Japan cruise to quarter-final win

LONDON, 4 Aug—Japan maintained their pursuit of double Olympic Football gold as the men followed the women into the last four of the tournament following



a 3-0 win over Egypt.

Women's World Cup holders Japan stunned Brazil yesterday to set up a semi-final clash with France at Wembley on Monday.

Just 24 hours later, the men clinched their own Wembley date, with Kensuke Nagai, captain Maya Yoshida and Yuki Otsu all on target in their quarter-final clash with 10-man Egypt, who had Saadeldin Saad sent off.

Japan will now face Senegal or Mexico on Tuesday. Japan coach Takashi Sekizuka said afterwards: 'I'm very satisfied we've progressed into our first semi-final for 44 years. The key now is to physically and mentally recover.' —London-2012

Ryu leads Republic of Korea to win

LONDON, 4 Aug—Ryu Seung-Min showed impressive resolve to seal a dramatic men's Team event victory for Republic of Korea against DPR Korea.

Ryu's side were winning 2-1 in the best-of-five Team match when the Athens 2004 gold medallist faced Kim Hyok-Bong, who he last year played with at the Qatar Peace and Sport Cup.

Ryu was twice behind, but sealed the last two games 11-5 and 11-3 to deliver a success.

Meanwhile, Chinese competitors were beaten by non-compatriots in a match for the first time at the Games, but still

Only a little number of genres of periodicals has to pass the censor board now before printing. The censor board itself will be abolished after the press law is approved by the legislature and respective organizations starts functioning.

With improving press freedom in Myanmar, the accountability of journalists has come under the spotlight. Unethical coverage of recent unrests in Rakhine State ended up in the prosecution. Some journals were also brought to the court by respective organizations in unsuccessful lawsuits.

It shows that the country is not still accustomed to the freedom we have not enjoyed before.

For the country is in the dramatic transition towards democracy, it will take time and patience to get the reforms accomplished. Rush could ruin results. In such critical transition period, every stakeholder is a reformer. And every reformer must sacrifice his gains and sentiments for the sake of a change.

NAY PYI TAW, 4 Aug—A meeting on regional level mining sector development, quality promotion in exporting and market penetration took place at region gymnasium in Sagaing of Sagaing Region on 1 August morning, attended by Union Minister for Mines U Thein Htaik.

Speaking on the occasion, the Union minister noted that systematic mining under prescribed rules and regulations could bring down the impacts on environment although mining could damage somewhat to the ecological balance. Mining entrepreneurs were required to fill up the exhausted mines and grow perennial trees and crops on the mines, for which procedures had been issued. He called for steps toward industrial-scale production from small-scale production by establishing refineries and workshops, promotion of quality to international standards, stressing the need for establishment of corporate companies to

The video reports will be submitted to Myanma Radio and Television and semi-official broadcasters via the head office or directly to MRTV and other private broadcasters via internet for real-time coverage.

Car bomb explodes in Tripoli, first since Gaddafi's fall

TRIPOLI, 4 Aug — A car bomb exploded near the offices of the military police in Tripoli early on Saturday, a senior security source said, the first such attack in the Libyan capital since the start of a revolt that toppled the regime of Muammar Gaddafi last year.

The source said the blast slightly wounded a Tunisian national, but it could not say who might have been behind it. A Reuters witness said police had cordoned off the area around the blast's location. Several violent incidents have rocked Libya in recent days but these have been mostly confined to the eastern city of Benghazi.

Also in Benghazi, seven Iranian relief workers were abducted on Tuesday by an armed group just as they started an official mission as guests of the Libyan Red Crescent Association, which is still seeking to get them released. — Reuters

US, Pakistan appear to make little headway in spy meet

exchanged grievances in their first official meeting this week, sources familiar with

the two uneasy allies made any progress to end deep divisions on militants living in Pakistani tribal areas or on US drone strikes. Lieutenant-General Zaheer-ul-Islam, who was named in March to head the Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI), on his first official visit to Washington met on Thursday with CIA Director David Petraeus at CIA headquarters.

Ahead of his visit, Pakistani officials said the country's spy chief would call for an end to US military drone strikes in volatile areas bordering Afghanistan and push for a sharing of

technology and intelligence. The public preview of Pakistani demands on Petraeus appeared to have displeased US officials, who pushed back at the notion they might cede to Pakistani requests. The United States and Pakistan are seeking to repair relations that have suffered over the past 20 months, in part because of the unilateral US raid that killed al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden in Pakistan in May, 2011, and a US air attack that killed 24 Pakistani soldiers in November.

The two countries reached a breakthrough last

month with a deal that reopened ground supply routes that NATO nations use to supply troops in neighbouring Afghanistan, which had been closed since the November air attack along the Afghan border.

The Obama administration is deeply suspicious of Pakistan, which it believes harbours militants, while Pakistan accuses Washington of disregarding its own human toll from militancy and says drone strikes violate its sovereignty.

While sources familiar with the discussions said the two spy chiefs aired mutual grievances, they did not appear to have made big strides on the main issues. — Reuters

Indonesia arrests 24 more asylum seekers heading to Australia

JAKARTA, 4 Aug — Twenty-four more illegal immigrants planning to go to Australia to seek asylum have been arrested in Bangka-Belitung province of Indonesia, a media reported here on Saturday. The immigrant from Pakistan and Afghanistan were arrested days ago and did not

have immigration documents. "They were arrested by the Navy in two different places, at Tanjung Limbung Muntok Port in West Bangka district and at Depati Amir Airport in Central Bangka district, while they were heading to Jakarta," said Filianto Akbar, head of

supervision at the Pangkal Pinang Immigration Office on Bangka Island, as quoted by the *Jakarta globe* as saying.

The Navy also arrested four drivers and an assistant who were transporting the asylum seekers. The drivers said they had helped drive asylum seekers seven times.

Habibullah, one of the asylum seekers, said he left Afghanistan because of the conflict there. Indonesia is a favourite transit point for immigrants from the Middle East and other countries heading to Australia for seeking asylum.

Indonesia and Australia have co-operated with Australia in fighting human trafficking heading to Australia. — Xinhua

Iran calls for unity against West's "economic war"

TEHERAN, 4 Aug — Teheran's interim on Friday Prayers leader, Ayatollah Ahmad Jannati, called on the Iranian nation and the government to form a united front against what he called an "economic war" waged on the Islamic republic by the West, Press TV reported on Friday.

"This is a war in which the enemy, which has suffered defeat in other wars, is trying to regain its lost face through victory," Jannati, also chairman of Iran's high legislative body, ie Guardian Council, was quoted as saying.

He said economic problems in Iran have their

root in politics, adding that the United States seeks to restore its domination on the region by inflicting an economic defeat on Iran. Jannati added that economic problems in the Islamic republic will not continue and are limited to a short period, and urged the Iranian nation to resist the West's economic pressure, according to semi-official *Fars* news agency. Iran's currency value slumped against foreign currency in the street market of Teheran on Thursday as 1 US dollar was exchanged for about 20,260 rials, compared to 19,200 rials one week ago.

Meanwhile, 1 euro was traded for 24,800 rials on

Thursday, while the number was 23,850 rials last week. The current Iranian rial's value is the lowest since the beginning of the new Iranian year, which started on 20 March. The new depreciation in the Iranian currency rate came as US President Barack Obama announced on Tuesday additional sanctions against Iran's energy and petrochemical sectors over the Islamic republic's disputed nuclear programme.

