## Mobile Medical Unit provides free health care to workers in Mingaladon industrial zone

A mobile medical unit (MMU) provided health care services to the workers of Asia Optical Factory in Mingaladon Industrial Zone on 15 February. The MMU is a clinic on the wheels that can offer basic health care to the people.

In the morning, the deputy minister attended a stake-driving ceremony for construction of a new operation theater for Htantabin Workers' Hospital in Hlinethaya Township.

It is learnt that efforts are being made to widely cover more workers in pro-

viding primary health care to them with the use of such mobile medical facility. Moreover, plans being implemented by the ministry aim at enabling workers who contribute their regular payments to the social security funds to have access to free healthcare at other people's hospitals and private hospitals apart from clinics of social security board and workers' hospitals in the future.

## Thai police fail to reach deal with protesters

BANGKOK, 16 Feb—Thai police and a prominent protest leader failed to reach a deal on Sunday to reopen state offices and roads in Bangkok that have been occupied for months by protesters seeking to overthrow Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra.

Talks with Buddhist monk Luang Pu Buddha Issara, a protest leader, failed to free up an occupied government complex in the north of the capital as a third day of a security operation designed to retake sites occupied by protesters drew to a close.

Buddha Issara said the government was using a request to reopen roads as an excuse to crack down on protesters.

"If there is blood loss... will the authorities take responsibility? Or will you blame it on provocateurs?"

Buddha Issara asked police representatives.

Speaking to the monk during a televised video conference, Naret Nanthachot, commissioner of Provincial Police Region 1, said police would not use force.

"I am asking for your kindness and understanding...tens of thousands of people are frustrated each day by their inability to use roads," said Naret.

Both sides agreed to talk at a later date.

Hundreds of riot police began an operation to reclaim key intersections and state buildings in Bangkok on Friday in what authorities said would be a slow operation to take back areas that have been occupied by protesters for several weeks.

Labor Minister Chalermsak Yooamrungrat, who

is charge of the operation, said the government would continue with its operation and try to reclaim five protest sites next week.

"This gathering has caused distress to others... that's why we have to reclaim the sites starting next week," Chalerm said at a news conference on Sun-

day.

The security operation has so far avoided larger sites in the city center occupied by the main protest group, the People's Democratic Reform Committee (PDRC), focusing instead on state offices on the outskirts of Bangkok.

## Two killed as more storms batter Britain

LONDON, 16 Feb—Two people were killed and 32 people were rescued from a seaside restaurant on Friday as storms and strong winds battered Britain, adding more misery to areas already hit by widespread flooding and transport chaos. Gales of up to 80 miles per hour and heavy rain lashed southern England and Wales overnight, Britain's Met Office said, while severe flood warnings remained in place for much of southern and central parts

of Britain.

More than 141,000 people have been left without power after high winds brought down power lines, the Energy Networks Association which represents energy companies said.

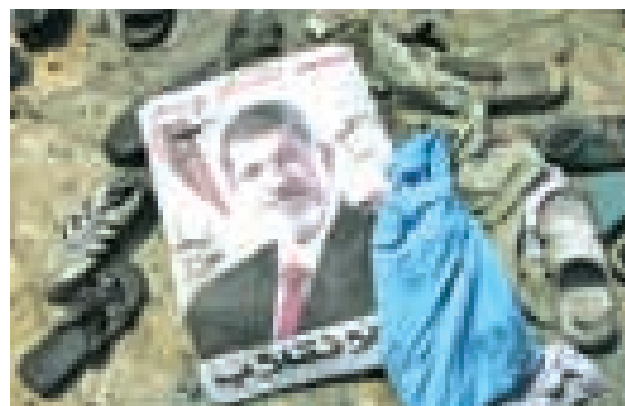
A 49-year-old woman died in the central London district of Holborn late on Friday after part of a building collapsed on the car she was driving, British police said.

In the English Channel, an 85-year-old man died when a cruise ship carrying 1,084 passengers and crew was hit by a large wave during rough seas, the ship's operator Cruise & Maritime Voyages said. The ship was heading to her home port of Tilbury, southeast England after a 42-night voyage.

Emergency services rescued 32 diners from a beachfront restaurant in

Milford on Sea, on England's south coast, after the building was hit by a strong tidal surge and high winds. No-one was injured, police said. The Met Office said Friday's weather was likely to be the last of the series of violent storms that have crossed the country in recent weeks, with the weather set to improve through the weekend. However, Britain's Environment Agency said flooding risk would continue for at least another week. Parts of southwest England have been underwater for weeks after heavy rain in February followed the wettest January in nearly 250 years. More recently, areas along the River Thames to the west of London, an important economic corridor, have been inundated, forcing many from their homes.

## Iraq's Shiite cleric Moqtada al-Sadr quits politics

BAGHDAD, 16 Feb — Iraq's firebrand Shiite cleric Moqtada al-Sadr on Sunday announced that he is leaving political life and closed his offices in order to stop the "evil acts" by some people under the name of his Sadr family.

"I announce that I do not intervene in public political affairs, and there is no bloc would represent us anymore, nor any position inside and outside the government and the parliament," Sadr said in a statement posted in his official website.

The statement also said that Sadr has closed all of his political offices except for some charities and said that "no one has the right to represent and speak on their behalf and under their title."

According to the statement, Sadr's surprise decision came to "protect his family's name, and to end all evil acts that occurred and likely to occur under the name of our family or under the name of our offices." Sadr's move would have some impacts on the political process as his parliamentary bloc al-Ahrrar and his allied politicians would lose their religious legitimacy after Sadr's withdrawal.

Sadr also known of his stance to reject Prime Minister Nuri al-Maliki's efforts to seek a third term in his post after the coming April 30 national elections. His withdrawal could be useful for Maliki's ambition.

Moqtada al-Sadr, 40, is the son of a prominent Shiite leader, Ayatollah Mohammad Sadeq al-Sadr, who was murdered presumably by the regime of Saddam Hussein in 1999.

Succeeding his father's career, al-Sadr became the head of the al-Sadr group. He was also enrolled at the Najaf Hawza Seminary and then in Iran's Qum Hawza Seminary.—Xinhua

## Continued vigilance urged against heavy snow in northern Japan

TOKYO, 16 Feb—The Japan Meteorological Agency on Sunday urged continued vigilance about heavy snow and strong winds in northern Japan, as the low pressure system that brought record snowfalls centering on the country's eastern region moved to the northeastern Pacific coast.

The heavy snow has caused 12 deaths since Friday in seven prefectures -- Gunma, Saitama, Yamaguchi, Nagano, Shizuoka, Shiga and Oita.

The low pressure system, which dumped 27 centimeters of snow in Tokyo and broke snowfall records in other cities, is expected to further strengthen by Monday, coming close to the Kuril Islands, to bring heavy snow and strong winds in coastal areas in northern Japan, the agency said.—Kyodo News

## Egypt's deposed president Mursi on trial on terrorism charges

CAIRO, 16 Feb—Deposed Egyptian president Mohamed Mursi appeared in court on Sunday on charges of conspiring with foreign groups to commit terrorist acts in Egypt, in a further escalation of the crackdown against his Muslim Brotherhood.

Declaring it "the biggest case of conspiracy in the history of Egypt", prosecutors have detailed a "terrorist plan" dating back to 2005 and implicating Palestinian group Hamas and the Shi'ite Islamist government of Iran as well as its Lebanese ally Hezbollah.

Mursi's Muslim Brotherhood propelled him to victory in the 2012 presidential election but has been driven underground since the army took power in July after mass protests against his rule.

The state, which has declared the Brotherhood a terrorist group, has killed

about 1,000 of its members on the streets and jailed thousands of others, including top leaders.

Egypt's Western allies have exerted little pressure on the Cairo government to end what critics say are widespread human rights violations.

Mursi is on trial in three cases and charged in two others.

In the latest one, the prosecutor also charged Brotherhood leaders Mohamed Badie, Khairat El-Shater, Mahmoud Ezzat and others with crimes including committing acts of terrorism in Egypt and divulging military secrets to a foreign state.

A total of 36 people are on trial.

The Brotherhood accuses the army of staging a coup and reviving a dictatorship, an allegation the military denies.

The prosecutor said

the Brotherhood's plan was to send "elements" to the Gaza Strip for military training by Hezbollah and the Iranian Revolutionary Guards.

Upon their return to Egypt, they would join forces with extremist groups in the Sinai Peninsula, the Egyptian-controlled territory that borders Israel to the east, it said.

After the 2011 uprising that ousted President Hosni Mubarak, the group exploited the chaos to carry out attacks on security forces in North Sinai and elsewhere, it said.

The prosecutor said they aimed to establish an "Islamic emirate" in North Sinai were Mursi not declared president.

Mursi's presidential aides including Essam El-Haddad, his national security adviser, had leaked secret reports to Iran's Revolutionary Guards and Hez-

## Tokyu blames snow for train collision near Tokyo

TOKYO, 16 Feb — An official of railway operator Tokyu Corp suggested on Saturday heavy snow may have weakened the brakes of a train involved in the commuter train collision that occurred near Tokyo shortly after midnight.

Fumiaki Shiroishi, general manager of Tokyu's railway business, said the brakes of the train that rear-ended another "were not as effective as expected due to the effects of snow." He noted that the automatic train control system worked

properly at the time of the accident that left 19 passengers with light injuries.

"We apologize for causing much anxiety and trouble to everyone," Shiroishi said.

At around 12:30 am, a train on the Tokyu Toyoko

line linking Tokyo and Yokohama bumped into another train that was stopped at Motosumiyoshi Station in Kawasaki city south of Tokyo after overrunning the stop line by about 30 metres.

