ILO lifts most of restrictions on Myanmar

Lifting, removing and suspending of restrictions benefits Myanmar in trading with EU for interests of people

ILO lifts most of its restrictions on Myanmar

- Restrictions were imposed on Myanmar at 87th International Labour Conference in 1999 and 88th International Labour Conference in 2000 as regards measures for ending forced labour in Myanmar. From 6 to 11 June 2012, ILO governing body, selection committee comprising representatives from employers and employees reviewed the country's actions for ending forced labour in Myanmar and submitted the draft for resolutions on Myanmar to the 101st International Labour Conference on 13 June, 2012.
- The draft of the resolutions submitted by the Selection Committee was unanimously supported by representatives of governments, labour unions and employers organizations and the draft was approved at 6.10 pm local time (10.40 pm Myanmar standard time) on 13 June, 2012.
- Following are the key notes of the resolutions on Myanmar at the 101st International Labour Conference.
 - To lift all restrictions imposed on Myanmar at the 87th International Labour Conference in 1999.
 - Five restrictions were imposed on Myanmar at the 88th International Labour Conference in 2000. Out of them, it was decided to lift sub paragraph (d) which is to review on Myanmar by international labour unions, sub paragraph (c) which is to make resolutions at the United Nations General Assembly and ECOSOC meeting, and sub paragraph (d) which is to report Myanmar's

- fulfillment of the recommendations of the Commission of Inquiry to international organizations. As regards sub paragraph (b), it is decided to suspend ILO's measures to make necessary review in engagement with Myanmar for one year. Minutes of the Selection Commission state that Special Sitting held under sub paragraph (a) is to be suspended as long as all measures against such forced labour are taken.
- To provide technical assistances to Myanmar by International Labour Organization and necessary financial resources by member countries and organizations in order that the country which is experiencing rapid reforms may not lose the opportunity.
 - Myanmar government is to implement the joint-strategy urgently for ending of forced labour ahead of targeted time.
- Thanks to lifting, removing and suspending of restrictions, the country may get special benefits in trading with the EU for the interests of Myanmar people.
 - Myanmar delegation comprising representatives of employers and employees led by the Union Minister for Labour and for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement and the Attorney-General of the Union attended the 101st International Labour Conference at which the Union Minister and the Attorney-General of the Union met representatives of international governmental institutions, employers organizations and labour unions and gave a clear and complete account of developments and implementation in Myanmar, bringing fruitful results for the interests of Myanmar people.

Iraq bombs kill 70 Shi'ite pilgrims, police

BAGHDAD, 13 June—Bombers struck at Shi'ite pilgrims celebrating a religious festival in Baghdad and across Iraq on Wednesday, killing more than 70 people in one of the bloodiest days since the last US troops left the country in December.

The bombings appeared to be the work of Sunni insurgents who often hit Shi'ite targets to try to reignite the intercommunal violence that killed tens of thousands of people in 2006-2007. With the government's Sunni, Shi'ite and ethnic Kurdish parties already locked in a crisis

that threatens to shatter their delicate power-sharing agreement, the attacks revived fears that Iraq risked sliding back into sectarian bloodshed.

It was the worst day of violence since early January, when four bombs in Baghdad killed 73, and the latest in a spate of bombings on Shi'ite religious sites. At least 30 people were killed when four blasts hit pilgrims across Baghdad as they marched through the city to mark the anniversary of the death of Shi'ite imam Moussa al-Kadhim, a great-grandson of Prophet Mohammad.

One car bomb exploded outside a Baghdad Shi'ite mosque while another blast tore into groups of pilgrims

as they rested at refreshment tents along the route to a shrine in Kadhimiya District. "A group of pilgrims were walking and passed by a tent offering food and drinks when suddenly a car exploded near them," said Wathiq Muhana, a policeman whose patrol was stationed near the blast in central Karrada District.

"People were running away covered with blood and bodies were scattered on the ground," he said. In a separate attack in the mainly Shi'ite southern city of Hilla, police said two simultaneous car bombs, including one detonated by a suicide bomber, exploded outside restaurants used by security forces, killing 22 people.

Record dive planned for Chinese submersible on 14 June

ABOARD XIANGYANGHONG 09, 13 June — China's manned deep-sea submersible, Jiaolong, will attempt a new dive as part of a bid to go down 7,000 metres into the Mariana Trench on the morning of 14 June, according to mission headquarters. If water and weather conditions are favorable, the submersible and its three crew, Ye Cong, Cui Weicheng and Yang Bo, will move into the dive site to test for seawater parameters and install kentledge (ballast) at 2 or 3 am Beijing time (1800 GMT or 1900 GMT) on 14 June.

Everyone should be ready by 7 am (2300 GMT), an hour before the actual dive, Liu Xincheng, an on-site official, told Xinhua. The first dive will reach a depth of 5,000 metres and last eight hours. "This will be the first dive attempt of the 7,000 metre dive mission," Liu said onboard the Xiangyanghong 09, the submersible's oceanographic mother ship, "and also the first dive Jiaolong will take after its successful dive to 5,188 metres last July."

"Much remains uncertain. If everything goes well with the 5,000-metre dive, we hope to go deeper," he said. The team will analyze data retrieved from the first dive to identify any malfunctions and prepare for possible problems before finalizing the plan for the second dive.—Xinhua

Insight: When Romney wasn't so tough on China

WASHINGTON, 13 June—Mitt Romney may be down on China and threatening to declare Beijing a currency manipulator from day one if he is elected US president, but his past dealings with the country show he was not always so hostile. From his early days at private equity firm Bain Capital to his time as Massachusetts governor, Romney welcomed investments from China, and bought and expanded companies that benefited from its low labour costs and controlled currency. As chairman of the 2002 Winter Olympics, he also said Beijing should not be punished for human rights abuses.

