President U Thein Sein sends messages of sympathy to Chinese President, Premier

NAY PYI TAW, 23 April—U Thein Sein, President of Republic of the Union of Myanmar, has sent messages of sympathy to His Excellency Mr. Xin Jinping, President of the People's Republic of China and His Excellency Mr. Li Keqiang, Premier of the State Council of the People's Republic of China for the great loss of life and property caused by the earthquake in Sichuan Province of the People's Republic of China.—MNA

NAY PYI TAW, 23 April—Myanmar President U Thein Sein had a meeting with Indonesian President Dr Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono and party at the Credentials Hall of the Presidential Palace here this evening.

The Myanmar President opened the meeting with his wish for further cementing time-honoured ties between the two countries established since 1949.

The two countries agreed on increasing the trade volume to USD 500 million on his Indonesian visit in May 2012, he recalled, acknowledging the current trade volume between the two countries has reached USD 470 million.

According to statistics up to December 2012, 12 Indonesian firms have invested USD 241 million in Myanmar with plenty of future investment possibilities, he added.

The Myanmar President called for boosting bilateral cooperation in tourism,

transportation, livestock and fishery, agriculture, energy and electricity sectors.

He said scholarships and cooperation for promotion of technology sector would be welcomed. The Indonesian President recalled his first trip to Myanmar in 2006

and recognized the country's significant progress in democracy, peace and stability and international relations he witnessed in his

second visit.

He vowed to increase economic cooperation as Indonesia in supportive of relations he witnessed in his

President U Thein Sein's ICG Chairman's Award Acceptance Speech

YANGON, 23 April—A video speech of President U Thein Sein was presented at the ICG Chairman's Award acceptance ceremony.

The full text of the speech is as follows:-

Excellencies, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I receive this honor with gratitude and humility at a time when citizens of Myanmar are engaged in an adventure to build a more democratic, open and inclusive society. Before I continue, I wish to thank the International Crisis Group, Madam Louise Arbour, and Members of the Board of Trustees for honoring me with the Chairman's Award. I also wish to thank Mr. George Soros for his kind words and congratulate my fellow honoree, his Excellency Mr. Lula.

I do not believe that I received this award as a person, but as a representative of a movement to transform a society. As you all may know already, we are undertaking a series of reforms aimed at political liberalization, peace building and economic development. I have been fortunate to participate in these reforms in my capacity as the President and witness change first hand. At the same time, I am mindful that I play but one part in this undertaking and humbled by those who came before, others who are equally deserving, and those who will continue the journey.

Words alone cannot describe the joy in my heart or the faith I place in my fellow citizens to mold "New Myanmar". We are on our way, but I am mindful that the kind of society we want to live in requires us to work

harder. For Myanmar to be truly inclusive, all ethnic nationalities must come together and heal the wounds of the past in order to respond to the challenges we face today. There can be no democracy without peace and no peace without democracy.

I wish to extend an invitation to all of you to visit Myanmar. There is a sense of renewed hope now that we are on a democratic path. But, democracy is more than an idea. We must not just talk about democracy, but build its institutions and construct its new culture—a culture where we can give meaning to such values as equality, social justice, and tolerance. We must be mindful that the practice of democratic freedoms that we hold dear must not infringe on the civil liberties of others.

This is a time for possibilities. What seemed impossible before is now possible, but we must turn what is possible now into something enduring. We must chart a collective path towards something better—a society that is open, inclusive, tolerant, and respectful of individual dignity. I am mindful of the challenges. But, I am also heartened to know that we have friends in the international community who will keep us diligent and honest, but pick us up if we stumble.

I sincerely hope that you will join us on this journey. Again, I thank you.

Transformer fires waste over K 23.5 million in Dagon Township

YANGON, 23 April—Due to rainwater that flowed into underground cables, electric stock caused outbreak of fire at transformers in Dagon Township at 7 pm on 18 April.

According to the information given by dutiful people, fire engines and management vehicles from Kyauktada Township Fire Station arrived at the scene and put out the fire at 7.35 pm.

The fire started from the electric stock at the 6.6 KV underground cable at the officer quarter of Public

Works at the corner of Zizawa Street and Samon Street.

The fire engulfed the 6.6 KV power line of Township Electricity Supply Board at the corner of U Wisara Road and Ziwaka Road in Pyay (East) Ward of Dagon Township, 6.6 KV transformer of Yangon City Electricity Supply Board in the compound of Lower Myanmar Medical Research Department at No 5 on Ziwaka Road in Phayagyi Ward of Dagon Township, and 6.6 KV transformer of YESB at Nawarat Sub-Power Station on U Wisara Road in Dagon Township.

The loss in the fire amounted to over K 27.5 million.

Due to untimely rains in some townships of Yangon Region, there were electric shocks at power lines from the lamp-posts and housings.

Plan to implement second OPV immunization programme in Rakhine State

YANGON, 23 April—The second oral polio vaccine immunization programmes will be held in Rakhine State in the last week of April, according to UNICEF-Myanmar.

“In the first time, the immunization was held from 26 to 30 March in Rakhine State. In the last week of April, OPV will be given to children under five

in villages and relief camps. Moreover, BCG vaccines and light refreshment will be provided to the children in addition to OPV,” said the UNICEF resident representative.

Due to recent year’s unrest in the state, 44 per cent of children under

five missed the chance to get OPV, so the UNICEF will give the vaccine to the children. In the first immunization, OPV was given to over 300,000 children from 12 townships of Rakhine State, and in the second time, emphasis will be placed on providing

OPV to the all remaining children.

