## Indian Coast Guard Ship “Vishwast” to dock in Yangon on goodwill visit

YANGON, 7 Feb — “Vishwast”, an Indian Coast Guard Ship commanded by Inspector General Sashi Kumar, will pay a goodwill visit to Myanmar on 10 February, according to a press release of the Indian Embassy in Yangon.

The ship's visit is aimed at enhancing interactions between India and Myanmar and strengthening the close and friendly relations between the two countries in the spirit of traditional friendship and cooperation, said the embassy in the press release.

The ship, manned by 12 officers and 90 crew, will dock at Myanmar In-

ternational Terminals Thilawa, a deep sea port located 25 km south of Yangon, from 10 to 13 February.

The press release said that during their four-day stay in Myanmar, the Commanding Officer and crew will meet with officials from the Myanmar Navy and Department of Marine Administration and also call on the Chief Minister of Yangon Region.

On the second day of their visit, the ship's crew will perform free medical treatment at Thanlyin People's Hospital.

ICGS Vishwast, which means “trustworthy” has a facility for operating Chetak and Dhurv helicopters and is fitted with sophisticated and state-of-the-art equipment and technology. The offshore patrol vessel can operate at sea for over two weeks without any replenishment, according to the press release.

NAY PYI TAW, 7 Feb— The signing of production sharing contracts for AD-9 and AD-11 offshore Rakhine coast and MD-5 offshore Taninthayi coast was held between Myanma Oil and Gas Enterprise under the Ministry of Energy and Shell Myanmar Energy Pte Ltd and Mitsui Oil Exploration Co., Ltd Group

at Hilton Hotel, here, on 5 February.

Managing Director U Myo Myint Oo of MOGE, Vice President Exploration Asia/Australia Mr Graeme Smith of Shell Myanmar Energy Pte Ltd and Director Mr Kosuke Onishi of Mitsui Oil Exploration Co., Ltd signed the contracts.

MOGE will get US\$61

million for signature bonus and US\$300,000 for data fee. The companies will spend at least US\$ 1.215 million during two years observation period and six years exploration period for three blocks.

The companies will conduct environment impact assessment and social impact assessment.

## Shinhan bank provides Cooperatives Ministry with mid-term loan for modernizing Myanmar agriculture

YANGON, 7 Feb— Shinhan Bank, a leading bank in South Korea, and the Ministry of Cooperatives have reached an agreement on provision of a medium-term commercial loan of \$ 85million for modernizing Myanmar's agriculture sector, according to the bank on Saturday.

The agreement to provide the ministry with the

loan for purchase of farm machinery from South Korean firm Daedong Industrial Co., Ltd was signed on 21 January, said the bank, adding the first loan is expected to be taken out in the second week of this month based on the import of the agriculture machinery.

An official of the bank expressed his view that Myanmar's agriculture sector will be able to restore its status as a top world rice ex-

porter with construction of more infrastructure and use of modern farm equipment in the sector.

Besides providing loans for farm machinery import, the bank also plans to launch a two-step loan fund for the sector in cooperation with local banks, he added.

The South Korea-based bank opened its representative office in Yangon in 2013. —GNLM

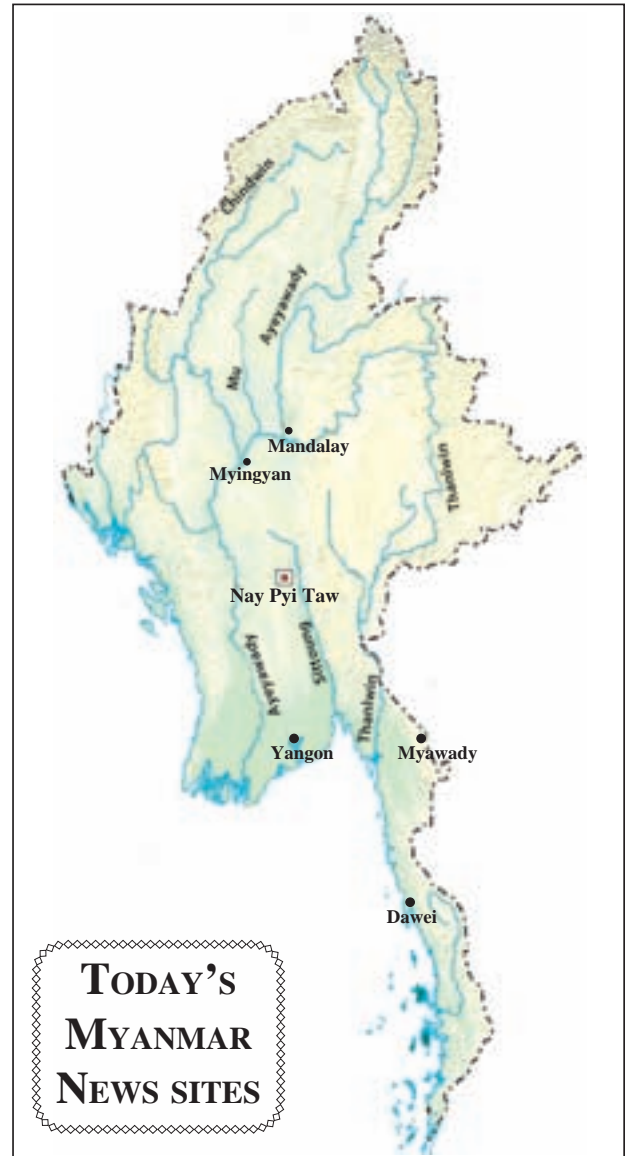

## Eight burnt to death in Bangladesh in two bombings

DHAKA, 7 Feb — Eight people, including two children, were burnt to death on Friday night in two separate petrol bomb incidents, with 31 people received burn injuries, amid continued country-wide non-stop blockade enforced by the opposition alliance, police said on Saturday.

One of the incidents took place at 11 pm on Friday night at northern Gaibandha, where a Dhaka-bound passenger bus carrying around 50 passengers was petrol bombed allegedly by the pickets of on-going blockade.

Five people, including two children, were burnt to death on the spot, fire service officials said. Seventeen of the injured victims

were rushed to Rangpur Medical College Hospital and the rest were admitted to Gaibandha hospital.

Another petrol bombing took place on a truck at Gaurnadi sub-district of southern Barisal District at midnight Friday, in which all the truck employees, including the driver, died on the spot.

Former Prime Minister Khaleda Zia's opposition alliance has announced the non-stop blockade across the country from early January, demanding fresh elections under a non-party caretaker government system. The indefinite blockade and series of work stoppage, which has entered the 33<sup>rd</sup> day, has left 63 people dead.—Xinhua

## Top DPRK leader oversees test firing of newly developed rocket

PYONGYANG, 7 Feb — Top leader of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) Kim Jong Un recently watched the test firing of a "newly developed anti-ship rocket," the official KCNA news agency reported on Saturday.

The test firing of the "ultra-precision anti-ship rocket," which was designed to precisely hit enemy warships, proved that "the powers of the rocket boat and the anti-ship rocket's hit rate reached the level of designed tactical and engineering data," the KCNA said.

This new-type rocket, after being deployed at naval units of the Korean People's Army, will "bring a great change" in defence of

bat, it said.

Kim showed satisfaction with the test firing and required more tactical

guided weapons of high precision and intelligence be produced based on test firing experience.—Xinhua

## Thai Prime Minister Prayut says election possible by year's end

BANGKOK, 7 Feb — Thai Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha said on Friday that a general election for a new government is possible by the end of this year, while expressing a view that it is necessary to maintain martial law for the time being.

Speaking to a group of reporters from Japanese media ahead of the prime minister's first visit to Japan, which begins Sunday, Prayut explained that a draft constitution has to be approved in April and submitted to the king for endorsement in September. Another two months

will then be needed to prepare for a general election, he said. Provided that this plan goes smoothly without conflict among concerned parties, the prime minister said, "It is possible that the election will be held at the end of the year."

Prayut seized power in a military coup in May 2014. In June, he said that a general election would be held in the second half of 2015 but told a group of reporters on Wednesday that it could be delayed to early 2016. He assumed the post of prime minister in a provisional Cabinet installed in August. The Thai leader pointed out

the importance of keeping martial law in place to ensure peace and order in the country, a measure issued after political turmoil intensified amid anti-government protest. Japanese businesses operating in Thailand are paying close attention to when martial law would be lifted as it impacts their business activities.

"Give me some time to take care of my people and my country," Prayut said of maintaining martial law.