All this is in sharp contrast to the Republican presidential candidate's current line of attack on the world's second-largest economy, which is now the United States' most important trading partner and largest foreign creditor. And that

makes political strategists, China experts and business leaders wonder whether Romney will really follow through on his campaign promises if he is elected. So far in his campaign, Romney has accused China of cheating Americans out of jobs and said a country that represses its own people cannot be a trusted partner. He has also promised to label China a manipulator of the yuan. On

the surface, that would just be a symbolic gesture because it only requires Washington to start talking to Beijing about adjusting its currency. But Beijing could easily see it as threatening enough to trigger major trade tensions and reduce the chances of Chinese cooperation over international issues, business executives, analysts and former US government officials said.

Iranian minister denies Western claims about nuclear activities at Parchin

TEHERAN, 13 June — Iranian Defence Minister Ahmad Vahidi denied Western claims that nuclear activities are carried out at Iran's Parchin military site, the Press TV reported on Tuesday. The accusations are "entirely irrelevant and irrational," Vahidi was quoted as saying on Monday. The allegations aimed at affecting the upcoming negotiations between the Islamic republic and the P5+1 — Britain, China, France, Russia and the United States plus Germany, which is scheduled to be held in Moscow on 18 and 19 June, he said, according to the report.

Media said the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) received reports that Iran has tested in Parchin military site explosives that could be used to set off a nuclear charge. Iran denied such reports, and insisted that the access to Parchin would only be granted if Iran and IAEA agree on certain conditions and steps. An Iranian lawmaker said on Saturday that Iran would not allow the IAEA inspectors to visit the Parchin military complex.

"The US and the West are seeking to find access to our military sites, but the representatives of (Iranian) people will not allow our military sites, which have nothing to do with nuclear activities, to be inspected by Western spies," Avaz Heidarpour was quoted as saying by the semi-official Mehr news agency. "We will file a complaint against the agency for satellite espionage" on the Parchin military site, Heidarpour was quoted as saying. Iranian envoy to the IAEA Ali-Asghar Soltanieh earlier accused the agency of conducting secretive intelligence activities on Iran's nuclear programme.—Xinhua

China wins saw blades dispute against USA at WTO

GENEVA, 13 June — China won a World Trade Organization ruling on Friday after the United States decided not to contest the facts of its complaint against US anti-dumping duties on shipments of diamond saw blades and frozen warm-water shrimp from China. China's complaint, which it made in February 2011, was based on the fact that the US anti-dumping duties were calculated in a way that has repeatedly been ruled as illegal under WTO rules.

The WTO dispute panel that examined the case said the US Department of Commerce

Obama, after tough week, defends record on economy

PHILADELPHIA, 13 June — Barack Obama stoutly defended his economic record on Tuesday after a stream of bad news — and an uncharacteristic verbal misstep of his own — rallied Republican hopes that they can defeat him in November. Acknowledging there is still a "long way to go" to repair the damage done by a recession he inherited, Obama insisted the American economy was on the right track despite recent signals that the country's recovery might be fading.

"What we have been able to do over the last 3-1/2 years, after a decade in which we had been moving in the wrong direction, is to begin to point towards a trajectory where here in this country, everybody is getting a fair shot," he told supporters at the first of a string of fundraising events. His remarks to supporters, after what some political pundits say has been the worst week of his presidency, took care not to deny the subdued tone of recent economics indicators, but remained upbeat about the country's future.

Disappointing May jobs data has challenged Obama's claim that his policies are healing the economy. His own comment to reporters on Friday that the private sector is "doing fine" helped Mitt Romney, his Republican challenger in the 6 November election, argue that the Democratic president is out of touch with ordinary Americans.

Obama later tried to explain that comment, saying he meant the private sector has seen some momentum while other areas of the economy need help more urgently. He returned to the issue on Tuesday, saying "there are a lot of folks out there who are hurting, a lot of folks who are looking for work or are underemployed, a lot of folks whose homes are underwater."

US robotic rover to seek Martian life with new focus

CAPE CANAVERAL, 13 June—This summer, if all goes well, a robotic geologist will arrive on Mars to try out a new strategy for searching for life beyond Earth. Rather than hunt for microbes like the Viking missions of the 1970s, NASA's Mars Science Laboratory, a wheeled rover nicknamed Curiosity, will look for places that could have hosted and preserved life.

"The term 'life-detection' is so ill-defined and so hard to ascertain it doesn't make a good starting point," said geologist John Grotzinger of the California Institute of Technology, who is the lead scientist for the Curiosity mission. Instead, NASA's new Mars mission, scheduled for landing on 6 August, is primarily a geological expedition to an intriguing piece of real estate called Gale Crater, located just south of the Martian equator.

Scientists believe the crater formed some 3.5 billion to 3.8 billion years ago when Mars, Earth and the rest of the planets in the inner solar system were regularly bombarded by meteorites.

Gale's most striking feature is not the 96-mile (154-km) wide pit in the ground, but a 3-mile-high (5-km-high) mound of debris rising from the crater's floor. Scientists believe the mountain, located in the centre of the basin, is the layered remains of sediment that once filled the crater.