Obama said he ordered the latest round of sanctions to deter Iran from establishing payment mechanisms to circumvent existing sanctions.

Fostering strong US economy starts with strong middle class: Obama

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — Fostering a strong US economy started with building a strong US middle class, and economic fairness was critical to the nation's recovery, US President Barack Obama said here on Friday. Speaking at the White House after the release of the latest job report, Obama stressed that the last thing the nation should do in the weak economic recovery is tax increase on middle class families. Flanked by middle-class Americans, Obama said "if we want to keep moving this country forward, these are the folks who are going to get us there."

Obama said the nation continued to create jobs last month, evidence of the ongoing economic growth. "We've now created 4.5 million new jobs over the last 29 months, and 1.1 million new jobs so far this year," he noted. US unemployment rose 0.1 percentage point from June to 8.3 percent in July, while the non-farm sector added 163,000 new jobs across the country last month, the US Labour Department reported on Friday.

However, Obama stressed that there were still too many Americans looking for jobs, adding that "we've got more work to do on their behalf—not only to reclaim all the jobs that were lost during the recession, but also to reclaim the kind of financial security that too many Americans have felt was slipping away from them for too long." "When families have the security of knowing that their taxes won't go up, they're more likely to spend, and more likely to grow the economy," said Obama, who has geared up his reelection bid.

Obama criticized Republican lawmakers' efforts to extend Bush-era tax cuts for the wealthiest Americans next year, noting that middle class families should not pay more taxes while the wealthiest Americans could pay less. — Xinhua

Judge releases nun who broke into US nuclear bomb facility

KNOXVILLE, 4 Aug — A US magistrate judge on Friday ordered the release pending trial of an 82-year-old nun and another anti-nuclear activist charged with breaching security fences at one of the most sensitive US nuclear facilities, in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where weapons-grade uranium is kept.

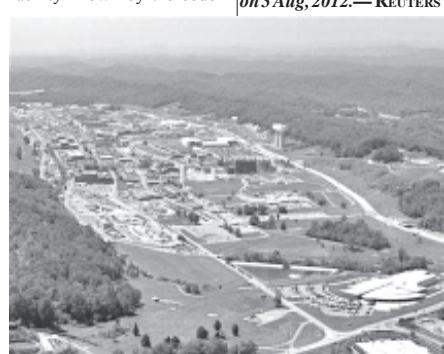
The security failure was an embarrassment for the National Nuclear Security Administration, or NNSA, the Energy Department branch that operates US nuclear weapons plants, and for the international security firm G4S, which owns WSI Oak Ridge, the contractor

responsible for protecting the facility.

G4S was also at the centre of a dispute over security at the London Olympic Games. Officials said the facility was shut down on Wednesday at least until next week after peace activists Megan Rice, 82, Michael Walli, 63, and Greg Boertje-Obed, 57, cut through perimeter fences to reach the outer wall of a building where highly enriched uranium, a key nuclear bomb component, is stored.

The activists painted slogans and threw what they said was human blood on the wall of the facility, one of

numerous buildings in the facility known by the code



name Y-12 that it was given during World War Two,

Palm trees ‘grew on Antarctica’

LONDON, 4 Aug — Scientists drilling deep into the edge of modern Antarctica have pulled up proof that palm trees once grew there. Analyses of pollen and spores and the remains of tiny creatures have given a climatic picture of the early Eocene period, about 53 million years ago.

The study in *Nature* suggests Antarctic winter temperatures exceeded 10C, while summers may have reached 25C. Better knowledge of past “greenhouse” conditions will enhance guesses about the effects of increasing CO2 today.

The early Eocene — often referred to as the Eocene greenhouse — has been a subject of increasing interest in recent years as a “warm analogue” of the current Earth. “There are two ways of looking at where we’re going in the future,” said a co-author of the study, James Bendle of the University of Glasgow. “One is using physics-based climate models; but increasingly we’re using this ‘back to the future’ approach where we look through periods in the geological past that are similar to where we may be going in 10 years, or 20, or several hundred,” he told BBC News.

The early Eocene was a period of atmospheric CO2 concentrations higher than the current 390 parts per million (ppm) — reaching at least 600ppm and possibly far higher.

Global temperatures were on the order of 5C higher, and there was no sharp divide in temperature between the poles and the equator. Drilling research carried out in recent years showed that the Arctic must have had a subtropical climate. But the Antarctic presents a difficult challenge.

Glaciation 34 million years ago wiped out much of the sediment that would give clues to past climate, and left kilometres of ice on top of what remains. Now, the Integrated Ocean Drilling Program (IODP) has literally got to the bottom of what the Eocene Antarctic was like, dropping a drilling rig through 4km of water off Wilkes Land on Antarctica’s eastern coast. The rig then drilled through 1km of sediment to return samples from the Eocene. With the sediment came pollen grains from palm trees and relatives of the modern baobab and macadamia. Crucially, they contained also the remnants of tiny single-celled organisms called Archaea.

The creatures’ cell walls show subtle molecular changes that depend on the temperature of the soil surrounding them when they were alive. The structures are faithfully preserved after they die. They are, in essence, tiny buried thermometers from 53 million years ago. Together, the data suggest that even in the darkest period of Antarctic winter, the temperature did not drop below 10C; and summer daytime temperatures were in the 20Cs.

The lowland coastal region sported palm trees, while slightly inland, hills were populated with beech trees and conifers. Dr Bendle said that as an analogue of modern Earth, the Eocene represents heightened levels of CO2 that will not be reached any time soon, and may not be reached at all if CO2 emissions abate.

However, he said the results from the Eocene could help to shore up the computer models that are being used to estimate how sensitive climate is to the emissions that will certainly rise in the nearer term. — Internet

Anonymous hackers identify charity attacker

LONDON, 4 Aug — Hacking group Anonymous has aided a global search for a cyber-vandal who defaced a charity website. Members of Anonymous helped track the attacker down to Madrid following a plea from the owner of the RedSky video production company. New Zealand-based RedSky asked for help after an attacker penetrated its website, erased data and left graffiti. The attack was reportedly carried out in a bid to impress Anonymous and join its ranks as a member.

RedSky boss Bryan Bruce issued a plea on Facebook for help restoring his company’s website after a hacker who called himself AnonVolde mort announced that he had hacked the site. Despite his name, the attacker was not a member of the hacker collective but was seeking to show that he had skills they could use.

Unwittingly, he offended one of the unwritten rules of

the Anonymous group which is to never mount attacks on charity sites.

The plea was relayed to Anonymous by one of Mr Bruce’s friends who knew someone in the hacker group who was also aware of RedSky’s charitable work. Profits from a documentary made by RedSky about the effects of poverty on children in New Zealand were being passed on to charities that provide meals for impoverished youngsters.

Within 24 hours of the plea being passed on Mr Bruce got an email providing evidence that the attacker was a man living in Madrid, Spain. In an interview with the New Zealand Herald, Mr Bruce said that he had contacted the police in Spain with the information and was waiting for a response. Mr Bruce said he still had work to do to restore the website as the attacker had deleted all the data on it as well as the backups. — Internet

The bad news for American users, though, is that the ICS upgrades have only been made available to users in the United Kingdom so far, as TechRadar reports that Galaxy Tab 7.0 Plus and 10.1

an Android app maker for using the word “ToDo.” Appigo has sent a letter to an Android developer regarding his Star Trek ToDo Agenda app. In the letter, Appigo notes that it owns the trademark for the word “ToDo” and the developer’s use of the word is “likely to cause customer confusion to our existing and potential customers.”