UNICEF (Myanmar) issued news release that UNICEF and Ministry of Health are making concerted efforts for making Myanmar as polio free nation in 2014, so they are trying hard to successfully carry out immunization of OPV to the children across the nation.—Myanma Alinn

IAEA calls for efforts in radioactive water management at Fukushima

TOKYO, 23 April—A team of experts from the International Atomic Energy Agency on Monday called on Japan to make efforts to enhance its management over the radioactive water accumulating at the crippled Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant, calling it “the most challenging issue” in the short term. “Measures should continue to improve management issues regarding radiation releases and exposure from the site, particularly issues created by the storage of accumulated water,” the IAEA said in a summary of its draft report released the same day following its week-long mission in Japan.

The 13-member team is the first IAEA mission to Japan to review the coun-

try’s efforts to decommission the reactors that were severely damaged during the Fukushima Daiichi complex disaster, triggered by a huge earthquake and tsunami in March 2011. The mission took place shortly after the plant’s fragile state was highlighted through a series of mishaps including leaks of radioactive water and electricity supply disruptions that affected key cooling systems of spent fuel pools.

Team leader Juan Carlos Lentijo, Director of the IAEA Division of Nuclear Fuel Cycle and Waste Technology, said Tokyo Electric Power Co, the plant operator, has achieved the stable cooling of the crippled reactors and spent fuel pools, but the temporary systems

installed at the complex in the face of the crisis need to be permanent ones to improve its stability. He also said at a Press conference in Tokyo that the team has

called for the need to “define a new comprehensive strategy for the appropriate management” of the polluted water accumulating at the plant.

The strategy should include the introduction of more reliable technological systems and an assessment of the doses to the public arising from the contaminated water in the tanks, he added. The draft report itself was not made public. The IAEA team plans to deliver a final report on the mission to Japan within one month. Japan hopes to reflect the advice given by

the IAEA when it updates its medium- and long-term roadmap toward the decommissioning of the Nos. 1 to 4 reactors at the plant. The whole process is expected to take around 30 or 40 years.


The building housing the No 4 unit was subjected to a hydrogen explosion at the time of the accident. The IAEA team said Japan has “logical and rational plans” for the most complex task of removing the melted fuel from the Nos. 1 to 3 reactors, which experienced meltdowns.

Afghan, Pakistan, US to meet for talks in Brussels

KABUL, 23 April—Afghan President Hamid Karzai will travel to Brussels on Tuesday to meet US Secretary of State John Kerry and senior Pakistani officials to discuss the flagging Afghan peace process, an Afghan presidential spokesman said on Monday.

The meeting had been arranged by Kerry in order to repair relations between Pakistan and Afghanistan, following weeks of tension relating to border disputes and the peace process, Karzai’s chief spokesman, Aimal Faizi, said in Kabul.—Reuters

In China, top military officer defends US pivot to Asia

BEIJING, 23 April—The United States’ top military officer on Monday defended the re-orientation of its foreign policy toward Asia in front of his Chinese counterpart, a week after Beijing criticized Washington for ramping up its military presence in the region.

China is uneasy with what the United States has called the “rebalancing” of forces as Washington winds down the war in Afghanistan and renews its attention further east. China says the policy has emboldened Japan, the Philippines and Vietnam in longstanding territorial disputes with Beijing.

US Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Gen. Martin Dempsey said the United States “has been and will continue to be a Pacific power. “We seek to be a stabilizing influence in the region,” Dempsey said at a news conference at China’s

Ministry of National Defence. “In fact, we believe it would be our absence that would be destabilizing in the region, not our presence.”

Dempsey was speaking at a joint Press conference with Chinese Chief of the General Staff of the Chinese People’s Liberation Army Fang Fenghui after both

sides held talks earlier in the day. China’s defence ministry made a thinly veiled criticism of the United States last week for increasing tensions in the Asia-Pacific, saying China faces “multiple and complicated security threats” due to the US strategy.

Taleban militants capture nine people from downed chopper

PUL-E-ALAM, (Afghanistan), 23 April—Taleban militants captured nine people from a downed helicopter in Azra district of Logar Province over night, local official Hamidullah Hamid

said on Monday. “A civilian helicopter went down in Darai Manga area of Azra District overnight and Taliban militants captured all nine aboard,” Hamid told Xinhua.

Eight of the hostages are Turkish nationals and one is Afghan, Hamid said, adding that the Turkish nationals are construction engineers and were coming from Khost to Kabul. According to the

European Union lifts sanctions against Myanmar

BRUSSELS, 23 April—The European Union decided at a meeting of foreign ministers on Monday to lift all sanctions against Myanmar, with the exception of arms embargo, to recognize changes toward democratization in Myanmar.

The decision will pave the way for Myanmar and the EU to strengthen economic relations as it removes the asset freeze and travel embargo to the EU against government officials and measures banning trade and investment in forestry, industrial and

other sectors. The EU Council said in a statement, “In response to the changes that have taken place and in the expectation that they will continue, the Council has decided to lift all sanctions with the exception of the embargo on arms which will remain in place.”

In April last year, the EU had decided to suspend all sanctions against Myanmar except arms embargo for one year. In January, it set up an office in Yangon, the largest city in Myanmar, to step up relations.—Kyodo News

Boston Marathon case prosecutor known for aggressive record

BASTON/NEW YORK, 23 April—As the top federal law enforcer in Massachusetts, US Attorney Carmen Ortiz has taken heat for being tough to a fault and coming down too hard on some defendants. But as she builds a possible death penalty case against suspected Boston Marathon bomber Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, 19, the unflinching approach that earned her opponents in the past could become a legal asset for the biggest case of her career, said attorneys who have faced off against her.

