NAY PYI TAW, 9 April— President U Thein Sein visited reclamation site of 900-acre mechanized farms to be irrigated through Setsetyo creek and construction site of diversion weir.

The President called for cent per cent operations of the farm, irrigation system and roads by coming monsoon.

The President and party then visited construction site of Setsetyo diversion

weir. Union Minister U Myint Hlaing reported the President on work progress.

The construction of diversion weir will be beneficial to environmental

conservation. It would also prevent 900-acre farmlands from inundation in rainy seasons. The diversion weir will enable farmers to employ multiple cropping patterns.

The President presented gifts to those from Irrigation Department, Agriculture Mechanization Department and Agriculture Department.

The President called on visiting officials from Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) to cooperate in agriculture sector of Myanmar and updated that Myanmar would receive aids from JICA to penetrate Japanese market. Myanmar will start to export Seintalone mangoes and dragon ball fruits to Japanese market this season.

The President invited Japanese assistance for the country's shift from

conventional farming to mechanized one and microfinance loans which he called "essential to farmers in Myanmar".

The President disclosed his supports for closer cooperation between the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation and JICA to strengthen intergovernmental and people-to-people connectivity.

The President and party looked round irrigation system of Setsetyo diversion weir, land reclamation for mechanized farming and thriving vegetable plantations and farmlands in the irrigation area of Setsetyo dam in a motorcade.

The site where new mechanized farmlands are being reclaimed is located between Ottarathiri and Pobbathiri Townships in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area.—MNA

Car vandals cause nearly K 1.8 million worth of damage to three vehicles in Shwepyitha Township

YANGON, 9 April — Three vehicles had been vandalized by a drunken mob of four vandals who threw stones at the front and rear windscreens of the cars and drove away by a motorbike in Shwepyitha Township at 11.40 pm on 24 March.

A Probox driven by Ko Ko, 35, of ward-10 in the township had fallen victim to a vandal attack from the motorbike driving on the opposite lane by four men who threw stones at it. The front windscreen of the

Probox was smashed in the stone attack. The next vandal attacks happened to a taxi driven by Ko Win Khaing, 42, of the township and a stationary 10-wheeled bus near Shwe Yon bus-stop, leaving the windscreens of the two vehicles broken. The vandal attacks caused nearly K 1.8 million worth of damage to the three vehicles.

Shwepyitha police station opened a case and is launching an investigation to expose the four drunken vandals. —*Kyemon*

Two robbers sentenced to five years in jail with hard labour

YANGON, 9 April—Two suspects were given a five-year prison sentence with hard labour each by Dalla Township Court on 1 April as they were found guilty of committing an armed robbery, taking golden items, cash and handset away from the house of the owner of Annawa Moe fish brokerage on Kanaung Street in Banyadala ward of Dalla Township.

The incident occurred at her house while Daw Ohnma Swe, 45, was at her fish brokerage on Bogyoke street. As she was informed of the armed robbery at her

house by Daw Ohn Myint, her housemaid, she rushed there and she found her belongings—gold chain, golden bracelet, golden locket, one handset and K 70000—worth over K 2.4 million were stolen by the robbers. Dalla township police station opened a case and made necessary investigation into the robbery. Police members arrested two suspects—Ko Ko Chit, 22, and Aye Naing (a) Ange Lay of Kyisu village in Kyonphar village-tract in Bogale Township—together with stolen gold wares.

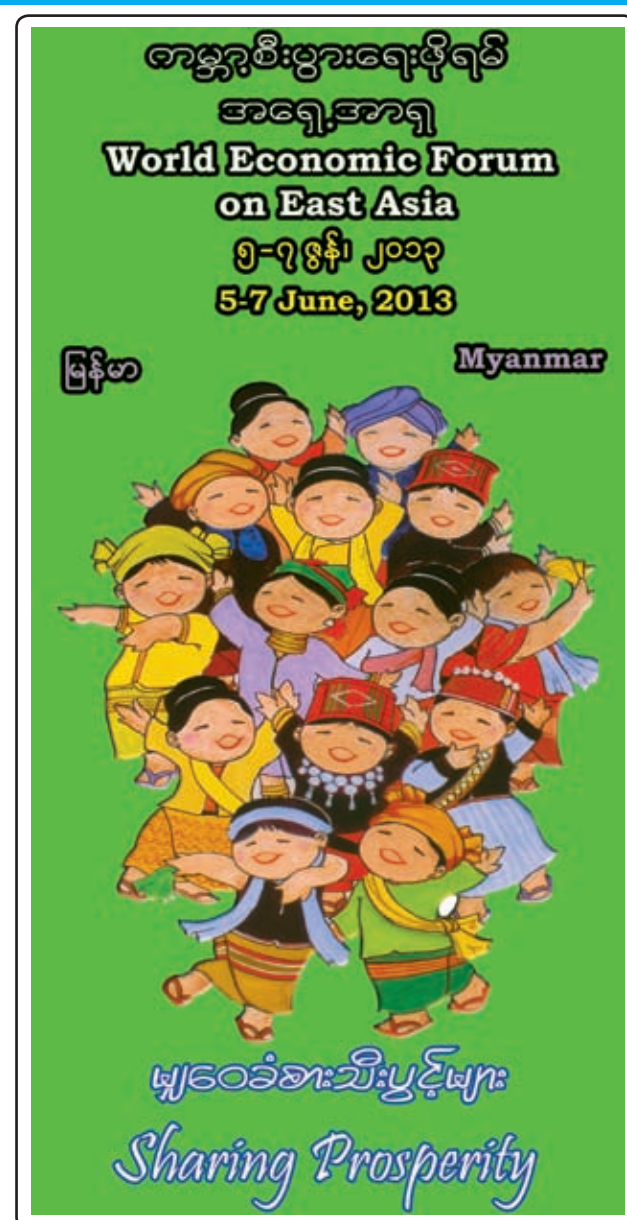
Thetkalchaung bridge construction in full swing on Pathein-Ngapudaw road in Kangyidaunt Township

NAY PYI TAW, 9 April— Union Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lwin inspected progress of tarmacking of Pathein-Ngapudaw road and progress in installation of steel trusses and construction of approach road and bridge at the worksite of Thetkalchaung bridge construction project on 7 April.

motorway flanked by three feet and six inches wide pedestrian lanes on either side. The main structure of the reinforced concrete bridge will have steel truss frames and concrete floor. Its water clearance will be 40 feet high and 215 feet wide and it can withstand 60 ton-load of each vehicle. Thanks to the bridge, local people will be able to travel from Pathein to Ngapudaw within a short period of time.

UN's Ban says all claims of chemical arms use in Syria need investigating

THE HAGUE, 9 April—An advance team of UN-mandated experts has gone to Cyprus and is awaiting permission from the Syrian government to investigate allegations of chemical weapons attacks, UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon said on Monday.

Syria has asked the United Nations only to investigate what it says was a rebel chemical attack near Aleppo. The opposition has blamed President Bashar al-Assad's forces for that strike and also wants the

UN team to probe other alleged chemical attacks by the government.

There have been three alleged chemical weapons attacks — the one near Aleppo and another near Damascus, both in March, and one in Homs in December. The rebels and Assad's government blame each other for all of them.

Russia, an ally of Syria, has supported Damascus against demands from Western powers that the investigation be widened.

Ban has made clear he

wants an all-encompassing inquiry, saying it was the "firm principle" of the United Nations that investigators be granted access to all areas where chemical weapons were allegedly used.

After meeting in The Hague with the head of the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW), which is providing scientists and equipment, Ban said an advance team was in Cyprus, ready to go to Syria within 24 hours.

"All we are waiting for is the go-ahead from the Syrian government to determine whether any chemical weapons were used, in any location," Ban said. "I urge the Syrian government to be more flexible, so that this mission can be deployed as fast as possible." An exchange of letters between Syria's UN Ambassador Bashar Ja'afari and UN disarmament chief Angela Kane showed that the two sides are far from agreement, UN diplomats said on condition of anonymity.

ADB urges Asia to explore cleaner energy sources

MANILA, 9 April—The Asian Development Bank on Tuesday stressed the need for Asia to "aggressively explore" new and cleaner energy sources to fuel its rapid growth in the coming decades, saying securing an adequate energy supply will be critical to sustaining developing Asia's growth.

