Pyuchaung Hydropower Project to generate 120 million kwh/Year

NAY PYI TAW, 23 June—Union Minister for Electric Power No. 1 U Zaw Min yesterday afternoon inspected fixing of Spiral Casing at Unit 1 and Unit 2, installation of penstock steel pipeline at the exit of power intake tunnel, completion of concrete works at the tunnel, construction of sluice gate and land preparations for construction of the switch yard at Pyuchaung Hydropower Project being implemented by Construction 3 of Hydropower Implementation Department on Pyu Creek, seven miles southwest of Pyu in Bago Region.

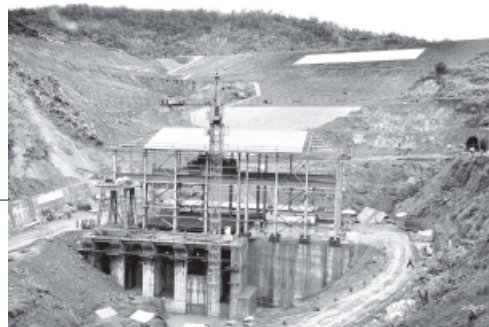
The Union minister stressed the need for officials to strive for timely completion of the project and supervise worksite safety and then viewed progress of main embankment construction tasks.

The main embankment of the project is being built by

Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation and the power station by Ministry of Electric Power No 1.

On completion, two 20-megawatt generators will generate 120 million kilowatt hours per year. The project would be completed in 2013.

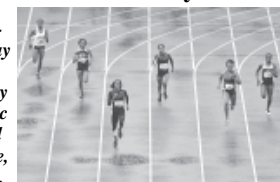

Maximum results

Mostly, the national budget cannot be an adequate single financial force for the developing countries in their missions for multiple sectoral progresses covering the national development goals and the UN Millennium Development Goals. Naturally, they need international aid, loans and technological assistance.

In consequence, our government in office formed the Central Committee for Management of Foreign Aids, the Work Committee and the National Economic and Social Advisory Council for the effective management of any financial or material assistance we receive from international community while learning the international experiences in facilitating the work.

Normally, benefactor states or organizations have their own specific programmes, interests and focusing areas, and the receiving countries on their part too have their own special, pressing and normal issues for the effective implementation of their development plans and reform strategies.

So we need comprehensive and integrated plans in carefully and wisely spending the financial resources we receive from the government budget allotments, international aids and domestic and foreign investments as effective as we can. A large chunk of government budget allotments and aids should be saved for far-flung areas where the private sector has less interest in making investments as the profit prospects are low while using most of the local and foreign investments in regions which are economic for private companies.

In taking loans from abroad we must take into account the interest rate, other terms and conditions, and our promising areas and projects and priority concerns. We need considerable investments in infrastructure projects including education, health, electricity, communications, roads, bridges and ports as they serve the long-term interest of the State and the people.

As the current year sees the government launching the second phase of reform strategy at top gear, all levels at government bodies must do their best in managing financial and material resources though wider bottom-up approach to get maximum results in every sector.

Big four eurozone economies propose growth package at Rome summit

ROME, 23 June—As Italy sweltered in the summer heat, there were signs of warmer relations among leaders of the big four eurozone nations — Italy, Germany, France and Spain, as they met in Rome to consider the future of the euro and how to balance austerity with growth. Dressed in a mint green suit, German Chancellor Angela Merkel looked cool and in control as she faced the media flanked by Italian Prime Minister Mario Monti, French President Francois Hollande

and Spanish Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy.

The biggest surprise was the leaders' endorsement of a 130-billion-euro (163.0 billion US dollars) package, or 1 percent of Europe's gross domestic product, to stimulate growth in Europe ahead of a crucial European Union summit in Brussels next week. "Risk cannot be sustainable economically and politically if there are no conditions for growth," Monti told the media. "We agree on the fact that what has been done so far

is insufficient for economic growth, the stability of the eurozone and the possibility to offer European citizens a long-term vision of euro integration," he said.

"Growth and job creation should be the first objective to be brought about by national structural reforms to increase competitiveness and a new European agenda," he said. Hollande endorsed the growth package, but he also spoke of the need for austerity in a concession to his colleagues. Merkel backed

the ambitious spending package and called for more action to stabilize the euro. "We want it to be clear that we will do our best for the euro and are ready to fight for the euro so it can go back to be a

stable currency," Merkel said. Italian political pundits immediately welcomed the leaders' growth proposal but demanded more details about how the stimulus package would be funded. "I think it is

important from a political point of view," said Professor Miguel Maduro, head of the global governance programme at the European University Institute in Florence.—Xinhua

Pakistan's newly elected PM, cabinet take oath

ISLAMABAD, 23 June—Pakistan's newly elected Prime Minister Raja Pervez Ashraf took oath of his office in Islamabad on Friday night. President Asif Ali Zardari administered the oath-taking ceremony which was attended by former prime minister Yusuf Raza Gilani, chairman of the Senate, speaker of the National Assembly, senior political leaders, military and civilian officials, members of the parliament, dignitaries and journalists.

Ashraf replaced Yusuf Raza Gilani who was disqualified by the Supreme Court on Tuesday over contempt of court to become the 25th prime minister of the country. The president also administered the oath to federal ministers and ministers, who had been members of Gilani cabinet.

President Zardari congratulated the newly elected prime minister over his election and said his election reflects continuation of democratic process in the country. He also praised speaker of the National Assembly for smoothly running the house during the election process. He hoped that the new prime minister would focus on solution to the energy crisis in the country.—Xinhua

Spanish Govt announces plan to boost tourism

MADRID, 23 June—The Spanish government on Friday approved a plan aimed at promoting and increasing income from tourism in the country. About 1.6-1.8 billion euros (2.0-2.3 billion US dollars) would be dedicated to the sector, announced the government.

The plan aims to create the conditions for rapid and sustainable growth in the sector. Spain is the fourth most important tourist destination in the world after France, the United States and China. Nearly 57 million foreign visitors visited the country in 2011.

Tourism accounts for around 10 percent of Spain's GDP, which is vital in times of economic crisis. About 19.1 million foreign visitors spent time in Spain between January and May this year. Catalonia is the most popular destination for tourists. Visitors there increased by 12.3 percent so far this year.—Xinhua

US looks forward to working with Pakistan's new PM to restore ties

WASHINGTON, 23 June—The US government said on Friday it looks forward to working with Pakistan's newly-elected prime minister Raja Pervez Ashraf to bring the strained US-Pakistan relations back on track. "We are pleased that the leadership issue appears to have been settled," State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland told reporters at a news briefing.

"We obviously look forward to working with the new prime minister and hope that this will open space to continue to roll up our sleeves and get back on track with all of the things that we want to do with Pakistan," she added. Ashraf took oath of his office in Islamabad Friday night at a ceremony administered by President Asif Ali Zardari, to replace

Yusuf Raza Gilani, who was disqualified by the Supreme Court on Tuesday over contempt of court.