“The criticism lately has been that they’ve overcharged some people and been overly harsh,” said Peter Elikann, a Boston defense attorney. “I don’t think that’s relevant for Tsarnaev because no one is going to accuse any prosecutor of making too big

a deal out of this case.” Tsarnaev and his brother, Tamerlan, 26, are suspected of setting off bombs at the crowded finish line of the marathon on Monday, killing three people and injuring more than 170.

Tsarnaev was arrested late on Friday after a manhunt that shut down parts of Boston. He is hospitalized and under guard.

His older brother died after a shootout with police. Ortiz’s office, which is leading the investigation, has not given a firm timetable for charges. Ortiz, 57, did not respond to questions sent via a spokeswoman. Massachusetts Attorney General Martha Coakley told CNN on Sunday it was likely “most if not all the charges will be federal.” Tsarnaev could face murder and other state charges.

Slowdown in Apple orders weighs on LG Display's first-quarter profit

SEOUL, 23 April—LG Display Co Ltd reported its smallest profit since it returned to the black in the second quarter of last year, as demand for iPhone and iPad screens from Apple weakened amid concerns the US company is losing its luster in the mobile de-

vice market.

Apple Inc, which analysts say provides about 30 percent of LG Display's revenue, is facing intensifying competition from Samsung and up-and-coming rivals. A disappointing forecast by a US supplier to Apple last

week heightened fears about slowing demand for the iPhone and iPad, pushing shares of Asian suppliers including LG Display sharply lower.

LG Display, which vies with Samsung Electronics Co Ltd's panel unit for the top position in LCD flat screens globally, made 151 billion won (\$135 million) in operating profit in its January-March first quarter. That compared with the average forecast of a 147 billion won profit in a Thomson Reuters poll of analysts.

It was the South Korean company's fourth straight quarterly profit after seven straight quarters of losses, as makers of liquid crystal display panels have since curtailed output after about two years of oversupply.

Nokia to launch new phone with physical keyboard on 24 April

NEW DELHI, 23 April—Nokia has teased an image of what possibly could be a new mobile phone, on its blog, Nokia Conversations and through its Twitter account.

The Finnish handset maker has also informed that it will be announcing something new, followed by a Q&A session with Neil Broadley from its Mobile Phones team along with an unnamed special guest on Wednesday, 24 April at 7am GMT (12:30pm IST).

The teaser displays part of a phone's screen and a small part of its hardware keyboard. The device is a yellow coloured phone with a polycarbonate shell similar to the designs we've seen in the company's Lu-

mia range of Windows Phone smartphones.

It's difficult to say if the launch could be feature Nokia's first hardware keyboard equipped Windows Phone device or the company is launching a refreshed line-up of handsets in its Asha feature phone range. While we haven't heard much about the Windows Phone QWERTY handsets, we've seen some evidence of the latter.

Earlier this month, a purported pictures featuring Nokia's refreshed range of Asha mobile handsets had been posted online by the Twitter user @evleaks. The images had featured three different handsets in bold colours such as green,



red and yellow. The images had made us think that Nokia was trying to apply a similar design philosophy to its Asha devices that it had adopted for its Lumia smartphones.

The launch event could see the rumour materialising into a real product. Nokia is facing increased competition in the sub Rs 5,000 category from the local handset makers offering affordably

CAPE CANAVERAL, 23 April—A privately owned rocket built in partnership with NASA to haul cargo to the International Space Station blasted off on Sunday for a debut test flight from a new commercial spaceport in Virginia.

The 13-story Antares rocket, developed and flown by Orbital Sciences Corp, lifted off at 5 pm EDT (2100 GMT) from a Virginia-owned and operated launch pad at NASA's Wallops Flight Facility on Wallops Island, Virginia.

"Beautiful view," said NASA launch commentator Kyle Herring as live video from the rocket, broadcast on NASA TV, showed the booster riding atop a bright plume of fire above the Atlantic Ocean.

Ten minutes later, the rocket deposited its payload — a 8,380-pound (3,800-

kg) dummy capsule — into an orbit 158 miles above the planet, fulfilling the primary goal of the test flight.

Orbital Sciences and privately owned Space Exploration Technologies, or SpaceX, hold NASA contracts worth a combined \$3.5 billion to fly cargo to the space station, a \$100

billion research outpost that flies about 250 miles above Earth.

NASA turned to commercial suppliers after retiring the space shuttles in 2011. Flight controllers radioed news of Antares' successful debut to the station crew shortly after launch.

Cosmonauts tackle equipment installation outside space station

CAPE CANAVERAL, 23 April—A pair of Russian cosmonauts wrapped up a 6-1/2 hour spacewalk outside the International Space Station on Friday, the first of up to eight outings this year to install experiments and prepare the orbital outpost for a new module, officials said.

Flight engineers Pavel Vinogradov, 59, a veteran of seven spacewalks and Roman Romanenko, 41, a second-generation cosmonaut on his debut spacewalk, floated outside the station's airlock at 10:03 am EDT/1403 GMT as the station soared 262 miles

over the southern Pacific Ocean.

The primary purpose of the 6-1/2 hour excursion was to set up an experiment that monitors plasma waves in Earth's ionosphere, the outer layer of the planet's atmosphere that extends to about 370 miles into space.

Instruments on two boxes attached to handrails on the forward portion of the station's Zvezda module will measure low-frequency electromagnetic radiation, which, among other triggers, has been tied to earthquakes.

Search is on for next Israeli astronaut

HERZLIYA, 23 April—At the recent gathering of outer-space experts in Herzliya, one clear message echoed repeatedly: Israel may be a tiny nation, but it has a lot to offer the space community.

