

Myanmar, U.S. focus on combating people smuggling, trafficking

NAY PYI TAW, 21 May—President U Thein Sein on Thursday received a U.S. delegation led by Deputy Secretary of State Mr. Anthony Blinken at the Creden-

tials Hall of the Presidential Palace, where they held talks on humanitarian assistance for illegal migrants and boat people in the Andaman Sea and the Strait

of Malacca.

They also discussed combating people smuggling and human trafficking, the situation in Rakhine State, the peace-making pro-

cess and constitutional amendment ahead of the 2015 general election.

Also present at the meeting were union ministers Lt-Gen Ko Ko, Lt-Gen Wai Lwin, U Wun-

na Maung Lwin, U Aung Min, U Ye Htut and officials. The U.S. delegation was accompanied by Ambassador to Myanmar Mr. Derek Mitchell.

Low pressure over Bay of Bengal no longer influential: weather bureau

YANGON, 21 May — The influence of a low-pressure area over the East Central Bay and adjoining Southeast Bay of Bengal has become negligible, according to an observation at 1:30 p.m. Thursday by the Department of Meteorology and Hydrology.

The southwest monsoon has already entered the deltaic areas during the past 24 hours, according to the forecast of the government weather bureau.

The forecast stated that strong monsoon conditions were present in the Andaman Sea, South and East Central Bay of Bengal, while the weather was partly cloudy in the Bay of Bengal.

Rain is expected to decrease in the next two days

in upper Myanmar areas where rain has fallen heavily in the past 24 hours.

The government weather bureau forecast for Friday predicts rain or thundershowers will be isolated in Sagaing and Magway Regions and Chin State, scattered in Mandalay Region, Kachin, Shan and Rakhine states, fairly widespread in Bago Region and widespread in the remaining regions and states, with isolated heavy falls in Taninthayi Region and Mon State.

Isolated rain or thundershowers are expected Friday over Nay Pyi Taw and Mandalay, while rain or one or two thundershowers are expected over Yangon and neighbouring areas, with an 80-percent degree of certainty.

S. Korea-Myanmar forum aims to boost bilateral trade, investment

YANGON, 21 May—The Korea-Myanmar Forum 2015 began Thursday in Yangon with presentations and panel discussions focused on furthering economic, political and cultural exchanges between the two countries.

The forum was part of Korea Week 2015 in Myanmar running from 21 to 26 May to mark the 40th anniversary of diplomatic relations between Myanmar and South Korea.

After the opening ceremony, Union Minister for Commerce U Win Myint and Korea Trade-Investment Promotion Agency President Mr. Kim Jae-Hong signed a Letter of Intent on promotion of bilateral trade and investment.

U Win Aung, President of the Republic of

the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, said the forum will lead to investment and trade opportunities between the two nations.

“International forums

are needed for our country’s development, to have business partners in terms of trade and investment,” U Win Aung said.

Academics and economists from both countries shared their views on stra-

tegic partnerships and expansion of bilateral cooperation, as well as the rich cultural heritages of the respective countries.

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Pyidaungsu Hluttaw session covers land disputes, labour issues

NAY PYI TAW, 21 May — The Central Committee for Management of Land Use will cooperate with parliament to resolve some 8,000 outstanding land disputes, Deputy Minister for Home Affairs Brig-Gen Kyaw Zan Myint told the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw session on Thursday.

The deputy minister

was reporting on work done by the central committee to prevent losses to the public due to confiscation of land including farms.

The central committee is handling all complaints on land confiscation including those sent to the president and the vice presidents, according to

the deputy minister.

The central committee looked into a total of 10,225 land disputes, with 119,328.678 acres of land returned to former owners as of 15 May, 2015 in addition to 224,403.079 acres released by ministries and private companies, the deputy minister said.

Deputy Minister for Labour, Employment and Social Security Daw Win Maw Tun reported to the session on work of the ministry, saying the labour organizations law of 2014, the social security law of 2012, the minimum wage law, the employment and skills development law, and the law amending the

leave and public holiday law (1951) have been enacted while four other laws have been repealed.

She added that efforts are also being made to complete new bills for foreign workers and worksite health and safety.

The ministry is also taking measures for state and private sector workers in special economic zones and industrial zones, as well as to protect Myan-

mar migrant workers in other countries.