The problem with all this, as David Ruddock of Android Police points out, is that

Appigo’s trademark happens to be for the Spanish word “ToDo,” and not a fanciful respelling of the phrase “to-do.”

Ruddock explains that “had Appigo claimed ToDo [was] a fanciful respelling of To-Do, it would almost certainly not have received principle registration for its trademark until it had established sufficient secondary meaning.” — Internet

Three firms share 1.1 bln USD NASA fund for manned spacecraft

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — Three firms have won over 1.1 billion US dollars in contracts from NASA to develop spacecraft capable of carrying astronauts to the International Space Station, the US space agency said on Friday. Boeing, a longtime NASA contractor, will receive 460 million dollars for the development of its CST-100 vessel.

SpaceX, which recently wowed the world by performing the first successful docking of a privately-owned craft, the Dragon, with the International Space Station, will receive the next-largest chunk, some 440 million dollars. That will be used to continue the development of a crewed version of the Dragon.

Sierra Nevada Corp will receive about 212.5 million dollars to further work on its Dream Chaser spacecraft, which is perhaps most visually and functionally similar to the retired fleet of NASA space shuttles.

The funding awards are the third set given under NASA’s Commercial Crew Program, an effort that kicked off in 2010 to whittle down those companies that say they can provide viable replacements for the space shuttle. The first funding awards were worth a total of 50 million dollars and the second funding awards were worth 315 million dollars.

“Today, we are announcing another critical step toward launching our astronauts from US soil on space systems built by American companies,” NASA Administrator Charles Bolden said in a statement. “We have selected three companies that will help keep us on track to end the

outsourcing of human spaceflight and create high-paying jobs in Florida and elsewhere across the country.”

Until their retirement last summer, US space shuttles carried most of the gear and many of the astronauts to the orbiting outpost. Since then, American astronauts have had to rely on Russian capsules for rides.

European, Japanese and Russian supply ships have been delivering cargo. NASA is looking to the private sector, in this post-shuttle era, to get American astronauts launching again from US soil. It will be at least four to five years before SpaceX or any other private operator is capable of flying astronauts. — Xinhua

Wall Street takes a hit from ECB disappointment

NEW YORK, 4 Aug — Stocks fell for a fourth day on Thursday after European Central Bank President Mario Draghi disappointed investors hoping for immediate action to contain the euro zone debt crisis. One of Wall Street's top market makers, Knight Capital Group (KCG), was fighting for its survival after a trading glitch that roiled markets on Wednesday wiped out \$440 million of the firm's capital. However, the market focused mostly on the ECB, though traders were also looking ahead to Friday's closely watched US jobs report which could bring a volatile end to an eventful week.

Draghi said the ECB would gear up to buy Italian and Spanish bonds on the open market but would only act after euro zone governments have activated bailout funds to do the same, disappointing traders after his pledge last week to do "whatever it takes" to save the euro left many thinking action was imminent. "Today people were looking for concrete steps and an outline of exactly what

path the ECB would take to do that, and there weren't any," said Brian Gendreau, market strategist with Cetera Financial Group in Gainesville, Florida. "Just as the market went up on the 'whatever it takes' comments it is coming down on the lack of specificity."

Markets rallied late last week in part on hopes for stimulus from the Federal Reserve but mostly as expectations grew the ECB would take action to protect the euro. Friday's jobs report could give a stronger indication whether the Fed, which has a freer hand than the ECB, will act shortly. Data showed the number of Americans filing new claims for jobless benefits rose last week and manufacturers suffered an unexpected drop in orders in June, suggesting the economy is struggling to break out of a soft patch. The Dow Jones industrial average (^DJI) fell 92.18 points, or 0.71 percent, to 12,878.88. The S&P 500 Index (^GSPC) dropped 10.14 points, or 0.74 percent, to 1,365.00. The Nasdaq Composite (^IXIC) lost 10.44



points, or 0.36 percent, to 2,909.77. Major indexes fell for a fourth day running, totaling weekly losses so far of more than 1.5 percent. Knight Capital shares fell after Wednesday's trading error forced the company to seek new funding. The stock closed down 62.8 percent at \$2.58, their lowest since early October 1998.

According to Thomson Reuters data, 67 percent of the 385 S&P 500 components that have reported results so far this quarter have beat earnings estimates. In the past four quarters, the average beat rate has been 68 percent. General Motors Co (GM) posted a smaller-than-expected loss in Europe that helped the No. 1 US automaker post a better-than-expected second-quarter profit. Shares slipped

2.6 percent to \$19.14.

Gap Inc (GPS) jumped 12.8 percent to \$33.17 after the clothing retailer posted its July and second-quarter sales, but rival Aeropostale (ARO) plummeted 32.8 percent to \$13.08 after cutting its second-quarter forecast. US retailers reported stronger-than-expected sales for July but the gains were largely due to discounting and do not necessarily signal vigorous consumer spending for the rest of the year.

About 7.1 billion shares exchanged hands on the New York Stock Exchange, NYSE MKT and Nasdaq, above the year-to-date daily average of 6.75 billion. About 8 issues fell for every 5 that rose on the NYSE and on Nasdaq the decline/advance ratio was roughly 7 to 5. — Internet

Apple's Jobs was open to making smaller iPad: executive

SAN JOSE, 4 Aug — Steve Jobs was receptive to Apple Inc making a smaller tablet, a senior executive said in a 2011 email revealed on Friday, fanning speculation that Apple plans to make a mini-iPad and take on Google and Amazon products. Vice President Eddy Cue urged then-chief operating officer Tim Cook in January 2011 to build a 7-inch tablet, according to an email from Cue that Samsung Electronics introduced as evidence in a US patent trial.

In an email addressed also to software chief Scott Forstall and marketing head Phil Schiller, Cue said he believed there was a market for a 7-inch tablet and that "we should do one". Speculation intensified in 2012 that Apple is preparing to launch a 7-inch version of the market-dominating 10-inch iPad, to counter increasing inroads made by smaller tablets such as the Kindle Fire, and most recently, Google's Nexus 7. But the company has never confirmed such talk.

The email was introduced on Friday as an exhibit in a high-wattage trial being played out in San Jose this summer

before much of the technology industry. Apple and Samsung are going toe-to-toe in a patent dispute that mirrors a global struggle for industry supremacy between two rivals that together control more than half of worldwide smartphone sales. Apple accuses Samsung of copying the design and some features of its iPad and iPhone, and is asking for billions of dollars in damages and a sales ban. The Korean company, which is trying to expand in the US market, accuses Apple of infringing on some of its key wireless technology patents.

Cue, who rose to prominence overseeing the iTunes and Apps stores, became the company's senior vice president of Internet software and services in September. — Reuters

Fruit flies offer DNA clue to why women live longer

LONDON, 4 Aug — Scientists believe they have discovered a clue to why women tend to live longer than men - by studying fruit flies. Writing in *Current Biology*, they focus on mutations in mitochondrial DNA—the power source of cells. Mitochondria are inherited only from mothers, never from fathers, so there is no way to weed out mutations that damage a male's prospects. But one ageing expert said there were many factors that explained the gender difference in life expectancy. By the age of 85, there are approximately six women for every four men in the UK, and by 100 the ratio is more than two to one. And females outlive males in many other species.

