Union Peace-making Work Committee, ABSDF reach four-point agreement

YANGON, 5 Aug—The state level peace talks between delegation led by Vice-Chairman of Union Peace-making Work Committee Union Minister U Aung Min and a delegation led by Chairman of All Burma Students Democratic Front (ABSDF) Yebaw Than Khe, Vice-Chairman Yebaw Myo Win and General Secretary Yebaw Hsan Ni took place at the Myanmar Peace Centre, of No 10, Shweli Road in Kamayut Township this morning.

At the meeting, Vice-Chairman of Union Peace-making Work Committee Union Minister U Aung Min said that since the new government took office, the President had offered peace to the national race armed groups. As a result, altogether 13 ethnic armed groups had entered ceasefire agreements with the government, and the agreement signed between the KIO and government in Myitkyina in May had brought almost conflicts to an end in Kachin State, he disclosed.

He went on to say that the peace policy of the government is not merely a ceasefire as chronic armed conflicts could not be resolved immediately. Political dialogue can be the best solution to the conflicts, and all are thus to work hard for the emergence of a political platform on which conflicts can be addressed through a roundtable discussion, he noted.

The peace process

calls for a ceasefire as an initial state. This should be followed by a framework among the stakeholders, and peace talks will be held based on the framework, he said. And therefore, all are to strive for the emergence of a national accord through the peace talks, he added.

The government has the peace policy already, he said and added that the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw issued a statement that it welcomed the peace-making efforts and would cooperate in the process. Moreover, the Tatmadaw also disclosed its cooperation in the peace process in line with the guidance of the President, he said.

The national race armed groups are also desirous of making peace

Food authorities meet importers of tainted milk

BEIJING, 5 Aug — China's food and drug authorities on Sunday

met with representatives of three companies that have imported potentially

contaminated products from New Zealand dairy company Fonterra.

The State Food and Drug Administration (SFDA) asked the companies to stop sales of such products and recall all products produced using potentially tainted materials.

Fonterra said on Friday that some of its whey protein produced in May 2012 has been found to be contaminated with clostridium botulinum, which can cause botulism.

The three importers are Hangzhou Wahaha Health Food Co, Ltd, Coca-Cola (China) and Shanghai-

The SFDA urged the importers to investigate the cause of the incident and take action as soon as possible.

The CFDA on Saturday issued an emergency notice ordering local food and drug administrations in Shanghai and Zhejiang to cooperate with the Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine to investigate the incident.

The CFDA said it will pay close attention to the development of the incident and release further information to the public in a timely fashion.—Xinhua

Prevention of floods at Bago River inspected



BAGO, 5 Aug—Chief Minister of Bago Region U Nyan Win inspected preparations for floods against houses near the concrete bridge on Yangon-Mandalay Highway at the entrance to Bago on 1 August.

In the rainy season, Bago River overflows road section No 48/7 and 49/0 on Yangon-Toungoo-

Mandalay Highway. To prevent the flood, the road was upgraded and the concrete bridge, 84 feet long and 76 feet wide, was constructed by Bago District Public Works from 1-1-2004 to 2-5-2005. It cost K 87.5 million.

Thanks to construction, water that flows into Gaunghsaykyun Lake can easily access to Bago River

without any blockage. As a result, the roads and housing wards do not suffer floods in the rainy season.

The Chief Minister gave instructions on necessary preparations for prevention against flood and inundation to the departmental officials and ward administrators.

Taung-in Bridge, Nanmagyi Bridge commissioned into service in Mohnyin Township

MOHNYIN, 5 Aug—Taung-in Bridge which is 450 feet long and 13 feet wide linking Nanma Village of Mohnyin Township and Kathagon Kyundaw Village in Taungingyi was put into service at 9 am on 31 July.

The facility was built at a cost of K 18 million contributed by Kachin State government and K 21.3 million by the local people.

Present on the occasion were Kachin State Minister for Finance and Revenue U Nyunt Aung, State Hluttaw

representatives, Mohnyin District and Township development officials and local people.

The state minister, Deputy Commissioner U Aung Soe Moe of Mohnyin District General Administration Department and village administrator U Thein Htwe formally opened the new bridge.

At 10.30 am, the ceremony to open the Nanmagyi Bridge, 88 feet long and 13 feet wide, was held in Nanma Village.

The bridge links Mohnyin Township and

Hopin Sub-Township, built at a cost of K 42 million by Kachin State government.

The state minister, State Hluttaw Representative U Nyi Lay and Mohnyin Township Administrator U Mya Yu formally opened the new bridge.

Thanks to the two new bridges, the local people will enjoy fruits of transport, smooth flow of commodities, education, health and regional development.

Pajero plunges off Sule Railway Overpass



YANGON, 5 Aug—A Mitsubishi Pajero driven by a doctoral student, 25 years old, from south to north along Gyobyu Street in Mingala Taungnyunt Township plunged off the railway

overpass on the approach road near Sakura Tower and Traders Hotel at 11.15 am on 4 August after hitting the rails. It plunged into the rail tracks, according to Mingala Taungnyunt Myoma police station.

A person, 55, father of the driver was onboard the car. He suffered cuts and bruises and he is now under treatment at Yangon General Hospital. The woman who drove the car was also injured and is under treatment at Neurosurgical Department of YGH.

Although the Pajero plunged into the rail tracks, there was any delay for transportation because it was on the railroads for shunting of cargos, timber and fuel tanks, said Junior Engineer U Than Zaw of Myanma Railways.

"When I was sitting under the overpass, a car suddenly plunged off the overpass. It fell upside down on the ground. The uncle sustained bleeding from his face and his leg was under the car. At that time, Ko Hla Htay was together with me near the incident," said Ko Zaw Min Htaik who sells betels near Yangon Railway Station.

"I saw a car that overturned on the rail tracks from the overpass. A man shouted help. About 14 persons lifted the car to be normal position. A woman was unconscious under the leather sheet near the driver seat of the car," recounted Ko Hla Htay who gave a helping hand to victims of the car accident.

Australian Prime Minister Rudd calls general election for 7 September

CANBERRA, 5 Aug — Australian Prime Minister Kevin Rudd on Sunday called a general election for 7 September, only weeks after ousting the country's first female leader Julia Gillard as head of the Labour Party in a party-room vote.

"This afternoon I visited the Governor-General and Her Excellency has accepted my advice an election be held on Saturday, the 7th of September," Rudd said at a Press conference at the Parliament House in Canberra.

In starting the election campaign, the prime minister said he will focus on

strengthening the economy and that "managing the big economic transition that lies ahead will be difficult, but it is definitely doable."

Referring to the decline in Chinese demand for iron ore and coal, Rudd said, "The boom, of course, has fuelled so much of our nation's wealth. That boom is over." "The election will be about who the Australian people trust to best lead them through the difficult new economic challenges," he said, adding that the new leadership "will require a steady hand, and a clear cut plan for the future."

Rudd, who lost the

party leadership to Gillard in June 2010 prior to the last general election, has consistently fared better as preferred leader in opinion polls.