During his three-day visit to Japan, Prayut plans to meet with Prime Minister Shinzo Abe.

The Thai prime min-

ister expressed hopes for securing Japanese cooperation in railway and other infrastructure development. He also showed interest in building a high-speed rail link in the future with Japan's shinkansen bullet train technology as a possible option. On Thailand's special economic zones in six border provinces, Prayut said, "I want more automobile investment in special economic zones and industrial area expansion. However, infrastructure investment in those areas is still needed and Japan is more than welcome to invest."—Kyodo News

## Japanese woman injured in Cambodia armed robbery attempt

PHNOM PENH, 7 Feb — A Japanese woman suffered minor injuries on Friday afternoon in Cambodia's capital Phnom Penh after she resisted an armed attempt to rob her purse, a police officer said.

Two unidentified men riding on a motorbike near the Olympic Stadium in a central part of the city fired a shot that struck the right side of her hip, the Phnom Penh municipal police chief said.

The victim and her hus-

band, a Vietnamese national, had stepped off a city bus and were waiting to catch a tuk-tuk motorcycle taxi to their guest house, he said. The couple arrived in Cambodia on Friday, according to the police.

She was sent to a hospital and discharged soon after as her condition was not serious.

The police said they are investigating the case and looking for the perpetrators.

During the meeting, the Prime Minister's office said, the Sultan and President Widodo discussed issues related to the bilateral relations as well as exchanged views on regional and international matters of mutual concern.

The Sultan and President Widodo witnessed the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU)

between the government of Brunei and the government of Indonesia in the field of health.

The ceremony was followed by the second signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the Brunei Darussalam National Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the Indonesia Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Prime Minister's office said. Some 4,000 students lined up along the main road to the main entrance of Istana Nurul Iman (the Palace), waving flags of both countries to welcome the visit of the Indonesian president. —Xinhua

## US's Kerry meets Iran minister in Munich on nuclear talks

MUNICH, 7 Feb — US Secretary of State John Kerry met with Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif for more than an hour on Friday to discuss developments in nuclear negotiations between Teheran and major world powers, which have been at an impasse for months.

“Their meeting was focussed on the ongoing nuclear negotiations and they discussed the recent meetings of the P5+1 (six world powers),” a senior US State Department official said on condition of anonymity.

“Secretary Kerry also reiterated our desire to move towards a political framework by the end of March,” the official added. “They agreed to stay in close touch and that they would try to meet again soon.”

The meeting, which included senior European Union official Helga Schmid, took place on the sidelines of the annual Munich Security Conference. Kerry and Zarif have met repeatedly in recent months in an attempt to break the deadlock in the nuclear negotiations.

Zarif is also expected to meet France's and Russia's foreign ministers in Munich.

In response to the State

Department statement, a source in Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office warned there may soon be “a dangerous deal enabling Iran to produce nuclear weapons that would threaten the survival of Israel.”

“Prime Minister Netanyahu believes it is his obligation to speak out about this grave threat to the Jewish state while there is still time to stop a bad deal,” the source said on condition of anonymity.

Republicans invited Netanyahu to address US Congress in March, an invitation that President Barack Obama's Democrats have criticized.

Iran and the United States, Britain, France, Germany, Russia and China have set themselves a March deadline to reach a political agreement ahead of a final nuclear deal by 30 June.

The agreement would be on limiting Iran's nuclear programme in exchange for lifting sanctions.

Iran and the six have twice extended the negotiations after failing to meet previous deadlines for a deal.

Teheran rejects allegations by Western powers and their allies that it is developing the capability to produce atomic weapons. But it has refused to halt uranium enrichment and other sensitive atomic work, leading to US, European Union and UN sanctions that have hobbled the Iranian economy.

While progress has been made in narrowing differences on how many uranium enrichment centrifuges Iran will be allowed to operate under a long-term agreement, officials close to the talks say differences remain on lifting sanctions and the duration of any deal.

## UK concerned over ‘threatening’ Russian nuclear strategy

MUNICH, 7 Feb — Britain's defence minister voiced concern on Friday that Russia may have “lowered the threshold” for using nuclear weapons and said Britain must update its own deterrent in response to Russian modernization of its nuclear forces.

Russia's nuclear strategy in a hypothetical future war is coming under greater scrutiny among NATO members as tensions between the Western alliance and Moscow hit their highest level since the Cold War over the Ukraine conflict.

“There is three-fold concern, first that they (the Russians) may have lowered the threshold for use

party, the senior member of the two-party ruling coalition, favours a like-for-like replacement of the submarine fleet.

Fallon also voiced concern about stepped-up patrolling near Britain's coast by Russian bombers, ships and submarines.

“We've seen a sharp increase in Russian activity, not simply just at the edges of UK airspace, but affecting a number of other allies in NATO,” he said.

An incident last week when two heavily-armed Russian bombers flew into the English Channel was “something we've not seen for as long as anybody can remember”, Fallon said.

of nuclear. Secondly, they seem to be integrating nuclear with conventional forces in a rather threatening way and ... at a time of fiscal pressure they are keeping up their expenditure on modernizing their nuclear forces,” Defence Secretary Michael Fallon told *Reuters* in an interview.

“All of that is very worrying,” he said during the Munich Security Conference. “The main answer to that is to make sure that we modernize our own deterrent too.”

Russia's new military doctrine reserves the right to use nuclear weapons in response to a nuclear strike or a conventional attack that endangered the state's existence, but some in the military had been calling for a first strike option.

Fallon did not expand on how Russia could be lowering its nuclear threshold.

Britain is set to take a final decision next year, after this year's election, on whether to replace its ageing fleet of Vanguard class submarines, which carry Trident nuclear missiles.

Fallon's Conservative

The Russian flights were provocative, intimidating and “frankly they are dangerous because there are pilots who are not responding to air traffic control, not filing flight plans and not responding to our own pilots”, he said.

Fallon spoke out against supplying weapons to Ukraine, an option which is under consideration in Washington.

Asked if Britain would follow suit if Washington decided to send weapons, Fallon said: “No, we are not supplying lethal equipment to Ukraine. We think that would escalate the conflict. We have been supplying non-lethal equipment and training already and we continue to keep that under review.”

He said Britain backed a new effort by the leaders of Germany and France to try to halt the Ukraine conflict, but said the West also needed to keep up sanctions pressure on Moscow.

Territorial gains made by Ukrainian separatists since the Minsk agreement in September should “absolutely not” be recognized in any new ceasefire, he said.

## Echoes of the 1990s in Ukraine as financial crisis bites

KIEV, 7 Feb — A crippling financial crisis in Ukraine is turning the clock back to the 1990s, when people kept dollars in their socks rather than at banks and smuggled cars to sell them on the black market and avoid the tax man.

When the Soviet Union collapsed in 1991, leaving the command economy in tatters, many in the newly independent republics such as Ukraine were left to fend for themselves, using guile to seek out goods and services and navigate the new capitalist reality.

Some business leaders say those days are returning as Ukraine nears financial collapse, with the hryvnia currency plunging about 30 percent against the dollar on Thursday after the central bank ditched its unofficial peg.

As the economy deteriorates and fighting rages between government forces and Russia-backed separatists in east Ukraine, banks are no longer lending, and selling imported goods makes little economic sense, said Oleh Nazarenko, director of the Ukrainian Associ-

ation of Car Importers and Dealers.

“We are returning to the 1990s, when drivers hid their dollars in their socks and bought cars in Germany, then drove them to Ukraine and sold them with cash changing hands on the street - with the state not getting a penny in taxes,” he said.

He said car prices at showrooms were soaring as the hryvnia devalued, with vehicles worth \$20,000 at 160,000 hryvnias in February last year now on sale for 400,000 hryvnias or more.

Complicating matters,

the central bank's decision to scrap the daily foreign currency auctions that had in effect pegged the exchange rate has made it all but impossible to gauge the new rate.

Official automobile sales last month were 77 percent lower than January 2014 and sales for 2014 were 57 percent down on the previous year. Forty-four percent of people working in the automobile industry lost their jobs last year, when the hryvnia fell 50 percent against the dollar.

## Putin, Merkel, Hollande end talks on Ukraine crisis

Moscow, 7 Feb — A tripartite meeting on the Ukraine crisis, involving Russian President Vladimir Putin, French President Francois Hollande and German Chancellor Angela Merkel, ended here at midnight, a Kremlin spokesman said on Saturday.

The French and German leaders have left the Kremlin and were heading for the airport, spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters.

