Now the International Labour Organization has already lifted most of the sanctions imposed on Myanmar in 1999 and 2000, which in fact is the result of our ongoing reforms moving forward with acceleration much greater than many foreign countries had initially anticipated. In consequence, the magnitude of global recognition of our democracy transition has been growing ever more shaping a better future in which prospects for greater understanding and trust with the international community through proper diplomatic channels are brighter than ever. And the ILO's action we believe is a boost for Myanmar in extending its trade relations with global countries especially the EU.

What's more, many countries of the West with very little or no relations with Myanmar are sending goodwill delegations to us in their special missions for exploring areas of common interest, extending the volumes of bilateral trade, establishing or enhancing diplomatic ties and promoting mutual trust and understanding through fruitful talks with our high-level decision-makers from the President to the parliamentary speakers, Union ministers and chief ministers.

We also had visitors from Peace Donor Support Group-PDSG whose coordinators including United Nations, European Union, World Bank, Norway, Australia and Britain pledging firm support and financial and technical assistance for Myanmar reforms, peace process, and political, social economic sectors during their meeting with our President. International Monetary Fund the sister organization of World Bank is another international institution eager for establishing a platform where it can extend its activities in Myanmar.

These two powerful international financial institutions formed after World War II have a lot of experiences in rehabilitation and rebuilding task in areas hit by civil wars, famine, natural and man-made disasters.

Countries in the East including Japan, China, India, Korea, Singapore and Thailand are also on the move to extend their investments and businesses in Myanmar which they see as a land of opportunities.

For all these encouraging signs we are witnessing at present, credit goes to the government under the leadership of the reform-minded President, the parliament and the people as our success is not important only for us but for the whole Asia.

Bombs, clashes kill 35, including NATO troops, in Afghanistan

KABUL, 9 July—At least 35 people, including seven NATO soldiers, were killed in a string of roadside bombs and clashes on Sunday, one of the most violent days in the country for months.

A bomb killed six NATO troops in the east, the coalition said without elaborating, after an insurgent attack in the south killed one foreign soldier.

Twenty-eight Afghan civilians and police were killed in southern Kandahar and Helmand provinces, officials

said. On the same day, major donors in Tokyo pledged \$16 billion in development aid for Afghanistan over the next four years as they try to prevent it from sliding back into chaos once most foreign troops have left by the end of 2014.

The Taliban said early on Sunday that a roadside bomb had killed four American soldiers in eastern Logar Province, where Czech soldiers are based. The exact location of the six dead NATO soldiers in the east was not

immediately clear. Three bombs hit three vehicles in Kandahar, the birthplace of the Taliban where the group has substantial sway and enjoys popular support, killing 18 people including children.

"Villagers were travelling in a mini-van and tractor when they were hit by twin roadside bombs planted by the Taliban," the provincial governor's spokesman, Ahmad Faisal, said of the attack in Spin Boldak near the border with Pakistan.—Reuters

Obama team targets Romney over taxes, Republicans cry foul

WASHINGTON, 9 July—US President Barack Obama's campaign and top Democrats on Sunday called on Mitt Romney to release more personal tax records and raised questions about his offshore assets that the Republican challenger's campaign condemned as an "unseemly and disgusting" character assault.

Democrats and Republicans tussled over the economy, but it was Romney's offshore assets that Democrats seized on during the Sunday talk shows in their quest to portray him as a wealthy man out of touch with ordinary Americans. Romney faces Obama in the 6 November election and polls indicate a close race.

Democratic National Committee Chairwoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz raised the issue on "Fox News Sunday" as her interview time ran out.

"I'd really like to see Mitt

Romney release more than one year of tax records, because there's been disturbing reports recently that he's got a Bermuda corporation, a secretive Bermuda corporation that no one knows anything about, investments in the Caymans, kind of Swiss bank account."

"Americans need to ask themselves why does an American businessman need

a Swiss bank account and secretive investments like that?" Schultz said.

Obama campaign adviser Robert Gibbs, on CNN's "State of the Union," called on Romney to release years of back tax records to allow scrutiny of his adherence to tax law. Asked whether Romney had broken the law, Gibbs said, "Well, we don't know."—Reuters

Greek government wins confidence vote, bigger battles loom

ATHENS, 9 July—Greece's new conservative-led government won parliamentary approval on Monday, but faced the much tougher task of convincing European partners and the IMF to give it more time to meet the terms of its bailout.

There had been little doubt the government would sail through the confidence vote after a heated three-day debate in which it pledged to win back the trust of foreign lenders.

All 179 ruling coalition deputies backed the motion in the 300-seat parliament.

After demanding a long

list of changes to Greece's latest rescue package when it took power last month, the three-party coalition has struck a more conciliatory tone in recent days as it faces the prospect of running out of cash without more aid.

It has pledged to push through privatizations and long-discussed structural reforms, saying those were the first steps to regaining credibility with lenders.

"We don't want to change the targets of the bailout but that which is causing recession and hampering us from attaining those goals," Prime Minister

Antonis Samaras said in a speech before the confidence vote.

"We have been saying



the same thing repeatedly all along — the only way to avoid bankruptcy and an exit

17 insurgents killed in Afghan raids

KABUL, 9 July— Afghan police, army and NATO-led coalition forces have killed 17 armed Taliban insurgents during 17 cleanup operations in different provinces within the past 24 hours, the country's Interior Ministry said on Monday morning.

"During the cleanup operations, launched in Kunar, Laghman, Baghlan, Badakhshan, Kandahar, Zabul, Ghazni, Khost, Farah and Helmand provinces, four other Taliban insurgents were injured and two other suspects were arrested by the joint troops," the ministry said in a statement providing daily operational updates to media.

The joint forces also found and seized weapons, the statement said, without saying if there were any casualties on the side of security forces.

The Taliban insurgent group, which launched an annual spring offensive on 3 May, has yet to make comments.

Afghan forces and some 130,000 NATO-led coalition troops have intensified cleanup operations against insurgents recently. Records kept by Xinhua, based on figures released by Interior Ministry, reveal that around 251 insurgents have been killed, 15 wounded and over 90 others detained since beginning this month by the joint forces.

However, the insurgents in retaliation responded by carrying out suicide attacks and roadside bombings especially in southern and eastern parts of the country.—Xinhua

Air India flight makes emergency landing in Pakistan

NEW DELHI, 9 July—An Air India aircraft flying from Abu Dhabi to Delhi made an emergency landing at Pakistan's Nawabshah airport in Sindh Province on Monday morning, said local TV channel Times Now.

The flight, with 130 passengers on board, made an emergency landing due to suspected hydraulic failure. All passengers are safe, said the report, showing TV footage of Pakistan's Geo TV channel.

Air India is sending a relief aircraft with engineers from Delhi to Pakistan's Nawabshah on Monday morning, said the report.

The captain of the Airbus aircraft contacted Pakistani authorities and sought permission for an emergency landing after detecting the problem with the hydraulic system, civil aviation authority spokesman Pervez George was quoted as saying.

The captain preferred to have the passengers remain on board the aircraft though Pakistani authorities had offered to allow them to disembark, George said.—Xinhua

Putin opens probe into fatal floods

MOSCOW, 9 July—President Vladimir Putin launched an investigation into floods that killed 150 people and drove thousands from their homes in southern Russia at the weekend, hoping to stem criticism of the authorities' handling of the disaster.

Putin, who was criticised for reacting slowly to disasters when he first took power, quickly visited Krymsk — the worst-hit town — on Saturday and promised compensation for victims the day after water rose above head-height in some houses and turned streets into raging torrents.

Even so his trip came under fire on social media sites for drawing attention from the victims, and residents complained they had been caught unawares when the torrential rain struck without

warning from local officials on Friday night.

Some suggested the water came with such force that the gates of a local reservoir may have been opened.