"For me it's pretty basic, it's pretty clear. I simply do not have it in my nature to stand idly by and to allow an Abbott government to come to power in this country by default," Rudd said after winning the Labour leadership vote on 26 June, referring to polls suggesting conservative opposition leader Tony Abbott would win in a landslide over a Gillard-led government.—Kyodo News

MADRID/GIBRALTAR, 5 Aug — Spain is studying retaliatory measures against the British territory of Gibraltar in an escalating dis-

pute over fishing grounds, Spanish Foreign Minister Jose Manuel Garcia-Margallo said in an interview published on Sunday.

White House: US willing to engage with Iran on nuclear concerns

WASHINGTON, 5 Aug — The United States said on Sunday it is prepared to work with the new government of Iranian President Hassan Rouhani to address concerns about Iran's nuclear programme if Iran will engage seriously on the issue. "The inauguration of President Rouhani presents an opportunity for Iran to act quickly to resolve the international community's deep concerns over Iran's nuclear programme," White House spokesman Jay Carney said in a statement.

"Should this new government choose to engage substantively and seriously to meet its international obligations and find a peaceful solution to this issue, it will find a willing partner in the United States," he said. The White House congratulated

Rouhani, seen as politically more moderate than predecessor Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, on the election, which it said demonstrated a desire by Iranians for change. "We hope the new Iranian government will heed the will of the voters by making choices that will lead to a better life for the Iranian people," Carney said. Rouhani was elected in June and took office on Saturday, promising "constructive interaction with the world" after eight years under Ahmadinejad marked by diplomatic confrontation and damaging sanctions. The 64-year-old cleric's resounding victory raised hopes for a negotiated end to the dispute over Iran's nuclear programme and an easing of the sanctions that have hit the OPEC country's oil exports.—Reuters

"The party is over," Garcia-Margallo told ABC newspaper, referring to years of softer policy on Gibraltar under the previous Socialist government.

The minister said Spain was mulling a 50-euro border-crossing fee and tax investigations of thousands of Gibraltarians who own property in Spain. A border fee would affect tourists and Gibraltarians who cross the border for work. Spain was also considering closing airspace to planes heading for the airport in Gibraltar and changing rules to wring taxes from on-line gaming companies based in Gibraltar, he said.

Spain disputes Britain's three centuries of sovereignty over Gibraltar, a territory on the southern tip of Spain that is home to close to 30,000 people with an economy dominated by off-shore banking, internet gambling operations and

tourism. Under the previous Socialist government Spain softened its stance on Gibraltar, discussing other issues without bringing up sovereignty while agreeing to give Gibraltar a voice in any talks with Britain over its status.

But the centre-right government of Spanish Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy has taken a harder line regarding its claim on the territory.

The latest tensions between Spain and the British territory began 10 days ago after Gibraltar boats began dumping blocks of concrete into the sea near the territory. Gibraltar said it was creating an artificial reef that would foster fish populations. Spain said the reef would block its fishing boats and ramped up border checks, creating long lines at the border between Spain and the territory.

US documents show Britain supported atomic bombing of Japan

TOKYO, 5 Aug — Britain expressed support for the use of atomic bombs by the United States against Japan in World War II about a month before the first one

Marshal Sir Henry Wilson told the meeting chaired by US Secretary of War Henry Stimson that the British government "concurred in the use of the TA weapon against

was dropped on Hiroshima, documents recently declassified by the US National Archives and Records Administration showed. The documents illustrate Britain's involvement as a close ally in the United States' decision to carry out the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945, something not widely known in Japan. The British government officially expressed its support for the atomic bombing of Japan in a meeting of the Combined Policy Committee held in Washington on 4 July, 1945, on the development and control of nuclear energy, referring to atomic bombs as Tube Alloys, a codename used for British wartime research on nuclear weapons also used to refer to plutonium.

According to the declassified minutes, British Field

Japan." "The Governments of the United Kingdom and the United States had agreed that TA weapons should be used by the United States against Japan, the agreement of the British Government having been communicated" by Wilson, the minutes said.

The committee was established based on the Quebec Agreement in August 1943 by the United States, Britain and Canada on coordinated development of atomic weapons.

Britain's official agreement to the use of atomic bombs came after US President Franklin Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill agreed in their meeting in New York in September 1944 that an atomic bomb might be used against Japan when it was developed.

Kirobo the talking robot blasts into space on historic mission

NEW YORK, 5 Aug—Kirobo, a knee-high talking robot with red boots and a black and white body, has blasted off from Japan for the *International Space Station* to test how machines can help astronauts with their work. The Japanese-speaking robot, equipped with voice- and facial-recognition technology, was packed into an unmanned cargo vessel along with tons of supplies and equipment for the crew of the orbital research base.

The cargo vessel, launched from the Tanegashima Space Centre in southwestern Japan on Sunday, will arrive at the outpost on Friday, according to the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency's website. At a recent demonstration, Kirobo said it "hoped to create a future where humans and

robots live together and get along".

As it carries on the first robot-human chats in space, Kirobo's main conversation partner will be Japanese astronaut Koichi Wakata, who is expected to take off for the space station with six other crew members in November.

Wakata is due to take command of the complex, a \$100 billion project by 15 nations, next March. Kirobo — jointly developed by the University of Tokyo, Toyota Motor Corp and Dentsu Inc — will stay in space until late 2014. Standing 34 cm (13 inches) tall and weighing about 1 kg (2.2 pounds), Kirobo is designed to navigate in zero gravity and gets its name from "kibo", the Japanese word for "hope", and "robot".—Reuters

Scientists to cook world's first in-vitro beef burger

LONDON, 5 Aug—A corner of west London will see culinary and scientific history made on Monday when scientists cook and serve up the world's first lab-grown beef burger. The in-vitro burger, cultured from cattle stem cells, the first example of what its creator says could provide an answer to global food shortages and help combat climate change, will be fried in a pan and tasted by two volunteers.

The burger is the result of years of research by Dutch scientist Mark Post, a vascular biologist at the University of Maastricht, who is working to show how meat grown in petri dishes might one day be a true alternative to meat from livestock. The meat in the burger has been made

by knitting together around 20,000 strands of protein that has been cultured from cattle stem cells in Post's lab. The tissue is grown by placing the cells in a ring, like a donut, around a hub of nutrient gel, Post explained.

To prepare the burger, scientists combined the cultured beef with other ingredients normally used in burgers, such as salt, breadcrumbs and egg powder. Red beet juice and saffron have been added to bring out its natural colours. "Our burger is made from muscle cells taken from a cow. We haven't altered them in any way," Post said in a statement on Friday. "For it to succeed it has to look, feel and hopefully taste like the real thing."

TJ Maxx, others look past chaos to e-commerce bonanza

NEW YORK, 5 Aug — Low-price retailer TJ Maxx plans to open an online store this year, as does rival Saks Inc's Off Fifth outlets, making 2013 the year technology may have caught up with the speed of fashion. For such chains, which feature clearance items, last-year's fashions and overruns, their fast-moving and often unpredictable inventory has made selling goods over the web complex. "Retail is chaotic. Off-price retail is even more chaotic," said Fiona Dias, a leading e-commerce expert and chief strategy officer at ShopRunner.