Asia is moving along a dangerously unsustainable energy path that will result in environmental disaster and a gaping divide in energy access between rich and poor unless the region dramatically changes course, warned

Changyong Rhee, the ADB's chief economist, as the bank released its Asian Development Outlook 2013 report.

"Asia could be consuming more than half the world's energy supply by 2035, and without radical changes carbon dioxide emissions will double," Rhee said.

He said Asia "must both contain rising demand and explore cleaner options, which will require creativity and resolve, with policymakers having to grapple with politically difficult issues like fuel

subsidies and regional energy market integration."

With 6 percent annual growth, the report says developing Asia could produce 44 percent of global gross domestic product by 2035.

"This 'Asian Century' scenario would see the region's share of world energy consumption rise rapidly from barely a third in 2010 to 51-56 percent by 2035.

With insufficient energy, developing Asia would need to scale back its growth ambitions."

US Navy to field first laser weapon, could shoot down a drone

WASHINGTON, 9 April—The US Navy said on Monday it will deploy for the first time a laser weapon on one of its ships that could be capable of shooting down drones and disabling vessels.

"The future is here," said Peter Morrison at the Office of Naval Research's Solid-State Laser Technology Maturation Programme.

The weapon is being billed as a step toward transforming warfare. Since it runs on electricity, it can fire as long as there is power at a cost of less than \$1 dollar per shot.

"Compare that to the hundreds of thousands of dollars it costs to fire a missile, and you can begin to

see the merits of this capability," Chief of Naval Research Rear Admiral Matthew Klunder, said in a statement.

The prototype, which

one official said cost between \$31 million and \$32 million to make, will be installed aboard the USS Ponce, which is being used as a floating base in the

Middle East, sometime in fiscal year 2014, which begins in October.

Klunder said the Navy expects that someday incoming missiles will not be able to "simply outmaneuver" a highly accurate laser beam travelling at the speed of light. A new report from the Congressional Research Service praises the laser technology but also notes drawbacks, including the potential it could accidentally hit satellites or aircraft. Weather also affects lasers.

"Lasers might not work well, or at all, in rain or fog, preventing lasers from being an all-weather solution," it said in its report issued on 14 March.

Abe calls for practical English teaching in education system reform

TOKYO, 9 April—Prime Minister Shinzo Abe called on Monday for more practical English-language education as the ruling party's advisory panel submitted to him a set of education reform proposals, including a requirement of the Test of English as a Foreign

Language for entry to and graduation from public universities.

Japan must make its English education "more suited for practical use," Toshiaki Endo, chief of the Liberal Democratic Party's education system reform panel quoted Abe as saying at their meeting

at the premier's office.

Endo handed to Abe the proposals to drastically reform English-language education, revamp science and mathematics education, and enhance information and communications technology education.

On English education

reform, the panel proposed making it a prerequisite for students to score certain minimum points in TOEFL or other established exams to gauge knowledge and skills in the language to be recognized as qualified to enroll in, or graduate from, public universities.

Iran to launch two projects related to nuclear programme

TEHERAN, 9 April — Iran will inaugurate two big projects related to its nuclear programme in the central Province of Yazd on Tuesday, official IRNA news agency reported on Monday. Saghand uranium complex is projected to extract uranium from 350-metre depth of the ground and the extracted uranium will then be

processed into yellow cake (a kind of uranium concentrate powder) in another complex, Shahid Rezaeenejad, in the city of Ardakan, the report said.

Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad will open the two projects on Tuesday on the occasion of National Nuclear Technology Day.

HTC posts record-low quarterly profit after delayed phone launch

TAIPEI, 9 April—HTC Corp reported a record-low quarterly profit on Monday that missed analysts' estimates after it delayed the full launch of its 2013 flagship smartphone model, which will now debut against Samsung Electronics' newest Galaxy.

A shortage of cameras meant HTC managed to introduce its latest HTC One phone in just three markets by the end of the first quarter instead of the planned 80. It does not expect to kick off sales across Europe, North America and the Asia-Pacific region before the end of April.

Samsung Electronics Co Ltd has said its Galaxy S4 will be available in 155 countries by the end of April.

HTC said its unaudited net profit was T\$85 million (\$2.85 million) in its January-March first quarter, compared with T\$1 billion in the prior quarter and T\$10.9 billion in the same period last year. It was the lowest since HTC began reporting

quarterly profits in 2004.

The Taiwanese smartphone maker was expected to post a net profit of T\$467.5 million, according to the average forecast of 18 analysts polled by Thomson Reuters I/B/E/S.

First-quarter revenue was T\$42.8 billion, lower than the T\$50-60 billion range that HTC had forecast in February. Revenue in the fourth quarter was T\$60 billion.

"As HTC failed to establish its brand image by selling its most important flagship phone on time, it'll

be very difficult to push on the mid- and low-end phones when HTC launches them in Q3-Q4," said Dennis Chan, an analyst with Yuanta Securities in Taipei. "Sales in the second quarter will bounce, but they will lose momentum again in Q3-Q4."

The company has partnered with Facebook Inc, which unveiled new software last week called "Home" that replaces the home screen on some Android smartphones, and introduced a \$100 HTC-made handset that is pre-installed with the new app.

Ericsson says to buy Microsoft IPTV business

STOCKHOLM, 9 April—Telecom equipment maker Ericsson said on Monday it had struck a deal to buy Microsoft Corp's Mediaroom IPTV business, which makes software used by phone companies to deliver television over the Internet. Ericsson said in a statement the deal would make the company, the world's biggest mobile networks maker, the leading provider of IPTV. The company, which did not disclose the purchase price, said it expected to close the deal during the second half of 2013.

Mediaroom is situated in Mountain View, California and employs more than 400 people worldwide, it added. Internet protocol television (IPTV)

uses the same technology that powers the Internet to transmit multimedia content over telecom and cable networks. Ericsson wants to cater to phone companies that are competing with cable, satellite and web-based media providers. "This acquisition contributes to a leading position for Ericsson with more than 40 customers, serving over 11 million subscriber households," said Per Borgklint, Ericsson Senior Vice President and Head of Business Unit Support Solutions. Ericsson said the global IPTV market was estimated to reach 76 million subscribers in 2013 with revenues of \$32 billion, growing to 105 million subscribers and \$45 billion in 2015.—Reuters

To crack human brain's code, a search for visionaries

WASHINGTON, 9 April—To crack the code of the human brain, Cori Bargmann figures it's the best to keep an open mind.

As one of two leaders of a scientific "dream team" in the initial phase of President Barack Obama's ambitious \$100 million project to map the brain, Bargmann said the first step is to find the right combination of people to set research priorities.

"You might start with people who are very senior and are household words in their fields, and then you may realize that what (you) actually need is the young Turk who's a visionary wild man," Bargmann said.

Bargmann, a neurobiologist at The Rockefeller University in New York, and William Newsome, a

neurobiologist at Stanford Medical School in California, are the co-chairs of a

committee announced by the White House on Tuesday for the Brain Research through Advancing Innovative Neurotechnologies Initiative. That long title has been dubbed BRAIN for short. Both Newsome and Bargmann are at the top of the neurobiology pyramid, professors at premiere institutions, winners of dozens of scientific honors and awards, authors of research papers in prestigious journals. As Newsome noted wryly, "I don't need this aggravation, to some extent, but I think this is really important."

Bargmann, who recalls watching the first Apollo moon landing in 1969 as an 8-year-old, this year won a \$3 million Breakthrough Prize in Life Sciences for her work on

the genetics of neural circuits and behaviour and synaptic guidepost molecules.

This project was something no scientist, so far, has turned down.

"If there's going to be a programme to try to do something significant and the taxpayer's going to be involved in it, you make the time to try to help," she said. "As far as I know, everyone who was asked to help said yes."

The BRAIN effort isn't quite like any other, Bargmann said. Even the Human Genome Project had a more focused goal at the start: to determine the precise sequence of chemical "letters" that constitute the full complement of human DNA.

Oceans may explain slowdown in climate change

OSLO, 9 April—Climate change could get worse quickly if huge amounts of extra heat absorbed by the oceans are released back into the air, scientists said after unveiling new research showing that oceans have helped mitigate the effects of warming since 2000.