"We were lying there asleep when the water came out of nowhere at 2 am, and right away it was knee-deep,"

said Vitaly Bereznoi, a 35-year-old cement worker, as he tried to salvage what he could from his home in the town of 57,000 nestling in the wooded mountains of the Krasnodar region.

"We barely managed to pull the children out. The dogs drowned. All our documents

were lost—the car registration, work records, my army draft card."

Residents remained without power, gas or drinking water on Sunday night, and the Health Ministry, fearing infection from a cemetery eroded by floodwaters, had begun vaccinating people.

Witnesses said a seven-metre wall of water had smashed through the town, killing 139 people. Utility poles toppled by the floodwaters lay near a crumpled transformer in the centre of Krymsk and a drowned dog lay by a fallen walnut tree.

In the centre of town, the emergency ministry had set up a tent camp to house people flooded out of their homes — as many as 12,000 people throughout the affected coastal areas.—Reuters

WASHINGTON, 9 July—Tens of thousands of people around the world whose computers were infected with malware last year may lose their Internet access when a US government fix expires, security experts say. The problem stems from malware known as DNS Changer, which was created by cybercriminals to redirect Internet traffic by hijacking

the domain name systems of Web browsers. The ring behind the DNS Changer virus, discovered in 2007, was shut down last year by the US Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Estonian police and other law enforcement agencies.

“Internet doomsday.” “DNS Changer is an insidious form of malware affecting everyone from the everyday consumer to a large chunk of the Fortune 500,” said Lars Harvey, the chief executive of security firm Internet Identity.

The FBI, Facebook, Google, Internet service providers and security firms have been scrambling to warn users about the problem and direct them to fixes. According to a working group set up by experts, more than 300,000 computers remained infected as of 11 June. The largest number were in the United States (69,000), but more than a dozen countries—including Italy, Germany, India, Britain, Canada, France and Australia—are also believed to have infected computers. Security experts say it’s not clear how many of those computers are active.

“Reaching victims is a very hard problem, and something we have had issues with for years,” said Johannes Ullrich, a researcher with the SANS Security Institute. But he said he expected the impact to be “minimal” because many of

these systems are no longer used or maintained. Internet Identity said last week that at least 58 of all Fortune 500 companies and two out of 55 major government entities had at least one computer or router that was infected with DNS Changer. That’s an improvement over January, when half of Fortune 500 companies and US federal agencies were infected.

IID said that the malware also compromises computers by preventing antivirus software updates. Users who think they are infected may perform a test at the DNS Changer Working Group’s website <http://www.dcwg.org/> or others operated by various security firms. For computers affected, the blackout will be total, experts say. “Connectivity will be lost to the Internet PERIOD,” said a blog posting from the security firm Symantec. Six Estonians and a Russian were charged last November with infecting computers, including NASA machines, with the malware as part of an online advertising scam that reaped at least \$14 million.

PORTLAND, 9 July—A video created by a Maine filmmaker that shows him talking to a younger version of himself thanks to creative editing is making its way across the Internet.

Jeremiah McDonald of Portland put together VHS footage of himself when he was 12 years old and juxtaposed it with a video of himself as a 32-year-old actor and filmmaker, creating a conversation between the two that’s both snarky and

nostalgic. Posted on YouTube on Thursday, it had received more than 1.6 million views within 24 hours.

The video shows the modern McDonald sipping booze while talking to his squirmy younger self about his cartoon drawings as a child, a Star Wars action figure, their pets, the Internet and the British science fiction TV show “Doctor Who.”

New studies nix report of arsenic-loving bacteria

NEW YORK, 9 July—It was a provocative finding: strange bacteria in a California lake that thrived on something completely unexpected—arsenic. What it suggested is that life, a very different kind of life, could possibly exist on some other planet. The research, published by a leading scientific journal in 2010, led to overheated speculation about how life might exist elsewhere—and quickly some dissent about the original finding.

On Sunday, that same journal, *Science*, released two papers that rip apart the original research. They “clearly show” that the bacteria can’t use arsenic as

the researchers claimed, said an accompanying statement from the journal. The saga began when scientists led by Felisa Wolfe-Simon of NASA’s Astrobiology Institute published a paper that said the bacteria, found at Mono Lake in eastern California, could grow by substituting arsenic for phosphorus. The researchers had looked at Mono Lake because of its high arsenic levels, and they reported their conclusions from lab experiments.

Their paper raised eyebrows because phosphorus was considered essential to life, while arsenic, while chemically similar, is a

poison. If the bacteria can break the rules like this, some argued, who knows what kinds of life may be possible beyond Earth? But not everybody bought the conclusions of the paper. Last year, *Science* published a bunch of challenges from other scientists, and the paper has long been an object of skepticism.

For both new papers, scientists did their own tests of the bacteria. One team, led by Rosemary Redfield of the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, Canada, reports that arsenic does not contribute to the bacteria’s growth. Maybe the original results came from some sort of undetected contaminant in the arsenic the researchers used, they suggest.—Internet

Internet providers bracing for calls about malware

WASHINGTON, 9 July—Internet providers have plans to help their customers Monday and others are braced for calls to helplines because thousands around the country whose computers were infected with malicious software more than a year ago faced the possibility of not being able to get online. Internet users scanning their

Twitter feeds or Facebook accounts on Sunday were encouraged to add one more quick click to check their computer for malware. Some providers may put technical solutions in place that will correct the server problem that could hit some computers after midnight EDT Sunday. It they do, the Internet will work, but the malware will

remain on victims’ computers and could pose future problems, said Tom DeGrasso, an FBI supervisory special agent.

After midnight EDT Sunday, the FBI was shutting down the Internet servers set up as a temporary safety net to keep infected computers online for the past eight months. The court order the agency obtained to keep the servers running expired, and it was not renewed. The problem began when international hackers ran an online advertising scam to take control of more than 570,000 infected computers around the world. When the FBI went in to take down the hackers late last year, agents realized that if they turned off the malicious servers being used to control the computers, all the victims would lose their Internet service. In a highly unusual move, the FBI set up the safety net.—Internet

Plastic electronics cease stretching credulity

NEW YORK, 9 July—In electronics there’s an understanding that silicon and other elements are responsible for bringing our gadgets to life while plastic serves as the supporting structure. But what if that plastic could be both the brains and the brawn? Better yet, what if plastic was pliable enough to form all sorts of wearable electronics and even implantable medical devices?

In fact, electronics made from conductive plastic have been in the works for at least a decade. One of the difficulties has been overcoming a loss of conductivity when plastic electronics are stretched too far.

A team of researchers from the US, South Korea and China say they have found a way to keep an electrical connection even after stretching their specially

made plastic more than four times its normal size. The key—make a highly porous polymer, and then fill those pores with liquid metal. A bit out-there, I know, but science has a knack for catching up with science fiction.

Shares, euro slump on growth worry after weak US jobs

TOKYO, 9 July — Asian shares and the euro slumped on Monday as sluggish US jobs data and cooling inflation in China deepened worries about slowing global economic growth and reinforced risk aversion ahead of a meeting aimed at defining steps to shore up Europe's banks. The euro fell to a two-year low of \$1.2225 in early Monday Asian trade, while commodity-linked currencies such as the Australian dollar and the New Zealand dollar, typically indicative of risk appetite, hit one-week lows. "What investors are most sensitive to right now is the risk of an economic deceleration around the world," said Tetsuro Ii, president of Commons Asset Management.

The market is set to focus

on China's economic slowdown in particular, with second-quarter GDP figures on Friday expected to be the worst at least three years. MSCI's broadest index of Asia-Pacific shares outside Japan fell 0.9 percent after rising 1.6 percent for the first week of the third quarter. Japan's Nikkei average (N225) shed 0.8 percent while 10-year Japanese government bond futures jumped to their highest since October 2010 and the 10-year cash bond yield touched 0.790 percent to match a nine-year low hit on 4 June.