In the research, experts from Australia's Monash University and the UK's Lancaster University analysed the mitochondria of

13 different groups of male and female fruit flies. Mitochondria, which exist in almost all animal cells, convert food into the energy that powers the body. Dr Damian Dowling, of Monash University who was one of the researchers, said the results point to numerous mutations within mitochondrial DNA that affect how long males live, and the speed at which they age. "Intriguingly, these same mutations have no effects on patterns of ageing in females," he said.

"All animals possess mitochondria, and the tendency for females to outlive males is common to many different species." Our results therefore suggest that the mitochondrial mutations we have uncovered will generally cause faster male ageing across the animal kingdom." They suggest this is because there is no

evolutionary reason for the faults that affect males to be picked up—because mitochondria are passed down by females. Dr Dowling added: "If a mitochondrial mutation occurs that harms fathers, but has no effect on mothers, this mutation will slip through the gaze of natural selection, unnoticed."

"Over thousands of generations, many such mutations have accumulated that harm only males, while leaving females unscathed." Tom Kirkwood, professor of ageing at Newcastle University said the paper was "intriguing". He said: "It may be it does tell us something rather important about mitochondria and the difference between male and female fruit flies."

And we know that mitochondria are important for ageing in a number of species. "But I certainly don't think this is a discovery that explains why women live five-to-six years longer than men. "There are other things we know also count—lifestyle, social and behavioural factors. But the biggest difference in biology is that we have different hormones." — Internet

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — Medical experts on Friday accused a major US breast cancer foundation known for its high-profile "pink ribbon" campaign of overselling pre-emptive mammography and understating the risks. The Susan G Komen for the Cure foundation uses misleading statistics in its pro-screening campaigns, two doctors from The Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Clinical Practice in New Hampshire wrote in the *BMJ* medical journal.

"Unfortunately, there is a big mismatch between the strength of evidence in support of screening and the strength of Komen's advocacy for it," professors Steven Woloshin and Lisa Schwartz wrote. They take issue with a Komen poster

comparing the 98-percent five-year survival rate for breast cancer when caught early, with a 23-percent rate for later diagnosis. Comparing the two figures did not say anything about the benefits of screening, they argued, and in reality a mammogram only narrowly decreases the chances that a 50-year-old woman will die from breast cancer within 10 years from 0.53 percent to 0.46 percent. Breast cancer treatments are more effective today, and some question whether screening mammography has any benefit whatsoever, wrote the pair.

They accused Komen of overlooking the potential harms, with up to half of women screened annually over 10 years experiencing at least one false alarm that requires a biopsy. Screening also results in overdiagnosis—detecting cancers that would never have killed or even caused symptoms in a person's lifetime, and unnecessary treatment. "The Komen advertisement campaign failed to provide the facts," said the piece. "Worse, it undermined decision making by misusing statistics to generate false hope about the benefit of mammography screening." In

2010, a report in the *New England Journal of Medicine* said mammograms have only a "modest" impact on reducing breast cancer deaths.

Komen, in a response to the BMJ comment, insisted that early detection enables early treatment, which gives the best shot at survival. "Everyone agrees that mammography isn't perfect, but it's the best widely available detection tool that we have today," said Chandini Portteus, the foundation's vice president of research, evaluation and scientific programmes. "We've said for years that science has to do better, which is why Komen is putting millions of dollars into research to detect breast cancer before symptoms start, through biomarkers, for example." In February, Komen was embroiled in a controversy over its decision to stop funding for an abortion clinic group in the United States. — Internet

LONDON, 4 Aug — Europe's biggest economies endured another torrid month in July as businesses battled slumping demand, according to surveys on Friday that gave scant hope the region will emerge any time soon from a malaise induced by a paralyzing debt crisis. Purchasing managers indexes (PMIs), which gauge

business activity and have a good record of tracking economic growth, showed order books at euro zone companies shriveled last month as a downturn in

at odds with their portrayal of steady but unspectacular growth in Asia and the United States. At the heart of the region's problems is the sovereign debt crisis, which has pushed government borrowing costs in big economies like Spain and Italy to unsustainable levels and stamped on consumer and businesses confidence. European Central Bank President Mario Draghi warned the risks to economic growth in the euro zone are on the downside after its policy meeting on Thursday, while sidestepping immediate action to calm the debt crisis.

Germany and France became more entrenched. And growth in Britain's dominant services sector slowed to a crawl in July, casting fresh doubt over whether its economy will rebound from a contraction in the first half of the year.

Overall, the PMIs pointed to a recession-laden second half of the year for most of Europe's biggest economies,

well below the 50 threshold that marks growth. Survey compiler Markit said it was consistent with a 0.6 percent quarterly rate of economic decline. The euro zone narrowly avoided recession in the first quarter this year thanks only to the resilience of Germany.

While Reuters polls of economists last month suggested both Germany and France can still skirt recession, Italy and Spain look destined for painful economic contractions into 2013. Official data on Friday also showed euro zone retail sales in June came in above expectations, even as growth slowed sharply from the previous month. But the more forward-looking PMIs augured badly for future business activity in Europe. Euro zone new business orders collapsed at the fastest rate since June 2009—a much worse situation than portrayed in the flash reading two weeks ago.—Reuters

Man 'on hold with Qantas for 15 hours'

MELBOURNE, 4 Aug — An Australian man on Friday claimed he was put on hold by Qantas Airways for so long he managed to read an entire managerial textbook, with the 15-hour phone call enough time to fly to the United States.

Andrew Kahn told Fairfax newspapers he phoned Qantas to confirm plans to travel to New York on Sunday, and was placed in a queue with a recorded message saying someone would be with him as soon as possible.

"I wanted to find out what exactly they meant would be as soon as possible," said Kahn.

After some time had elapsed the Adelaide businessman said he did not want to surrender his place in the queue and left the call rolling while he went onto other things — "surfing the net and working". "I also managed to read Bazerman & Moore's seventh edition of Judgment in Managerial Decision Making — more than 200 pages of advanced

master's level reading," he said. The call was placed at 7.22pm on Wednesday evening and Kahn said he finally hung up at 11.01am on Thursday without speaking to anyone. "I hung up in the end simply because I had had enough," he said, adding that he would never fly with the airline again.

Qantas declined comment, although it told the newspaper it had no record of someone being on hold for 15 hours that day and "the longest wait time was 17 minutes".

The embattled Australian carrier has endured a turbulent 12 months, with staff strikes prompting it to ground its worldwide fleet for 48 hours last October in a row that badly damaged its reputation.

Its investment-grade credit rating has been placed on watch by Standard & Poor's after warnings of a huge profit slump due to stiff competition, soaring fuel bills, the strong Australian dollar and weakening global conditions.—Internet

UN body sends first food aid to flood-hit N Koreans

GENEVA, 4 Aug — The World Food Programme has said it is sending a first shipment of emergency food aid to flood-hit areas of North Korea, where torrential rain has killed scores of people and inundated cropland. The assistance will provide victims with an initial ration of 400 grams (14 ounces) of

maize a day for 14 days, the UN body said in a statement posted on Friday on its website.

It said a UN mission that travelled to flood-hit regions earlier in the week found considerable damage to maize, soybean and rice fields. The country struggles to feed its people even in normal times

and suffered a famine in the 1990s that killed hundreds of thousands. The UN mission said immediate food aid was needed for residents of the worst-hit counties, Anju and Songchon in South Pyongan Province and Chonmae in Kangwon Province. It also stressed that tens of thousands of families urgently need clean drinking water to prevent disease.

