NAY PYI TAW, 25 Aug—President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar U Thein Sein, accompanied by General Hla Htay Win of Defence Services Commander-in-Chief's Office, Union Ministers U Myint Hlaing, U Ohn Myint, U Thein Nyunt, U Aung Kyi, U Win Myint, Dr Mya Aye and Dr Pe Thet Khin, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Myint Swe, Commander of Yangon Command Maj-Gen Hsan Oo, region ministers, and departmental heads, attended a ceremony to provide grains and cash assistance for agricultural development of Yangon Region at Kayan Township General Administration Department at 8.20 am today.

It was also attended by departmental personnel, members of social organizations and local farmers.

Yangon Region Chief Minister U Myint Swe presented brief report on salient facts about Yangon Region, projects to be implemented in 2012-2013 fiscal year for rural development and poverty alleviation, rainfall and progress of monsoon paddy cultivation in August, condition of floods due to the rains and supervision for re-cultivation of damaged farmlands by forming committees at different levels and assistance to flood victims.

Union Minister for Agriculture and Irrigation U Myint Hlaing explained measures for agricultural development of Yangon Region. He recommended a focus on quick win as agricultural is instrumental to rural

development and poverty alleviation scheme, systematic reforms in line with five-point instructions of the President, establishment of quality agricultural zones

In his instructions, President U Thein Sein said that they were there to lend a helping hand to local people who are in difficulties for a while due to flood. The visit is mainly

aimed at providing financial assistance to them to be able to purchase grains, and to render assistance to flood victims for their livelihood, education and health.

NAY PYI TAW, 25 Aug—Hydropower Department of the Ministry of Electric Power No. 1 and the Myanmar citizen's owned Virtue Land Co Ltd signed MoU on implementing Yangon Coal-Fired Power Plant through the BOT system yesterday.

The MoU is the first step to carry out the assessment to potential for building the coal fired power plant.

The signing ceremony was held at the Myat Tawwin Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw Hotel Zone here yesterday.

In his key-note address at the ceremony, Union Minister for Electric Power No. 1 U Zaw Min said that the ministry has been carrying of power plants projects with the local investment through the BOT system and with the

foreign direct investment through the JV/BOT systems to fulfill the power needs of the country.

Director-General of the Hydropower Department U Kye Soe and responsible personnel of the Virtue Land Co Ltd signed the MoU and exchanged notes.

The ceremony ceremony was also attended by Union Minister for Finance and Revenue U Hla Tun, Attorney-General of the Union Dr Tun Shin and deputy ministers, the directors-general and managing directors and the chairman and members of the Virtue Land Co Ltd.

The MoU is the first phase of the project to carry out the assessment to the potential for the plant which would be equipped with two 150 MW generators.— MNA

China willing to promote military ties with US: senior army officer

military ties, says a senior Chinese military officer. Cai Yingting, a deputy chief of the general staff of the People's Liberation Army, made the remarks on

Thursday while meeting with US Deputy Secretary of Defence Ashton Carter at Pentagon. Cai, who arrived in the United States on Monday for a visit, said the two nations have made key and positive progress in developing bilateral relations since the Obama administration came to power in 2009. The top leaders of the two countries have reached important consensus to establish a new type of big power relations, he said, adding that the two sides should be committed to the principle of equality, mutual benefit and win-win cooperation while developing inter-military ties.

Saying the US strategy in the Asia-Pacific region is not aimed at containing China, Carter voiced his country's hope that China continues to be its cooperation partner. He called on the two sides to work together to find a way to ensure their development and prosperity through cooperation. Also on Thursday, Cai met with Admiral James Winnefeld,

vice chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, and General Lloyd Austin III, the US Army's vice chief of staff. During his talks with Winnefeld, Cai said the two countries should prevent their military relations from suffering major setbacks.

Winnefeld said that, as conflicts and frictions between big powers are inevitable, it is important for both sides to enhance dialogues, step up strategic mutual trust and avert misjudgment.

While meeting with Austin, Cai proposed that the two countries should promote mutual trust and cooperation between their armed forces, and properly tackle the obstacles that are undermining healthy and stable development of inter-military ties.

Austin said it is important to establish a long-term and fruitful inter-military relationship between the United States and China, which will benefit both sides.

BERLIN, 25 Aug — German Chancellor Angela Merkel on Friday stressed that Germany would support efforts by the Greek government to solve its debt crisis "step by step," urging Greece meanwhile to meet its bailout commitments.

"Greece sacrificed a lot," Merkel said after talks with Greek Prime Minister Antonis Samaras.

Samaras arrived in Germany on Friday for talks with Merkel over his country's future in the eurozone. He was expected to ask for an extension of two years for Greece's implementation of its economic reforms in order to have some "breathing space."— Xinhua

Two dead, nine others injured in NYC Empire State Building shooting, perpetrator identified

NEW YORK, 25 Aug — Authorities in New York City say two people died and nine others injured in a shooting early on Friday outside the Empire State Building in midtown Manhattan and the dead included the gunman who was later killed by police. The perpetrator was identified as Jeffrey Johnson, 56, who used to work at Hazan Import Corp, a women's fashion accessories company, near the iconic Empire State Building. Johnson was laid off one year ago.

New York City Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said at a news conference at the scene that the shooting happened near the 34th Street and the Fifth Avenue, where the Empire State Building stands, at about 9:03 am, local time. Johnson reportedly followed one of his former co-workers to the area, opened fire with a .45-caliber pistol and shot the victim on the head three times after a dispute, killing the co-worker. The shooting was witnessed by one construction worker who alerted the police officers nearby. The police officers approached the gunman and shot him dead in a shootout.

The gunfire came less than two weeks after a knife-wielding man was shot dead by police near Times Square, another tourist attraction in the midtown Manhattan. Authorities say police shot 51-year-old Darrius Kennedy after he lunged at officers with a kitchen knife on 11 August. Kennedy was smoking marijuana in Times Square in

the afternoon of the day when officers first approached, police said. In Friday's shootout, nine others were also injured, but none of them was seriously hurt, said New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg at the news conference at the scene. Mayor Bloomberg also admitted that some of the injured "may be accidentally shot by the police" in the shootout.

While addressing the news conference, Mayor Bloomberg called the incident a "terrible tragedy," and said "We are not immune to the national problem of gun violence." The injured were hospitalized. They were

expected to survive and recover quickly, said Mayor Bloomberg. The shooting led to a chaos in the midtown Manhattan as it took place at a very packed area of the city just after the morning rush hour.

Both the 34th Street and the Fifth Avenue were cordoned off, causing temporary traffic disruptions, while helicopters hovered above in the sky. A guard at the Empire State Building, however, said the incident didn't involve the parts of the building where tourists gather to visit the landmark skyscraper.

Mexican police shoot two US Embassy staff in botched chase

MEXICO CITY, 25 Aug — Two US Embassy employees were shot at and wounded by Mexican police on Friday after they were caught up in a police chase on the outskirts of the capital, Mexico's Navy said. Police fired on the vehicle in which the embassy employees were travelling, which carried diplomatic plates, after the driver veered out of the way when he saw the officers' weapons. "At that moment those in the ... (police) vehicle opened fire on the diplomatic vehicle," the Navy said in a statement. "Moments later, three other vehicles joined the chase and fired shots at the US Embassy vehicle."

Two employees were taken to a hospital for treatment and their injuries were not life-threatening, it said. The US government said the two employees were in stable condition. The US Embassy in Mexico said in a statement that the diplomatic vehicle was "ambushed by a group of individuals" and "sustained heavy damage" as a result of the attack. Speaking on condition of anonymity, a Mexican government security official said federal police had

thought the vehicle belonged to a group of suspected kidnappers they were pursuing, and opened fire on it. "This was all because of a mix-up," the official said. The Navy said the officers involved were being questioned.

"We are working with Mexican authorities to investigate an incident this morning in which two employees of our embassy in Mexico City came under attack by unknown assailants," said State Department spokesperson Victoria Nuland.

"They are receiving appropriate medical care and are in stable condition." The incident took place on a highway on the southern outskirts of Mexico City close to the city of Cuernavaca,

authorities. Roadside shootings have been a feature of the violence linked to drug gangs that has overshadowed President Felipe Calderon's six years in office.

Gangs have been known to set up fake military checkpoints to ambush rival groups. Last year, two US Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents were shot by hitmen on a major Mexican highway. One of the agents died.