The three leaders ended the nearly five hours of talks without announcing the outcome of their talks.

Peskov said the meeting was “constructive and substantial” and that efforts would be continued to draw up a possible joint document on the implementation of the Minsk agreements reached in the Belarussian capital of Minsk in September.

“Joint work is being done to draft a document that would include the Ukrainian president's proposals and those put forward today by Russian President Vladimir Putin,” the spokesman said.

There will be a telephone conversation in the Normandy format on Sunday when preliminary results of Friday's meeting will be reviewed, said Peskov, referring to talks in France in June that involved Putin, Merkel, Hollande and Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko.

The French and German leaders' meeting with Putin came a day after their surprise visit to Kiev where they talked with Poroshenko to discuss ways to end the fighting in eastern Ukraine.

The Minsk agreements aimed at committing the Kiev government and the

pro-independence militants to an immediate ceasefire in eastern Ukraine failed to stop the violence which has killed over 5,300 people since April 2014. The fight-

ing intensified sharply over the past two weeks.

Last Saturday's Trilateral Contact Group talks in Minsk failed to produce an agreement.—Xinhua

downtown Yangon as a non-profit organization by U Ba Than and U Ye Tun with the aim of encouraging the arts, both painting and sculpture, of naturalism and modernism in the country.

"In those days, artists considered that exhibiting their works at Lokanat was being ordained as artists," said U Pe Nyunt Wai, a 60-year old art master and a

1992 as successive governments set strict censorship rules on creating modern and contemporary arts.

"The worst for the artists was that the socialist regime which started in 1962 put media, including paints and brushes, on the list of luxury items and collected high taxes on them so they could not be imported easily. Therefore paints, brushes, paper and canvas were not available in Myanmar,"

ings at an annual exhibition in Yangon. Sometimes, diplomats organized group exhibitions at their embassies and residences, and from four to five Myanmar artists exhibited their works in each group show.

As there was no income from their creation of works, nor getting media easily, Myanmar artists had to turn to commercial painting for their livelihood and struggled to make ends meet.

Diplomats from the French, US, German and British embassies gave the media, including paints, paper, canvas and so and books on the arts to their friends in the art world as gifts and showed documentary films of international modern arts to them.

On the other side, Myanmar artists, living in an isolated country, knew little about the movements of international artists, how they made their creations, or with which techniques.

"Modern paintings were also considered 'paintings created by crazy men' in those days," said U Tin Win.

"In fact, Lokanat gave birth to the vanguard of Myanmar's modern and contemporary arts movement," said U Pe Nyunt Wai.

He recounted the generation before them, saying the then young artists Paw Oo Thet, Baji Aung Soe, Khin Maung Yin, Maung Ngwe Tun, Win Pe, Ko Shwe Aung Thein started to develop the modern art styles and became successors to U Khin Maung (Bank) and U Aung Khin (Mandalay) who introduced modern arts to Myanmar after the country

gained independence from Britain in 1948 after they discovered modern works in books from France, the US and other European countries.

In 1988, the socialist era ended and the then government adopted new policies that helped Myanmar contemporary artists to be able to have relations with international arts societies and to study movements of international artists through the internet.

And owners of overseas galleries and artists

from foreign countries began to visit the country.

Still, the rapid change was not much benefit to early contemporary artists in Myanmar, the majority of whom had faced serious obstacles to make a living and a career.

The country has opened up, unexpectedly, but even now many artists are not ready to break out after being isolated from the international community for more than 30 years.

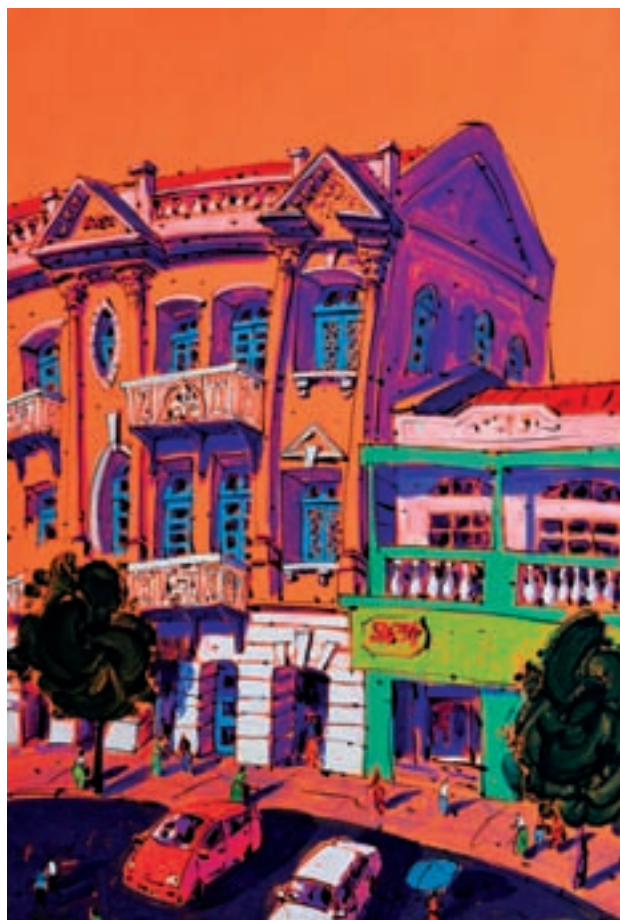
For many of those artists, the lack of knowledge

in their crafts due to a rarity of books on the arts, scarcity of media, worry about censorship, and not really understanding contemporary arts because they have no experience of visiting arts shows and galleries abroad has meant a clouded and difficult learning path that, for most, is only beginning to be travelled.

In fairness, Myanmar's contemporary arts should be considered to have started only in 1993, not in 1920. Myanmar's contemporary arts, even now, have not yet grown up and are still "at toddler age", U Tin Win said.

Today, the art works of the founding members of the Lokanat Galleries are rare works in Myanmar.

"Leave the vanguard to history. Today is the time for the new generation, the new blood of artists to make new creations with new techniques and with new thinking," U Pe Nyunt Wai said.

## Italy's support strengthens safeguarding of Myanmar heritage

In just a few years, Myanmar has seen the inscription of its first World Heritage site, increased public and political awareness about heritage protection, as well as citizens learning the skills necessary to make cultural safeguarding a long-term reality in their country.

These remarkable accomplishments in such a short period of time were made possible in large part by members of the international community who recognize the enormity of the tasks ahead in sustainably safeguarding Myanmar's heritage and are committed to working with UNESCO and national authorities to address them.

Italy has been a dedicated partner in these efforts since 2012 when the country began funding the "Capacity Building to Safeguard Cultural Heritage in Myanmar". This support

has allowed UNESCO to bring in international experts from specialist agencies, such as ICCROM and the Leric Foundation, to assist Myanmar in protecting important its heritage sites, particularly the ancient Pyu settlements and the Bagan archaeological landscape.

These international experts worked with professionals in the Ministry of Culture and related agencies to develop skills in mural painting and monument conservation; archaeological assessment; site management; usage of Geographic Information Systems (GIS); and community-awareness raising.

Those efforts paid off last year when Pyu Ancient Cities became the first site in Myanmar to be inscribed to the UNESCO World Heritage List.

That milestone provided a foundation upon

which Myanmar authorities can now build and a model that can be applied at other potential sites of outstanding universal value. Most recently, the government of Myanmar has made it a priority to nominate the Bagan Archaeological Area as its second cultural World Heritage site.

Preparing a nomination dossier for Bagan, as well as boosting skills in site management and conservation at Pyu Ancient Cities are the main areas of focus of the second phase of the project, which is currently underway.

Italian funding for the second phase of the project has enabled conservation laboratories to be set up in Sri Ksetra (one of the Pyu cities that inscribed on the World Heritage list) and Bagan; increased the effectiveness of international experts in their advisory roles; and expanded capac-

ity-building activities to respond to critical contemporary needs, such as disaster risk preparedness, hydrology mapping and emergency conservation.

The project's successes thus far have also helped bring about an overall atmosphere of improved political and institutional support for cultural heritage in Myanmar, which is critical to its progress towards international standards in cultural heritage conservation.

Many donor countries have answered UNESCO's call to cooperate in efforts to promote the safeguarding of Myanmar's cultural heritage. The Royal Norwegian Government, for example, has been funding projects to enhance the conservation of Myanmar's natural heritage properties as well as the safeguarding of its Intangible Cultural Heritage through UNE-



SCO capacity-building strategies. Switzerland and Japan, through their Funds-in-Trust with UNESCO, have also been contributing funding and expertise to

help Myanmar achieve the World Heritage List nomination as well as devising heritage management schemes.

