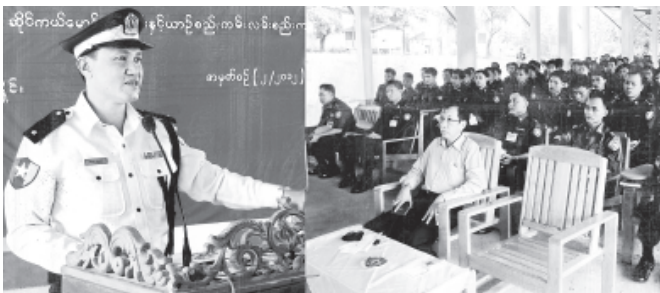

NAY PYI TAW, 22 July—Union Minister for Commerce U Win Myint and Sagaing Region Chief Minister U Tha Aye attended the opening of the office of Shwese Yaungchi Rice Co at Taze Township in Sagaing Region on 20 July.

The Union minister and the chief minister addressed the ceremony to provide inputs to farmers by Shwese Yaungchi Co at Taze Township Hall.

Speaking on the occasion, the Union minister said that emphasis is put on enhancement of the social status of farmers that constitutes 70 per cent of the whole population. Taxes have been cut or exempted on agricultural produce and assistance provided too to reduce the production cost in order that farmers can fetch reasonable benefits from their labour.

Ten dead, 30,000 evacuated in Beijing downpour

BEIJING, 22 July—The heaviest rain in six decades in the Chinese capital has left 10 people dead, Beijing authorities said on Sunday.

As of 4 am Sunday, more than 30,000 residents in Districts of Fangshan,

Huairou, Mentougou and Pinggu as well as Miyun and Yanqing counties were relocated, the city's floods control headquarters said at 9 am.

In Fangshan, where the maximum precipitation

reached 460 mm in Hebei Township as of 6 am, road traffic in 12 townships was disrupted. Mobile telecommunication services and Internet access were cut off in six townships, the headquarters said.

Train services between Beijing and Guangzhou were suspended as the railway line section at Nangangwa, Fengtai District, was soaked in water, the headquarters said.

More than 12,000 people worked for draining 1 million cubic metres of water from streets. Most puddles in the city were cleared by 6 am.

Health worker shot dead in Pakistan

GENEVA, 22 July—The World Health Organization (WHO) on Saturday reported a polio eradication worker being shot dead on Friday evening in the Gadap town area of Karachi, Pakistan.

The victim was identified as Muhammad Ishaq, who had worked with the national polio eradication effort for several months, helping to plan and implement vaccination campaigns to protect local children against the disease.

This is the second shooting incident in a week, which targeted health

workers.

On Tuesday, a WHO staff member and an international consultant working for the health agency were injured in the same region by armed men.

Polio immunization activities were suspended after Tuesday's attack.

Obama vows to ensure public safety after Colorado shooting

WASHINGTON, 22 July—US President Barack Obama has promised every effort will be made to ensure the safety of Americans, a day after a shooting rampage in a Colorado movie theater killed 12 people.

"We are still gathering all the facts about what happened, but we do know the police have one suspect in custody.

And the federal government stands ready to do everything necessary to bring whoever's responsible for this heinous crime to justice," Obama said in his weekly radio and Internet address on Saturday.

Police have detained James Eagan Holmes, 24, who allegedly killed 12 and wounded 59 at a midnight showing of the new Batman movie—The Dark Knight Rises, at

Aurora, Colorado, a Denver suburb. The man surrendered without a fight in a parking lot behind the theater, police said.

The shooting reminded Americans of the Virginia Tech bloodbath in April 2007 in which 33 died. The FBI said there was so far no indication of any links to terror groups.

"We will take every step possible to ensure the safety of all our people. And we will stand by our neighbors in Colorado during this extraordinarily difficult time," Obama said.

Police said 30 victims remained hospitalized Saturday, 11 of them in critical condition.

"And if there's anything to take away from this tragedy, it's a reminder that life is fragile. Our time here is limited and it is precious," the US President said.

However, Obama didn't mention gun control, a sensitive issue for any candidate for the November presidential elections.

Gallup polls showed 39 percent of Americans owned a gun in 2010, while the National Rifle Association, a pro-gun lobby group, said almost half of US households possess guns.

US F-16 fighter crashes off coast of Japan

TOKYO, 22 July—A US F-16 fighter jet crashed into the Pacific Ocean off the coast of northern Japan on Sunday and efforts are underway to rescue the pilot, a spokeswoman for the Misawa Air Base said.

The jet took off from the US air base in Aomori and crashed about 11:30 Japan time (0230 GMT) some 200 miles northeast of Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost island, the spokeswoman said.

"One person, the pilot, was on board. Efforts are currently underway to retrieve the pilot," she said, reading from a statement.

"The aircraft was en route to North America when the incident occurred. The cause of the incident is unknown at this time."

The F-16 is made by Lockheed Martin Corp.

Blast rocks Egypt's gas pipeline to Israel, Jordan

CAIRO, 22 July—An explosion on Sunday rocked the Egyptian pipeline built to carry natural gas to Israel and Jordan, the 15th time it has been attacked since the start of the uprising in early 2011 that toppled President Hosni Mubarak.

The blast occurred in the early hours of Sunday morning at al-Tuwail, east of the coastal Sinai town of al-Arish, at a point before the pipeline splits into separate branches to Israel and Jordan, security officials and witnesses said.

Gunmen in a small truck drove up to the pipeline, dug a hole and placed explosive charges under the pipeline that they detonated from a distance, a security official and witnesses said.

A large boom echoed across the area and residents up to 30 km (18 miles) away said later they could see flames of burning gas lighting the sky.

An official in the company that manages the pipeline said exports of gas to both Israel and Jordan had been halted since an explosion that hit the pipeline in April and that the flames were caused by residual gas.

Residents in al-Arish, however, said gas shipments had begun three days ago through the pipeline, which at one point supplied Israel with about 40 percent of its natural gas.

Egypt in April terminated its agreement to supply gas to Israel because of what it said was a business dispute. The 20-year gas deal, signed in the Mubarak era, was unpopular with many Egyptians, with critics accusing Israel of not paying enough for the fuel.

No group has claimed responsibility for the attacks on the installation that crosses the increasingly volatile Sinai Peninsula. Security in Sinai was relaxed after the fall of Mubarak as the police presence thinned out across Egypt.—Reuters

Airstrikes kill 15 militants in northwest Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, 22 July—Pakistani military jets struck militant hideouts in the northwest of the country on Sunday, killing 15 militants and wounding several others, military officials said.

The airstrikes targeted four hideouts in the remote Ghaljo and Dabori areas of the northwestern Orakzai tribal region, the officials said. The locations were being used by members of the Pakistan Taliban.

The death toll could not be independently verified

and militants often dispute official figures.

The Pakistan military has been conducting operations against militants in Orakzai for months.

Several militant groups are active in Pakistan's northwestern semi-autonomous tribal regions, near the border with Afghanistan, including the Pakistan Taliban, responsible for many of the bombings across the country in recent years.

Foxconn looks for a board seat at Sharp as Apple HDTV news

NEW YORK, 21 July — Manufacturing heavyweight Foxconn is reportedly interested in acquiring board seats at Sharp Electronics, *DigiTimes* reported on Friday. The company received three non-executive board seats at Sharp Display earlier this month after it acquired a 46.48% stake in the company, equivalent to 1.32 million shares.