Over time and by a process not well understood, the sediment was carried away, leaving what is now known as Mount Sharp, which scientists hope will reveal the geological

history of Mars like no similar formation can do on Earth.

"There is no place on Earth you can go to get the whole history at once," Grotzinger told journalists during a field trip last month to California's Death Valley, one of the few places where chunks of Earth's geologic record covering large spans of time are exposed.

"At Gale you don't need to reconstruct the layers. You can see how they go from older to younger. You've got time's arrow always pointed in the right direction. It's all laid out very simply," Grotzinger said.

Preservation of life

Previous missions to Mars revealed compelling evidence that the planet was once warmer and wetter than the cold, dry desert it is today.

For example, NASA's Mars Exploration Rovers, one of which is still operating after more than seven years on the planet's surface, found

minerals that on Earth form only in the presence of water.

Liquid water is one of three key ingredients needed for life—at least as life as we know it. Life's recipe also requires an energy source, such as solar or chemical, and a source of carbon.

"One of the ingredients of life is water. We're now looking to see if we can find other conditions that are necessary for life," said Mary Voytek, director of NASA's astrobiology programme.

A key goal for the Mars Science Laboratory is to find organically produced carbon, a tricky proposition because almost every process that makes rock destroys organics.

"Even on Earth finding signs of past life isn't easy. Whatever was happening biologically, if anything, for the first 4 billion years there is no record. For the first 3 billion years, there's no rock record either," Grotzinger said.

One technique that has

proven useful on Earth is to search for chemistry that can preserve life, a system scientists are adopting to hunt for signs of life on Mars as well. On early Earth for example, minerals, such as silica, are important because they preserved the record of carbon.

"You pickle the organics early on," Grotzinger said.

"Let's assume life did evolve on Mars. Where are the places that have habitable environments and the highest preservation potential?" he said. "If you do this as a random walk, you're doomed to failure because you only have so much time and the clock is ticking."

If the Mars Science Laboratory touches down safely, which is by no means a given, scientists expect to have two years to collect information about Mount Sharp and the surrounding area. NASA hopes to land the rover on a flat surface as close as possible to the base of Mount Sharp using a first-of-a-kind, rocket-powered sky crane. The exact landing spot will depend on the craft's final steering maneuvers as it races toward Mars.

Mission managers said on Monday they would aim for a 12-by-4-mile (20-by-7-km) patch of land, far smaller than original estimates, which would shave off months of drive time to reach the mound.

The rover blasted off aboard an unmanned Atlas 5 rocket on 26 November for a nine-month, 60-million mile voyage that is due to end at 1:30 am EDT on 6 August.

Record-breaking solar flare described

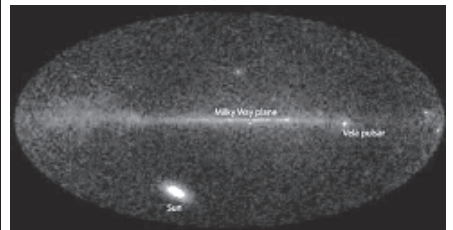
GREENBELT, 13 June—A NASA space telescope detected the highest-energy light ever measured in an eruption on the sun during a powerful solar blast, the space agency has reported.

The powerful solar flare, observed on 7 March by the Fermi Gamma-ray Space Telescope, produced such an outpouring of gamma rays—a form of light with even greater energy than X-rays—that the sun briefly became the brightest object in the gamma-ray sky, NASA said on Monday. "For most of Fermi's four years in orbit, its LAT saw the sun as a faint,

steady gamma-ray source thanks to the impacts of high-speed particles called cosmic rays," Nicola Omodei, an astrophysicist at Stanford University, said. "Now we're beginning to see what the sun itself can do."

The March flare produced high-energy gamma rays for about 20 hours, two and a half times longer than any event on record, researchers said.

Solar eruptions are increasing as the sun moves toward the peak of its roughly 11-year-long activity cycle, expected in mid-2013, they said.—Internet

Flame pieces found in Stuxnet virus — expert

LONDON, 13 June—A leading computer security firm has linked some of the software code in the powerful Flame virus to the Stuxnet cyber weapon, which is believed to have been used by the United States and Israel to attack Iran's nuclear programme.

Eugene Kaspersky, chief executive of Moscow-based Kaspersky Lab, which uncovered Flame last month, said his researchers have since found that part of the Flame programme code is nearly identical to code found in a 2009 version of Stuxnet. The new research could bolster the belief of many security experts that Stuxnet was part of a massive US-led cyber programme that is still active in the Middle East and perhaps other parts of the

world. Although Kaspersky did not say who he thought built Flame, news organizations including Reuters and the New York Times have previously reported that the United States and Israel were behind Stuxnet, which was uncovered in 2010 after it damaged centrifuges used to enrich uranium at a facility in Natanz, Iran. Instead of issuing denials, authorities in Washington recently launched investigations into the leaks about the highly classified project.

On Stuxnet and Flame, "there were two different teams working in collaboration," Kaspersky said at the Reuters Global Media and Technology Summit in London on Monday.

World's biggest telescope project approved

Observatory has approved construction of what will be the world's largest optical telescope, to be located on a mountaintop in Chile.

ESO member states approved the project at a meeting in Germany on Monday, the BBC reported.

The European Extremely Large Telescope will have a primary mirror around 130 feet

in diameter, and will be built in Chile's Atacama desert region to take advantage of the area's extremely arid conditions, conducive to excellent astronomical observation, officials said. Although the telescope has been approved, there is still the matter of its \$1.2 billion in funding, which has not been fully secured.