A cardinal sin in e-commerce is to tell customers something is available when it's not, and conversely, having an item in stock but not having it on the website. That is why the retailers are investing in software that manages inventory, tracks it in real time, and continuously updates the websites. This will be TJX Cos Inc's, owner of TJ Maxx, second stab at e-commerce after a 2005 failure. It abandoned its first attempt after only a year following poor sales, turmoil in the corner office, and challenges at its smaller chains. That failure cost



TJX \$15 million.

Now, TJX is one of the fastest growing retailers, and T.J. Maxx one of the most popular brands. In 2011, it hired Elaine Boltz, a leading e-commerce executive. Last year, it spent about \$200 million to buy online retailer Sierra Trading for its technology and expertise. The revenue potential is huge. Avondale Partners thinks TJX, for in-

stance, can quickly garner annual online sales of \$1 billion. The company declined to comment beyond what its chief executive has said on investor calls, but Morningstar analyst Jaime Katz thinks TJX will carve out space at its current distribution facilities to handle e-commerce, rather than spend millions on a fulfillment centre.

Warming oceans impact breeding patterns and habitat of marine life: Australian research



CANBERRA, 5 Aug—Warming oceans are impacting the breeding patterns and habitat of marine life, effectively rearranging the broader marine landscape as species adjust to a changing climate, according to a new research statement from Australian national research body, CSIRO, on

Monday. The international team led by CSIRO's Climate Adaptation Flagship and University of Queensland marine ecologists Elvira Poloczanska and Anthony Richardson, included 19 researchers from Australia, USA, Canada, UK, Europe and South Africa. They identified more than

1,700 changes, including 222 in Australia.

According to this three-year study published on Monday in *Nature Climate Change*, marine species are shifting their geographic distribution towards cooler regions and doing so much faster than their land-based counterparts. Despite the ocean having absorbed 80 percent of the heat added to the global climate system, the ocean's thermal capacity has led to surface waters warming three times slower than air temperatures over land, Dr Poloczanska explained. "The leading edge or 'front line' of a marine species' distribution is moving towards the poles at the average rate

of 72 km per decade, which is considerably faster than terrestrial species moving poleward at an average of 6 km per decade," she said. "This is despite sea surface temperatures warming three times slower than land temperatures."

She said winter and spring temperatures, over both the ocean and land, are warming fastest, which might advance phenological events such as the start of growing seasons and the timing of reproduction. In addition, anthropogenic carbon dioxide uptake by the oceans is altering seawater carbonate chemistry, which can impact some marine organisms.—Xinhua

South Korea says concerned about US decision on some Apple models

SEOUL, 5 Aug—The South Korean government on Monday expressed concerns about the decision by the United States to overrule a sales ban of some Apple Inc (AAPL.O) models. The Obama administration vetoed a US trade panel's ban on the import and sale

of some older iPhones and iPads, reversing a ruling that had favoured South Korea's Samsung Electronics Co Ltd (005930.KS) over Apple in their long-running patent battle. The move was vehemently criticized by the South Korean media as "protectionism."

"We express concerns about the negative impact that such a decision would have on the protection of patent rights," the Ministry of Trade, Industry & Energy, said in a statement. The ministry called on the US trade body and the Obama administration to make "fair and reasonable decisions" as Samsung faces a decision on Friday as to whether some of its phones and tablets infringed on Apple's patents and should be banned from imports into the United States.

Apple and Samsung, the world's top two smartphones makers, have been waging a global patent war since 2011, filing multiple lawsuits against each other over the design, interface and technology of their devices.

Vodafone files Telecom Italia suit

BEIJING, 5 Aug — British telecoms provider Vodafone Group is suing Telecom Italia for abusing its dominant position in Italy, seeking damages of more than 1 billion euros (US\$1.3 billion).

A Vodafone spokeswoman said in an email yesterday the civil action in Milan stated that Telecom

Italia committed a series of abuses from 2008 to 2013 “with the intention and effect of impeding growth in competition in the Italian fixed-line market.”

Telecom Italia rejected the claim saying it was confident it would demonstrate the “total correctness” of its behaviour. In May, Italy’s competition authority fined

Telecom Italia about 104 million euros for abusing its dominant market position as owner and manager of the country’s largest fixed-line telephone network.

Telecom Italia has said it would appeal against the antitrust fine, which was decided after a three-year investigation prompted by rival Wind, Italy’s third-largest mobile operator, and broadband company Fastweb, a unit of Swisscom.

Vodafone said Telecom Italia had caused a loss of customers, restricted Vodafone Italy’s ability to expand its fixed-line business, and forced it to pay artificially high costs to compete in the market.

Vodafone Italy, which filed the lawsuit, is 77 percent owned by Vodafone, with the rest held by the

British firm’s United States partner Verizon Communications. The lawsuit comes as Telecom Italia is moving ahead with a plan to spin off its fixed-line copper network, which rivals say gives it a competitive edge. Last month, Vodafone posted a 3.5 percent drop in organic service revenue with Italy and Spain posting double-digit falls and competition increasing in its once-reliable markets of Germany and Britain.

Japan to consider expanding tax-exempt items list for foreign travellers

TOKYO, 5 Aug — The Japan Tourism Agency plans to propose the addition of food and cosmetic products to a list of tax-exempt items for foreign travellers as part of fiscal 2014 tax reform, agency sources said on Sunday. The proposal is aimed at attracting travellers and mitigating the negative impact of a sales tax hike planned for next April.

According to a survey by the agency, food and cosmetic products dominated

the list of the top three popular Japanese souvenirs in 2012, with 58.2 percent of foreign travellers buying confectionery, 51.4 percent buying other food products, alcohol and cigarettes and 38.5 percent buying cosmetics and pharmaceutical products.

Of the 1.09 trillion yen spent by foreign visitors in Japan last year, 31 percent was spent on shopping, the survey showed. At present, food products bought by

foreign travelers are subject to sales tax because stores cannot be sure whether such items will be consumed in Japan or taken abroad.

In many parts of the world, including member countries of the European Union, all products bought by foreign travellers are tax exempt and tax refunds are made on departure. The tourism agency will also propose making procedures for tax-free purchases easier. — *Kyodo News*

India partly revokes Roche cancer drug patent

ZURICH, 5 Aug — India has partly revoked patents granted to Roche Holding AG for its breast cancer drug Herceptin, a spokesman for the drugmaker confirmed on Sunday. Swiss newspaper *Schweiz am Sonntag* reported that the Kolkata Patent Office had lifted divisional patents for Herceptin on 17 July on the grounds they had not been properly submitted.

“I can confirm that the Assistant Controller of Patents at the Kolkata Patent Office has revoked divisional patents of Herceptin and that we are now considering the further course of action,” a spokesman for Roche said. The decision is the latest in a series of rulings on intellectual property and pricing in India that have frustrated attempts by Western drugmakers to sell their medicines in India’s fast-growing drugs market.