The US-Pakistan relations have been soured since May 2011, when the US sent special forces into Pakistan to kill al-Qaeda mastermind Osama bin Laden, without notifying Islamabad in advance. The ties took a turn for the worse in late November last year, when the US-led NATO forces in Afghanistan launched an air strike on a Pakistan's border post, killing 24 soldiers. Pakistan closed NATO's land supply routes in retaliation and has been demanding for an apology from Washington for the incident. Past talks on reopening the routes have yielded no tangible results.

Russia says more missile talks only possible after US presidential election

MOSCOW, 23 June—Further talks with Washington over the controversial missile defence issue are only possible after this November's presidential election in the United States, the Kremlin said on Friday. "Perhaps it would be possible to resume authentic and detailed political discussions on the missile defence issue only upon the end of the US presidential election," Russian presidential aide Yuri Ushakov told a news briefing here.

Russian President Vladimir Putin, who met with his US counterpart Barack Obama at the G20 summit in Mexico earlier this week, has said that Washington is continuing its development of the missile defence system. "Still, our president said a drastic decision will change everything, if the United States accepts our offer to make everyone — Russia, the US and Europe — equal participants in that process," Ushakov said. Meanwhile, the official said that Moscow remains calm at a tough rhetoric of US Republican presidential candidate Mitt Romney, who called Russia a "geopolitical opponent."

"This statement is odd but we perceive it absolutely calmly ... and understand that the election campaign is in progress, (and) the emotions are on the rise," he said. Ushakov also expressed hope that if Romney becomes the next US president, he would understand it is in the national interests of the United States to treat Russia in a balanced and pragmatic way.

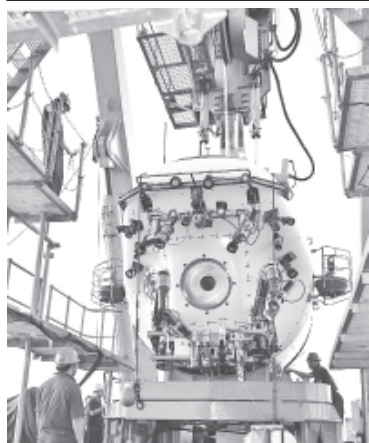

UN, EU launch new project to prevent biological, nuclear disasters

UNITED NATIONS, 23 June—The UN Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute (UNICRI) and the European Union (EU) launched a programme here on Friday in a bid to prevent future biological and nuclear disasters around the world. The Centres for Excellence (CoE) Initiative is designed to alleviate the risks of crimes related to chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear disasters (CBRN) by "promoting cooperation, coordination, and coherent national and regional CBRN policies," according to a Press statement issued here on Friday.

"The initiative maximizes existing capacities and supports countries to better address the risks posed by CBRN through the coordination and integration of their actions within a broader network," Jonathan Lucas, director of UNICRI, said in the Press release. During a Press conference here, Bruno Dupre, the policy coordinator for CBRN issues for the EU Diplomatic Service, said that the agency's aim toward "increasing cooperation, increasing vigilance and increasing dialogues" in those regions which are at higher risk of suffering from any nuclear disaster.—Xinhua

Samsung probes burnt out Galaxy phone in Ireland

SEOUL, 23 June— Samsung Electronics Co said it was investigating reports that one of its flagship Galaxy S III smartphones exploded in a user's car in Ireland.

Samsung launched its latest Galaxy S, the strongest rival for Apple's iPhone, in Europe on May 29 and in the United States on Thursday. It plans to roll out the device in its lucrative home market in South Korea on Monday.

A Dublin-based consumer posted comments and photos on a web site on Wednesday (here), saying his Galaxy phone "exploded" while mounted on his car dashboard. He wrote that while he was driving, "suddenly a white flame,

sparks and a bang came out of the phone."

"There's no confirmation it was a fault with the phone. It may actually have been caused by a combination of my car mount and my car's heating system," he added.

There have been other reports of Samsung smartphones overheating. In March, a Korean schoolboy reported that a spare battery for his Galaxy S II exploded in his back pocket. Samsung said then that the cause was massive external pressure or force.

On Friday, the company said it was still looking into the reported Irish incident. "Our initial investigation found no fault with the phone,

but we'll conduct further investigations to decide the exact cause of the problem," spokesman James Chung said, adding the result of those investigations could be released as early as next week.

Heat issues have been reported with other devices. In March, influential

consumer watchdog Consumer Reports said Apple's latest iPad tablet threw off a lot more heat than the previous version, lending weight to complaints on Internet forums that the device could get uncomfortably warm after heavy use.—Reuters

Yahoo, Facebook seek more time for settlement talks

NEW YORK, 23 June— Yahoo Inc (YHOO O) and Facebook Inc (FB O) believe settlement talks in a high profile patent lawsuit would be helped if a US judge pushed back certain deadlines in the case, according to a court filing

on Tuesday.

Yahoo sued Facebook earlier this year, claiming the social networking company infringed 10 of Yahoo's patents, including several that cover online advertising technology. In its lawsuit,

Yahoo said Facebook was considered "one of the worst performing sites for advertising" prior to adapting Yahoo's ideas. Facebook then filed a countersuit of its own and called Yahoo shortsighted for its decision to prioritize "litigation over innovation."

Yahoo brought its lawsuit while the company was under the leadership of then-Chief Executive Scott Thompson. However, shortly after the case began Thompson was ousted from the company amid questions about his resume.

In a court filing on Tuesday, Yahoo attorney Kevin Smith asked a San Francisco federal judge to push back a series of deadlines in the case for two weeks. Facebook did not oppose the request, Smith wrote.

The extension would "facilitate settlement," he wrote. Representatives for Yahoo and Facebook declined to comment. US District Judge Jeffrey White approved the delay request on Wednesday.

The case in US District Court, Northern District of California is Yahoo Inc v Facebook Inc, 12-cv-1212. —Reuters

Twitter double outage blamed on bug

SAN FRANCISCO, 23 June—A double outage rocked Twitter on Thursday, as users worldwide reported significant down-time and slow service across the website and mobile applications of the microblogging platform.

The outages left another bruise on a service that earned a reputation for unreliability in its early days. The San Francisco-based company blamed the disruption on a "cascading bug" in one of its infrastructure components.

"One of the characteristics of such a bug is that it can have a significant impact on all users, worldwide, which was the case today," Mazen Rawashdeh, a Twitter vice president of engineering, wrote in a blog post after normal service resumed.

"This wasn't due to a hack or our new office or Euro 2012 or GIF avatars, as some have speculated today." "We are currently conducting a comprehensive review to ensure that we can avoid this chain of events in the future," he added.

Twitter's statements

came amid speculation that hackers contributed to the disruption.

UgNazi — an emerging hacker outfit that recently gained publicity for breaking into Cloudfare chief executive Matthew Prince's personal Google email account — claimed credit for the service disruption in an email to Reuters, saying it launched a distributed denial-of-service (DDoS) attack against Twitter because of the company's support for the Cyber Intelligence Sharing and Protection Act.