## Dutch entrepreneurs to invest in Myanmar's fishery industry

YANGON, 7 Feb—The government is striving for enhancement of the nation's fishery sector. In the future, the government will cooperate with the Netherlands to promote the marine product industry.

A delegation of marine product entrepreneurs from the Netherlands visited Myanmar in January. They are interested in putting investment in Myanmar's fishery sector, and they will

submit a work proposal to the Ministry of Livestock, Fisheries and Rural Development, according to the Fisheries Department.

"Myanmar has much prospect for marine products. Myanmar entrepreneurs have many opportunities to do business in the fishery industry. However, they face some difficulties in export of products and seeking foreign markets. They cannot keep ahead of entrepreneurs from the international community in market opportunities. With regard to the work propos-

al, the entrepreneurs from the Netherlands will carry out the tasks from the stage of fishing to cold storage processing. And then, they will export," an official of the fisheries department said.

U Tin Shwe from a fishing industry said, "We welcome entrepreneurs from the international community, but I worry about their occupation of market share. In the country, we operate most fishery industries with the payment-for-job system. Generally, we lack a market network."



## Community-based immunization campaign to be conducted in Feb: Health Ministry

YANGON, 7 Feb—The second phase of the nationwide measles-rubella mass immunization campaign will be conducted from 19 to 28 February, aiming to meet the WHO's regional goal of measles elimination and rubella control by 2020, according to the Ministry of Health.

The community-based

vaccination programme is also aimed at preventing both infectious diseases in the target-age group of 9 months to 15 years, including all children who were left out, dropped out or missed vaccination at school, Dr Kyaw Kan Kaung of the ministry said.

The health ministry in partnership with both local and foreign agencies already conducted their first phase of school-based immunization in all public, private and religious schools from 19 to 26 January.

More than 8 million children among over 17 million in the target-audi-

ence received new combined measles-rubella vaccine during the school campaign, with Myanmar achieving 95 percent coverage in it. With the result that international observers recognize the ministry's effort to provide national MR vaccination services to the public, the source reported.

At the media briefing on Saturday, the health ministry issued updated information on the community-based campaign, urging parents to continue their involvement.

In Myanmar, it was later found in the higher-aged group of people who failed to get vaccinated, but the country has reached its goal of reducing the risk of a measles outbreak in South East Asia. The previous measles vaccination programme for under the age of 5 was held in 2012.

Measles is one of the major causes of child mortality. Rubella is usually mild in children, but for some people, especially pregnant women and their babies, rubella can be serious, the doctor said.

## Ukrainian army, rebels declare humanitarian truce in frontline town

KIEV, 7 Feb — The Ukrainian army and pro-independence insurgent rebels on Friday declared a temporary humanitarian truce in the frontline town of Debaltsevo in eastern Ukraine.

The ceasefire, beginning at 8:00 am local time (0600 GMT), will last nine hours to enable the evacuation of civilians from the combat area, said Vitaly Kiva, deputy head of the Interior Ministry department in Donetsk region.

Meanwhile, Eduard Basurin, a senior insurgent commander, said that within the framework of the humanitarian truce, about 1,000 people will be evacuated from Debaltsevo and several hundreds from the neighbouring Uglegorsk town. The evacuees are allowed to choose a destination for their evacuation, Basurin said, explaining that civilians can decide whether to flee to government-controlled or rebel-held areas.

Debaltsevo, a Ukrainian army stronghold in Donetsk region with a population of about 25,000, has been an epicenter of the recent fighting between the warring sides in eastern Ukraine. A green corridor for civilians was also estab-

lished in Lugansk region, local authorities said.

According to Lugansk governor Gennady Moskal, over the past few days, about 100 children have been evacuated from war-torn areas in Lugansk region to Severodonetsk, a

relatively calm town.

The conflict in eastern Ukraine, which has raged since April 2014, has claimed more than 5,300 lives and displaced over 1 million civilians, including nearly 700,000 people within Ukraine. — *Xinhua*

## Italy's Renzi emerges from tough period stronger than ever

ROME, 7 Feb — Italian Prime Minister Matteo Renzi lost the backing of two key supporters in less than a month, but experts say he has nonetheless emerged stronger and is more prepared than ever to aggressively pursue his reform agenda.

Last month, 89-year-old Giorgio Napolitano stepped down as Italian president, citing his advanced age. Napolitano had been a faithful supporter of most of Renzi's reform plan. This week, controversial ally Silvio Berlusconi, the former prime minister best known for his legal problems, announced he was abandoning the pact that allied him with Renzi's supporters after he was mostly left out of the consultation process to select Napolitano's successor.

At the same time, Renzi's economic reforms have failed to gain much traction, with predictions of economic growth downgraded twice in recent weeks, while the country's debt keeps piling up despite warnings from

European Union economists. Yet despite those developments, Renzi's deft navigation through the political waters around recent changes have left the 40-year-old leader once criticized for a lack of experience in a stronger position than ever.

"Renzi is from Florence and so was Niccolò Machiavelli," said Pietro Paganini, from the Competere think tank, referring to the Renaissance writer and philosopher known for brutality, ambition and the phrase "The end justifies the means." "Renzi played a tough political game and he won; he learned well from his fellow Florentine," Paganini continued. Former judge and government minister Sergio Mattarella was selected as Napolitano's replacement last weekend, and though it's too early to know how Mattarella will react regarding the reform agenda, experts say Renzi's strong position in parliament is likely to make that less important. — *Xinhua*

## US Benghazi panel plans to interview Susan Rice, other officials

WASHINGTON, 7 Feb — A House panel investigating the deadly 2012 attacks on US diplomatic facilities in Benghazi, Libya, plans to interview at least 20 officials including National Security Adviser Susan Rice, former Pentagon chief Leon Panetta and ex-CIA head David Petraeus, the committee said on Friday. The list of interviewees — a veritable "who's who" of US foreign policy and national security officials — emerged as Democrats complained about the "unlimited" budget of the Select Committee on Benghazi and its open-ended schedule, as it covers similar ground to earlier investigations.

Democrats say the committee's efforts are politically motivated and

aimed at undermining the possible presidential candidacy of Hillary Clinton. She was Secretary of State when the 11 September, 2012 Benghazi attacks killed US Ambassador Christopher Stevens and three other Americans. Republicans say Clinton's State Department failed to protect diplomatic personnel. Previous investigations have said that the compound where Stevens died was not well protected, but that the CIA and the US military responded properly.

A letter to Democrats dated Thursday from the panel's Republican chairman, Representative Trey Gowdy, detailed whom it plans to interview after 1 April. Targets include Rice, who rankled many Republicans soon after the attacks with comments that they were related to protests against a US-made video, rather than being premeditated. This was two months before President Barack Obama was to face voters seeking re-election; Rice was US ambassador to the United Nations at the time.

Others on Gowdy's list include Rice's current deputy, Ben Rhodes; White

House Chief of Staff Denis McDonough; General Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and former White House press secretary Jay Carney. White House spokesman Eric Schultz, travelling with Obama to Indiana on Friday, would not say whether administration officials would consent to Benghazi committee interviews, saying he had not seen the committee request. Gowdy wants Clinton to testify to the panel in public, but wants more documents first. By Gowdy's own description, the State Department has already handed over the equivalent of "40 copies of Dr. Zhivago." Democrats this week asked the House Administration Committee for a hearing on the Benghazi panel's spending, saying it could cost over \$3 million in 2015 — about \$8,000 (5,247 pounds) per day. The Administration Committee rejected the request as "remarkably odd," saying Democrats should have spoken out when the House reauthorized the panel in January. It was created last May and spent \$1.8 million last year.

## 61 bodies discovered at abandoned crematorium in southern Mexico

MEXICO CITY, 7 Feb — Police have uncovered bodies of 61 people, including children, at an abandoned crematorium in Mexico's Pacific coast resort of Acapulco in southern Guerrero state, officials said on Friday.