Heat-trapping gases are being emitted into the atmosphere faster than ever, and the 10 hottest years since records began have all taken place since 1998. But the rate at which the earth's surface is heating up has slowed somewhat since 2000, causing scientists to search for an explanation for the pause.

Experts in France and Spain said on Sunday that the oceans took up more warmth from the air around 2000. That would help explain the slowdown in surface warming but would also suggest that the pause may be only temporary and brief.

"Most of this excess energy was absorbed in the top 700 metres (2,300 ft) of the ocean at the onset of the

warming pause, 65 percent of it in the tropical Pacific and Atlantic oceans," they wrote in the journal *Nature Climate Change*.

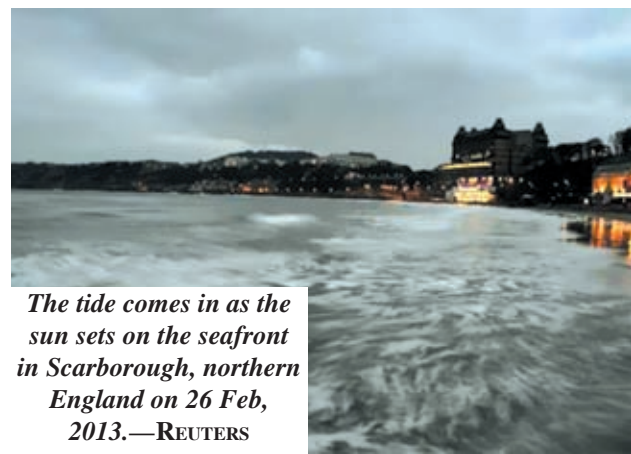
Lead author Virginie Guemas of the Catalan Institute of Climate Sciences in Barcelona said the hidden heat may return to the atmosphere in the next decade, stoking warming again.

"If it is only related to natural variability then the rate of warming will increase soon," she told Reuters.

Caroline Katsman of the Royal Netherlands

Meteorological Institute, an expert who was not involved in the latest study, said heat absorbed by the ocean will come back into the atmosphere if it is part of an ocean cycle such as the "El Nino" warming and "La Nina" cooling events in the Pacific.

She said the study broadly confirmed earlier research by her institute but that it was unlikely to be the full explanation of the warming pause at the surface, since it only applied to the onset of the slowdown around 2000.—Reuters

UAE telco Etisalat says unblocks Skype website

DUBAI, 9 April—The United Arab Emirates' top telecom operator Etisalat has stopped blocking the website of Skype, the world's No1 Internet-based phone call provider, although the move could put further pressure on the state-controlled firm's revenue. Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) providers such as Skype allow for free internet-to-internet phone calls and messaging, while tariffs for internet-to-mobile or landline phone calls are

dramatically cheaper than by conventional means.

Skype is owned by Microsoft Corp. Etisalat, in an announcement made on its Facebook page, said it had unblocked access to Skype's website on Monday. Such access had been denied for several years. Reuters was able to access Skype's website with an Etisalat mobile phone. The statement did not say whether Skype-to-phone calls were also now possible and Etisalat did not reply to

requests for more comment. It initially announced it had unblocked access to Skype's website last week via Twitter, then deleted the tweet. "It is becoming less sustainable to maintain restrictions on VoIP because the way people use communications is rapidly changing," said Matthew Reed, a principal analyst at Informa in Dubai. "So there is an argument that it's better for operators to find a way to work with over-the-top internet players such as Skype, rather

than forlornly trying to fight market trends."

Yet allowing these services will mean operators lose a big chunk of their international call revenues, Reed added. These are an important source of income in a country where the vast majority of the population are expatriates and instant messaging services such as Whatsapp and BlackBerry Messenger have also eaten into international text revenue.

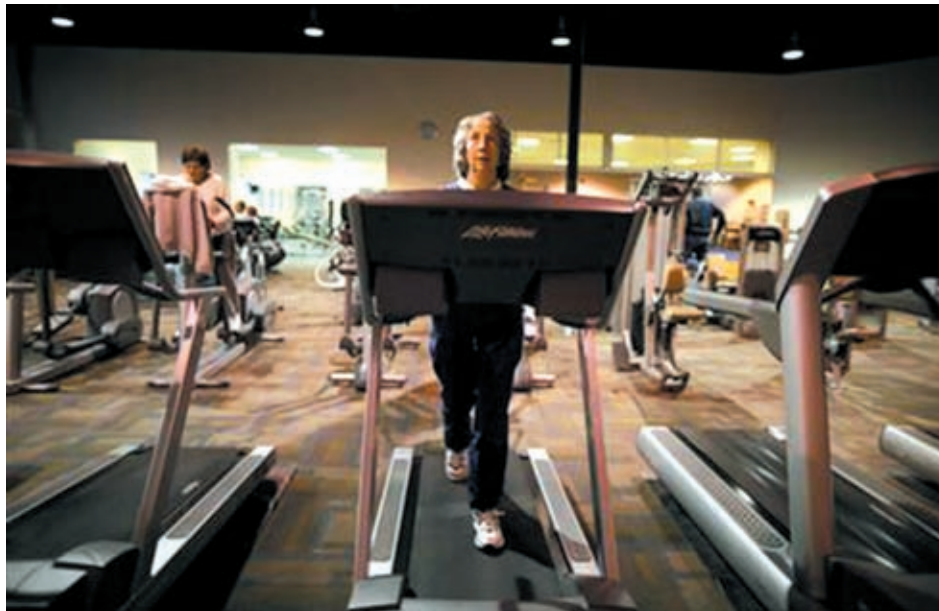
Fitness after 65 is no one-size-fits-all endeavour

NEW YORK, 9 April—America's ageing population is posing special challenges, fitness experts say, because it is difficult to design effective workout routines for people with such a wide range of abilities.

For one 70-year-old, the goal may be to run a marathon, for another it's getting out of a chair.

"If you are teaching 10-year-olds, it's perfectly reasonable to do an activity that everybody would participate in," said Dr Wojtek Chodzko-Zajko, an expert on aging with the American College of Sports Medicine. But 20 80-year-olds could be as different as chalk and cheese."

Some baby boomer could be athletic, he explained, while others would be unable to get out of bed. There are now more Americans age 65 and older than at any other time in US history, according

to Census Bureau figures. Some 40 million people age 65 and over lived in the United States in 2010, accounting for 13 percent of the total population. The older population grew from 3 million in 1900 to

40 million in 2010.

Older adults should be doing aerobic activity to help maintain body weight, strengthening exercises to develop and maintain muscle mass and some type of flexibility

training, according to Dr James Graves, Dean of the College of Health at the University of Utah. Physical activity can reduce the risk of diseases such as diabetes, hypertension and osteoporosis, he said, as well

as improve the quality of life by maintaining functional capacity, such as the ability to climb stairs, open doors, and carry groceries.

"A very healthy 70-year-old can safely participate in high-intensity activity while a frail 60-year-old needs to lower the intensity," said Graves.

"My recommendation is to work with a personal trainer or group leader who has knowledge and qualifications to work with the elderly." Mary Ann Wilson is the creator and host of the "Sit and Be Fit," a senior fitness programme that has aired on US public television since 1987.

The majority of her viewers are women over 65. For that population, she said, the goal of exercise is health and well-being, not physical prowess. "Gravity has been working on them for 70 years," said Wilson, a registered nurse who specialized in geriatrics.

Australia's trade deficit narrows in February

SYDNEY, 9 April—Australia's trade deficit narrowed to 178 million AU dollars (186.24 million US dollars) in February, according to data released on Wednesday by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS). The result was less than economists' forecasts of a 1 billion AU dollar deficit.

The ABS said the balance on goods and services was a deficit of 178 million AU dollars in February, a fall of 1,037 million AU dollars on the deficit in January. Exports of goods and services rose 3.0 percent to 25,642 million AU dollars in February while imports of goods and services fell 1.0 percent to 25,820 million AU dollars in the month.

Arsenic found in German beers

WASHINGTON, 9 April—High levels of arsenic have been detected in some German beers and are believed to come from a filtering material widely used in food production, said a report released on Sunday.