One security professional said the group probably used a DDoS-for-hire site to launch an attack against Twitter on Thursday, but played down the likelihood the group was responsible for

bringing down the social media network. "It was mere coincidence," the security professional said. "The backend of Twitter is having issues, which is unrelated to the very small attack."

North American traffic levels for Twitter.com plummeted on two occasions between 8.30 am PDT (1530 GMT) and 11.00 am PDT (1800 GMT), according to data provided by network analytics company Sandvine. The first outage lasted between 8.30 am (1530 GMT) and 10.00 am (1700 GMT), data showed.

Twitter acknowledged the disruption in a mid-morning blog post that was continually revised as the service resumed, only to fail for a second time before 11.00 am.—Reuters

Prehistoric 'giant wombats' unearthed

BRISBANE, 23 June— Australian paleontologists say they've unearthed a large deposit of prehistoric "giant wombat" skeletons that provide clues to the species' extinction.

Remains of about 50 diprotodons, the largest marsupial that ever lived, were found in Queensland and are believed to be between 100,000 and 200,000 years old, researchers said.

"When we did the initial survey I was just completely blown away by the concentrations of these fragments," Scott Hocknull of the Queensland Museum in Brisbane told the BBC.

"It's a paleontologists' goldmine where we can really see what these megafauna were doing, how they actually behaved, what their ecology was."

The "mega-wombats" were still widespread across Australia about 50,000 years ago when the first indigenous

people are believed to have lived but the creatures first appeared about 1.6 million years ago, researchers said.

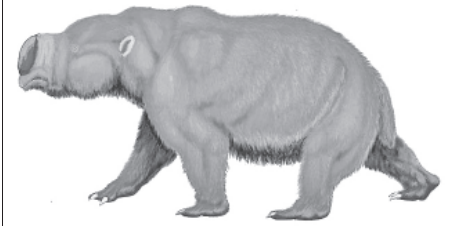
Scientists say they're not sure why the species went extinct but it could have been due to hunting by humans or, more likely, a changing climate.

The grouping of the skeletons found suggests the creatures had been trapped in a bog while taking refuge from dry conditions, Hocknull said.

Along with the diprotodons, researchers found other prehistoric species including a 20-foot lizard called megalania and giant crocodiles.

"We're almost certain that most of these carcasses of diprotodon have been torn apart by both the crocodiles and the lizards, because we've found shed teeth within their skeletons from both animals," Hocknull said.

Most US readers unaware of e-books at libraries

NEW YORK, 23 June— Though Kindles and Nooks are becoming almost as common as books, more than half of all US readers don't know they can borrow e-books from their local library, a Pew Centre poll showed on Friday.

The poll showed 62 percent of readers didn't know if their library had e-books for lending, and only 12 percent of Americans 16 and older who read e-books had borrowed at least one from a library in the past year.

"The most important thing libraries can do is make sure e-books are accessible through the rest of the library system," said Micah May, the director of strategy at the New York Public Library, about raising e-book lending awareness.

Of those who had borrowed e-books, 66 percent said their library's selection was at least "good," while only 4 percent thought theirs was "poor," the survey said.

There are difficulties, occasionally, with the

process, with 56 percent of borrowers saying their libraries didn't have a particular e-book while 52 percent found there was a waiting list to borrow a book they wanted. Some 18 percent had incompatible readers for the e-books they wanted.

May said most e-book lending problems were due to the current library e-book distribution system. On Thursday, book publisher Penguin agreed to digitally lend its books to the NYPL, joining Random House and HarperCollins to become only the third of the "Big Six" publishing companies to lend e-books through libraries.

Simon and Schuster, Macmillan and Hachette don't lend new e-books through libraries, according to Publisher's Weekly.

Print readers expressed interest in e-books, though. Of those who don't borrow e-books, 46 percent said they'd be at least somewhat likely to borrow a device pre-loaded with a book, while 32 percent

would be at least somewhat interested in learning how to use an e-reader or download e-books.

Those who borrow e-books are much heavier readers than those who don't, averaging six more books than non-borrowers last year.

The lack of knowledge about libraries and e-books means many readers still buy; 55 percent of e-book readers with library cards prefer to buy their e-books, while 46 percent said they prefer purchasing printed books.

The purchasing numbers lessen with those who borrow e-books; 33 percent of e-book borrowers prefer to buy e-books and 57 percent prefer to borrow them.

Reading is still important to many Americans. Fifty-eight percent of those 16 and older have library cards, while 69 percent said the library was important to them. The Pew poll surveyed 2,986 Americans aged 16 and older by phone with a margin of error of 2 percentage points.

Sony to invest \$997 million to boost output of CMOS sensors

TOKYO, 23 June—Sony Corp said on Friday it would spend 80 billion yen (\$997 million) to boost production of image sensors as part of its strategy to boost income from digital imaging.

Sony, which posted a record net loss in the year to 31 March, said it will complete the investment by September 2013 at its CMOS image sensor plant in Nagasaki in southern Japan, with half the money to be spent during the current business term as part of outlays already announced.

Output at the plant will be 60,000 wafers a month once it has established new production lines, the company said. These will be sold to makers of smart phones and tablets and will also be used

for Sony's own products.

With its television unit hammered by weak demand and intense competition from foreign rivals such as Samsung Electronics the company is looking for ways to boost revenue and profits in other divisions.

Sony expects sales at its TV unit, which has lost more than \$12 billion in 9 years, to fall 11 percent to 17.5 million this business year.

The company's new president, Kazuo Hirai, in April said that Sony's future lay in mobile devices such as the Xperia smartphone, gaming and digital imaging. He set a target for group sales of 8.5 trillion yen in two years, with an operating margin of more than 5 percent.—Reuters

Court rules in favour of Tata Motors in Singur land tussle

KOLKATA, 23 June—The Calcutta High Court on Friday nullified a law that forced Tata Motors (TAMONS) to forfeit Singur land acquired by the company to build a factory, in a decision that could pave the way for the automaker to recoup some of its \$310 million investment in the development.

The law, which forced the company to hand back land in West Bengal, was ruled "unconstitutional and void" by the Calcutta High Court, lawyers present told Reuters.

The ruling will be challenged in the Supreme

Court, said Kalyan Banerjee, a lawmaker in the state government.

Tata, which abandoned the project in 2008 and shifted the factory to make its ultra-low cost Nano car to Gujarat, has previously sought compensation over the dispute.

"We will be studying the order before deciding the next course of action," Tata Motors spokeswoman Ashmita Pillay said.

Shares in Tata Motors were flat in the afternoon, after having risen slightly following the ruling.

IKEA to enter India, invest 1.5 b euros in stores

MUMBAI, 23 June—Swedish retailer IKEA, the world's largest furniture maker, is opening up in India, marking a crucial step for the Indian government whose policy flip flops related to foreign investment have damaged market confidence. The company, known for huge stores selling flatpack furniture and accessories, said it would invest 1.5 billion euros to open 25 stores in Asia's third-largest economy after initially balking at India's sourcing requirements.