That could happen by

the time of the ESO's next meeting in December, when Brazil is likely to have become the 15th full member of the organization, spreading the telescope's cost and making it more affordable for member nations. The telescope is intended to be complete and ready to begin astronomical observations in 2022.

50 yrs of ocean warming attributed to man

LIVERMORE, 13 June—Human activity has been the primary cause of global ocean warming during the past 50 years, a team of US and international researchers says.

Scientists say the observed ocean warming in the last 50 years is consistent with climate models only if the models include the effects of observed increases in greenhouse gas during the

20th century.

"We have taken a closer look at factors that influence these results," lead author Peter Gleckler at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California said. "The bottom line is that this study substantially strengthens the conclusion that most of the observed global ocean warming over the past 50 years is

attributable to human activities."

The scientists looked at the average temperature, or heat content, in the upper layers of the ocean and found the global average ocean warming, from the surface down to 2,300 feet, has been around 0.025 degrees Celsius per decade, a LLNL release reported on Monday.

"What we are trying to do

is determine if the observed warming pattern can be explained by natural variability alone," Gleckler said. "Although we performed a series of tests to account for the impact of various uncertainties, we found no evidence that simultaneous warming of the upper layers of all seven seas can be explained by natural climate variability alone. Humans have played a dominant role."

Chrysler, Kia, Ford, call in vehicles

WASHINGTON, 13 June—US regulators said Chrysler, Kia and Ford Motor Co, announced vehicle recalls on Monday ranging from 346,900 affected vehicles to 128 of them.

Chrysler Group LLC announced an expanded recall of Jeep Liberty vehicles to include 2004-07 roll outs in which rear suspension lower control arms could fracture to due excessive corrosion following winters in areas that use road salt.

Chrysler will replace rear lower control arms free of charge in affected vehicles originally sold or currently registered in states that use

road salt, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reported.

Kia is recalling 21,912 2009 Borregos made from 2 May, 2008, to 20 Jan, 2009, equipped with non-adjustable brake pedals.

Certain brake pedal mounts have a fiberglass composition that may break in the event of a collision, the NHTSA said. Kia said it would replace the brake pedal mounts free of charge.

Kia also said it was recalling 72,568 model year 2006-08 vehicles made from 20 Feb, 2005, through 9 Dec, 2007, due to faulty air bag sensors that could fail to

detect a child in a seat with an airbag.

“The system will not be able to detect whether a child passenger is in the seat and the airbag will deploy during a crash,” regulators said.

Kia said it would replace the sensors free of charge.

Ford Motor Co said it would recall 128 model year

2013 Lincoln MKT Limousines made from 6 March to 3 April with rear brake rotor bolts that are not fully seated.

This could lead to a wheel separation. However, “All the affected vehicles have been quarantined and will be repaired before delivery to owners,” Ford said.—Internet

Vietnam, Latin America to promote trade ties

HANOI, 13 June—Vietnam will hold the first ministerial level forum on trade and investment between Vietnam and Latin America in capital Hanoi on 5 to 6 July, Vietnam News Agency reported on Tuesday, quoting the source from Vietnam’s Ministry of Foreign Affairs as saying.

Delegates from 27 Latin American countries including ministers and deputy ministers in charge of international trade and investment, representatives from Latin American embassies in Vietnam and businesses from the continent will participate in

the forum.

To date, Vietnamese firms have pledged to invest seven billion US dollars in the region while Latin American countries plan to invest three billion US dollars in Vietnam.

Vietnam exports to Latin American countries mainly with rice, textiles, seafood, rubber and coffee.

It imports animal feed, raw materials for textiles and garments, steel, chemicals and medicine.

In 2011, two-way trade turnover between Vietnam and Latin American countries reached 4.5 billion US dollars.—Xinhua

380,000 US deaths yearly due to smoking

ROCKVILLE, 13 June—Death attributable to smoking is declining, with 200,000 such deaths annually for US men, and 180,000 for women, researchers said.

Brian Rostron of the Centre for Tobacco Products at the US Food and Drug Administration said smoking is the leading cause of preventable mortality in the United States, but the methods and data used in the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention’s estimates of adult smoking-attributable mortality have not been substantially revised since their introduction in the

1980s.

“We employed the CDC’s general methodology for estimating smoking-attributable mortality but produced improved estimates by using recent, nationally representative relative risk data from the National Health Interview Survey—Linked Mortality Files and adjusting for confounding risk factors.

We also produced estimates by smoking status and over time,” Rostron said in a statement.

“Our use of more recent and nationally representative relative risks tended to decrease estimates of

smoking deaths for men and increased estimates for women compared with the CDC’s estimates.”

Adjustment for confounding factors further refined the estimates, particularly by smoking status, Rostron said.

“Estimated smoking-attributable mortality has finally begun to decline for both US men and women,” Rostron said.

“Our approach offers several substantive improvements in the estimation of smoking-attributable mortality by cause for the United States.”

Inflation data on Thursday will be key: a Reuters poll shows WPI

likely accelerated 7.60 percent in May from a year ago, the fastest pace this year.

Banking shares, as measured by the NSE banking index, gain 0.9 percent after earlier falling as much as 0.8 percent before the output data. ICICI Bank (ICBK NS) gains 0.75 percent, while SBI Bank (SBI NS) gains 1 percent. Sensx gains 0.2 percent, while the Nifty adds 0.2 percent.