The first and second cars of the moving train derailed after the collision and the driver said he had applied the brake but not in time, according to Kanagawa prefectural police.

Train services were disrupted at the time of the accident due to heavy snow, and Shiroishi said there had been 10 previous instances on Friday of trains halting beyond the stop line on the same line, including two at the same station. Transport authorities have launched an investigation and found that the driver of the colliding train had been notified prior to the accident, an official said.—Kyodo News

## Gov't to submit bill to parliament to ratify arms trade pact

TOKYO, 16 Feb — The government plans to submit to parliament by the end of this month a bill to ratify the Arms Trade Treaty, the first international pact to regulate trade in conventional arms, government sources said on Saturday.

The measure, coming less than a year after Japan signed the treaty adopted at the UN General Assembly last April, underscores Tokyo's eagerness to nudge others to join the

framework, according to the sources.

However, the move appears incongruous with the policy of Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's government in seeking to relax the nation's restrictions on arms exports.

The treaty would regulate trade in such weapons as tanks, attack helicopters, combat aircraft and small arms. Countries that accede to the pact would be banned from importing, exporting

or brokering arms trades if there are risks the weapons could be used for terrorism or genocide or the trade would violate a UN Security Council resolution.

Japan took the lead in drafting the treaty along with Britain and Australia, and signed the pact last June. It will go into force when 50 countries ratified the treaty, but just over 10 countries have so far done so. The United States signed the pact last

September but has yet to ratify it, with no prospect of obtaining approval from Congress anytime soon. Neither Russia nor China has signed the treaty. One government source dismissed the notion of inconsistency in Tokyo's arms export policy on the grounds that the country's restrictions on arms exports, even if relaxed, would still be more strict than the regulation to be imposed by the treaty.—Kyodo News

## Marshall Islands leader finds similarities on visit to Hiroshima

HIROSHIMA, 16 Feb — Marshall Islands President Christopher Loeak visited the Hiroshima peace museum on Saturday and spoke of similarities between his country and the Japanese city that suffered US atomic bombing in 1945.

Loeak, who met with Prime Minister Shinzo Abe in Tokyo on Friday, visited Hiroshima ahead of the 60th anniversary of the US hydrogen bomb test 1 March, 1954, on Bikini Atoll in the Marshall Islands.

At the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum, Loeak was briefed by museum director Kenji Shiga and atomic bomb survivor Keiko Ogura, 76, on

the 1945 bombing of the city and its aftermath.

Loeak said he looks to atomic bomb survivors to draw attention to the effects of nuclear weapons, adding that he hopes to forge solidarity with the people of Nagasaki and Fukushima for having similarly been impacted by radiation.

Some Marshall Islands residents were exposed to radioactive fallout from the 1954 H-bomb test. The Japanese tuna fishing boat *Fukuryu Maru No 5* was also exposed to the fallout.

The president arrived in Japan on Wednesday and is set to leave on Sunday.

## Iraqi PM visits battlefield in Anbar, 21 killed in violence

BAGHDAD, 16 Feb — Iraqi Prime Minister Nuri al-Maliki on Saturday paid a surprise visit to the battlefield in Anbar Province to announce a rebuilding plan, while violence across the country left 21 people killed and 26 wounded, government and security sources said. Maliki spent several hours in his first visit to the province, during which he met with top military and tribal leaders, who briefed him on the security situation and the development of military operations in the provincial capital city of Ramadi, some 110 km west of Baghdad, a statement from Maliki's office said. Maliki pledged to restore security and stability across province

and announced a comprehensive reconstruction plan for cities destroyed by militant groups or in clashes with them, the statement said.

The plan also includes training thousands of local young men, who fight the militant groups to protect their homeland in the place of the army, which will withdraw for other missions, the statement added.

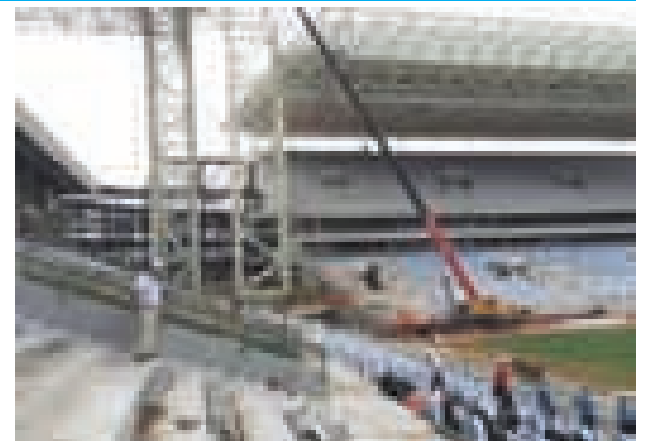
Meanwhile, an official from the main hospital in Fallujah told *Xinhua* that his hospital received Saturday three bodies and four people with artillery and mortar wounds. Anbar Province has been the scene of fierce clashes that flared up after Iraqi police dismantled an anti-government protest

site outside Ramadi in late December.

In Baghdad, three civilians were wounded when two roadside bombs went off in the east district of Sadr City, a police source told *Xinhua*. Four more people were wounded in a roadside bomb blast at a marketplace in Obiedi district in east Baghdad, while a policeman was wounded in a roadside bomb explosion near his patrol in Zaiyounah District also in the east, the source added.

In Iraq's eastern province of Diyala, militiamen bombed a Sunni mosque in the village of Albu-Shaheen east of the provincial capital city of Baquba, a local police source told *Xinhua*.

## Brazil World Cup stadium was structurally damaged by fire

CUIABA, 16 Feb — An October fire at a Brazilian World Cup stadium caused far more damage than previously reported, according to a report by local prosecutors obtained by *Reuters*, raising questions about whether the stadium will be ready for the competition and why government officials have insisted the blaze was minor.

State officials overseeing construction of the still-unfinished Arena Pantanal in the western city of Cuiabá, which is among 12 Brazilian cities scheduled to host games, have long said the 25 October fire wasn't a major cause for concern.

However, an 18-page report prepared in December by the Mato Grosso state Public Ministry, an independent judicial body similar to the district attorney's office in the United

States, warned that the blaze caused "structural damage" that "could compromise the overall stability of the construction." The report was delivered in December to the state agency overseeing the stadium's construction, the Extraordinary Secretariat for the World Cup, or Secopa. State prosecutors provided *Reuters* with access to the document, whose content has not been previously disclosed to the public.

It is unclear whether the damage described in the report has since been fixed. Prosecutors are scheduled to conduct a follow-up inspection of the fire site next Thursday, and they said they hoped the disclosure of the report's contents would lead local officials to be more cooperative and transparent than they have until now.

# Obama signs increase in US debt ceiling

RANCHO MIRAGE, (California), 16 Feb — President Barack Obama signed legislation on Saturday that raises the US debt limit through March 2015, taking the politically volatile issue off the table with congressional elections coming up this November.

Without an increase in the statutory debt limit, the US government would have soon defaulted on some of its obligations and would have had to shut down some programs, an historic event that would have caused severe market turmoil.

## Picnic bus accident kills seven children in Bangladesh

DHAKA, 16 Feb — At least seven children were killed and some 20 others injured as their picnic bus plunged into a roadside canal in southwestern Jessore district, some 164 km away of capital Dhaka, on Saturday night, police said.

A Jessore police official told *Xinhua* that the bus with around 30 children of a primary school veered off the road and plunged into the canal at around 8:30 pm (local time).

“All the seven children died on the spot,” said the police official. He said the accident took place on their way back to home after a picnic.

The bus driver seems to have lost control as the roads were slippery after rain, he added. At least 44 school students were killed in a fatal road accident in July 2011 when a truck carrying them overturned and plunged into a ditch in Mirsarai sub-district of Bangladesh's Chittagong District, 240 km southeast of Dhaka.

On a long holiday weekend in a desert resort area in southern California, Obama put his signature on the legislation without fanfare, while behind closed doors at the Sunnylands retreat.

It was a quiet end to the latest chapter in what has been one of the more challenging aspects of his presidency, as he and his fellow Democrats have repeatedly sparred with Republicans over increasing the country's borrowing authority.

Extending the debt ceiling to March 2015

means the issue may not get caught up in election-year politics.

Congress had given final approval to the increase after final action in the Senate on Wednesday, but only over the objections of Texas Republican Ted Cruz, a favorite of the conservative Tea Party movement.

It appeared at first there would not be enough Republicans to join the Democratic majority and advance the bill.

But a decision by Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell and No

2 Senate Republican John Cornyn, who are both up for re-election this year, to vote to advance the measure ensured that it would survive.

The House of Representatives, where Republicans hold a majority, passed the measure in a close vote on Tuesday after Republicans dropped the confrontational tactics they had used in similar votes over the past three years.

The advance of the measure has brought relief to financial markets. Investors were becoming

increasingly jittery ahead of 27 February, the date by which the US Treasury had been warning its

## Confab calls for action to outlaw nukes on 70 years after Hiroshima

NUEVO VALLARTA, (Mexico), 16 Feb — A major conference drawing representatives from more than 140 countries ended on Friday with an appeal for action to outlaw nuclear weapons ahead of the 70th anniversary of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki next year.

The chair's summary of the two-day Second Conference on the Humanitarian Impact of Nuclear Weapons in Nayarit, Mexico, reiterated the growing risk of nuclear weapons use globally because of their proliferation and vulnerability to cyber attacks,

human error and potential access to nuclear arsenals by terrorist groups.

In addition to the short and long-term impact on human health from radiation exposure, a nuclear weapon detonation would have effects not constrained by national borders, most severely affecting the poor and vulnerable, the document said.