Student's iPhone app helps Mars rover

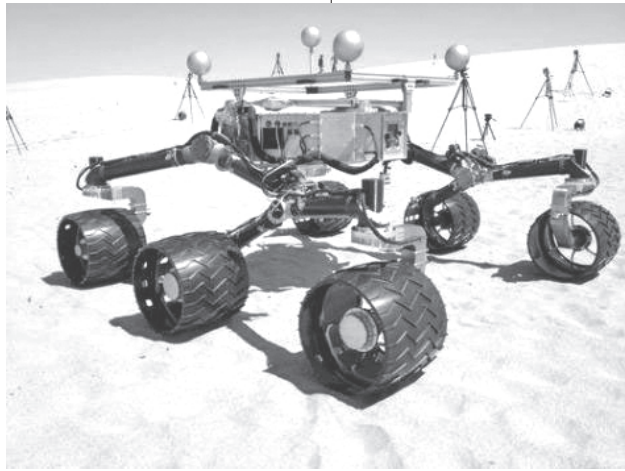
WEST LAFAYETTE, 25 Aug—A 19-year-old Purdue University sophomore from Los Angeles played a big role in enabling the first steps of NASA's Curiosity rover on Mars, the school said.

Riley Avron, working as an intern with NASA engineers training this summer to drive the Mars rover Curiosity, noted the slow progress caused by their having to spend several minutes entering arcane code into their computers before every maneuver.

So Avron solved the problem by whipping up a custom-designed iPhone app that makes driving a one-ton robot as easy as a toy remote control car, a Purdue release reported on Friday.

"They were spending so much time with their face buried in a computer that they couldn't pay attention to the rover's progress through the simulated Mars

landscape — the real reason they were out there," Avron said. "With the iPhone it was quick and easy, and they



could really learn what the rover was capable of doing."

Avron has returned to Purdue from his internship at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena to pursue his studies, but JPL engineers still use his app regularly to drive Curiosity's earthbound twin Scarecrow through tough maneuvers on

Mars Science Laboratory mission team members used the Scarecrow rover in mobility tests on California sand dunes in preparation for operating the Curiosity rover.

"If the scientists want Curiosity to go through a crater, over a rock or along a ridge, then engineers absolutely have to know if it can do it without rolling over or getting stuck," Avron said. "After all, there's no AAA tow truck to call for help up on Mars."—Internet

Boston subways to see bioterror test

BOSTON, 25 Aug—A series of tests in Boston's subways will measure the performance of new bioterrorism sensors developed to detect biological agents, US officials said.

The "Detect-to-Protect" Bio Detection project will assess several sensors developed by US companies and designed to alert authorities to the presence of biological material, the US Department of Homeland Security's Science and Technology Directorate reported on Friday.

These devices with "trigger" and "confirmer" sensors are intended to identify and confirm the release of biological agents within minutes, it said.

The tests will see the release of a small amount of an innocuous killed bacterium in subway stations in the Boston area to test how well the sensors work.

After the subway stations close, scientists will



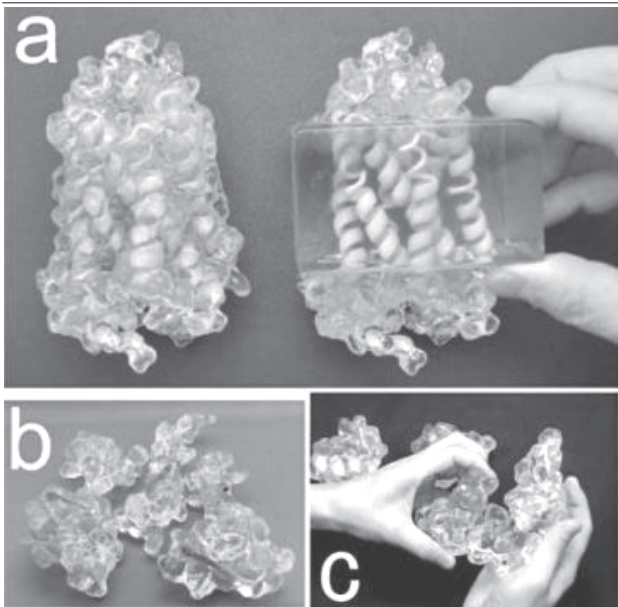
spray small quantities of killed *Bacillus subtilis* in subway tunnels.

The common, food-grade bacterium is widely found in soil, water, air and decomposing plant matter and, even when living, is considered nontoxic to humans, animals and plants, directorate scientists said.

"While there is no known threat of a biological attack on subway systems in the United States, the S&T testing

will help determine whether the new sensors can quickly detect biological agents in order to trigger a public safety response as quickly as possible," Anne Hultgren, manager of the project, said.

The testing will continue periodically for the next six months, officials said, and will be monitored by the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority as well as state and local public health officials.—Internet

'Squishy' model shows cell biology

WASHINGTON, 25 Aug—A new soft, transparent and squishy silicone model could offer biology researchers hands-on help to learn the secrets of molecules, its Japanese developer said. Created by Masaru Kawakami a biophysicist researcher at the Japan Advanced Institute of Science and Technology, it is mostly transparent and easy to manipulate, intended to help researchers more intuitively understand protein structures, positions, and interactions.

The model, described in the American Institute of Physics journal *Review of Scientific Instruments*, will enable researchers to quickly and collaboratively see, touch and test ideas about molecular interactions and the behavior of proteins, Kawakami said.

"Because my new model is soft, users can deform the model and experience ligand binding or protein-protein association, which has never been possible with other physical molecule models," he said. "I believe my model would be an effective discussion tool for the classroom or laboratory to stimulate inspired learning."—Internet

Flat lens can create a perfect image

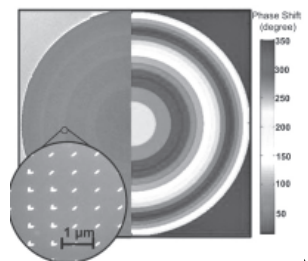
CAMBRIDGE, 25 Aug—An ultrathin, flat lens with a nanometer-thick layer of gold can focus light without imparting the distortions of conventional lenses, US engineers say.

The flat lens is essentially two-dimensional at only 60 nanometers thickness but focusing power approaches the ultimate physical limit determined by the laws of light diffraction, Harvard University researchers reported on Thursday.

A very thin wafer of silicon is plated with a nanometer-thick layer of gold, which is stripped away in places leaving behind an array of V-shaped structures. When a laser is shone onto the flat lens, the structures act as nanoantennas that capture incoming light and

hold onto it briefly before releasing it again.

Those delays, precisely tuned across the surface of the lens, change the direction of the light in the same way that a thick glass lens would.

However, the flat lens eliminates optical distortions such as the "fish-eye" effect that results from conventional wide-angle lenses.

Operating at wavelengths commonly used in fiber-optic communications, the new device is completely scalable, from near-infrared to terahertz wavelengths, and simple to manufacture, the researchers said.

"In the future we can potentially replace all the bulk [lens] components in the majority of optical systems with just flat surfaces," study lead author Francesco Aieta, a visiting graduate student from the Universita Politecnica delle Marche in Italy, said.

"It certainly captures the imagination."—Internet

Logitech unveils washable PC keyboard

NEW ARK, 25 Aug—US computer peripheral maker Logitech says its newest keyboard is a boon for those who suffer spilled coffee accidents, because it's completely washable.

The Logitech Washable Keyboard K310 can stand anything from a light dusting to a rinse in the kitchen sink,



the company said in a release on Wednesday.

The keyboard can be hand washed repeatedly and can even be submerged — with the exception of the USB cable — in up to 11 inches of water, Logitech said.

Drainage holes at the back of the keyboard allow for easy drying while key characters are laser printed and UV coated to ensure the letters don't fade in the wash.

"We've all experienced that moment of distraction

— followed by panic, when a cup of coffee or a soda spills all over your keyboard," Sophie Le Guen, senior director of mice and keyboards at Logitech said.

"Because life and its messes will happen, regardless of how careful you are, Logitech designed the Logitech Washable Keyboard K310 to look and function like new, even over time," she said.

The suggested retail price is \$39.99.

Storms spoil NASA's 2nd launch bid for satellites

CAPE CANAVERAL, 25 Aug—Thunderstorms have ruined NASA's second attempt to launch a pair of science satellites. For the second day in a row, NASA had to halt the countdown for its Radiation Belt Storm Probes. Lightning and thick storm clouds prevented the

unmanned rocket from taking off early Saturday from Cape Canaveral. On Friday, a tracking beacon on the rocket held up the flight.

NASA says it will try again on Sunday. The twin satellites are designed to study Earth's harsh radiation belts. Scientists say the two-year mission will improve space forecasting. The goal is to better guard against solar storms. Spacecraft can be damaged, and astronauts hurt, from severe solar outbursts. Life here on the planet also can be disrupted.—Internet

Tap water in neti pots linked to deaths from 'brain-eating' amoeba

NEW YORK, 25 Aug—A popular treatment for sinus congestion has been linked to a rare brain-eating amoeba, which the FDA has linked to two deaths in the US.

The Food and Drug Administration has warned consumers about using tap water in neti pots—a device with a long spout that is used to rinse nasal passages with a saline solution.