The report did not name specific brands, but said the arsenic levels in 140 samples of beers sold in Germany are above the 10 microgram per litre threshold for drinking water. The element entered the beverage during the filtration process, said authors of the report, released here at a national meeting of the American Chemical Society.

"When arsenic level in beer is higher than in the water used during brewing, this excess arsenic must come from other sources," said Mehmet Coelhan from the Munich Technical University.

"We analyzed all materials, including the malt and the hops used during brewing for the presence of arsenic."

The researchers found that the arsenic came from a filtering material called kieselguhr, or diatomaceous earth, used to remove yeast, hops and other particles and give the beer a crystal clear appearance. Kieselguhr consists of fossilized remains of diatoms, a type of hard-shelled algae that lived millions of years ago. It finds wide use in filtering beer and is an ingredient in other products. "We concluded that kieselguhr may be a significant source of arsenic contamination in beer," Coelhan said. "This conclusion was supported by analysis of kieselguhr samples. These tests revealed that some kieselguhr samples release arsenic."—Xinhua

Experts triple estimate of world dengue fever infections

LONDON, 9 April—Around 390 million people are infected each year with dengue fever—the world's fastest-spreading tropical disease—more than triple the current estimate by the World Health Organization, experts said on Sunday.

The new finding, based on several years of analysis, underscores the growing burden of the mosquito-borne viral disease, which is also called "breakbone fever" because of the severe pain it can cause.

There is as yet no approved vaccine or specific drug to treat dengue, which is not normally fatal but lands many victims in hospital.

Researchers from the University of Oxford and the Wellcome Trust presented their results, along with a detailed map of dengue distribution, in the journal *Nature*.

Their new figure

includes 96 million severe cases and approximately 300 million mild or asymptomatic episodes. That compares with the WHO's most recent estimate for overall infections of 50-100 million a year. The high number of relatively mild cases offers little cause for comfort, since it suggests the reservoir of disease is far larger than expected.

What is more, dengue is a disease that hits more than once and people who get it mildly first time are more likely to have a serious episode if bitten again by an infected mosquito. "The asymptomatic patients, in terms of the future burden of disease, are a very important contributor," said Jeremy Farrar, director of Oxford University's tropical disease research unit in Vietnam.

Spread by the *Aedes*

aegypti mosquito, dengue has grown rapidly along with urbanization and globalization because it thrives in tropical mega-cities and is easily spread in goods containing small puddles of water, such as used tires.

Climate change is also making more parts of the

planet habitable for the dengue-spreading mosquito.

As a result, half the world's population is now exposed to the disease, mostly in the developing world—but also in parts of southern Europe and the southern United States.

Heart disease culprit found in red meat

WASHINGTON, 9 April—The cholesterol and saturated fat in red meat may not be the real culprit for heart disease as another compound — carnitine — could harden the arteries, according to US researchers. The researchers said that gut bacteria metabolizes carnitine into trimethyl-lamine-N-oxide (TMAO), a metabolite they previously linked to the promotion of atherosclerosis in humans. Further, the researchers said that a diet high in carnitine promotes the growth of the bacteria that metabolize carnitine, compounding the problem

by producing even more of the artery-clogging TMAO.

"Carnitine metabolism suggests a new way to help explain why a diet rich in red meat promotes atherosclerosis," said study author Stanley Hazen, section head of Preventive Cardiology & Rehabilitation in the Miller Family Heart and Vascular Institute at Cleveland Clinic. Prior research has shown that a diet with frequent red meat consumption is associated with increased cardiovascular disease risk, but that the cholesterol and saturated fat in red meat does not appear to be enough to explain the

increased cardiovascular risks. The researchers followed 2,595 patients undergoing elective cardiac evaluations and also examined the cardiac effects of a carnitine-enhanced diet in normal mice compared with mice with suppressed levels of gut microbes. Finally, they found a new connection between red meat and cardiovascular disease. While carnitine is naturally occurring in red meats, including beef, venison, lamb, mutton, duck, and pork, it's also a dietary supplement available in pill form and a common ingredient in energy drinks.

EU's Rehn: Big depositors could suffer in future bank bailouts under new law

HELSINKI, 9 April—Big bank depositors could take a

hit under planned European Union law if a bank fails, the EU's economic affairs chief Olli Rehn said on Saturday, but noted that Cyprus's bailout model was exceptional. "Cyprus was a special case ... but the upcoming directive assumes that investor and depositor liability will be carried out in case of a bank restructuring or a wind-down," Rehn, the European Economic and Monetary Affairs Commissioner, said in a TV interview

with Finland's national broadcaster YLE.

"But there is a very clear hierarchy, at first the shareholders, then possibly the unprotected investments and deposits. However, the limit of 100,000 euros is sacred, deposits smaller than that are always safe." The European Commission is currently drafting a directive on bank safety which would incorporate the issue of investor liability in member states' legislation.—Reuters

Aid group pleads with UN to do more for Syria's children

UNITED NATIONS, 9 April— The aid group Save the Children pleaded with members of the UN Security Council on Monday to do more for Syria's children, nearly 2 million of whom need help because of the country's 2-year-old civil war.

The UN Security Council has been deadlocked since the start of the conflict, with Syrian President Bashar al-Assad's close ally Russia — with the aid of China — using its veto power to block any condemnations or attempts to sanction Assad's government.

"From the very beginning of the crisis in Syria, children have been its forgotten victims — facing death, trauma and suffering, and deprived of basic humanitarian aid," Save the Children said in a report presented to the 15-nation council on Monday.

"Children are increasingly being put directly in harm's way as they are being recruited by armed groups and (government-aligned) forces," it said. "There have even been reports that children as young as 8 have been used as human shields."

The threat to children

begins before they are born, it said. Since hospitals and health workers are being attacked, women are reluctant to go to hospitals. It added that nearly 2 million Syrian children were in need of aid.

"This means more births are taking place at home, without a skilled birth attendant," the report said, adding that access to food was also a serious problem for Syrian families.

Save the Children, a US-based non-governmental charity organization, said last month that Syria's children were being shot at,

tortured and raped.

Carolyn Miles, president and chief executive officer of Save the Children, told *Reuters* in an interview that the main message she

brought the deadlocked Security Council was that aid access must be improved and pledges of relief funds paid out.

US envoy says must fight mistrust for Middle East peace

JERUSALEM, 9 April— US Secretary of State John Kerry said on Monday he is trying to break down mistrust on both sides of the "festering" conflict between Israelis and Palestinians and would not rush into a new peace process.

Making his third visit to the region in less than three weeks, Kerry met Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas in Ramallah on Sunday night and was to sit down to dinner with Israeli Prime

Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Monday night.

"I am intensely focused on this issue ... because it is vital, really, to American interests and to regional interests to try to advance the peace process and because this festering absence of peace is used by groups everywhere to recruit and encourage extremism," Kerry told reporters traveling with him.

While Kerry gave no details of his talks, Palestin-

ian officials said he had revisited a 2002 Arab League proposal that offered full Arab recognition of Israel if it gave up land seized in a 1967 war and accepted a "just solution" for Palestinian refugees.

"The US discussed a renewal of the initiative from the Arab League's part," Abbas aide Nimr Hammad told *Reuters*.

Rejected by Israel when it was originally proposed at a Beirut summit in 2002, the plan has major hurdles to overcome. Israel objects to key points, including a return to 1967 borders, the inclusion of Arab East Jerusalem in a Palestinian state and the return of Palestinian refugees to what is now Israel.

Kerry said he was trying to chip away at the mutual mistrust that has built up during the conflict, whose main issues include borders, the status of Jewish settlements on the West Bank, the fate of Palestinian refugees and the status of Jerusalem.

Fiji speaks for G77 at UN Forum on Forests

SUVA, 9 April—Fiji delivered a statement on behalf of the Group of 77 as its chair at the tenth session of the United Nations Forum on Forests, underscoring the importance of forest financing to the group as a means of its achieving sustainable forest management, the Fijian government said on Tuesday.

Inia Seruiratu, Fiji's minister of fisheries and forests, was participating in the first two days of the meeting, a dedicated min-

isterial segment involving plenary and two roundtable discussions.

The meeting was officially opened by Turkish prime minister on Monday in Istanbul and ends next Friday.