The summary said weapons will only have been eliminated after they are outlawed. “We believe this is the path to achieve a world without nuclear weapons,” it added.

“In our view, this is

consistent with our obligations under international law” such as those derived from the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty and the Geneva Convention.

The conference called on nuclear weapons states and countries that have not joined the NPT to take part in the third conference to be held in Austria.

The United States, Russia, China, Britain and France, which are allowed to possess nukes under the NPT, did not take part in the first conference in Oslo in March last year as well as the latest meeting.

## Japan, US apart over farm produce, auto trade in TPP trade talks

WASHINGTON, 16 Feb — Japan and the United States moved no closer to an early conclusion of the Trans-Pacific Partnership free trade pact in ministerial talks Saturday, remaining divided over thorny farm produce and auto trade issues. Both governments will “continue to work” on narrowing the gaps ahead of an upcoming plenary ministerial meeting in Singapore, Japanese

TPP minister Akira Amari told reporters after meeting with US Trade Representative Michael Froman in Washington.

Amari said bilateral negotiations with the United States on the TPP had been “deadlocked” since top officials from both governments met on the sidelines the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland, last month.

“We shared a view on

how to narrow down our differences,” Amari said, after being asked what the main progress made in the talks with Froman was.

Amari said both governments agreed on the importance of bridging gaps over the issue of market access including agricultural products and rules in the TPP framework.

The USTR said in a statement that Froman and Amari “noted that differences remain, particularly in the negotiations on automotive trade.” The ministers “instructed their teams to continue this work next week in Singapore and Tokyo,” the statement said.

The talks between the two biggest economies in the envisioned TPP pact came before the first ministerial gathering for the TPP countries in the Southeast Asian country since they missed the primary deadline for concluding a pact at the end of last year.

## Over half Osaka voters question Hashimoto re-election bid

OSAKA, 16 Feb — A majority of voters in the city of Osaka, western Japan, question Mayor Toru Hashimoto's recent resignation to seek re-election with the aim of achieving his proposed local administrative reform, a *Kyodo News* survey showed on Sunday. In the telephone survey conducted Saturday and Sunday, 64.2 percent of respondents voiced doubts about Hashimoto's move, while 27.3 percent welcomed it.

On 7 February, Hashimoto submitted his resignation in order to elicit public opinion in an election regarding his plan to merge the Osaka prefectural and municipal governments into a metropolitan government similar to Tokyo's.

The 1,014 respondents to the random-digit-dialed survey were divided about the reform plan, with 39.1 percent in favor and 40.3 percent against, and also about whether to back Hashimoto, with 47.8 percent supportive and 41.8 percent opposed.

Asked about their reasons for questioning the mayor's move, the largest group of 31.2 percent cited the high cost involved, followed by 30.0 percent who said Hashimoto should discuss the matter with opponents in the municipal assembly and 21.2 percent who said they do not favor Hashimoto's political stance.

Of those who welcomed the re-election bid, the largest group of 29.8 percent said public views about the Osaka metropolis plan would be clarified by the election.

The Osaka municipal assembly voted Friday to reject Hashimoto's resignation, but he will automatically lose the mayoral post on 27, 20 February days after he announced his resignation, under the local autonomy law. Major political parties in Osaka plan not to field candidates. If no other candidates run, Hashimoto will be re-elected without a vote in the election set for 23 March.—*Kyodo News*

## Opera Software says Skyfire's expectations were too high

OSLO, 16 Feb — Norway's Opera Software now expects to pay \$35 million less than anticipated for Skyfire, a video and data compression technology firm bought in February 2013, as sales underperformed the unit's own expectations, the company said on Tuesday.

Opera's shares traded 4.1 percent lower at 1050 GMT. "As we got through the end of 2013, we realized that the earn-out targets set by the Skyfire management team were not realistic, and

as a result, in the fourth quarter of 2013, we reduced the estimated earn-out payments to Skyfire by \$35 million. We continue to feel good about the Skyfire technology, its business and its prospects going forward," Opera Chief Financial Officer Erik Harrell said.

The original deal set a price tag of up to \$155 million for Skyfire, with an upfront pay of \$50 million and the rest to be paid over three years. Skyfire helps telecoms operators and broadband providers compress

data through cloud computing technologies and thereby save money by allowing them to invest less in physical infrastructure. "Many in the market had expected the operator business to grow faster than it actually has," Arctic Securities analyst Markus Bjerke said. "Opera must also have thought so since they're now changing the previously announced payment."

He said the share price fall was linked to the Skyfire announcement. "The share has performed

strongly on Skyfire expectations so it's not entirely surprising that it's falling on a disappointment there," Bjerke added. Chief Executive Lars Boilesen said he was pleased with signing two Skyfire deals during 2013 and that prospects for the unit were good. "If there is a disconnect between analysts' expectations and what we actually deliver, then that's something we have to work on," he told Reuters.

"There are many (potential customers) that are testing the product. It's a

complex and time consuming process that we believe will lead to several deals in 2014," he said. "The video compression is now becoming part of all our products, and that's the main reason why we bought them." Opera maintained it is on track to meet its long-held 2015 sales target of \$500 million and core earnings of \$150 million. Analysts in a Reuters poll on average expected next year's revenues to hit \$487 million.

The analysts expected 2015 earnings before

interest, tax, depreciation and amortization (EBITDA) of \$159 million. Opera's forecasts for 2014 were also broadly in line with analyst expectations. Fourth-quarter 2013 revenues totaled \$89.6 million, beating the predictions from all eight analysts in the Reuters poll, which had an average expectation of \$86.1 million. Adjusted EBITDA for the period was exactly in line with forecasts, at \$24 million, while operating profit (EBIT) was marginally lower.—Reuters

## South Korea to route sensitive US communications away from Huawei gear

SEOUL, 16 Feb — South Korea has agreed to route sensitive US and South Korean communications away from networks that include equipment made by Huawei Technologies Co Ltd, spurred by Washington's concerns over the Chinese firm, the Wall Street Journal reported on Friday. US

officials in meetings with South Korean counterparts in recent months raised the risk that Huawei's equipment could be used for spying on communications between the allies as well as compromise networks used by US military and intelligence officials in South Korea, the report said.

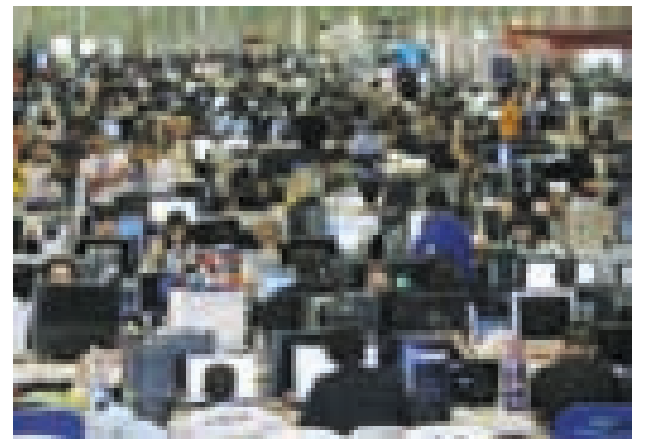
"To address these security concerns, South Korea decided to make changes to the project so that sensitive South Korean government communications won't pass through Huawei equipment," the Journal quoted US officials briefed on the discussions as saying. A US official confirmed the report but declined to provide further details. A South Korean foreign ministry official declined to comment on the report but said the issue at stake involved purchase decisions by private companies, over which the government has no control. Huawei had no comment on the report.

South Korea hosts about 28,500 US troops as part of the two countries'

combined defence against possible North Korean aggression. Last year, the heads of two US Senate committees overseeing national security expressed concern about a supply deal between Huawei and South Korea's LG Uplus Corp, its third largest mobile carrier.

Huawei equipment will not be used or connected to US military bases in South Korea to protect American communications, the officials were quoted as saying. State Department spokeswoman Jennifer Psaki said: "While the United States has expressed concerns in the past, these decisions were made by the Republic of Korea and the Republic of Korea alone."

## Spain to force search engines to pay to display some content

MADRID, 16 Feb — News media companies in Spain will be able to charge search engines such as Google for displaying copyrighted content under a new law proposed by the Spanish government on Friday.

The measure echoes similar drives around Europe. Publishers in Portugal, France, Belgium and Germany have pushed for compensation in some form or another for links, snippets, headlines and lead paragraphs that appear in news search engines and aggregators such as Google

News and Yahoo news. The search engines draw revenue from advertising placed near news content and media companies have fought for a share of it.

The new rule was introduced in the draft of an intellectual property law that the centre-right People's Party government will present to parliament for approval, Deputy Prime Minister Soraya Saenz de Santamaria told a weekly news conference. Under the proposed changes, the search engines would not have to seek permission to publish brief fragments but would have to pay "an equitable remuneration for the use".

The government did not say how it would be determined which fragments must be paid for and how amounts would be calculated.

This has been a matter of fierce debate elsewhere in Europe. A spokeswoman for Google in Spain said the company could not comment because it had not yet seen the exact wording of the intellectual property reform bill.—Reuters

## After retailer breaches, SEC plans roundtable on cybersecurity

WASHINGTON, 16 Feb — The Securities and Exchange Commission said on Friday that it plans to hold a roundtable next month to discuss cybersecurity, after massive retailer breaches refocused the attention of the business community and policymakers on the area. The SEC said that it would hold the event

on 26 March to talk about the challenges cyber threats pose for market participants and public companies.