The agency warned that un-filtered tap water can contain bacteria, including amoebas. While stomach acid is quick to kill the bacteria ingested through the digestive system, the "bugs" could stay

alive in the nasal passage and cause serious infections, according to the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention. A warning on the FDA website posted on Thursday states: "Improper use of neti pots may have caused two deaths in 2011 in Louisiana from a rare brain infection that the state health department linked to tap water contaminated with an amoeba called *Naegleria fowleri*."

Naegleria fowleri is also referred to as the "brain-eating amoeba." A 2010 study from Stanford University states that the amoeba can cause primary amebic

meningoencephalitis in humans, of which 98 per cent of cases end in death. On average, victims die of the infection only one week after symptoms such as headaches, fever, nausea and vomiting appear, according to the study.

The FDA warning extends to all nasal-rinsing devices, which include bulb syringes and squeeze bottles.

While the devices are generally safe, the agency said they must be used and cleaned properly.

The FDA also warned that some manufacturers' instructions recommend

using tap water in the devices, while others warn against it. Some manufacturers do not provide any instructions or information with the items, the FDA noted.

It's recommended to use distilled, sterile or filtered water in any sinus-rinsing product. Consumers can also

use boiled tap water that's been cooled. "The nose is like a car filter or home air filter that traps debris. Rinsing the nose with saline solution is similar to using saline eye drops to rinse out pollen," said the FDA's Dr Steven Osborne on the agency's website.—Internet

Dow, S&P snap six week winning streak

NEW YORK, 25 Aug—US stocks rebounded on Friday, wrapping up a dismal week on positive note, but major indexes were still lower for the whole week.

When the market closed, the Dow Jones Industrial Average jumped 100.51 points, or 0.77 percent, to 13,157.97. The Standard & Poor's 500-stock Index gained 9.05 points, or 0.65 percent, to 1,411.13. The Nasdaq Composite Index climbed 16.39 points, or 0.54 percent, to 3,069.79.

Friday's rally came after the surface of a letter from Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke to Republican Representative Darrell Issa, saying that he thinks the central bank can do more to help the economy.

"There is scope for further action by the Federal Reserve to ease financial conditions and strengthen the recovery," Bernanke says in the letter.

The US central bank head also noted that the Fed has had to deploy other means to strengthen the economy, such as buying bonds, as the interest rates have already stayed at record lows.

His words fueled the expectations for further stimulus and push major indexes higher.

Food inspection agency issues mango warning

VANCOUVER, 25 Aug—The Canadian Food Inspection Agency is warning Canadians that a batch of mangoes sold between 12 July and 14 August of this summer may be contaminated with salmonella.

"There have been several confirmed illnesses associated with the consumption of these mangoes," the organization said in a statement released on Friday afternoon.

The affected mangoes came with a sticker that reads PLU# 4959 and were sold in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Northwest Territories, Nunavut and Yukon.

The organization said Food contaminated with salmonella may not look or smell spoiled. But consumption of food contaminated with the bacteria can cause salmonellosis, a foodborne illness.

Young children, the elderly and people with

weakened immune systems are particularly susceptible and salmonellosis could cause serious and even deadly infections for those individuals.

In otherwise healthy people, salmonellosis may cause short-term symptoms such as high fever, severe headache, vomiting, nausea,

doctor and those who believe they may have bought the affected mangoes should contact their retailers to check.

The voluntary recall by the Vancouver-based importer, North American Produce Sales, is being monitored by the CFIA.

Happiness gene discovered—but it only works for women

LONDON, 25 Aug—Scientists have discovered a gene that makes people happy, but it is said to work only in women.

The findings could help explain why women are often happier than men, the predominantly female team of US researchers said.

The study focused on a gene called MAOA that affects the levels of feel-good chemicals in the brain.

Almost 350 men and women were asked how happy they were and gave a saliva sample that was tested for their DNA.

The MAOA gene comes in two versions, a highly active and a less active type.

Women with the less active type were happier than others, the researchers found—and those with two copies of the "happy" type of MAOA had the sunniest dispositions of all.

Some 59 percent of the women studied had one copy and a lucky 17 percent had two—leaving only around one in four women lacking the happiness gene.

Many of the men in the study carried the gene but were no happier than others.

University of South Florida researcher Dr Henian Chen said this could be because its effects are cancelled out by testosterone—but boys may benefit.

"Maybe men are happier before adolescence because their testosterone level is lower," the *Daily Mail* quoted him as saying.

The link was true even when other factors affecting wellbeing—from age to income—were taken into account.

But there was a downside—the happy version of the gene has been linked to alcoholism and anti-social behaviour.

"You may be more likely to get into trouble but still be happier than the next person," Dr Chen said.—Internet

Cup of tea with cucumber sandwich 'best way to keep cool'

LONDON, 25 Aug—Having a cup of tea with a cucumber sandwich is the ideal way to cool off in a heat wave, say scientists.

According to the researchers, however tempting ice creams may be, they will not work to beat the heat.

Even water should be drunk at room temperature rather than ice cold during the hottest days of the year, a newspaper reported.

While the British colonial favourite of cucumber sandwiches works best during summer, the crust free, white bread versions served

in posh hotels and tea rooms, do not seem to work best.

Instead, having them on whole wheat bread with a slab of mayonnaise and sea salt on top works best, said food industry experts at the American Chemical Society (ACS) annual meeting.

Fruit and vegetables with high water content are particularly good for hot weather, which includes cucumber but also watermelon and celery.

Cocoa may help aging brain function

SANTA MONICA, 25 Aug—People who ate high or moderate levels of cocoa flavanols for two months improved significantly in some thinking assessment tests, a US food expert says.

"A study in the journal *Hypertension* found elderly people with mild cognitive impairment given dietary flavanols from chocolate did better on cognition tests," Phil Lempert, a food industry analyst, trend watcher and creator of supermarketguru.com, said in a statement. "They also experienced a decrease in insulin resistance, which helps regulate blood sugar, as well as improvements in blood pressure, compared with those who consumed only small amounts."

Flavanols are a type of flavonoid—the phytochemical associated with the many health benefits of cocoa, Lempert said.

A variety of research projects demonstrate cocoa's health benefits but it's important to understand that not all chocolate products are the same, Lempert said.

"All chocolate contains some flavanols, but it is important to choose minimally processed dark chocolate with a cacao content upwards of 70 percent," Lempert said. "The higher the cocoa percentage, the more flavanols and antioxidants it contains. You can also purchase cacao or cocoa powder that can be used in a variety of ways."

Hong Kong apartment fetches record \$61 million

HONG KONG, 25 Aug—A luxury apartment in Hong Kong has sold for a record HK\$470 million (\$61 million), making it the priciest condominium in the Chinese city and possibly the second most expensive in the world, reports said. An unidentified buyer paid the HK\$75,806 (\$9,773) per-square-foot price for the 6,200-square-foot (576-square-metre) unit at Opus Hong Kong in the upmarket Peak residential area, *Hong Kong Economic Journal* and *Sing Tao Daily* said.

The whopping price for the unit, which takes up the entire eighth floor of the 12-storey building, is believed to be Asia's most expensive apartment and the world's second most costly after London's One Hyde Park, *Sing Dao Daily* said. The building was designed by the Pritzker Prize-winning architect Frank Gehry. Developer Swire Properties declined to confirm the deal. "We have no information to share at this point," spokeswoman May Lam-Kobayashi told *AFP*. She added however that tenants recently leased another unit at the property for HK\$850,000 a month.

Local media reported that the sale beat the city's previous record price of HK\$360 million paid for a unit at another luxury property last year. "This is definitely a new record price for any Hong Kong apartment," Centaline research head Wong Leung-sing told *AFP*. "But we think it's an isolated case as this is an ultra luxury condo," Wong said, adding that it could not be used as a yardstick to gauge investors' appetite for luxury apartments in the Asian financial hub.

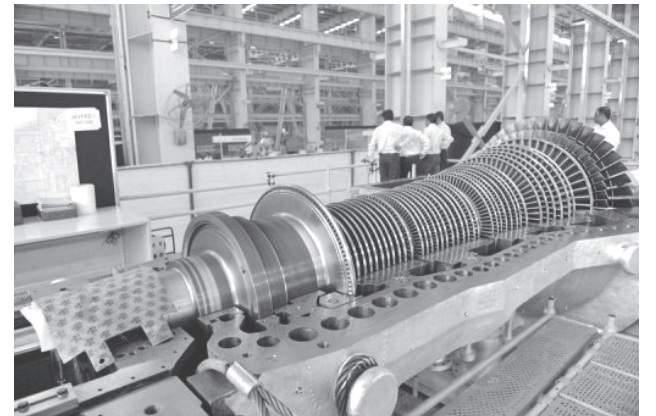
Property prices in Hong Kong, famous for its sky-high rent and super-rich tycoons, have surged over the past few years due to record low interest rates and a flood of wealthy buyers from mainland China. The property market however has seen a slowdown this year, with sentiment hit by the eurozone crisis and plans to boost public housing. Even so, many residents complain they can no longer afford decent accommodation in the city of seven million people, and analysts say property ownership is out of reach even for the upper middle class.— *Internet*

India sets up investment panel as FDI slumps 78% in June

NEW DELHI, 25 Aug—India's government on Friday set up a panel to suggest ways to improve the climate for doing business in the country as figures showed foreign direct investment in India slid by 78 percent in June. The committee, headed by former Securities and Exchange Board of India chairman M Damodaran, will prepare a report within six months for submission to the Congress-led government, the corporate affairs ministry said. Overseas investors have increasingly been giving a wide berth to Asia's third-largest economy — until recently a sought-after investment destination.