"Investors are pouring money into Japanese government bonds because they no longer feel certain about piling up Bunds due to increasing pressure on Germany to bear a greater

burden for the euro zone's problems," said Ii. US employers added fewer new jobs than expected in June, sending global stocks lower on Friday and lifting borrowing costs in Spain above the critical 7 percent. The data may not prompt any immediate action, but it boosted the chances of the Federal Reserve launching a new round of monetary stimulus to boost growth, a

poll showed. Slow US economic growth will probably continue for quite some time as firms postpone hiring and investment in the face of an uncertain global economy, Boston Fed President Eric Rosengren said in Bangkok on Monday. He does not have a vote on the US central bank's policy-setting committee this year.—Reuters

On-screen smoking may turn teens onto cigarettes

NEW YORK, 9 July — Youth who watch a lot of movies with cigarette-smoking characters—whether the films are rated R or PG-13—are more likely to start smoking themselves, researchers suggest in a new study out on Monday. The report's lead author said the finding supports the idea that it's the smoking itself—and not the sex, profanity or violence that may go along with it in certain films—that influences youth to take up the habit. "Movie smoking seems to be just as impactful if it's packaged in a PG-13 movie as opposed to an R movie," said Dr James Sargent, from the Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth in Lebanon, New Hampshire.

"I really think it's a 'cool'

factor. The more they see it, the more they start to see ways that (smoking) might make them seem more movie-star," he told Reuters Health—even if the effect is subconscious. Sargent and his colleagues counted how many times a character was seen smoking in each of over 500 box-office hits from recent years. Then, they asked 6,500 US kids ages 10 to 14 which of a random selection of 50 of those movies they'd watched. The average "dose" of movie smoking was 275 scenes from films rated PG-13 and 93 scenes from R movies, the researchers reported in Pediatrics.

Japan's biggest banks target Korean conglomerates for growth

TOKYO, 9 July — Japanese banks, facing sluggish loan demand at home, are increasingly targeting South Korea where conglomerates such as Samsung Electronics and Hyundai Motor are seeking funds to expand globally. With rival European lenders retreating as the region's debt crisis heads towards its fourth year, well-capitalized Japanese banks find themselves at a competitive advantage.

Mitsubishi UFJ Financial Group, Mizuho Financial Group and Sumitomo Mitsui Financial Group (SMFG), the country's biggest banks, have formed teams to track the funding needs of South Korean firms looking to build chip factories and auto assembly lines abroad.

"We have been studying their business and capital expenditure plans and chasing potential deals," said Takahiko Yasuhara, the Seoul branch general manager at Mizuho Corporate Bank, a unit of Mizuho Financial Group.

"As European lenders face hard times, the status of Japanese banks is on the rise." In the year ended March 31, loans by Japan's top three banks in South Korea grew 28 percent to about 1.07 trillion yen (\$13.3 billion). Reuters

Sunburn may help rid body of radiation-damaged cells

SAN DIEGO, 9 July — In examining exactly what happens when skin gets sunburned, researchers studying human skin cells and mice found that sunburn is the result of RNA damage.

The red and painful burn is an immune response triggered by this altered genetic material to remove sun-damaged cells, according to the study published in the 8 July online edition of Nature

Medicine. Researchers from the University of California, San Diego (UCSD), suggested their findings could help scientists find a way to block this inflammatory process, which could have implications for a number of medical conditions and treatments, including psoriasis.

"For example, diseases like psoriasis are treated by UV [ultraviolet] light, but a

big side effect is that this treatment increases the risk of skin cancer," lead investigator Dr Richard Gallo, a professor of medicine at UCSD and Veterans Affairs San Diego Healthcare System, said in a university news release.

"Our discovery suggests a way to get the beneficial effects of UV therapy without actually exposing our patients to the

harmful UV light. Also, some people have excess sensitivity to UV light, patients with lupus, for example. We are exploring if we can help them by blocking the pathway we discovered," Gallo added.

Using human skin cells and a mouse model, the investigators found that ultraviolet B radiation fractures and tangles elements of a special type of RNA that doesn't directly make proteins, known as non-coding micro-RNA.

Knee ligament injuries may be more common in men

STOCKHOLM, 9 July — Men have a greater number of knee ligament injuries than women, despite research suggesting that women's knees are more prone to anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) tears and surgeries to fix them, according to a Swedish study. The report, published in the American Journal of Sports Medicine, counted the injuries across the entire Swedish population, not just among players of particular sports or in certain regions.

The ACL is the key stabilizing ligament in the knee, and is most often injured during sports that involve quick turns or pivoting movements, such as basketball, soccer and skiing. It has been estimated that 80,000 cruciate ligament injuries — the majority of them ACL — take place in the United States every year, with almost half surgically repaired. "I think the difference is that earlier studies studied at-risk populations," said Richard Nordenvall, of Karolinska University Hospital in Sweden.

"In those studies, women are more prone to get injured. The difference with this study is that we studied the general population." Nordenvall and his colleagues used a nationwide database of patients to see how many Swedes had knee ligament injuries and how many had surgical repairs between 2002 and 2009. Overall, 56,659 people in Sweden tore a knee ligament during the study period. The researchers say that works out to an average of 78 tears for every 100,000 Swedish citizens.—Reuters

Babies in dog-owning families may be healthier

NEW YORK, 9 July — Dogs are no longer just man's best friend: The furry family members may also protect infants against breathing problems and infections, a new study suggests. Researchers found that Finnish babies who lived with a dog or — to a lesser extent — a cat spent fewer weeks with ear infections, coughs or running noses. They were also less likely to need antibiotics than infants in pet-free homes. Dr Eija Bergroth from Kuopio University Hospital in Finland and colleagues said one possible explanation for that finding is that dirt and allergens brought in by animals are good for babies' immune systems.

The researchers studied 397 infants who were born at their hospital between September 2002 and May 2005 for their first year. Parents filled out weekly diaries starting when the child was nine weeks old, recording information on babies' health as well as their contact with cats and dogs. Based on those diaries and a year-end questionnaire, the researchers determined that 35 percent of the children spent the majority of their first year with a pet dog and 24 percent in a home with a cat. Despite only a third of families owning dogs and fewer owning cats, the majority of babies had at least some contact with a dog at their house during the study period and more than one-third were exposed to a cat.—Reuters

Thai detainees in safe, but to face charges

NAY PYI TAW, 9 July—Thai rubber growers detained for illegally operating rubber plantation in Myanmar's territory are safe but actions will be taken against them.

Myanmar army columns arrested the Thai people and seized arms and ammunition and vehicles when they combed an area between the villages of Nanton and Ywa-hay-lu in Khamaukgyi branch township, Kawthoung Township, Taninthayyi Region, on 4 July. They also discovered about 1000 acres of rubber plantations and an earthen road linking with the Thai territory.

Three huts and 500 acres of rubber plantation were also found the next day and the army columns arrested Thai nationals who illegally encroached on the farm land in Myanmar's territory and seized arms and ammunition and vehicles from them.

Up to July 7, the army columns have detained 61 Thai nationals including 52 men and nine women, five M-16s, two AR-15s, two AK-47s, five Winchester arms, three .36 revolvers, one .357 revolver, nine home-made long barren guns, two home-made short barren guns, one mine, one

grenade, 42 rounds of 5.56 bullets, 11 rounds of AK-47 bullets, 36 rounds of .38 bullets, 125 rounds of bullets for homemade guns, 32 magazines, three bulldozers, 17 vehicles, five backhoes, 20 motorcycles and confiscated 1500 acres of rubber plantations.

The Thai detainees have encroached upon Myanmar's territory and worked rubber farming on a commercial scale and held arms and ammunitions for their security.

There was no exchange of fires nor injured during the raids.

The detainees are in safe and Myanmar officials have already informed Thai officials about the detaining through diplomatic means, according to sources.