A representative of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw submitted a motion during the session urging the combined houses of parliament and the union government to submit and approve a bill to exempt mobile phone subscribers from a 5 percent commercial tax on their prepaid phone charges in fiscal 2015-2016.—MNA

They held discussions on democratic reform in Myanmar, US sanctions on Myanmar, endeavours of the Hluttaw, the general election, peace process, situation in Rakhine State and illegal migration of boatpeople.

Present at the meeting were Hluttaw committee chairmen U Thein Swe and U Hla Myint Oo, Hluttaw officials and US Ambassador to Myanmar Mr. Derek Mitchell.

The Speaker held a talk with EU Ambassador to Myanmar Mr. Roland Kobia and party at the hall of Pyithu Hluttaw Building, here, on Thursday.

Also present at the call were Chairman of Pyithu Hluttaw International Relations Committee U Hla Myint Oo, member of Legal Affairs and Special Cases Assessment Commission U Ko Ko Naing and officials of the Pyithu Hluttaw Office. MNA

Senior General describes country of origin as top priority in troubled boat people issue

NAY PYI TAW, 21 May — The country of origin is the first thing to consider when it comes to troubled boat people, Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services Senior General Min Aung Hlaing told Antony J. Blinken, Deputy Secretary of State of the United States on Thursday.

The commander-in-chief pledged rescue efforts of his army, adding that there was no push against Myanmar citizens to leave the country.

Over 2,000 Myanmar citizens were reportedly among the troubled boat people ashore in Indonesia, with the US deputy secretary of State urging the My-

anmar's army to rescue the victims.

Senior General Min Aung Hlaing hinted that most victims are expected to assume themselves to be Rohingyas from Myanmar in the hope of receiving assistance from UNHCR. He stressed the need to investigate their country of origin rather than to accuse a country.

He cited interviews in some foreign media as reporting that the boat victims were from Bangladesh.

Some Bangladeshis fleeing their country entered a village in Maungtau on the Myanmar soil as they ran out of food and water and found it difficult to continue their

journey, with the senior general saying that Myanmar helped them with food and water and freed them.

He also spoke of peace talks with ethnic armed groups and the army's preparedness to sign 'Nation-wide Ceasefire Accord'.

Regarding the elections, the commander-in-chief pledged to abide by the regulations of the Union Election Commission and greater cooperation in making the elections free and fair.

He also stated the need to improve the role of the army depending of democratic maturity of citizens and challenges in defence, politics and international relationships.—MNA

Union FM receives Indonesian, U.S. and Malaysian guests

South Korea's Deputy Minister for Trade, Industry and Energy Mr. Lee Woon-Ho, South Korean ambassador to Myanmar Mr. Lee Baek-Soon, and U Win Aung, President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry. GNLM

They discussed promotion of bilateral relations including further strengthening economic, social and cultural cooperation and democratization in Myanmar. They exchanged views on movements of illegal migrants at the Andaman Sea and the Strait of Malacca as reported by the international media and on the need to intensify cooperation in law enforcement in the sea. The union minister hosted a welcome dinner to the visiting Indonesian delegation on 20 May.

The union minister also received a US delega-

tion led by United States' Deputy Secretary of State Mr. Anthony Blinken at 1 pm, the ministry, here, on Thursday.

They cordially discussed and exchanged views on the promotion of bilateral relations and cooperation between Myanmar and the United States as well as on the matters of mutual interest. Dato' Sri Anifah Aman, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Malaysia called on Union Minister U Wunna Maung Lwin at 2 pm.

The Malaysian minister briefed on the rationale

behind the statement jointly issued by Malaysia, Indonesia and Thailand on 20 May 2015. He also informed that such cooperation among the affected countries was done in response to international attention received by boat people. In this connection, the Malaysian minister welcomed the press release by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Myanmar on 19 May 2015. On his part, Union Minister U Wunna Maung Lwin expressed his views on possible cooperation in preventing smuggling, human trafficking and illegal migrations.—MNA

Stability in Rakhine State enables new development focus: vice president

NAY PYI TAW, 21 May—Measures to restore peace, stability, and the rule of law in Rakhine State have been successful, ena-

bling regional development activities to focus on new areas, Vice President Dr Sai Mauk Kham told local people in Sittway on Thursday.

Communal violence that broke out three years ago had weakened the administrative machinery of Rakhine State.

Dr Sai Mauk Kham expressed his hope that the expansion of electric power supply to many parts of Rakhine State will dramati-

cally improve the quality of life for local households.