The eighth annual Ilan Ramon Space Conference at the end of January brought to Israel's shores a record 14 international heads of space agencies, including NASA and the European Space Agency, as well as experts from around the world.

Israeli activity in the study of outer space began in the 1960s with academic research. In 1983,

the Israel Space Agency was established, by government decision, within the Ministry of Science and Technology.

The conference in Herzliya, co-sponsored by the Fisher Institute for Air & Space Strategic Studies, focused on conquering new frontiers in space, collaboration projects, and the latest developments in the field.

Maybe one of them will come from Moona, a new science, environment and space educational center in the mixed Arab-Jewish city of Sakhnin.

At the conference, NASA and the Ministry of

Science and Technology representatives announced that the search has begun for the next Israeli astronaut. "It's possible that an Israeli trained by NASA could be sent to work at the International Space Station in a few years," the ministry said in a statement.

In space research, collaboration is the name of the game. And with heads of all the major players at the event, more than one handshake for proposed joint projects came about. Israel was invited to join the UN Committee on Peaceful Uses of Outer Space (COPUOS), the central international body that

Gold traders pick bargains fearing price rise

MUMBAI, 23 April—Gold traders in India, the world's biggest buyer of the metal, continued to pick up bargains for a second consecutive week fearing further price rise, after prices rose nearly 1 percent from the lowest level in more than 18 months.

* An 11 percent slump in gold prices since last week released years of pent-up demand, resulting in a supply shortage in the physical market, triggering higher premiums.

* "There are a lot of deals as people are comfortable at these levels ... All are saying prices may go up any time," said a dealer with a state-run bullion importing bank.

* However, the federal government has been trying to keep a lid on bulging imports to counter the record high current account deficit.

* The actively traded gold for June delivery on the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX) was 266 rupees higher at 26,312 rupees per 10 grams at 2:39 pm, after hitting a low of 25,270 rupees, a level last seen in September 2011.

* The rupee, which weakened on Monday, plays an important role in determining the landed cost of the dollar-quoted yellow metal.

* Gold in the overseas market jumped more than 2 percent after a rebound above \$1,400 ignited technical buying, but sentiment was shaky as steady outflows from exchange-traded funds trimmed their bullion holdings to the lowest in three years.

* May silver on the MCX was 215 rupees higher at 43,638 rupees per kg.—Reuters

World stocks gain, dollar up against yen after G20 backs Japan

LONDON, 23 April—The dollar strengthened towards 100 per yen on Monday and shares rose after the G20 accepted Japan's bold stimulus policies, helping to counter the gloom over the global growth outlook.

In a communique after a two-day meeting, the G20 said it would be "mindful" of possible side effects from extended periods of monetary stimulus, without singling out Japan as some in the markets had feared.

The move signals acceptance that reflation of Japan's economy, the world's third largest, is seen as key to any

global recovery, still very fragile after years of easy monetary policies by major central banks in the US and Europe.

"The real issue of deflation in Japan has to be tackled before we can have a genuine global recovery," said James Bevan, chief investment Officer at CCLA Investment Management.

The G20's move has also removed any remaining obstacle to further yen weakness, setting up a test of the symbolic 100 yen to the dollar level.

"Japan not only escaped criticism, but on the contrary won praise as a country that was fulfilling

Ahead of reform, medical care slowdown hits companies

NEW YORK, 23 April—As the clock ticks down to the start of a US healthcare overhaul, companies from device makers to hospital chains have been surprised to see Americans make even fewer trips to the doctor's office.

Use of non-emergency medical services has been weak for several years in the wake of a deep recession, high joblessness and the steadily rising cost of care.

Those trends now may be exacerbated in the months before President Barack Obama's healthcare law takes full effect in 2014, analysts said. Part of the reason is that employers are shifting more of the insurance benefits they

offer to so-called high-deductible plans, requiring employees to pay more for their medical care upfront, to buffer new costs they face under "Obamacare".

This is all starting to show in some weak and disappointing earnings reports for the first quarter.

"It's still early in the reporting season, but so far it all points to softness. In the US volumes at hospitals, inpatient and out-patient are soft," said David Heupel, senior healthcare analyst at Thrivent Investment Management.

In the past week, medical testing companies, such as Quest Diagnostics, medical device makers Johnson & Johnson and Abbott Laboratories,

787 jets owned by launch customer All Nippon Airways (9202.T), starting a process that should make the first commercial Dreamliners

ready to fly again in about a week. Teams of Boeing engineers are working on the ANA jets at four airports in Japan, including Tokyo's Haneda and Narita hubs, Ryosei Nomura, a spokesman for the carrier said.

The Dreamliners have

been parked since regulators in the United States and elsewhere ordered all 50 planes out of the skies in mid-January after batteries on two of them overheated.

ANA is the world's biggest operator of the carbon-composite aircraft with 17 of the planes. After ANA, the biggest 787 operator is local rival Japan Airlines Co (9201.T) with seven jets, followed by United Continental Holdings Inc's (UAL.N) United Airlines and Air India AIN. UL with six each.

ANA plans about 100 to 200 round trip test flights in May of its repaired aircraft before carrying passengers again from June, sources knowledgeable about ANA's operations told Reuters last week. The flights will check the safety of the aircraft, and allow ANA's 180 Dreamliner pilots to get

hospital operators, such as HCA Holdings Inc, and even diaper maker Kimberly-Clark, which has a surgical supply unit, have cited a slowdown in use of medical services.