Recent breaches at Target Corp and Neiman Marcus have sparked concern from lawmakers and revived a long-running spat among retailers and banks over who should bear the cost of

consumer losses and technology investments to improve security. On Thursday, trade groups for the two industries announced they are forming a partnership to work through the disputes.

US lawmakers have also considered weighing in on how consumers should be notified of data theft. But

progress on legislation is not guaranteed in a busy election year.

The SEC in 2011 drafted informal staff-level guidance for public companies to use when considering whether to disclose cyber attacks and their impact on a company's financial condition.

## Ericsson says Ciena deal will boost IP networks presence

STOCKHOLM, 16 Feb — Ericsson's agreement on Friday with Ciena for the development of joint transport solutions for IP-optical convergence will help Ericsson to reach its goal of becoming the No 3 player within the IP networks market, an Ericsson spokesperson told Reuters. Ericsson, the No 1 global supplier of mobile network gear,

is smaller than the likes of Cisco, Juniper and Alcatel-Lucent within IP-networks.

The Sweden-based telecoms supplier has the ambition to reach the No 3 position within IP-networks within a few years, Jan Haglund, head of IP and Broadband within Ericsson's biggest business area Networks, told Reuters. "In year 2020 about 30 percent of these

markets will be dependent on common solutions for IP and optical systems, which is the underlying financial driver for this agreement with Ciena," Haglund said.

Haglund said the market for IP networks is worth about 15 billion dollars currently with an annual growth of about 5 percent and that the market for optical systems is worth 10 to

15 billion dollars per year. Ericsson will, as part of the agreement, offer Ciena's

## Health experts call for soft drink tax to curb New Zealand obesity

WELLINGTON, 16 Feb — New Zealand health researchers on Friday called for a tax on sugary carbonated soft drinks in order to save lives and increase public health spending. The call came in the run-up to a symposium hosted by the University of Auckland next week under the theme “A Sugary Drink Free Pacific by 2030?”. The research-

ers from the universities of Auckland and Otago estimated a 20-percent tax on fizzy drinks would reduce energy consumption by 0.2 percent a day and help avert or postpone about 67 deaths from cardiovascular disease, diabetes and diet-related cancers a year.

The health effect of such a tax would likely be greater amongst Maori and

Pacific island consumers as they were more responsive to changes in food prices and amongst children and young people due to their higher consumption of such drinks. “High sugar intakes are linked to obesity, type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease — a strong case can therefore be made for efforts to reduce consumption,” lead researcher Professor Cliona Ni Mhurchu of the University of Auckland’s National Institute for Health Innovation said in a statement.

“Of particular concern are sugar-sweetened soft drinks because they are nutrient poor, and energy from beverages appears less satiating than that obtained from solid foods, resulting in increased consumption.” About 17 percent of the total sugar intake of New Zealand and between

27 percent and 29 percent of total sugar consumed by 15 to 18 year-old adults came from non-alcoholic beverages. A 20-percent tax could also generate up to 40 million NZ dollars (33.43 million US dollars) each year, which could be invested in programmes to improve public health, according to the researchers’ calculations.

However, the Taxpayers’ Union public spending watchdog group said a Danish tax on saturated fat, introduced in 2011, had been an “economic disaster” and had to be abandoned after 15 months with little effect on consumption. “The overseas experience is that fat taxes merely lead to compensatory purchasing and brand switching,” Taxpayers’ Union executive director Jordan Williams said in a statement.—Xinhua



## Investor Tom Perkins says progressive taxation ‘persecutes’ the rich

SAN FRANCISCO, 16 Feb — Tom Perkins, the Silicon Valley venture capitalist who compared the plight of the wealthiest Americans to Jews in Nazi Germany, offered up a provocative new idea on what the rich deserve: more votes in public elections for every dollar they pay in taxes.

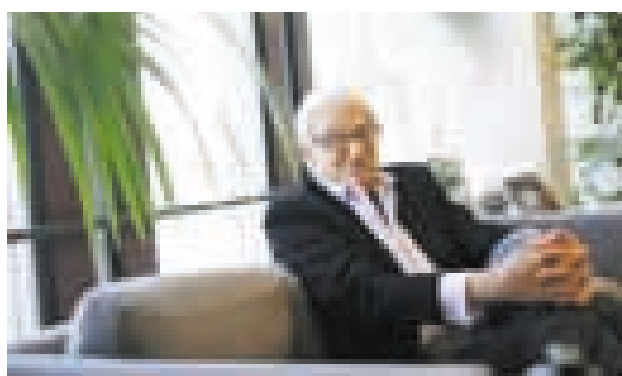
“If you pay a million dollars, you should get a million votes,” Perkins, the retired co-founder of venture capital firm Kleiner Perkins Caufield & Byers, told an audience at San Francisco’s Commonwealth Club in comments that he later said were meant to be provocative. He also said that only taxpayers should have the right to vote. Last month, Perkins wrote a much-discussed letter-to-the-editor published in *The Wall Street Journal*

that likened the Nazi party’s war on Jews to what he called “the progressive war on the American one percent, namely the ‘rich.’”

He later apologized for the analogy, which included a reference to Kristallnacht, the 1938 attack on Jews in Nazi Germany and Austria. He expressed regret again on Thursday for

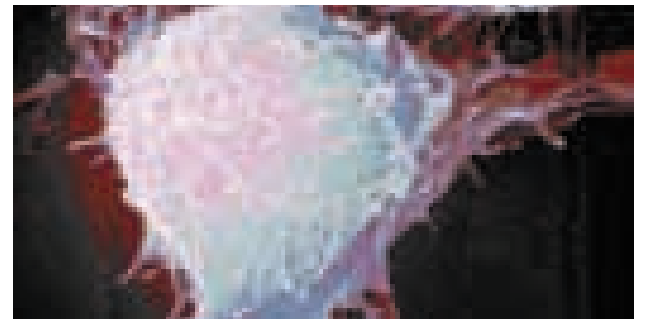
those words, saying, “You shouldn’t compare anything to the Holocaust.” But on Thursday night, he doubled down on his comments about the treatment of the nation’s wealthiest citizens. “The extreme progressivity of taxation is a form of persecution,” he said.

## Over 5,000 Cubans receive stem cell treatment

HAVANA, 16 Feb — More than 5,000 patients have received stem cell treatment in Cuba since that procedure was introduced in 2004, a medical expert said on Saturday.

Doctor Porfirio Hernandez, research vice director at the Hematology and Immunology Institute in Cuba, said in an official media outlet that the stem cell treatment method has been implemented in 13 of the entire 15 provinces of the island country.

As a widely acknowledged pioneer of this

practice in Cuba, Hernandez indicated that more than 60 percent of patients receiving this treatment had suffered from severe ischemia at lower limbs and other blood vessel related ailments.

The therapy has also been used to reduce the sufferings of patients with severe problems in orthopedics and cardiology, Hernandez added. Stem cells are capable of self-renewing, regenerating tissues damaged by diverse disease, traumas, and aging, and stimulating the creation of new blood vessels.—Xinhua

## China’s Wanxiang wins US bankruptcy auction for Fisker Automotive

NEW YORK, 16 Feb — Wanxiang Group, China’s largest auto parts company, won a bankruptcy auction for the assets of Fisker Automotive, the defunct manufacturer of the Karma plug-in hybrid sports car, Fisker said on Friday. Wanxiang’s bid has been valued at about \$149.2 million, representing \$126.2 million of cash, \$8 million of assumed liabilities, and a contribution of common equity in an affiliate designated by Wanxiang, Fisker said in a statement.

The sale will be presented to the US Bankruptcy Court in Wilmington, Delaware, on Tuesday for approval by Judge Kevin Gross. Wanxiang outbid an affiliate of Richard Li, a Hong Kong billionaire and Fisker investor, said two sources who were briefed on the auction. The auction began on

Wednesday and ended on Friday. Li had presented an initial bid of around \$55 million, the sources said. There were 19 rounds of bidding, according to Fisker.

California-based Fisker was the brainchild of Henrik Fisker, a former BMW designer. The company’s elegant cars were hobbled by cost overruns and tech glitches and in 2012 it stopped production to conserve cash. Wanxiang has been building a US manufacturing presence and last year

the US government cleared it to acquire the bankrupt assets of A123 Systems Inc, which made Fisker batteries.

Both Fisker and A123 were funded in part with loans from the US government that were meant to foster clean-fuel technologies. Wanxiang outbid Johnson Controls Inc for A123, and the Chinese company also overcame an active lobbying effort to block it from obtaining technology developed with US taxpayer money.

## Aveo, Astellas end pact to develop cancer drug tivozanib

BANGALORE, 16 Feb — Aveo Oncology and Astellas Pharma Inc said they would end an agreement to develop Aveo’s lead experimental drug that has seen a string of failures in multiple cancer indications. Aveo, which cut 62 percent of its workforce last year to focus on developing the drug, tivozanib, as a treatment for breast and colon cancers, said in December that the

drug was not likely to succeed in a mid-stage trial testing its use in colon cancer.

The companies said on Friday they would discontinue the study. A mid-stage trial testing tivozanib as a treatment for breast cancer was stopped last month due to insufficient enrolments. Tivozanib was rejected by US health regulators in June for use in kidney cancer, citing inconsistent study



results. The termination of the collaboration will be effective 11 August, after which Aveo will retain the rights to the drug, the companies said in a statement.