The vice president said local people had contributed to the success and recognized their active cooperation in development activities. He also inspected renovations at Sittway General Hospital and comforted patients.

At the Union-Level Emergency Coordination Centre, he met INGOs and local officials to seek further cooperation in improving rescue shelters in Rakhine State.

INGOs included the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) and the United Nations Office

for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UNOCHA).

It is important for boat people at sea to be able to come ashore, they said, stressing the need to provide health care to children under the auspices of the local government.

Director General U Myint Swe of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs read out the government's announcement on the issue which appeared in state-run dailies dated 20 May.

Regarding rehabilitation measures, the vice president said local authorities are building houses for families staying in rescue shelters in Rakhine State. A total of 2,000 detached houses have been built. In the first phase, altogether 5,091 houses will be built.

Vice President U Nyan Tun says Myanmar fulfilling int'l duties on boat people

NAY PYI TAW, 21 May — Vice President U Nyan Tun delivered a speech Thursday at the meeting of the Emergency Management Committee for Illegal Migrants at Sea at the Presidential Palace, here.

In his speech, the vice president said extensive international media coverage about boat people and illegal migrants in the Andaman Sea and Strait of Malacca had caused concern among the international community, although Myanmar has been placing an emphasis on prevention of illegal migration and human trafficking.

The country deems regular patrols and search-and-rescue operations in Myanmar waters as one of the major duties of the defence services, he said.

The vice president pointed out that the boat people are victims of international criminal gangs who have been committing transnational crimes in the

form of large-scale human trafficking.

Allegations that the boatpeople had left Myanmar are completely wrong, he said, stating adamantly that most of them are not from Myanmar, although a few among them may be from the country.

Protection and care will be provided to those found to be Myanmar citizens after conducting citizenship scrutiny in accordance with international consular practices prior to their repatriation to Myanmar, the vice president added.

The vice president explained that repatriation of 102 Myanmar migrant workers detained in Langkawi, Malaysia, by the Myanmar Navy, and that of about 500 Myanmar fishermen in Indonesia, proved Myanmar is ready to provide care and protection to genuine citizens regardless of race and religion.

The vice president explained the situation in

Rakhine State, saying that revocation of temporary identity cards and citizenship scrutiny tasks are being carried out peacefully in accordance with the citizenship law, without racial discrimination, and no one will leave Myanmar due to the process.

The situation in Rakhine State has changed dramatically since communal violence broke out in 2012, he said, adding there has been no further violence, while permanent homes for those living in relief camps are being built, and measures are being taken to provide them with job and education opportunities and healthcare.

The vice president added that the government and international organizations are working together for stability and development in Rakhine State and the assumption that people are fleeing the state due to suppression and discrimination are completely at odds with

what is happening on the ground, although some people may be trying to migrate for economic reasons.

He urged officials to take measure against human trafficking and to carry out educational tasks to prevent human trafficking and to disseminate knowledge of the dangers of illegal migration at sea in the Bengali community in Rakhine State, while measures are taken to create job opportunities for the community.

The vice president later pointed out that it is necessary for security forces at sea to prevent Myanmar waters being used for transit by human traffickers, and to provide search and rescue for boat people in Myanmar waters, as well as humanitarian assistance, regardless of their origins.

As human trafficking and illegal migration is a regional problem and is difficult for Myanmar to tackle alone, it is necessary for Myanmar to identify and

treat the root causes of human trafficking through regional cooperation, the vice president said.

In conclusion, the vice president warned that tackling a problem with the wrong approach will not deliver favourable outcomes.

After the speech, Union Minister Lt-Gen Ko Ko reported on taking legal action against 435 Bangladesh nationals and repatriation of them since April 2011.

Then, Union Minister Lt-Gen Wai Lwin report-

ed on operations against human trafficking at sea before Union Minister U Wunna Maung Lwin explained the measures for citizenship scrutiny in accordance with international norms and cooperation with regional countries.

Union Ministers U Aung Min and U Ye Htut and deputy ministers reported on measures being taken by respective ministries.