In his statement, one of the issues Seruiratu underscored was the importance of forest financing to the G77 as a means of its achieving sustainable forest management, according to a statement from Fiji's Ministry of Information.

The call for increased level of forest funding has been a consistent position of the group and it recognizes the need for support that many developing countries require to enable them to sustainably manage their forests.

Seruiratu said there is also "a need to develop and strengthen the role of governments on forest issues, including public-private partnerships and private sector engagement, where appropriate".

Japan set to join TPP talks as nod expected from US this week

TOKYO, 9 April— Japan and the United States are likely to conclude this week their preparatory talks on the Trans-Pacific Partnership free trade negotiations, clearing the way for Japan to join the full-fledged talks involving 11 nations in July at the earliest, government sources said on Tuesday.

Japan has agreed to allow the United States to retain the tariffs it imposes on automobiles and trucks imported from Japan for some time while securing fair competition in the insurance sector.

After the conclusion of the bilateral talks, US President Barack Obama is expected to notify the US Congress and seek its approval for Japan's participation in the negotiations on the trade liberalization pact covering the Pacific Rim nations. The approval process is expected to take at least 90 days. While Japan must still obtain approval from Australia, Canada and New Zealand to join the TPP ne-

gotiations, Japanese officials believe Tokyo is firmly on course to get the green light, with the three countries awaiting a US decision.

Since Prime Minister Shinzo Abe announced Japan's intent to join the TPP talks on 15 March, Japan has been calling for TPP negotiating countries to hold a negotiation round in July, seeking to join the rule-making process that has already entered its third year.

Nepali guide becomes 1st Mt Everest casualty this season

KATHMANDU, 9 April— A 46-year-old Nepali guide fell into a crevice on the slopes of Mt Everest, becoming the first casualty of this year's spring climbing season, a mountaineering official said on Monday.

Mingma Sherpa, among a select few Sherpas nicknamed "icefall doctors" for their expertise in fixing ropes over the treacherous Khumbu Icefall on the mountain, met instant death after falling into the crevice on Sunday afternoon while returning after fixing ropes, Tilak Pandey told *Kyodo News*.

His body has been recovered and handed over to his family members in Solukhumbu District, which is home to the world's tallest mountain.

The spring climbing season is the most popular among climbers seeking to scale the 8,848-metre peak. Every year, hundreds of climbers ascend the mountain in May after having spent weeks on its lower slopes acclimating to the altitude.—*Kyodo News*

Latvian PM denies massive inflows of money from Cyprus

TOKYO, 9 April—Latvian Prime Minister Valdis Dombrovskis denied reports on Monday that Russian money has flowed into the Baltic country in massive amounts following the financial crisis in Cyprus, saying he has not seen any “extraordinary developments” in that regard.

“So far we do not see any major inflows of this money,” he said during a speech in Tokyo, noting nonresident deposits, which make up around half of all deposits in Latvian banks, are at the level of the period

prior to the 2008 global financial crisis.

There is speculation in the media that Russian money has been flowing to Latvia, following the recent financial crisis in Cyprus, which has led to a bailout requiring big depositors at Cypriot banks to take losses. Dombrovskis also refused to equate the financial situation in his country with that in Cyprus, saying Latvian banks’ assets are equivalent to around 130 percent of gross domestic product, considerably lower than the 700 to 800 percent

seen in Cyprus.

“We have a small banking sector,” he said.

The prime minister added that Latvia does not intend to engage in “chasing” the money leaving Cyprus in search of a haven, because it is seen as a “higher-risk activity.”

Latvia, which joined the European Union in 2004, is seeking to join the 17-member eurozone and adopt the euro as its currency by 2014.

Dombrovskis made the case for Latvia’s bid to accede to the currency union,

saying the former Soviet republic has met all the requirements for joining the club, including on inflation and the ratios of its budget deficit and public debt to GDP.

The prime minister also said he plans to ask his Japanese counterpart Shinzo Abe to support Latvia’s bid to join the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, an association of 34 developed economies, when the two men hold a summit on Wednesday.

West sees enough substance for Iran talks to continue

BRUSSELS, 9 April—World powers believe there are enough grounds to keep talking to Iran about its disputed nuclear programme, a senior Western diplomat said on Monday, even though the latest round of negotiations made little apparent progress.

“There is enough substance for these negotiations to continue,” the diplomat, speaking on condition of anonymity, told reporters. “I would not expect a breakdown.”

At a meeting in the Kazakh city of Almaty on Friday and Saturday, the six nations — the United States, Russia, China,

France, Britain and Germany — tried to persuade Iran to give up its most sensitive uranium-enrichment work to allay concerns that Tehran is seeking the means to make atom bombs.

Iranian negotiators did not accept the offer — coupled with a pledge of modest relief from crippling economic sanctions—and the two sides failed to even agree to meet again.

But Western diplomats are at pains to show that diplomacy will continue, in part to avoid escalating tensions with Israel which has threatened to bomb Iranian nuclear sites if negotiations and sanctions fail to force it

to change course.

They are wary, however, of fuelling criticism that Iran may be playing them for time. US Secretary of State John Kerry said on Sunday the negotiation process could not go forever.

“We are clear talks for (the sake of) talks are not acceptable,” the senior diplomat added.

Some Western diplomats have said that while the two sides failed to bridge their differences in the decade-old dispute in Almaty, there was some optimism because of the apparent willingness of Iranian negotiators to engage in detailed discussions of their proposal.

Iran denies having any military intentions and says it needs nuclear power to generate electricity and for medical purposes. It wants the international community to recognize its right to enrich uranium and lift major economic sanctions.

The powers argue international rules apply only to countries that subject their nuclear work to stringent oversight by the United Nations, something Iran refuses to do.

Indian PM to visit Germany this week

NEW DELHI, 9 April—Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh will visit Germany this week along with five ministers, during which several pacts are likely to be inked between the two countries, a top official of the External Affairs Ministry said on Monday.

“Several pacts are likely to be signed during the high-profile visit. The ministers of the two countries will also meet and discuss possible areas of cooperation.

Defence and other areas are also high priority. We do have a very substantive cooperation in defense, even though our defence minister (AK Antony) is not visiting this time,” Indian Foreign Secretary Ranjan Mathai told the media.

During his three-day visit to Berlin, starting on 10 April, the Indian Prime Minister will co-chair with German Chancellor Angela Merkel the second meeting of inter-governmental con-

sultations to discuss all possible areas of cooperation.

The five ministers in his delegation include External Affairs Minister Salman Khurshid, Commerce Minister Anand Sharma, in addition to the Foreign Secretary and National Security Adviser Shiv Shankar Menon.

Germany is India’s largest trading partner in Europe and is also the eighth largest foreign direct investor in India.—Xinhua

BOJ mulled more easing steps at Shirakawa’s last meeting

TOKYO, 9 April—Bank of Japan policymakers discussed further monetary easing steps such as buying government bonds with longer maturities at the last policy-setting meeting chaired by former Governor Masaaki Shirakawa on 6 and 7 March, the minutes of the meeting showed on Tuesday.

Among other options raised by the members at the meeting were lowering the interest rate on excess bank reserves at the BOJ and expanding the pur-

chase of risky assets such as exchange-traded funds, according to the minutes.

“The time might be approaching for the bank to reconsider” the framework for monetary easing, one member said.

At the meeting, Policy Board member Sayuri Shirai proposed immediately starting the open-ended asset purchasing and integrating the BOJ’s asset-purchase programme for monetary easing with its regular bond-buying via market operations. But the

proposals were rejected by the board.

In considering ways to purchase long-term government bonds, some members said it was important for the central bank to ensure the market’s confidence that its large-scale purchases were not a form of “fiscal dominance,” or financing government debt.

One member, meanwhile, noted that it might be possible for the government to share any losses from risk asset purchases by the BOJ.—Kyodo News

Greens ask US to delay Keystone decision after Arkansas leak

WASHINGTON, 9 April—Environmental groups on Monday asked the Obama administration to extend the approval process of the Keystone XL pipeline, using last month’s spill of heavy Canadian crude oil in Arkansas as their latest reason to delay the project. The Obama administration is deciding whether to approve the Canada-to-Nebraska leg of TransCanada Corp’s proposed pipeline, which would link Canada’s oil sands, the world’s third richest crude oil deposit, to refineries in Texas.