They have been deterred by a string of graft scandals, red tape, high inflation, sharply slowing growth and the government's inability to further open up the economy in the face of fierce political opposition. The panel will include Indian industrial tycoons Anand Mahindra and Kumar Mangalam Birla "and come out with a detailed roadmap for improving the climate of business in India in a time-bound manner", the ministry said. The late evening announcement coincided with the release of official data earlier in the day showing foreign direct investment (FDI) in June tumbled to \$1.24 billion from \$5.66 billion in the same month a year earlier.

For the financial first quarter to June, FDI tumbled year-on-year by 67 percent to \$4.43 billion, according to the department, with big drops in construction, real estate, mining, and business and financial services. The central bank said on Thursday that India could help reverse the investment decline by shortening investment approval times and sorting out land acquisition issues. Central bank governor Duvvuri Subbarao cited the example of Singapore, an investment hub, to stress the importance of doing away with cumbersome rules that deter business.

"There is a need to make doing business easy by adopting models like the one in Singapore where multiple agencies/ministries sit together to quickly give a decision clearing investment projects," he said in the bank's annual report.

Experts say foreign investment is vital for India, which needs to fund a \$1 trillion scheme over the next five years to overhaul its dilapidated ports, airports, highways and other infrastructure seen as key to boosting growth. Among a host of stalled high-profile projects are South Korean steelmaker POSCO's plans to build a \$12 billion mill.

Ammonia leak sickens 17 at US meat plant

Houston, 25 Aug— At least 17 people were sickened on Friday in an ammonia leak at a northeast meat packing plant in the US state of Texas.

According to local TV channel ABC13, the leak occurred in the afternoon at the Pilgrim's Pride poultry plant in Mount Pleasant, about 176 km northeast of Dallas.

Seventeen people were sent to hospital for examination as a precaution, and no serious injuries or illnesses were found, a spokeswoman at Titus Regional Medical Centre in Mount Pleasant was quoted as saying.

The spokeswoman said the hospital had initially been told to expect as many as 40 people potentially exposed to the leak.— *Xinhua*

Four dead in Iraq attacks on Shiites

BAGHDAD, 25 Aug — Attacks on Shiites in Baghdad and north of the capital killed four people on Friday, after the conclusion of the Eid festival and as al-Qaeda claimed a series of attacks earlier in the summer. In the deadliest attack, two explosions struck the predominantly Shiite neighbourhood of Sadr City in north Baghdad at around 12:30 pm (0930 GMT) as worshippers were gathering for prayers on the Muslim day of rest. Three people were killed and at least eight were wounded, according to medics at nearby hospitals and an interior ministry official.

A police officer at the scene of the blasts said they were caused by mortar fire. All spoke on condition of anonymity. Among the wounded was Nasser al-Saadi, an official in the movement loyal to anti-US cleric Moqtada al-Sadr, the medics said. Another person was killed and three others wounded by

a roadside bomb targeting the home of a Shiite family in the town of Khan Beni Saad, 30 kilometres (18 miles) north of Baghdad, a police colonel and a medic at the main hospital in provincial capital Baquba said. Officials in the main northern city of Mosul, meanwhile, on Friday morning found four bodies, all of men in their 30s who had been shot in the head and chest. It was unclear why they had been targeted.

Both police First Lieutenant Mohammed al-Juburi and doctor Mahmud Haddad at Mosul General Hospital said the men appeared to have been killed late on Thursday. The violence came after the conclusion of the three-day festival of Eid, which had been relatively calm after violence during the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan left 409 people dead across Iraq. Friday's unrest takes to 242 the number of people killed in attacks nationwide this month, according to an *AFP*

tally based on reports from security and medical officials. On Wednesday, al-Qaeda's front group in Iraq in a statement posted on jihadist forums claimed to have carried out a series of attacks, mostly on security forces in the western province of Anbar in June and July.

The 43 attacks purportedly carried out by the Islamic State of Iraq (ISI) were largely in the form of bombings and shootings against Iraqi soldiers, police and anti-Qaeda militiamen known as the Sahwa, according to the statement. It comes after the ISI declared a campaign last month to retake territory it had abandoned in the years since the peak of Iraq's sectarian bloodshed between 2006 and 2008. Also in the early hours of Friday, six people were killed and 10 injured by a fire at a nightclub in central Baghdad, security and medical officials said. The blaze appeared to have been caused by an electrical fault.— *Internet*

Azerbaijan's trade within CIS exceeds 1.9 billion USD

BAKU, 25 Aug—The trade turnover between Azerbaijan and other members of the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) amounted to more than 1.9 billion US dollars during the first seven months of this year, customs authorities said on Friday. During the period, the country exported 617.7 million dollars of goods to other CIS countries and imported 1,301 million dollars, resulting in a negative balance of some 683 million dollars, according to a report released by the State Customs Committee.

In 2011, Azerbaijan's foreign trade turnover with its CIS counterparts totalled 5.498 billion US dollars, with exports and imports respectively at 2.925 billion dollars and 2.573 billion dollars. Oil products accounted for some 60 percent of Azerbaijan's exports to other CIS countries.

Former US crime kingpin sentenced to 218 years

LOS ANGELES, 25 Aug — Pierre Mercado, a former leader of US notorious Asian Boyz gang, was sentenced on Friday to 218 years in jail by a Los Angeles judge. Mercado, 38, was sentenced after he was found guilty on charges of four killings, five attempted murders and two kidnappings committed in what the gang called the "summer of madness" in 1995 in an attempt to make it the most feared gang in Los Angeles, said Deputy District Attorney Hoon Chun.

While most of other crime groups desired to make money through drug trafficking, the Asian Boyz was committed to burglaries and robberies, Chun said, adding that Mercado was the last member of the crime group to be put on trial. The Asian Boyz is an Asian American street gang formed in 1985 by Cambodian youths in southern California. Its branches spread across the United States.

Mercado, along with his older brother Marvin Mercado who was also a key gang member, fled to the Philippines shortly after the violent activities. They were arrested in 2007 and brought back to Los Angeles to stand trial. The older Mercado was convicted of eight murders and received last year eight life sentences without the possibility of parole.— *Xinhua*

Continuing Education

Hlaing Thinn

The following is the reproduction of Hlaing Thinn's article appeared in the annual magazine of Defence Services Technological Academy. Ed

Continuing Education, as its name implies, is life-long education. Today is what is called 'knowledge Age' and in knowledge age it goes without saying that continuing education is an inevitable way of life. It sounds like the latest development in 21st century education. However, for every Myanmar who is familiar with the story of U Gya Pwe (the Rev. Pestle)(sic) of Bagan Dynasty (over seven centuries ago,) it is by no means a modern concept.

The story went like this: once, an illiterate monk of over sixty-year of age disclosed to the King that he wanted to become learned and he needed *kankusan* (soapstone pencils) for that purpose. The King Kyaswa himself was erudite and enjoyed in giving lectures on Buddhist literature to his royal family and attendants. "How", quoth the King, "could an old wooden pestle procreate new shoots?" Nevertheless, the King donated *kankusan* to the monk. Unstoppable and unbowed, the monk went back to the monastery, endeavoured day and night to become learned and came back to the King holding a pestle to which small shoots were bound by strings!

Monks of light and leading from six institutions of Bagan asked him difficult problems from Holy Scriptures. The monk gave unequivocal answer to every question. When he, in turn, asked them, they were dumbfounded by his transcendent genius. He became famous with the name of **Ditha Pamauka** (the far-famed professor).