Amount of nightly sleep linked to stroke

BOSTON, 13 June—Routinely sleeping 6 hours or fewer a night significantly increases the risk of stroke symptoms among middle-age to older adults, US researchers say.

Lead author Megan Rutter of the University of Alabama at Birmingham said the study involved 5,666 normal-weight adults who were at low risk for obstructive sleep apnea.

The study participants were tracked for as long as

three years.

Rutter and colleagues recorded the subjects’ first stroke symptoms, along with demographic information, stroke risk factors, depression symptoms and various health behaviours.

After adjusting for body-mass index, the researchers found a strong association for middle-age to older adults with daily sleep periods of fewer than 6 hours and a greater

incidence of stroke symptoms — even beyond other risk factors.

However, the study found no association between short sleep periods and stroke symptoms among overweight and obese participants.

“In employed middle-aged to older adults, relatively free of major risk factors for stroke such as obesity and sleep-disordered breathing, short sleep duration may exact its own

negative influence on stroke development,” Rutter said in a statement.

“We speculate that short sleep duration is a precursor to other traditional stroke risk factors, and once these traditional stroke risk factors are present, then perhaps they become stronger risk factors than sleep duration alone.”

The findings were presented at Sleep, the 26th annual meeting of the Associated Professional Sleep Societies in Boston.

Four dead in Taipei mudslides

TAIPEI, (China), 13 June — At least four people died and one was injured when mudslides triggered by torrential rains hit two areas in central Taipei, rescue officials said on Tuesday. Schools were suspended in several large cities, as Taipei faced the most serious flooding since Typhoon Morakot lashed the island in 2009, triggering massive mudslides that killed more than 600 people.

Two were killed and one was wounded when a makeshift shelter in a mountainous area of Nantou county was buried by

mudslides, said the national fire agency, adding downpours also damaged roads and disrupted electricity. Two men who worked for the forestry bureau in Taichung City were rushed to a clinic on Monday with severe injuries caused when a mudslide crushed their office, but despite efforts to save them they died later in the day, the agency said.

In northern Taoyuan county, 20,000 chickens were drowned when a farm was submerged by a flash flood, officials said. Massive flooding was reported across the island since late Monday,

with more than 700 millimetres of rain (27 inches) in some areas while Taipei's central weather bureau warned of more heavy rains this week.

As of mid-morning Tuesday, Taipei and three other large cities had suspended classes and work in government offices.— Internet

Bulldozers dig for victims of Afghan earthquakes

KABUL, 13 June—Bulldozers dug through tons of rocks and dirt on Wednesday in hopes of recovering 71 victims of a landslide that occurred after two earthquakes struck in northern Afghanistan earlier this week. Two bodies have

been recovered so far and 69 other people are feared dead — entombed in the rubble in Baghlan province's Burka district, Mahmood Haqmal, the spokesman for the province, said Wednesday.

Wielding shovels, nearby villagers and Afghan policemen dug into the dirt alongside three bulldozers as they uncovered beams of houses crushed under the weight of the landslide. "We have to dig and find the 69 other bodies," Haqmal said. "I do not know how long it will take. It is not an easy task, but the government has promised that they will not leave the bodies under the rocks... they will stay until they find the last bodies."

The US Geological Survey said one earthquake with a magnitude of 5.4 struck the region on Monday morning, followed by a magnitude 5.7 quake. Both caused buildings to shake in the Afghan capital, Kabul, 190 kilometers (120 miles) to the south.

Damage was reported in five areas of the province, but the worst was in the village of Sayi Hazara.—Internet

Iraq attacks kill four

MOSUL, 13 June — Gun and bomb attacks killed three policemen and a soldier and wounded six other people in Iraq on Monday, security and medical officials said.

Police Lieutenant Colonel Saad al-Hamdani said gunmen opened fire with light weapons on a checkpoint in the Hamam al-Alil area, 35 kilometres (21 miles) from the restive northern city of Mosul, then fled the scene.

The attack killed three policemen and wounded two others, Hamdani said. Gunmen also shot dead a soldier in Baquba, in central Iraq's Diyala Province, a police colonel and a medical

source at a local hospital said.

A roadside bomb against a police patrol wounded three police in Kholes, 65 kilometres (40 miles) north of Baghdad, a police major and a medical source said.

And gunmen wounded a police first lieutenant in the Karrada area of central Baghdad, an interior ministry official said.

Violence in Iraq has declined dramatically since its peak in 2006-2007, but attacks remain common, especially in Baghdad, Diyala and Mosul.

A total of 132 Iraqis were killed in violence in May, official figures show.

Industrial music scares off pesky Sydney bats

SYDNEY, 13 June — A huge colony of fruit bats that live in Sydney's Royal Botanic Gardens are such a pest that desperate officials have taken to blaring industrial noise and banging sounds to scare them off.

And the ploy appears to have worked. A week ago some 5,000 of the large mammals could be seen hanging in trees throughout the park, a popular haunt for both locals and tourists on the harbour near the city's famous Opera House.

But now just 10 are left, said the executive director of the Royal Botanic Gardens Brett Summerell. "The majority of bats have been

evicted from the gardens," he said on Tuesday. "We've been playing a range of industrial type noises — basically annoying sounds for about 45 minutes in the mornings and 35 minutes in the evening."

Over the past 20 years, the bats, also known as flying foxes, have caused extensive damage in the gardens, with more than 28 trees and 30

palms already lost and several hundred more trees and plants damaged, 60 critically. Summerell said 100 bats had been fitted with satellite collars to track their movement and they were dispersing around the Sydney region, up the coast, and even as far as Queensland state, some 700 kilometres (434 miles) away.