In response to reports that it was seeking a board seat at Sharp Display's parent company, Foxconn reportedly said that "the company's focus in cooperating with Sharp is to help complement each's weakness to allow each side to achieve maximum benefits.

"The company did say "a board seat is not really the main focus of Foxconn," however, adding that it's "hoping to have more substantial influence to help Sharp improve its management and sales and raise the panel maker's

profitability." Sharp Display currently supplies display panels used in Apple's latest iPad, and it is rumored to be building TV panels for Apple's rumored HDTV, which is expected to launch early next year.— *Internet*

Facebook acquires mobile app maker Acrylic

VANCOUVER, 22 July — The engineer behind Canadian startup Acrylic said on Friday that he was closing up his one-man shop and joining the design team at leading social network Facebook. Facebook confirmed that it has bought Acrylic in an "acqui-hire" that brings on board founder Dustin MacDonald, the creator of mobile gadget applications for newsfeeds and digital wallets.

"Facebook is an invaluable service that we all use daily, and a company I believe is one of the most innovative and important around today," MacDonald said in a blog post announcing his move to California. "After visiting late last year, I discovered that we shared many of the same core product design goals and principles, and it soon became obvious that it was a natural fit."

Acrylic's best-known applications — Wallet and Newsfeed — were not acquired by Facebook in the deal. Buying promising startups for the talent and not its products has become common in the competitive Internet technology world. Facebook recently bought startups Spool and TagTile in "talent acquisitions" aimed at helping it stay in synch with users as they shift increasingly to using smartphones and tablet computers.

Leaders say climate is changing Native way of life

WASHINGTON, 22 July— Native American and Alaska Native leaders told of their villages being under water because of coastal erosion, droughts and more on Thursday during a Senate hearing intended to draw attention to how climate change is affecting tribal communities.

The environmental changes being seen in native communities are "a serious and growing issue and Congress needs to address them," Tex Hall, chairman of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation of New Town, ND, said on Wednesday.

Mike Williams, chief of

the Yupit Nation in Akiak, Alaska, said in the informational Senate Indian Affairs Committee hearing, that villages are literally being wiped out by coastal erosion. Williams said he can cast a net and catch salmon at his childhood home because the home is under water, he said. He also described how the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, in which he participates, has been moved because of lack of snowfall and that dogs must run at night to stay cool.

"We've always lived off the land and off the waters and continue to do that. But we're bearing the burden of

living with these conditions today," Williams said. Sen. Daniel Akaka, committee chairman, acknowledged that environmental changes are widespread, but the Hawaii Democrat said native communities are disproportionately impacted because they depend on nature for traditional food, sacred sites, and for cultural ceremonies. Several tribes already are coming up with plans to adapt to the changes and federal agencies are assisting with resources, Akaka said.

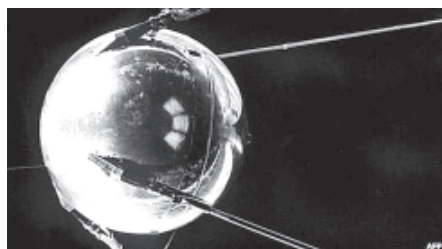
Members of several West Coast tribes and Alaska communities have been in

Washington this week for a symposium at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of the American Indian on the impact of climate change on indigenous people and their communities.

The symposium, titled First Steward, brought together tribal leaders, people experiencing the changes and scientists. Williams said Congress needs to come up with a strategic plan to address the impact to help ensure Alaska Natives and American Indian tribes continue to exist.

He said in coming up with the plan, Congress should consider Native practices and traditional knowledge.— *Internet*

RAF leader sought evidence of Highland Sputnik crash

LONDON, 21 July — A former RAF Kinloss Mountain Rescue Team leader has told how he sought evidence that a Russian satellite crashed in the Highlands 50 years ago. David "Heavy" Whalley was intrigued by a story from the 1960s that a shepherd found the remains of a Sputnik on a moor above Ardgay in Sutherland. An RAF Kinloss Mountain Rescue Team member sent to the scene later told Mr Whalley of finding unusual debris. Team members involved were allegedly told to "keep quiet" about it.

After becoming Kinloss's rescue team leader in the late 1980s, Mr Whalley tried to find a record of the search in the team's logs. He believes the information was deliberately suppressed. Sputniks were a series of satellites built and launched by the former Soviet Union. The first was launched in 1957 and was the first man-made satellite to orbit the Earth. The achievement has been widely credited with starting the space race between Russia and the US. In 1962, a shepherd reported finding wreckage from a Sputnik in the hills above Ardgay.

The late Jack Baines, an experienced climber who later became an RAF Kinloss MRT leader, was among military searchers sent to investigate. For the first time, Mr Whalley has revealed publicly that he looked for records of what they recovered. He said: "They found various bits and pieces. "They included a part with Russian and pictures on it explaining what to do if the satellite was found crashed, and that a reward would be given for its return.

"Jack said the team were told to keep quiet about what they found. "When he told me the story I first thought it was an urban myth, but he convinced me and I believe they definitely found a crashed Sputnik." Mr Whalley added: "There is no incident report, or mention in the team archives, as I checked when I became the team leader in the late 80s." The story of the crash is recalled in a section of Frank Card's 1993 book *Whensoever*, which marked 50 years of RAF mountain rescue.

Vietnamese soldiers held over deaths of rare monkeys

HANOI, 22 July — Vietnamese authorities have detained three soldiers suspected of torturing and killing two rare monkeys, state-run *Voice of Vietnam* newspaper reports. One of the men had posted photos on Facebook showing how the monkeys were killed, triggering a public outcry. The monkeys were endangered grey-shanked douc langurs (*Pygathrix cinerea*), reports say. The soldiers, stationed in Vietnam's Central Highlands area, are now under investigation.

One of them, Nguyen Van Quang, who is serving in the Tay Nguyen Command of the Vietnamese army, posted photos of the monkeys on his Facebook page last week. The photos showed one of the monkeys, believed to be pregnant, being made to smoke a cigarette before it was tortured and killed. Col Nguyen Van Hai, head of Tay Nguyen Command's

Military Prosecutor's Office, told the *Voice of Vietnam* that the soldiers had been detained and were being questioned.

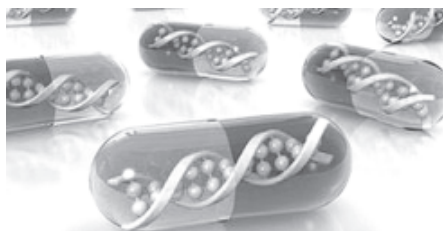
"We're still continuing our investigation into the case. When we have enough evidence, they [the soldiers] will be dealt with in accordance with Vietnamese military laws," he said. He added that the three had admitted killing the monkeys and said they had bought them from locals. The men, who were identified on Thursday, are set to appear in a military court on an as yet unspecified date.

What is more worrying about the incident is that the young soldier who posted the photos on Facebook did not think he did anything wrong, says Nga Pham from BBC Vietnamese.