Myanmar workers are working in neighbouring countries as migrant workers while nationals from neighbouring countries have come in Myanmar to work in the country. Myanmar nationals had faced charges of illegal migration in neighbouring countries under the law of the respective countries and the government has been standing by them in accordance with the law.

according to mines law and whether necessary orders and instructions have been issued for legal mining on manageable scale in line with mines law. Union Minister for Mines U Thein Htaik replied that gold and mineral mining on manageable scale is not allowed in consideration of ecological conservation, prevention against extinction of rivers and creeks and soil erosion and accuracy of gold production volume of the country. But, small-scale mining can be carried out in line with procedures, rules and regulations.

Lonekhin, Phakant regions of Kachin State was designated as Lonekhin, Phakant gems region, Mohnyin region as Mawlu Mawhan gems region by the Mines Ministry. Work permits for raw gems mining are granted to national entrepreneurs-owned companies and cooperatives in those regions in accord with the minutes of the related committees.

Union Minister for Transport U Nyan Tun Aung replied the question of Daw Za Talam about **if there is a plan to construct airport and run flights**, and the question of U Aung Kyaing of NyaungU Constituency about **if there is a plan to take measures against bank erosion in Hse model village.**

Regarding the first question, the Union Minister replied that the proposed site for the airport is seven miles northwest of Haka and 17.5 miles north and one mile west of the place the Transportation Ministry had made surveyed. Generally, it can be assumed that the possibility is low as the proposed site is near the place the ministry had conducted survey. Nevertheless, the ministry would conduct survey on the proposed site and present the report to Pyithu Hluttaw Office.

With regard to the second question, the Union minister replied that three 100-foot gravel-filled diversion embankments are to be built upstream Hse (model) village with 150 feet long distance among them to be able to change the water course and slow down the current of water course with the aim of preventing bank erosion and flood at Uyindaw Creek in Hse (model) village of Ngathayauk Sub-Township. Moreover, it is necessary to maintain the dyke of Irrigation Department and cut the trees in creek. At present, the Irrigation Department plans to build two earthen embankment and diversion embankment with measurement of 2000 feet long, eight feet high, 32 feet wide of base area and 12 feet wide of surface area. Due to starting the construction of the earthen embankment, Directorate of Water Resources and Improvement of River Systems will provide technological assistance to the works.

U Khun Lein of Falam Constituency asked **whether there is a plan to allow turpentine production and open purchase centre from natural growing pine plants in townships of Chin State** and U Thein Tun Oo of Amarapura Constituency asked **whether there is a plan to manage waste of distillery, sugar mill and other factories from industrial zone in line with the environmental law.**

Union Minister for Environmental Conservation and Forestry U Win Tun replied to queries. Concerning the first question, the Union minister replied that the Forest Department adopted a discipline to systematically produce turpentine from pine plants not to damage the trees. If turpentine is not produced in line with the discipline, the pine plants will be lost. Therefore, it should not allow opening the turpentine purchase centres. Thus, it is necessary to apply the modern technology for production of turpentine and it will create job opportunities for the local people and increase their income.

That is why encouragement will be given to investment of local and foreign companies. So, it is necessary to consider production of turpentine in the long run through modern technology and to establish pine plantation.

With regard to the second question, the Ministry of Environmental Conservation and Forestry has constituted the supervisory committee for systematic throwing of waste and sewerage from factories and workshops under notification No 181/2011 dated 23-9-2011. The committee joins hands with Mandalay City Development Committee to inspect the cleaning of waste of the factories and workshops and take action against those who broke the disciplines. Industrial Supervisory and Inspection Department under the Ministry of Industry annually checks the Mandalay Industrial Zone whether waste of the industrial zone harms the environment or not. Then, the department submits suggestions to the respective industrial zone management committee and MCDC. Respective industrial zones and MCDC is making arrangements for preventive measures against harmfulness of wastage depending technology, fund and geographical condition.

As such, the industrial projects, factories and urban special task force constituted by Environmental Conservation Committee will cooperate with MCDC and Industrial Supervision and Inspection Department of the Ministry of Industry to control waste from various factories including industrial zones and to conserve environs of factories.

Deputy Minister for Home Affairs Brig-Gen Kyaw Zan Myint replied the questions raised by U Thein Nyunt of Tingangyun Constituency on **“there is any plan to grant amnesty”** and by U Tin Maung Oo of Shwepyitha Constituency on **“there is any plan to guarantee the life of squatters”**.

With respect to the first question, the deputy minister said that Insein Township Court sentenced Prisoner Maung Aye Aung son of U Than Sein who is serving his prison

terms in Kalay jail, to 59 years jail terms in connection with Section 5 (J) of Emergency Act, Section 7 and 20 of Printers and Publishers Registration Act and Section 17 (1) of Unlawful Association Act. With respect to the second one, Region/State governments are handling the squatters' problems by carrying out the establishments of new towns and villages and urban extension projects in accord with Management Section Para (b) of Chart 2, Para 8 of the Section 188 of the Constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar and Provisions of Human Settlement and Housing Development, based on the situations.

Civil special appeal cases heard

NAY PYI TAW, 9 July—A special appellate comprising Chief Justice of the Union U Tun Tun Oo and judges of Supreme Court of the Union U Mya Thein and U Aung Zaw Thein passed six special civil appeal cases and six civil miscellaneous application (writs) at Room No. 1 of Supreme Court of the Union this morning.

Besides, they heard five special civil appeal cases.—MNA

submitted at the second session, was discussed Daw Tin Nwe Oo of Dagon Myothit (North) Constituency and Dr Win Myint of Hline Constituency. They discussed that it needed to designate priority level, based on whether or not national projects can fulfill the people's needs and money spent on projects by using public funds. As it also needed to scrutinize the values of projects, the fact that the proposal on budget should be submitted in October and November yearly six months before the start of the hluttaws, was a need for systematic integration of projects and budgets. Chairman of Public Accounts Committee U Thurein Zaw submitted the proposal on the committee's report, and Hluttaw decided to approve it.

U Ye Tun of Hsipaw Constituency and U Win Myint of Patheingyi Constituency discussed the report of Pyithu Hluttaw Hluttaw Rights Committee, which was submitted at the second day session.

In drafting Pyithu Hluttaw Bill, Committee and Commission formed by Pyithu Hluttaw are Union-Level.

Constitutional Tribunal has reached the verdict that designating of Committee and Commission formed by Hluttaws as Union levels is not in accord with the Constitution. Due to that, to pass Pyithu Hluttaw Bill has reached a deadlock. So, Hluttaw representatives should find the way to overcome this plight.

After that, member of Hluttaw Rights Committee U Paik Htway submitted the proposal on approval of committee's report, and Hluttaw decided to approve it. U Zaung Han of Yinmabin Constituency and U Zaw Tun of Labutta Constituency discussed the Pyithu Hluttaw Government's Guarantees, Pledges and Undertaking Vetting Committee's report submitted at the second day session.

The report included two sections. The first one was the promise on starred questions and the second, the proposals which were discussed and approved by Union government representatives. At the third meeting, as among 126 starred questions were 68 government's pledges—10 by Border Affairs Ministry, 10 by Ministry of Construction and eighth by Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation most, it can be seen that basic infrastructure section still was the most frequent one among the wishes of people voices. The headings that can be undertaken only in 2013-2014 were fully stated as there was no fund for it. It would be more convenient if the committee drafts a monitoring programme for the rest pledges as there would be the additions of pledges for 2013-2014 in additional pledges for 2012-2013. During Even over one year term of the Hluttaw, the committee's day and night undertakings, relations, coordination and management was a perfect one, compared with time and the committee's experience. Member of Pyithu Hluttaw Government's Guarantees, Pledges and Undertaking Vetting Committee U Win Than submitted the approval of the Committee's report, and Hluttaw decided to approve it.