On Friday, India revoked a patent granted to GlaxoSmithKline’s for breast cancer drug Tykerb, following on from a landmark court ruling in April disallowing patents for incremental innovations. Roche has already adapted its business model in India to increase affordable access to drugs and try to stave off trouble from India’s patent authorities.

In August 2012, it introduced cut-price versions

of Herceptin and another cancer drug MabThera, under an alliance with Indian generics firm Emcure Pharmaceuticals.

Last year, India revoked patents granted to Roche’s hepatitis C drug Pegasys, Pfizer Inc’s cancer drug Sutent, and Merck & Co’s asthma treatment aerosol suspension formulation. All were revoked on grounds that included lack of innovation.

Sugary drinks tied to obesity among preschoolers

NEW YORK, 5 Aug — Five-year-olds who drink sugar-sweetened sodas, sports drinks or juices every day are more likely to be obese than those who have sugar-sweetened beverages less often, according to a new study.

Although the link between sugary drinks and extra weight has been well documented among teens and adults, researchers said that up until now, the evidence was less clear for young children.

“Even though sugar-sweetened beverages are relatively a small percentage of the calories that chil-

dren take in, that additional amount of calories did contribute to more weight gain over time,” said Dr Mark DeBoer, who led the study at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. He and his colleagues surveyed the parents of a nationally-representative group of 9,600 children when the kids were two, four and five years old.

The children were all born in 2001. Parents reported on their income and education, as well as how often children drank sugary beverages and watched TV.

The children and their mothers were weighed at

each survey visit. The proportion of kids who had at least one soda, sports drink or sugar-sweetened juice drink each day ranged from 9 to 13 percent, depending on their age. Those children were more likely to have an overweight mother and to watch at least two hours of TV each day at age four and five.

After accounting for those influences as well as families’ socioeconomic status, the researchers found five-year-olds who had at least one sugary drink each day were 43 percent more likely to be obese than those who drank the beverages less frequently or not at all.

Kids were considered obese if they had a body mass index — a measure of weight in relation to height — above the 95th percentile for their age and gender, as calculated by the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. About 15 percent of five-year-olds in the study were obese.

Child care in Australia booming

CANBERRA, 5 Aug — A new report released on Sunday shows unprecedented growth in Australia’s child care sector as record numbers of families take advantage of government fee assistance to return to work. The Child Care in Australia report also confirms that fee increases have remained stable for nearly a decade. “Child care is booming in Australia,” Early Childhood and Child Care Minister Kate Ellis said.

“The report shows record numbers of children and families in record numbers of child care services across the nation. Of course more needs to be done, but this is a testament to Labour efforts over the past six years.” The

report finds that more than 1 million children are in child care and more than 726,000 families are using child care. There are more than 15,000 child care services in Australia and the average child care fee increase across the sector last year was 7.3 percent, lower than the previous year’s 7.4 percent.

It also reports that average families with annual income of 75,000 AU dollars (66,750 US dollars) spent 8.4 percent of their disposable income on child care in 2012, compared to 13 percent of their income in 2004. Ellis said not only were more families using child care than ever before, they were using child care on more days of

the week for longer hours. “Nearly half of all 3 to 5 year-olds in Australia are now in child care, up from 43.5 percent six years ago,” she said.

Ellis said while the report was encouraging, challenges remained for the sector, particularly relating to availability. “While there’s been strong growth in the number of places, there are still unacceptable shortages in many highly populated centers, particularly Sydney and Melbourne,” she said. “Our government is tackling these shortages on a number of fronts but it will take partnerships between all levels of government and the private sector.”—Xinhua

Next, Chairman of ABSDF Yebaw Than Khe, Vice-Chairman Yebaw Myo Win and General Secretary Yebaw Hsan Ni

expressed their belief in conflict resolution through negotiation for the sake of the people, their readiness for cooperation with those who love the nation and successful implementation of internal peace and national reconciliation, their hope for the today's meeting where future plans for ensuring internal peace could be laid down and their views on requirements for peace process.

Then, both sides exchanged views on ceasefire, regional peace and stability and development in a frank manner and leaders of both sides signed agreements.

After the meeting, the Vice-Chairman of Union Peace-making Work Committee presented a peace bell, U Thein Zaw and the Union ministers, gifts to ABSDF chairman and party.

The meeting was also attended by Union Ministers U Ohn Myint and U Zeyar Aung, the advocate-general of Kayin State, the Kayin State minister for security and border affairs, senior military officers of the Commander-in-Chief (Army) Office, responsible persons of Myanmar Peace Centre, CEC members, the military affairs in-charge and members of ABSDF. At the today's state level peace talks, both sides agreed to cease fire as of 5 August, 2013 for ensuring a nationwide ceasefire and holding a political dialogue, to take measures in order not to occur conflicts and fighting between ABSDF and Tatmadaw and to allow unarmed ABSDF members to travel to other places in accord with the law except designated area ("designated area means bases of ABSDF in the areas of national race armed groups), to open a liaison office in which arms are not allowed in Myawady which is acceptable to both sides and to continue to hold talks on places for opening of more liaison offices at the Union level meeting, to form an official delegation to hold a Union level peace talks and to begin the Union level peace talks as of 10 August, 2013. To be able to sign agreements at the today's meeting, ABSDF accepted the invitation of the Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar and held informal meetings with Vice-Chairman U Aung Min for three times and preparatory work committee for two times totaling five.

Press release on relief and rehabilitation works in flood-hit regions

1. Some townships in Kayin State and Mon State and Taninthayi Township in Taninthayi Region had experienced floods as of 27 July 2013 due to heavy rains and swollen rivers.
2. While accommodating 33409 flood victims of 6733 households in Hpa-an, Hlaingbwe, Kawkareik, Kyar-in Seikkyi and Myawady Townships and Kamamoung sub-township at 79 relief camps, only 16579 flood victims of 3440 households still remain at 47 relief camps up to date and necessary assistance is being given to them. Regular traffic resumed on 2-8-2013 on Thingan Nyinaung-Kawkareik road

where officials of Kayin State government and the Public Works under the Ministry of Construction and local Tatmadawmen carried out clearing road blocks. Flash floods in Kayin State left six persons killed and one still missing so far. Four bridges were destroyed and 367 basic education schools closed temporarily and 3675-acre of paddy farmlands are still under water.

3. Likewise, a total of 4680 flood victims of 1050 households in Bilin, Kyaikmaraw and Ye Townships in Mon State were accommodated at 34 relief camps. As flood waters receded, flood victims in Bilin and Ye Townships returned home. A total of 1600 flood victims of 361 households in Kyaikmaraw are being provided with necessary assistance at three relief camps. Flash floods destroyed one bridge in Mudon Township and one school building in Paung Township and 58 schools were subject to temporary closure in Kyaikmaraw Township.
4. Flooding occurred in Taninthayi Township on 2 August 2013, forcing 1670 people of 324 households to move to

three relief camps where they are being provided with necessary assistance.