Nine young elephants find new home in Mexican zoo

PUEBLA, (Mexico), 13 June — It was the stuff of a major film studio's next animation project: Nine African baby elephants orphaned after their parents were poached, but then miraculously rescued to a wild game park in Latin America. In the highlands of central Mexico, pee wee pachyderms the size of Volkswagen Beetles could wander around, wide-eyed as they munched on tortillas and donned sombreros in their new home.

Except that the government of Namibia, where they came from, says it didn't happen that way. The nine elephants that made a big media splash last week lumbering off a cargo plane, on their way to a reserve in

Puebla, were the result of a commercial sale. Despite reports to the contrary, the creatures had never been truly, fully free. They also aren't babies, but youngsters ranging from 4 to 10 years old, said Boas Erkki, deputy director at the Namibian Ministry of Environment and Tourism.

The elephants were sold by the original owner, a farm, to the Namib Game Services private reserve and their mothers were not poached, Erkki told *The Associated Press* on Monday.

The Namib Game Services sold the animals because they didn't have enough space to keep them, he said.

Chinese police destroy 100,000 illegal guns

BEIJING, 13 June — Police in 150 Chinese cities jointly destroyed more than 100,000 illegal guns on Tuesday, the Ministry of Public Security said.

About 250 tons of illegal explosives will also be disposed of in the next few days, according to the statement from the ministry. A large portion of these guns were seized by police during raids, and others were submitted by citizens, the statement said.

Half of the guns were confiscated during a national campaign targeting illegal guns and explosives, which started in February and will last until December, it said.

So far, police have busted more than 180 criminal organizations and detained 7,800 suspects involved in the illegal possession of guns and explosives, the statement said.

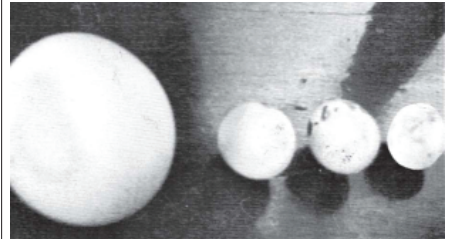
Tree growing ceremony held in Myawady Township

UAE no longer most expensive place in Middle East

DUBAI, 13 June — Abu Dhabi lost its lead as the Middle Eastern City with the highest cost of living to Beirut, while Dubai fell back 12 places in the global ranking, the Worldwide Cost of Living 2012, which was published by consultancy firm Mercer, showed on Tuesday.

The annual Mercer study examines the cost of living for expatriates in 214 cities globally. In the Middle East, Abu Dhabi fell to place 76 from 67 last year. Beirut, on the other hand, moved up by eight notches to land on

number 67 in the global Mercer ranking. Mostly due to pressure on real estate prices and rents, the United Arab Emirates (UAE) capital was replaced by Beirut as the most costly metropolis regionally. The UAE's trade and business hub Dubai is regionally the third, as globally, Mercer said that Dubai has fallen to position 94 from 81, also because the property market saw an ongoing value decline.

Nevertheless, the UAE remains the most expensive place to live in the Gulf Arab union. Both Abu Dhabi and

Dubai are ahead of Saudi Arabia's Capital Riyadh (123), Manama, Bahrain (156), Kuwait City, Kuwait (134), Doha, Qatar (169), Muscat, Oman (179) and Jeddah, the western port city in Saudi Arabia (186). Globally, the most expensive city to live for foreigners is Tokyo, which replaced Angola's capital Luanda, Mercer said. Mercer compares costs for over 200 factors in each location including housing, transport, food, clothing, household goods and entertainment.

Canton Fair to further boost Italy-China commercial ties

The fair, founded by the Chinese government in 1957 and the largest trade fair in China, not only fosters international commercial exchange but also provides a unique platform for sharing knowledge and information. Liu Jianjun, deputy director-general of the China Foreign Trade Centre, told the press conference in Milan.

With an exhibition area of 1.16 million square metres and over 210,000 buyers from more than 210 countries and regions in the world, the fair enhances the leadership of best-performing enterprises in the competitive international market, he said. "The fair also attaches a lot of importance to innovation, and has created a Fair Product Design and Trade Promotion Centre," Liu said. Other officials, including the Canton Fair's secretary general Wang Zhiping and Chinese Consul General in Milan Liang Hui, also attended the Press conference.

Innovation, which is typical of many Italian businesses, can further enhance bilateral relations that "have significantly grown both in cultural and economic terms since 2004," Liang said. Italy is China's fourth-largest trading partner in Europe as bilateral trade reached 51 billion US dollars last year, and its annual investment in China is estimated at 5.5 billion dollars, the consul general said. Events such as the Canton Fair can help Italy further strengthen its dialogue with China that besides promoting exports also has the goal of balancing international trade by promoting imports as well, Liang said. — Xinhua

Nuclear power more costly than renewables

BEIJING, 13 June — Like a modern-day Pompeii, the streets and buildings of Prypyat stand frozen by a disaster. But, unlike the eruption of Mount Vesuvius nearly 2,000 years ago, Prypyat was destroyed by a manmade — and thus preventable — catastrophe. Weeds and gray desolation are all that thrive in this once-bustling community, which housed the workers of Chernobyl's doomed nuclear power plant, whose devastating meltdown 26 years ago still inflicts physical and socioeconomic harm on many in Ukraine and nearby countries.