At the proposal-discussion session, U Tin Maung Oo of Shwepyitha Constituency discussed the proposal on drafting law on the Republic of the Union of Myanmar the disabled Rights, which was submitted by U Tin Maung of Mingaladon Constituency on 5 July. After that, Deputy Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement U Phone Swe also discussed drafting of law on the disabled rights in line with the citizens' rights

in accord with the Constitution (2008) of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, UN human rights agreements, UN Convention on the Elimination of All forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) and UN Convention on the Disabled Rights.

With respect to that proposal, Hluttaw decided that Hluttaw would monitor it and put

it on record, and the proposal will be approved so as to draft the law within the designated period.

At the proposal-submitting session, U Phayansako of Pekhon Constituency discussed the proposal submitted by U Htay Maung of Saw Constituency on drawing country-level plans on in which years townships would get better town-to-town roads and electricity supply. Pyithu Hluttaw decided to accept and discuss it. And Hluttaw announced that the representatives who want to discuss are to submit their names in the evening. At the Bill-Submitting Session, member U Myint Shwe of Pyithu Hluttaw Education Promotion Committee submitted Myanmar Language Commission Bill. Then, member U Stephen of Bill Committee explained the Bill Committee's report.

The date on which the Bill will be discussed will be announced later. The representatives who want to discuss the amended proposal are to submit their names by disclosing exactly the para, sub-para and contents of the bill that they want to amend to by 9 am on 13 July.

At the bill-approval session, amended para and sub-para of Examination Board Bill (2012) submitted by Pyithu Hluttaw Education Promotion Committee, was discussed by Bill Committee and respective para and sub-para of amended proposals, by Dr Daw Aye Myint of Shwedaung Constituency, Dr Soe Moe Aung of Bilin Constituency, U Stephen of Kengtung Constituency and U Saw Hla Tun of ChaungU Constituency, U Aung Mya Than of Nyaungdon Constituency, U Soe Yal of Dimawhso Constituency. And Deputy Minister for Education U Aye Kyu explained the facts about it.

Hluttaw decided to approve the amended para and sub-para of the Bill. At the meeting, eight questions were raised, three reports discussed, one proposal discussed, one new proposal submitted and one bill approved. The meeting came to an end at 3.50 pm and the fifth day session is at 10 am tomorrow.

without legal right. The instruction has been enforced against collection of rent on pasture and running pasture on profit-sharing basis. Minbya Township GAD, under the instruction of Sittway GAD, has summoned 9 farmers on behalf of those 36 farmers on 8-6-2012 and instructed them to retain the 85.87 acres of pasture in field No. 1349 as it is.

Regarding the second question, the deputy minister replied that Kyetyet Village previously was located in Taungyintan and were moved to current place when anti-insurgent operation was launched. Currently, the village has a monastery, a basic education primary school and a rural health care center with drinking water lakes and is accessible by vessel and vehicle.

Under the instruction of the state government in response to request of some Kyetyet villagers for moving back to the old village, a team led by Minbya Township Development Affairs Committee learned the conditions on the ground and it was found that 33 years have elapsed since the village moved to the current place from the old one and it has adequate health care, education transportation facilities. It would be required

to construct roads, drinking water lake and basic education primary school and monastery if it was to be moved back. So the team suggested the village should remain in the current place.

Taking finding, suggestion and recommendation of the team into account, the Rakhine State is preparing to ask the wishes of the villagers and the report of the team would be submitted to the President Office.

Regarding the question of U Hla Swe of Magway Region Constituency No. 12 about if there is plan to designate Sanmyo, Thintaw, Kokka, Tawwin villages in Gangaw Township,

Gangaw District, Magway Region wish to stand on their own as independent villages, the deputy minister replied that Magway Region GAD has made field trips to those villages so as to check their status and found them with necessary foundations to stand independently. Magway Region government also agreed the formation of those villages as independent village-tracts. The Township Administrator concerned would have to file the request attached with the wishes of respective villagers in black and white to the President's Office through the region government.

Regarding the question of Dr Myint Kyi of Yangon Region Constituency No. 8 about whether the government has adopted employment policy as it is undertaking poverty alleviation scheme and the actions of the Union government to make sure the standard working conditions for workers, Union Minister for Labour U Aung Kyi replied that the Union government already has employment policy and is implementing it systematically. Myanmar is a member of ILO and there are only three main points in ILO Convention 122, Employment Policy Convention 1964 — to guarantee jobs for those seeking jobs, to guarantee a job to be productive as much

as possible, to guarantee choices for jobseekers, which is to be realized through suitable means and ways depending on the condition of and economic performance of a nation.

The government has articulated the seven-point employment policy and the Labour Ministry is taking measures toward those goals formulating laws of international practice.

Regarding the second question, the Union Minister replied that there were 851 cases of labour disputes, all of which were settled in coordination with employers, employees and government departmental officials and compensations were paid to the employees.

A total of 90 factories were reported to face labour disputes from 1 May to 30 June 2012, but latter agreement was reached on all the cases. Beginning the second week of June, civil society participated in labour dispute settlements in addition to government, employers and employees.

It is natural that there are disagreement and disputes between the employers and employees, but organizations at different levels act as arbitrator to settle and reduce the disputes.

Regarding the question of U Paul Lian Lwin of Chin State Constituency No. 9 about if there is plan to construct sub microwave station in Matupi and

The Hluttaw agreed to discuss the proposal and called for registration of MPs wishing to discuss the proposal.

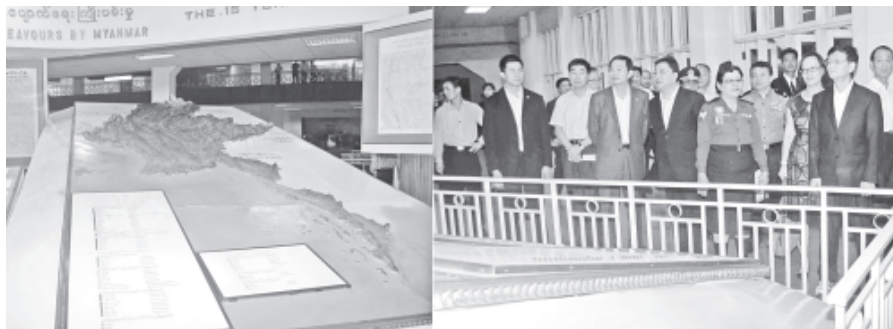

France eyes structural change to save auto sector

PARIS, 9 July—France will not let its auto industry collapse and plans to unveil structural measures to help the struggling sector stay afloat, French Finance Minister Pierre Moscovici said on Sunday, as the threat of closure looms over a major production centre.

Moscovici said a plan to save the auto sector, which was first floated this week by Prime Minister Jean-Marc Ayrault, would be unveiled in the next month, including job-saving solutions for a Peugeot PSA factory near Paris.

“We will have to take measures in the coming month,” he told BFM news television. “There will be a plan for the auto industry, we

will not abandon the automobile industry.”

“We have trust in PSA and we will find solutions that are both balanced and respectful of jobs.”

Hinting at a plan that could touch on high labour costs and rigid contracts which French auto constructors say make them less competitive, he added: “We will also need structural measures for this industry, which is in a strategic position.”

Moscovici, whose home constituency is in France’s industrial east, home to automobile producers, has taken a keen interest in the sector’s fate as declining European car sales force France’s remaining car

makers to slash costs.

He presided over the ACSIA group of carmaking regions which published a report in late June calling for a “new deal” to save the car industry by reorienting French production toward smaller vehicles and taxing big polluters.

The plan would have to come in time for a Peugeot PSA works council meeting this month, at which company executives are expected to announce the closure of its plant at Aulnay-sous-Bois, near Paris, union officials said.

The plant employs some 3,500 people, with an additional 10,000 subcontractors.

Cold snap kills 16 in Chile’s capital

SANTIAGO, 9 July—Freezing temperatures in Chile’s capital Santiago claimed more lives on Sunday, raising the number of cold-related deaths to 16.