Authorities now realise that they need to do something to educate people, especially the young, about animal welfare and protection, she adds.— *Internet*

Gene therapy nears approval in Europe

LONDON, 22 July — Europe is on the cusp of approving a gene therapy for the first time, in what would be a landmark moment for the field. Gene therapies alter a patient's DNA to treat inherited diseases passed from parent to child. The European Medicines Agency has recommended a therapy for a rare genetic disease which leaves people unable to properly digest fats. The European Commission will

now make the final decision. The idea of gene therapy is simple: if there is a problem with part of a patient's genetic code then replace that part of the code. The reality has not been so easy. In one gene therapy trial a US teenager, Jesse Gelsinger, died, and other patients have developed leukaemia. There are no gene therapies available outside of a research lab in Europe or the US. The European

Medicines Agency's Committee for Medicinal Products for Human Use has considered the use of Glybera to treat lipoprotein lipase deficiency. One in a million people have the deficiency. They have damaged copies of a gene which is essential for breaking down fat. It leads to fat building up in the blood, abdominal pain and life-threatening pancreatitis (inflammation of the pancreas). The only way to manage the condition is by having a very low-fat diet. The therapy uses a virus to infect muscle cells with a working copy of the gene. It was recommended for patients with severe pancreatitis, who cannot control the disease through diet.

The manufacturer, UniQure, said the decision was a "major breakthrough" for patients and medicine as a whole. UniQure chief

executive officer Jorn Aldag said: "Patients with lipoprotein lipase deficiency are afraid of eating a normal meal because it can lead to acute and extremely painful inflammation of the pancreas, often resulting in a visit to intensive care." Now, for the first time, a treatment exists for these patients that not only reduces this risk of getting severely sick, but also has a multi-year beneficial effect after just a single injection.

"Restoring the body's natural ability to break down fat particles in the blood, in order to prevent pancreatitis and excruciating abdominal pain suffered by patients, is what gene therapy is all about: curing disease at the genetic level." Dr Tomas Salmonson, from the agency's Committee, said the use of Glybera should be restricted to patients "with greatest need".

GE second quarter profit tops Wall Street view

WASHINGTON, 22 July — General Electric Co on Friday reported a 2.5 percent rise in profit from continuing operations, topping Wall Street expectations, as solid demand in the United States and emerging markets offset weakness in Europe. The largest US conglomerate by revenue stuck with its forecast for the rest of 2012, saying it would increase earnings at a double-digit percentage rate by pushing profit margins higher. In a move intended in part to cut costs, GE said it will break up its big energy division into three separate units. "The environment continues to be challenging," Chief Executive Jeff Immelt said on a conference call with investors. He said the US economy was stable, adding that "Europe remains very tough, but within our expectations." GE's industrial sales in Europe were down 7 percent in the quarter, but up 6 percent in the United States and 24 percent higher in China, said Chief Financial Officer Keith Sherin. Overall revenue rose 2.5 percent, but missed expectations.

The company, the world's biggest maker of electric turbines and jet engines, posted profit of 38 cents per share, excluding one-time items, a penny above analysts' average estimate, according to Thomson Reuters I/B/E/S. It excludes 5 cents in charges from its former US subprime mortgage unit and Japanese consumer finance business. GE's report followed two days of stronger-than-expected earnings from other industrial companies, including Tectron Inc and Honeywell International Inc, indicating multinational companies were finding a way to manage through a rough economy.— Reuters

Rural Chinese get online as mobile overtakes desktop

LONDON, 22 July — Mobile phones are now the most common way for people to connect to the Internet in China, a report has said. For the first time, desktop computers are no longer the leading method for the country's 538 million connected citizens to get online. The report from the China Internet Network Information Center (CINIC) said over 50% of the year's new internet users were from rural areas. A fall in smartphone costs has been the key cause of growth, experts said.

"Mobile phones are a cheaper and more convenient way to access the internet for [residents in] China's vast rural areas and for the enormous migrant population," said the report from the state-linked CINIC. Mobile internet users now number 388 million, up almost 10% since the start of the year.

"Mobile phone prices continued to drop," the report said. "The emergence of smartphones under 1,000 yuan [\$157, £100] sharply lowered the threshold for using the devices and encouraged average mobile phone users to become mobile web surfers."

The total number of those online has risen 5% since the

end of last year, many of whom are very active in cyberspace.

Bill Dutton, professor of Internet studies at the University of Oxford, told the BBC that the trend followed similar growth in other parts of the world. "We're moving to what we call next-generation users," he said.

"They're likely to have three or four devices in their homes, therefore they're able to integrate computing into their lives wherever they are." He added that the rapid adoption of mobile among the rural community was one of necessity over desire. "There's a wave of people coming online that would not otherwise be able to afford to be there."—Internet

People feel 'healthier' on the English coast

LONDON, 22 July — People living on the English coast are more likely than those living inland to say they are fit and well, an analysis of census data suggests. The researchers said living in areas such as Skegness, St Ives or Scarborough was linked to a "small, but significant" improvement in health.

Lower stress and more opportunities to exercise were suggested as possible explanations. The findings were published in the journal *Health and Place*.

The researchers looked at data from 48 million people in England from the 2001 census. They compared how close people were to the bracing sea air and their answer to a question about

their own health. The study was conducted by the European Centre for Environment and Human Health at the Peninsula College of Medicine and Dentistry at the University of Exeter. It found people living less than 1km from the sea were more likely to say they

were in "good health" than people living further away.

The effect was small but the researchers said that when magnified across 48 million people it could have a large impact on public health. The lead researcher Dr Ben Wheeler said loads of explanations had been

suggested, although they had not yet been tested. "One of the most obvious is the opportunity for physical activity or being more motivated to go for a walk along the coast," he said. There are also ideas about 'being beside the seaside' being a more relaxing environment.

However, there is another explanation. Wealthier and healthier people might be more able to move to the coast. "They are possibly moving to the coast and bringing their good health with them," Dr Wheeler told the BBC. The study also found that people from the poorest backgrounds benefited most from a coastal home. There was little or no benefit to the most affluent people.

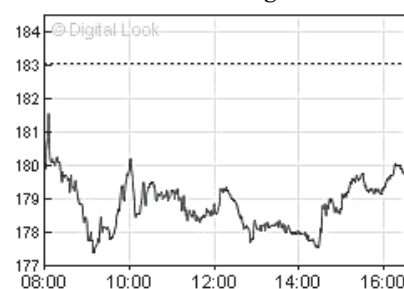

Vodafone sees revenue growth slow



LONDON, 22 July — Vodafone has seen its sales growth slow in the first quarter, dragged down by a weak performance in Europe. Group service revenue grew 0.6% on an organic basis to £9.98bn. In the fourth quarter it had recorded growth of 2.3%. Sales in Italy and Spain shrank, as conditions remained "challenging". UK growth was weak due to "increased competition and a weak economy". Vodafone outperformed its peers over the previous year, paying a record dividend to shareholders. Shares in the mobile operator closed down 2% on Friday trading in London. Vodafone's strength in emerging markets, Germany, Turkey and—until recently—the UK has helped offset a slump in southern Europe. But in recent months the downturn on the Continent has begun to take its toll.