Back then, the world was, for an instant, shocked by the folly of nuclear technology. But, as with Hiroshima, Three Mile Island, and last year's Fukushima meltdown in Japan, the spike in global dismay was all too fleeting.

This myopia is a symptom of steady population growth, coupled with consumption-driven economies and ever-increasing demand for cheap energy. But the risks clearly outweigh the alleged benefits.

While nuclear energy's advocates often claim that there have been only two major calamities, a very different picture emerges if we consider other "accidents" that caused loss of human life or significant property damage.

Between 1952 and 2009, at least 99 nuclear accidents met this definition worldwide, at a cost of more than US\$20.5 billion, or more than one incident and US\$330 million in damage every year.

This recurrence rate demonstrates that many risks are not being properly managed or regulated. The

meltdown of a 500-megawatt reactor located 50 kilometres (31 miles) from a city would cause the immediate death of an estimated 45,000 people, injure roughly another 70,000, and cause US\$17 billion in property damage. During a visit to Chernobyl in April, I learned about a new project to build, by 2015, a "shelter" to lock in the radiation still emanating from the reactor.

The price tag is estimated at US\$1.9 billion. But this sarco-phagus is no more than a wildly expensive Band-Aid, which will be ripped off a still-festering wound in 100 years, by which point, it is hoped, a permanent solution will have been found. A 30-kilometre exclusion zone still rings Chernobyl, leaving once-fertile land unable to be tended by local farmers.

Murdoch confidante in court over hacking scandal

LONDON, 13 June — Rebekah Brooks, a trusted confidante of Rupert Murdoch and friend to a succession of British prime ministers, appears in a London court on Wednesday accused of hindering a police investigation into phone hacking and corruption by staff at his British tabloids. Huge media interest is guaranteed for the first appearance in the dock of the 44-year-old, a former editor of two of Britain's top-selling newspapers who counts the upper echelons of the British establishment and senior politicians in her network of friends.

Those include Prime

Minister David Cameron whose close relationship with Brooks and other figures in Murdoch's media empire will come under the microscope when he appears before a public inquiry into press ethics on Thursday. Brooks is charged with concealing material from detectives and hiding documents, computers and other electronic equipment. Brooks, her racehorse trainer husband Charlie, her

Mexican cartel accused of laundering cash in

MCALLEN, (Texas), 13 June — Authorities said they arrested seven members of one of Mexico's largest drug cartels on Tuesday and accused them of laundering money in the United States by buying, breeding and racing American racehorses. The case points to the increasing corrupting influence in the United States of the billion-dollar illegal drug trade across the border in Mexico, an official said. The leader of Mexico's brutal Zetas

drug cartel, Miguel Angel Trevino Morales, and 13 others, including his brothers, used false businesses to conceal the true owners of the horses, according to charges in an indictment unsealed in District Court in Austin on Tuesday.

Federal authorities arrested seven of the 14 defendants in California, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma. They include one of the drug lord's brothers, Jose Trevino Morales and his

wife, Zulema Trevino, the Justice Department said in a statement. Miguel Angel Trevino Morales, known as "Z-40," and another brother, Oscar Omar Trevino Morales, known as "Z-42," are believed to be at large in Mexico, authorities said.

The Zetas have fought their way to become one of Mexico's two largest drug cartels and have thousands of members across Mexico and into Central America, a vast

trafficking network with a stronghold in Nuevo Laredo, across the Rio Grande from Texas.

Its key business is smuggling cocaine, heroin, marijuana and crystal meth into the United States, but the cartel is also involved in extortion, kidnapping, oil theft and other crimes. Court papers said the Zetas poured millions of dollars in proceeds from drug trafficking into the purchase, training and racing of American quarter horses in New Mexico, Oklahoma, California and Texas since 2008. — Reuters

Centuries old scripture found in Lhasa

LHASA, 13 June — Cultural specialists in southwest China's Tibet autonomous region have found more than 100 pages of Tibetan scripture that dates back to the 13th century, local authorities said on Wednesday. The document, whose content covers traditional Tibetan medicine and religion, was found at a monastery in Nyemo county on the outskirts of Lhasa last week, said Tashi Gyatso, an official with Lhasa's cultural bureau.

"The pages were loose and the document was incomplete," he said. But the text, written in black ink and on quality Tibetan paper made of bark fiber, was still legible, he said. Though the text was written in Tibetan, most of the pages were numbered with Chinese characters, the official said. "The document was compiled during the Yuan Dynasty (1271-1368), almost 800 years ago," said Pempa Tsering, a Lhasa-based specialist on ancient Tibetan literature.

Four dead in Sacramento gang shooting

SACRAMENTO, 13 June— Four people, including two ethnic Hmong shamans, were killed in a gang-related shooting in California's capital of Sacramento, officials and media said on Sunday. The dead included the gunman, police said. A fifth person was hospitalized in critical but stable condition with gunshot wounds, they said. The Sacramento Bee newspaper said the two shamans — traditional spiritual healers or guides — were in their 50s.

The shooting occurred late on Saturday in a southern

Sacramento neighbourhood, said Michele Gigante, a spokeswoman for Sacramento Police Department. Authorities said they believe that the gunman was let into the home before he opened fire with a handgun, killing three of the occupants of the home and wounding a fourth person.

I think that's because of the intensity of the Premier league." Hodgson is confident that England's strikeforce of Ashley Young and Danny Welbeck will improve as they gain greater experience.

