Central Bank of Myanmar to put into circulation new denomination of Ten Thousand Kyats currency note on 15 June

The Central Bank of Myanmar will put into circulation a new denomination of Ten Thousand Kyats currency note with effect from June 15, 2012. The new currency note will be issued to the public at the Currency Department of the Central Bank of Myanmar, Banks and Government Treasuries during the banking hours.

All legal tender currency notes and coins will continue to be in circulation. General description of the new currency note is as follows:-

TENTHOUSANDKYATSNOTE

- Dimension : 15x 7 cm
- Dominant Colour : Blue
- Obverse Side : On the top, the inscription “ပြန်စာရိုင်းတော်စတိုဘတ်” is printed. In the middle portion, the Note carries the depiction of the Map of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar encircled by two



laurels and two royal white elephants in face to face position with a white lotus at the top in Myanmar artistic style. And also the Myanmar inscription “တစ်သောင်းကျပ်” mentioning the value of the note is printed. On the right hand side, floral designs in Myanmar artistic style are printed. On the three corners, the value of the Note is printed in numeral figures. Bank Notes numbers are printed in Myanmar and English. In fact it is a form of government in which the supreme power is vested in the people and exercised directly by them or by their elected representatives under a free electoral system or in other words a state having such a form of government.

Generally, democracy is a system in which the voting public takes part in elections and chooses politicians to represent them in a Legislative Assembly. The members of the assembly then make decisions with a majority vote.

Anyhow, democracy is a system that focuses on the people rather than on the administrative authorities or the people in power. During the meeting, the Turkish Co proposed to assist Myanmar in solving recent power outage with power ship equipped with generators, which the company said can be launched within three to six months. According to the company, the ships are operated with dual fuel system and thus both natural gas and fuel oil can be used for operating without interruption. It has successful examples in Pakistan and Iraq. The Union Minister and the guests agreed to discuss further for feasibility of the operation and proposal submitting.

Likewise, the Union Minister received General Manager Mr Mistuo Ido of Mitsubishi Corporation from Japan and party who proposed to import its gas-fired power generators from Thailand and send diesel generators in Singapore and Vietnam urgently.

Panetta in Afghanistan for talks amid rising violence

KABUL, 7 June — US Defence Secretary Leon Panetta arrived in Afghanistan on Thursday for talks with military leaders amid rising violence in the war against the Taliban and a spate of deadly incidents, including a NATO air strike said to have killed 18 villagers.

Panetta said the purpose of the trip was to hear an assessment from US General John Allen, the head of NATO coalition forces in Afghanistan, about the “ability to confront these

threats from the Taliban and from the Haqqanis”, a reference to the hardline, al Qaeda-linked Haqqani network.

Panetta also planned to visit troops and hold talks with the Afghan defence minister, General Abdul Rahim Wardak.

Panetta said he wanted to find out about a recent increase in the numbers of attacks in Afghanistan, including some that appear to have been more organized than others seen recently.

“I think it’s important to try to make sure we are aware of the kind of attacks they are going to engage in, particularly as we go through the rest of the summer and enter the latter part of this year,” Panetta said.

The Afghanistan visit came at the end of Panetta’s week-long trip to Asia to explain a new US military strategy, announced in January, that calls for a shift in strategic focus to the Asia-Pacific Region.

United Nations Secretary-General’s message on World Oceans Day

8 June, 2012

This year’s World Oceans Day falls as the international community marks an important milestone: the thirtieth anniversary of the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

When the Convention opened for signature on 10 December 1982, it was rightly characterized as a “constitution for the oceans”. Forged through a process of negotiation among more than 150 States, the treaty is a living monument to international cooperation.

When it was adopted, the Convention on the Law of the Sea made treaty history. With 320 articles and nine annexes covering every aspect of the oceans and marine environment, the Convention sets out a delicate balance of rights and duties.

The protection of the world’s oceans and coasts is among the key goals of the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development, which will open in Rio de Janeiro in just 12 days. The Convention is contributing to this goal through its

provisions, including on the preservation of the marine environment, marine scientific research and the transfer of marine technology.

We must do more for our world’s oceans, which are threatened by pollution, depleted fishery resources, the impacts of climate change and the deterioration of the marine environment. Rio+20 must mobilize the United Nations, Governments and other partners to improve the management and conservation of oceans through initiatives to curb overfishing, improve protection of the marine environment and reduce ocean pollution and the impact of climate change.

There could be no more fitting way to commemorate World Oceans Day than for all countries that have not yet done so to ratify the Convention on the Law of the Sea.

Let us make 2012 another milestone year for the world’s oceans, so that we can set sail towards the future we want.

Chinese President Hu Jintao hosts opening ceremony of 12th SCO Summit

BEIJING, 7 June — Chinese President Hu Jintao will host the opening ceremony of the 12th summit. Leaders from the other five member states have already arrived to attend. Russian President, Vladimir Putin, was the first to arrive in Beijing on Tuesday. It’s his first trip to China since regaining the Russian presidency.