In May, the company wrote down the value of its assets in Italy, Spain, Portugal and Greece by £4bn. Vodafone, the world's largest mobile operator by revenue, provides its growth figures on a reported basis and on an organic basis. Organic revenue growth reflects performance on a comparable basis, by stripping out the effects of mergers and acquisitions and of movements in foreign exchange rates.— Internet

Chinese navy escort ships complete first joint escort operation

GULF OF ADEN, 22 July—The Chinese navy's 11th and 12th escort groups accomplished their first joint escort operation here on Friday.

The groups escorted six merchant ships from China, Singapore, Norway, South Korea and Portugal.

The two fleets held a

handover ceremony on the destroyer "Qingdao" before the joint escort operation. The farewell ceremony of the 11th group will be held on 23 July. Then the flotilla will leave the Gulf of Aden and Somali waters and embark on a goodwill visit.

The 11th group has

escorted 184 ships in 43 operations since it started the mission on 27 Feb. A total of 126 pirate vessels in 58 incidents were successfully driven away by the fleet.

To date, the Chinese navy fleets have escorted 4,727 ships from countries all over the world.—Xinhua

Pentagon eyes drones for Kenya to fight militants nearby

WASHINGTON, 22 July—The Pentagon is seeking to send hand-launched drones to Kenya as part of a \$40 million-plus military aid package designed to help four African countries fight al-Qaeda and al-Shabaab militants, notably in Somalia, the *Wall Street Journal* reported. Kenya would get eight "Raven" unmanned aerial systems—an unarmed drone that can be used to identify targets for strikes by ground forces or other aircraft.

"This assistance will improve the tactical effectiveness and operational reach of the Kenyan National Defence Forces engaged in CT (counter-terrorism) operations against al-Shabaab in Somalia," the newspaper quoted a Pentagon document as saying.

The Ravens for Kenya would be part of an initial \$41.4 million package that also would include trucks, communications gear and rifles for Burundi, Djibouti and Uganda,

the newspaper said. The United States provided Ravens to Uganda last year, it added, citing officials and documents. The Defence Department and the State Department had no immediate comment. US government-to-government arms transfers are presided over by the State Department, subject to an often-lengthy congressional review process.

The newspaper cited officials as saying the military aid package would be meant to help key African allies in the region go after al-Sabaab and other al-Qaeda supporters.

The Raven is built by Monrovia, California-headquartered Aero Vironment Inc Weighing 4.2 pounds (1.9 kilograms) and with a wingspan of 4.5 feet (1.37 metres), it is described as capable of sending real-time color or infrared imagery to ground controllers and to remote viewers day or night.

LONDON, 22 July — Fauja Singh, the world's oldest marathon runner at 101, will be running the Olympic torch through the streets of east London later on Saturday.

Singh, who carried the torch in Athens eight years ago, was born in Punjab in 1911 and has been stayed in UK since 1992.

He ran his first marathon at the age of 89 and has since completed six London marathons.

Putin signs Russia's WTO accession protocol

MOSCOW, 22 July — Russian President Vladimir Putin has signed into law a protocol ratifying the country's accession to the World Trade Organization (WTO), the Kremlin announced here on Saturday.

The bill was approved by the State Duma, or the lower house of the parliament, on 10

June and passed by the upper house on 18 July ahead of its summer break, according to a statement issued by the President's Office.

In light of the Russian law, the country will officially become a member of the WTO 30 days after the parliament's approval and the president's ratification.

In December 2011, the WTO decided to grant Russia its membership, thus ushering in the last major economy outside the global trade club.

The WTO accession has triggered heated debates in Russia, though the country has been seeking it for more than 18 years.

Those against it claim that the move would negatively impact domestic economy, and even undermine national sovereignty and security. After the WTO accession, Russia will have to gradually lower its average tariff ceiling to 7.8 percent from the current 10 percent, with the agricultural tariff down from 13.2 percent to 10.8 percent. Tariff for industrial products will also be reduced from 9.5 percent to 7.3 percent.—Xinhua

Three students selected to attend 2012 APEC summit

BEIJING, 22 July — Three university students have been selected to attend the 2012 Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) summit in Vladivostok, Russia, in September on behalf of all of the country's university

students.

The three representatives were chosen from nearly 10,000 contestants after several rounds of competition, which were conducted through mock summits held in key universities across the

country.

The competition was started in 2010 to broaden students' international knowledge and improve their understanding and analytical abilities regarding politics and economics.—Xinhua

EU to continue joining peace effort in S Philippines

MANILA, 22 July — The European Union (EU) will continue to participate in the Malaysian-led International Monitoring Team (IMT) in conflict-stricken areas in southern Philippines after its term expired last month, the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) disclosed on Saturday.

MILF said that the decision to continue EU's role in the IMT was made late last month by the European Commission. "The decision also outlined a new programme of support for the peace-making in Mindanao by the EU," the MILF said.

Muhammad Ameen, head of the MILF Secretariat, welcomed EU's move, saying it was a positive development that would give inspirations to the parties to strive further

to resolve the Moro Question and the armed conflict in Mindanao.

"This is an indication of the EU strong commitment to provide support to the GPH (Government of the Philippines)-MILF peace negotiation," he stressed. IMT, composed of representatives from Malaysia, EU, Brunei, Indonesia, Norway and Japan, has been overseeing the ceasefire agreement between the government troops and the MILF and the development aspects in the conflict-affected areas.

The GPH and the MILF have been engaged in a peace process with the goal of forging a final peace pact to end the decades-old conflict in Mindanao.

HELLO TOURISM

Tourism has come to our Land of a million pagodas and smiling peoples. It is indeed a hearty welcome for the global tourists who have now chosen this beautiful haven to enjoy the still virgin landscape, the magnificent pagodas and temples of a thousand years of heritage, the yet unexplored nooks and corners, swaying coconut trees, silver sands, and unspoiled clear seas. The time has never been more opportune. A constellation of factors and events have converged to affect a glorious boom: the multi-party election resulting in the opening of democracy and civil society, resurged interest of the Western hemisphere towards the country overlooked through passage of decades, and not yet ready for the hospitality services.

The spate of catastrophic disasters in the years 2008 onwards had caused havoc for the regular tourist-friendly host nations of Japan, Thailand, Chinese Taipei in South East Asia such as severe storms, floods, earthquakes and attending *tsunami* deadly deluges, at one time or the other. Even in Myanmar the deltaic fertile flatland once the granary of Asia, was utterly devastated by Nargis following Aceh, as hundreds of thousands of lives perished, uncountable thatched huts demolished, mangroves and paddy fields wasted. Continuing calamities followed off and on as a result of turbulence caused by man compounding nature's miseries in the wake. Only now the situation had somewhat calmed due to the efforts of the State and the sympathetic public, NGOs and many generous donors who came to the rescue of the afflicted, out of sublime compassion.

There is also a welcome climate of change visible in the overall landscape and socio-economic spectrum. This is the morn of Democracy, openness pervading in the overall environment, and the voice of the people, from the electorate and constituency to representation for the people becoming more articulate. The dawn of the New Year 2012 augurs spreading the red carpet to the distinguished statesmen, celebrities and friends from the West, followed in its heels in rapid progression by the people with warming of relations amity and trade. There is also an active interchange as we also reach out beyond to the ASEAN, the ASPAC and the wide wide world. Never has our aspiration been so brimming as we look forward with pride and dignity to the years ahead.