Police found "perfectly embalmed bodies" of men, women and children "ready for cremation" at a crematorium called Cremaciones Del Pacifico, the State Prosecutor's Office (FGE) said in a press release. "An anonymous tip" led police to the site late Thursday, the

FGE said. State Prosecutor Miguel Angel Godinez said authorities were trying to determine how to classify the crime, according to the daily *El Universal*. "We have a clear violation of sanitary laws ... possibly fraud, because the crematorium has been abandoned. However, we couldn't say for certain at the moment," he told the daily by phone. The official said authorities didn't know the whereabouts of the owner of the business. The FGE, meanwhile, said the president of the Guerrero State Association of Funeral

Homes was giving testimony. The agency was looking to consult "the files of all the people sent to the crematorium from 2013 to the present," the FGE said. The bodies, covered in lime and white sheets, appeared to have languished at the site for about a year and were rotting, media reported. The discovery comes amid ongoing protests sparked by the disappearance and probable massacre in late September of 43 students from the town of Ayotzincapa, Guerrero.

## Islamic State says US hostage killed in air strike in Syria

BEIRUT, 7 Feb — Islamic State said on Friday that an American woman hostage it was holding in Syria was killed when Jordanian fighter jets bombed a building where she was being held, but Jordan expressed doubt about the Islamist militant group's account of her death.

In Washington, US officials said they could not confirm that the woman, 26-year-old humanitarian worker Kayla Mueller of Prescott, Arizona, had been killed. Her family said in a statement on Friday they are hopeful she is alive and asked Islamic State to contact them.

Mueller was the last-known American hostage held by Islamic State,

which controls wide areas of Syria and Iraq.

The group has beheaded three other Americans, two Britons and two Japanese hostages — most of them aid workers or journalists — in recent months. Mueller was taken hostage while leaving a hospital in the northern Syrian city of Aleppo in August 2013.

The group's latest claim, detailed by the SITE

monitoring group, came just days after it released a video on Tuesday showing a captured Jordanian pilot, Mouath al-Kasaesbeh, being burned alive in a cage.

Jordan's King Abdullah, who was in Washington discussing how to deal with Islamic State militants when the video was made public, vowed to avenge the pilot's death and ordered a stepped-up military role in the US-led coalition against the group.

Jordan said it had carried out a second straight day of air strikes on Friday on Islamic State positions.

"We are looking into it but our first reaction is that we think it is illogical and we are highly sceptical about it. ... It's part of their

criminal propaganda," government spokesman Mohammad Momani said in response to Islamic State's account of what happened to Mueller.

"How could they identify Jordanian war planes from a huge distance in the sky? What would an American woman be doing in a weapons warehouse?" Momani said.

Hours after the release of the video showing the pilot burning to death, Jordanian authorities executed two al-Qaeda militants who had been imprisoned on death row, including a woman who had tried to blow herself up in a suicide bombing and whose release had been demanded by Islamic State.—Reuters

## Egyptian military kills 47 militants in the Sinai

CAIRO, 7 Feb — Egyptian security forces killed 47 Islamic militants in the country's Northern Sinai on Friday in one of the biggest operations in the region in months, security sources said. Apache helicopters killed 27 militants from the Sinai Province group, which pledges allegiance to Islamic State, the ultra-hardline militants who have seized swathes of Iraq and Syria, the sources said. Hours later, soldiers shot and killed 20 militants, said the sources.

Sinai Province, fighting to topple the Cairo government, has claimed responsibility for coordinated attacks that killed more than 30 members of the security forces in late January.

After that bloodshed, President Abdel Fattah al-Sisi told Egyptians the country faced a long, tough battle against militants.

Also on Friday, a bomb exploded along a street in Egypt's second largest city Alexandria, killing one person and wounding four others, security sources said. Sinai-based militants have killed hundreds of soldiers and police since then army chief Sisi toppled president Mohamed Mursi in mid-2013 after mass protests against his rule.

A security crackdown on Brotherhood supporters, in which hundreds were killed in the streets and thousands arrested, has weakened the group.

## Yemen's Houthis dissolve parliament, assume power — televised statement

SANAA, 7 Feb — Yemen's dominant Houthi movement dissolved parliament on Friday and said a new interim assembly and government would be formed, a move denounced by a main political faction as a coup. Yemen has been in political limbo since President Abd-Rabbu Mansour Hadi and the government of Prime Minister Khaled Bahah resigned last month

after the Houthis seized the presidential palace and confined the head of state to his residence in a struggle to tighten control.

Yemen's instability has drawn international concern as it shares a long border with top world oil exporter Saudi Arabia, and the country is also fighting one of the most formidable branches of al-Qaeda with the help of US drone strikes.

The Houthis, who became power brokers when they overran Sanaa in September, had been holding talks with the main political factions trying to agree a way out of the stand-off.

Friday's declaration suggested that the Houthis had taken on more powers including forming the new parliament and control over the military and security forces. Some po-

litical leaders attended the announcement, which took place at the Presidential Palace. Former interior and defence ministers were also there, indicating that the announcement might have had the blessing of some other political factions.

But this was unlikely to be tolerated by Saudi Arabia and other Gulf Sunni Arab allies who eye the Shi'ite Houthis with suspicion for being close to their regional rival Iran. The new assembly is to elect a five-member interim presidential council to manage Yemeni affairs in a transitional period of up to two years, according to a televised statement.

"What the Houthis have done is political suicide and also a coup that would lead the country into the unknown," said Nasser al-Noubah, a leader of the southern separatist movement al-Hirak. Hundreds of protesters took to the streets in the Yemeni city of Taiz to reject the Houthi takeover, eyewitnesses said.

## US charges six with supporting Islamic militant groups

WASHINGTON, 7 Feb — Six people have been charged with providing money and equipment including US military uniforms to foreign fighters joining al-Qaeda, Nusra Front and Islamic State in Syria and Iraq, the US Justice Department said on Friday. The six are Bosnian natives living in Missouri, Illinois and New York. Five of them were arrested in the United States and charged with conspiring to provide material support and resources to terrorists. The sixth person is overseas, the department said in a statement.

Members of the group conspired to provide money and equipment — including US military uniforms, combat boots, tactical gear, military surplus goods and firearms accessories — to be used to commit crimes outside the United States,

according to a federal grand jury indictment made public by the Justice Department.

It said people in Turkey and Saudi Arabia acted as intermediaries who received the money and property from the defendants in the United States and transferred them to militants fighting with groups in Syria, Iraq and elsewhere.

The group transferred thousands of dollars over the past two years to purchase equipment for a man identified as Abdullah Ramo Pazara and other foreign fighters travelling to join battles in Syria, Iraq and elsewhere, the indictment said. In one message last year, two of the accused parties discussed buying a night-vision optic with a built-in camera for recording killings while fighting in the Middle East, according to the indictment.

## Thousands rally in Jordan demanding revenge for pilot's death

AMMAN, 7 Feb — Thousands of Jordanians packed the streets of the capital Amman on Friday, urging their monarch to step up air strikes on Islamic State to avenge its killing of pilot Mouath al-Kasaesbeh.

Crowds massed near the main Hussein mosque, then marched chanting "Death to Daesh," using an Arabic acronym for the jihadist group, in the lat-

est sign of mounting public anger. The rally came three days after Islamic State released a video purporting to show Kasaesbeh being burned alive in a cage as masked militants in camouflage uniforms looked on.

Many Jordanians have opposed their country's involvement in US-led air campaign against Islamic State positions, fearing retaliation. But the killing of

the recently-married pilot, from an influential Jordanian tribe, has increased support for the military push.

Jordanian fighter jets pounded Islamic State targets in Syria on Thursday, before roaring Kasaesbeh's hometown.

Queen Rania, the wife of King Abdullah, joined Friday's marchers, carrying a picture of the pilot.

"Mouath died standing

for his country and faith, defending our common humanity. We are united in our grief and pride in our brave martyr," she told Reuters in a statement.

"Jordan is united in its resolve to confront this ideology of terror and ultra-violence," she added. Protesters wearing the red Arab Bedouin headdress, chanted: "We sacrifice our souls for you O'Majesty." —Reuters

# Israeli minister urges West to give more arms to Kurds, Jordan

MUNICH, 7 Feb — Western states should provide more weapons to Jordan, Egypt, Kurdish forces and certain opposition forces in Syria, Israel's Strategic Affairs Minister Yuval Steinitz said on the sidelines of the Munich Security conference on Friday.

Israeli officials had previously stopped short of making such explicit calls, citing concern that such groups would face added hostility by being publicly associated with Israel.

Kurdish regional forces are battling Islamic State militants on Syrian and Iraqi territory where IS has submitted whole towns to strict Islamic rule. Egypt is trying to defeat jihadists operating in the Sinai Peninsula, bordering Israel.

When asked what the Western-led alliance conducting air strikes against IS strongholds could do

better, Steinitz said:

"More support with weapons and also financial support to more moderate groups, Islamic forces, like for example the Kurds, like the Free Syrian Army and like moderate Arab states, like Jordan, like Egypt."