A major highlight has been the signing of a joint communiqué along with a range of commercial agreements between China and Russia. On Wednesday, President Hu Jintao has held separate meetings with his counterparts from

Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Russia, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

They’ve exchanged opinions on past cooperation and have expressed their

hopes for the two-day summit. Participants also include leaders from the observer states, India, Iran, Mongolia and Pakistan, as well as dialogue partners Belarus and Sri Lanka. Other delegation guests include those from Afghanistan, the SCO secretariat, the United Nation, the Commonwealth of Independent States, the Collective Security Treaty Organization, and the Eurasian Economic Community.

The Beijing summit is expected to set the tone for the development of the organization over the next decade.— Xinhua

India wants US to “recalibrate” its new Asia-Pacific defence strategy

NEW DELHI, 7 June — India has called on the United States to “recalibrate” its new strategy in the Asia-Pacific Region during talks between Indian Defence Minister AK Antony and visiting US Defence Secretary Leon Panetta on Wednesday in the Indian capital, said local media on Thursday.

“Antony emphasized the need to strengthen the multilateral security architecture in the Asia-Pacific and to move at a pace comfortable to all countries concerned,” the Indian Defence Ministry was quoted as

saying in a statement after the talks between Antony and Panetta.

During the talks, Panetta outlined the new US Asia-Pacific strategy, saying, “America is at a turning point. After a decade of war, we are developing the new defence strategy in particular, we will expand our military partnerships and our presence in the arc extending from the Western Pacific and East Asia into the Indian Ocean region and South Asia. Defence cooperation with India is a linchpin in this strategy.”—Xinhua

Afghan President Karzai hails China as steady partner

BEIJING, 7 June — Afghanistan is extremely grateful that China has been a steady partner for the country in providing fundamental support during its process of seeking stabilization and progress, said Afghan President Hamid Karzai in Beijing on Wednesday. When delivering a speech on Afghanistan’s foreign

policies at the China Foreign Affairs University, Karzai thanked China for being the biggest investor in his country while helping his homeland in lots of other ways.

“The relations we have with the world are among the strongest Afghanistan has ever had,” said the president. Afghanistan has broad relationships not only with

its neighbours, but also with Europe and the United States, as the country has signed strategic partnership agreements with many countries including Germany, the United States, Australia and India, said Karzai. His country is happy in keeping a good equilibrium of understanding and contact, Karzai added.

US offers millions in bounty for top Somali militants

WASHINGTON, 7 June — The United States is offering rewards of up to \$7 million for information leading to the location of seven key leaders of Somalia’s al Shabaab, seeking for the first time to target top echelons of the al Qaeda-linked militant group. US officials said the rewards, to be announced on the State Department’s “Rewards for Justice” website on Thursday, opened a new front in the battle against al Shabaab and signaled Washington’s determination to press the fight against terrorism across Africa.

“This is the first time we’ve had key leaders of al Shabaab as part of the Rewards for Justice programme,” said Robert Hartung, an assistant director at the State Department’s Bureau of Diplomatic Security, which administers the program-me. “Every time we add someone to the Rewards for Justice site, that is a signal that the US government is sending that it takes the fight against terrorism very seriously,” Hartung said. The US government in 2008 named al Shabaab to its list of foreign terrorist organizations, imposing financial and other restrictions on the group that had seized control of large areas of south and central Somalia and sought to impose its strict version of Islam on the impoverished Horn of Africa nation.

The United States has also joined international efforts to bolster Somalia in the face of its multiple crises, pledging \$300 million to support an African Union force battling al Shabaab and \$250 million for humanitarian relief after drought struck the region last year.”

'Chemical' chip could control our bodies

LINKÖPING, 7 June—Researchers in Sweden say an electronic circuit based on chemistry could control and regulate the signal paths of cells in the human body. The chip is based on ion "transistors" for transport of both positive and negative ions, as well as charged biomolecules, rather than moving electrons as in conventional electronic circuits, Linköping University reported on Tuesday. The chemical chip can thus control the delivery of neurotransmitters, allowing chemical control of muscles, researchers said.

"We can, for example, send out signals to muscle synapses where the signaling system may not work for some reason. We know our chip works with common signaling substances, for example acetylcholine," Magnus Berggren, a professor of organic electronics and leader of the research group, said. An advantage of chemical circuits is that the charge carrier in the circuit consists of chemical substances with various functions in the body, researchers said, opening up possibilities of treating certain physical conditions.—*Internet*

Tree rings suggest ancient cosmic event

NAGOYA, 7 June—Japanese researchers say ancient tree ring data suggests Earth may have been the target of an unusual cosmic ray bombardment more than 1,200 years ago.

When cosmic rays — subatomic particles traveling through space — reach Earth they react with the atmosphere, producing new particles, including carbon-14 that is taken up by trees during photosynthesis and is "fixed" in the tree's annual growth ring.

Researchers at Nagoya University examined the carbon-14 content of two Japanese cedar trees and found an unusually high amount of the isotope between AD 774 and 775, *NewScientist.com* reported on Sunday.

A similar increase has been found in the carbon-14 record of North American trees of the time, they said.

Physicists probe atomic mystery

PASADENA, 7 June—US physicists say the most sensitive measurements yet in a hunt for a hypothetical atomic process could help solve some of the universe's biggest mysteries.