The two companies had signed a worldwide

agreement to develop and market tivozanib outside of Asia for the treatment of a broad range of cancers in February 2011. Cambridge, Massachusetts-based Aveo’s shares have lost nearly 7 percent of their value since December 13, when the company said the drug was unlikely to succeed as a treatment for colon cancer. The stock closed at \$1.75 on the Nasdaq on Thursday.—Reuters

**March towards an accountable and responsible media world**

A number of democratic reforms are taking place in all sectors of the country. As part of media reforms, the media has enjoyed free media pre-censorship since one and half years. With the aim of ensuring media development, the government has carried out such relaxations on the media. The green-light has been given for publication of books on politics and mythic and of private daily newspapers as of April 2013. Till now, there are 18 private daily newspapers. Thanks to the government's relaxations, the media world sees more progress. On the other hand, the media should have accountability and responsibility in accord with media ethics. Only then, could the media serve as a distribution channel of information between the civil society and the government.

It can be seen that Myanmar's media sector is changing at a fast pace. The country sees the growing number of online media consumption that outnumbered traditional media. Digital media is becoming more popular among the educated Myanmar youth rather than traditional media, the print media, even though Myanmar's internet access remains low. The increasing number of internet users can make the flow of information fast. On the one hand, people could enjoy the up-to-date news thanks to it. On the other hand, it may have a negative impact. The information should be accurate one and not be ones like the hate-speech that can trigger the violence. Here, it can be seen that how important the media ethics are for the journalists. The government has given the media freedom in accord with democratic norms.

But some journalists have weaknesses in following the journalist ethics such as Code of Ethics of Myanmar Press Council (Interim) states that media must ensure every news item is correct in facts and data and assess them as much as possible and journalist ethics of society of professional journalists also states that journalists should test the accuracy of

information from all sources and exercise care to avoid inadvertent error. Deliberate distortion is never permissible. Some have failed to follow the ethics described in the society of professional journalists that the journalists should never distort the content of news photos or video. It is regretted that Myanmar media sees the prevalence of smear campaign.

For the emergence of an accountable and responsible media environment, the Ministry of Information has signed an MoU on media development cooperation with International Media Support in November, 2013. The media development programme includes training course for photo journalists and those from print media, photo exhibition and establishment of a Myanmar Journalism School in cooperation with Myanmar Forever Group, UNESCO, Canal France International (CFI), DW Akademie of Germany and Fojo Media Institute of Sweden. Here I would like to briefly explain the facts about the Myanmar Journalism School. The establishment of this school was discussed at a ceremony to sign Film and Media Sectors Cooperation Agreement between Union Information Minister U Aung Kyi and Culture Minister Ms Aurelie Filipetti of France in Yangon in December, 2013. Opening the school is aimed at ensuring the development of reliable news coverage through journalist ethics being practiced in international media and the designation of Myanmar's media quality. Plans are under way to conduct one-year diploma course in coming July.

One of main areas of cooperation under the MoU between the Ministry of Information and IMS is the peace process. After years of civil war, the government led by the President is striving for peace with the ethnic armed

groups. Reporting peace efforts is crucial for success of peace process and democratization. But there were biased reporting or reporting which incited violence indirectly due to less experience in journalism. To prevent undesirable consequences, conflict sensitive journalism courses were conducted from November 2012 to June 2013 in 11 cities—Nay Pyi Taw, Yangon,

Mandalay, Mawlamyine, Monywa, Kalay, Myitkyina, Taunggyi, Lashio, Magway and Patheingyi. Myanmar is currently drafting a handbook of conflict sensitive journalism and also initiating efforts on monitoring media coverage on peace process. The MoU also covers supports to other organizations and courses to develop capacity of working journalists.

Under the media development cooperation MoU, the Ministry of Information agreed to provide necessary inter-governmental cooperation, support regional projects through local governments, coordinate with government agencies to smoothen process of the project, provide necessities (eg. Visa) to IMS consultants and international scholars, allow IMS to register, and support its implementations.

Teams of spokespersons have been formed in each ministry to enable the media contact with respective ministries directly. But there are still challenges for thorough relations with the media due to lack of experience in media relations. To remedy the situation, the ministry opened media relations courses where local and international lecturers gave lectures. Journalism courses were also opened for the staff of the Ministry of Information. U Ko Ko Hlaing, Saya Maung Wuntha, U Ye Naing Moe, U Ko Ko (Sethmu Tekkatho), U Hein Latt, U Tint Swe, U Ye Myint Pe and U Myat Khaling gave lectures at a course from 14-3-2011 to 25-3-2011. U Ye Naing Moe gave five Media and Public Relations Courses in May and October 2011. Mr Graham Wattas and Ms Sardra gave lectures at Public Relations Training for Government Officials from 19-11-2012

to 23-11-2012 with the support of UNESCO. U Ye Naing Moe again gave Public Relations Training for Government Officials from 26-12-2012 to 28-12-2012 with the support of UNESCO. Members of Governing Body of Public Service Media also gave trainings to journalists of the Ministry of Information. From 22-5-2013 to 23-5-2013, Ms Barbarar Swann, Mr Blair Levin, Mr David D Oxensord and Mr Jim Me Queeny gave the Development of Communication Strategy training with the support of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the United States. Ms K Bhavani provided Crisis Media Management course with the support of the Singaporean government from 16-7-2013 to 17-7-2013. Ms Margenite Sullivan provided applied journalism courses twice with the support of USAID from 14-8-2013 to 23-8-2013. U Thi Han Myo Nyunt, Professor Dr N Ganesan of the Hiroshima Peace Institute, Daw Saint Yi Htet and Dr Tin Maung Than provided Civil Service Trainings thrice. Dr Daw Thida Tin provided public relations course from 10-10-2013 to 11-10-2013. With the support of the Ministry of Information, Director-General U Ye Tint of Information and Public Relations Department and U Ye Naing Moe provided public relations course from 12-11-2013 to 14-11-2013. With the support of Konrad Adenauer Stiftung of Germany, Professor Dr Ganesan of the Hiroshima Peace Institute and Daw Saint Yi Htet provided civil service trainings twice. These trainings were aimed at ensuring accountable and responsible media environment.

The pen could bring about both the good and the bad. So, any organization or the government alone could not create the accountable and responsible media environment which would contribute to the country and the society. Cooperation of every stakeholder is required for this and to ensure the peaceful democracy.

## Eleanor Roosevelt is top US first lady, survey says

WASHINGTON, 16 Feb — Eleanor Roosevelt was named the greatest first lady of the United States in a survey of historians released on Saturday, while Michelle Obama, in fifth place, edged out Hillary Clinton in sixth.

Roosevelt, whose husband, Franklin, served as president from 1933 to 1945, has come up No 1 each of the five times the survey has been conducted by Siena College Research Institute since 1982. In the top finishers after Roosevelt were Abigail Adams, Jacqueline Kennedy and Dolly

Madison. Least impressive, according to the survey, was Jane Pierce, the wife of 14th US president, Franklin Pierce. Although historians disagree over exactly when the title of first lady came into common usage, it has traditionally been given to a president's wife and is an unofficial, but potentially powerful, role. Pollsters asked 242 historians and political scientists to rate 38 presidents' wives in 10 categories such as "courage," "integrity," "value to the country" and "accomplishments."

## Tanzania police seize 58 tuskers, arrest three in connection

DAR ES SALAAM, 16 Feb — Police in Tanzania's southern region of Mtwara said on Saturday that they have seized 58 pieces of ivory valued at 440,000 US dollars and arrested three people in connection with the haul.

The seizure of the ivory comes hardly three days after President Jakaya Kikwete appealed to the international community to assist his East African country in stopping ivory and rhino horn trade in the world in order to protect the wild animals from extinction.

"If the ban is effected, elephants and rhinos will be safe. There will be no demand for ivory and horns and thus no enticement to kill an elephant or rhino," Kikwete said when speaking to delegates at the London Conference on the Illegal Wildlife Trade last Thursday.

He cited a ban on ivory

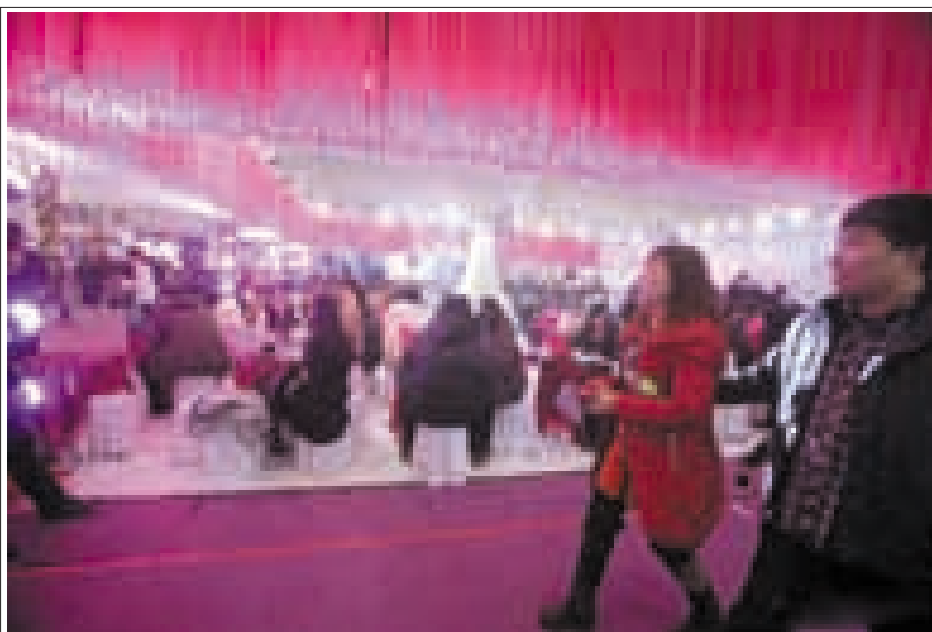
trade in 1989 by the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES), which played a crucial role in stopping the trade.