5. During Vice-President U Nyan Tun's rescue and relief tour, 7181 households in Hpa-an, Hlaingbwe, Kawkareik, Kyar-in Seikkyi, Myawady and Papun Townships were provided with rice, medicines and relief supplies including K 15,000 each to flood victims totaling K 107,715,000 as well as donors donated K 200 million for flood victims.
6. Under the arrangement of Kayin State government, flood victims were provided with 337 bags of rice, 86 viss of edible oil, 8364 eggs and 13478 packets of instant noodle including K 8.85 million.
7. It is hereby to inform that sanitation, health care services and rehabilitation works in the regions where flood waters receded are being carried out by the Union government in cooperation with respective state/region governments, social organizations, Tatmadawmen, police members and local people after rescue and relief works for flood victims had been performed in Kayin and Mon States and Taninthayi Region.

We cannot allow transformation to fail

Democracy cannot just be about elections, basic freedoms, and constitutions. It must also include a culture of democracy and a new understanding of citizenship. We cannot be under an illusion that this is not a difficult thing, but we all are confident that we will succeed.

The first component of our transformation is political. We have a new constitution. We have had elections and by-elections. Media censorship and restrictions on the Internet have ended. New laws protect the freedom of association and expression. Thousands of prisoners have been freed. A special committee, comprised in part of former prisoners, is working diligently to ensure that no one remains in prison due to his or her political beliefs or actions. We are reviewing all cases.

The government is aiming for nothing less than a transition from half a century of military-rule and authoritarianism to democracy. It is beyond doubt that this is no easy thing. We see elsewhere the dangers of any sudden political shift, with which institutions are unable to cope, and where the habits of democracy are not yet engrained, and the dangers of violence and anarchy. We must manage this transition in a way that moves fast but prudently, grounded in our own realities.

We must succeed as well in the second component of our transformation: moving from a state-centered and isolated economy to one that is based on free-market principles and is integrated into world markets.

We have embarked on a transformation that we believe is unparalleled in modern times. It is a multi-faceted transformation that must be successful in all its parts. Anyone who visits Myanmar today will see the great energy that has been thrown up by the transformation of competing ideas and robust debate. This is because all Myanmar people know that we cannot allow this transformation to fail.

LESSONS FROM THE HORRORS OF HIROSHIMA*Maung Hlaing*

It was on the morning of 6 August in 1945, a B-29 bomber of the United States Army dropped the first Atomic bomb on the centre of the City of Hiroshima, Japan.

According to the records of the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum, the bomb emitted mysterious flashes of light in the air about 1,800 feet above the ground and then produced a gigantic fireball which swelled rapidly into a tremendous explosion. A horrifying column of flames hit the earth and rose in the form of a swifty-bulging mushroom cloud to a height of 27,000 feet almost instantaneously.

The atomic bomb destroyed about 13 square kilometres of the city. Between 70,000 and 100,000 people are estimated to have been killed and more people died later from the effects of atomic radiation.

Three days later, the Americans released a second atomic bomb on the City of Nagasaki. Thus, Japan surrendered to the Allied Forces on 2 September in 1945.

Why did they use the atomic bomb?

"Horrors of Hiroshima emerged due to the translation error. Instead of writing the news title as 'US ultimatum postponed,' the journalist wrote the title

as 'US ultimatum ignored,' said Sayagyi Thakin Ba Thaug while I was studying translation under him. However, historians concluded that although it was an immediate cause, the world had heard the war cry and seen the dark colors of war since 1939.

After the first test explosion of an atomic bomb in the United States in July, 1945, the then US President Harry S. Truman informed the other leaders of the Allied Forces. Then the Allied Forces issued a statement threatening to destroy Japan unless it surrendered unconditionally. In spite of the warning, Japan went on fighting. So the bomb was dropped. The historians concluded so.

Before the atomic bomb was used, the US bombing of Tokyo took place in March, 1945. According to the *Kyodo* news of 8 May, 2013, more than 300 B-29 bombers dropped a large number of incendiary bombs above Tokyo on 10 March, 1945, about five months of Japan's surrender that year turning the Japanese capital to ruins. The US raids of Tokyo also came in April and May that year.

The then Japanese government had filed a protest with the US government shortly after the March 1945 air raid. However, the US said the

war with Japan in the Pacific theatre of the global war was one against fascism.

Actually, war is war. If a war breaks out, it is followed by social evils.

A year after the bomb was dropped, among those who survived the nuclear holocaust, some were crippled and some were destitute. People had lost the buildings which had taken them to many years to acquire, and had no prospects or rebuilding them. Let me introduce a letter from my jottings to you. Just before the anniversary of the dropping the bomb, Mr. Tanimoto wrote in a letter to the Americans:-

"What a heart-breaking scene this was the first night! About midnight, I landed on the river bank. So many injured people lay on the ground that I had to make my way by striding over them. Repeating 'Excuse me!', I went forward, carrying a bucket of water and giving a cup of water to each of them. They raised their upper bodies slowly, accepted the water with a bow, and drunk quietly. One of them said, 'I couldn't help my sister, who was buried under the house'. Another murmured, 'I lost my home and family'. The next morning, I found many men and women dead, people whom I had given water the night before. But to my surprise, I never heard any one cry in pain and sorrow even though their anguish and agony must have been beyond words..."

On 9 August, 1945, Nagasaki, which is on the west coast of the island of Kyushu, was destroyed by the second atomic bomb used in warfare. The blast destroyed 4.7 square kilometres in the heart of the city. It injured 40,000 people, and 40,000 were killed or missing.

According to the *Kyodo* news appeared in the New Light of Myanmar of 5 June, the Nagasaki City Office began the annual task of adding names to the list of victims of the 1945 US atomic bombing of the city. The newly confirmed victims, who died between, 1 August last year and 31 March, told 1,178. The names and dates of death of the deceased, along with those of more victims likely to be found by the end of July, are to be added to the list, which contained 158,765 names as of 9 August, 2012. Their details will be inscribed by two citizens with ink brushes in time to be dedicated on 9 August at a ceremony commemorating the 68th anniversary of the bombing.

"I feel anew the cruelty of atomic weapons," said Masahiro Tanigawa, 75, a hibakusha, or atomic bombing survivor, and former officer of the city government.

The list of names, which is contained in 160 volumes as of 'last year, is usually kept at the Nagasaki National Peace Memorial Hall for the Atomic Bomb Victims.

In Hiroshima, the Atomic Bomb Dome, a building left unconstructed after the war, has become a symbol of the peace movement.

A service is held there each year on the anniversary of the bombing, in memory of the victims. And in the month of August every year, war opponents and peace lovers recall an unhappy chapter in the history of mankind.

Wars—war for land, war for wealth, war for power, war for security—settle nothing. Millions of men, women and children were killed, or died of diseases, famine and untold sufferings. As we hate wars or conflicts, peace prevailing activities or movements will have to be encouraged. We must take lessons that in a warfare, the loser suffers and so does the winner.

Wars—never, never once again!

On Conflicts

Everyone desires the fulfilment of their basic needs such as making a living in peace and harmony under affluent socio-economic conditions, and the attainment of their life goals in peace and happiness, without any loss of their fundamental rights and human rights. Everyone also likes to contribute as much as they are able to beneficial activities not only for themselves but also for their families, friends and loved ones, the community which includes the neighbourhood or village or township where they live and for the country and the people, as well as for the people of the world.