Kimberly-Clark executives on Friday noted that other companies have reported surgical

admissions down about 4 percent in the first quarter. Earlier this week, J&J reported a 10.5 percent decline in its US surgical sales, and Chief Financial Officer Dominic Caruso said a modest upswing in medical device use seen in the fourth quarter did not persist into 2013.—Reuters

Boeing begins fixing Dreamliners

ANA has not said how much the 787's grounding has cost it to date, though it has said it lost about \$900,000 in revenue per plane in the last two weeks of January. The grounding has cost Boeing an estimated \$600 million. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) in the US on Friday approved a Boeing plan to encase the 787s lithium ion batteries in steel box, install new battery charges, and add a duct to vent gases directly outside the aircraft that could cause overheating. Investigators in the United States and Japan have yet to unravel what caused a 787 battery onboard an ANA jet in Japan and one on another JAL Dreamliner parked at Boston's Logan Airport to overheat.—Reuters

BRUSSELS, 23 April—Consumer morale in the euro zone improved in April, the European Commission said on

Monday, but remained well below the currency area's long-term average.

The Commission said consumer confidence in the

17-member euro zone rose to -22.3 this month from a March figure of -23.5.

The reading beat expectations of economists polled by Reuters, who had expected a deterioration to -23.85.

Consumer spending accounts for more than half of euro zone economic output, but with the effects of the debt crisis cutting disposable income, households have been in no position to contribute much to economic recovery.

In the wider 27-member European Union, consumer sentiment also improved in April, to -20.4, compared to -21.6 last month.

Hollande wins acclaims on security amid economic challenges



French President Francois Hollande

PARIS, 23 April — Under pressure to effectively fix the French economy, President Francois Hollande recently won some acclaims on the security front. During a sudden visit to Charles de Gaulle Airport on Thursday morning, Hollande promised to French voters the highest vigilance against terrorist

threats, stressing that citizens and public interests are safe thanks to reinforced safety measures.

“There are threats that are particularly targeting France... (However), everything was in place so that the safety of French is guaranteed, and it is”, assured the president. A day after, the Socialist top of-

ficial confirmed the release of seven French hostages, including four children after two months of captivity by an Islamist cell in Cameroon. Expressing firmness and determination, Hollande said “this is an immense relief. This will redouble our determination to free the hostages who remain” in the Sahel region.

The French President got to Paris’ Orly Airport on Saturday morning to welcome the freed French family. Their return is no doubt good news for Hollande amid all the economic hardships. “For the moment, the hostages’ release could be considered as a political success of Hollande in this context of disastrous news,” said Thierry Arnaud, head of political division at BFMTV news channel.—Xinhua

Russia partially lifts ban on food imports from eastern Japan

TOKYO, 23 April— Russia on Monday partially lifted a ban on food imports from eastern Japan that was imposed just after the March 2011 Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant accident, the Japanese government said.

An import ban will remain on processed and

unprocessed seafood products from eight eastern Japan Prefectures — Aomori, Iwate, Miyagi, Yamagata, Fukushima, Ibaraki, Chiba and Niigata. Seafood imports from other prefectures will still be subjected to tests for radioactive contamination.

For food imports other

than seafood products from Tokyo, Fukushima, Ibaraki, Tochigi, Gunma and Chiba prefectures, Russia replaced a ban with a requirement for government-issued certificates of tests for radiation. Imports from other prefectures will also remain subject to tests.

Global partnership to fight malaria seeks annual \$3 billion in aid

TOKYO, 23 April— Representatives of a global partnership to fight malaria called for more financial aid on Monday to control the infectious disease, saying their activities need an additional \$3 billion a year.

Princess Astrid of Belgium, who serves as special representative to the Roll Back Malaria Partnership, said at a Press conference in Tokyo ahead of World Malaria Day on Thursday that some mosquitoes in Asia have become resistant to insecticide.

Fatoumata Nafotraore, executive director of the initiative launched in 1998 by the World Health Organization, the UN Chil-

dren’s Fund and other entities, also said the mosquito-transmitted disease claims the lives of 660,000 people every year globally, most of whom are children in Africa.

The partnership has been implementing coordinated action against malaria, including the promotion of mosquito nets to protect against the disease. Special nets developed by Sumitomo Chemical Co. have been widely used in Africa as the product has a long-lasting effect. Insecticide incorporated into polyethylene fibers of the nets continues to seep out from the fabric even after repeated washing.—Kyodo News

Delays hit major airports as control tower furloughs kick in

NEW YORK, 23 April — Travellers waited more than an hour for flights in New York and experienced delays at other US airports on Sunday evening as furloughs of air traffic controllers began, reducing the ability of busy hubs to handle arrivals and departures, the Federal Aviation Administration said.

The furloughs that started on Sunday reduced staffing by 10 percent across the country. Last week the FAA warned of delays up to 3-1/2 hours at some airports as the agency cuts spending to meet reductions required under federal budget cuts.

New York’s LaGuardia and John F Kennedy Airports reported delays of more than an hour, and Philadelphia International Airport also reported de-


lays due to furloughs, the FAA said. Los Angeles International reported nearly a two-hour delay at 10 pm ET, and Newark Liberty International reported

28-minute delays, though the FAA could not confirm whether those were related to the staff cuts. Delays of up to 58 minutes in San Francisco and 29 minutes in Orlando, Florida, were due to construction and weather, the FAA said.”

Relatively good weather throughout the country and light traffic helped minimize air traffic delays,” FAA spokeswoman Laura Brown said.

The delays come as the FAA furloughs its 47,000 employees, including nearly 13,000 air traffic controllers who manage the nation’s airspace.