IKEA's plans, announced by the Indian government after a meeting between the company's CEO and India's trade minister in Russia, could give a boost to the embattled government of Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, which was forced in December to backtrack on plans to allow in foreign supermarket operators.

While the government removed foreign investment caps in single-brand retail in January, it imposed a condition that foreign retailers source 30 percent from local small and mid-sized enterprises, dampening the enthusiasm of retailers for the plan. "It's a baby step but it has definitely sent the right signal out... The government is trying to convince international investors, India is still open for business," said

Devangshu Dutta, consultant with Third Eyesight, a retail consultancy said. The Indian economy which grew at its slowest pace in nine years has been badly hit by political roadblocks to economic policymaking battering corporate investor sentiment.

But the company, following similar moves in China and Russia, plans to cash in on India's burgeoning urban middle class, which, having grown up on pop culture, generates a strong demand for owning international brands and lifestyle products such as furniture.

Sourcing

On Friday, India said the company had discussed its reservations over the sourcing policy with the government.

"IKEA had certain reservations about sourcing

norms which were discussed with the DIPP (Department of Industrial Policy and Promotion) officials; suitable answers of which were provided leading to the decision to invest," the Indian government said in a statement. The company does not yet have any stores in India but sourced \$450 million worth of goods from the country last year, a figure it aims to lift to \$1 billion in coming years.

It sources goods such as textiles and carpets from 70 suppliers and 1,400 sub-suppliers in the country, the company said. "The mandatory sourcing clause that requires goods to be sourced from small and medium enterprises will remain a challenge," IKEA spokeswoman Malin Pettersson Beckeman told Reuters by phone on Friday.

The Singh government is keen to bring global supermarket chains such as Wal-Mart Stores Inc (WMT.N) and Carrefour SA (CARR.PA) into India, in hope of improving the efficiency of supply chains in a country where roughly one-third of fresh produce rots before it gets to market.

However, foreign direct investment in supermarkets has been opposed by owners of one-off shops, which account for roughly 90 percent of India's \$450 billion retail sector, as well as by members of the ruling coalition.

IKEA said its investment will be made over 15 to 20 years. India's Commerce Ministry said IKEA will initially invest 600 million euros and a further sum of up to 900 million. "These investment estimates have been drawn up based on our experience in countries like China and Russia," Beckeman said.

Industry officials, however, said that the Swedish firm's entry will not really shake things for the domestic market given the number of stores it plans and the period of investment. "It's not going to shake up the entire domestic market but it will set a benchmark model for others to follow in India's nascent furniture and home products market," Dutta said.—Reuters

Health Tip: Does your child have a seasonal allergy?

It may be difficult to tell if your child's sniffles are caused by the common cold or seasonal allergies. The American Academy of Pediatrics offers these telltale signs of seasonal allergies:

- *Persistent symptoms including red and watery eyes, sneezing and runny nose that last for weeks at a time, and seem to emerge at the same time each year.
- *A tingling or itching feeling in the mouth or throat.
- *A scaly red rash in the skin creases, ankles or wrists.
- *If your child has the skin condition eczema, he or she is more likely to develop seasonal allergies.—Internet

Drugs help infants from getting mom's HIV

BETHESDA, 23 June—Adding nevirapine to drugs given newborns of women diagnosed with HIV shortly before or during labour halves the newborns' risk of HIV, US researchers say. Study author Dr Heather Watts of the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health and Human Development said the rate of mother-to-child HIV transmission around the time of delivery was 2.2 percent among infants who received the standard drug zidovudine combined with nevirapine, compared with 4.8 percent among infants treated with zidovudine alone. The study, which involved 1,600 infants, found a reduced rate of transmission — 2.4 percent — among infants treated with a three-drug combination: zidovudine, nelfinavir and lamivudine. However, infants given the two-drug combination were less likely than were those on the three drug regimen to have neutropenia — a blood disorder consisting of low levels of neutrophils, a type of infection-fighting white blood cells.

"Pregnant women who don't know they have HIV or those who don't come in for prenatal care may not get the early treatment needed to keep the virus from being passed on to the baby," Watts said in a statement. "Our findings show that even in these situations, many, many infant cases of HIV can be prevented with the two drug combination treatment."

The findings were published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.—Internet

Roche's breast cancer drug extends survival in study

ZURICH, 23 June—A late-stage study showed that women with an aggressive type of breast cancer lived significantly longer when treated with Roche's new breast cancer drug Perjeta, the Swiss drugmaker said on Friday.

The phase III study found a combination treatment of the drugs Perjeta and Herceptin plus chemotherapy lengthened the amount of time women lived without their disease

worsening, compared to those just treated with Herceptin and chemotherapy. Perjeta, also known as pertuzumab, was granted approval by US health regulators earlier this month.

Roche is hoping that it will become the standard treatment for women with a form of cancer known as HER-2 positive, which makes up about a quarter of all breast cancers and has no cure.

Endangered Sumatran rhino gives birth in Indonesia

JAKARTA, 23 June — A critically endangered Sumatran rhinoceros was born on Saturday at an Indonesian sanctuary, only the fourth birth in captivity in more than a century, boosting survival hopes for the species, say conservationists.

"Ratu gave birth to a male baby at 00:45 (1745 GMT Friday) on Saturday. Both the mother and the baby are all very well," conservationist Widodo Ramono, who works at a sanctuary on the southern tip of Sumatra island, told AFP.

The last three in-captivity births for Sumatran rhinos took place in the United States at the Cincinnati Zoo in Ohio. The father of the new born, Andalas, was himself the first Sumatran rhino delivered in

captivity in 112 years. He was born in September 2001, according to the zoo.

Andalas was brought to Indonesia to mate with Ratu, a female who grew up in the wild but wandered out of the forest and now lives at the Sumatran Rhino Sanctuary in Way Kambas National Park.

Sumatran rhinos have suffered a 50 percent drop in population numbers over the past 20 years, largely due to poaching and loss of tropical habitat. There are now believed to be fewer than 200 alive. Most reside in isolated pockets in Southeast Asia.

"Thank God, we are very grateful that all the delivery process went smoothly and naturally. We actually made some emergency preparation

in case that Ratu need(ed) a surgery in delivering the baby," Indonesia forestry ministry's spokesman Masyhud said.

"It's really a big present for the Sumatran rhino breeding efforts as we know that this is a very rare species which have some difficulties in their reproduction," the ministry's spokesman said.

"This is the first birth of a Sumatran rhino at a sanctuary in Indonesia," he told AFP.

"Soon after the delivery, the mother began breastfeeding the baby," he added. The US-based International Rhino Foundation executive director Susie Ellis said in a Press release, published on Friday before the birth, that a veterinary team would

immediately harvest placental cells that can be used to generate stem cells. Stem cells have the potential to be useful for many purposes in the near future, including curing diseases and helping promote reproduction, it said.