Sunday’s first victim died at 1 am local time on La Paz Street, in the capital’s downtown area, and a second victim died around the same time some five blocks from the government palace of La Moneda, officials said.

The second victim was a 50-year-old man found lying under a tree, in a makeshift shelter with a roof and mattress. Both victims are presumed to have been homeless people who

succumbed to hypothermia.

The lowest temperature so far this winter was recorded in Chile around dawn on Sunday, when the mercury fell to 21 degrees F (-6.1 degrees C).

The government has opened 73 temporary shelters around the country for the homeless sleeping in the streets, and also established a toll-free telephone number which people can call to alert shelters of the location of the homeless people, so officials can go to pick them up. According to official figures, some 12,550 Chileans are homeless, among whom 765 are minors.—Xinhua

China’s inflation eases to 29-month low

BEIJING, 9 July—China’s Consumer Price Index (CPI), a main gauge of inflation, has eased to a 29-month low driven by falling food prices, leaving the government ample room to introduce more pro-growth measures to boost the slowing economy.

The CPI grew 2.2 percent year on year in June, the slowest pace since January 2010, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) announced on Monday.

It eased from May’s 3

2012, the CPI climbed 3.3 percent compared with the same period of last year.

Food prices, which account for nearly one-third of the weighting in the calculation of China’s CPI, increased 3.8 percent last month from one year earlier, down from 6.4 percent in May.

According to the NBS, pork prices fell 12.2 percent year on year in June, eggs declined 3.6 percent, while vegetable prices increased

imported inflation also explained the slowing CPI, said Yao Jingyuan, a researcher from the Councilor’s Office of the State Council, or China’s cabinet.

The Producer Price Index (PPI), a main gauge of inflation at the wholesale level, fell 2.1 percent in June from a year earlier. It was the lowest reading since December 2009.

Commodity prices like crude oil and iron ore moved mildly this year, as the prolonged debt crisis in the Eurozone and the sluggish world economy sapped demand for goods.

Yao predicted such trends will continue in the second half of this year, keeping China’s CPI away from effects of the imported inflation.

With a bumper grain harvest and steady supply of vegetables and eggs, bringing the yearly inflation within China’s 4-percent target is out of question, he added.

While the slowing CPI bodes well for consumers, it ignited fears of deflation, as many believe macro-economic data for June that is due for release on Friday will point to a further slowdown of the world’s second-largest economy.

One soldier killed in landmine explosion in eastern Turkey

ANKARA, 9 July—One soldier of the Turkish security forces was killed and another injured in a landmine explosion, believed to have been planted by the banned Kurdish Workers’ Party (PKK), in eastern Turkey on Sunday, local newspaper *Today’s Zaman* reported on its website.

The incident occurred

during a military operation against the PKK in Tunceli Province after a group of PKK members set several trucks on fire in the province over the weekend, said the report.

A special sergeant died and a soldier was injured in the landmine explosion while carrying out the military operation.

The PKK, listed as a terrorist organization by Turkey, the United States and the European Union, took up arms in 1984 in an attempt to create an ethnic homeland in southeastern Turkey. Since then over 40,000 people have been killed in conflicts involving the group.

Mexico condemns fatal shooting over border by US agent

MEXICO CITY, 9 July—The Mexican government on Sunday condemned the fatal shooting of a Mexican citizen over the US border by a US agent.

The victim was hit by a single bullet on Saturday, close to the Tomates-Veterans border crossing in Matamoros, over the river

from Brownsville, Texas, Mexico’s Foreign Relations Ministry said in a news release.

The shot was fired by a US Border Patrol agent, the ministry said in the release.

“The Mexican government has reiterated that the disproportionate use of lethal force in immigration

control is unacceptable under any circumstances,” it said.

Officials for the Border Patrol were not immediately available for comment.

According to media in Brownsville, an agent reported that he had fired in response to rocks being thrown over the border.

Job market takes turn for the worse—survey

LONDON, 9 July—The national labour market took a turn for the worse in June as employers lacked the confidence to hire staff in the face of the ongoing crisis in the euro zone, a survey showed on Monday.

The labour market has so far been surprisingly resilient and the number of unemployed has even declined despite an economy mired in its second recession in four years.

But the latest Recruitment and Employment Confederation (REC) and KPMG jobs survey showed

that the number of permanent placements fell at the sharpest rate in almost three years.

The permanent places index, which measures how many extra workers are being hired, dropped to 46.8 in June, down from 51.0 in the previous month. A reading above 50 signals growth in placements, a number below a decline.

“A decrease in hiring activity means we could see a period of increased unemployment, especially as a new wave of school leavers and graduates will be entering the labour market

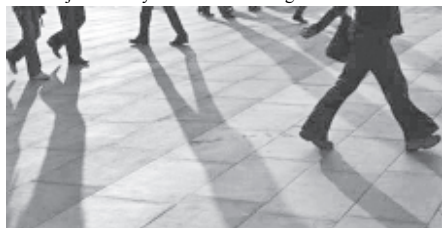
over the summer,” said REC chief executive Kevin Green.

The number of temporary placements declined for the seventh month running while both average salaries for permanent staff and wages for temporary employees remained broadly unchanged.

Bernard Brown, partner and head of business services at KPMG said the survey came as a sobering reminder of the weak economic situation. “The real worry is that the acceleration in the pace of decline suggests this isn’t a mere blip,” he said.

“If this trend were to continue, there’s a very real chance we could hit a 3 million unemployed figure in the UK in the not too distant future,” he said.

The number of people without a job on the ILO measure fell by 51,000 in the three months to April to 2.615 million, though the number of those claiming unemployment benefit ticked up in May.—Reuters

China's Hebei Steel gets approval to invest in Canada iron ore miner

BEIJING, 9 July—Hebei Iron & Steel Group, China's largest steel producer, has been given the go-ahead to invest in Canadian iron ore developer Alderon Iron Ore Corp, the official Xinhua News agency quoted local authorities as saying on Sunday. Hebei Steel said in April that it would invest about C\$194 million (\$195 million) for a near 20-percent stake in Alderon and a 25-percent interest in Alderon's principal asset known as the Kami project, located in Canada's Labrador Trough.

The deal would also give Hebei the right to buy 60 percent of annual iron ore produced from the Kami project. The investment has gained approval from the country's top economic planning body, the National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC). Xinhua said, quoting a statement released by the NDRC's branch in Hebei Province.

Lucky baby golden eagle survives Utah wildfire

SALT LAKE CITY, 9 July—A baby golden eagle is recovering at a wildlife rehabilitation facility after officials say it miraculously survived a Utah wildfire last month.

Kent Keller told *The Salt Lake Tribune* he feared the worst when he returned to the nest site west of Utah Lake to retrieve a leg band he had attached to the male eaglet on 1 June.

But the veteran Utah Division of Wildlife Resources volunteer found the burned bird alive on 28 June behind a charred tree, about 25 feet below the nest that was burned to a crisp in the 5,500-acre Dump Fire near Saratoga Springs.

"I thought there was no chance he would be alive. I was stunned when I saw him standing there," Keller said.

"I thought maybe I could rebuild the nest a little bit, but I took a good look at him and realized that was not going to happen."

The 70-day-old eaglet had suffered burns on his talons, beak, head and wings. His flight

feathers were melted down to within an inch or two of his wing and tail.

He's very underweight at just over five pounds.

Keller realized the eagle would not fly for at least a year and that the parents eventually would stop providing food.

Not a stick from the nest was left after the fire sparked by target shooters swept through.

"I've seen nests burn before, but this is the first year I have seen one burn with young in it," he told *The Tribune*.

"They are usually long gone and flying when fire season starts."

After permission was secured from state and federal wildlife agencies, the Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre of Northern Utah in Ogden assumed care of the eaglet this week.

"I wasn't sure he was going to make it," said DalYn Erickson, executive director of the centre. "He kind of had that look like he may have given up."