Global tourists who used to plan yearly summer tours months ahead with regularity, were now faced with disrupted tour plans never before experienced, with their jaunts almost totally wiped out. Thereupon, as an alternative they swarmed to Myanmar to explore the land quite adjacent but seldom frequented. Only now in just two years the tourist industry and its complementarities started to gain momentum. Hotel bookings rose to cater to unprecedented demands as tourists from UK, EU, the America, Australia and New Zealand, as well as traditionalists from our Asian neighbours thronged in frenzy to make the most of the time available in the tail-end of the holiday season. As with the economics of demand and supply, rentals rose erratically as the hoteliers lolled on windfall gains with near-full

occupancy. Shortage of hotels, and rooms in hotels were never more critically felt and tariffs skyrocketed, as scruples got the better of reason and conscience and the souvenir items intrinsic to the host country in a wide array such as paintings, exquisite tapestry, elaborate lacquer wares, sculpture, figurines crafted in genuine precious and semi precious jewels plain or inlaid with gold and silver, right down to small figurines made of teak and a variety of hardwoods enjoy brisk sales too. Clothing and apparel woven in silk with elaborate designs descending from the ancient heritage of Myanmar kings are also displayed for the nouveau riche with the sky as the limit.

The first magnificent sight for the incoming tourist by air is the majestic Shwedagon Pagoda, epitome of pristine perfection, a 326 feet glittering golden stupa inlaid with thousands of priceless gems of heritage value of the ancient kingdoms, now 2600 years old this March 2012. Then there is the ancient city of Bagan of more than a thousand-year standing with over 2000 relic pagodas, stupas, temples, caves and ancient library of Buddhist canonical scriptures. Then there is the Shit-thaung Pagoda complex of Rakhine maritime nation on the west coast of the Bay of Bengal enjoying prosperity around the same millennium. For millions of Buddhists around the religious world and particularly for the devotees and disciples of 5 Theravada Buddhism: *Sri Lanka, Myanmar, Thailand, Laos and Cambodia*, they are the sacred repositories of the enduring faith. Intrinsically also they are the marvels of art, culture and architecture of bygone centuries, for many to wonder at the state of preservation witnessed today in spite of iconoclastic vandalism, and wanton destruction, over and above the vagaries of tropical weather of the centuries. What remains are indeed treasure troves which the tourists will eagerly scout with zest and enthusiasm.

The British had been here since 1824 in three waves culminating with total occupation in 1886. Foreign Christian missionaries of various denominations made early incursions followed by war, and then by trade. Colonies were the source of raw materials, cheap exploited labour and market for finished goods for the colonial industrial power. Mercantilism, Laissez-faire economics and monopoly capitalism were the order of the times till 1939 the outbreak of the Second World War, when the British Government made hasty mass retreat by motor road along Mahamyang forest from Tamu border to India.

Colonial architecture, representative of massive colonnaded commercial buildings lined the Strand Road with the Strand Hotel as the flag bearer of the British Raj in Myanmar. Viewed from vantage point in 2012 the faded buildings along Strand Road, the Secretariat, coupled with Christian cathedrals and churches with lingering old grace, have become history, which had stood witness to a bygone era of heritage value and themes for research and study for scholars, historians and tourists.

A scintillating panorama opens up to the tourist on his first visit in a number of ways: the sights he sees, the air he breathes, the water he drinks, the earth he treads, the esoteric

food he tastes. *The Sacred Shwedagon* is unique, comparable to none, in its breath-taking aura, pomp and pageantry. Then there are many others too for sheer beauty in their own beautiful renditions. You may climb *the Golden Rock Pagoda*, perched precariously on the tip of a boulder, defying gravity. For curiosity if not for anything else you can push the Golden Rock and be amazed that it rocks. There are two famous lakes, the Inle in the Southern Shan State and the Inn-Daw-Gyi in the Kachin State in Northern Myanmar where "*Mount Khakhaborazi*" with snow capped peak amidst virgin surroundings will captivate you ravishingly. There are so many to explore that the author leaves you to your imagination tailored to your own itinerary.

There are also national and ethnic food to savour at will. Being ethnically linked since the beginning of migration to the main Mongolian races, the foods are natively similar with distinct flavor, aroma and mixture of spices, sweets, and condiments to accentuate the national credo. Here the sojourn of a tourist will not be complete without the two Myanmar national snacks: *mohingar, and lephet*. Being rice-eaters, rice in all its varieties *japonica and indica* are consumed as the staple food. And almost all snacks, delicacies and finger foods are mostly rice-based. Preparation of curry and snacks vary with its regional or ethnic preferences. Hinthada Mohingar, Mandalay law win (Royal) Nangyi Monti, Shan khaukswe and Tofoo, Rakhine Monti salad, Bhamo Myee Shay and *Anyar* crisp fried flour parata with boiled mash peas etc are most eagerly sought. Then there is a variety of fried fritters with succulent fresh gourd leading the finger food treat with potatoes a distant second. And there are also fruits of many varieties to the bargain. While we Asians indolently consume delicious oranges, bananas, mangoes, exotic pungent durians and tropical varieties, we tend to crave for apples luxurious and high priced. Little will our common folks imagine that what we take as ordinary is indeed treasured as exotic as is the other way round *mutatis mutandis* indeed.

All these preconditions positively point out to rosy days ahead for boom of long term tourism. Tourism here, in spite of a certain head-start 20 years ago seemed to be not as it should have been so. Much will still need to be done in terms of infrastructure, investment, recruitment, training in the hospitality industry, and above all the mindset and ambience to make it going. Start from the basics such as clean and fragrant toilets encompassing standard toilet culture and rise in progression to the ladder of efficiency, courtesy and service with a smile, a real one, not a plasticized copy. Both forward and backward linkages, spread effects and backlash will have to be carefully noted. Experiences will have to be nurtured and outsourcing worked out. Setting high vision for the future with open environment, transparency and allure of tourists, Myanmar may yet set its place as one of the rising attractions in the global map of tourism.

Violence has been on the rise since Taliban launched an annual spring offensive on 3 May. A total of 247 foreign soldiers have been killed in Afghanistan so far in 2012.—Xinhua

9 killed in suicide bomb attack in NW Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, 22 July—At least nine people including five children were killed and 15 others were injured when a suicide bomb hit a militant headquarters in Pakistan's northwest tribal area of Kurram Agency on Saturday afternoon, local media reported.

Earlier reports said that the attack was launched in Kurram Agency's neighbouring area of Hangu.

In a report, local state-run TV channel PTV said that the incident took place at about 1:00 pm (local time)

when a suicide bomber rammed his explosive-laden vehicle into the wall of a house used as headquarters of a Molana Nabi Hanfi-led militant group in Speen Tall area of Kurram Agency, a restive semi-autonomous tribal area at Pakistan-Afghanistan border.

The suicide blast killed nine people including four militants and five kids who were passing by the blast site after attending their school.

Outer wall of the militants' headquarters was completely

destroyed and four nearby houses were also damaged in the blast.

No group claimed responsibility for the blast.

The attack seems to be an outcome of internal conflict between two militant groups lead by Molana Hafiz Ziaur Rehman and Molana Nabi Hanfi.