Researchers at the California Institute of Technology and Stanford University's SLAC National Accelerator Laboratory say their experiment, involving the radioactive decay of atomic nuclei, could help scientists understand the fundamental laws of physics and why there is more matter than antimatter — and therefore why regular matter like planets, stars and humans exists at all.

The EXO-200 experiment has made the most sensitive measurements on the nature

of a hypothetical so-called neutrinoless double beta decay, and has narrowed the range of possible masses for the neutrino — a tiny uncharged particle that rarely interacts with anything — passing through rock, people and planets as it zips along at nearly the speed of light, a Caltech release reported on Monday.

In a normal double beta decay, which was first observed in 1986, two neutrons in an unstable atomic nucleus turn into two protons.

In the process, two electrons and two anti-neutrinos — the antimatter counterparts of neutrinos — are emitted.

Physicists have suggested two neutrons could also

decay into two protons by emitting two electrons without producing any anti-neutrinos if the two neutrinos produced could somehow cancel each other out.

If this neutrinoless process does indeed exist, physicists would be forced to revise the Standard Model, the remarkably successful theory that describes how all elementary particles behave and interact, because the model does not predict a neutrino could act as its own antiparticle.

"People have been looking for this process for a very long time," EXO-200 researcher Petr Vogel said. "It would be a very fundamental discovery if someone actually observes it."—*Internet*

Apple wins in nano-SIM card battle

SOPHIA ANTIPOLIS, 7 June — Apple has won another technical battle as its proposed next generation of mobile SIM cards has been accepted by a European standards body.

The European Telecommunications Standards Institute has decided on a new standard size and insertion technique for so-called nano-SIM cards that could lead to smaller mobile devices in the future, *venturebeat.com* reported.

Nokia, Apple, Motorola, and RIM all had competing proposals, with Nokia and Motorola campaigning for a push-in type of card while Apple proposed a tray-based design, eventually accepted by the institute.

The new nano-SIM cards will be 12.3 millimeters by 8.8 millimeters, about 40

percent smaller than current SIM cards, and have the same thickness as the current Micro-SIM standard, the institute said.—*Internet*

Starfish stranding linked to starvation

TOKYO, 7 June—Hundreds of crown-of-thorns starfish found on a beach in southern Japan became stranded because they were weakened by starvation, researchers say.

More than 800 of the creatures were discovered on a 1,000-foot stretch of sand on Ishigaki Island in January, a report in the journal *Coral Reefs* reported. A population "outbreak" was first noted in 2009 when masses of juvenile starfish were seen feeding on the island's outer coral reef, eventually completely deleting the food source in



the next three years, researchers said. "The shortage of food, corals, is a probable cause of the

stranding," Go Suzuki from Japan's Fisheries Research Agency said.

Intel turns to plastic Ultrabook cases

SANTA CLARA, 7 June—Intel says it's turned to aerospace in an attempt to come up with materials and configurations to help bring down the price of its Ultrabook computers.

The company's R&D centre, consulting with engineers from Boeing, has developed a design method to make plastic laptop cases as strong as the more expensive metal ones typically used in Ultrabooks, *techeye.net* reported on Monday.

Using plastic instead of metal may cut the cost of future Ultrabooks by between \$25 and \$75, Intel's Ben Broili told Avionics Intelligence.

The researchers found that hard drives, motherboards and other components inside a laptop computer can be arranged in a manner that makes the computer's internal structure much stronger, allowing the use of plastic for the outer cases without sacrificing strength.

Suit filed over Zuckerberg stock dump

MENLO PARK, 7 June — Facebook investors filed suit against Chief Executive Officer Mark Zuckerberg, saying he knew the firm's initial share price was too high, court papers say.

TMZ reported on Monday the class-action lawsuit claims Zuckerberg sold a significant share of his Facebook stock, knowing in advance the \$38 per share price would not hold up.

The price of Facebook shares has dropped sharply — off nearly 30 percent, trading at \$27.27 per share late Monday — since its public debut on 18 May.

This is the second lawsuit filed concerning Facebook and underwriters withholding information before the firm's IPO, which was also marred by technical difficulties at the Nasdaq stock exchange.

The new lawsuit claims underwriters of the IPO — Morgan Stanley, JPMorgan and Goldman Sachs — notified large investors the stock was overvalued, but did

not disclose this to smaller investors, known as retail investors.

MarketWatch reported on Monday market analyst Carlos Kirjner of Bernstein Research set a price target for the company at \$25 per share.

"It is difficult to argue for owning stock today," Kirjner wrote in a research note.

Kirjner said the company's revenue capacity through display ad inventory, projected revenue growth and the value of future business opportunities put Facebook in a "material risk," category.

"Investors will question Facebook's ability to achieve our... (projected) 2013 revenue as near-term (sales) growth decelerates," Kirjner said.

The analyst also said the value of social advertising is uncertain and "will not be resolved in the next 12 months."

When working out is too much of a good thing

NEW YORK, 7 June—Constantly thinking about the next work out? Upset about missing an exercise class? Fitness experts say more is not always better and overworking a work out can sap strength and invite injury.