The State Department,

which issued a draft environmental assessment of the \$5.3 billion project on 1 March, indicated then that a final decision could come by July or August.

The assessment is now in a 45-day public comment period that runs through 22 April. Then the administration has 90 days to decide whether the project is in the national interest.

Leading green groups, including the Sierra Club, the Natural Resources Defence Council, and 350.org, asked the agency to prolong the comment period to 120 days after a pipeline spilled

thousands of barrels of Canadian crude in a suburban neighbourhood in Mayflower, Arkansas in late March.

The State Department did not immediately respond to the request for comment about the letter.

Exxon Mobil Corp’s Pegasus pipeline, which runs from Illinois to Texas and can transport more than 90,000 barrels per day, remains shut after 22 homes were evacuated as a result of the oil-spill. “A 45-day comment period ... is entirely inappropriate in light of so many unanswered questions surrounding the Mayflower disaster,” the letter said. The 800,000 barrel per day Keystone pipeline would be far larger than Pegasus. President Barack Obama is expected to be the final arbiter on the Keystone decision, which splits important parts of his base: environmentalists, who are mostly opposed, and organized labour, which has backed the pipeline and the construction jobs it is likely to create.—Reuters

Ambulance dispatches in Japan projected to peak in 2023

TOKYO, 9 April—The number of ambulance dispatches in Japan is expected to peak at around 6.20 million in 2023, continuing to rise from the record high of 5.80 million in 2012, a projection made by the Fire and Disaster Management Agency showed on Monday.

Ambulance dispatches will rise in line with the in-

creasing number of elderly people taken to hospital for treatment of acute diseases and injuries resulting from falls, among other reasons, according to the projection from the agency under the Internal Affairs and Communications Ministry.

With the increase in dispatches, it is taking longer for ambulances to arrive and there could be

further loss of life due to the delays.

The agency has been studying a system for ambulances to attend emergencies on a priority basis according to the degree of urgency, while making efforts to train people in first aid.

Compared with the agency's projection in 2010, which forecast am-

bulance dispatches would peak at around 6.09 million in 2030, the latest projection, compiled in cooperation with researchers, shows dispatches will peak earlier and will be greater in number.

Ambulance dispatches are likely to decline gradually from 2024, according to the projection.

Toyota Boshoku sets up production base in Laos for 1st time

NAGOYA, 9 April—Toyota Boshoku Corp, a group company of Toyota Motor Corp, said on Monday it has set up a company in Laos to manufacture vehicle interior components, its first production base in the country.

The new company, named Toyota Boshoku Lao Co, will begin production of vehicle seat covers and other interior components in April 2014, with an eye to supplying them to its seat production base in neighbouring Thailand.

With the enhanced production system, Toyota Boshoku aims to further optimize production and distribution in Asia and Australia.

With an investment of about 500 million yen from Toyota Boshoku and another group company Toyota Tsusho Corp, the new company is set to have an annual production capacity of vehicle interior components for 200,000 cars.

The company, to be set up on a tract of an 80,000-square-metre plot in Savannakhet Province, is expected to employ about 180 people when it begins production.

Indonesia on alert over H7N9, steps up monitoring

JAKARTA, 9 April—Indonesian Deputy Trade Minister Bayu Krisnamurthi said on Monday that the new strain of bird flu H7N9 has not entered Indonesia, but the country is on alert over possible spread of the virus and keeps monitoring the development of the disease.

Indonesia has had experience of being hit, the hardest, by avian influenza, H5N1 virus, which has killed 160 people out of 192 infected since 2005.

"Until now, there is no impact of (H7N9) based on report of WHO. But we have to be alert and we will watch closely the development of the virus," he said on the sidelines of a busi-

ness meeting at JS Luwansa hotel.

The deputy minister said that cooperation with the agency in charge of animal disease had been carried out to investigate imported products.

Indonesia has just manufactured over 10 million bird flu vaccines to halt spread of a new strain of bird flu that has attacked ducks in main Java Island and killed hundreds of thousands of them, Indonesian Agriculture Minister Suswono Arsyaf has told Xinhua.

At the end of last year, Indonesian experts found a new strain of H5N1 virus on duck, which is more virulent.—Xinhua

Extended protection area could stop NZ dolphin extinction

WELLINGTON, 9 April—New Zealand's two heavily endangered dolphin species could be saved from extinction if fishing restrictions were extended out to a depth of 100 metres around the coast, according to a New Zealand study.

Protected areas, where gill nets and trawling were banned, had been shown

to effectively stop the fall in populations of Hector's dolphins, which are believed to number just over 7,000, University of Otago zoology associate professor Liz Sloaten said.

In the sanctuary at the South Island's Banks Peninsula, survival rates had risen by 5.4 percent since it was created in 1988, Sloaten said in a statement on Monday.

"However, nationwide, Hector's dolphins continue to slide towards extinction, mainly due to continuing by-catch in areas with few or no dolphin protection measures," she said.

Hector's dolphins ranged to six nautical miles off the west coast of the South Island, but protection only extended to two nautical miles offshore, and then only for three months of the year,

she said.

Several scientific organizations, including the Scientific Committee of the International Whaling Commission and the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) had recommended that protection be extended out to 100 metres deep.

If the recommendation were adopted, it was calculated that dolphin populations could recover to around 15,000 within 40 years.

The New Zealand government has come under increasing international pressure to do more to protect its native South Island Hector's dolphins, which is believed to number just 7,270, and the North Island Hector's dolphin, also known as Maui's dolphin, which is thought to number just 55.

Singapore lifts suspension of food imports from parts of Japan

SINGAPORE, 9 April—The Agri-Food and Veterinary Authority of Singapore on Monday lifted a suspension of food imports from seven prefectures in Japan that had been imposed after the Fukushima nuclear crisis in 2011.

The AVA said in a statement on its website that it is resuming food imports from Tokyo, Chiba, Ibaraki, Gunma, Kanagawa, Saitama and Tochigi prefectures with immediate effect.

With this move, only food imports from Fukushima Prefecture remains suspended.

It said the decision follows a review by the AVA and assurances from the Japanese Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries on the safety of food from Japan.

The move will allow milk and milk products, meat and meat products, eggs, seafood, fruits and vegetables from those seven prefectures to be imported into Singapore.

However, the lifting of suspensions comes with the condition that every consignment has to be accompanied by a certificate of origin and pre-export laboratory report, which certifies that the food has been tested for radioactivity and found to be free from radioactive contaminants. It said it will continue to closely monitor food imports from Japan to ensure that they are free from radioactive contaminants. It assured that food imported from Japan that is available in Singapore is safe for consumption.

SINGAPORE, 9 April—The pensions for Singapore's administrative officers and judicial appointment holders, and a long-term retention package will be introduced instead for administrative officers, Deputy Prime Minister Teo Chee Hean said on Monday.

A gratuity plan will be introduced for judicial and statutory appointment hold-

ers.

The new retention package was introduced with the aim of retaining officers for leadership and policy continuity within the public service, following a review by the Public Service Division.

The change will affect about 300 administrative service officers, judicial and statutory appointment

Over 11,000 soldiers to participate in Russian Victory Parade

Moscow, 9 April— Over 11,000 servicemen are to take part in a military parade in Moscow on 9 May, a Russian military officer said on Monday.

A total of 11,312 servicemen will be involved in the parade on Moscow's Red Square. One hundred and one military vehicles will march past the Kremlin and eight Mi-8 helicopters will fly over the capital's main square, Col Gen Vladimir Chirkin said at a meeting in the Defence Ministry.

The parades to mark the victory in the Great Patriotic War in 1945 will be joined by 24 Russian cities.

Chirkin said it was the first time in three years the cadets would take part in the Russia's largest patriotic event.

"I consider that decision to be right. It would preserve years-long traditions," Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu said.

The First Victory Parade took place in Moscow on 24 June, 1945.

Italian police arrest 37 in mafia haul

PALERMO, 9 April— Italian authorities arrested 37 people accused of involvement in the Sicilian Mafia, including the mayor of a town on the island, police said on Monday.

The arrests, on charges including organized crime and extortion, were ordered by the Palermo anti-mafia office to tackle what police said was a network to control businesses in towns around Sicily's capital.