Both groups have been at odds with each other for the last two years and they are often involved in killing and kidnapping of rival fighters in Kurram Agency. Xinhua

Bodyguard of Shiite VP shot dead in Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 22 July—A bodyguard of Iraqi Shiite vice president was shot dead on Saturday in an attack in central Baghdad, an Interior Ministry source said.

Unidentified armed men gunned down a bodyguard of Vice President Khudair al-Khuzai in Baghdad's central district of Karrada, the source told Xinhua on condition of anonymity.

Khuzai himself was not at the scene when the attack occurred around midday, the source said.

Violence and sporadic high-profile bomb attacks still common in Iraqi cities despite the dramatic decrease in violence since its peak in 2006 and 2007 when the country was engulfed in sectarian killings.—Xinhua

Moderate quake hits Hokkaido, Japan region

TOKYO, 22 July—An earthquake measuring 5.1 on the Richter scale jolted Hokkaido, Japan region at 0441 GMT on Sunday, the US Geological Survey said.

The epicenter, with a depth of 57.70 km, was initially determined to be at 42.51 13 degrees north latitude and 142.9201 degrees east longitude.

One missing, two injured in helicopter crash in SW China

KUNMING, 22 July—One person was missing and two others injured after a helicopter crashed into a reservoir in the city of Chuxiong in southwest China's Yunnan Province, local authorities said on Sunday.

The accident happened

at around 5:45 pm on Saturday at the Qingshanzui reservoir, local authorities said.

Three people were on board when the helicopter crashed, two of them having been rescued and sent to hospital for treatment. They are currently not in critical

conditions, according to local authorities.

Initial investigation showed the helicopter belonged to the Yunnan General Aviation Co, Ltd Rescuers are searching for the missing person. Probes to the cause of the accident are underway.—Xinhua

16 killed, 27 injured in bus collision in South Africa

JOHANN RESBURG, 22 July—A running bus collided with the other one in the southern South Africa on Saturday, leaving at least sixteen people dead and 27 hurt, local news agency reported.

The accident occurred on the route R61 in the southern province of the Eastern Cape, the South African Press Association (SAPA) reported.

One of the two buses was carrying schoolchildren to an event as it collided with the other one with passengers, said the SAPA.

Among the injured, four are in a critical condition, according to the SAPA.

Police are investigating the fatal incident.

Italy shipwreck hearing postponed to 15 October

GROSSETO, 22 July—Experts investigating the Costa Concordia shipwreck, which killed as many as 32 people, need more time to gather evidence and will present their findings at a pre-trial hearing on 15 October, lawyers said on Saturday.

The panel of experts investigating the January 13 cruise line disaster off the Italian coast are expected to complete their work by September.

Saturday's pre-trial hearing, which considers evidence ahead of a full trial, was postponed after the

experts asked for more time to answer some 50 requests from information by the prosecutors, lawyers said. It was the second hearing since the procedure opened on 3 March. “It was a simple technical delay,” said Bruno Leporatti, a lawyer representing the ship's captain Francesco Schettino, who is accused of causing the accident and who faces charges including multiple manslaughter.

Leporatti said the investigators had not been able to gather all the evidence “given the complexity of the questions”.

The huge Costa Concordia, with some 4,200 passengers and crew aboard, ran aground and half capsized after a rock tore a hole in its hull when it approached the tiny Tuscan island of Giglio during a

cruise of the western Mediterranean.

At least 30 people died during a chaotic nighttime evacuation of the 114,500-tonne ship, and another two bodies have still not been recovered.—Reuters

13 killed in road mishap in northern India

NEW DELHI, 22 July—In a tragic incident, 13 people, including 11 women, were killed when a speeding truck mowed them down while they were sleeping on the roadside slums and pavement in the northern Indian state of Uttar Pradesh late Saturday night, a senior police official said on Sunday.

“The mishap happened in the state's Etawah district. Some 17 people were sleeping when 13 of them were run over by the truck after its driver lost control of the vehicle. All the victims died on the spot while others who sustained injuries have been rushed to a local hospital,” he said, on condition of anonymity.

The driver of the truck has managed to flee but efforts are on to nab him, the official said, adding that a probe has been ordered into the incident.

A large number of homeless people sleep on pavements in cities and towns across the country, often becoming victims of road mishaps.

Lawmakers in Japan outline denuclearization bill

TOKYO, 22 July—Former Japanese prime minister Naoto Kan and other governing party lawmakers have announced an outline of a bill that would end Japan's reliance on nuclear energy by 2025.

The draft outline says nuclear power generation could lead to infinite damages in the event of an accident. It adds that lack of final disposal measures will end up leaving

future generations piles of radioactive waste.

It calls for establishing alternative power sources and reducing the number of operating nuclear power plants to zero.

The draft also calls for promotion of solar, wind, and other sources of renewable energy to cut carbon dioxide emissions.

The outline also mandates the central

government to create jobs in communities that host nuclear plants.

The secretary general of the governing Democratic Party, Azuma Koshiishi, has been asking Kan to compile a plan on future energy sources.

The former prime minister said he intends to seek support within his party and that he wants to submit the bill with support from the opposition.—NHK

China to seek "early, proper" solution with Russia on detained Chinese ships

BEIJING, 22 July—China here on Saturday voiced the will to maintain close contacts with Russia for an early and proper solution of the dispute on the detained Chinese fishing ships, which left a fisherman missing.

Such events are "sudden and individual" cases, and China hopes the two sides can solve them while bearing China-Russia friendship in mind, said Foreign Ministry spokesman Hong Lei when commenting on a relevant question. According to the Chinese Consulate in Vladivostok, Russia's Far-East region, two Chinese fishing ships from China's eastern Shandong province were recently seized by the Russian side respectively.

Media reports said that a Russian coast guard vessel fired shots to one of the two Chinese fishing ships that had been fishing in Russia's exclusive economic zone. A Chinese fisherman went missing after the boat he was aboard collided with a Russian ship that chased the Chinese one.

China had lodged

representation over Russia's improper actions, Hong said.

"China hopes peoples of the two countries can view the event in an objective and calm way," he said. China, Hong said, is working on the consultation with Russia to set up an emergency response and cooperation mechanism, so as to prevent similar events from reoccurring and avoid such incidents to affect the overall situation of bilateral ties.—Xinhua

Boy attacked by hyenas receiving treatment

WAJIR, 22 July—A 10-year-old Kenyan boy left with several long scars on his face from an attack by hyenas has been flown to Nairobi for treatment, officials said.

The pack of hyenas attacked Musa Jelle on 10 June as he and his family slept in their home in the northern Kenya town of Wajir, the BBC reported.

The attack left two children in the family dead and 10 other people injured. The Kenya Wildlife Service, which manages the country's game parks and wildlife, is covering Musa's medical expenses and paying compensation of about \$230 to his family.

KWS has killed the hyenas involved in the attack.

The BBC noted wild animals are a major tourist attraction in Kenya but confrontations with humans have increased recently.

KWS is trying to stop the killing of wildlife in local communities.

At least 18 killed in bus accident in India

NEW DELHI, 22 July—A bus plunged into a gorge after landslides in India's northeastern state of Mizoram, killing at least 18 people and injuring dozens, a police official said on Sunday.

The accident took place on Saturday near Keifang village, close to the border with Myanmar and more than 100 km (60 miles) from the state capital Aizawl, the official, L.R. Sailo, said.