The meeting concluded with remarks by the vice president. —MNA

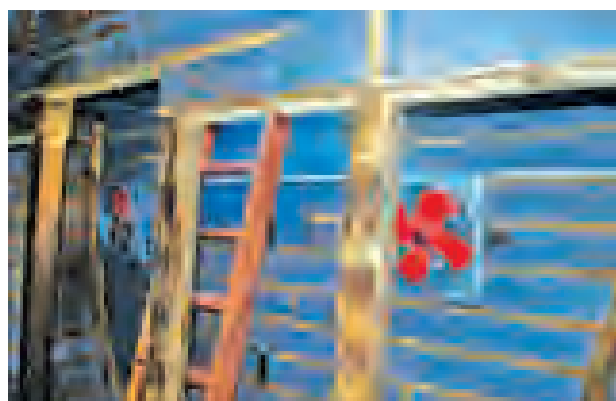


Photo shows structures inside the boat for smuggling Bengalis.—MNA

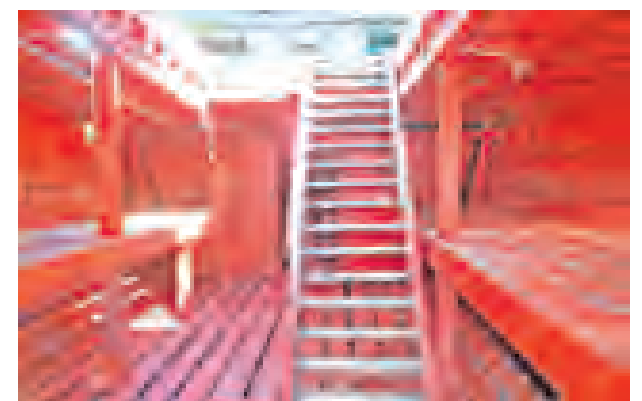

The 61-member delegation arrived in Mandalay from Thailand on 17 May and visited Mandalay and

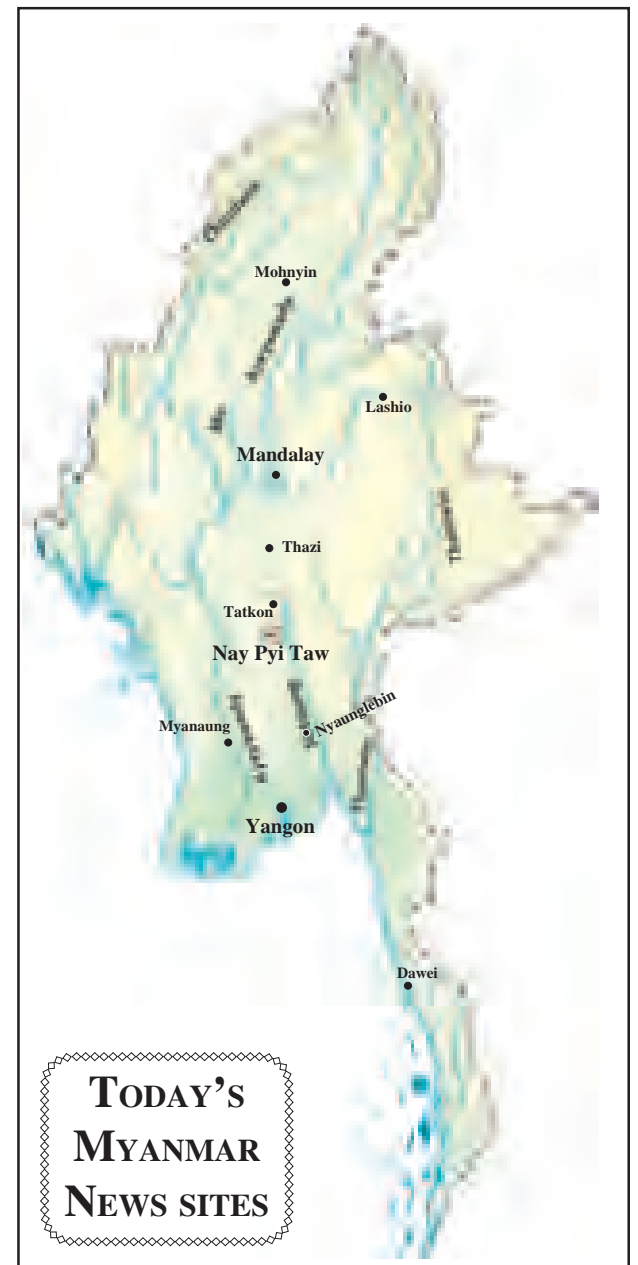
nearby areas. They also toured the archaeological region in Bagan before proceeding to Nay Pyi Taw for the conference at Myanmar International Convention Centre-II.