No single soul, before and since, had corroborated the theory of life-long education more brilliantly than Albert Einstein himself. In 1905, a twenty-six-year-old German Jew, Albert Einstein, had published a paper, "On the electrodynamics of moving bodies" which became known as the Special Theory of Relativity. In 1915, his General Theory of Relativity emerged. From that point onward, Einstein had destroyed the Newtonian cosmology, based upon the straight lines of Euclidean geometry and Galileo's notions of absolute time. (Actually Einstein's theory was confirmed after the tests made during the solar eclipse on 29 May, 1919.) When the actual announcement that the theory had been confirmed was made at the meeting of the Royal Society in London, A.N Whitehead who was present wrote:

We were the chorus commenting on the decree of destiny as disclosed in the development of a supreme incident. There was dramatic quality in the very staging: the traditional ceremonial, and in the background the picture of Newton to remind us that the greatest of scientific generalization was now, after more than two centuries, to receive its first modification...a great adventure in thought bad at last come home to shore.

But for most people, to whom Newtonian physics, with their straight lines and right angles, were perfectly comprehensible, relativity never became more than a vague source of unease. The postulate that spacetime is curved due to matter and energy seems to be beyond the compass of the ordinary human mind. Einstein asked us to think of gravity not a force acting between bodies but in terms of the shape, the curvature of four dimensional spacetime itself. In general relativity, gravity is the geometry of the universe. (Very recently, I happened to publish a book entitled "Universe" where it was attempted to explain Einstein's theory as much plainly as could be plausible. For further information, readers are referred to that book.)

Einstein's life was devoted to the quest not only for truth but for certitude. In scientific sense, he was a determinist. In the 1920s he found the indeterminacy principle of quantum mechanics not only unacceptable but abhorrent. For the rest of his life until his death in 1955 he

sought to refute it by trying to anchor physics in a unified field theory.

He wrote to his colleague, Max Born:

"You believe in a God who plays dice, and I in complete law and order in a world which objectively exists and which I, in a wildly speculative way, am trying to capture. I firmly believe but I hope that someone will discover a more realistic way or rather a more tangible basis than it has been my lot to find."

Einstein failed to produce a unified theory. But he best exemplified the life-long education.

Before Einstein died, a genius of his peer was born on Jan 8, 1942, in Oxford, England. Stephen William Hawking liked to recall that his birth was exactly 300 years after the date of Galileo, who is called the father of modern science.

After graduating from Oxford he went to Cambridge for his graduate studies in the field of cosmology. Shortly after his twenty-first birthday in January 1963, Hawking found that he had contracted a rare disease for which there was no known cure, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. Despite his huge physical handicap, Hawking would not allow himself to be discouraged in his studies. Although his disease had caused a great damage to his physical condition his brain was fortunately free from any effect of it. He became the most prominent physicist and mathematician in Britain and in 1979 Cambridge University gave him the prestigious title of Lucasian Professor of Mathematics that was once held by Sir Isaac Newton.

The story of Stephen Hawking is essentially a story of life-long education. Hawking has been working on the so-called Theory of Everything that Einstein had attempted and failed to produce. Hawking said he thought there was a good chance it would be found before long, leaving little for theoretical physicists like himself to do. Unable to walk, write, feed himself or raise his head if it tips forward, Stephen Hawking is still steadfastly clinging to his ever wearing-out thread of life with his unusual determination. The science world of our times is waiting and praying if Hawking becomes the 'someone' mentioned by Einstein in his letter to his friend, Max Born.

There might have been numerous people in our own country (albeit not of the stature of Einstein or Hawking) who refused to let go of learning simply because of the passage of youth. I would like to mention two ladies, from among my acquaintances. The former is the mother-in-law of my friend, Col. Nyan Tun Oo. *Aphwa*, as I call her, used to be the wife of the then prestigious government minister and at the same time a renowned writer non de plume of Ma Myat Lay. Even under such a cozy circumstance, she made and is still making out of the way efforts to get her degrees successively at her advanced age; first, B.A at the age of 46, then D.T at 48 and B.L at 52. She finished a librarian course at the age of 85 and now at the age of 87 she is attending a course of Diploma in Applied Psychology. She's some lady! The latter is the spouse of my first C.O. Ma Ma Thein, as I call her, was merely pre-matriculated when she got married to my C.O. It was not until she had given birth to her three offspring that she could manage to restart her education that was not terminated till she got her master of education degree.

Theory of education, as explained by our Director of Studies, who is also one of the best renowned educators of our country, is remarkable. On one of the inspection tours of the industrial training of final year cadets, Sayagy U Mg Mg Than addressed the cadets:

"The concept of education has changed of late. In previous times, a person who was graduated from a University

was called 'educated' person. Nowadays, knowledge is expanding more rapidly than ever before. That is why an educated man of today is less equipped with certitudes than an ancient man of Bagan Era. So our mission becomes not to produce 'educated' persons but to produce 'educable' persons. 'Educable person' means a person who is ready and still willing, even after graduation, to proceed his learning process throughout his whole life."

When one of my old friends, who has also been a part-time lecturer in our Academy, held a seminar on his M. Phil. papers, I addressed the cadets. I made my address in English:

"Good morning, gentlemen. I'm very pleased to have this opportunity of presenting U Khin Mg Chit who is the Deputy Director in Irrigation Department and also a candidate of M. Phil. Degree in our Academy. U Khin Mg Chit, after graduation from R.I.T, attended M.E. classes in R.I.T for two years and successfully passed the examinations. Unfortunately, however, he could not have managed to submit a thesis and was disqualified to be conferred an M.E. from R.I.T. Now, U Khin Mg Chit has been serving with our Academy in the capacity as a part-time lecturer and he is entitled to do toward a degree of M.Phil. Thus he has to submit six tenable papers and sit for an oral examination to defend his papers before a board of examiners. He has been an authority in concrete technology spending better part of his service life in the concrete laboratories. So, his papers on concrete technology will contribute to your benefit.

At the age of 53 and exactly 30 years after graduation, he is still, I'm pleased to witness, eager or enthusiastic to do towards another degree. It is a good example for the theory of continuing education or life-long education that we are constantly talking about. You must bear in mind that receiving your first degree is not the end of your studies. You have to study for your entire life and until and unless you acquire your doctorate your student-days will not be over.

One thing I forget to tell you. While in R.I.T, U Khin Mg Chit used to be C1 and me C2. You can imagine how smart he is. Be attentive and ask as many questions as you like.

So, may I request U Khin Mg Chit to take the floor and proceed with your programme. Thank you."

To my surprise and delight, owing to the enthusiasm of the cadets the seminar was not over until late in the afternoon.

U Khin Mg Chit is not the only candidate who is over 50 doing the graduate studies in our Academy. O/Lt. Col. Hla Thein, head of electrical engineering department of Military Technological College, and U Charlie Than, Engineer-in-Charge of Dala Dockyard are also doing toward their M.E.'s. We are giving every possible moral support to anybody who thinks himself never at the end of his tether in education.

On hearing about education, some might have thought of classrooms, lectures and examinations. This is not necessarily the case. Education simply means the quest for knowledge and, in most cases, it can be achieved through self-study. Most of the geniuses, past and present, are self-made. As long as one's pursuit of knowledge is ongoing it can be said one is undergoing the process of continuing education.

Avid for learning, Myanmar society is a society of continuing education. It is not without reason that I make this assertion. As our old adage goes, "One is never too old to learn," it is obvious that the concept of life-long education has been deep-rooted in our society since long time ago.

IAEA gets no deal with Iran on bomb research suspicions

VIENNA, 25 Aug — The UN nuclear watchdog and Iran failed on Friday to strike a deal aimed at allaying concerns about suspected nuclear weapons research by Teheran, a setback in efforts to resolve the stand-off diplomatically before any Israeli or US military action.

A flurry of bellicose rhetoric from some Israeli politicians this month has fanned speculation that Israel

might hit Iran's nuclear sites before the US presidential election in November. Tensions rose another notch on the eve of Friday's talks between Iran and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) when diplomatic sources said Iran had installed many more uranium enrichment centrifuges at its Fordow underground site.

While the new machines

are not yet operating, the move reaffirmed Iranian defiance of international demands on it to suspend enrichment and may strengthen the Israeli belief that toughened sanctions and concerted diplomacy are failing to make the Islamic Republic change course. "The discussions today were intensive but important differences remain between Iran and the UN that prevented agreement," Herman Nackaerts, the IAEA's chief inspector, told journalists after about seven hours of talks with an Iranian delegation in Vienna. "At the moment we have no plans for another meeting."

Little headway appeared to have been made on the IAEA's most urgent request - access for its inspectors to the

Parchin military site where the agency believes Iran has done explosives tests relevant for developing a nuclear weapons capability. Iran's ambassador to the Vienna-based IAEA, Ali Asghar Soltanieh, said that "undoubtedly some progress" was made but that differences remained. "Because it is a very complex issue... issues related to national security of a member state are something very delicate," the veteran Iranian diplomat said.

