54.57, 1.86 ahead of Aussie Nick D'Arcy.

Japan's Ken Takakuwa won the men's 200 individual medley in 2:00.55, .89 in front of compatriot Yuya Horihata.—INTERNET

JERUSALEM, 4 June—An Israeli company has said there is a high probability of further major natural gas deposits off the northern Israeli coast.

A statement released on Sunday by the Israel Opportunity energy exploration partnership said that prospecting at the Pelagic group of deep-sea fields, west of Haifa, showed a potential 189 billion cubic

metres (6.7 trillion cubic feet) of gas and 1.4 billion barrels of oil there.

"The quantity of gas discovered in the licences, and at high probabilities, are the third-largest discovered so far off Israel's shores," Chairman Ronny Helman said. "This quantity ensures Israel's energy future for many decades," he said.

French Open champion Li Na's title defence ended when she was knocked out in a flurry of unforced errors by Kazakh qualifier Yaroslava Shvedova 3-6-6-2-6-0.

After taking the first set, the Chinese seventh seed collapsed, taking only two games out of the next 14. Last year's champion made 41 unforced errors as she spectacularly lost control of a match in which she had looked to be cruising towards victory.

Doubles specialist Shvedova, ranked 142 in the world in singles, will now play the winner of Varvara Lepchenko's match against Wimbledon winner Petra Kvitova in the quarter-final.

Maria Sharapova fought Klara Zakopalova as well as swirling winds for more than three hours to book her place

in the French Open quarter-finals with a 6-4 6-7 6-2 win over the unheralded Czech.

The Russian second seed, looking to complete her collection of grand slam titles, spent more time on court on Monday than she had in total over her three previous matches. The windswept conditions on Court Philippe Chatrier made it almost impossible for the players to throw the ball and a total of 21

games, 17 of them in the first two sets, went against serve. Sharapova, who will take over as world number one if she reaches the final, eventually stamped her authority on the match in the final set to set up a last-eight meeting with either Dutchwoman Arantxa Rus or Estonian 23rd seed Kaia Kanepi.—Reuters