"We have fit people and deconditioned people who overdo it," said GERALYN COOPERSMITH, national director of the Equinox Fitness Training Institute.

"Exercise is like a drug, if you don't have enough, you get no benefits, if you have too much, you have problems," she said.

Shin splints, heel spurs, tendonitis are among the common overuse injuries that Coopersmith, who oversees the training of personal trainers for Equinox fitness centres, sees.

"Some days should be intense, some days not so intense," she said. "Exercise is a stressor. If it's too much, the body can break down."

Extreme fatigue, irritability, moodiness, an elevated resting heart rate, fever, and an inability to work your earlier level are among the signs that you've overdone it, she said.

California-based group fitness instructor Amy Dixon has broached the subject of overtraining with her clients, she said, but delicately, and only when they are ready to listen.

"I had a woman come in before my (indoor) cycling class," said Dixon, creator of the "Give Me 10" DVD series. "I'd see her on the treadmill for an hour, then she'd take my class, then after she would ride

longer or go on the elliptical (trainer) for another 40 minutes."

Poke an exercise addiction, Dixon believes, and you'll often uncover another addiction.

"Maybe they're a binge eater, or they really party on the weekend," she said. "If you're working out morning and night, you're over-trained. Your body's getting beaten up."

For Dixon and her colleagues, overtraining is an occupational hazard.

"A lot of group fitness instructors and trainers fall into that category because it's our job," she said. "I know instructors who teach over 30 classes a week."

Connecticut-based exercise physiologist Tom Holland, who has coached people in everything from climbing mountains to running marathons, has actually dropped clients who wanted him to push them too hard.

"I have a lot of types that think they're Lance Armstrongs," said Holland, author of "Beat the Gym: Personal Trainer Secrets Without the Personal Trainer Price Tag," said, referring to the seven-time Tour de France winner.

He said a lot of his job

involves telling clients what not to do.

"I try to keep them from getting hurt," he said. "I design programmes on a case-by-case basis but there's always a rest day."

When clients want to eliminate it I try to explain that you don't get healthier during the workouts, but during the rest days."

Jessica Matthews, an exercise physiologist with the American Council on Exercise, said she has referred several over-trained clients to psychologists.

"It's great to work with other professionals to help them (clients) recognize that they might have a problem," said Matthews, who is based in San Diego, California.

She said symptoms of overtraining can include constant headaches, sleeplessness and severe muscle soreness, as well as diminished performance.

"There are so many benefits to exercise, but if they're exercising excessively even the greatest benefits, like positive mood and better sleep, start to fall away," she said.

Coopersmith puts in another way: "We are a supersized society," she said, "but we shouldn't be supersizing exercise."

NEW YORK, 7 June—Nasdaq OMX Group Inc (NDAQ) has reached out to at least one brokerage that lost money due to Facebook's (FB) botched initial public offering on the exchange, saying it will make an announcement on Wednesday, a person at the brokerage firm said on Tuesday.

Nasdaq is expected to release details of a plan to make up some losses

sustained by banks and trading firms, which collectively have been estimated above \$100 million, in a filing with the US Securities and Exchange Commission, according to the Wall Street Journal, citing unnamed sources.

Nasdaq declined to comment on Tuesday.

Facebook shares have fallen 32 percent since the IPO when technical glitches resulted in a 30-minute delay

of the IPO, unconfirmed trades and losses by market makers and retail investors.

Nasdaq's plan to pay back brokers has been slowed by regulatory questions centered on exchange's ability to compensate customers, the WSJ reported, citing people familiar with the matter.

Nasdaq's liabilities for a trading glitch are limited through regulation and a contract with its customers to \$3 million per month. The exchange has applied to the SEC to increase the amount to \$13.7 million to include a gain of \$10.7 million it made from the Facebook IPO through the sale of so-called "phantom shares" it was left holding in the IPO.—Reuters

Nokia unveils cheap touch screen models

HELSINKI, 7 June—Struggling mobile phone firm Nokia (NOK1VHE) unveiled on Wednesday its first three basic phone models with large touch screens, filling a gap in its suite of products.

Consumer demand for such devices has been rising fast especially in emerging markets. Last year 105 million low-end touch screen

handsets were sold globally, according to Strategy Analytics.

Nokia said its Asha 305 model would go on sale this month for 63 euros, excluding subsidies and taxes. The Asha 306 and Asha 311 models will go on sale next quarter for 68 euros and 92 euros, respectively.

China's Hu sees role for regional bloc in Afghanistan

BEIJING, 7 June — A bloc bringing together China, Russia and central Asian states wants to play a bigger role in troubled Afghanistan, Chinese President Hu Jintao said in an interview published on Wednesday, as regional leaders gathered for their annual summit. The future of neighbour Afghanistan, facing the withdrawal of most foreign combat forces by the end of 2014, is likely to be discussed at the two-day meeting of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO), whose member states fear growing instability spilling across the central Asian region as the pullout goes on.

"We will continue to manage regional affairs by ourselves, guarding against shocks from turbulence outside the region, and will play a bigger role in Afghanistan's peaceful reconstruction," Hu was quoted as saying in an interview with China's official *People's Daily* newspaper about the SCO summit. "We'll strengthen communication, coordination and cooperation in dealing with major international and regional issues," said Hu.