Wells had been contaminated by overflowing latrines, creating a high risk of a diarrhoea outbreak, while floods had damaged water sources and pumping stations. Citing government figures, the UN mission said about 50,000 families would need purification tablets or other help to secure clean water. The North's state media has reported a total of 119 deaths in recent weeks, with 84,000 people made homeless and 45,370 hectares (122,500 acres) of farmland submerged or washed away.—Internet

First West Nile death reported in Houston

HOUSTON, 4 Aug — Health department officials of Houston, the first largest city of the US state of Texas, confirmed on Friday that an elderly man has died from the West Nile virus, the first reported death in the city. According to the reports on the website of local English newspaper the Houston Chronicle, the man, who lived in southwest Houston, died in his late 70s to early 80s on Wednesday.

Currently, there are six cases of the West Nile virus in

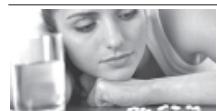
Houston and its surrounding areas such as the Harris county. There are 241 cases of the West Nile virus in the United States at the end of July, and almost 80 percent of such cases have been reported in the states of Texas, Mississippi and Oklahoma. Texas has reportedly been a hotbed of the West Nile virus this summer, and Dallas county has reported two more deaths from the virus.

The West Nile virus is one of the Japanese encephalitis (JE) antigenic serocomplex of

viruses, in the family Flaviviridae. It is found in both temperate and tropical regions, having been first identified in the West Nile sub-region in the East African nation of Uganda in 1937. The virus mainly infects birds, but is known to infect humans, and the main route of human infection is through the bite of an infected mosquito.

About 80 percent of such virus infections in humans are without any symptoms.

Digital pills approved by the FDA

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — Did you remember to take your prescription medication today? For some, this is an easy question to answer, but others struggle to remember whether or not they've taken their daily regimen. This forgetfulness may soon be a thing of the past, though — the US Food and Drug Administration has approved the use of a pill that can digitally remind you whether or not you've taken it that day.

Created by Proteus Digital Health, the technology places tiny silicon chips on each pill. These sand-grained sensors also contain magnesium and copper, a mix of metals that generates an electric charge when exposed to stomach acid. That charge ultimately makes its way to a patch on the skin, which transmits a notification that the pill has been taken to a doctor's smartphone.

Currently, the device is only approved for use with placebos. Its creators hope that the government will soon approve the silicon chips for use with anti-tuberculosis medications that need to be taken over the course of years, and for certain crucial pills taken by seniors who might otherwise forget to take their medication.—Internet

In his discussion, the President expressed his pleasure to meet leaders of 14 parties. Despite different parties, every one is realizing a common goal which is a prosperous democratic nation where peace and stability prevail. With democracy in its infancy, the country must take every step cautiously. Some says it is slow and some the other way. Democracy is not a system that could be moulded. Historical background and customs of its nationals will shape Myanmar's democracy model.

Perhaps, Myanmar may not be suited with model of western democracy. Every way that could profit the nation and the people will be followed. Stability is a sine qua none for flourishing democracy. The democracy will not survive without stability. And in turn, the stability will not be maintained with the weak democracy.

The government gives the stability the top priority. It is important to maintain stability as well as to make peace with national armed groups. The government is focusing on these two things.

The cooperation of each and every political party plays a vital role in stabilizing the political condition of the country. Despite different political views, all parties are invited to cooperate in implementing tasks on the common ground in the interests of the country.

The second point is about making peace with national races armed groups, which has long been an unsolved problem. Mutual understanding, sympathy, patience and trust are being built between the among all stakeholders first.

It is an extremely sensitive issue. However hard the higher level has tried, the efforts have often come to nothing once there emerges malfunctioning at the lower level, resulting in vain and decrease in trust. Contacts have been made with 10 out of 11 national races armed groups, achieving certain progress as some agreements have been reached. But agreement has not been yet reached with KIO/KIA in Kachin State (North). The magnitude of losses has been massive over a year period. The worst is that some of the national races in the region were forced to take refuge in safe hands of their friends or relatives, abandoning houses and property due to the fights. Agricultural reforms are being carried out to guarantee food sufficiency for the growing population of future generation and achieve surplus through the current production is adequate for consumption of 60 million people. Efforts are being made for ensuring better living standards for farmers.

As to economic sector, what is needed today for economic prosperity of the nation is creation of jobs as much as

possible. The poverty rate of the country stands at 26 per cent, affected by low employment rate, forcing about three million of citizens to work overseas for survival.

Foreign investments are required for creation of a large number of job vacancies. The country lacks capital and technology. Only with the foreign investment, can job opportunities be created. Only there is occupation, there will be income. Only there is income, can one make his living, afford schooling of children, and medical treatment, promoting the standards of education and health. Thus, it is crucial to have investors invest in the country.

Myanmar Investment Commission was constituted with seven ministers to avert losses to the country when FDI flows into country, adopting four policies. Foreign Investment Bill has been written to be commensurate with that of foreign countries and submitted to Hluttaw.

Arrangements have been made to systematically use the grants and loans from foreign countries in projects which would benefit the people and would take shape speedily. Plans have been laid down and efforts are being made to build small- and medium-scale industries, heavy industries and hi-tech industries such as IT and telecommunication with the aim of adding the value to the products of the country.

The government has turned just over a year and it is not easy for the new government to fulfill the needs of the country at once. It needs to give advices to the government on ways for sufficient power supply instead of launching protests. The country is in need of not only sufficient power supply but also basic infrastructures such as roads, bridges, school buildings, hospitals, clinics, housings and hotels, clean drinking water, daily easy transportation and earning high income. The government, spending its budget, is working to satisfy the needs to the best of its ability.

The current per capital income is around USD 800 and the country which is rich in natural resources and possesses sound foundations is ranked at the bottom of the list of per capital income in the ASEAN nations, even lower than neighbouring country Bangladesh. If possible, the government wants the per capita income reaches about USD 3000. The five-year plan is aimed at increasing 7.7% GDP within five years. To reach this goal, we should step up the efforts 1.3 times of present efforts. If we want to reach the GDP up to USD 3000, the country must boost efforts three times higher than

the present efforts.

It is not easy and impossible for the country to do it at present. But, it is the desire of the government and of the people. However, the dream would do come true if grants and low-interest loans and investments from foreign countries flow into the country and western countries remove sanctions and the EU accepts imports from Myanmar and allows Myanmar to re-apply the tax exemption system which would benefit the country and the country produces more gas and oil.

The government believes that there is no impossible thing to satisfy the needs of the country if the stability and peace prevail in the country and its people work harder.

The people has a common desire comprising three points. They are political stability, eternal peace with armed ethnic groups and socio-economic development in the country. The desire of the people is the desire of the government and parties. The government is working to fulfill the desire of the people.

The government and the parties are working together to translate our common desire to success and all are to work in unison until all reach the common goal, the President said.

If there are those who row back while paddling towards the goal, the travel to the goal would be delayed and it would be difficult to reach the goal.

The President also urged all participants to work in unison and in cooperation each other until the country reaches it goal.

The President thanked the participants and the meeting ended at 1.30 pm.

Typhoon-triggered flooding disrupts railway services in NE China

SHENYANG, 4 Aug — Flooding triggered by torrential rain brought by Typhoon Damrey, the 10th typhoon of the year, disrupted services of two railways in northeast China's Liaoning province early Saturday morning, local authorities said.