Japan, ADB to provide \$110 bil to develop infrastructure in Asia

TOKYO, 21 May — Japan will collaborate with the Asian Development Bank to provide around \$110 billion to develop “quality infrastructure” in Asia over the next five years, Prime Minister Shinzo Abe said on Thursday.

The plan to boost such investment by around 30 percent from the previous five years is apparently aimed at taking a lead in the fast-growing region with enormous infrastructure needs, amid the rise of China that is

planning to set up a multilateral lending body.

The prime minister said people in Japan are used to choosing good quality products that last a long time, even if prices are a bit high.

“In the long run, we’d like to spread quality infrastructure and innovative infrastructure in Asia,” Abe said in a speech in Tokyo.

To pursue not only quality but quantity, the Japanese government will cooperate with the ADB, led by Japan and the United States, to fund projects, while aiming to draw money from private-sector companies in addition to public funds, he said.

Abe said Japan “highly welcomes” the ADB’s move to boost lending capacity and consider further increasing its capital as well as expand lending to the private sector.

To expand investment, the government-backed Japan Bank for International Cooperation will create a new programme to supply financing for risky projects, though JBIC has so far provided funds for such projects

only with guarantees from local governments, Abe said.

He said Japan wants to share its technology and experience acquired through tackling issues such as poor energy resources and the aging population.

As for energy-saving technology, Abe said Japan has developed technology to significantly reduce carbon dioxide emissions in coal fired power generation, which would help slash 1.5 billion tons of greenhouse gases annually if the technology is spread to the United States, China and India.

Japan’s move is seen as intending to show its capabilities in infrastructure development, with the China-led Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank set to be launched by the end of this year with over 50 founding members.

While major European countries like Britain and Germany are among the prospective founding members, Japan and the United States have stayed out of the project, citing concerns over the new body’s governance and debt sustainability.

The prospective founding

countries are now holding a meeting in Singapore to discuss terms for the AIIB, with an eye to considerably lifting the initial capital from the earlier planned level of around \$50 billion, according to participants at the gathering.

China’s investment ratio, initially anticipated to be around 50 percent, could be less than 30 percent as more countries are set to become founding members, they said.

In boosting infrastructure investment in Asia, the Japanese government will focus on providing infrastructure that meets local needs, is long lasting and considerate of the environment, such as energy-saving subways and bridges that are resistant to earthquakes.

Japan will also place emphasis on creating employment and transferring its technology for building and maintaining such infrastructure to developing countries.

Among notable examples, Japan built a bridge over the Red River in Hanoi using its official development assistance, and the technology was adopted by Viet-

nam as the standard in constructing bridges, according to the government.

To finance projects, the government will also start a new program to have the Japan International Cooperation Agency collaborate with the ADB to invest in private sector-led projects, Abe said.

Japan’s cooperation with the ADB comes after the Manila-based bank pledged to merge its two main financing instruments for an expansion of its lending capacity to meet growing funding needs in the region and reduce poverty.

The government will also make efforts to swiftly conduct screening procedures in approving yen loans to boost infrastructure investment in the Asian region, it said.

The ADB spends around \$13 billion annually to finance infrastructure development, but the amount is far smaller than its estimate of around \$8 trillion expected to be required for the region’s infrastructure financing from 2010 to 2020.

Cambodia warns 4 UN representatives for criticism of draft NGO bill

PHNOM PENH, 21 May — Cambodian Foreign Minister Hor Namhong on Thursday warned four representatives of the UN agencies for their criticism of a draft NGO law in a meeting.

The meeting was convened after Wan-Hea Lea, representative of United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights to Cambodia, Rana Flowers, head of United Nations Children’s Fund (UNICEF)- Cambodia, Marc Derveeuw, representative of United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)-Cambodia, and Wenny Kusuma, representative of UN Women-Cambodia, criticized the Draft Law on the Association and the Non-Governmental Organization on the *Phnom Penh Post* newspaper last week.

Speaking to the media after the meeting, Hor Namhong said he told the representatives to perform their activities by respecting the UN Charter and their specific mandate.

He said the Article 2, Paragraph 7 of the UN Charter, stipulates that “Nothing contained in the present Charter shall authorize the UN to intervene in matters which are essentially within the domestic jurisdiction of any state.”