Acting Mtwara regional police commander Maisa Maganga told a news conference on Saturday that the 58 pieces of ivory were being ferried from Nanyumbu District in Mtwara region to the country's commercial capital Dar es Salaam.

He said the ivory was intercepted on Friday after members of the public had tipped off police on the contraband.

"Our final count has revealed that 29 elephants were killed by the poachers to get the 58 pieces of ivory," said Maganga, adding that the suspects cut-off the floor of a Landcruiser and made an artificial fuel tank to stock the ivory.

## Gaza leader says not to accept peace deal between PNA, Israel

GAZA, 16 Feb — The Hamas chief in the Gaza Strip said on Saturday that his movement will not accept any framework peace agreement between Israel the Palestinian National Authority (PNA) based in

the West Bank.

"Such a deal is meant to perpetuate (Israel's) occupation of Palestine," Ismail Haniya said at the opening ceremony of a charity organization in Gaza that cares for freed female pris-

oners from Israeli prisons. Haniya stressed that Islamic Hamas movement, which rules Gaza since mid-2007, will never agree to give up the Palestinian lands and the Palestinians' right of return.

## Pakistani PM terms Taliban attacks setback for peace talks

ISLAMABAD, 16 Feb — Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif on Saturday described Pakistani Taliban's recent attacks as a serious setback for the ongoing peace talks between the militant group and the government.

Sharif made comments two days after a deadly bomb attack on a police bus in the southern port city of Karachi killed 13 police officers and injured dozens of others. Taliban quickly claimed responsibility for the attack that created doubt about the success of the peace talks.

The Taliban spokesman, Shahidullah Shahid, said the attack revenged

Taliban members killed in Karachi and other cities in recent days by the police and paramilitary troops.

The Taliban claimed responsibility for attacks in Karachi and Peshawar which prompted strong condemnation across Pakistan.

"These attacks were sad and should have not occurred as we view such acts as a serious setback for the peace process," Sharif told Geo TV on board his special plane while returning from visit to Turkey.

"The Taliban has sent an encouraging message to us through their intermediaries and we are happy that the process has started," he said.

He said the government had also held the Taliban accountable for killing innocent people in public places.

"I am seriously concerned at the terror attacks during the ongoing peace dialogue," he said. "It is my desire that no more innocent people lose their lives in terrorism."

He said his government has started the dialogue with sincerity and formed a negotiating committee to take the process forward.

He also hailed formation of a team of mediators by the Taliban but stressed that the bloodshed should be stopped.

## Plane forced to turn around after hitting birds in China

HEFEI, 16 Feb — An airplane was forced to return to the airport in eastern Chinese city of Hefei after hitting birds en route to Beijing on Saturday, but no casualties have been reported. The China Eastern Airlines plane, MU5169, was struck by birds on its right engine, about 10 minutes after take-off at 7:58 am, a spokesman with the Hefei Xinqiao International Airport said.

The bird strike led to a

mechanical fault in the engine, forcing the plane to turn around. The flight was canceled later and passengers were transferred to another plane. It is the second such accident in two days at the Xinqiao Airport.

On Friday afternoon, an Air China plane also returned to the airport due to a bird strike about nine minutes after takeoff. No casualties have been reported.

## US pledges 1 bln USD in loan guarantees for Jordan

RANCHO MIRAGE, 16 Feb — US President Barack Obama announced Friday that his country will provide 1 billion US dollars in loan guarantees for Jordan to help the key Arab ally deal with the Syrian refugee crisis.

He made the pledge before a meeting with Jordanian King Abdullah II at Annenberg Estate, located in Rancho Mirage, California.

The promise, which follows a 1.25-billion-dollar loan guarantee announced last year, will make it easier for Jordan to enter the capital markets and borrow money.

Jordan's economy is under pressure because of hosting nearly 600,000 refugees from Syria. It will cost the Jordanian government 900 million dollars in 2014, according to the US Agency for International Development.

"The people of Jordan have been very generous in absorbing hundreds of thousands of displaced persons from that war-ravaged country," Obama said.

"It puts a great strain on the resources of Jordan and it's very important for us to make sure that we're supportive of the Kingdom in accommodating all these refugees," he added.

Acknowledging that the Syrian crisis would not be resolved in the short term, Obama said he is considering new ways to pressure the government of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad.—Xinhua

## Search continues for seven Japanese scuba divers missing off Bali

DENPASAR, (Indonesia), 16 Feb — Rescuers on Sunday continued to search for seven Japanese women who have been missing since Friday while scuba diving in waters off the Indonesian resort island of Bali.

Authorities said rescuers, operating from boats and aircraft, have so far not found any clues regarding the fate of the seven women, two diving instructors and five tourists from Japan.

Family members of some of the missing Japanese are scheduled to arrive in Bali on Monday.

The two diving instructors, Shoko Takahashi, 35, and Saori Furukawa, 37, work for Bali scuba diving operator Yellow Scuba, local sources said.

One of the five missing Japanese tourists is aged 59 and the others are in their late 20s. The seven women went missing while diving near Nusa Lembongan off

the southeastern coast of Bali, according to the Japanese Consulate General in Denpasar.

Japanese government officials said the seven were seasoned scuba divers, all having taken part in at least 50 scuba diving tours.

Nusa Lembongan, a favorite spot for seasoned scuba divers, is known for fast currents and transparent waters where coral reefs and tropical fish abound.

## Existing home sales in Tokyo area hit record highs in 2013

TOKYO, 16 Feb — Sales of existing homes, both condominiums and single-family houses, rose to record highs in 2013 in Tokyo and three surrounding prefectures on the back of the improving national economy, a real estate information firm said on Saturday.

The number of used condominiums sold in Tokyo and Chiba, Kanagawa and Saitama prefectures jumped 16.0 percent from the year before to 36,432, the most since the Real Estate Information Network for East Japan began collecting data in 1990.

Sales of existing single-family homes in that area increased 6.9 percent to 12,245, also a record.

"Consumer resistance to used houses is becoming less" as remodeling has grown popular in Japan, an official of the company

said, adding the uptrend is expected to continue this year despite the consumption tax hike in April, thanks to housing loan tax breaks.

The growth in existing home sales is also attributable to the rising cost of new condominiums.

Data at the Real Estate Economic Institute show the average price of new condominiums in the Tokyo area rose 18.2 percent in December from a year earlier, due largely to rising wages for construction workers and higher costs for building materials.

"The used housing market is a good option for those who cannot buy a new house amid circumstances where incomes have yet to increase," said Toshiaki Nakayama, a senior researcher of real estate research firm Tokyo Kantei Co.—Kyodo News

## Nepal to elect constitution drafting body Chairman on Tuesday

KATHMANDU, 16 Feb — Nepal's Constituent Assembly (CA), the body elected late last year with a main purpose of drafting a new constitution, is all set to elect its Chairman on Tuesday.

The meeting of CA on Sunday, which was chaired by senior lawmaker Surya Bahadur Thapa, announced the date for the election of CA chairman, which is regarded as a powerful post in the constitution drafting process.

Thapa is chairing the CA till its first meeting on

Jan. 22.

Nepal's CA is failing to make any progress in the constitution drafting process.

With the election of Chairman, CA is likely to expedite the constitution drafting body.

It has been one month since the first meeting of CA but there has not been any progress on constitution drafting process. Parties have made a public commitment to promulgate a new constitution within a year, but they are yet to start the constitution draft-

ing process.

The Nepali Congress has agreed to support the CPN-UML candidate in the House as a part of a power sharing between the country's two largest parties.

And the UCPN (Maoist) is demanding the post of CA chairman. "First and second largest parties have formed the government, we are outside the government so we should get CA chairman," Maoist Spokesperson Dina Nath Sharma told media persons after CA meeting.

## Small Nepal Airlines plane with 18 aboard missing in western Nepal

KATHMANDU, 16 Feb — A small Nepal Airlines aircraft with 18 people aboard lost radio contact Sunday and may have crashed in western Nepal, an airline official said.

The Twin Otter, with a three-person crew, was carrying 14 Nepali passengers and a Danish passenger, said Mahesh Kumar Moktan, a Nepal Airlines official. The plane was heading from Pokhara resort town in

western Nepal to Jumla district and is believed to have crashed in Arghakhanchi district.

A helicopter sent from Pokhara could not reach the site due to bad weather.

The plane left Pokhara after a refueling stop at 12:45 p.m., according to Dipak B.K., an air traffic controller at Pokhara airport, located about 150 kilometers west of Kathmandu.

The pilot contacted Bhairahawa airport at around 1:15 p.m. asking for weather conditions around the airport and contact was lost with the plane soon afterward, he said. The controller said weather conditions in the region were good at the time the plane took off from Pokhara.

Bhairahawa is about 200 kilometers southwest of Kathmandu.

Last week, Thailand ambassador to Iran Adisorndej Sukhasvasti expressed hope for an increase in the trade cooperation between Bangkok and Teheran. There are a lot of opportunities for expanding economic cooperation between Thailand and the Islamic republic, said Sukhasvasti, adding that he and the Iranian Ambassador to the Southeast Asian country, Hossein Kamalian, "are now planning different projects in this regard."

The Thai ambassador said Iranian President Hassan Rouhani has been trying to establish friendly ties with all countries since the beginning of his term in office, adding that "Undoubtedly, relations between Iran and other countries, including Thailand, will improve."

## US, China agree to work on climate change

BEIJING, 16 Feb — China and the United States, the world's top emitters of greenhouse gases, pledged on Saturday to work together to

attenuate the effects of global climate change.