Baghdad market bombs kill 14, wound more than 100

BAGHDAD, 23 June — Two bombs exploded in an open-air market in Baghdad on Friday, killing at least 14 people in the latest round of spiraling violence six months after the last US troops withdrew from Iraq. More than 160 people have died this month in attacks mostly attributed to Sunni insurgents linked to al-Qaeda.

They are targeting security forces and Shiite civilians in an attempt to weaken Iraq's fragile government, which is mired in deadlock and struggling to provide security and even basic services like electricity.

Friday's explosions, timed within minutes of each other, came at midmorning in the mostly Shiite

neighbourhood of Husseiniah in northeast Baghdad. No one claimed responsibility. Mohammed Hussein al-Jizani said he was haggling with customers in his shoe store next to the market when he heard a loud blast and ran outside.

"Three minutes later, there was a second explosion as people and policemen were rushing to the site of the first bomb," al-Jizani said. "The evil insurgents chose the best time to attack, because the market is usually busy on Fridays with young people gathering to sell and buy birds."

The blasts killed at least 14 people and wounded 106, a medical official said. He spoke on condition of

anonymity because he was not authorized to release the information. The death toll for the month of June is the second highest so far in 2012, rivaled only by January, when 198 Iraqis were killed in a series



of blasts widely seen as al-Qaeda's attempts to shock the country immediately after

The quake struck at 11:34 am (0434 GMT), 66 kilometres (41 miles) west-southwest of Kabanjahe at a depth of 97 kilometres, the USGS said.

Indonesia's Meteorological and Geophysics Agency put the magnitude at 6.6. "The quake's epicentre was on land. There are no reports of damage so far," Indonesian agency official Dedi Sugianto told AFP, adding the quake was felt moderately in a number of areas. Indonesia sits on the Pacific "Ring of Fire" where continental plates collide, causing frequent seismic and volcanic activity. — Internet

The *Detroit Free Press* reports Dearborn Heights Department of Public Works Director Bill Zimmer was in his front yard on Wednesday when he noticed the critter. He called fellow Public Works employees for help. They used vegetable oil and dish soap to free the raccoon.

A release from Dearborn Heights says the crew took the raccoon to the Public Works yard for a "much-needed shower" before letting it go in the woods. The animal was OK after the ordeal. — Internet



Chavez hosts close ally Ahmadinejad

CARACAS, 23 June — Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez hosted Iran's President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad on Friday to ink a series of deals, just a week after boasting about collaboration with Teheran on a drone project.

Chavez, who has been battling cancer for more than a year and faces a tough re-election contest in October, has expressed "solidarity" with key ally Iran as it faces growing pressure over its suspect nuclear programme. The two firebrand leaders, who share a common hostility towards the United States, were scheduled to hold a joint Press conference at Chavez's Miraflores presidential palace at 8:00 pm local time (0030 GMT Saturday).

Chavez said he planned to ink bilateral cooperation deals with Ahmadinejad on a wide range of areas, from housing to technology. Iran and Venezuela also engage in military cooperation. Chavez raised hackles last week when he announced that, with Iranian help, he had made his first drone and planned to soon begin exporting the unmanned aircraft. A Venezuelan general said the drone, which "does not carry arms," has a 100-kilometre (60 mile) sweep, can fly solo for some 90 minutes and reach an altitude of 3,000 meters (9,000 feet).

The United States — which has controversially waged drone strikes remotely against suspected militants in Pakistan and Yemen — expressed

caution about Chavez's announcement. "The Venezuelans make lots of extravagant claims. Sodo the Iranians," State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland told reporters in Washington. Iran and Venezuela have mutual investment of about \$5 billion in factories to make cement, satellites, food, tractors and bicycles.

Under escalating pressure from the West over its nuclear activities, Iran has sought closer political and economic relations with countries far and wide, including many in Latin America. Ahmadinejad will arrive in Caracas from the UN-sponsored Rio+20 summit on sustainable development in Brazil. En route to Rio, the Iranian leader stopped in Bolivia to court support from another leftist Latin American nation that has tense ties with the United States. Chavez has visited Teheran 13 times since taking power in 1999.

NJ woman hit with ball sues Little League player

MANCHESTER TOWNSHIPS, (NJ) 23 June — A New Jersey woman who was struck in the face with a baseball at a Little League game is suing the young catcher who threw it. Elizabeth Lloyd is seeking more than \$150,000 in damages to cover medical costs stemming from the incident at a Manchester Little League game two years ago. She's also seeking an undefined amount for pain and suffering.

Lloyd was sitting at a picnic table near a fenced-in bullpen when she was hit with the ball. Catcher Matthew Migliaccio was 11 years old at the time and was warming up a pitcher. The lawsuit filed on 24 April alleges Migliaccio's errant throw was intentional and reckless, "assaulted and battered" Lloyd and caused "severe, painful and permanent" injuries.

A second count alleges Migliaccio's actions were negligent and careless through "engaging in inappropriate physical and/or sporting activity" near Lloyd. She continues to suffer pain and anguish, incur medical expenses and has been unable to carry out her usual duties and activities, the lawsuit says.

And Lloyd's husband, in a third count, is suing for the loss of "services, society and consortium" of his wife. They've demanded a jury trial. Anthony Pagano, a lawyer for the Migliaccios, said the lawsuit is frivolous and without merit.

Death toll of Taliban attack on hotel in Kabul rises to 23: Afghan gov't

KABUL, 23 June— The death toll of a Taliban attack on a hotel in Afghan capital of Kabul has risen to 23, the Afghan Interior Ministry said in a statement on Friday evening. “The terror attack on Spozhmai Hotel in Qargha Lake has left 18 people including 17 civilians and a policeman dead,” the ministry said in a statement. The clash, according to the statement, began at 11:00 pm local time on Thursday when the attackers occupied the hotel building, overlooking the lake, some 10 km west of Kabul, and was over at 10: 30 am on Friday.

“The five suicide attackers opened indiscriminate gun fire on guests and hotel servants shortly after occupying the building besides holding several civilian hostages,” the statement said, adding that five more people including four civilians and a policeman were injured in the incident.

Meantime, Afghan President Hamid Karzai, Interior Minister Basmillah Mohammadi and the top US and NATO commander in the country General John R. Allen have strongly condemned the attack.

General Allen blamed the Haqqani network for the attack. A Taliban-affiliated group of militants, the Haqqani network which mostly operates in eastern Afghan provinces and capital Kabul, has been responsible for many high-profile attacks including suicide bombings and Improvised Explosive Device (IED) against security forces. Taliban insurgents claimed responsibility for the attack. The Taliban-led insurgency has been rampant since the militant group announced that it would launch a spring rebel offensive dubbed “Al-Farooq” from 3 May this year against Afghan and NATO- led troops stationed in Afghanistan.—Xinhua

Kenya wildlife agency decries death of lions due to human wildlife conflict

NAIROBI, 23 June— The Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) on Friday decried the loss of lions to both poachers and incidences of human wildlife conflict. KWS Assistant Director Paul Mbugua told journalists in Nairobi that the estimated population of lions in the country stands at 2000 with 30 of them at the Nairobi National Park. “KWS is concerned that rapid population growth has seen humans encroach on wildlife migratory paths leading to loss of wildlife, including lions,” Mbugua told journalists in Nairobi.