Among those arrested was the mayor of Montelepre, a town of 6,000 famous as the home of 1940s "Robin Hood" bandit leader Salvatore Giuliano, as well as a livestock breeder who police said was the head of the ring.

Anti-mafia prosecutor Francesco Messineo told reporters the investigation had revealed a concerted attempt to influence local politics. "Here we have two municipal governments... that have been the subject of strong mafia contamination," he said.

Italy has long struggled against the ingrained influence of mafia organizations whose operations are estimated to constitute up to 10 percent of gross domestic product.

Italy's main crime groups — the Sicilian Cosa Nostra, Calabria's 'Ndrangheta and the Camorra from the southern city of Naples — have a total annual turnover of 116 billion euros (98.5 billion pounds), the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime says.

Singapore Botanic Gardens eyes UNESCO heritage status

SINGAPORE, 9 April— Singapore is preparing for a bid for the Singapore Botanic Gardens to be listed as a UNESCO World Heritage site, Acting Minister for Culture, Community and Youth Lawrence Wong said on Monday.

If successful, it will be Singapore's first UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) World Heritage.

The garden, founded in 1859 by a horticultural society, was chosen for submission because it fulfils the criteria of having outstanding universal value, and it contributes to the region and the world, Wong said.

Rubber seeds grown in the garden propelled

the growth of the rubber industry, and the development of Singapore from a fishing village to one of the world's busiest ports in the 20th century, he said.

News of the garden in a bid for UNESCO Heritage status has made headlines recently in Singapore since 1 April.

Wong told lawmakers on Monday that the decision to nominate the gardens was based on a study commissioned by the Ministry for Information, Communications and the Arts, and was done in consultation with experts, academics and other stakeholders.

"There was indeed consultation done, in the lead-up to even identifying the Singapore Botanic Gar-

dens," he said. "It was not the only site that was highlighted as a possibility."

The National Heritage Board and the Singapore Botanic Gardens are currently working together on the bid and have hired a consultant to put together a nomination dossier, including a site management plan, by February 2014.

Upon submission of the nomination documents, experts from one of UNESCO's advisory bodies will carry out site assessments and study the dossier before making their recommendations. This process takes about a year.

The World Heritage Committee will then meet around June 2015 to vote on the nomination.

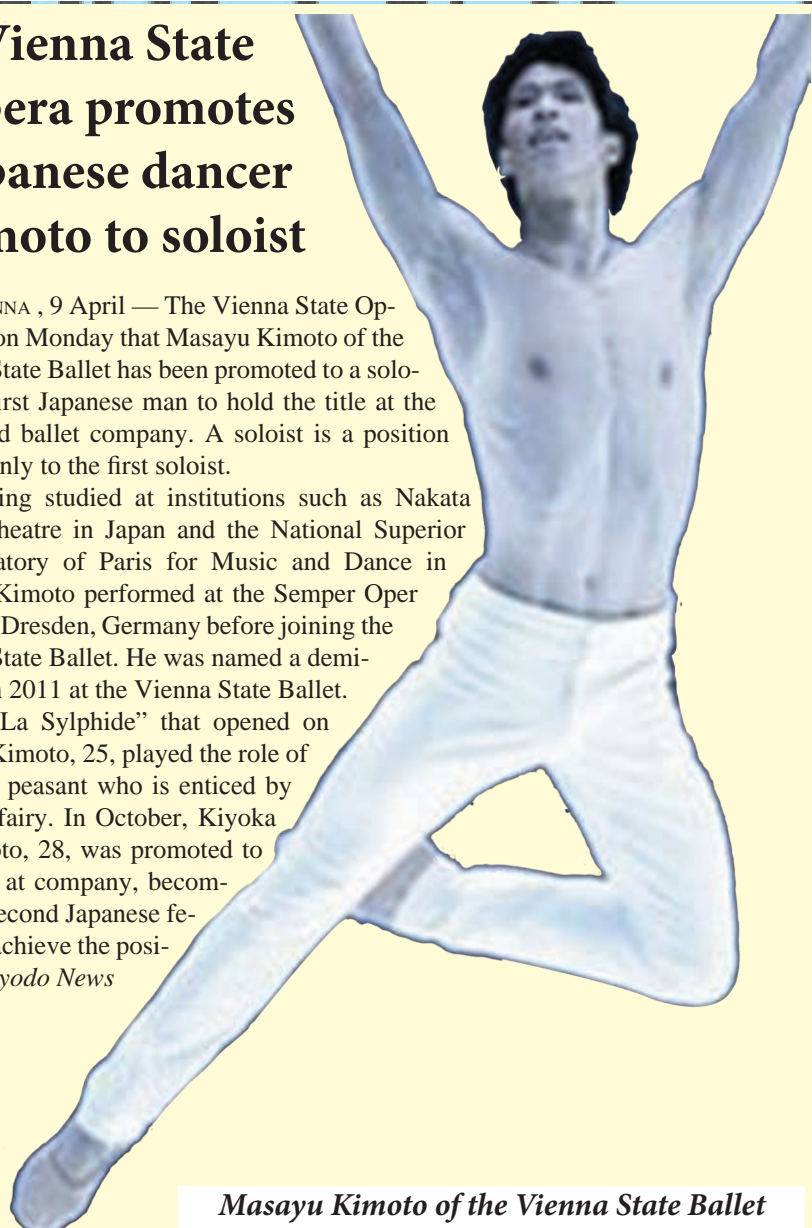

Streep voices admiration for “Iron Lady” she played in film

LONDON, 9 April — Actress Meryl Streep, who won an Oscar for her portrayal of Margaret Thatcher in the 2011 film “The Iron Lady”, praised the former British prime minister on Monday as a pioneer for the role of women in politics. Britain’s first and only female political leader died on Monday, aged 87, after suffering a stroke.

Streep, 63, described Thatcher as a trailblazer, “willingly or unwillingly”,

for female political leaders. “To me she was a figure of awe for her personal strength and grit,” the American actress said in a statement. “To have given women and girls around the world reason to supplant fantasies of being princesses with a different dream: the real-life option of leading their nation; this was groundbreaking and admirable.”

Streep paid tribute to Thatcher for rising to the position of prime minister

from her upbringing as a grocer’s daughter on the back of her own hard work. The multi-Oscar-winning actress acknowledged that the right-wing Thatcher divided opinion. But Streep said Thatcher deserved credit for standing by her convictions despite the “special hatred and ridicule, unprecedented in my opinion, levelled in our time at a public figure who was not a mass murderer”.—*Reuters*

Halle Berry pregnant with second child

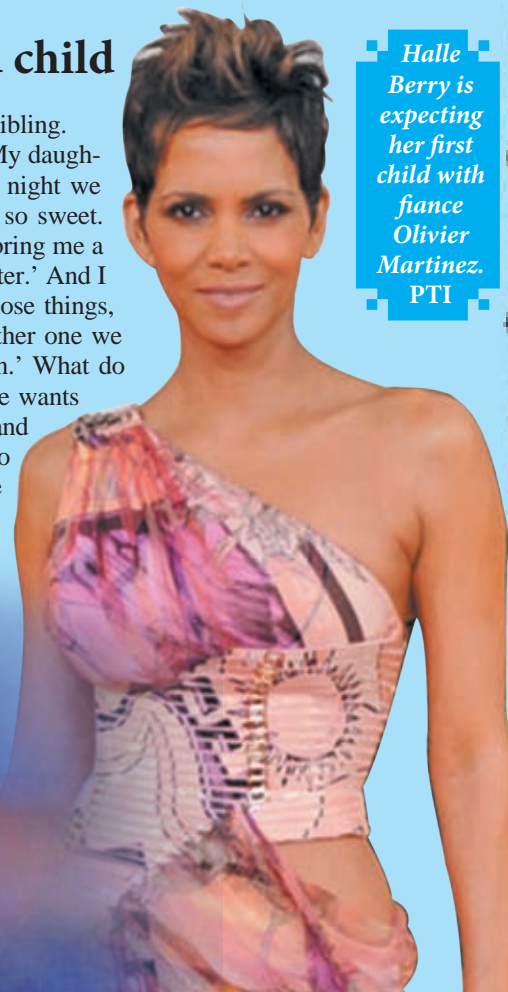

AUGUSTA, 9 April—Former British Open champion Darren Clarke has pulled out of this week's US Masters because of a lingering hamstring injury, the Northern Irishman said on Monday. The 44-year-old, who has made 11 appearances in the season's first major championship, suffered the injury just over a week ago while holidaying on the Bahamas island of Abaco.