"But I have to say that we are moving forward... and we

are going to continue this process so that we at the end of the day will have a framework agreed by both sides." Soltanieh had said before the talks began: "Both sides are trying to bridge the gap." The diplomatic sources who revealed the expansion of centrifuge capacity at Fordow also said satellite imagery indicated Iran had used a brightly coloured tent-like structure to cover a building at Parchin, increasing concern about a possible removal of evidence of illicit past nuclear work there.— Reuters

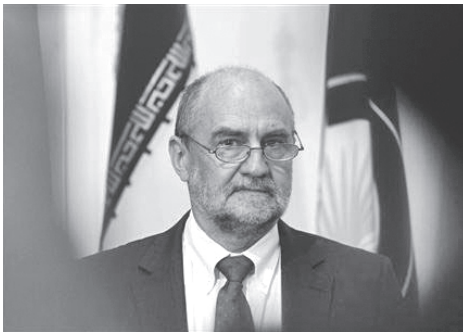
Cuba receives humanitarian aid from US NGO

HAVANA, 25 Aug—Cuba received 100 tons of humanitarian aid on Friday from a US non-governmental group (NGO) opposed to its country's embargo on the Caribbean nation.

The four shipping containers and five vehicles of assistance, including educational materials and medical supplies, were collected by the Pastors for Peace movement from the United States and Canada.

The Pastors for Peace movement was founded in 1992 by US Baptist minister Lucius Walker, who led the efforts until his death in 2010. Besides its efforts against the Cuba blockade, the group also helps Haiti and others in need.

According to Cuban authorities, the US blockade affects particularly the sectors of health and education, with economic losses estimated at over 975 billion US dollars besides "uncountable human damage."— Xinhua

Typhoon alert remains high in east China

HANGZHOU, 25 Aug — China's east coast remains on alert on Friday as a pair of typhoons threaten to wreak havoc.

Typhoon Bolaven, the 15th typhoon of the year, was gaining force on Friday and was forecast to reach the East China Sea on Sunday, the weather bureau of Zhejiang Province said in a Press release on Friday night.

It said the Zhoushan Islands were on high alert of the typhoon. Bolaven was located at 21.7 north latitude and 133.2 east longitude at 2 pm, packing winds of 41.4 meters per second and moving northwest at 15 km per hour,

it said.

Local authorities in Zhoushan have warned citizens to be on guard against the typhoon and banned fishing boats from going out to the sea.

Meanwhile, typhoon Tembin, whose centre was in seawater off Taipei on Friday afternoon, threatened to soak the eastern Fujian Province over the weekend, the local meteorological station said.

It said gales were already sweeping at 24.5 metres per second in Fujian's coastal areas on Friday, and could intensify in the coming two days.

A direct ferry service between Fujian's Pingtan to

Taipei will be suspended for three days from Saturday to Monday.

Tembin struck southern Taipei on Friday, toppling trees, overturning vehicles and dumping rains that swelled rivers and flooded homes and farmlands.

China's National Marine Environmental Forecasting Centre also warned the public of the dual typhoons on Friday, raising the alert level to yellow. Earlier this month, dual-typhoons "Damrey" and "Saola" left eight people dead and forced the evacuation of about 1.3 million residents in the coastal regions as of 5 August.— Xinhua

Breivik trial ends, but issues remain

OSLO, 25 Aug — With the verdict handed down on Friday at the Oslo District Court, all the dust around the case occurred on 22 July, 2011 in which 77 people lost their lives is hoped to settle down eventually so that this nation of five million could put the tragedy behind and move on.

The perpetrator, Anders Behring Breivik, a 33-year-old Norwegian, was sentenced to 21 years in prison for the bombing attack at the government quarter in Oslo and the subsequent shooting on Utoeya island some 40 kilometers west of the Norwegian capital on 22 July, 2011.

That is the maximum

punishment the mass killer could have under Norwegian law but many believe that he will spend the rest of his life behind the bars in the Ila prison on the suburb of Oslo.— Xinhua

Yellow River risks flood peak

BEIJING, 25 Aug — Water levels of three reservoirs along the Yellow River's Inner Mongolia reach have exceeded their flood control levels.

The water now flows at a speed of 3,000 cubic meters per second, nearly three times the norm. 58 high risk sections have been reinforced, and 20,000 people evacuated.

Two-thirds of the 73,000 hectares of farmland along the river have been submerged.

The flood control department says the water level may continue to rise, leading to complete destruction of crops across all of the affected land.— Xinhua



Low-altitude airspace to open up across China from 2013

SHENYANG, 25 Aug—China will relax a ban on the use of low-altitude airspace across the country starting 2013, air traffic authorities said on Thursday. A series of reforms will be carried out in the coming 5 to 10 years to create an independent airspace market with some government guidance, said Zhu Shicai, an official with the state air traffic control commission.

Zhu made the remarks at the 2012 China Low-altitude Economy Summit, a two-day event that opened on Thursday in Shenyang, capital of northeast China's Liaoning Province.

"The upcoming reforms will clear some major obstacles in the opening up of China's low-altitude airspace," Zhu said. "In particular, it will simplify application procedures for the use of low-altitude airspace by general aviation flights, including private jets."

China has launched related pilot projects in its northeastern and central-southern regions, as well as seven pilot cities, including Tangshan near Beijing, Xi'an, Qingdao, Hangzhou, Ningbo, Kunming and Chongqing, where airspace



below 1,000 meters is open to general aviation flights. The country will further open up its low-altitude airspace nationwide in the coming decade in order to stimulate the growth of the fledgling general aviation industry, said Zhu. Zhu said new regulations concerning airspace planning and management, as well as simplified application procedures for general aviation flights, will be issued this year. China's low-altitude airspace is controlled by the Air Force and the Civil Aviation Administration of China (CAAC).

Private flights currently need to go through time-consuming and complicated procedures to fly in low-altitude airspace, which has hampered demand for private jets.

In case of an emergency, many private jet owners prefer to take civil aviation flights or fly illegally rather than wait for their applications to be approved — which often comes far too late. In November 2010, the

State Council and the Central Military Commission jointly decided to open up part of the country's low-altitude airspace for the first time.

The central government said in its 12th Five-Year Plan for the 2011-2015 period that it will promote the general aviation industry's development and reform the airspace management system, as well as increase the efficiency of the allocation and utilization of airspace resources.

"The new policies will make it easier and faster for general aviation flights to get the green light to use low-altitude airspace," Zhu said. The move will hopefully bring about a boom in China's general aviation industry, which could in turn fuel the country's economic growth, he said.

However, general aviation is a highly specialized industry involving hefty investment and high risks, said Yang Fengtian, an academic at the Chinese Academy of Engineering and president of Shenyang Aerospace University.

"The government should play a leading role in policy-making and industry regulation," said Yang. "In the meantime, it should draw diverse capital to foster the industry and build a sound industrial chain to ensure its sustained growth."

LatAm countries to pursue independent strategies in drug fighting

MANAGUA, 25 Aug — Police chiefs from Latin American countries agreed on Thursday to pursue an anti-drug strategy that does not depend on international aid, Nicaraguan police chief said. Police chiefs of the region were in the Nicaraguan capital Managua to attend the 31st meeting of the Commission of Police Chiefs and Directors from Mexico, Colombia, Central America and the Caribbean.

Aminta Granera, head of Nicaragua's National Police, said the officials agreed "not to depend on international aid" in carrying out crime fighting and anti-narcotics strategies.

"The regional security strategy of the Central American Integration System (SICA) already has the funds for its eight priority projects. Nevertheless, the police agencies are not going to depend on international

help," said Granera.

However, Granera stressed that countries around the world should share the responsibility for the current climate of violence afflicting the region.

The police chiefs are working on a series of initiatives to fight organized crimes and drug cartels, said Granera, adding their task was to make criminal groups "shake" from fear.

Mexican Navy dismantles 15 alleged crime-related radio networks

MEXICO CITY, 25 Aug — Mexican Navy has dismantled 15 communication networks allegedly used by organized crime groups in the Gulf Coast states of Veracruz and Tamaulipas, Mexico's Naval Secretariat (Semar) said on Thursday.

The navy uncovered 13 illegal radiofrequency facilities and found a cache of devices like transmitters and antennas on the top of Cofre de Perote, an extinct volcano in Veracruz, said Semar.

In two other operations in Tamaulipas, the navy dismantled two communication facilities used by the notorious Los Zetas drug trafficking group. Semar also found a 50-metre high antenna located along the Monterrey-Nuevo Laredo Highway.

No one was arrested in any of the operations. In other anti-drug operations from December 2006 to 19 Aug 2012, the navy dismantled 824 laboratories producing synthetic drugs, discovered and secured 3,817 clandestine airstrips, and confiscated 538 aircraft.