“I told them that in their capacity as UN agencies, they must respect the UN Charter’s article 2,” said Hor Namhong, who is also a deputy prime minister.

He said this draft of law has nothing to do with human rights, with children, with Cambodian population or women.

“As a state of law, we just want to know who does what in this sovereign country and member of the United Nations, we need transparency and order when thousands of NGOs, Civil Societies and Associ-

ations perform their duties throughout the country,” he said. On Wednesday, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs also slammed the United States Ambassador to Cambodia, William Todd, for his criticism of the draft NGO law.

In a diplomatic note to the US Embassy, the ministry said, “The words expressed by the foreign Ambassador to Cambodia are extremely insolent, even if he is a representative of a big country.”

Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Sen said on 5 April that the proposed

NGO law will require NGOs to register their nationalities with the government in order to have legal standing, and they are required to file reports on their activities and finances each year to the government.

“We do not make the law to prevent the activities of NGOs, but we want to see NGOs operate transparently in this country,” he said. The law also aims at fighting against terrorism financing, money laundering, and creation of illegal armed forces, he added.

Thailand could stop thousands of HIV deaths with more tests and treatment

BANGKOK, 21 May, — Thailand could prevent more than 5,000 HIV-related deaths in the next decade if it expanded HIV testing and treatment among gays in Bangkok, where about one in three males who have sex with men is infected, researchers said.

A third of the estimated 185,000 men who have sex with men in the Thai capital fail to use condoms or are involved in other behaviour that puts them at high risk of infection, experts said in a World Bank-sponsored study. Yet in 2011, only 14,000 of men who have sex with men in Bangkok got tested, and only 30 percent of those diagnosed and eligible for treatment started taking lifesaving antiretroviral drugs (ARVs), the study said. “We know that antiretroviral treatment works. It keeps people alive, and it also works in reducing the risk of transmission to other people,” said David Wilson, an author of the study and associate professor at the University of New South Wales in Australia.

“It is clear that the number one priority in reducing HIV in this country is to target men who have sex with men with

better services so they can access testing and then be linked into treatment,” Wilson told journalists at the launch of the report in Bangkok this week. Often touted as a success story, Thailand tackled its massive AIDS epidemic in the 1990s, cutting the estimated number of people infected each year to 8,100 in 2013 from 143,000 in 1991.

However, it has failed to keep up with the spread of the disease among some groups, including gay men and transgender people.

About 44 percent of new infections are in men who have sex with men, and 25 to 30 percent of those are likely to occur in Bangkok, the study said, citing official estimates.

The researchers found that a continuation of the current levels of testing and ARV treatment would cost Thailand \$74 million between 2012 and 2022.

It would cost an additional \$55 million over the same period to expand testing and treatment to 80 percent from 20 percent in 2012, the study said.

“That’s a lot of money, but relatively, it’s not that much to get four times the coverage,” Wilson said.

Putin aide brings Russia president's message to Abe

TOKYO, 21 May— A close aide to Russian President Vladimir Putin on Thursday met with Prime Minister Shinzo Abe in Tokyo and delivered a message from Putin, a senior Japanese official said, without revealing the substance of it.

But Abe and Russian State Duma chairman Sergey Naryshkin did not discuss a visit to Japan by Putin, Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga said at a news conference.

Asked whether Abe and Naryshkin discussed bilater-

al negotiations for the return of four Russian-held islands off Hokkaido, Suga declined to comment on the substance of the 15-minute meeting at a Tokyo hotel.

Japan has invited Putin for a visit but it was put off last year due to Russia's annexation of the Crimean region of Ukraine, an act condemned by Tokyo and other members of the international community. The rescheduling of Putin's visit has yet to be decided.

Abe has attached importance to Putin's visit as

a step to bring forward the stalled negotiations for the return of the four islands. The territorial dispute has prevented the two countries from concluding a post-World War II peace treaty.

In a meeting Wednesday with Masahiko Komura, vice president of the ruling Liberal Democratic Party, Naryshkin said Japan's imposition of sanctions on Russia over the Ukrainian crisis is making it difficult for Putin to visit Japan despite Abe's hope for an early visit.—Kyodo News

S Korean president names justice minister as new PM

SEOUL, 21 May— South Korean President Park Geun-hye on Thursday named the current justice minister as new prime minister after the former prime minister stepped down for the alleged bribery scandal.