Hosting US defence chief, Israel hints at patience on Iran

TEL AVIV, 23 April — Israel suggested on Monday it would be patient before taking any military action against Iran’s nuclear programme, saying during a visit by US Defence Secretary Chuck Hagel there was still time for other options. With Iran’s Presidential election approaching in June there has been a pause in hawkish rhetoric by Israel, which has long hinted at possible air strikes to deny its arch-foe any means to make an atomic bomb, while efforts by six world powers to find a negotiated solution with Teheran have proved fruitless so far.

“We believe that the military option, which is well discussed, should be the last resort,” Israeli Defence Minister Moshe Yaalon told reporters at a news conference with Hagel. “And there are other tools to

be used and to be exhausted,” Yaalon said, listing diplomacy, economic sanctions and “moral support” for domestic opponents of Iran’s hardline Islamist leadership. Iran has denied seeking nuclear weapons capability, saying it is enriching uranium only for domestic energy purposes while calling for the elimination of the Jewish state. Israel is widely believed to have the Middle East’s only nuclear arsenal.

US President Barack Obama has in the past clashed with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu over how urgent the need may be to consider military action against Iran. Washington has suggested more time should be given for concerted diplomacy combined with sanctions pressure to produce a peaceful solution.—Reuters

Phyusin Parahita free clinic, reliable for needy persons in Magway

Four staff, one sanitation worker, one compounder, one clerk and one senior clerk are appointed at the clinic with salaries K 150,000 in total. Moreover, he said that the clinic costs K 50,000 per month for the hiring the room.

The clinic organizes the blood donors association. If necessary, they donate blood for needy persons. At present, the blood donors association has 150 members.

"We need fund for the clinic. The wellwishers far and hear may donate medicines to the clinic, dialing 063-25362 and 09-5342174," continued U Win Kyaw.

Nay Phyo Wai, 16, Moe Yan, 22, and Ma Lwin Lwin Naing, 28, are being kept under intensive care at the hospital. Ma Ni Ni Win, 22, is not in critical condition.—MNA

Kishida says Japan willing to chair OECD ministerial council

TOKYO, 23 April — Foreign Minister Fumio Kishida on Monday told Angel Gurría, Secretary General of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, that Japan is willing to assume the chairmanship of its ministerial council next year, Japanese officials said.

As no other member nation has expressed its intention to run for the position, Japan is likely to become the chair of the supreme decision-making

body of the Paris-based club for the first time since 1978, the Foreign Ministry officials said. The council plans to approve its new chair at its regular meeting in Paris in May.

The government of Prime Minister Shinzo Abe wants to chair the OECD's ministerial council as next year marks the 50th anniversary of the nation joining the organization in 1964 and being globally recognized as a developed country.

Japan, one of two Asian nations along with South Korea among the OECD's 34 member countries, aims to act as a "bridge between the OECD and Asia," a ministry official said.

The world's third-largest economy is also eager to lead discussions in the OECD about assistance to developing nations and trade issues including the Trans-Pacific Partnership free trade negotiations, the official said.

Marubeni to set up mega solar power plant in Hokkaido

TOKYO, 23 April — Japanese trading house Marubeni Corp said on Monday it will set up in Hokkaido a 3,000-kilowatt mega solar power plant that can provide electricity to about 1,000 households.

Marubeni will invest about 1 billion yen in the solar power plant with the aim of expanding its renewable energy business. Construction is set to begin in late May, and the new plant is planned to start operating in December.

About 12,000 solar panels will be set up at four premises with a total area of about 70,000 square meters in the town of Shimizu, central Hokkaido.

Marubeni plans to sell all electricity generated at the plant to Hokkaido Electric Power Co under a feed-in tariff scheme that awards renewable energy producers long-term contracts at fixed prices.

Five dead after shooting at apartment in Seattle suburb

SEATTLE, 23 April — Five people were shot dead, at least one by police, during a Sunday night gunfight at an apartment complex about 20 miles south of Seattle, a police official said.

Police officers responding to an emergency call at roughly 9:30 pm heard gunshots when they arrived at a three-level apartment complex in Federal Way, Washington, said Cathy Schrock, a spokeswoman for the city

police.

As police officers approached two men on the ground in the complex's parking lot, one of them reached for a weapon and police shot him dead, Schrock said. Two other men were also confirmed dead in the parking lot, and a man and a woman were found dead in the complex, which has roughly 25 units.

"We still don't have any idea what started this disturbance tonight," Schrock said, adding that

police believe everyone involved was dead. Police were interviewing witnesses on Monday. "At this time, we are not looking for any additional suspects," Schrock said. Eight Federal Way officers fired their weapons during the siege and have been placed on paid, administrative leave pending the investigation into the gunfight and their actions, Schrock said, adding that was standard policy. None were injured.

Somali reporter killed in fourth journalist murder this year

MOGADISHU, 23 April — A Somali journalist working for the government broadcaster was shot dead outside his home in the capital Mogadishu on Sunday, the fourth reporter to be murdered in the country this year, the union of journalists said.

Mohamed Ibrahim Rageh, who worked for Somali National Television and Radio Mogadishu, was killed by unknown assailants as he returned home after work, according to Abdirahim Isse Addow, director of Radio Mogadishu, who was quoted by the National Union of Somali Journalists.

Three other journalists had been killed in Somalia so far this year, the union said.

Iran to meet UN nuclear watchdog in May

DUBAI, 23 April — Iran and the United Nations nuclear watchdog will have further talks over Teheran's disputed nuclear programme around 21 May in Vienna, Iranian media reported on Monday. There was no immediate confirmation from the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), leaving unclear whether a firm date for the next meeting had already been agreed.