US domestic terrorism remains threat: expert

WASHINGTON, 25 Aug — A string of recent shootings including a bloody attack at a Wisconsin Sikh temple underscores that domestic terrorism remains a threat in the United States, said a US expert on Thursday. "Domestic terrorism in the United States is a cyclical phenomenon," argued Scott Stewart, vice president of tactical intelligence at Stratfor, a global intelligence company, in an analysis released on the group's website. "The intense political polarization that has occurred in recent years in the United States, the widespread distrust of the government on both the extreme right and the extreme left, and the current election-year rhetoric will further inflame political passions," he said. "This means that the

current cycle of domestic terrorism plots and violence is likely to continue for at least the next several months."

On 5 August, Wade Page opened fire on the congregation of a Sikh temple in Oak Creek, in the US state of Wisconsin, killing six people and wounding three others. "Though Page killed himself and did not leave any evidence explicitly listing his motives for the attack, his long association with the white supremacist movement was clearly a factor in his target choice," said Stewart. Less than two weeks later, Floyd Corkins shot and wounded a security guard in the lobby of the Family Research Council's office in Washington DC, after a guard blocked him

from entering the office.

Corkins allegedly targeted the organization because of its support for Chick-fil-A amid controversy over statements made by the fast food chain's founder regarding gay marriage. The next day, an off-duty sheriff's deputy was shot and wounded while working as a security guard outside New Orleans, Louisiana. A vehicle associated with the incident was spotted at a nearby trailer park, and two other deputies were ambushed and killed by a trailer's occupants. Seven people have been arrested in connection with the shootings. News reports indicate that the group was associated with the sovereign citizen movement, which the Federal Bureau of Investigation bills an anti-government extremist group.

Two dead, three buried in construction site collapse

XI'AN, 25 Aug — A collapse in a construction site in northwest China's Shaanxi Province on Wednesday has left two workers dead, local authorities have said.

As of 3 pm, three people were still buried in the debris after the accident happened at about 10 am at a carpet factory building under construction in Yulin City, trapping 18 workers, according to the city government. Rescuers pulled 15 workers out of debris, two of whom died later while the rest sustained slight injuries, and the rescue work is still going on. The cause of the accident is being investigated.— Xinhua

Balkans region hit by worst drought in decades

BELGRADE, 25 Aug — Wildfires are destroying forests, rivers are being reduced to a trickle, crops are wilting on the scorched farmland and electricity supplies are running low. After the harshest winter in decades, the Balkans region in the southeast of Europe is now facing its hottest summer and the worst drought across the area in nearly 40 years, officials say.

The record-setting average temperatures — which have been steadily rising for years because of global warming, according to scientists — have ravaged crops, vegetables, fruit, and power production in a region that already is badly hit by the global economic crisis. This year, farmers all over the Balkans are turning to the heavens for help. "This is lost," Ljubisav Tomic, a Serbian farmer said, pointing to his corn field, yellow and dried out with cracks in the soil. "Only God can help us, only heaven can save us." In Bosnia, Ajsa Velagic prays to Allah before offering potatoes at the market in Sarajevo, the capital.

The 64-year-old said, "There are no large

ones, the drought is killing everything." Adding to the troubles are dozens of wildfires, also fueled by the extreme heat. Blazes have destroyed hundreds of acres of forests and bush in Bosnia, Serbia, Croatia and Montenegro. Some of the fires raging on the border between Serbia and Kosovo are beyond control because of minefields left over from the war over the former Serbian province in 1999.

Potato crops and corn farms are among the worst hit by the drought as irrigation systems in the former Yugoslavia, built under communism, remain clogged and out of date, leaving most of the farmland at nature's mercy. The drought in the Balkans is being compared to a similar disaster now under way in the United States, with the economies such as Russia likely to profit by exporting food, wheat and other crops to the Balkan states. Because of the drought's effect on livestock, analysts forecast a sharp increase in the retail price of meat and milk, adding to the hardship of one of Europe's poorest regions.— Internet

Tropical Storm Joyce forms, stays in open Atlantic

SAN JUAN, 25 Aug — Puerto Rico and the US Virgin Islands braced for torrential rains on Thursday as Tropical Storm Isaac whipped up waves as high as 10 feet (3 metres) in the Caribbean and threatened to become a hurricane that could take a shot at Florida just as Republicans gather for their national convention.

Some flooding was reported in eastern and southern regions of Puerto Rico as the storm approached.

US forecasters said Isaac will likely turn into a Category 1 hurricane by Friday as it nears the Dominican Republic and Haiti.

It was expected to weaken a little while heading over their island and Cuba.

The storm was projected to head toward Florida as a hurricane by Monday, but the US National Hurricane Centre in Miami said some forecast models show it could go further west into the Gulf of

Mexico, so "significant uncertainty remains about the threat Isaac poses to Florida."

Isaac was centred 200 miles (320) kilometres south-southeast of Puerto Rico late Thursday morning, with maximum sustained winds of 40 mph (65 kph). It was moving west at 15 mph (24 kph) according to the Hurricane Centre.

The system has slowed down, and as a result, the island will see more rain, said Ernesto Morales, forecaster with the National Weather Service in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

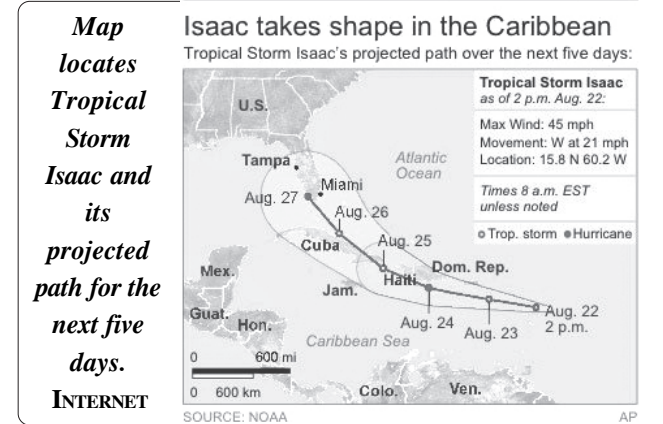
This is not the moment to become complacent," he said.

The US territory has opened 428 shelters, and 50 people have taken refuge, said Gov. Luis Fortuno. Some 4,000 people were without power and more than 3,000 without water.

Schools and government offices remained closed Thursday, but the governor said it was safe for people to go to work if they needed to.

However, he warned everyone to stay away from beaches and swollen rivers.

Imagine being stuck in a cage for two months while going through customs. That's the border limbo 16 tigers and lions have faced in Paraguay because Argentine officials refuse to approve their paperwork for

re-entry.

The nine Bengal tigers and seven African lions belong to an Argentine circus that performs in the Paraguayan capital each August.

Their owner, Oswal Wasconi, brought them back for this year's circus only to learn that a new law in Paraguay bans live animal acts at circuses.

With no chance of performing, Wasconi tried to ship his big cats back to Argentina. But then they got stuck at the border.

Estela Gomez, director of Paraguay's wildlife agency, said the animals all have good-health certificates, but their entry to Argentina was blocked by officials demanding more information about the protected species.

Aides to Argentina's quarantine office director,

Raul Castelli, said he was in a meeting and could not explain the holdup.

After inquiries from *The Associated Press* on Friday about the cats' plight, Gomez said her ministry decided to move the big cats two by two to the Asuncion zoo, "so that they can live in some comfort and not in a strange area."

Galliano, 51, will no longer have the right to wear the medal following its withdrawal under a decree signed by President Francois Hollande which was published in France's official journal on Thursday.

The former artistic

director of fashion house Dior was convicted last year of hurling anti-Semitic insults at patrons of a Paris bar.

Galliano blamed the outburst on drink and drug problems and went into rehab for two months. He has since kept a low profile, but recent unconfirmed reports suggest he is considering moving to Los Angeles.

Dior have replaced him with Belgian designer Raf Simons.

Suri cruises to millions in "TomKat" divorce: report

LOS ANGELES, 25 Aug— Katie Holmes walked away without a payment or alimony in her divorce with Tom Cruise, but the couple's six-year-old daughter, Suri, stands to receive \$400,000 annually in child support until she turns 18, celebrity website TMZ.com reported on Friday.

Citing sources familiar with court documents filed by the former couple, whose divorce was finalized earlier this week, TMZ said the "TomKat" pre-nuptial agreement blocked Holmes from receiving any portion of the 50-year-old actor's \$250 million fortune.

But Cruise will make child-support payments over the next 12 years that add up to \$4.8 million, or \$33,333.33 a month. TMZ also reported that Cruise must pay Suri's medical, education and extracurricular expenses.

Cruise's attorney declined to comment on the

report, and a lawyer for Holmes did not respond to *Reuters'* request for confirmation.

Holmes, 33, surprised Cruise in late June when she filed for divorce from the "Mission: Impossible" star

after a nearly six-year marriage. Cruise was in Iceland shooting a movie at the time.

The divorce, which took less than two weeks to settle, captivated the world and prompted questions about whether Suri will be raised in the Church of Scientology, with which her father has long been closely associated.