The Free Syrian Army is an array of mainly Western-backed armed opposition groups that have little or no central coordination in fighting President Bashar al-Assad in a civil war that began with peaceful anti-government protests in 2011.

Thousands rallied in Jordan on Friday three days after Islamic State released a video purporting to show a Jordanian fighter

pilot being burned alive in a cage as masked militants in camouflage uniforms looked on.

Many Jordanians have opposed their country's involvement in US-led air campaign against Islamic State, fearing retaliation. But the killing of the recently married pilot, who was from an influential Jordanian tribe, has increased support for the military push.

Yuval said he saw no immediate threat to Jordan's sovereignty from Islamic State: "If there will be such a threat, I believe the world and even if necessary Israel will interfere," he said.

## Pakistan detains 10,616 suspects after Taliban attack on army school

ISLAMABAD, 7 Feb — The security forces in Pakistan have detained about 10,616 suspects on different charges after the Taliban savage attack on an army-run school in last December, officials said on Friday.

The attack had killed 140 children and 10 of the staff members of the Army Public School in the north-western city of Peshawar.

The government of Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif launched a "National Action Plan" (NAP) with consensus of all political parties to deal effectively with terrorism and violent extremism.

A report presented to the prime minister said the law enforcement agencies have conducted 14,886 search operations in all parts of the country since the implementation of the NAP.

According to the report, the security agencies conducted 9,413 operations in the country's biggest Punjab province while 2,724 in the northwestern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, which is mainly affected by terrorism-related incidents.

The forces carried out 1,577 raids in southern Sindh Province, 336 in capital Islamabad, 39 in southwestern Balochistan province, 720 in Pakistan-administered Kashmir, 56 in the tribal regions, and 21 in northern areas of Gilgit-Baltistan.—Xinhua

## Authorities arrest 290 false asylum-seekers

BELGRADE, 7 Feb — The Serbian police arrested 290 individuals who tried to cross the Serbian border in the past 48 hours with an intention of illegally reaching EU countries, Serbian Minister of Interior Affairs Nebojsa Stefanovic released on Friday.

Over the past few days, the number of citizens wishing to illegally enter the territory of Hungary has been alarmingly high, the minister said and specified that misdemeanour charges were filed against 256

individuals while criminal charges were raised against 15 smugglers.

Stefanovic and Swedish Ambassador Christer Asp signed the protocol on implementation of the readmission agreement between Serbia and the EU and specified that at this moment, around 1,500 people from Serbia are waiting for response to their asylum applications in Sweden.

Of them, 95 or 96 percent will be returned to the country, he said.

The Serbian minister

called on everyone who want to try and cross the border illegally to refrain from such actions because they will certainly be turned back.

Stefanovic underscored that the signing of the protocol testifies of Serbia's wish to be even more strongly committed to its European integration and elimination of false asylum-seekers.

Stefanovic expressed gratitude to Sweden for the support in the process of Serbia's European inte-

gration and the cooperation with the Interior Ministry, adding that he expects the projects with the Serbian police to be realised by 2020, the total value of which adds up to over EUR 1 million.

The Swedish ambassador underscored that his country maintains very good and constructive cooperation with Serbia with regard to migrations, which has led to a more numerous Serbian diaspora in Sweden.

Nevertheless, the num-

ber of false asylum-seekers in Sweden is still large and not all of these individuals come from Serbia, Asp said.

Sweden will try to find the solution to this problem in cooperation with Serbia, the ambassador said.

Thanks to the cooperation with Serbian institutions, we successfully achieved a significant reduction of the number of asylum-seekers in Sweden, Asp said and noted that Sweden supports Serbia's EU path.—Tanjung

## Niger forces kill 109 Boko Haram militants in battle

NIAMEY, 7 Feb — Niger's forces killed 109 fighters from the Islamist militant group Boko Haram on Friday as they repulsed attacks on Bosso and Diffa, two southeastern towns near the Nigerian border, Niger state television said.

Four Niger soldiers were killed, 13 were wounded and two are missing after the fighting in Bosso against Boko Haram, whose five-year insurgency is spreading from Nigeria to neighbouring states. Four Niger soldiers were wounded in Diffa.

"At around 9 am elements of the Boko Haram terrorist group launched two simultaneous attacks at Bosso and Diffa. At Bosso, Niger's defence forces helped by Chadian troops neutralised the assailants,"

said the statement by Defence Minister Karidio Mahamadou on state television.

Chad deployed war planes to repulse the attack, military officials in Niger said earlier.

There was no independent confirmation of the numbers killed.

General Yaya Doud, commander of Chadian forces deployed north of Lake Chad, was shot in the stomach in Bosso, a Chadian security source said. He has been evacuated to hospital in N'Djamena for treatment.

"The Boko Haram attack from Malam Fatori (in Nigeria) against the town of Bosso and the bridge at Douthi in the Diffa region has been repulsed. We have Chadian planes bombard-

ing the locality," said a Niger military source.

Boko Haram has seized territory in north-eastern Nigeria as part of a five-year insurgency for an Islamist state. Around 10,000 people were killed last year and the militants increasingly stage cross border attacks.

The insurgency is the worst threat to Nigeria's security as the nation, Africa's top oil producer and biggest economy, heads to a presidential election on 14 February.

The militants are also increasingly threatening neighbouring Chad, Niger and Cameroon, prompting regional leaders to come up with a joint plan to defeat them.

Chad has deployed some 2,500 soldiers to

neighbouring Cameroon and Niger as part of this effort. Niger's parliament

is due to vote on Monday on a proposal by the government to send its troops

**Brazilian court seizes former  
billionaire Eike Batista's assests**

RIO DE JANEIRO, 7 Feb — Brazil's Federal Police on Friday carried out a court order to seize cash, luxury cars and other assests from former billionaire Eike Batista, who is being sued for money laundering, fraud and other financial crimes.

The amount frozen on Friday is estimated at 3 billion reais (1.09 billion US dollars).

Batista, founder and CEO of the EBX Group, went from the seventh richest man in the world to ruin in less than two years and he is now alleged to have 1

billion dollars in debt.

The EBX Group's flagship, oil company OGX, had successive bad results in oil exploration in Brazil and filed for bankruptcy protection in late 2013.

In September 2014, Batista was indicted for financial crimes and the court ordered that his assests be frozen. The court has also ordered to freeze assests of his wife, ex-wife and adult sons as investigators found they attempted to transfer assests in millions of dollars to escape the court's seizure.—Xinhua

**Mongolia's 1<sup>st</sup> major English-language magazine hits newsstands**

ULAN BATOR, 7 Feb — Mongolia's first major English-language magazine hit newsstands recently, with its founder and editor-in-chief hopeful that the biweekly publication will open the door to better understanding of the country that is rich not only in natural resources but also art and culture.

"My magazine is not only about one particular topic or subject," Chanrav Burenbayar said late last month in an interview in Ulan Bator days after the first issue of the *Mongolian Observer* was released. "If you want to understand Mongolia...you need to have a very comprehensive understanding of what is the mentality of the country."

Since Mongolia transitioned into a market economy and a democracy after the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1989, the Asian country landlocked

between China and Russia has attracted more international attention.

But for many foreigners, he said, the focus has been mainly on its economy, or more precisely the mining industry, as Mongolia with a population of about 3 million sits on some of the world's richest mineral deposits.

Burenbayar believes there is much more than that to be looked for even if they are interested in Mongolia only in terms of business.

He likened knowing about a country to forming a friendship, saying, "You need to understand what the person is like (from various angles)."

Consequently, he said, the magazine will cover "the entire gamut of the Mongolian society," not just the economy and politics, with each issue running a feature story.

Until now, information

on Mongolia in English was very limited.

There are two other English magazines available, but they are partially written in the language and very much focused on either the mining industry or the economy in general, according to him, whose past careers included working as a journalist and an official of the United Nations Children's Fund.

Each issue of the *Mongolian Observer* with nearly 50 pages costs about \$4. The 59-year-old editor-in-chief said he recognizes that it is "challenging" to publish an independent magazine, considering the decline of print media and the small market in Mongolia. For his short-term goal, Burenbayar said he wants to increase the circulation to 1,500 by the end of March from the current 500 by securing subscriptions from abroad, airlines and hotels.