The SCO, founded in 2001, includes China, Russia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan. Iran, India, Pakistan and others attend the summits, but not as full members. Each has a strong interest in Afghanistan's future.

Afghan President Hamid Karzai is attending the summit as a guest, and his country is due to be granted "observer" status in the SCO, meaning it can attend meetings but not vote. On Sunday, Afghan officials told *Reuters* that China and Afghanistan will soon announce a plan to deepen ties, signaling Beijing's desire to play a role beyond their economic partnership as Western forces prepare to leave.

Chinese Customs intercept radioactive waste metals from Japan

NINGBO, 7 June — Chinese Customs officials have intercepted 1,127 tonnes of imported waste metals from Japan with excessive gamma rays in the coastal city of Ningbo in east China, local authorities said on Tuesday.

The radiation levels of the waste metals, imported by a recycled metal company in Ningbo, was twice the national standard and hazardous to the human body and the environment, according to Ningbo Customs. The metals contained caesium-137, a radioactive isotope of caesium. Small amounts of caesium-137 were released into the environment during nuclear weapon tests and nuclear accidents, most notably the Chernobyl disaster.

Ningbo Customs has ordered the cargo to be returned and has handed the case over to the anti-smuggling department for further investigations. Ningbo Customs has intercepted a total of 8,544 tonnes of waste imported metals with excessive radiation from Japan since the Japanese nuclear disaster of March 2011, said Wang Lingbao, a logistics control department official with the customs.

Solar-powered plane lands in Morocco

RABAT, 7 June — An experimental solar-powered plane landed in Morocco's capital late Tuesday after a 20-hour trip from Madrid in the first transcontinental journey by a craft of its type. With the wing span of a *Boeing 777*, the plane appeared out of the pitch darkness over the runway, suddenly turning on its lights and gliding to a landing in Rabat, its four propellers already still. "It was perhaps the most beautiful flight of my life, I have dreamed since I was a child of flying without using fuel," said pilot Bertrand Piccard, who has already circumnavigated the world by balloon.

The single-seat aircraft is fitted with 12,000 solar cells across its immense wings and but only weighs just as much as the average family car, according to organizers. The plane is the first of its kind to fly both during the night and day as the solar panels charge the batteries for night flying. Piccard descended from the plane, apparently unfatigued by the long flight in the cramped cockpit. He said the Solar Impulse project had chosen Morocco because of its ambitious plans to increase its reliance on solar power. "We came here out of admiration for Morocco's pioneering solar energy programme," he said, flashing a brilliant smile and hugging members of his team on the tarmac.

All of the technology on this plane can be used in daily life." Morocco is set to begin construction on a huge solar energy farm in the south as part of an ambitious project to lessen its dependence on fossil fuels and produce 2,000 megawatts of solar energy by 2020. It also plans to eventually export the energy to Europe. Solar Impulse arrived in Madrid from Switzerland in late May on the first leg of the journey, but the delicate craft was delayed for several days by bad weather before it could continue its journey to Morocco. The two-leg Europe to Africa trip covered 2,500 kilometres (1,554 miles).

The light craft can only fly in perfect weather. The plane has managed to climb to 28,000 feet (8,535 metres) and reached top speeds of over 75 mph (120 kph), though its usual cruising speed is just over half that. The mission is being described as a final dress rehearsal for a round-the-world flight with a new and improved plane in 2014 involving five stops. The project began in 2003 and is estimated to cost about \$100 million over 10 years.— *Internet*

Top al-Qaeda strategist killed in Pakistan

WASHINGTON, 7 June — A US drone strike in Pakistan killed one of al-Qaeda's most powerful figures, the US government said on Tuesday, dealing the biggest in a series of blows to the militant group since the raid that killed founder Osama bin Laden last year.

Abu Yahya al-Libi, a veteran militant said to have been a leader of the group's operations, and who survived previous US attacks, was killed in the drone strike early Monday morning on a hideout in North Waziristan in Pakistan's tribal areas, officials said.

The White House called Libi's death a "major blow" to al-Qaeda, and claimed that

it will be hard for the group to find someone of similar stature to replace him. Some private analysts agreed, saying that the group that launched the 11 September attacks in the United States in 2001 now faces a crisis over its future. But even as al-Qaeda's core group, now led by Ayman al-Zawahri, reels from mounting losses, its affiliates elsewhere — particularly in Yemen — have continued planning attacks on US and other Western targets.

The drone strikes, which have escalated in number over the last two weeks, have deeply angered Pakistan's government and contributed to unrelenting tensions

between Washington and Islamabad. Pakistan summoned the US charge d'affaires to its foreign ministry to convey "serious concerns" over the drone strikes, a ministry statement said. For the United States, Libi had been one of al-Qaeda's most dangerous figures.