Iran's Mehr and ISNA news agencies initially reported that the meeting would be held on 21 May, but ISNA later quoted an unnamed official as saying this was only a "preliminary agreement" and that the date could be moved by one or two days. The IAEA-Iran talks are separate from, but have an important bearing on, diplomatic negotiations between Teheran and six world powers aimed

at a broad settlement to the decade-old dispute to head off the risk of a new Middle East war.

Western powers suspect Iran is trying to develop the capability to produce nuclear weapons under the guise of a declared civilian atomic energy programme. Iran denies this, saying it seeks only electricity from uranium enrichment. But its refusal to curb sensitive nuclear activity with both civilian and military applications and its lack of openness with IAEA inspectors have drawn UN and Western sanctions. Last week, a diplomatic source told Reuters that a meeting between the Vienna-based IAEA and Iran in May was a possibility, but that no date had yet been fixed.

New York City aims to ban cigarette sales for under age 21

NEW YORK, 23 April — New York City, home to bans on trans fats and salt, is taking a step toward outlawing sales of cigarettes to anyone under age 21.

City Council Speaker Christine Quinn, running to replace health conscious Mayor Michael Bloomberg, is due on Monday to

announce legislation to increase the minimum age for buying cigarettes to 21 from 18, the current limit.

On nearby Long Island, Nassau and Suffolk counties have boosted their legal age for buying cigarettes and other tobacco products to 19.

Japanese emperor, empress to visit India possibly this year

TOKYO, 23 April—The Japanese government is making arrangements for Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko to visit India as early as this year, the Imperial Household Agency said on Monday.

The visit is expected in autumn or later and will be the first ever to India by a Japanese emperor, the agency said. Japan and India marked the 60th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic ties in 2012.

India has offered an

invitation for the imperial couple to visit the country in recent years. Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh made the request when he met the couple in Tokyo in October 2010, and an invitation was also made via the Japanese ambassador to India in February this year, the agency said.

When he was the crown prince, Emperor Akihito visited India three times between 1960 and 1975 on behalf of his father, Emperor Hirohito,

the agency said. Empress Michiko once canceled her scheduled trip to New Delhi in September 1998 after India conducted a nuclear test in May of that year.

The empress was slated

to give a speech at the conference of the International Board on Books for Young People, but a recorded video of her speech was shown at the event instead.

Philippines to start shipment of bananas to US

MANILA, 23 April — The Philippine government said on Monday that the initial shipment of 3,000 metric tons of Cavendish bananas to the United States may finally push through before the end of April. The National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) said the shipment of Cavendish bananas to the US is expected to prop up Philippine farm exports in 2013. This would be the first time that the Philippines, one of the world's biggest banana exporters, enters the US market. Citing data from the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, NEDA Deputy Director-General Emmanuel F Esguerra noted that the US is among the top 20 importers of bananas in the world.

The Philippines shelved plans to export bananas to the US in December 2012 after typhoon Bopha (local name: Pablo) damaged several plantations in key banana-growing areas in Mindanao.

Esguerra said the Philippines is also looking at opening up new markets for sugar in a bid to increase farm exports this year.

The Philippine government said it is coordinating with South Korea, India, Indonesia and countries in the Middle East for their specific requirements. Latest figures from the National Statistics Office showed that the value of total farm exports rose by 43.7 percent year-on-year to 343.9 million US dollars in February. — *Xinhua*


He called for the legislatures of the two countries to increase exchanges, learn from each other's experience and enhance mutual understanding and friendship.

Spain marks Book Day as major event in booksellers' calendar

MADRID, 23 April—The Spanish capital city of Madrid is preparing to celebrate International Book Day on Tuesday with a series of events to promote reading and the purchase of books. The event, first celebrated in Spain as the "Fiesta of Spanish Books" in 1926, will take on an extra dimension as April 23 coincides with the St. Georges Day. 23 April is also the anniversary of the death of Manuel Cervantes, author of Don Quixote and perhaps the most famous of all Spanish writers, and William Shakespeare in 1616.

Over 500 writers will participate in the eighth edition of Book Night, during which over 200 bookshops in the capital will offer a 10-percent discount on all books and remain open well past their usual closing time. As well as publicizing the importance of reading, the event provides a much needed boost to the sector, which has been hit by the economic crisis. Bookshops usually conduct between 5 and 8 percent of their total sales for the year during the celebrations.

Meanwhile, book-fairs are also held in emblematic places such as the Parque del Retiro, the Plaza Callao and along the central Paseo de la Castellana in the heart of the city. Next to the famous Cibeles Fountain, the central Post Office building will host several events, with readings and lectures from authors such as John Banville, Laurent Binet and Javier Cercas.

One of the most traditional events of the day is held in the Circle of Bellas Artes, where Spanish celebrities will spend three days reading Cervantes' Quixote.

The opening words of the book are read by the winner of the previous year's Cervantes Prize for literature. Last year's winner, Jose Manuel Caballero Bonald will continue the tradition, before he is given his award at the University of Alcala. Madrid has the highest number of book readers in Spain, around 12 percent above the national average.—Reuters


"Finally the next morning they had to bring me down on a donkey, and in the heat and the smell, I had to get off and walk. It was the most awful experience."



Liverpool fine Suarez for bite but won't sack him

LONDON, 23 April—Liverpool have fined Uruguay striker Luis Suarez an undisclosed amount for biting Chelsea defender Branislav Ivanovic at the weekend but will not sack him, the Premier League club said on Monday.

Suarez, the league's top scorer with 23 goals, has been widely condemned for his behaviour in Sunday's 2-2 draw and is expected to get a lengthy ban from the Football Association but Liverpool managing director Ian Ayre said the club would stand by him.