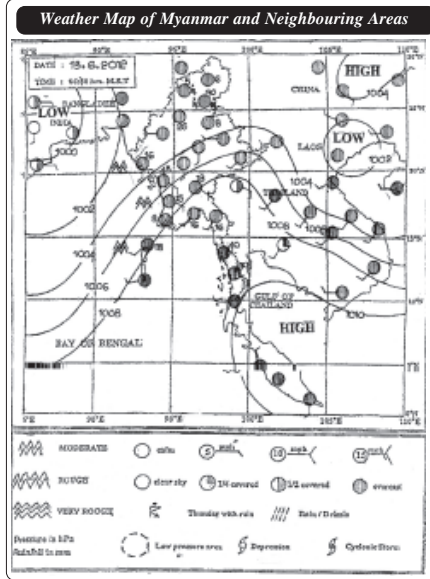

Hosepipe ban being lifted by three water companies

LONDON, 13 June—Three major water companies announced an end to hosepipe bans on Wednesday after unusually heavy rainfall during the last three months.

Thames Water, Anglian Water and Southern Water will officially end their bans on Thursday. Hosepipe restrictions were introduced in April to combat drought in southern and

eastern England after two consecutive dry winters.

"We have had two-and-a-half times the average rainfall for April, we have had steady showers in May and then monsoon downpours in June. That's changed things," a spokesman for Thames Water said. Richard Aylard, the firm's sustainability director, told the BBC that some other water companies were still "heavily dependent" on ground water and therefore needed to keep hosepipe bans in place.

"But those of us who are fortunate enough to have lots of surface water... we can lift the bans now," he added.

Anglian Water said that a combination of factors influenced it to remove the ban. "It's been because of supply and demand, it has recharged. It also is because we have had such a cold, wet May and June following a wet April, which means demand has been suppressed," a spokesman said.

Southern Water said it would be lifting restrictions in Kent and Sussex. The Environment Agency in its latest briefing said the wet weather had significantly increased river and reservoir levels, thus reducing the risk of drought and water restrictions.—Internet

Austrian minister says Italy too may need bailout

VIENNA/ROME, 13 June — Raising the stakes in Europe's debt crisis, Austria's finance minister said Italy may need a financial rescue because of its high borrowing costs, drawing a sharp denial on Tuesday from the Italian prime minister. Maria Fekter's assessment of the euro zone's third largest economy stoked investors' fears that Europe is far from ending 2-1/2 years of turmoil — a feeling reinforced by Dutch Finance Minister Jan Kees de Jager, who said the euro zone was "still far from stable".

A deal by euro zone finance ministers on Saturday to lend Spain up to 100 billion euros (\$125 billion) to recapitalize its banks was seen by many in the markets as yet another

sticking plaster. Spanish 10-year bond government yields soared to 6.81 percent, their highest level since the euro's launch in 1999. Euro zone rescue funds, already stretched by supporting Greece, Portugal, Ireland and soon Spain, might be insufficient to cope with Italy as well, Fekter said in a television interview on Monday night.—Reuters

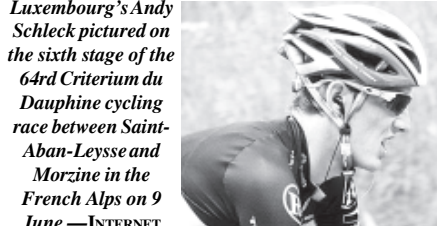
Top contender Schleck out of Tour de France

PARIS, 13 June — Yellow jersey contender Andy Schleck has pulled out of this year's Tour de France due to injuries suffered in last week's Criterium du Dauphine race, according to his family.

Schleck was among the favourites for the 98th edition, which will begin in Liege, Belgium on June 30 and end in Paris on 22 July, but will take no part after being diagnosed with a pelvis fracture in recent days. The RadioShack climbing specialist, who has finished runner-up three times on the world's premier cycling event, had recently been crowned the 2010 champion following the disqualification of Spain's Alberto Contador for doping offences.

Schleck's joy at finally securing the yellow jersey was, however, tempered by the injuries he suffered in a crash last Thursday at the Criterium, an eight-day race which is a major tune-up for the Tour. During a 53 km time trial a strong gust of wind literally picked Schleck and his bike up off the ground and dumped him at the side of the road.

Schleck continued, but complained of leg and back pain and despite beginning Saturday's sixth and penultimate stage he pulled out after 63 km. "He couldn't pedal anymore," RadioShack sporting director Alain Gallopin told the race's official website.—Internet

Little mighty creature of ocean inspires strong new material for medical implants and armour

SCIENCE DAILY, 13 June—A scientist from Nanyang Technological University (NTU) may be onto an ocean of discovery because of his research into a little sea creature called the mantis shrimp.

The research is likely to lead to making ceramics — today's preferred material for medical implants and military body armour — many times stronger. These findings

were published in a recent issue of the journal Science, and focused on the mantis shrimp's ability to shatter aquarium glass and crab shells alike.

The common creature native to the Indo Pacific, has club-like 'arms' which can strike prey at speeds matching that of a 5.56mm rifle bullet. Each impact generates a force exceeding 50 kilograms, which is

hundreds of times the mantis shrimp's weight.

Assistant Professor Ali Miserez, from NTU's School of Materials Science Engineering (MSE) and School of Biological Sciences (SBS), collaborated with Dr James Weaver from Harvard University as well as scientists from the University of California-Riverside, Purdue University, and Brookhaven National Laboratory in the United States.

They have observed down to the nanoscale the highly unique composite structure of the mantis shrimp's club and discovered that it is weaved together in a unique fashion to create a structure tougher than many engineered ceramics.