Recently released letters written by bin Laden and captured during the US raid in which he was killed last year show Libi was one of a handful of al-Qaeda officials bin Laden relied on to argue al-Qaeda's case to a worldwide audience of militants, in particular to the young Libi, a cleric whose real name was Mohamed Hassan Qaid, escaped from US custody in



List of al-Qaeda leaders captured, killed or at large. Abu Yahya al-Libi, one of the group's top strategists may have been killed in a drone strike in Pakistan, officials intelligence officials said on Tuesday.— REUTERS

Afghanistan in 2005 and on at least one previous occasion was prematurely reported to have been killed in a US drone strike.— *Reuters*

One of world's largest excavators produced in north China

TAIYUAN, 7 June — A leading manufacturer in north China's coal-rich Shanxi Province said on Tuesday that it has produced one of the world's largest excavators. The WK-75 mining excavator, which stands 23.5 metres tall and weighs 2,000 tonnes, can dig up to 12,000 tonnes of coal hourly, said Wang Chuangmin, president of Taiyuan Heavy Machinery Group Co, Ltd.

The machine covers an area the size of a basketball court, Wang said, adding that the excavator is equipped with the world's most advanced electronics and monitoring systems. Established in 1950, Taiyuan Heavy Machinery Group Co, Ltd has a 92 percent share of the country's mining excavator market. It has sold products in several resource-rich countries, including Russia, Peru, India, South Africa and Mongolia.

Israeli airstrike badly hurts two Palestinians

GAZA, 7 June — Two Palestinians were seriously injured in an Israeli airstrike in northwest Gaza City early Wednesday, witnesses and medical sources said. An Israeli *F-16* warplane dropped a bomb early at dawn near a Hamas police base, wounding the two people.

Sources suggest that the targeted were affiliated to Hamas, the Islamic movement

that controls Gaza. Earlier in the evening, the jets also hit a chicken farm in the southern Gaza Strip town of Rafah.

Israel has stepped up aerial raids in the Gaza Strip since a Palestinian militant killed an Israeli soldier in a shootout near Gaza-Israel border. The militant infiltrated into Israel before he was shot dead.

The Gaza militant groups

remained committed to the unofficial ceasefire that has shakily held since the end of Israel's three-week major offensive here in January 2009. The Islamic Hamas movement has been controlling Gaza since it routed forces loyal to President Mahmoud Abbas in 2007. Hamas doesn't recognize Israel.





S African carrier stops Cape Town-London flights

JOHANNESBURG, 7 June — South African Airways (SAA) announced on Tuesday it was halting daily direct flights between Cape Town and London to avoid losses amid shrinking demand.

The national carrier will close the Cape Town route, operational for 20 years, in August when two daily flights with increased capacity from Johannesburg will become its sole leg to Heathrow.

"A thorough analysis of

the route made it clear that we could use our aircraft more profitably elsewhere while continuing to ensure excellent business and tourism links... via Johannesburg," said Theunis Potgieter, SAA commercial general manager.

"It is also clear that we would lose money on the direct route in the future, whereas it is possible for us to operate more optimally between Cape Town and London via our Johannesburg hub," he said in a statement.

SAA is expanding its network of destinations said the move will see aircrafts from the axed route serve routes to India and west African Capitals.

But the airline is under pressure and last month said it was looking to the government for help to renew its fleet. "Serving the Cape Town-London route via Johannesburg will have an immediate positive effect on SAA's bottom line," said the airline.

China's Great Wall is 21,196 km long

BEIJING, 7 June—China's existing Great Wall, one of the country's signature relics, is 21,196.18 kilometres long, according to the latest survey results released by the State Administration of Cultural Heritage (SACH) on Tuesday. An archeological survey jointly conducted by the SACH and the former State Bureau of Surveying and Mapping since 2007 found that the Great Wall structures span the country's 15 provinces, autonomous regions and municipalities, including Beijing, Tianjin, Hebei, Shanxi, Inner Mongolia, Liaoning, Jilin, Heilongjiang, Shandong, Henan, Shaanxi, Gansu, Qinghai, Ningxia and Xinjiang.

IOWA, 7 June — An excavation is underway thanks to the discovery of the bones of a prehistoric mammoth in one Oskaloosa, Iowa, family's backyard. According to ABC's affiliate ABC5-WOI in Des Moines, the first bones were discovered in July 2010 by a man named John and his two teenage sons when they were walking in the woods of their property looking for blackberries. One of his sons pointed out what he thought was a ball in the creek below to his family. Once they got closer, John, who has an

interest in archeology, noticed a marrow line at the top of the object, said reporter ABC5-WOI reporter Katie Eastman, who interviewed the family.

Realizing this was no ball, the family dug out what has now been identified as a mammoth femur. Despite discovering the bones nearly two years ago, the bones were brought to the University of Iowa for identification only last month, sparking the interest of Holmes Semken, professor emeritus of Geoscience. Semken enlisted the help of volunteers from

the University of Iowa as well as Iowa State University, to



help to uncover the fossils lying six feet below the surface. The University of Iowa Museum of Natural History is overseeing the project's excavation and research. "The size of this discovery is quite uncommon," said Sarah Horgen, education coordinator at the museum. "It's pretty exciting—partially because the mammoth is being discovered where it died. And we know that because we're finding

Cambodia, UN hold forum to promote women's entrepreneurship

PHNOM PENH, 7 June— Cambodia's ministry of women's affairs and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) on Wednesday jointly organized a forum on women's entrepreneurship promotion to discuss challenges women are facing in business management. The one-day forum was attended by some 80 high-level government representatives, international experts, leaders of women's business associations, women's producers groups, entrepreneurs and economic experts, Ing Kantha Phavi, minister of women's affairs, said in her opening address.