"It is with deep regret that I will not be able to play at Augusta this year," Clarke said on his website

(darrenclarke.com/). "Playing in the Masters is one of golf's greatest pleasures and I am very disappointed to be missing out." Clarke, who won his only major title at the 2011 British Open after holding off Americans Phil Mickelson and Dustin Johnson, was also forced to withdraw from last week's Texas Open on the US PGA Tour because of the injury.

Despite having rest and extensive treatment on his hamstring, Clarke felt he would not be able to cope at the Masters with the

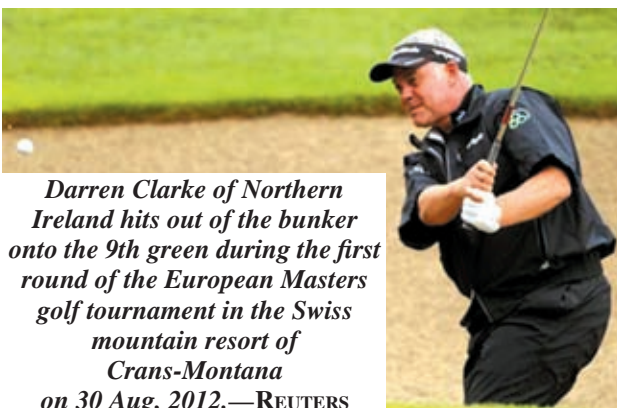

Greek federation welcomes improved state funding

ATHENS, 9 April—Greek athletics will receive improved state funding close to \$6.5 million after the national federation SEGAS protested against original proposals for cuts of up to 80 percent.

SEGAS said in a statement on its website (www.segas.gr) on Monday that it welcomed the government's change of heart, although the amount of 4,916,800 euros was still 30 percent less than in 2012. In February the state promised to revise the severity of proposed funding cuts and allocated an extra 11 million euros to stop some beleaguered federations from closing down.

The budget for Olympic sports federations has been slashed by 50 percent year on year since 2010, while cuts of between 60 and 80 percent were due to be put into effect for 2013 under the country's austerity measures.

Water polo and swimming have also suffered, with Greece pulling their swimmers out of the European short-course championships at the end of last year for the first time in 16 years.

Kuchar sees progression leading to major victory

AUGUSTA, 9 April—With big victories adding up on his PGA Tour profile, Matt Kuchar hopes his natural progression will lead him to the missing piece on his resume—a major championship. The 34-year-old American won last year's prestigious Players Championship and notched his first World Golf Championships title this year at the Accenture Match Play for his fifth career win. After finishing tied for third at the 2012 Masters, Kuchar believes he is ready to take the next step at the year's first major when the Masters begins on Thursday at Augusta National. "It just gives me confidence knowing that I can contend in major championships, that I can be there late on Sunday," Kuchar said on Monday about last year's Masters. "It was my first real chance to win a major coming down the stretch late on Sunday."

Kuchar, who along with Masters winner Bubba Watson were the only two players to break par all four rounds last year, was tied for the lead after making an eagle on the par-five 15th hole in the final round but bogeyed the 16th and missed out on joining a playoff with Watson and Louis Oosthuizen. "It just feels like one of those stepping stones into continuing to contend and winning majors, just having

that experience that I've been there," he said. "The more times you're there, the more comfortable you get with it."

While some major championship winners carefully devise their preparations ahead of major tournaments, world number nine Kuchar said he believed consistency was the best way to flourish in the majors. "To me I always felt like it was hard to turn things off and on. I would like to kind of be 'on' with regularity and play well week in and week out, and I felt like that was the best preparation...and let that carry into major championships. "I'd like to be able to kind of roll out of bed, know that I'm going to be hitting it good and have a good chance when I tee it up. I felt like my game has progressed that way."

While Kuchar, who began this season with a pair of top 10s in Hawaii, raved about the condition of Augusta National he was a little worried about how fast the greens were running. "It seems every year when I play practice rounds, you kind of get a feeling that the greens get quicker and quicker each day," said Kuchar, who will be playing in his seventh Masters. "They are already quick. They are already firm. I'm a little nervous to think what awaits us on Thursday."—Reuters

Volvo Ocean Race unveils longest ever route for 2014-15

ALICANTE, (Spain), 9 April — The next edition of the Volvo Ocean Race in 2014-15 will be the longest ever, after organizers announced on Monday a route taking in 10 cities in nine countries and lasting almost nine months. The 12th edition of the round-the-world yacht race will begin in Alicante, Spain on 4 October, 2014 and visit Recife (Brazil), Abu Dhabi (UAE), Sanya (China), Auckland (New

Zealand, Itajai (Brazil), Newport, Rhode Island (United States), Lisbon (Portugal), Lorient (France) and Gothenburg (Sweden), finishing on 27 June, 2015.

The full race distance will be 39,895 nautical miles. The previous longest edition, won by French skipper Franck Cammas in 2012, was 39,270 nautical miles. "This new route means two visits to Brazil just when it is the world capital of sport," Race CEO Knut Frostad told Reuters. "To be going there right between the soccer World Cup in 2014 and the Olympics in Rio in 2016 is very exciting."

UN agency reopens Gaza food distribution centres

GAZA, 9 April—The main UN humanitarian agency for Palestinians said on Monday it was reopening its Gaza food distribution centres after suspending operations last week in response to violent protests over aid cutbacks.

The centres, which the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) closed on Thursday after demonstrators stormed its headquarters, supply food to 800,000 Palestinians—

nearly half the population of the impoverished Gaza Strip.

Announcing that food distribution centres and relief offices would reopen on Tuesday, Adnan Abu Hasna, UNRWA's Gaza media adviser, said the agency had received "assurances from the relevant parties over the safety of its staff".

The violence on Thursday was part of a dispute that had been brewing

for weeks in the territory, which is governed by the Islamist Hamas movement.

Robert Turner, UNRWA's director of Gaza operations, said the agency faced a \$68 million shortfall in 2013 and that it had decided to cut a \$40 annual handout to 106,000 Gaza refugees to save some \$5.5 million. To soften the blow, the agency offered job programmes to help the poorest families.

Portugal court ruling forces cuts on education, health

LISBON, 9 April—Portuguese will suffer from cuts to schools and hospitals to protect civil service benefits after the constitutional court rejected austerity measures that would have reduced holiday bonuses and other public sector perks.

The government has had to scramble to find new areas to cut after the court concluded that it was unfair to single out civil servants for reductions in benefits under measures imposed to meet the terms of an interna-

national bailout programme.

The decision deepens the divide between a protected class of civil servants and other workers, whose lives have become far more precarious during the worst recession since the 1970s.

Although public sector pay has fallen faster than in the private sector during Portugal's economic crisis, state workers still earn on average double the wages of the private sector. Meanwhile, all Portuguese have been hit since January by the largest

tax hikes in living memory, and many economists believe more austerity measures will prolong and deepen the slump.

"This decision left me very worried. Civil servants benefit, but not the private sector. It's in the public sector where the government has to cut," said Sonia Castro 39, an unemployed secretary.

Jose Manuel, 56-year-old taxi driver in Lisbon, said the only outcome he sees is that "our lives will

French photographer escapes Afghan kidnappers after four months

KABUL, 9 April—A French photographer kidnapped in Afghanistan four months ago fled his captors on Monday and was now safe in the hands of officials from his embassy, the Afghan Interior Ministry said.

A second French hostage in Afghanistan was freed by his captors, a

spokesman for France's foreign ministry said, without providing any details.

Twenty-nine-year-old freelance Pierre Borghi had been chained up in a crudely dug hole covered by a trap door but managed to escape and reached a checkpoint manned by government security guards in central Wardak Province,

an Afghan official said.

Borghi, from Grenoble in south-eastern France, was brought to the Interior Ministry's headquarters in Kabul at about 4:30 pm (1200 GMT) and left in the company of French embassy officials less than an hour later, ministry spokesman Sediq Sediqqi said.