In working for the betterment of socio-economic life, stability and peace would be a prerequisite for any efforts to be successful. Essentially, "stability and development" capture the aspirations of all of us. Stability and development would be essential not only for individuals but also the families, communities, citizens and people of the world. They constitute the vital need that our communities, our neighbourhoods, villages, townships, Regions and States, our country and the entire world have.

There can be no controversy or dispute on the impossibility of development work without stability and peace. My colleagues and I have stability and peace as our underlying aim in all our work. And it is only natural that we will inevitably face challenges, difficulties, obstacles, hindrances and conflicts in making our efforts towards the

accomplishment of such worthy aims.

In our own minds, each of us has opposing forces vying for dominance. We have our own **internal opposition between greed and selflessness, ill will and good will, wholesome motivation and unwholesome motivation, altruism and self-interest, doubt and decisiveness, vagueness and clarity, strong will and lack of will.**

As opposing forces vie for dominance, one side may at one time become dominant over the other. While two opposing forces coming into conflict may often be in equilibrium, it can only be temporary. Eventually, one side always becomes stronger and wins out over the other.

From a political perspective, this process involving opposing forces may be seen as the contradictions. While there are many different kinds of tensions, they may be classified into 3 main categories: internal and external contradictions, fundamental and non-fundamental contradictions, and conflict-causing and non-conflict-causing contradictions.

To start with internal and external contradictions, individuals or organizations or groups may have tensions internally between the wholesome desire to do good things and the unwholesome desire to do bad things, normal desire and extreme greed, malice and benevolence, high spirits and low spirits, drive and lack of will, good will towards others and lack of it, indecision and resoluteness. These would be internal contradictions. External contradictions,

on the other hand, occur in the interactions that individuals or organizations or groups have with their surroundings. When we resolve our own problems, we are resolving our internal contradictions. But the contradictions between us and others would be an external contradictions. Here, internal contradictions are more primary than external contradictions. Resolution of internal contradictions would make it easy to resolve external contradictions.

Similarly with fundamental and non-fundamental contradictions, it would be crucial to prioritise fundamental contradictions for resolution.

In every society, contradictions of opposites (processes involving opposing forces) give rise to conflicts to a greater or lesser extent. Not all tensions lead to conflict, as there are conflict-causing and non-conflict-causing tensions. While we are building a new democratic nation, it is vital to show restraint and avoid adversarial conflicts.

Conflicts stem from differences or opposition of concerns and views between individuals, between organisations, between groups and between nations. Differences are generally caused by different approaches to a particular phenomenon, different values, different norms and criteria, different policies and ideologies, and differences in the educational qualifications or experience between those who are making evaluations and judgements. Conflicts are inherent in human nature and human affairs, and can be expected at

all times. Depending on the method of conflict resolution, some conflicts may be resolved while some others may escalate into open warfare.

Those specialising in the study of international relations have analysed international conflicts, past and present, into **two main categories: conflicts of ideas and conflicts of interests.** Examples of the first category would be ethnic conflicts, religious conflicts and ideological conflicts, while examples of the second category would be territorial disputes, problems involving control of governments and economic conflicts.

No one can deny the negative potential impact that conflicts may have, from undermining the political stability and economic development that a country has already achieved to stalling or even reversing them. In world history and Myanmar history and also in the current affairs of the world and those of Myanmar, there are prominent examples of such negative impact. In the period immediately after gaining independence in Myanmar, while Myanmar was a parliamentary democracy, ideological biases, personal prejudices, egos, and party biases gave rise to multicolour politics with differing hues even among those with the same political colour. Extreme nationalism displaced the sense of citizenship and the desire to work together for the Myanmar nation. National unity was undermined, and armed conflicts appeared in the end, leaving no space for effective development work, from which a political lesson needs to be learned.

Conflicts do have the potential to delay or stall the achievement of political, economic and social objectives that have been adopted for national

development. Attention must be paid to the fact that inability to control or reduce rivalries and tensions based on conflict may give them an opportunity to escalate into disputes, open warfare and other forms of destructive conflict.

On the one hand, conflicts may provide an opportunity to conduct negotiations and find solutions collaboratively, resulting in mutual understanding. They may be the starting point for lasting peace and development as conciliation may be achieved through mutual compromise. Once the door is open to negotiation, it would certainly be supportive of the political, economic and social processes. In addition, **conflicts may be constructive and beneficial** when they produce capable managers and effective leaders.

All conflicts have underlying causes. As everything that has a beginning must also have an end, all conflicts have a resolution. It will be necessary to make an effort to find optimal conflict resolution methods best suited to the realities so that conflicts can be brought to an end. Conflict management is an important matter so that conflicts can be brought to an end in a mutually satisfactory manner that is directed toward serving the interests of the country and the people.

We need to minimize the damage and pain caused by conflict and at least learn lessons for the local areas, for the country and for the national people. The next stage would be to manage it to bring about advantages and benefits.

Only then will we be able to compensate for the lost time, energy, morale, finances and good prospects. Then we will have implemented our optimal conflict resolution.

It is only natural that differences in sentiments, goals and beliefs will continue to exist. It is important to recognize mistakes for what they are. Our work can be correct only when we have the correct outlook, correct views and correct concepts. Every one experiences ridicule and praise. It is also natural to be offended by ridicule and blame and to be pleased with praise. It is necessary to follow the correct path calmly and steadily without being moved too much by either praise or ridicule. It is also human nature to want to take revenge. But it is necessary to remember that revenge would make it impossible to rise above the level of the other side. We have already worked to overcome numerous challenges for more than a decade to achieve the path to multiparty democracy. At present we have favourable conditions to achieve stability and development for the nation and the people through multiparty democracy that we have strove for. We may still have challenges and conflicts to overcome, and we can overcome them through a worthy spirit, correct motivation and good will, constant awareness, unity and concerted efforts. **Rather than responding emotionally** to every incident that is encountered **with excessive ego, excessive pride and a high level of jealousy, it is necessary to act on the basis of rationality and analysis.** It is our wish and earnest hope that all those currently participating in the nation-building process and all the young people who will shoulder the responsibilities of the State in the future will sagaciously contribute to the continuing process of nation-building in any capacity or role.

Over 247,000 people affected by flooding in S Philippines

MANILA, 5 Aug — Over 247,000 individuals or nearly 50,000 families in southern Philippine Province of Maguindanao were affected by flooding due to heavy rains brought by low pressure area and intertropical convergence zone, the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) said on Sunday.

The displaced families came from 185 villages in 20 municipalities, the state agency said, adding that it is yet to receive report from the towns of Datu Odin Sinsuat and Datu Saudi Ampatuan.

Sultan Kudarat has remained as the place to have the most number of affected people at 41,700, it said.

The government has already extended over 4 million pesos (92, 170 US dollars) to the affected families, the NDRRMC said.

Search continues for 3 missing passengers in Vietnam shipwreck

HANOI, 5 Aug — Search and rescue teams on Sunday continued combing the area off the coast of Vietnam's southern Ho Chi Minh City to look for three missing passengers after a motor boat capsized last Friday, local media reported.