According to the wildlife agency, the country has lost nine lions, six alone in the past week and four elephants since January due to conflicts with people. Data from KWS also indicates that total wildlife mortality resulting from human wildlife conflict since January is 50, including 26 primates. Mbugua noted that

areas that were once inhabited by wildlife have now been occupied by humans leading to increasing conflict. “Since the beginning of the year, 18 people have lost their lives as a result of human wildlife conflict, while another 65 have suffered injuries,” the assistant director said.

On Tuesday, angry residents at a local village in the outskirts of Nairobi spearheaded investigations to ascertain the cause of the deaths and also dispatched rangers and a veterinary capture teams to search for the lions who escaped during the incident. Mbugua noted that some communities are still engaging in the age old practice of killing lions in order to show their prowess but it results in loss of precious resource for the country.—Xinhua

Russia rejects artificial timetable for Iranian nuclear talks

ST. PETERSBURG, 23 June—No artificial timetable to solve the Iranian nuclear issue should be set, Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said on Friday.

“It seems the process is underway. The talks should not be protracted, but it is wrong to set some artificial deadlines and ultimatums saying like ‘unless by July or August the final agreement is reached’ — which is definitely impossible in such

terms, — ‘we shall cut the negotiations and start some belligerent actions’,” Lavrov told Russia-24 TV channel.

He said that threats to use force against Iran were not helping the situation, adding that the Moscow talks between Iran and the six world powers on 18-19 June were useful. “There were no agreements reached on the essence of the Iranian nuclear problem, but the meeting, from our point of view, was

quite useful,” Lavrov said. During the Moscow talks, Iran and the P5+1 group, the five permanent members of the UN Security Council plus Germany, thoroughly exchanged their views and agreed to meet again in Istanbul in July at the expert level. The Western countries suspect that Iran is developing nuclear bombs under the cover of its nuclear programme, while Iran insists on the programme’s peaceful nature.—Xinhua

Russia confirms three new ISS crew members

Moscow, 23 June— Russia confirmed Friday three new crew members for the International Space Station (ISS). They were NASA astronaut Sunita Williams, Russian cosmonaut Yuri Malenchenko and Japanese astronaut Akihito Hoshide, a spokesman for Russia’s Gagarin Cosmonaut Training Center told reporters. The new crew members have passed all of the exams at the training center and Russia’s Soyuz TMA-05M rocket has been scheduled to take them to the ISS from the Baikonur space center in Kazakhstan on 15 July, the spokesman said.

The backup members for the new crew also were announced and include Russian cosmonaut Roman Romanenko, Canadian astronaut Chris Hadfield and NASA astronaut Thomas Marshburn. The new crew members will join the current ISS crew, which includes Russian cosmonauts Gennady Padalka and Sergei Revin and NASA astronaut Joe Acaba, who have been in orbit since mid-May. —Xinhua

Turkish military plane lost over Mediterranean Sea, pilots in good condition

ANKARA, 23 June— The Turkish general staff said Friday that a military aircraft disappeared on radar over the Mediterranean Sea. The warplane, carrying two pilots, was found crashed into Syrian territorial waters, said local Dogan News Agency, adding that the two pilots have been rescued by forces.

The pilots, located in the Mediterranean Sea, were in good health, according to a report posted on the website of Turkish newspaper Hurriyet Daily News. Turkish search and rescue teams are waiting for Syrian authorities’ permission to enter the area to further locate the plane, Dogan said, adding that the Mediterranean naval units of Turkey are now approaching

the area. The military plane disappeared on radar at 11:58 am local time (0858 GMT) in the southwest of Turkey’s southern Hatay Province after it departed from southern Malatya-Erhac airbase one and a half hours ago, the Turkish general staff said in a statement.—Xinhua

Yemeni security forces detain local al-Qaeda leader

ADEN, 23 June— A local leader of Yemen-based al-Qaeda branch was arrested by soldiers of Yemeni security apparatus on the outskirts of southern port city of Aden, a police officer said on Friday. Security soldiers managed to capture a leading member of the al-Qaeda terrorist group suspected of links to a suicide bombing attack that killed a high-ranking military commander earlier this week in Aden, the local police officer told Xinhua on condition of anonymity. “Sami Dayyan, the captured al-Qaeda leader, was behind assassinating Major General Salim Qatan, the commander of military forces in southern regions last Monday. He masterminded and planned the suicide operation,” the police officer said. “Two of his bodyguards were also arrested while they were attempting to sneak into Aden by a pick-up truck filled with explosives and suicide belts,” he added. Last Monday, the al-Qaeda group claimed responsibility for assassinating Major General Salim Qatan, the commander of military forces in south Yemen.—Xinhua

**Slowest Greenland sharks
hunts sleeping prey**

LONDON, 23 June — Researchers have measured the swimming speed of the ocean's slowest shark. Data-logging tags revealed that Greenland sharks "cruise" at 0.34m per second — less than 1mph.

The study showed that, even when the languid fish embarks on a burst of speed in order to hunt, it is far too slow to catch a swimming seal. Since the species is known to eat seals, the scientists think it probably "sneaks up on them" as they sleep under the water. The Greenland shark was already known to be the world's slowest swimming shark, but its sluggishness surprised the scientists.

Yuuki Watanabe from the National Institute of Polar Research in Tokyo, who took part in the study, said that, when you account for the size of its body, it is the slowest fish in the ocean.

Previous research had revealed seal remains in the stomachs of the sharks. "It was hard to understand," he told BBC Nature, "because [it would seem] impossible for them to catch fast-swimming seals."

The researcher joined Dr Kit Kovacs and Dr Christian Lydersen from the Norwegian Polar Institute, to tag Greenland sharks in the waters off Svalbard.

The study, published in the Journal of Experimental Marine Biology and Ecology, was the latest part of an ongoing mission by the Norwegian researchers to find out what has been killing the harbour seals off Svalbard's coast.

It was thought that Greenland sharks simply fed on the carcasses of dead seals on the seafloor, but the team recently discovered evidence that they were taking live seals.—Internet

Shares in Air France-KLM shot up by 6.0 percent after the job cuts announcement.

The company said that the new framework

agreement is "a major condition of the company's recovery" and the carrier needs to increase economic efficiency by 20 percent by the end of 2014. Air France said the Central Works Council would have draft agreements for signing by unions on 28 June.

"If the agreements are signed, the accompanying measures to reduce staff numbers will exclude the use of forced departures before the end of 2013," Air France said. The efficacy of the plan will be evaluated in the second half of 2013 and if the 20 percent improvement is achieved "the use of forced departures will also be avoided in 2014," the company said.

S Korea, US conduct joint drills in Yellow Sea

SEOUL, 23 June—Forces from South Korea and the United States launched combined maritime maneuver drills on Saturday in the Yellow Sea with the participation of the US nuclear-powered aircraft carrier, the USS George Washington. According to Seoul's Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS), the three-day exercises mobilized about 10 warships and submarines. Apart from the carrier George Washington, South Korea's King Sejong destroyer also took part in the drills.