The services of a major local railway that links Liaoning's capital city Shenyang with the port city of Dalian was suspended

after a section was submerged under water at about 2am, the Shenyang railway bureau said in a statement. The disruption has led to the delay of several trains, it added. Flooding also caused the collapse of the railway bed in a section of the Shenyang-Shanhaiguan line.

More heavy rains are forecast to batter Liaoning later Saturday, according to the provincial meteorological centre. The southeastern

part of Liaoning received 100 to 220mm of rainfall as of 4am on Saturday, with a locality in the city of Anshan receiving 420mm.

One person was killed and another five missing on Friday night in Dalian when a bridge they were purportedly crossing was toppled by floods, the local government said. Flooding also has forced the evacuation of 88,773 people in the province.

S&P cuts ratings of 15 Italian banks

NEW YORK, 4 Aug — Standard & Poor's Ratings Services on Friday cut the ratings for 15 Italian banks, citing a potentially deeper and more prolonged recession in Italy than originally anticipated. The ratings firm said the downgrading reflected "our view of increased credit risk for the Italian economy and its banks." The agency revised the economic risk score for Italy, one of the main components of its Banking Industry Country Risk Assessment, to five from four.

"With Italy facing a potentially deeper and more prolonged recession that we had originally anticipated, we are of the view that the vulnerability of Italian banks to the impact of rising loan losses has increased due to the combined effect of mounting problem assets and reduced coverage of loan loss reserves," S&P said in a statement.

The firm now thought a severe recession likely would increase Italian banks' problem assets in 2012 and 2013 to levels higher than previously anticipated, and higher than other banks in Europe. Banks like Unione di Banche Italiane, Banca Popolare dell' Emilia Romagna and Banca Popolare di Vicenza saw their ratings downgraded.— Xinhua

Hiring picks up but not enough to sideline Fed

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — Employers hired the most workers in five months in July, but an increase in the jobless rate to 8.3 percent kept prospects of further monetary stimulus from the Federal Reserve on the table. Nonfarm payrolls rose 163,000 last month, the Labour Department said on Friday, breaking three straight months of job gains below 100,000 and offering hope for the ailing economy. "It's a relief we did not post another number like 75,000, but the reality is it's not night and day. It's not as though it brings us all the way back to being wildly optimistic," said Robert DiClemente, chief US economist at Citigroup in New York.

While the report gave talking points to Republicans and Democrats for the upcoming general election, investors on Wall Street shrugged off the rise in the

jobless rate to a five-month high and boosted stocks to their highest level since early May. The unemployment rate rose from 8.2 percent in June, even as more people gave up

US stocks rally to three-month high

NEW YORK, 4 Aug — US stocks rose to a three-month high on Friday, as investors cheered a positive jobs report. The US Labour Department reported that the US economy added 163,000 jobs in July, beating previous estimates of 100,000. The unemployment rate, however, rose to 8.3 percent from 8.2 percent. The upbeat job report eased investor concerns about the US economy and helped to boost the market. Meanwhile, investors also expected that the European Central Bank will take more steps in the near future to control the region's debt crisis.

"There are unconfirmed rumours out there today that the ECB will hold another press conference," Stephen J Guilfoyle, economist from Meridian Equity Partners told

Xinhua. He added that this expectation may also be part of the reason that European equities were so strong on Friday. The Dow Jones industrial average rallied 217.29 points, or 1.69 percent, to 13,096.17. The Standard & Poor's 500 surged 25.99 points, or 1.90 percent, to 1,390.99. The Nasdaq Composite Index soared 58.13 points, or 2.00 percent, to 2,967.90.

As for shares, financials, energy and technology stocks led the market. The CBOE Volatility Index, widely known as the best gauge of fear in the market, ended below 16. As for next week's market issues, investors were expecting the Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke's speeches on next Monday and Tuesday. On next week's economic front, investors will

stay focused on jobless claims next Thursday and import and export prices, which will be released on next Friday. As for other markets, crude prices soared on Friday also because of the positive jobs report.

Light, sweet crude for September delivery jumped 4.27 dollars, or 4.90 percent, to settle at 91.40 dollars a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. For this week, the WTI rose 1.27 dollars, or 1.41 percent. In London, Brent crude for September delivery surged 3.04 dollars, or 2.87 percent, to close at 108.94 dollars a barrel. It rose 2.47 dollars, or 2.32 percent for the week. The US dollar fell against most major currencies in late New York trading on Friday as the jobs report helped ease concerns over the US economy.— Xinhua

China nabs 137 for organizing organ sale

BEIJING, 4 Aug — Chinese police have arrested 137 suspects in the latest crack down on human organ trafficking.

The operation was jointly conducted by 18 provincial police authorities in late July, who also rescued 127 organ suppliers, said a statement from the Ministry of Public Security on Saturday.

Organizing underground organ transplantation is a crime under the Chinese law.— Xinhua

Japanese minister tries out Osprey plane at Pentagon

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — Japan's defence minister flew from the Pentagon grounds on Friday in a revolutionary hybrid aircraft at the heart of a controversy that threatens to strain strong defence ties between the United States and its Asian ally. The minister, Satoshi Morimoto, donned a white flight helmet and goggles before taking the jump-seat, between the pilots, on the flat-gray Marine Corps MV-22 Osprey troop transport.

The Pentagon is seeking to deploy the tilt-rotor aircraft



— which takes off like a helicopter but flies like a plane — as early as next month to the southern Japanese island of Okinawa despite strong public opposition, largely on safety grounds. An initial shipment of 12 of the aircraft have arrived at Iwakuni Air Station, the only US Marine Corps station in the main Japanese islands. Activists are hoping to attract hundreds of thousands to what could be the island's largest-ever protest rally on Sunday.

The United States has agreed to refrain from flying the Osprey in Japan "in the short term," Defence Secretary Leon Panetta told a news conference with Morimoto at his side. Morimoto's trip, to Marine Corps Base Quantico in northern Virginia and back, would let the Japanese defence chief experience first-hand the Osprey's "impressive capabilities," Panetta said. The aircraft with the minister aboard headed low from the Pentagon over the Potomac River, crossing not far from the cherry tree plantings that originated in 1912 as a gift of friendship to the people of the United States from the people of Japan.

At Quantico, Morimoto watched a second Osprey land, evaluating its operation and noise levels in patterns meant to mimic their intended use at Futenma Marine Air Station on Okinawa island, where the Pentagon plans to base the Ospreys to replace aging CH-46 helicopters.

FAA: Three jets near DC were never on collision course

WASHINGTON, 4 Aug — None of the commuter jets that flew too close together near Washington was ever on course to collide head-on with the others, federal officials said on Thursday. During a news conference, US Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood strongly disputed media reports characterizing what happened as a near-miss. "At no point were the three aircraft on a head-to-head course. They were not on a collision course," said Michael Huerta, administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration.

The jet problem occurred on Tuesday after a miscommunication between a manager at Potomac Consolidated Terminal Radar Approach Control and two traffic management coordinators at Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport, Huerta said. Officials

are investigating. The exact nature of the miscommunication was not immediately clear, but there was apparently a failure on both ends to follow standard procedure. Traffic controllers at the time had been changing the direction planes were landing and taking off at the airport because of bad weather including several thunderstorms, the closest about 6 miles south.

Both LaHood and Huerta praised the work of air traffic controllers to quickly set the US Airways planes on another path once they learned they were too close together.

Huerta said the planes were on different headings at different altitudes and thus never would have crashed. All of the planes were equipped with collision avoidance systems, but none was activated Tuesday, Huerta said.