"China and the United States will work together... to collaborate through enhanced policy dialogue,

including the sharing of information regarding their respective post-2020 plans to limit greenhouse gas emissions," according to a US-China joint statement issued at the end of US Secretary of State John Kerry's whirlwind Beijing visit.

The two sides "commit to devote significant effort and resources to secure concrete results" by the Sixth US-China Strategic and Economic Dialogue later this year, the statement added.

"Both sides reaffirm their commitment to contribute significantly to successful 2015 global efforts to meet this challenge," the statement said.

International talks to try to agree on a successor to the 1997 Kyoto Proto-

col, the first and only international agreement to tackle climate change, are due to be held in Paris next year. The United States never ratified the Kyoto deal.

A new global pact might include pledges on curbing greenhouse gas emissions and measures to enable the poorest nations to adapt better to climate change. Kerry welcomed Chinese cooperation.

"This is a unique, co-operative effort between China and the United States and we have hopes that it will help to set an example for global leadership and global seriousness on the issue of next year's climate negotiation," Kerry told reporters before departing for Jakarta.

## French minister says CAR operation to last longer than expected

PARIS, 16 Feb — France's military operation in the Central African Republic will last longer than initially planned because the situation in the country is worse than anticipated, French Defence Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian said on Saturday.

"I think it will be longer than expected because the level of hatred and violence

is more important than we had imagined," Le Drian told France Inter radio. "A military operation is not decreed as clockwork, we have to adapt." France said on Friday it would send another 400 troops to help combat the crisis in the African country as UN chief Ban Ki-moon pleaded for more swift, robust international help to

stop sectarian violence that could turn into a genocide.

Almost a million people, or a quarter of the population of the former French colony, have been displaced by fighting which erupted after the mostly Muslim Seleka rebel group seized power in March last year in the majority Christian country.

## Syria's death toll now exceeds 140,000

BEIRUT, 16 Feb — More than 140,000 people, over 7,000 of them children, have been killed in Syria's uprising-turned-civil war, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said on Saturday.

The pro-opposition Observatory said the period since the "Geneva 2" peace talks for Syria began last month had been the bloodiest of the nearly three-year conflict.

The death toll is now at 140,041, according to the Observatory, which is based in Britain but has a network of activists across the country. Among the dead were 7,626 children and 5,064 women.

The revolt against President Bashar al-Assad began as peaceful street protests but transformed into an armed insurgency after a fierce security force crackdown. It has since descended into a civil war with sectarian dimensions.

The Observatory's toll could not be independently verified by Reuters. The United Nations said last month it would stop updating its death count in Syria as dangerous conditions on the ground made estimates impossible to update with accuracy. The Observatory said all those cases included in its count were those it could document with either

names and identification documents, or pictures and videos. It said the fate of tens of thousands more people remained unknown.

The Observatory said it counted more than 30,000 rebels killed and over 50,000 from pro-Assad forces. But the group's chief, Rami Abdelrahman, said the true toll on both sides was likely much higher—by perhaps more than 60,000.

Groups on both sides try to hide their casualties, he said, making fighter death tolls very difficult to gauge.

"The Observatory would like to point out that these statistics do not include the fate of more than 180,000 people missing inside the regime's prisons," it said in a statement.

"Nor does it include more than 7,000 detained by regime forces and armed groups loyal to it, or the hundreds of people kidnapped (by rebel groups) because they are believed to be regime loyalists."

The Observatory called for an immediate ceasefire for the Geneva peace talks, now planned to go into a third round. "It is shameful that the international community has done nothing to show that it will defend human rights," Abdelrahman told Reuters by telephone.

## 'Juno' actress Ellen Page comes out as gay

LAS VEGAS, 16 Feb — Actress Ellen Page, who was nominated for an Oscar for her role in "Juno," came out as a lesbian on Friday at a Las Vegas conference for gay teens. "I am tired of hiding and I am tired of lying by omission," the 26-year-old actress said in a speech that drew roaring support from an audience at the Time to Thrive conference sponsored by the Human Rights Campaign.

"I'm here today because I am gay. And because ... maybe I can make a difference," she said. "To help others have an easier and more hopeful time. Regardless, for me, I feel a personal obligation and a social responsibility." Page, who in 2007 played a pregnant teen in "Juno," has also starred in "Inception,"

"To Rome with Love" and "X-Men: The Last Stand."

Page is also working on "Freeheld," a drama about a terminally ill police detective fighting to assign her retirement benefits to a lesbian lover. Page said in her speech that she suffered for years because she was scared to be public about her sexuality. "My spirit suffered, my mental health suffered and my relationships suffered," she said. "And I'm standing here today, with all of you, on the other side of all that pain."

The Human Rights Campaign, a lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender advocacy group that posted her speech on its website, congratulated Page for completing the "deeply personal and arduous journey" of coming out.—Reuters

## American Hustle grosses \$200 mn worldwide

LOS ANGELES, 16 Feb — David O Russell's American Hustle has earned \$200 million at the box office worldwide. The film is the highest grossing film for producer Megan Ellison's Annapurna Pictures and has also set a domestic record for its writer-director Russell, reports hollywoodreporter.com.

It has grossed \$138.7 million in North America, setting a career high record for Russell at the domestic

box office, surpassing the \$132.1 million take for his Silver Linings Playbook. Internationally, the movie has earned \$64 million and it has yet to open in territories such as Germany, Russia and Korea.

American Hustle, which features Christian Bale, Amy Adams, Bradley Cooper, Jeremy Renner and Jennifer Lawrence, is nominated in 10 categories at the forthcoming 86th Academy Awards.—PTI

## Composer Penderecki is witness to history of native Poland

TEL AVIV, 16 Feb — Krzysztof Penderecki, one of the world's most celebrated living composers, says his music bears witness to the harrowing history of his native Poland in the 20th century. Now 80 but showing no signs of slowing down, Penderecki is performing with the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra this week in Israeli cities his Polish Requiem, a monumental composition with soloists and choir first performed 30 years ago.

"I am emotionally very much involved in this piece because it tells us the story of our history and the history of the last decades to which I was a witness," Penderecki told Reuters in an interview between rehearsals in Tel Aviv. "I have lived through very difficult times," said Penderecki, reflecting on the

Nazi occupation of Poland in World War Two, the Holocaust and postwar communist oppression. "When the Second World War started, I was only five but I still remember... Being a witness ... I wanted people to remember what happened in our country

and elsewhere," he said.

Among the events commemorated in Polish Requiem are the Jewish uprising against the Nazis in the Warsaw Ghetto in 1943 (Dies Irae) and the Soviet massacre of some 22,000 Poles in Katyn Forest in 1940 (Liberate me, Domine).

Penderecki embarked on the Requiem in 1980 with the brief, lyrical "Lacrimosa" section commissioned for the unveiling of a monument at the Gdansk shipyard to the Solidarity trade union, which helped topple Poland's communist regime nine years later.

"It was an idea from (then-Solidarity leader and future Polish president) Lech Walesa," Penderecki said. "A year later, my friend Cardinal (Stefan) Wyszyński, who was a very important political figure in our postwar history, passed away, so I wrote the Agnus Dei."

"And then I started to write the requiem, but it took me 25 years. The last movement for strings was only written to commemorate the death of Pope John Paul II (in 2005)," he said.

"I'm not brilliant with babies," Cowell told US magazine Parade last October. "I never know what to do. But (once he's older) I think I'll be a good dad in terms of advice."

## Stoch edges Kasai to gold, former S Korea hero An wins title for Russia

SOCHI, (Russia), 16 Feb — Polish ski jumper Kamil Stoch leapt to gold in the men's large hill on Saturday, edging Japanese veteran Noriaki Kasai by the slimmest of margins, while five-time world champion skater Victor An gave Russia its first ever short track gold in the men's 1,000 metres and China's Zhou Yang retained her title in the women's 1,500. In high drama at the RusSki Gorki Jumping Centre, 41-year-old Kasai leapt into first place with his final jump, notching up 277.4 points, but normal hill winner Stoch made it double gold with his last leap, falling short of Kasai's length but totaling 278.7. Peter Prevc

of Slovenia, who won silver in the normal hill a week ago, took the bronze with 274.8. Kasai, taking part in a record seventh Olympics, was part of the Japanese team that won silver at the 1994 Lillehammer Games but this was his first individual Olympic medal.

At the Iceberg Skating Palace, An finished in 1 minute, 25.325 seconds, with compatriot Vladimir Grigorev taking silver just 0.074 behind, to become the first athlete to win Olympic gold medals for two countries having changed citizenship. Seoul-born An, who bagged the bronze in the 1,000 meters last Monday, reclaimed the title he won for South Korea in Turin eight years

ago. An, now a four-time Olympic gold winner, missed out on the 2010 Vancouver Games due to a mixture of injury and disaffection with his native country's skating authorities, and became a Russian citizen in 2011. European champion Sjinkie Knegt, who was disqualified for a finger gesture aimed at An in the European championships in Dresden last month, took bronze for the Netherlands.

Zhou defended her 1,500-metre short track title in a time of 2:19.140, out-sprinting 17-year-old Shim Suk Kee of South Korea in the final lap to edge her into silver spot, as Italian veteran Arianna Fontana, silver medalist in the 500

meters, collected bronze. At the Adler Arena Skating Centre, Zbigniew Brodka scored a sensational win for Poland in the men's 1,500 metres.

The Pole, who finished 27th four years ago in Vancouver, beat Dutchman Koen Verweij to the gold by three-thousandths of a second in a time of 1:45.006, made official after computer calculations. Canada's Denny Morrison took the bronze in 1:45.22 to add to his silver in the men's 1,000 metres on Wednesday.