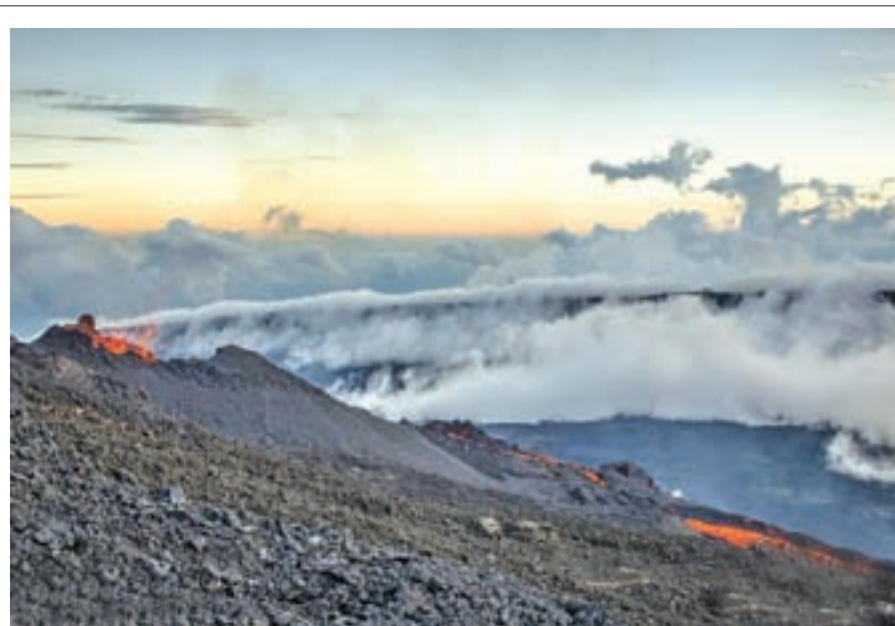

JOHANNESBURG, 7 Feb — When Michelle Obama and Beyonce Knowles attended high-profile events in clothes made by African designers, it was a sure sign that the continent's vibrant style has arrived on the world stage.

The showcasing of clothes from home-grown African designers in stores in New York, London and Tokyo is a sign of a broader change of attitude towards a continent which is earning a brighter reputation beyond stories of war and disease.

It has proven difficult for Africa's home grown designers to break into the mainstream fashion market because the perception has often been that products from the world's poorest continent are of low quality or just not cool.

Global fashion designers like Yves Saint Laurent took inspiration from Africa decades ago and more recently brands like Burberry, Louis Vuitton and Christian Dior have embraced the continent's style and broadened its appeal. But consumers now want products made by Africans, not replicas produced by Western clothing chains, according to Bethlehem Tilahun Alemu, who owns Ethiopian shoe company, soleRebels, which has a dozen stores from Singapore to Greece.—Reuters

Leo, Quinto and Wilkinson might play Laura Poitras, Glenn Greenwald and Ewen MacAskill respectively in 'The Snowden Files'. Poitras is the director of Oscar-nominated Snowden documentary 'Citizenfour', which was also a part of the whistleblower's revelations.

Greenwald is a lawyer/journalist, who was chosen by Snowden to

leak information to. MacAskill is a contributor at The Guardian who helped break Snowden's stories about mass surveillance. Gordon-Levitt will play the whistleblower and Woodley will be seen as his girlfriend in the movie, which is based on books 'Time of the Octopus' by Snowden's lawyer in Russia, Anatoly Kucherena, and 'The Snowden Files: The Inside Story of the World's Most Wanted Man' by Guardian journalist Luke Harding.

Scott Eastwood has also joined the movie. He will play a National Security Agency agent.—PTI

Bonehill also worked as an actor, fencing coach and sword master on films and TV series such as 'The Avengers', 'Rob Roy', 'The Count of Monte Cristo', 'Robin Hood' and 'Jason and the Argonauts'.

He also appeared on 'Doctor Who'. In 'The Empire Strikes Back' and 'Return of the Jedi', Bonehill appeared in a variety of roles including a Stormtrooper, a rebel soldier, a TIE fighter pilot, a Tauntaun handler and as Nien Nunb, a creature who co-pilots the Millennium Falcon.—PTI

## Herzog brings his female 'Lawrence of Arabia' to Berlin film contest

BERLIN, 7 Feb — Nicole Kidman says she loves the desert, which was lucky for her as veteran German director Werner Herzog expected her to spend a lot of time there for his entry for this year's Berlin film festival competition.

His "Queen of the Desert", which had its premiere on Friday is based on the life of the British society woman Gertrude Bell.

Known as "the female Lawrence of Arabia", she trekked the deserts of the Arabian peninsula in the early part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, knew TE Lawrence, befriended Bedouins, had two failed love affairs, worked as a spy and wound up as Britain's diplomatic expert on the Arab tribes.

Herzog, 72, who directed off-the-wall features such as "Fitzcarraldo" and other films starring the maniacal Klaus Kinski in the 1980s, said he wished he'd made more movies with women. "I think I should have done films about fe-

male protagonists much earlier in my life. I always thought I was a director for men ... and I'm glad that finally this discovery came to me, I should have done films about female characters from much, much earlier on," Herzog told a news conference. Kidman said she was attracted to the movie in part for the opportunity to bring Bell's life to the screen, but also for the chance to film in the desert. James Franco, Robert Pattinson and Damian Lewis is co-star, but as Herzog pointed out, the Australian actress appears in all but one scene.

"I think what's so beautiful about this movie is you just see how exquisite that region is and the desert and the people and being a part of it certainly gives you a strong affinity for that, but I've always felt a pull towards the desert," she said.

Herzog said he hoped the film would give viewers a better appreciation of the region and its politics,

in part complicated by borders Bell helped to draw. He said if the West did not understand the region, it risked falling further into the hands of Islamic State.

"We legitimately have to ask ourselves the question whether the border delineations ... have been the best of all worlds, no they have not. But we see the alternative out there, the alternative is materializing and the alternative is

no borders — and Islamic State running this as a Caliphate which includes Lebanon and Israel, among others," he said. The film got mixed early reviews, with Britain's Independent newspaper saying: "This is the closest Herzog has come to making a conventional Hollywood movie — what it lacks is the perversity, drive and wildness that are usually his hallmark."—Reuters

## Detroit man with marathon walking commute surprised with new car

DETROIT, 7 Feb — A Detroit factory worker who has walked more than 20 miles (32 km) during his daily commute to work for a decade was surprised on Friday with a brand new car, donated by a suburban car dealership.

The unexpected gift is the latest in an outpouring of donations from supporters across the globe who, touched by James Robertson's plight, have raised more than \$310,000 to help him buy a car. Robertson has told the *Detroit Free Press* that his car broke down a decade ago and, making \$10.55 an hour, he has been unable to save for a new one.

"I don't like it, I love it," said Robertson, 56, who appeared baffled as he sat behind the wheel of his 2015 red Ford Taurus. "If only my parents could see me now." Robertson thought he was going to look at cars to purchase with Evan

Leedy and Blake Pollock, who both helped coordinate the gift, worth an estimated \$37,000. Instead Robertson was greeted by reporters and a team of supporters who first learned of his marathon commute this week in a story that ran in the *Sunday Detroit Free Press*.

The story has since been widely shared on social media, and Robertson has been featured on national network news programmes. The publicity has prompted a renewed discussion about reforming Metro Detroit's troubled public transportation system.

Leedy, 19, a student at Wayne State University, launched an online GoFundMe.com fundraiser after he read about Robertson's daily trek between his home in Detroit and the Schain Mold & Engineering factory in the suburb of Rochester Hills.

He spent part of the week negotiating a reasonable insurance rate for Rob-

ertson, who has not driven in 10 years.

Leedy told *Reuters* he was initially quoted a \$15,000-a-year premium, a quote that illustrates Detroit's notoriously high insurance rates.

The *Free Press* was tipped off by Pollock, a banker who had befriended Robertson two years ago when he spotted the factory worker walking by his office

on his way to work.

The newspaper said Robertson takes buses to work, but has to walk more than 20 miles round trip because buses do not cover the whole route.

He starts his commute at 8 am for his 2-10 pm shift, and does not get home until 4 am. He has perfect attendance at his job, the said.

## Equatorial Guinea fined for Nations Cup violence

MALABO, 7 Feb — Equatorial Guinea were fined \$100,000 (652,316 pounds) on Friday for the behaviour of their supporters during Thursday's violence-strewn African Nations Cup semi-final loss to Ghana.

The tournament hosts will, however, be allowed to have spectators for their third place playoff match against the Democratic Republic of Congo at the same venue on Saturday.