The accident, which happened on Friday night due to strong wind, has

claimed the lives of six passengers, including the boat operator. Another 21 passengers were rescued and being treated, according to state-run Vietnam News Agency.

The motor boat, with a maximum capacity of 18 passengers, was found to have carried 30 passengers on a passage that crossed Long Hoa village in Can

DPJ to leave talks with ruling bloc on Japan's welfare reforms

TOKYO, 5 Aug — The main opposition Democratic Party of Japan is set to break away from talks with the ruling bloc on social security reforms, in protest at the likelihood that its own policy goals cannot be achieved, lawmakers said on Monday.

In June 2012, under the initiative of the then DPJ-led government, the party agreed with Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's Liberal Democratic Party and its

junior coalition partner, the New Komeito party, to discuss welfare system reforms and also to increase the nation's sales tax from next April to help finance the system.

They planned to streamline the social security system, which has been increasingly under pressure due to Japan's aging population, and the DPJ specifically pressed for introducing a guaranteed minimum monthly pension

and ending the public medical insurance system for people aged over 75.

While the deadline for concluding the talks is set for 21 Aug, significant gaps remain between the DPJ and the two other parties, which regained control of the government in December's general lower house election and strengthened its grip on power in last month's upper house election.

Two killed in elephant attack in Nepal

KATHMANDU, 5 Aug — Two people were killed when an elephant went on rampage at Hariipur-1 in the Sarlahi District of Nepal, locals said on Sunday.

The elephant killed Upendra Mahato, 30, and two-and-half-year-old Hiriyah Mahato in the district. Upendra had gone to water his field and slept in

the field when the elephant attacked him. Hiriyah was attacked and killed outside her house while sleeping. Other members of her family had fled the scene during the attack.

"When we are sitting in front of house, (the) elephant suddenly came and began to attack, we ran away but I failed to rescue

my daughter," Hiriyah Mahato's father Nathuni Mahato told Xinhua.

Another local Prameshwor Mahato said one person was also injured in the elephant attack.

According to local police, four people have died in elephant attack in the district in the past two months.

S Korea to receive final bid for 7.4 bln USD fighter jet deal

SEOUL, 5 Aug — South Korea's arms procurement agency planned to receive a final bid next week for an 8.3 trillion won (7.4 billion US dollars) deal to buy 60 fighter jets, the largest arms import contract in the nation's history, an official said on Monday.

"The final bidding will be held between 13 and 16 Aug, except for the 15 Aug Liberation Day holiday," an official at the Defence Acquisition Programme

Administration (DAPA)'s spokesman office said by phone.

Three combat planes, including Lockheed Martin's F-35 stealth jet, Boeing's F-15 Silent Eagle and the Eurofighter Tranche 3 Typhoon of the European Aerospace Defence and Space Company (EADS), have been competing for the contract.

All the three aerospace giants have failed in the previous biddings due

to higher prices than the 8.3 trillion won budget approved by the parliament.

The DAPA official told Xinhua that possible failure of the planned bidding may lead to re-examination of the project from the starting point, noting that all options would be available such as the cut in the number of jets to be bought, purchases in installments and an increase in state budget.

ADB provides loan for transport link in Vietnam

MANILA, 5 Aug — The Asian Development Bank (ADB) will lend 410 million US dollars to Vietnam to build projects for the second arterial highway connecting Ho Chi Minh City to the Mekong Delta and southern coastal regions, ADB said on Monday. "This transport link will help open up Vietnam's western provinces in the Mekong River Delta and support its economic and industrial development," said Rustam Ishenaliyev, transport Specialist in ADB's

Southeast Asia Department.

The projects will comprise two cable-stayed bridges with a combined length of 5 km and associated access and interconnecting roads totaling 26 kms.

The two bridges and the interconnecting road will cut travel time between Ho Chi Minh City and Long Xuyen, capital city of An Giang Province in the Mekong Delta region of southwestern Vietnam, from 3.5 hours to 2.5 hours. The highway is expected to be open to traffic

by the end of 2017.

In addition to these transport benefits, the project is expected to support more inclusive development, improve access to basic social and health services, increase national food security and facilitate private sector investment in the region.

The project is expected to cost 860 million US dollars, which will be provided by the ADB, Australia and South Korea.

edge as
Detroit
bankruptcy
cuts loom

BEIJING, 5 Aug—Thousands of pensioners already struggling to get by are afraid they will be pushed into poverty if the United States city of Detroit is able to slash their benefits in a bankruptcy court.

Retired fire chief Jerry Franklin Smith spent 39 years battling blazes in a city filled with abandoned buildings and too many arsonists. He's worried that if a bankruptcy judge allows the city to wipe out its obligations to his pension fund he'll need to somehow find a job at the age of 78.

"I've only done physical things all my life. But I really can't do them anymore," Smith said. "It makes you nervous."

Police and firefighters don't qualify for the federally-run Social Security pension plan, which has an average payout of US\$1,268 a month. So their city-run plan is the only thing keeping them out of food banks or even homeless shelters.

Luckily it is better-funded than a separate plan run for Detroit's other municipal workers. But it is still owed millions and the city is hoping to slash all pension and retiree health care benefits in order to wipe out debt and reduce future costs.

Emergency manager Kevyn Orr was in court last Friday urging a federal judge to find the city eligible for bankruptcy in the second such hearing since the birthplace of the US auto industry became the largest US city to go bust on 19 July.—Xinhua

‘2 Guns’ shoots past ‘Smurfs,’ ‘Wolverine’ to claim box office

LOS ANGELES/NEW YORK, 5 Aug—“2 Guns,” starring Denzel Washington and Mark Wahlberg as rival federal agents, shot through its weekend competition at movie theatres, collecting \$27.4 million to lead the North American box office, according to studio estimates released on Sunday.

“The *Wolverine*,” last weekend’s box office leader, finished second with \$21.7 million in ticket sales and has totaled \$95 million during its two weeks in theatres.

Sony’s “*Smurfs 2*,” the newly released sequel to its 2011 movie “*The Smurfs*” starring Neil Patrick Harris and a band of small blue elf-like creatures, was third with \$18.2 million in ticket sales.

The horror film “*The Conjuring*,” about a house possessed by a demon, continued its strong run and was fourth with ticket sales of \$13.7 million. The animated “*Despicable Me 2*” was fifth after five weeks with \$10.4 million in ticket sales.

“2 Guns,” an adaption of the graphic novel by the same name published by Boom! Studios, fell some-

what short of some industry projections that it would generate about \$30 million in ticket sales in a summer in which a number of films have failed to live up to expectations.

Walt Disney’s (DIS.N) “*The Lone Ranger*” and Sony’s “*White House Down*” and “*After Earth*” bombed earlier this summer.

“We’re thrilled” with the numbers, said Nikki Rocco, president for domestic distribution at Universal Pictures, which distributed “2 Guns” and chalked up its seventh number-one opening this year. She added that “this was a very healthy box office weekend” at a time when “people used to talk about the August doldrums.”