There was a remarkable victory too for Sweden in cross country skiing as the women's relay team came from behind to take the 4x5-kilometre title in

53:02.7, beating out Finland by just 0.5 second and Germany a further 0.4. The Swedes began the last leg in third place more than 25 seconds behind the Finnish leaders, but Charlotte Kalla, double silver winner

at Sochi in the women's 10-km classic and skiathlon, put in a tremendous burst to catch Krista Lahtenmaki and Germany's Denise Herrmann with 300 metres left and snatch gold in the final sprint.—Kyodo News

## Allred's Cinderella story not yet over at Riviera

PACIFIC PALISADES, (California), 16 Feb — Whatever happens in Sunday's final round of the Northern Trust Open, American Jason Allred will be able to celebrate a fairytale week of the unexpected at Riviera Country Club. A graduate of the nearby Pepperdine University, Allred is playing his first PGA Tour event since the 2010 US Open, where he tied for 47<sup>th</sup>, after earning one of four spots in the Riviera field via Monday qualifying.

Allred had decided to try to qualify for this week because he and his wife are expecting their third child at the end of the month and so far, so good. The

33-year-old has amazingly strung together scores of two-over-par 73, 64 and 67 to surge into a tie for fourth place at nine-under after 54 holes, just three strokes behind leader William McGirt. "This is somewhat of a new situation for me but I sure am having fun," Allred told reporters after posting a nine-under total of 204 on Saturday.

It feels so good to be out there and have a blast. "I told my wife a couple weeks ago, if I can look back on the week and say I really enjoyed it and stayed present in the moment, whatever happens I'll be proud of myself for that.

back in this Pepperdine area. Coach is one of my best friends in the world and he had a lot of the team out here today so just a really special treat to be here." Allred, who worked as a whitewater rafting guide after college, was a member of the PGA Tour in 2005 and 2008 but has otherwise played most of his professional golf on the satellite circuits. His most significant achievements include winning the 1997

US junior title and competing in the British Open (2005) and the US Open (2006 and 2010). This week's experience at Riviera can certainly be added to that list. "Gosh, yesterday I happened to hit a great shot at 14 and I made a great putt there (from 25 feet) today," Allred said of the reaction he has earned from the supportive fans at Riviera over the past three days.

## Fireman Brodka douses Dutch hot streak

SOCHI, (Russia), 16 Feb — Poland's Zbigniew Brodka denied the Dutch another Olympic speed skating gold medal by winning the men's 1,500 meters by just three thousandths of a second on Saturday, while a change of suit failed to reverse America's slide on the Adler Arena ice. Part-time fireman Brodka clocked one minute, 45 seconds in the 17th of 20

heats but then was left with his heart in his mouth as Dutch skater Koen Verweij crossed the finish line in the same time in the final pairing.

All eyes were fixed on the giant scoreboard at the Adler Arena as organizers tried to split them before determining the Pole had been victorious by the tiny margin. "Its unbelievable," Brodka told reporters "First

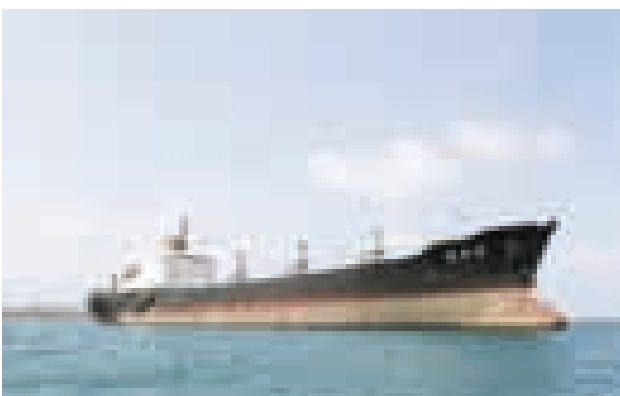
of all I wasn't sure, but in the back of my mind I believed I had won. When I saw I had won it was an unbelievable feeling." Brodka, 29, grabbed the Polish flag and took off on a lap of honor as he celebrated his country's first Olympic gold medal in speed skating despite not having a covered oval to train on at home.

He said he had commiserated with Verweij on the podium during the flower ceremony but added "that is sport". Verweij's medal was the 13th for the Dutch in speed skating in Sochi, tying East Germany's record for most medals in the sport at a Winter Olympics. That stat was of little consolation to the long haired 23-year-old, who was despondent at missing out on his country's fifth gold of the Sochi Games.

"When I crossed the finish line, I saw I had the same time. You hope it falls on your side but it didn't. You can't describe it," Verweij told reporters. "Still silver, I don't know, it doesn't feel that good. I really wanted gold. The silver medal is for the first loser." Denny Morrison of Canada took bronze to go with the silver medal he won in the 1,000 meters on Wednesday. Morrison's double is two more medals than the United States have managed after seven speed skating events in Sochi.

## Panama says freed North Korean ship set sail for Cuba

PANAMA CITY, 16 Feb — A North Korean ship detained near the Panama Canal for smuggling Cuban weapons set sail back for the Caribbean island on Saturday with most of its crew on board after it paid a fine, the government said.

The Chong Chon Gang ship was seized in July for smuggling Soviet-era arms, including two MiG-21 jet fighters, under thousands of tons of sugar.

Thirty-two sailors in good health were on the ship when it left the country's Colon port Saturday morning, Panama's foreign

ministry said in an emailed statement. The captain and two other officers remain jailed on weapons trafficking charges.

The ship was released after paying two-thirds of a \$1 million fine imposed after two MiG-21 aircraft, 15 MiG engines and nine anti-aircraft missiles were found hidden beneath its declared cargo of sugar.

After the discovery, Cuba acknowledged it was sending "obsolete" Soviet-era weapons to be repaired in North Korea and returned to Cuba.

## Turkish PM tightens grip on judiciary in parliament vote

ANKARA, 16 Feb — Turkey's parliament approved a law boosting government control over the appointment of judges and prosecutors on Saturday, after a heated debate and a brawl that left one opposition lawmaker hospitalized.

Dozens of MPs broke into fights during the tense 20-hour debate and insults flew across party lines. When an opposition deputy called Prime Minister Tayyip Erdogan a dictator, deputies from the leader's party shouted back "are you drunk?"

The battle for control of the Higher Council of Judges and Prosecutors (HSYK), which appoints

senior members of the judiciary, lies at the heart of a feud between Erdogan and influential US-based cleric Fethullah Gulen.

Gulen, whose followers say they number in the millions, is believed to have built up influence in the police and judiciary over decades and leads a powerful worldwide Islamic movement from a forested compound in the United States.

Erdogan, head of the ruling AK Party, blames him for unleashing a corruption investigation he sees as an attempted "judicial coup" designed to undermine him in the run-up to local and presidential elections this year.

prominent business people, the sons of three cabinet ministers, and state officials were questioned.

death, the cause of fire at Ducheertan (west) village and whether it is an arson attack, false reporting about the village fire and who are behind it, deaths and injuries and loss of property in the incidents and present suggested measures in order to avoid the recurrence of such incident.

A team of forensic and legal experts will accompany the commission during the investigation tour in order to help the commission's probe into incidents, it is learnt.

## Follow-up news to arson attack on Pynmana custody

PYINMANA, 16 Feb—Pynmana custody facility fire caused panic among nearby residents and locals in urban wards on 15 February morning.

It was, police said, due to an arson attack of Maung Maung Naing, one of detainees at the facility, who is currently on trial for a murder case. The fire swept through his detention room and spread three others.

"We called authorities concerned shortly

after spotting the fire. As detainees failed to follow our verbal warnings, we had to fire about 18 warning shots into the air with blank bullets to control the situation," said one of the police officers.

"We took quick action in order to return to normal with the use of police force. Now, calms returned to the facility. Further action will be taken against those who got involved in the disorder," said Police

Major Than Myint, head of Pynmana Township Police Force, while giving an interview to media persons.

According to witnesses, arson attacks by detainees turned into a riot as they damaged the walls. Some firefighters suffered injuries as detainees threw bricks at them.

A total of 282 suspects—236 men and 46 women—are held at the custody facility, it is learnt.

## Organic fertilizer introduced to farmers at organic farm in Ottarathiri Tsp

It is learnt that fruits and vegetables show is being held in commemoration of Peasants' Day at the organic farm near Koeywa Thabyaygon Village in Ottarathiri Township on 9 February. Out of 900 acres of farmland, saplings are being nurtured at 40-acre and water for saplings are taken from Setsetyo and Chaungmagyi Dams. The purpose of the show is to understand benefits of organic pesticide and organic fertilizer by the farmers.

Use of pesticides and fertilizers for fruits and vegetables can be harmful to not only consumers but also to growers. The show aims at raising awareness among farmers about chemical fertilizer. If the farmers change chemical fertilizers to organic fertilizer, chemical fertilizers are not required for the saplings, said Staff Officer

Daw Aye Aye Nwe of Agriculture Department under the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation. Number of plantations such as cabbage, pumpkin, lady's finger, chilly, tomato, cucumber, banana, papaya and pineapple are grown at the organic farm. Surplus saplings of crops will be given to the farmer free of charge, she continued.

Cultivation of cucumber contributes much to the farmers as the fruits are

ready to be plucked after 35 day-old and its duration is only 80-85 days. Moreover, musk melon is marketable fruit and very popular in the neighbouring countries. Fruits and vegetables grown with the use of organic fertilizer are more expensive than that of grown with chemical fertilizer in international horticulture and vegetable markets, she added.