"Seventeen people died on the spot and a 10-year boy died in the hospital," Sailo said by telephone from Aizawl.

Mitsubishi to use EVs as emergency batteries

TOKYO, 22 July—Mitsubishi Motors has introduced a system to use electric vehicles as an emergency power source in the event of outages at its headquarters in Tokyo.

Mitsubishi experienced power cuts following last year's earthquake and tsunami that hit northeast Japan. The auto company's headquarters building has been refurbished so that electric vehicles can be connected by cable to switch boxes.

The company says that in the event of a power outage, stored electricity will be used to feed power to communications equipment and a teleconference system at a disaster response task force. The company says the system will allow it to confirm safety of employees and give instructions to production sites across Japan.

Mitsubishi says it will make the stored electricity available for workers stranded at the company by traffic disruptions. It plans to connect 4 electric vehicles to the building, which it says can provide enough electricity to maintain the system for 3 days.

Another Japanese auto firm, Nissan, started preparations to use electric cars as emergency power sources at its dealerships nationwide this month. More Japanese companies are expected to follow suit.—NHK

Rescued Taiwan fishing vessel crew members arrived in Tanzania

DAR ES SALAAM, 22 July—The 26 rescued Taiwan fishing vessel XuFu 1 crew members, transferred by a Chinese navy warship, arrived in Dar es Salaam, the capital of Tanzania on Saturday morning.

All crew members looked well and were transported immediately to hotel for medical examines by a Chinese medical team waiting there.

They were crew members also received medical and psychological examines when

they were on the Chinese navy warship for three days after freed by Somali pirates.

An official with China's Ministry of Foreign affairs said the Chinese navy warship sent a helicopter to airlift the crew members to the warship after they were freed, due to the difficulties caused by strong wind and seawave at the rescuing spot. Chinese ambassador to Tanzania Lv Youqing expressed his gratitude to the Tanzania government for its help during the transferring and Customs

clearance process.

The Vietnamese crew members were received by officials with Vietnam embassy to Tanzania after arriving at the port. The Chinese crew members were expected to fly back home on Monday.

XuFu 1, with 13 crew members from the Chinese mainland, one from Taiwan and 12 from Vietnam, was hijacked by Somali pirates in December 2010 off the Madagascar coast and taken to Somalia.—Internet

Boat escapes wave caused by crumbling iceberg

TOKYO, 22 July—A small sightseeing boat narrowly escaped a large wave created by a piece of crumbling iceberg in the Arctic. The boat carrying a tourist was approaching a gigantic iceberg off the coast of western Greenland on Thursday when the wave was created.

A video taken by a crewmember shows the iceberg creaking and cracking and a massive wave closing in on the boat. The boat barely stayed ahead of the wave as its captain steered it at full speed.

China, Russia to test Cuban diabetes drug

HAVANA, 22 July—Cuba is set to begin advanced stage-three tests in China and Russia of a new biotech drug designed to prevent diabetes-related foot amputations, the official daily *Granma* reported on Thursday.

According to the officials, the tests of Heberprot-P, which has already proven effective in healing diabetic foot ulcers, would begin sometime this year.

Along with China and Russia, the phase-three trials are also slated for 100

hospitals throughout the European Union, marking the first time that Cuban scientists undertake advanced trials in developed countries, said Dr. Luis Herrera, director of Havana's Center for Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology.

Herrera said the trials represent the first large-scale testing of a drug designed to treat diabetic foot ulcers.

"That decision is an evidence of the level of the acceptance and effectiveness of the product, which has prevented the amputation of

lower limbs in thousands of diabetic patients," Herrera said.

More than 70,000 patients from different nations have been treated so far with Heberprot-P, which is meant to complement, not replace, conventional therapies.

Cuba's biotech industry was founded in 1979 by Cuban revolutionary leader Fidel Castro, who saw science and technology as important engines of economic and social development.

UN body praises Bolivia's stable economy amid global crisis

LA PAZ, 22 July—The UN Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) on Thursday praised Bolivia's economic stability and resilience amid the global financial crisis.

Speaking at a banking forum held by Bolivia's Central Bank here, Juan Alberto Fuentes, director of the ECLAC's Economic

Development Division, said Bolivia's macroeconomic indicators proved to be solid.

"The sustainability of Bolivia's public finances makes it less vulnerable to the global crisis," said Fuentes.

Bolivia successfully weathered the 2008-2009 financial crisis, becoming one of the few Latin American countries that had avoided

negative growth at the time, the ECLAC official noted.

Even today, compared with most Latin American countries, Bolivia has less foreign debt, and a current account and balance of payments surplus that make it less likely to suffer from the global slowdown, said Fuentes.

Besides, Bolivia has substantial foreign currency

reserves and very balanced public finances, he added.

The dynamism of Bolivia's raw material exports, such as gas and minerals, to Argentinean, Brazilian and Asian markets also puts the country in a better position than others in the region whose economies are more dependent on Europe and the United States, said Fuentes.

Bodies of missing Ukrainian climbers found on Mt Ushba

TBILISI, 22 July—Georgian rescuers had found the bodies of the missing Ukrainian climbers on Mount Ushba and were now trying to recover the bodies, according to reports reaching here on Thursday.

The bodies of Sasha Taranik and Dima Volodin were found at an altitude of 3,500 meters above sea level.

"We did our best," said Temur Giorgadze, chief of the Georgian government emergency situation department, "but unfortunately could not save the lives of the Ukrainian climbers." The chief told local media that Georgian rescuers would try to bring down the bodies to the base camp and then to Tbilisi.

The incident occurred when the safety rope on Sasha Taranik and Dima Volodin had snapped broken during descent.

Fog-caused poor visibility problem forced Georgian rescuers to withdraw from their search job on Wednesday, shortly after the rescue was launched.

According to reports

reaching here, Sasha Taranik and Dima Volodin went missing from the Ukrainian mountaineering team, after their safety rope had snapped broken at an altitude of 3,600 meters above sea level. The mountain sits at 4,710 meters above sea level.

The remaining members of the Ukrainian climbing team have joined the Georgian rescuers in the search.

Though not high on the Major Caucasus Mountain Range, Mount Ushba is famous for its difficulty for climbing, especially the southern of its twin summits.

The northern Ushba summit was first surmounted in 1888 by John Garford Cokklyn and Ulrich Almer while the southern summit was first conquered in 1903 by a German-Swiss-Austrian expedition led by Rickmer Rickmers.

The routes leading up to the northern summit are graded as French AD+ (fairly difficult) while the routes leading to the southern summit are graded as French ED (extremely difficult).

Australia's Maritime Union calls for investigation into cancer rates at workplaces

SYDNEY, 22 July—The Maritime Union of Australia is calling on the New South Wales (NSW) Government to investigate cancer rates at all workplaces in the NSW Hunter region, local media reported on Friday.

A study by the University of Newcastle released on Thursday found workers at the Newcastle site were nearly twice as likely to be diagnosed with cancer than the general population of NSW, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) reported.

The study of 859 employees at the Port Waratah Coal Service facility at Kooragang Island over a 23-year period found that 63 employees had been diagnosed with cancer, with the most common being melanoma, prostate and colon cancers. John Attia, professor of Medicine and Clinical Epidemiology from the university said further investigation was recommended as the study did not identify the cause of the high incidence of cancers.