Three charged with Dutch tourist killing in Tanzania

MUSOMA, 9 July—Three people have appeared in court in the northern Tanzanian town of Musoma.

"They appeared before the resident magistrate's court in Musoma. We are still looking for other suspects," Absalom Mwakyoma, police commander for the northern Mara region, told AFP.

He named the accused as Daniel Musa, Marwa Machage and Ghati Wegesa. The three are among five people who were arrested on

30 June in connection with the killings.

The two who have not been charged are "still helping police with investigations," Mwakyoma said. He said the court hearing took place on Thursday.

The police chief said Wegesa was found in possession of a sub-machine gun believed to have been used in committing the crime. Tourism is a major source of foreign exchange for the east African country.

Five unaccounted for after Mo dock collapse are safe

WARSAW, 9 July—Authorities say five people who were unaccounted for after a dock collapsed at a Missouri lake have been found safe.

Sgt Collin Stosberg of the Missouri State Highway Patrol says a thunderstorm moved through the Sterett Creek Resort and Marina on Truman Lake in west-central Missouri when the dock gave way around 4:30 pm Saturday. The marina is near Warsaw, about 90 miles southeast of Kansas City.

Those unaccounted for included four fishermen. Stosberg says all five people have been found safely and that no injuries have been reported. A number of boats were damaged.

Treme Brass Band singer Lionel Batiste dead at 81

NEW ORLEANS, 9 July— Lionel Batiste, the vocalist, bass drummer and assistant leader of the Treme Brass Band, has died. He was 81.

Fans of the HBO series

“Treme”(truh-MAY) may not have known Batiste by name, but they often saw him close up. He was the skinny guy with the big drum in the band, one of the acts regularly

featured on the show.

Family and others close to Batiste were with him when he died Sunday at the Ochsner Health System’s hospital just outside New Orleans, said Batiste’s daughter, Karen Williams.

Batiste, known as “Uncle Lionel,” had been ill for about a month, said band leader Benny Jones Sr. He said Batiste had been with the band since it was formed in 1995, but had played bass drum since childhood.

Batiste used his drum to stay afloat in the floods after Hurricane Katrina, Clarinetist Michael White said.

“The water kept rising,” White said. “He couldn’t swim. The water was too high for him to walk out. He saved himself by floating out on top of his bass drum.”

Batiste’s singing voice was “somewhere between blues and old-time gospel, kind of raspy but with a nice quality to it,” White said.

Lt Gov Jay Dardenne and New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu recognized Franklin’s longevity in the industry and talent with awards from the state and city. “You are the essence of Essence,” Dardenne said.

Franklin thanked them all “for these very wonderful and significant awards” and then returned to the music with her hit “Chain of Fools.” She also played piano on several of songs, including “Bridge Over Troubled Water.”

At the end of her performance, R&B superstar Chaka Khan returned for an encore show that included the newly comprised R&B

Choi wins US Women's Open by four shots

KOHLER, (Wis), 9 July — South Korea's Choi Na-yeon survived a tumultuous four-hole stretch after the turn to win her first major title by four shots at the US Women's Open in Kohler, Wisconsin on Sunday. A commanding six strokes ahead of the chasing pack overnight, Choi triple-bogeyed the 10th and did well to salvage pars at the 12th and 13th before regaining momentum to close with a one-over-par 73 at Blackwolf Run.

The 24-year-old birdied the 15th and 16th in dazzling sunshine and shrugged off a bogey at the last for a seven-under total of 281, finishing four ahead of her fellow Korean and playing partner Amy Yang (71). World number five Choi embraced her caddie in delight before being showered in champagne by her compatriots after becoming the sixth Korean to win the US Women's Open, and the fifth in the last eight years. After being presented with the champion's medal and the glittering US Women's Open trophy, Choi was asked greenside how she had recovered from her triple-bogey at the 10th.

"I tried to forget it from there," she replied with a smile. "And then I had a really good (birdie) bounceback on 11. I also had a really good save for par on 12 so I got some momentum from 11 and 12 and that's how I kept it going until the 18th hole." With her US Women's Open triumph, Choi emulated fellow Koreans Pak

Se-ri (at Blackwolf Run in 1998), Birdie Kim (2005), Park In-bee (2008), Ji Eun-hee (2009) and Ryu So-yeon (2011). "Actually before Se-ri won in 1998, my dream was just being a professional golfer," said Choi, who is projected to climb to second in the world rankings on Monday.

"But after I watched her (win), she really inspired me to be a LPGA player. So I really appreciate what Se-ri did before and she is a legend in Korea. Five-times major champion Pak, whose victory here 14 years ago sparked the Korean surge

at the highest level in women's golf, led the charge on to the 18th green to congratulate Choi with champagne bottle in hand." She said, "Hey, Na-yeon, I'm really proud of you. You did a really good job." She talked to me a lot, and she was hugging me," Choi said. "And 14 years later I'm here right now, and I made it. My dreams have come true. It's an amazing day." — Reuters

Oxfam won big when Federer won 7th Wimbledon title

WIMBLEDON, 9 July — Roger Federer's seventh Wimbledon title turned into a quite a bonanza for international aid agency Oxfam. Because of a bet made in 2003, the charity won \$157,750 (101,840 pounds) when Federer defeated Andy Murray on Sunday in the Wimbledon final.

According to Oxfam, Nicholas Newlife bet that Federer would win seven Wimbledon titles before 2020. When Newlife died three years ago, he left his estate — including some outstanding bets — to the organization. Oxfam says it already claimed \$25,920 (16,750 pounds) in 2009 when Federer won his 14th Grand Slam title at the French Open. — Internet

Federer beats Murray for 7th Wimbledon, 17th major

WIMBLEDON, 9 July — A Grand Slam title drought did indeed end in Sunday's historic and riveting Wimbledon final, only it was Roger Federer's lengthy-for-him gap between trophies that came to a close, rather than Britain's 76-year wait for a homegrown men's champion. Making sure everyone knows he is still as capable as ever of brilliance on a tennis court — particularly one made of grass, and with a roof overhead — Federer came back to beat Andy Murray 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-4 indoors on Centre Court for a record-tying seventh championship at the All England Club.

"It feels nice," Federer said, clutching the gold trophy only Pete Sampras has held as many times in the modern era. "It's like it never

left me." The victory also increased Federer's record total to 17 major titles after being stuck on No 16 for 2½ years, and clinched a return to the top of the ATP rankings, overtaking Novak Djokovic, after an absence of a little more than two years. Federer's 286th week at No 1 ties Sampras for the most in history.

"He doesn't want to stop now. He knows he's going to continue to play well and try to break seven, and he could very well end up with eight or nine Wimbledon titles," Sampras said in a telephone interview. "I just think he's that much better than the other guys on grass, and he loves the court the way I loved that court. He's a great champion, a classy champion, and I'm really happy for him." After a record seven consecutive Wimbledon finals from 2003-09, winning the first six, Federer lost in the quarterfinals in 2010 and 2011, then wasted two match points and a two-set lead against Djokovic in the US Open semifinals last year, raising questions about whether he might be slipping.

"A couple tough moments for me the last couple years, I guess," Federer said. "So I really almost didn't try to picture myself with the trophy or try to think too far ahead, really." After losing in the semifinals each of the previous three

years, Murray was the first British man to reach the final at Wimbledon since Bunny Austin in 1938, and was trying to become the hosts' first male title winner since Fred Perry in 1936.

Alas, Murray dropped to 0-4 in Grand Slam finals, three against Federer. Only one other man lost the first four major title matches of his career: Ivan Lendl, who is coaching Murray now and sat in his guest box with chin planted on left palm, as expressionless as he was during his playing career. While Lendl never did win Wimbledon, perhaps Murray can take solace from knowing his coach did end up with eight Grand Slam titles. — Internet

Deschamps named new France coach

PARIS, 9 July — France's World Cup and Euro winning captain Didier Deschamps was named coach of the national side on Sunday, the French Football Federation (FFF) announced on its website. The 43-year-old — who captained France to the 1998 World Cup and Euro 2000 trophies — replaces fellow World Cup and Euro winning team-mate Laurent Blanc, who turned down a

new two year contract last weekend. Blanc had guided the French to the Euro 2012 quarter-finals - the minimum requirement of the FFF — but dressing room discord and two outbursts by Samir Nasri had not helped Blanc's cause.