"I think the most important thing is that we acted swiftly yesterday," Ayre told the club's website (www.liverpoolfc.com).

"Luis issued his apology and then we spoke

with him last night and then again this morning. We've taken action to fine Luis for his actions."

Ayre did not specify the size of the fine but Suarez asked for the money to be donated to the Hillsborough Family Support Group—an organization set up after the 1989 stadium disaster that left 96 Liverpool fans dead.

Former Liverpool midfielder Graeme Souness said on Sunday that Suarez had reached "last chance saloon" at Anfield after the latest in a string of misdemeanours while others have suggested the club could take a moral stance and terminate his contract.

However, Ayre said manager Brendan Rodgers would work with the player

Clattenburg to ref first Chelsea game since Mikel accusation

LONDON, 23 April—Referee Mark Clattenburg will take charge of a Chelsea game on Sunday for the first time since being cleared of using racist language towards their midfielder John Obi Mikel.

NEW DELHI, 23 April—China's enviable pool of outstanding talent makes it almost impossible for anyone else to make a dent on their ruthless domination of badminton, Saina Nehwal

said on Monday.

The London Olympic bronze medallist has been something of an aberration in the women's rankings, being the lone non-Chinese in the top five for much of the last year and offering sporadic challenges to the sport's super-power nation.

Nehwal is ranked second, sandwiched between Li Xuerui and Wang Yihan, winners of the gold and silver in London last year, and is in awe of China's conveyor belt of talent.

"It's not easy to break the Chinese wall," Nehwal told reporters ahead of this week's Indian Open in New Delhi.

"Even if you beat one or two in one tournament the others will be there

in the next tournament. It's not easy to beat them again and again," added the 23-year-old.

"We can try to do it but we don't have a system like that. They have so many players, it's like cricket (in India).

"I'm happy that girls from different countries are trying to beat them and be among the top players. But to be there consistently, it's difficult for other countries." German Juliane Schenk and Korean Sung Ji Hyun complete the women's top five.

"The competition is really tough," said Nehwal. "When you play a lot, you get tired but they (China) have seven or eight players.

"It was such a special Ryder Cup, one that will have a special place in history, and I don't think anyone associated with that team will ever get tired of celebrating it."


United States were 10-6 up going into the last

Romania to purchase used F-16 jets from Portugal

BUCHAREST, 23 April—Romania will operate in 2017 a 12-strong squadron of F-16 multirole fighters purchased from Portugal, to replace the current Soviet-built MIG-21 Lancers, the country's Defence Minister Mircea Dusa said on Monday. Dusa paid last week an official visit to Portugal and discussed the possible acquisition with his counterpart Jose Pedro Aguiar-Branco.

"By the end of May, we will probably finalize documents with the Portuguese party and subsequently, until September — with the American party, so that we resume the multirole aircraft equipping program at the scale of a squadron, i.e. 12 planes," said the official, specifying that "we will also tackle the amounts to be paid," when

negotiations will have been completed. Dusa's predecessor Corneliu Dobritoiu announced last autumn that Romania will pay around 670 million euros over five years for these fighter jets. "Only about 120 million euros go to paying for the aircraft, the rest being logistic support, which would have been the same if we had purchased new aircraft," he explained.

Romania and Portugal have a deadline this June to complete negotiations, Dusa said that the package included everything necessary for the operation of the planes: the training of the pilots, maintenance, upgrading and everything else. According to sources, the fighters are among the 25 F-16s delivered to Portugal by the United States in 1999 under the

Peace Atlantis II Program. Prior to that, they had been used by the US Air Force since 1984 before they were placed in storage.

The aircrafts are in "very good" condition, according to the Romanian expert teams sent to Portugal to evaluate the technical condition of the multi-purpose jets with the assistance of US experts. The Romanian Air Force operates some 48 MiG-21 Lancer jet fighters which, after 40 years of missions, are towards the end of their flight resources.

Though the fighter jets from Portugal are already 30-years-old, they can be used for at least 20 more years, according to experts. Romania's neighbour Bulgaria had also expressed interest in nine used F-16s from Portugal.

interrupted second day in Palermo and the tie will be finished on Monday.

Ekaterina Makarova and Elena Vesnina secured the winning point for hosts Russia when they outlasted Dominika Cibulkova and Daniela Hantuchova 4-6 6-3 6-1 in the decisive doubles to clinch the two-day tie on Moscow clay.

After splitting the first two sets, the Russians broke Cibulkova in the fourth game and Hantuchova in the sixth to run away in the final set as the Slovak duo slowly ran out of steam.

"We hadn't played such hard and dramatic matches in Fed Cup for a very long time," Vesnina told Russian television NTV Plus.

"After a disastrous first day we still believed we could win. Luckily we did it."

Slovakia, appearing in their first semi-final since 2002 when they went on to win the competition for the only time, led 2-0 after the

The Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar welcomes the European Union's decision on 22 April 2013, regarding the lifting of all economic sanctions on Myanmar.

The EU has enthusiastically supported the wide-ranging reform efforts of the Government of Myanmar, and as an initial gesture of its support for that reform, the EU, on 14 May 2012, suspended most of the sanctions it had previously imposed upon Myanmar for a period of one year.

The Government believes that this decision will be greatly beneficial to the Myanmar people who have demonstrated their strong determination to achieve democratic reforms and have been actively supporting the Government's reform process during the last two years.

The lifting of all economic sanctions on Myanmar will encourage and engender a far stronger Myanmar-EU relationship and will facilitate a deeper and wider bilateral cooperation.