Rocco said the studio had anticipated “2 Guns” would open “somewhere in the twenties” of millions, so “we’re very satisfied.”

“*Smurfs 2*” fell short of the \$35.6 million in ticket sales for Sony’s 2011 original film, which was released in late July. The film is based on a Belgian comic first published in 1958 that has been expanded into movies, a TV series and even an Ice Capades show.—Reuters

Manchester United have given up on Fabregas — Barca chief

BARCELONA, 5 Aug—Barcelona sporting director Andoni Zubizarreta has claimed that Manchester United have abandoned their interest in Cesc Fabregas, according to reports in the Spanish media.

United, who have yet to make a major signing since David Moyes succeeded Sir Alex Ferguson as manager, have already had two bids for the Spanish international rejected by La Liga champions.

“Manchester United were interested in the player, but they have also understood our stance that we don’t want to sell him,” the former Spain goalkeeper was quoted as saying by Barcelona based daily Sport. “They have given up on signing him.”

Despite claiming the first league title of his career last season, Fabregas has endured a largely frustrating time in the two years since he returned to the club he left as a 16-year-old to join Arsenal.

AKRON, (United States), 5 Aug—Tiger Woods savored an eighth Bridgestone Invitational success and a 79th PGA Tour triumph on Sunday. But for his young son, Charlie, it was a first chance to see his father win.

Woods was observed arriving at the course near lunchtime and walking hand-in-hand with the four-year-old from the players car park to the Firestone clubhouse.

And Charlie was there when Woods walked off some hours later a seven-shot winner. Woods said his daughter, Sam, is old enough to understand his profession, but for Charlie “it was the first win he’s ever been at.”

“That’s what makes it special for both of us. He’s never seen me win a golf tournament,” Woods said.

“Sam was there when I won the US Open in ‘08, and she loves to look at the YouTube videos and look back to Daddy.”

Arsene Wenger fears slow progress on transfers

LONDON, 5 Aug—Arsene Wenger admits Arsenal may be forced to go into their crucial Champions League qualifier without further additions to the squad.

Wenger has experienced a frustrating close season in the transfer market with France under-20 international Yaya Sanogo the only new arrival at the Emirates Stadium.

Wenger’s interest in

Luis Suarez, his principal target, is ongoing but so far Arsenal have failed to persuade Liverpool to part with the striker with a bid of over £40 million (46,038,504 euros) falling short of the Anfield club’s valuation. (Also read: Arsene Wenger hits back at Rodgers)

But “Charlie’s never had that, never felt what it’s like to be with the trophy,” he added. Woods said his children always ask “Daddy, when are you going to win the tournament?”

“So this week was nice to be able to get the lead and I held it, and it was awfully special for me to have (Charlie) here to witness it because he understands it now,” he said.

“He understands when I make a birdie, when I make par, and he understands the difference,” Woods added. “It’s awfully special to be able to share that kind of moment.”

As Woods now heads to the PGA Championship a red hot favourite to finally end a five-year major title drought, the world No 1 said he won’t push his son into the game.

“Charlie likes playing golfer, he likes going out there and giving it a hit,” Woods said. “It’s like what my dad did and that’s keep

it fun. Go out there, no lessons, and just have fun.”

But Woods said he wouldn’t put any pressure on his son. “Yes, it would be cool but I am not going to be pushing him and if he wants to do it, so be it,” he said. “If he wants to go and play another sport then that would be great, too.”

While Charlie is already emulating his father, Woods was asked if the youngster might model himself on some of the US tour’s younger talents, such as the often flamboyantly attired Rickie Fowler. Woods laughed and said: “My kid is not going to wear a flat bill (cap).”—PTI

“I haven’t heard that comment at all, and I haven’t read it so I’m always a bit cautious to answer what a manager is supposed to have said,” Wenger said.

“What I know is Fabregas will stay one more year at least in Barcelona. That’s the information I have. If that changes, I don’t know. But that’s what I have been told.”

Wenger also confirmed Gervinho was close to sealing a move to AS Roma, while Marouane Chamakh is expected to tie up a permanent switch to Crystal Palace.—PTI

Greek tourism bounces back to further growth

ATHENS, 5 Aug—After a tough year of 2012 when tourists stayed away from Greece amid economic and political uncertainty, the year 2013 will see the crisis-hit country on the rebound in the tourist industry sector, according to state officials and sector representatives.

As foreign visitors are returning in droves lured by the pristine beaches and wealth of history, Greece is expected to draw an all-time high number of at least 17 million tourists this year, up one million from 2012,

they told *Xinhua*.

Hopes that the sector, one of the ailing economy's most significant pillars, will help lift it out of recession are boosted.

Determined to win the battle, Greece has undertaken a massive and well-coordinated strategy in order to spur growth of tourism, looking ahead with optimism and showing the way to other countries.

On 31 July the Greek parliament approved a new tourism ministry-sponsored draft law which included clauses aimed at boosting

tourism sector entrepreneurship in the context of this strategy.

"The target for 2014 and onwards is to establish long-term growth: for Greek tourism to be strong in crises and constantly evolving," Tourism Minister Olga Kefaloyannis said, addressing the assembly.

She explained that the new bill will achieve this goal through facilitating investment, ensuring the quality of tourism infrastructure and services, as well as introducing new tourism products.—*Xinhua*

Juan Martin Del Potro beats John Isner to win Washington title

WASHINGTON, 5 Aug—Juan Martin del Potro showed he deserves to be among the favourites to win the US Open by rallying to beat John Isner in Sunday's final of the Washington Open.

The 24-year-old top seed from Argentina shook off a sluggish start to beat the US eighth seed 3-6, 6-1, 6-2 for his third title in six years at the \$1.76 million ATP and WTA hardcourt event, a tuneup for the year's final Grand Slam event beginning in New York in three weeks.

"I would have to be a favourite," del Potro said. "I'm playing well. To win tournaments and beat these guys, you have to be fit and in good condition."

"But I have a few more

guys playing better than me, and they have been favourites forever."

World number one Novak Djokovic, defending champion Andy Murray, five-time US Open winner Roger Federer and 2010 US Open champion Rafael Nadal were del Potro's picks as the players to beat at Flushing Meadows.

"I would put him the smallest hair behind Djokovic and Murray," Isner said of del Potro. "It would just be those guys right now. He would be third favourite."

In his first event since an epic five-set loss to Djokovic in the longest semi-final in Wimbledon history, del Potro showed his left knee was fine after an injury at Wimbledon.

"Honestly, I'm sur-

prised to win this tournament after a month without competition," del Potro said. "To win my first tournament on hardcourt, it means a lot. It gives me confidence to keep going and get closer to the top guys."

Del Potro stretched his Washington win streak to 14 matches by adding to the titles he won in the US capital in 2008 and 2009. The last time he won in Washington he went on to win the US Open, the only Grand Slam title since the 2005 Australian Open not taken by Federer, Nadal, Djokovic or Murray.

"I'm so glad to win again here," del Potro said. "It felt unbelievable."

Seventh-ranked del Potro won his 15th career