Usher gains sole custody of two children

LOS ANGELES, 25 Aug— An Atlanta judge on Friday awarded R&B singer Usher primary custody of his two sons with ex-wife Tameka Foster Raymond, according to a person with knowledge of the ruling.

Usher filed for divorce from Foster in 2009 after less than two years of marriage.

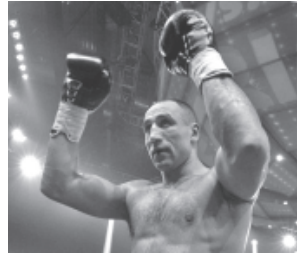

New Zealand teen Ko shares LPGA lead

WELLINGTON, 25 Aug—New Zealand golf prodigy Lydia Ko fired a second-straight four-under par 68 on Friday to seize a share of the second-round lead with Chella Choi at the LPGA's Canadian Women's Open. Choi, 22, had eight birdies in a bogey-free eight-under par 64. "I'm very happy," said Choi, who had been hindered by a sore shoulder on Thursday. "I don't know how I made the putts." Club member Brian Alexander served as Ko's caddie, and she appreciated having the local knowledge.

Alexander, a real estate developer, said he gave Ko advice about the course in practice rounds this week, but she has been making her own decisions during the tournament.

Kvitova wins, Wozniacki retires in New Haven

NEW HAVEN, 25 Aug—Caroline Wozniacki's New Haven winning streak ended at 20 Friday when the four-time defending champion retired from her semifinal match with Maria Kirilenko because of a knee injury.

Wozniacki, who injured the right knee in her quarterfinal win on Thursday, called for the trainer right after dropping the first set 7-5 to the 25-year-old Russian.

"I could feel it from the start," she said. "But, you know, it just started to get a bit worse. I decided to stop because if you don't feel a hundred percent, you can't compete at a hundred percent. It's better to let it rest. I wasn't

going to win this match anyways if I'm not on a hundred percent fit level."

Kirilenko, the seventh seed, will face second-seeded Petra Kvitova on Saturday. The 2011 Wimbledon champion beat Italy's Sara Errani, 6-1, 6-3 on Friday night.

Using a serve that hovered at about 108 mph, and powerful returns, Kvitova needed just 24 minutes to win her first set. She then broke Errani in the first game of the second set and cruised from there, closing the match out with another service break.

"She serve more than me, she hit more than me," Errani said. "(It) was like for me inside

Champions Dortmund down Bremen to open 50th season

Chelsea seal swoop for Wigan's Moses

LONDON, 25 Aug—Chelsea finally completed their swoop for Wigan forward Victor Moses on Friday after the Nigeria international passed a medical and agreed personal terms with the European champions.

The Blues had seen four bids for Moses rejected by Wigan chairman Dave Whelan during the course of a fractious transfer saga that had lasted since the end of last season.

Whelan had infuriated Chelsea by speaking publicly

about the negotiations in a bid to drive up the price.

But Chelsea boss Roberto Di Matteo got his man at the fifth attempt after Wigan confirmed on Thursday that they had accepted an improved offer, believed to be around £9 million, for the 21-year-old.

"Chelsea Football Club is delighted to announce the signing of Victor Moses from Wigan Athletic," a statement on the club's website confirmed.

Chelsea didn't

announce the length of the contract for Moses, who joined Wigan from Crystal Palace in 2010 and rose to prominence after a series of impressive displays for the Latics last season.

Moses, who scored eight times in 74 league appearances for Wigan, caught the eye again in the Latics' 2-0 defeat against Chelsea in the Premier League last weekend.

While he clearly has vast potential, Moses will have to raise his game to an even higher level at Stamford Bridge, where he will compete with the likes of Eden Hazard, Juan Mata, Daniel Sturridge and Marko Marin for a place in Di Matteo's starting lineup.

At international level, Moses played for England from schoolboy up to the Under-21 team, but has opted to represent Nigeria at senior level and made his debut in February against Rwanda.

Moses was Di Matteo's second signing in just a few hours, following his capture of Marseille's Spanish right-back Cesar Azpilicueta for £7 million.—Internet

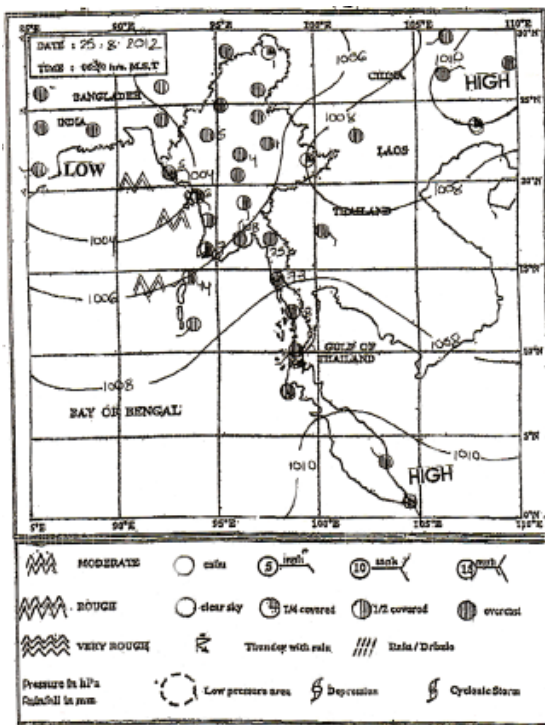

LYON, 25 Aug—Lyon missed the creative spark of injured playmaker Yoann Gourcuff on Friday as they dropped their first points of their new campaign with a 1-1 draw at modest Evian. Lyon had won their two opening games but fluffed their lines as only a Michel Bastos equaliser 16 minutes from time saved their blushes after Cedric Barbosa had given Evian the lead on 57 minutes with a neat volley.

Bastos had only minutes earlier replaced Lisandro when he pounced with a direct freekick which flew through a poorly organised wall. Wins over Rennes and Troyes had taken Lyon to the summit on goal difference after thrashing Troyes 4-1 but Gourcuff sustained a knee ligament injury in that game and he faces three months out of action.

Lyon, champions seven years in a row between 2002 and 2008, finished a disappointing fourth last term and have brought in only one new player — Serbian defender Milan Bisevac, from Paris Saint-Germain — in the transfer window.

Sakhalin film festival to witness clashes between Western, Eastern culture

VLADIVOSTOK, 25 Aug — Sakhalin International Film Festival opened on Friday in southern Yuzhno-Sakhalinsk city of Russia's Sakhalin Province, RIA Novosti news agency reported. The six-day film festival aims to provide a platform for Asian and Western cultures to meet and interact with each other, create an opportunity for the public to meet with elites from the West and the East, and seek common grounds between high technology and rich traditions.

Filmmakers from Russia, France, China, Iran and Japan will compete in the festival. Their films will be judged by an authoritative international jury consisting of a Tokyo FILMeX festival director and famous Russian actors. The festival's non-competition programme will stage a retrospective screening of classic Asian and Russian animation, including those by Hayao Miyazaki, the grand master of Japanese animation.

Viewers will also get a chance to see recent award-winning films in major international film festivals as well as documentary films about famous contemporary artists' life and work. The festival is to close with Japanese director Takashi Miike's "Hara-Kiri: Death of a Samurai," the first 3D film screened at the Cannes Film Festival. — Xinhua

NATO airstrike kills 12 militants in Afghanistan

KABUL, 25 Aug — A NATO airstrike in eastern Afghanistan targeting a group of insurgents near the Pakistani border killed at least 12 militants on Friday, the international military coalition said. Pakistani intelligence and Afghan officials said Mullah Dadullah, the self-proclaimed leader of the Pakistani Taleban in Pakistan's Bajur tribal area was killed, although they offered conflicting reports on the exact location of the strike. NATO could not confirm that a senior militant had been killed.

Coalition spokesman Maj Adam Wojack said the attack took place late Friday afternoon in Kunar province near the Pakistan border, killing 12 militants. Conflicting reports out of the rugged and remote regions along the Afghan-Pakistan border are common shortly after an attack. Kunar provincial official Aslam Gul Mujahid said the airstrike killed 20 people, including Dadullah. Pakistani intelligence officials said Dadullah and 19 others were killed, but they said the airstrike took place in Pakistan's Bajur region, just across the border from Kunar.

The Pakistani intelligence officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to brief the media, said the strike occurred after a cross-border attack by Pakistani Taleban militants who came from Afghanistan. Jahangir Azam Khattak, a local Pakistani government official, said dozens of militants attacked a Pakistani post manned by anti-Taleban militiamen in the Salarzai area of Bajur. He said six militants were killed and four tribesmen were wounded. Two Pakistani militiamen also were killed, local tribesmen said on condition of anonymity out of fear for their safety.

The Pakistani intelligence officials said the militiamen and army soldiers fought the militants for hours but eventually repelled the attack. —Internet