The drills, taking place near a South Korean island off the west coast town of Taean in the Yellow Sea, also involved some 8,000 personnel from the two allies' navies and airforces, along with South Korea's F-15K fighter jets and the US F-18 Super Hornet aircraft. The intention of the exercises is to boost the operability of the combined forces between the two allies, the JCS said. According to the plan, the two sides will conduct maneuvers to jointly detect. The exercises came as a follow-up of a two-day, trilateral naval drill with Japan in waters off South Korea's

southern island of Jeju which just ended on Friday.

One NATO soldier killed in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 23 June—One NATO soldier was killed on Friday following an insurgent attack in southern Afghanistan, the military alliance confirmed.

"An International Security Assistance Force service member died following an insurgent attack in southern Afghanistan today," the NATO-led ISAF said in a press release issued on Friday. The brief statement did not provide more details and the nationality of the victim, only saying "it is ISAF policy to defer casualty identification procedures to the relevant national authorities."

The Taliban insurgents, who have been waging more than a decade-long insurgency, announced on 2 May that they would launch a spring rebel offensive starting on 3 May to target Afghan forces as well as US and NATO troops across the country. A total of 208 NATO soldiers with the majority of them Americans have been killed in Afghanistan so far this year.

Rising sea levels to hit California hard by 2100

WASHINGTON, 23 June—Seas could rise higher along the California coastline this century than in other places in the world, increasing the risk of flooding and storm damage, dune erosion and wetland destruction, the US National Research Council reported on Friday. Rising sea levels have long been seen as a consequence of climate change, because as the world warms, glaciers melt and contribute water to

the Earth's oceans. At the same time, ocean waters tend to expand as they heat, pushing sea levels higher.

The report looked at how much seas could rise by 2100 along the US West Coast, and found that the water off California's coast from the Mexican border to Cape Mendocino could rise between 16.5 inches and 66 inches by century's end, compared to what they were in 2000. The high end of the

range is higher than the projection for the global rise in sea levels, which runs from about 20 inches to 55 inches, scientists said in the report.

That global range is higher than predictions made in 2007 by the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change: between 7 inches and 23 inches, with an additional 6.7 inches if rapid changes in ice flow are part of the calculation.

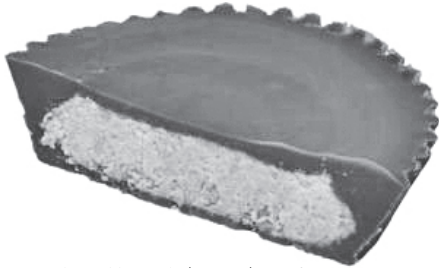
The other two shareholders of the JV are Russian giant Basia Element Group and Russia's largest bank Sherbank, with respective stakes of 50 percent and 20 percent.

Zoo apes get stimulation from iPad apps

Officials at the Houston Zoo said the "Apps for Apes" program, which provides apes with iPad apps designed for children, helps mentally stimulate the primates.

Zookeepers said the facility is the first in Texas to participate in the "Apps for Apes" programme, which was developed by New York primate advocacy group Orangutan Outreach and pioneered at zoos in Wisconsin and Toronto. The programme helps to stimulate the primates mentally in the absence of wild conditions, the Houston Chronicle reported.

"Chimps and orangutans and



other apes are very intelligent," chimp keeper Helen Boostrom said. "In the wild, the problems they must solve are finding food

and shelter. They don't have to do that at the zoo. This is enrichment. It helps them use their minds."

Zoo spokesman Brian Hill said zookeepers have noticed similar reactions in apes and human children when they solve the puzzles on the iPad apps.

"You see the same reaction on their faces when they solve a problem and get something right," he said.

Germany thrashes Greece to reach Euro 2012 semis

GDANSK, 23 June — Germany showed their champion-level strength by sweeping past Greece 4-2 to reach Euro 2012 semifinals on Friday night. Philipp Lahm's powerful strike, Sami Khedira's volley, Miroslav Klose's header and Marco Reus' last shot inspired Germany to keep 100% record at this tournament and play either England or Italy in the last-four battle in Warsaw on 28 June. "No matter whom we will meet, the next step for us is to go to the finals. We want to achieve it," said German playmaker Mesut Ozil, who was voted as the man of the match.

Greece, who upset Russia to progress from Group A, failed to find their rhythm throughout this lop-sided match despite being boosted by Giorgos Samaras' equalizer and Dimitris Salpingidis' late penalty. Germany has refreshed their advantageous record against Greece by six wins and three draws, igniting the passion of their fanatic supporters at the 39,150-capacity Gdansk Arena, where German Chancellor Angela Merkel also appeared in the stands. "The Chancellor showed her praises and congratulations to us," added by Ozil.

Germany head coach Joachim Low made a bold selection by giving four changes to his starting lineup for the encounter. Jerome Boateng returned from suspension to his regular right defending role while two young wingers Marco Reus, Andre Schuerrle and veteran Miroslav Klose all made their first appearances. "Though they put in many new faces, they are equally good as the first-choice players. As I said before the tournament, Germany and Spain are favorites to win the title. Low made a right decision to give chances to young players," said Greece's head coach Fernando Santos. The youngest squad at this tournament started solid and gave no chance to the opponents, dominating the game with a near 70% possession and 26 shots in total, which are three times of Greece.

The fullback Lahm showed his attacking talent with six minutes left in the first half. The German captain cut in from left flank, rounded a defender and struck a swerving shot near the edge of the area to send the ball in the dead corner. Greece launched a counterattack 10 minutes into the second half when left winger Samaras ran onto a sharp pass to the near post and made a cool finish before a desperate save from

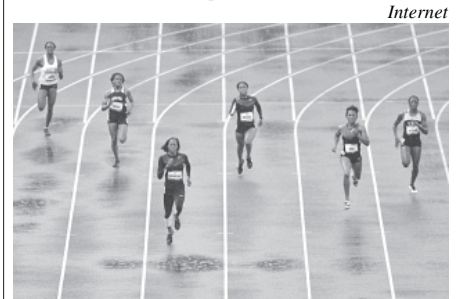
Manuel Neuer. However, the fans of Greece got another blow just after six minutes when Khedira in the middle of the area connected well with Jerome Boateng's pass to deliver a volley and restore Germany's lead.

The starting forward Klose proved his value in the 68th minute when he grabbed a header in the area to make it 3-1 and leave no suspense for the match. Greece produced their last goal in the tournament by a well-placed penalty in the last minute of regular time after the young gun Reus fired in a Germany's fourth goal in the area. "I just thought about the change after the group campaign. Greece knew our formation well. So today I wanted to make our team unpredictable. I fielded out three different type players. All of them did well," said coach Low. Germany are now on a run of 15 consecutive competitive victories, refreshing their national team record. "We are in the fourth successive semifinals in big tournaments (2006, 2008 and 2010).