"The event is aimed at creating a platform of exchange and a network among the key players in the government of Cambodia, development partners, and private sector to identify the specific challenges that women entrepreneurs usually experience and explore some of the good practices on how to overcome these constraints," she said. In Cambodia, more than 60 percent of micro, small- and medium-sized enterprises are owned by women, but those enterprises are very small and informal ones with only a few employees, she said, adding that those women business owners still face a different kind of challenges compared to their male fellow-entrepreneurs.—Xinhua

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police announced they had made two arrests in the rural area of Fisher, 100 miles north of Winnipeg, based on an anonymous phone tip.

The 2009 Case IH Steiger 485 tractor worth \$300,000 disappeared in 2010 and the case was all but cold when someone alerted the Mounties to its location last week using the anonymous CrimeStoppers tip line, the *Winnipeg Sun* reported. It took officers several days of searching the property, but the tractor was found secreted under the massive manure pile, police said.

Stolen laptop snaps photo of thief

Police in Michigan said a stolen laptop's owner used theft-protection software to provide them with the thief's name, picture and location. Ann Arbor police said Logan Chadde, 21, and his roommate returned home from a night out about 2:45 am on 3 June and discovered items, including baseball hats, video games, checks, office equipment and a backpack with a laptop computer, had been stolen from their rooms, AnnArbor.com reported.

Police Lt Renee Bush said the laptop's anti-theft software took a picture of the thief when he turned it on and sent it to a Web site along with a screen shot of what the thief was doing and the stolen item's location. The screen shot contained a picture of the thief's Facebook page, giving investigators his full name. Police said they knew the 19-year-old suspect from a previous investigation and arrested him. They said his name would not be released until he is arraigned.

conference in Warsaw that Laurent Blanc's side, who were expected in Ukraine later on Wednesday, were on a good unbeaten run, of 21, and their forward line was taking shape.

"I think they're a team that people will have to watch

— if they get off the bus," he said with a smile. France are hoping to erase memories of a disastrous World Cup campaign two years ago in South Africa, when players went on strike against then-coach Raymond Domenech — refusing to leave the bus for a training session — and a humiliating first round exit.

Overall, Platini — who lifted the European championship trophy with France in 1984 when he scored a tournament record nine goals — tipped holders Spain and perennial favourites Germany to be among the challengers for the title when the competition ends with the final in Kiev on 1 July.

"The two teams for me are Spain and Germany — if they play at 100 percent. But if they don't, there are a lot of teams that can beat them," he added. — INTERNET

There is no Real/Barcelona divide, says Arbeloa

GNIIEWINO, 7 June — The Spanish squad is united and not riven by a split between Real Madrid players and those from Barcelona said Real defender Alvaro Arbeloa on Wednesday. The 29-year-old — a member of the Spanish squads that won both Euro 2008 and the 2010 World Cup — denied Barcelona midfielder general Xavi Hernandez's assertion last week that there was an underlying bitterness between the two camps.

years, had said last week that the attitude of the players from both teams was very different. "We congratulated Real Madrid for winning the title when they have patently failed to do so over the past few years," said the 32-year-old.

Nadal to play Ferrer in semis at French Open

PARIS, 7 June — Defending champion Rafael Nadal beat fellow Spaniard Nicolas Almagro 7-6(7-4), 6-2, 6-3 on Wednesday to set up a semifinal clash with David Ferrer at the French Open. Against the 12th-seeded Almagro, Nadal saved four break points to dominate the match, especially in the last two sets. "It's a difficult match," he told reporters. "You play against the best players of the world and one of the best players of the world on this surface." Nadal, whose only loss at Roland Garros came at the fourth round in 2009, is bidding to become the first player to win seven French Open titles, moving him out of a tie with Swedish legend Bjorn Borg.

The second seed will in the semifinals meet his

countryman David Ferrer, the sixth seed, who outgunned fourth seed Andy Murray of Britain 6-4, 6-7(3-7), 6-3, 6-2. "He had his chances and converted them. He's solid and consistent and if you don't convert opportunities against him, the games become longer and the pressure builds on you," said Murray, who had reached the semifinals in the last five Grand Slams. The other semifinal will be played between top seed Novak Djokovic and third seed Roger Federer. Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova came back from one set down to finish off the giant-killing run of Kazakh qualifier Yaroslava Shvedova 3-6, 6-2, 6-4 and reach her first time ever French Open semifinals.

Doubles specialist Shvedova looked on her way

to the semifinals after she won the first set.

But the Czech fourth seed kept her focus through driving rain to complete victory after her 142nd-ranked opponent drilled a backhand wide on matchpoint. "I expected it would be tough match and it was actually," said Kvitova.