London tourism rates 'plunge' during Olympics

LONDON, 4 Aug — The London 2012 Olympics appears to be deterring tourists from the capital's centre after warnings of travel chaos and overpriced hotel rooms, according to key industry figures. Many businesses complain they are being sidelined as tourists make a beeline for the Olympic Games and avoid the capital's other attractions and shopping destinations, while non-sports fans opt to stay at home or delay their trips. In the run-up to the Olympics, commuters and tourists alike were warned to avoid central London, with millions of athletes, support staff, media and spectators descending on the capital for the greatest show on earth.

The Games have long been heralded as a key boost to the recession-hit British economy. But tourist numbers have fallen "dramatically" since the Games began, according to industry body the European Tour Operators Association. "London has approximately 300,000 foreign and 800,000 domestic visitors every day in August. These people have been told implicitly that they should stay away and they have done so," said ETOA chief executive Tom Jenkins. He argued that many were simply following official travel advice from Transport for London.

"The numbers are currently dramatically down on last year. How far down will be determined by how long Transport for London maintains the 'don't come into London' campaign," added Jenkins. "But they have been replaced by approximately 500,000 Games ticket holders, many of whom are Londoners, all of whom are here because they've come to watch sport."

"They are not necessarily interested in London as a tourist destination."

Jail for Hong Kongers after huge Australia cocaine bust

SYDNEY, 4 Aug — Two men from Hong Kong were on Friday handed lengthy jail terms in Australia after importing Aus\$173 million (US\$181 million) of cocaine hidden in lawnmowers. Lau Pak Kwan, 34, was jailed for 20 years while Yim Yiu Chi, 36, was sentenced to 19 years for their part in one of the largest cocaine seizures ever made by Australian police. A third man from Sydney, Samuel Hotin Yung, 21, was jailed for 11 years. All three pleaded guilty to importing a commercial quantity of a border-controlled drug.

Their sentencing came just days after Australian police seized half a billion dollars worth of crystal methamphetamine and heroin after smashing

another international drugs syndicate, also allegedly run by Hong Kong men. "While all of you were acting on the part of others superior to you in your organisations, your participation was active and essential to those organisations," Justice Terry

Forrest said in the Victorian Supreme Court. "It is my duty to impose long-term imprisonment for your roles."

More than 200 kilograms of the drug was found in a shipping container holding eight ride-on lawnmowers packed in individual crates at Melbourne on 19 August last year.

The ship had travelled from Brazil via Hong Kong. Police then carried out a controlled delivery to an address in central Melbourne which led to the arrest of one of the men, with the two others subsequently caught. At the time, police said it was fifth-largest seizure of cocaine ever in Australia and the biggest haul in Victorian state history.

Glazers may make a killing on Man Utd investment

LONDON, 4 Aug — Manchester United Ltd's owners stand to make about three times their investment in the British soccer club if it successfully goes public. The club, one of the most popular in the world, has kicked off the marketing for its US initial public offering, which will value the club at \$3.3 billion if the sale is at the high end of the pricing range of \$16-to-\$20 per share. The owners, the Glazer family, bought the team for 790 million pounds (\$1.2 billion) in 2005 in a leveraged buyout. In terms of equity, the Florida-based family, whose other interests include shopping centers and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers football team, has invested at least \$21.1 million pounds (\$813.7 million) in Manchester United.

Through the IPO, they will initially get up to \$167

million from their sale of 8.3 million shares. They will also still own 89.8 percent of the shares, which will be worth nearly \$3 billion at a \$20 a share price. The Glazers have already received a 10 million pound dividend, which was used to pay back money they borrowed from the club in 2008. The huge profit for the family could make Manchester United the latest poster child for potential problems faced by companies that become targets of leveraged buyouts. To critics, such deals load companies with debt to supercharge the

owners' profits, while sometimes leaving the companies worse off than they were before.

The risk may be greater for a sports team, where finances can turn on how well the team does on the field, which can depend on a club having enough money to buy and pay top players. Poor performance can quickly feed through to lower revenue from ticket sales and TV rights, and eventually hurt commercial revenue from sponsorships and sales of merchandise, such as team shirts.—Reuters

Toyota says April-June quarterly profit \$3.71 bn

TOKYO, 4 Aug — Toyota said on Friday that its fiscal first-quarter profit skyrocketed to \$3.71 billion as the Japanese auto giant recovered from last year's quake-tsunami disaster.

The company said it earned 290.3 billion yen between April and June, up from just 1.16 billion yen a year ago—the first full quarter after Japan was devastated by the 11 March natural disasters that dented production and demand. Sales in the period shot up nearly 60 percent to 5.50 trillion yen, the automaker said. Its operating profit reached 353.14 billion yen, swinging back into the black after an operating loss of 107.96 billion yen a year ago.

Toyota kept its annual net profit forecast at 760 billion yen on sales of 22.0 trillion yen. "In all regions, vehicle sales increased significantly due to strong recovery of demand which had suffered last year from the lack of supply caused by the Great East Japan Earthquake," Senior Managing Officer Takahiko Ijichi said in statement.—Internet

3.5 inch home error costs \$24,850 to repair

A Canadian couple said they are facing \$25,000 in costs to repair a 3 1/2-inch error in the placement of their half-constructed home.

Steven Boyd and Karen Bursley said the Conception Bay South, Newfoundland, town council told them the house they are building is 3.5 inches too close to a neighbouring property and they must now pay \$25,000 to correct the error or buy more property to render it moot, the Canadian Broadcasting Corp reported.

Officials said local zoning laws require homes to be 59 inches from neighbouring properties, but Boyd and Bursley received an exemption to be only 51.15 inches away. However, a construction error

resulted in the home being only 49.6 inches away from the property line.

The council has issued a stop-work order on the home's construction until the issue is resolved. "We're devastated, obviously," Bursley said. "We have thousands of dollars invested in a home that we can't proceed with."

Bursley said fixing the error would cost \$25,000 and their neighbours want the same amount to move their property line. "Our only other avenue of appeal is to go through the municipal appeals board, which right now at this point in time there's a wait list of well over a year," Bursley said.

Zoo chief Lilik Kristianto said the orangutans would smoke any lit cigarettes thrown into the cage.

"At first they looked anxious and drained, but after two days they looked better and have started to play in the trees on the 300-square-

metre (3,229-square-foot) area," Lilik said.

Daniek Hendarto, conservation program coordinator for the Jakarta Animal Aid Network's Centre for Orangutan Protection said blood tests administered on 3 July found Tori and Didik were both suffering from hepatitis and tuberculosis.

"We should focus on disciplining visitors. We have put up signs prohibiting

visitors from throwing cigarettes into the apes' enclosure, but they keep doing it when nobody is looking. They think smoking orangutans are funny, hence they do it over and over again without knowing that the outcome could be fatal," Hendarto said.

He said the orangutans may remain on the island permanently to keep them away from cigarettes.

Air Force plane lands in wrong place

The US Air Force said it is investigating after a C-17 cargo plane that landed at an airport about 10 miles from its intended destination.

The Air Force said the plane landed Friday at Peter O Knight Airport in Tampa, about 10 miles from MacDill

Air Force Base, where it was supposed to land, the *Tampa Bay Times* reported.

"I'm quite sure the crew was embarrassed," said Deric Dymerski, president of Atlas Aviation, which runs ground operations at Peter O. Knight Airport.