We won 15 official games in a row. No one would think about that after 2004. The team are very young and have great future. I was proud of what they did today," added by the coach. For the next opponent England or Italy, Low said every team in the last four had the talents to win the title. "England are well organized and dangerous in counter-attack. Italy are great in the back. Just a small thing can decide the match in this level. We don't allow that to happen." — Xinhua

All favourites move on easily at trials

EUGENE, 23 June—Sanya Richards-Ross stepped over a puddle, ran hard for a few more steps, then jogged to the finish line for an easy win. A routine result Friday at the rain-drenched Olympic trials that left one of America's biggest track stars with nothing to complain about. Well, almost nothing. "Other than it messing up my hair, it's OK," she said. Richards-Ross, LaShawn Merritt, Allyson Felix, Dawn Harper and Carmelita Jeter were among those who made it through the first day of rain-soaked Olympic trials without any problems. So he came to Wichita for this week's Nationwide Tour event determined to do something about it. If his first 36 holes this week are any indication, Herman is definitely on the right track.

After posting a 66 in the afternoon yesterday, the 34-year-old Herman used a run of five consecutive birdies on Crestview Country Club's back nine to shoot 64 on Friday, one of four players to record a 7-under score in Round 2. Herman's bogey-

free score of 12-under 130 for the first 36 holes led to a two-stroke lead over Stanford product Joseph Bramlett, a runner-up earlier this year at the Chile Classic presented by Pacific Rubiales, and veteran Robert Damron, the winner of the 2001 Verizon Byron Nelson Classic on the PGA TOUR and the 2008 Athens Regional Foundation Classic on the Nationwide Tour.

Herman's stretch of consecutive birdies on the back nine started with a five-footer at the short par-4 11th after almost driving the green. He then holed 15- and 25-foot birdie putts and the next two par-4s before two-putting from 20 feet for birdie at the

par-5 14th. His last birdie of the day came at the par-4 15th when he holed an eight-foot putt.

Herman's two-day total this week was also just one stroke off Camilo Benedetti's best first 36 holes on the 2012 Nationwide Tour, recorded at the Chitimacha Louisiana Open. The Palm City, Fla resident was a 36-hole co-leader earlier this year at the Stadion Classic at the University of Georgia tournament and eventually finished solo sixth in Athens. His only victory on the Nationwide Tour came at the 2010 Moonah Classic in Australia where he was the solo leader after the first two days.— Internet

Andy Roddick earns 600th career win

EASTBOURNE, 23 June—Andy Roddick claimed his 600th career singles win and reached the Eastbourne final when Steve Darcis retired on Friday after receiving treatment on his back. 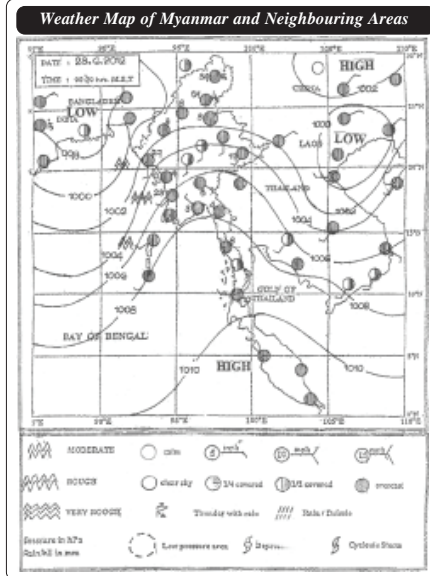

Seven Czechs killed, 44 injured in Croatia bus crash

ZAGREB, 23 June—At least seven Czech tourists were killed and 44 injured in a bus crash on a major highway in Croatia on early Saturday, police said. The accident happened at around 4 am some 200 kilometers (124 miles) south of Zagreb, on the highway connecting the Croatian capital with the central Adriatic coastal city of Split.

Croatia's state TV said the bus crashed through the metal barriers in the middle of the highway and overturned in the opposite lane near a tunnel. The TV quoted eyewitnesses saying that the bus started "swaying" on the highway moments before it crashed through the barriers. Initial photos from the scene of the crash showed the twisted metal remains of the bus positioned on its side, with bodies covered with white sheets spread on the pavement. The TV said that among the killed is one child.

Most of the injured passengers were hospitalized at the nearby town of Gospić while three of the most seriously hurt, including two children, were flown to Zagreb by helicopter. Gospić General Hospital doctor Marija Vrkljan Ilijevska told the Croatian TV that those hospitalized there were not seriously

Remote Indian state becomes rock music hub

NEW DELHI, 23 June—In the far north-east of India, cut off from the rest of the country except via a narrow land bridge, perhaps the only way to make yourself heard is loud, really loud, rock music. For White Fire's drummer Elangbam Kumar, that explains why their cover version of the Guns N' Roses song "Welcome To the Jungle" has become an anthem for the band and a big hit with their fans in the remote state of Manipur. The state, which is 1,000 miles (1,700 kilometres) from the capital New Delhi, has struggled for decades with separatist violence, a society divided among competing tribes and grinding poverty. It is also an unlikely hub for rock and heavy metal music, boasting a burgeoning festival scene and local stars who have defied social and cultural boundaries to pursue their music.

"All my pain and angst found an outlet in this genre of music. It is the attitude and the lyrics which are the biggest draw for us," 32-year-old Kumar, his tattooed biceps bulging out of a tight T-shirt, told AFP. Kumar first started playing music at college in the city of Bangalore, where he watched MTV and hung out with students from across India who were into the "head-banging" style of the West. "There is something raw, rebellious and pure about rock. You can express yourself freely," he explains, adjusting drums in his makeshift practice room decorated with posters of US heavy metal bands Coal Chamber and Slipknot.

Federer's eyes on Nadal, Djokovic at Wimbledon

LONDON, 23 June—Roger Federer insists he is still hungry enough for grand slam glory and will do whatever it takes to break Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal's grip on the top prizes.

For years, Federer reigned supreme at Wimbledon, winning the grass-court grand slam six times, while also enjoying huge success at most of the other major events.

The Swiss star amassed a record 16 grand slam crowns and occupied the world number one ranking for a total of 285 weeks.

But those halcyon days must seem like a distant memory to the 30-year-old, who heads into Wimbledon, which starts on Monday, without a grand slam title to his name since the 2010 Australian Open.

That barren sequence includes successive Wimbledon quarter-final exits as Djokovic and Nadal have run amok, winning nine grand slams between them since Federer last lifted a major trophy.

Such is Nadal and Djokovic's stranglehold on the sport that they have made the last four grand slam finals a private battle for supremacy.

Having won so much in his illustrious career and with other priorities now—Federer

is a father to young twin daughters—it has been suggested that his appetite for success has started to fade.

But Federer is adamant he is still willing to put in the hard work required to keep up with, and ultimately defeat, Djokovic and Nadal. "My confidence is very good. I've won many tournaments, so many matches the last year or so that I feel perfect in this regard," Federer said on the eve of his 14th Wimbledon appearance.—Internet