They were told that as part of their sanction they must play their next game behind closed doors but this part of the punishment has been suspended, the Confederation of African Football said in statement

on Friday.

At least 36 people were treated by the medical

teams at the stadium after the rioting that interrupted the semi-finals.

"All the injured were supported and attended to on site. A total of 14 were transferred to hospital units for further investigations with one case requiring close monitoring," CAF added. Angry home fans pelted Ghana's team officials and spectators with an assortment of missiles as their side went behind.

Ghana fans were attacked as they celebrated and they fled on to the playing area, seeking sanctuary behind the back of the goal.

Equatorial Guinea were fined \$5,000 on Monday for an invasion of the pitch by a few spectators after their upset win over Tunisia in the quarter-final in Bata.— *Reuters*

## Chocolate snorting offers new way to a cocoa high

BRUGES, (Belgium) 7 Feb — When Belgian chocolatier Dominique Persoone created a chocolate-sniffing device for a Rolling Stones party in 2007, he never imagined demand would stretch much beyond the rock 'n' roll scene. But, seven years later, he has sold 25,000 of them.

Inspired by a device his grandfather used to propel tobacco snuff up his nose, Persoone created a 'Chocolate Shooter' to deliver a hit of Dominican Republic or Peruvian cocoa powder, mixed with mint and either ginger or raspberry.

"The mint and the ginger really tinkle your nose," the 46-year-old said in his chocolate factory in the medieval city of Bruges. "Then the mint flavor goes down and the chocolate stays in

your brain." Tattoo-clad Persoone, who has collaborated with celebrated chefs such as The Fat Duck's Heston Blumenthal and elBulli's Ferran and Albert Adria, has a history of culinary innovation.

Alongside the classics, he has created chocolates flavored with bacon and onion, oysters and even grass.

It took some perfecting to create the snorting powder as chocolate itself was too dry. Before the successful formula was discovered, Persoone used a mix that included chili pepper.

"It's a very bad idea," he

said. The chocolate shooters, which sell for 45 euros (\$50) each, have been exported to Russia, India, Canada, Australia and the United States.

The packaging bears a warning against excessive sniffing, but Persoone insists it is safe. He was inspired by the role of the nose when tasting food and, he says, a certain idea of fun. "The mentality when you think about sniffing is: 'Oh it's kinky, guys who do that stuff...'" Persoone said.

"I'm not the bad boy promoting drugs, not at all ... Life is boring. Let's have fun."— *Reuters*

## Manchester United close to full strength for West Ham trip

LONDON, 7 Feb — Manchester United midfielder Michael Carrick is their only absentee for this weekend's visit to West Ham United, manager Louis van Gaal said on Friday in a rare positive update in a season dominated by injury troubles.

United are returning to full strength after being hampered for most of the campaign, with Van Gaal chopping and changing his team as he has made do without the likes of Phil Jones, Marcos Rojo and Ashley Young for long

spells.

Carrick is now the only United player left on the sidelines after rupturing his calf muscle in the run-up to last week's Premier League win over Leicester City.

Despite a mixed start to the campaign in which United's results have frequently been better than their performances, they are third in the table and into the fifth round of the FA Cup.

Van Gaal, however, is determined not to get complacent and despite the 10 point-deficit to leaders

Chelsea is keen to kick on starting at Upton Park on Sunday.

"I said that at the beginning of the week before the game against Leicester City, that this is an important week and we have to win all three matches," he told reporters on Friday.

"After we beat Leicester we were third in the league. After that, we beat Cambridge and we are in the next round of the FA Cup.

"Now, we have to continue, but it's not so easy because we have to play away

in London against West Ham and it was a tough game in Manchester. We have to win in London."

Van Gaal has faced criticism that his side have struggled for attacking fluency, with some suggesting their three-man defensive system sacrifices flair in favour of possession.

"It is not a question of playing with wingers or without wingers or playing with three defenders or four defenders. It is the playing style which is attractive," he said.

"We are fourth in the goalscoring league and third or fourth in the defensive way of playing (goals conceded). I don't think we are very bad — we are very good but we can improve."

The United manager laid flowers at a ceremony to mark the 57<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Munich air disaster on Friday.

"I represent the club. I think the players who died played a big part in the history of the club. We must remember that always," he said.

## Mourinho continues attack on Financial Fair Play rules

LONDON, 7 Feb — Chelsea manager Jose Mourinho has repeated his call for clubs who breach European governing body UEFA's Financial Fair Play rules to be stripped of their titles and docked points.

"I don't think a team can be champions when you are punished because you didn't comply with Financial Fair Play (FFP)," Mourinho said in comments reported by the BBC on Friday, which many will see as a thinly-veiled attack on Premier League rivals Manchester City.

Manuel Pellegrini's side won the title last year, but were also fined, had their transfer spending restricted and told not to exceed their salary bill for breaching the rules, which are designed to prevent clubs from running up losses.

"I enjoy the challenge of the English competition," Mourinho added. "The only thing that is not nice is that you compete against the ones who don't follow the same rules.

"Our work to keep the

team strong, with possibility to compete against the ones financially more powerful or against the ones who don't care and don't respect Financial Fair Play... we had to work very, very hard."

Chelsea were heavily funded by billionaire Roman Abramovich when he bought the club in 2003, but posted a 18.4 million pound profit for the year ending last June, the largest since the Russian took over.

## Schalke leapfrog Gladbach into third with 1-0 win

BERLIN, 7 Feb — A solid defence helped Schalke 04 secure a 1-0 win at home to Borussia Moenchengladbach on Friday that lifted them above their rivals into third spot in the Bundesliga in the battle for Champions League places.

Swiss international Tranquillo Barnetta scored the winner after some sloppy defending from Gladbach, beating two defenders at the near post to tap in a pinpoint Kevin-Prince Boateng cross in the 10<sup>th</sup> minute.

"When you don't allow any (players) through then it's really difficult for your opponent to score," Barnetta told reporters. "We also showed it against Bayern Munich on Tuesday (in a 1-1 draw) where we did not let anything through. That is our goal."

Schalke, without suspended leading striker Klaas-Jan Huntelaar, were by no means exciting to watch, crowding their defence and waiting to catch the visitors on the break.

The addition of defender Matija Nastasic, on loan

from Manchester City, has been an instant success with the Serbian oozing confidence.

Schalke's tactics paid off as Gladbach struggled, failing to create a chance in the entire game while also being caught out at the back on several occasions.

Schalke, who face Real Madrid in the Champions League Round of 16 later this month, have gone five league games without defeat, conceding two goals in the process. They now

have 34 points, one ahead of Gladbach, who had won their previous two games this year.

Champions Bayern Munich, eight points clear at the top on 46, will look to bounce back from a loss and a draw at struggling VfB Stuttgart. Second-placed VfL Wolfsburg entertain Hoffenheim while last season's runners-up Borussia Dortmund take on Freiburg as they look to move off the bottom of the table with a win. —Reuters

## Leeds defender Bellusci cleared in Norwich racism row

LONDON, 7 Feb — Leeds United defender Giuseppe Bellusci has had a misconduct charge for allegedly racially abusing Norwich City striker Cameron Jerome found not proven by an Independent Regulatory Commission, the Football Association said on Friday.

Bellusci, 25, was accused of using abusive and insulting words towards Jerome in a championship (second tier) game at Carrow Road on 21 October.

"It was further alleged that this breach of Rule E3(1) was an "Aggravated Breach" pursuant to Rule E3(2), as it included a reference to ethnic origin and/or colour and/or race," the FA said on its website.

Ex-Italy under-21 international Bellusci, nicknamed 'The Warrior' when he played for Catania, had denied the charge and requested a personal hearing.

Norwich said they were "deeply disappointed" at the verdict and fully supported Jerome "who genuinely believed he was

on the receiving end of unacceptable language on the field of play..."

Jerome told the club website (www.canaries.co.uk): "I'm glad the commission has said that they believe I truthfully reported what I genuinely believe I heard.

"I'll always continue to report anything unacceptable I hear said to me on or off the pitch and I'd certainly encourage any other players in a similar situation to do so as well.

"We must stand up together to eradicate these

problems from our game and our society."

The FA acted after receiving referee Mark Clattenburg's match report on the incident which led him to stop the game midway through the first half having received a complaint from Jerome after words were exchanged with Bellusci.

Clattenburg spoke to both managers on the touchline before lecturing the Italian defender. Moments later Jerome was booked for a foul on the Leeds player. —Reuters