"She started well and I was very nervous from the beginning making easy mistakes. Then I knew I had to change my game and I had to be the aggressive one and going for the points," she said. Shvedova said she was worn down by tiredness rather than Kvitova. "I was just super-tired. In the first set I still had the energy and I played well," she said. "Then I had just lost energy. The third set is just like I was saying to myself to fight and just try to get all the

balls," she added. Kvitova will next take on title favourite Maria Sharapova for a place in Saturday's final. — XINHUA

Beware of Ronaldo, warns Mertesacker

OPALENICA, 7 June — Experienced centre-back Per Mertesacker has said Germany's defence must be on their guard against Portugal's Cristiano Ronaldo on Saturday in their opening Euro 2012 match. Germany open their Group B campaign against Portugal

in Lviv, Ukraine, with Ronaldo in outstanding form having scored 46 Spanish league goals for Real Madrid last season, bettered only by Lionel Messi's 50 goals for Barcelona.

Despite having missed three months at the end of last season after surgery to repair ankle ligaments, Arsenal defender Mertesacker looks set to anchor the German back four and says only good teamwork can subdue Ronaldo's silky skills. "I think we have managed to nip in the bud any of Ronaldo's efforts in past matches against Portugal," said the centre-back at Wednesday's press conference here referring to Germany beating Portugal at both Euro 2008 and the 2006

World Cup. "We must try at all costs to avoid one-on-one situations with him, because Ronaldo plays a key role and that is something we will work on in the next few days."

Goalkeeper Manuel Neuer said Germany's Mesut Ozil is just as dangerous as his Real team-mate Ronaldo, but admits the responsibility to subdue Portugal's impressive attackers falls on the whole team to deny them possession. "Mesut Ozil has just as good a shot as his Real Madrid team-mate," said Neuer. "I think all of Portugal's forwards are dangerous and a force to be reckoned with, so we have to place the responsibility on all the players to defend well against them."

F-16 stops small plane in Obama's LA air space

LOS ANGELES, 7 June—An F-16 fighter jet intercepted a small private plane after it entered airspace that was restricted for President Barack Obama's fundraising visit on Wednesday night.

The single-engine Cessna 117 was intercepted and forced to land shortly before 5 pm Wednesday, according to a statement from the North American Aerospace Defence Command. Obama was at the Beverly Hilton at the time, and was later taken to the Regent Beverly Wilshire for a

600-person campaign fundraiser in Los Angeles held by gay and lesbian supporters. The plane was intercepted northwest of Los Angeles and landed without incident at an airfield in Camarillo, Federal Aviation Administration spokesman Ian Gregor said. FAA officials would interview the pilot, whose name was not released, Gregor said. There have been similar incidents when Obama visited Los Angeles in the past. In May, a pilot mistakenly flew into restricted airspace as the president was about to leave the city from Los Angeles International Airport.

Spanish coach dies one day after appointment

MADRID, 7 June — Spanish coach Manuel Preciado died of a heart attack on Thursday at the age of 54, just a day after he was named the new coach at relegated side Villarreal.

"A heart attack claimed the life of Manuel Preciado in the early hours at a hotel in Valencia," his former side Sporting Gijon said in a

statement. Preciado, who was known for his frank speaking style, had been due to be officially unveiled as Villarreal's new coach on Friday on a one-year deal.

"Villarreal want to express their deepest sorrow at the sad loss and want to offer their condolences to his family and all his relatives," the club Preciado was joining added in a separate statement.

Preciado lost his first wife to cancer in 2002 and two years later the youngest of the couple's two sons was killed in a car accident at the age of 15. Last year his father died after being run over by a car. "Life has given me strong blows. I could have become vulnerable and shot myself or I could look up to the sky and carry on. I preferred the second option," Preciado said last year when his father died.

Two buildings collapse in Italy, 10 injured

ROME, 7 June—Two residential buildings collapsed in southern Italy on Thursday following a big explosion caused by a gas leak, injuring at least 10 people.

Rescue teams rushed on the spot as it was not immediately clear if there was anyone still inside the buildings, according to ANSA news agency. At least 10 people were injured, and one 18-month-old child was reportedly still missing at the time being, after his parents were extracted alive from the rubble.

The explosion, occurred in the morning in the small town of Conversano, near the city of Bari, was reportedly felt across a large surrounding area, and smashed the mirrors of many nearby homes.—Xinhua

Redknapp urges Spurs to sort out his future

LONDON, 7 June—Tottenham Hotspur manager Harry Redknapp has only 12 months remaining on his contract and on Tuesday he urged chairman Daniel Levy to sort out his future at the Premier League club.

"The simple situation is I have a year left on my contract and it is up to Tottenham whether they want to extend that or not," Redknapp told Sky Sports.

"It's not a case of me looking for security. What it's about is that when players know they have only a year

left on their contract it doesn't work.

"You don't let players run into the last year of their contract if you think they are any good and you don't let managers run into the last year of their contract if you think they are any good," he added.

Redknapp has been with the Londoners since October 2008 and is happy with the progress Spurs have made in that time.

"Things couldn't have gone better," he said. "We've finished fourth twice, fifth



once, reached the quarter-finals of the Champions League and played fantastic football.

"It's a good club and I enjoy being at Tottenham ... (but) it's up to the chairman. If he doesn't want to give me another contract, it's his decision."