"They weren't on our frequency. They just showed up," he said. "They obviously, well, I'm speculating, mistook it — all appearances are they mistook the airport for MacDill Air Force Base."

The Air Mobility Command at Scott Air Force

Base in Illinois said the aircraft was en route to the base following Central Command operations in southwest Asia.

Maj James Bressendorf, AMC public affairs executive officer, said he could not provide details of the mission or the mistaken landing because the investigation is ongoing.

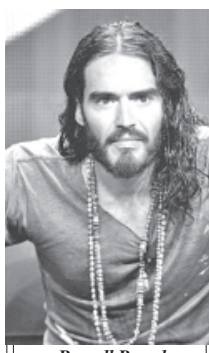

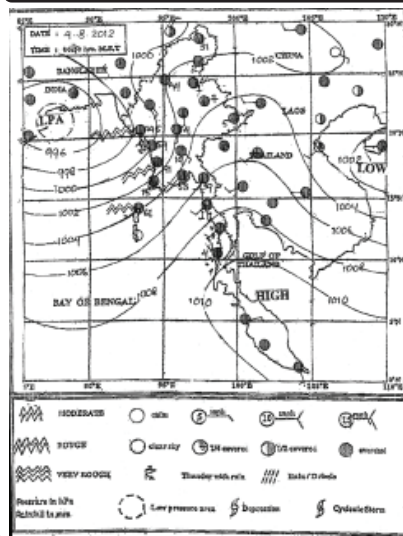

Athletics: Bolt taster for fastest women on day two

LONDON, 4 Aug — After a rip-roaring first day of action in the athletics, the London Olympics gets its first glimpse of the biggest name in the sport on Saturday when Usain Bolt takes to the track for the 100 metres heats. The Jamaican defending champion has a chance to lay to rest any doubts about his fitness before the title of fastest woman in the world is decided later in the evening in the women's 100 metres final.

Over 116 years the Olympic 100 metres final has produced drama, pain, controversy, disillusionment, incredulity and unbridled joy — all crammed into a race lasting little longer than it takes to say "Baron Pierre de Coubertin." —REUTERS

The race for the men's title is expected to be a battle between three Jamaicans — Bolt, Asafa Powell and Yohan Blake — and two Americans — Tyson Gay and Justin Gatlin — with the same two countries are expected vie for the women's gold. American Carmelita Jeter installed herself as favorite with a run of 10.83 seconds in the heats, but defending champion Shelly-Ann Fraser and her fellow Jamaican Veronica Campbell-Brown will be out to keep the title in the Caribbean.

In the wake of Tirumesh Dibaba's sensational defense of her women's 10,000 metre title on Friday, her fellow Ethiopian Kenenisa Bekele has a chance to outdo her with a bid for an unprecedented third successive gold in the men's race. That will pitch him against Mo Farah, who is hoping to become the first Briton to win a long distance gold and possibly grab the first gold for the hosts in the Olympic Stadium. Jessica Ennis might beat him to it, however, having ridden a huge wave of local support to take a 184-point lead into the final three events in the heptathlon. There will certainly be a new champion in the men's long jump after Panama's Irving Saladino made a premature exit in qualifying despite only seven competitors getting over the eight metres mark.

World indoor champion Mauro Vinicius da Silva of Brazil and American Marquise Goodwin led the way but Greg Rutherford and Christopher Tomlinson will be hoping to medal for the hosts. The women's discus looks as wide open as it was in Beijing four years ago. Cuban Yarelys Barrios qualified in first place but one good throw could win the title for any of the finalists.

The first athletics gold medal of the day will be won outside the stadium in the 20 km walk on a circuit which goes back and forth in front of Buckingham Palace, with Russia's Valeriy Borchin favorite to defend his title. — Reuters

Olympic women's basketball: France's last-second three-pointer breaks hosts' dream of first win

LONDON, 4 Aug — French Celine Dumerc's two three-pointers broke hosts Britain's dream of taking their first ever Olympic basketball victory here on Friday in the women's event in London. Dumerc, who finished with 14 points, made a shot from beyond the arc with 5.6 seconds remaining in regulation to send the game into overtime. It was also Dumerc who made a three-pointer with 0.2 seconds left in overtime to give France an 80-77 victory. Sandrine Gruda and Edwige Lawson-Wade added 16 points apiece for France, which improved to an unbeaten 4-0 record in Group B and will play Russia on Sunday.

Johannah Leedham had 29 points and eight rebounds to lead Britain, which has lost all four of its games. Nevriye Yilmaz scored 16 points and Esmeral Tuncluer added 12, leading Turkey to an 82-55 thumping of China in a Group A match. Turkey never trailed and improved to 3-1 to wrap up a spot in the quarterfinals after Wednesday's 58-89 loss to the United States.

Chen Nan scored a match-high 19 points and was the only Chinese player to reach double figures. Already qualified for the quarterfinals before the match, China will play against the US team which they had never beaten at Olympics.

Australia's Elizabeth Cabbage became the star of the day as she dunked in the match Australia beat Russia 70-66.

The 20-year-old Aussie maybe the first female player to dunk in an Olympic match as FIBA couldn't confirm Cabbage caught the ball at the top of the lane from teammate Kristi Harrower with 6:14 left in the third quarter, took one dribble to the basket for the one-handed dunk. The dunk in the middle of a 12-0 run that gave Australia a 44-33 lead. Russia battled back to close within 61-58 with 4:22 left in the game on Becky Hammon's three-pointer.

Australia responded extending its lead back up to 68-62 on Jenna O'Hea's three-pointer with 1 minute 27 seconds left. Hammon's basket with 50 seconds left made it 68-66 before Cabbage hit two free throws to seal the victory.

In Friday's other matches, Ana Lelas scored 23 and Sandra Mandir added 18 to help Croatia beat Angola 75-56 for its first victory in women's basketball at the Olympics, which also kept Croatia's chances to advance open. Canada defeated Brazil 79-73 and got enough points to guarantee a spot in quarterfinals with two wins while the United States beat Czech Republic 88-61 and increased its Olympic winning streak to 37 matches. — Xinhua

NAY PYI TAW, 4 Aug—Vice-President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Dr Sai Mauk Kham, accompanied by Union ministers and deputy ministers, left here by air yesterday morning and arrived at Sittway Airport at 8 am.

The Vice-President and party were welcomed by Rakhine State Chief Minister U Hla Maung Tin and departmental officials.

At the airport lounge, the State Chief Minister reported on loss and damages in the riots of Rakhine State, relief, supplies and rehabilitation tasks, undertakings for restoring peace and stability of the state, constitution of the Peace and Stability, Relief and Rehabilitation Supervisory Committee, opening of relief camps, arrival of victims at the relief camps due to the riots and present situations, supply of relief items, acceptance of donations and relief items and distributions, opening of schools in the state, health care services, construction of tents and houses, systematic rehabilitation works, training of vocational courses for long-term guarantee of earning incomes, and microfinance works for odd-job people.

Union Minister for Border Affairs Lt-Gen Thein Htay also reported on cooperation with NGOs for restoring security in the state, undertaking the emergency rescue works, ongoing tasks of present relief works and carrying out of rehabilitation tasks, and returning the areas to normalcy, management for enabling the local people

to restore original livelihoods, requirements of current process, requirements for creating the harmonious society, creation of new job opportunities, plans to build health and infrastructures, and cooperation with internal and international social organizations and foreign countries on a basis of mutual understanding and consideration.

After asking what he wanted to know the Vice-President gave necessary instructions on works.