The Maritime Union's Newcastle Branch Secretary Glen Williams said on Friday that the union was concerned about the results at Kooragang. "Our members are concerned for their safety... more work needs to be done in the form of a fully independent inquiry to find out why our members keep getting sick," Williams said in a statement.—Xinhua

enterprises) Board Index, makes up the three core indices reflecting the performance of China's stocks listed on the Shenzhen Stock Exchange.

The ChiNext Board, which started trading on Oct. 30, 2009, mainly lists hi-tech companies and those with high growth potential.

discouraged. Instead, the bomb squad from Bloomington, Minn., was summoned. Officers used a machine to open the trunk and a robot to remove what appeared to be a 3-foot-long bomb weighing 50 to 60 pounds. The bomb was detonated at a quarry. No arrests had been made late Thursday.

Police: Mom left girl in car while in bar

A Florida woman is charged with child neglect for allegedly leaving a young girl in her pickup truck while she went to drink at a bar, authorities said.

Ultimately Lopez, 42, said she decided to leave the show to focus on her family, film and music careers and her fashion business.

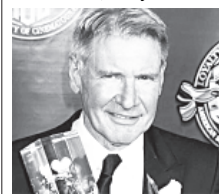

Rodgers went with a mix of experience and youth to open the contest, with veterans including Jose

Enrique and Jamie Carragher joined on the starting side by prospects such as Dani Pacheco and Nathan Eccleston. Toronto manager Paul Mariner fielded close to a first-choice lineup, with the only change in the team that beat the Colorado Rapids on Wednesday coming in goal, where Freddy Hall replaced Milos Kocic.

Mariner's side featured captain Torsten Frings in midfield, although leading scorer Danny Koevermans was absent after suffering a season-ending knee injury in a league fixture last Saturday — the reason for Amarikwa's acquisition. Mariner was pleased with his team's performance, but noted that Liverpool were not at full strength. "You've got to temper your thoughts with where Liverpool are at, the squad that they brought over, but all you can do is your best and I thought we did well under the circumstances," Mariner said. "Let's not get carried away. If Liverpool brings their first squad and they're further on in their pre-season or the season, they're a top-class team with top-class players."

After a first half that featured few scoring opportunities, Rodgers made

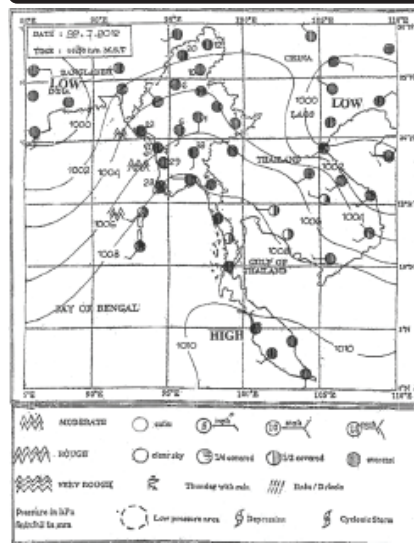

Aston Villa beats MLS' Fire 1-0 in exhibition

BRIDGEVIEW, 22 July — The Chicago Fire received a lesson in soccer from Aston Villa on Saturday night.

Gabriel Agbonlahor scored in the 29th minute and then left with an injury in the second half as the English Premier League club beat the Fire 1-0 in an exhibition match. Villa thoroughly dominated the match nearly until the final whistle.

It wasn't until nearly three minutes into extra time that the Fire launched their one on-target shot of the night. However, backup goalkeeper Brad Guzan, a Chicago-area native, made the save to preserve the shutout.

Agbonlahor went down clutching his left leg after spinning by a defender in the 63rd minute, screaming in pain.

The trainer for Villa gingerly flexed Agbonlahor's leg, which caused more pain, and the forward was carted off. Villa manager Paul Lambert said he thought the

Agbonlahor could be out for two weeks.

Villa came out attacking, and the push paid off with Agbonlahor's goal. He headed the cross of defender Chris Herd past Chicago goalkeeper Jay Nolly from 10 yards out.

Villa continued pushing after with and without the ball, keeping the Fire players on their heels.

Their defensive movement from side to side was particularly impressive.

"Their quickness," Fire defender Dan Gargan said. "They're an organized, compact unit." Villa went 7-14-17 in the Premier League last year, then brought in Lambert to coach. They're 3-0-0 in their preseason, including two wins against MLS squads.

"This was great for us," Lambert said. "I've got nothing but praise for the players, the way they've gone about it. As a group, our defense is very strong, not just the back four."

LYTHAMSTANNES, 22 July — The ball tumbled over the edge of a pot bunker and appeared to put Adam Scott in the worst spot he had been all day at the British Open.

All he saw was opportunity. From the wet sand right of the 17th green, Scott had to clear two more pot bunkers to reach the

green, with the flag only five paces from the edge. Scott was thinking about birdie, not trying to save par, so he confidently told caddie Steve Williams, "I can handle this." The shot came out pure, trickled by the cup and settled a foot away.

Cibulkova charges into WTA Carlsbad final

Carlsbad, 22 July — Second seed Dominika Cibulkova beat the heat to reach the final of the WTA hardcourt tournament, outlasting tiring Russian Nadia Petrova 7-6 (10/8), 6-1. The Slovak "pocket rocket," who stands just 1.61 meters (5 feet, three inches), on Saturday played a big match to impose her game on Petrova, who was attended by the trainer after losing the draining, 63-minute opening set. Bartoli went into their evening semi-final after struggling in her last two matches — both three-setters — and has been dealing with a leg injury.

Cibulkova hasn't been taken to three sets this week, a fitness advantage which she hopes will stand her in good stead in the title match. "I feel really fresh and good."

Kaka 'decides to quit Madrid' – England an option

Manchester United, Chelsea & Manchester City target Kaka ready to leave Real Madrid in summer transfer window

MADRID, 22 July—Brazilian legend Kaka is ready to leave Real Madrid this summer and is open to a move to the Premier League, according to Sao Paulo president Paulo de Jesus Lopes.

The former AC Milan star has often been linked with a move to England during a glittering career,



with Manchester City closest to securing an astonishing £100 million deal back in 2009.

Instead, the 30-year-old attacking midfielder moved

to the Santiago Bernabeu, and picked up his first La Liga title last season with a renewed influence for Jose Mourinho's side.

After three years with Los Blancos his time in the Spanish capital could be up however, with Lopes claiming that Sao Paulo can't afford their former starlet, but that he's happy to either stay in Spain or move to England.

"Kaka has decided to

quit Madrid," he told O Globo in Brazil.

"He believes that England or remaining in Spain would be two interesting destinations for him. Sao Paulo can't afford him as his price-tag is astronomical and out of the reality of Brazilian football."

TalkSPORT claims that Manchester United, Chelsea and Manchester City could all renew their interest if the claims are revealed to be true, and Kaka would add an extra dimension to any Premier League side if he were to move in the summer transfer window.—Internet

MADRID, 22 July—Tennis ace Rafael Nadal has set his sights on becoming Spain's flag-bearer at the 2016 Olympics after injury deprived him of the opportunity at the London Games.