Deschamps immediately became the favourite and lent credence to the fact by quitting Marseille last Monday. "Noel Le Graet, President of the FFF, and Didier Deschamps reached agreement after the conclusion of their talks for him to be named France coach," read the statement. Both men are to hold a joint press conference on Monday at the federation headquarters at 1530 GMT. Frederic Thiriez, president of the French Professional League (LFP), welcomed the appointment unreservedly. — Internet

Ted Potter Jr wins Greenbrier Classic in playoff

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, 9 July — Ted Potter Jr's first PGA Tour victory means a lot more than a big paycheck.

The 28-year-old rookie can take a trip to Augusta National off his wish list. By making a 4-foot birdie putt on the third hole of a playoff Sunday to beat Troy Kelly in the Greenbrier Classic, Potter earned a spot in the Masters, something he listed as career goal. Simply winning, though, had been the top priority for a player who first joined the former Nationwide Tour in 2004 and didn't have much success until last year.

"When you're missing cut every week, you get down on yourself," Potter said. "I

mean, it's hard to pick yourself back up".

"But the plus side for me is I was still young. I just knew I had plenty of time and just be patient and it will come back around again." Potter finished second on the Nationwide money list last year to advance to the PGA Tour. He tied for 13th in his first event of the year but had missed five straight cuts entering the week.

His fortunes changed Sunday. "It was just a big relief," Potter said. "All the struggles the last few weeks, knowing that now I've got a couple years to try to improve on my game and win some more tournaments."

Poland win maiden World League title

SOPIA, 9 July — Poland clinched their maiden World League title after a straight sets win over Olympic champions the United States in the final of the competition at the Armeets Arena on Sunday. "I'm really happy," Poland's Italian coach

Andrea Anastasi told a news conference after his men earned the \$1 million cash prize. "It is the first gold medal for Poland in the World League and for me as a coach and this is important."

Although Poland comfortably won the first set

25-17, the US — trying to win the competition for a second time after their triumph in 2008 — fought back in the second. A series of spikes and blocks by Zbigniew Bartman and Bartosz Kurek, however, helped the Poles winning 26-24. Kurek

then engineered the emphatic 25-20 win in the third set with some spectacular points. Poland, who won the bronze medal on home soil last year, reached their first final after a hard-fought win over world champions Brazil and victories in straight sets against Cuba and Bulgaria. — Reuters

Tour de France: French

youngster Pinot wins eighth stage

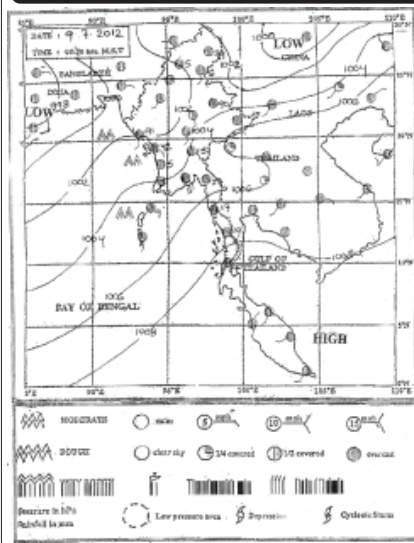
PORRENTURY, (Switzerland), 9 July—Thibaut Pinot, the youngest rider in the Tour de France, presented the French with their first stage victory in this year's edition after winning the hilly 157.5km Belfort-Porrentury eighth stage on Sunday. The 22-year-old, born near Belfort, attacked in the last of seven climbs to cross the line on his own after the Tour crossed the mountainous French border into Switzerland. Pinot finished 26 seconds ahead of a group that included a host of Tour favorites, leaving defending champion Cadel Evans in second place and Frenchman Tony Gallopin third.

The Frenchman held his nerve during the descent off Col de Croix which saw a chasing pack catching up with the leaders. British rider Bradley Wiggins emerged as the leader of this second pack, seeing off a downhill pursuit from the dogged Italian Vincenzo Nibali as well as polka-dot jersey wearer Chris Froome. Froome eventually gave up his polka dots to the Swedish rider Fredrik Kessiakoff, who starts Monday's stage as King of the Mountains. Wiggins' fourth place was enough for him to retain the yellow jersey.—Reuters

Webber passes Alonso late on to win British GP

SILVERSTONE, 9 July — Red Bull driver Mark Webber won the British Grand Prix on Sunday, overtaking Fernando Alonso from the start and finally passed the Ferrari driver on lap 48 of 52.

“Fernando Alonso had very good pace, we had the better strategy in the end,” Webber said. “We never gave up, we kept pushing and it did not work out in the end for Fernando.”

Webber pulled within 13 points of Alonso with his second victory in this unpredictable season. Alonso is the only other driver to win more than once in 2012. “We were controlling the race more or less OK until the last stint, we were now quick enough and when Mark arrived I think he overtook very easy and there was nothing we can do,” said Alonso, who won the European GP two weeks ago. It was Webber's second victory in three years at Silverstone.

The Australian driver lives nearby and he says staying at home aids his performance.

“There is that extra little bit that makes you a little bit more relaxed and a bit more comfortable,” he said. He also upstaged world champion teammate Sebastian Vettel, who finished third and is third in the title race, and is in a prime position as he enters negotiations over a new deal for the 2013 season. “Mark is doing great for us, we love having him in the team,” Red Bull team principal Christian Horner said.

It was a disappointing day for the leading British drivers as both Lewis Hamilton and Jenson Button failed to make the podium.—Internet

Neymar shines in last game for Santos before Olympics

RIO DE JANEIRO, 9 July—Brazil starlet Neymar helped Santos to a 4-2 victory over Gremio on Sunday in his last match before departing for London with Brazil's Olympic squad.

The 20-year-old scored with a 61st minute header at the Vila Belmiro stadium as Santos moved clear of the relegation zone in Brazil's Serie A championship. Felipe Anderson and Edu Dracuna were also on the scoresheet for Santos while Marquinhos and Wilson struck for Gremio.

In Rio de Janeiro, former Lyon striker Fred scored the winner as Fluminense moved to second in the standings with a 1-0 victory over Flamengo. The 28-year-old struck in the 11th minute at Rio's Engenhao stadium by prodding in from close-range after an inviting cross from Thiago Neves.

The match had historical significance as it marked the 100-year anniversary of the first Flamengo-Fluminense derby, considered Brazil's most famous rivalry.

“To be able to participate in such an important occasion is a great honour and scoring makes it even more special,” Fred said after the match.—Xinhua

Regarding the question of U Myint Soe of Pyawbwe Constituency about **whether there is a plan to exempt import tax on vehicles imported by social organizations for their organizational functions**, Deputy Minister for Commerce Dr Pwint Hsan said that the Ministry of Finance and Revenue levies one percent of custom duty and five per cent of commercial tax on ambulances for their prices. If a social organization is to apply for tax exemption, the vehicle must be registered under the ownership of the association. It is to apply to Finance and Revenue Ministry making clear of the

purpose of using the vehicles. The ministry, after scrutiny, can issue tax exemption order with the affirmation of the Union Government Office. Custom duty and commercial tax have been exempted on hearses with the announcements of the ministry. According to the Ministry of Rail Transportation, ambulances have been exempted from registration fees but only ambulances used for public health and not of private hospitals. If funeral services social organizations apply for registration of vehicle imported from abroad as hearse, the vehicle can be exempted from registration fees under the prohibition of it for other uses except as hearse.