Justice Minister Hwang Kyo-ahn was nominated as the country's second-highest administrative post, 25 days after Lee Wan-koo, the former prime minister, resigned on suspicion that he received bribes, the presidential office said.

It reflected President

Park's strong will to reform the political arena by naming the head of the judiciary authority as new prime minister.

"Under our current reality, it is very important to achieve a political reform by eliminating irrationalities, corruption and irregularities that have lasted from the past," senior presidential press secretary Kim Sung-woo told reporters.

Hwang, 58, was named as the first justice minister of the Park administration that took office in Febru-

ary 2013. He had assumed major positions in the prosecution before making the justice minister.

Hwang's nomination came after the former prime minister stepped down on suspicion that he received 30 million won (28,000 US dollars) in bribes during the by-election campaign period in April 2013 from a businessman who killed himself on 9 April.

Sung Wan-jong, the former ruling party lawmaker and businessman who ran the now-bankrupt

construction firm, left a brief memo that listed eight heavyweight politicians, including the former prime minister alongside current figures. Lee had strongly denied his involvement although admitted that he had few acquaintances with Sung. Lee even said that he would kill himself if any evidence comes out for conviction. Lee resigned as it turned out that he had made some 200 phone calls with Sung in the past year and had dozens of meetings with Sung.—Xinhua

China navy warns US spy plane in disputed South China Sea

WASHINGTON, 21 May — The Chinese navy warned a US surveillance plane flying over artificial islands that Beijing is creating in the disputed South China Sea to leave the area eight times, according to CNN, which was on board the flight on Wednesday.

At one stage, after the American pilots responded by saying the plane was flying through international airspace, a Chinese radio operator said with exasperation: "This is the Chinese navy ... You go!"

The P8-A Poseidon, the US military's most advanced surveillance aircraft, flew at 15,000 feet (4,500 metres) at its lowest point, CNN said.

The incident, along with recent Chinese warnings to Philippine military aircraft to leave areas around the Spratly archipelago in the South China Sea, suggests Beijing is trying to enforce a military exclusion zone above its new islands.

Some security experts worry about the risk of confrontation, especially after a US official said last week the Pentagon was considering sending military aircraft and ships to assert freedom of navigation around the Chinese-made islands.

A spokesman for China's Foreign Ministry said

he was not aware of the incident.

"China has the right to engage in monitoring in the relevant airspace and waters to protect the country's sovereignty and prevent accidents at sea," ministry spokesman Hong Lei said in a regular briefing. "We hope the relevant country can earnestly respect China's sovereignty in the South China Sea."

Footage taken by the P8-A Poseidon and aired by CNN showed a hive of construction and dredging activity on the new islands the plane flew over, as well as Chinese navy ships nearby.

CNN said it was the first time the Pentagon had declassified video of China's building activity and audio of challenges to a US aircraft.

"We were just challenged 30 minutes ago and the challenge came from the Chinese navy," Captain Mike Parker, commander of US surveillance aircraft deployed to Asia, told CNN aboard the flight.

"I'm highly confident it came from ashore, this facility here," Parker said, pointing to an early warning radar station on Fiery Cross Reef.

Military facilities on Fiery Cross Reef, including a 3,000-metre (10,000-foot) runway, could be op-

erational by year's end, one US commander recently told Reuters.

Asia's rising power China claims sovereignty over most of the South China Sea, through which \$5 trillion in ship-borne trade passes every year. The Philippines, Vietnam, Malaysia, Taipei and Brunei also have overlapping claims.

Foreign Minister Wang Yi last week asserted Beijing's sovereignty to reclaim the reefs, saying China's determination to protect its interests was "as hard as a rock".

China has also said it had every right to set up an Air Defence Identification Zone (ADIZ) in the South China Sea but that current conditions did not warrant one.

ADIZs are used by some nations to extend control beyond national borders, requiring civilian and military aircraft to identify themselves or face possible military interception.

During the P8-A mission, the pilot of a Delta Air Line flight in the area spoke on the same frequency after hearing the Chinese challenges, and identified himself as commercial. The Chinese voice reassured the pilot and the Delta flight went on its way, CNN said.—Reuters

Pakistan denies report of nuclear deal with Saudi Arabia

ISLAMABAD, 21 May— Pakistan on Thursday rejected as baseless a report by Britain's *Sunday Times* newspaper that Saudi Arabia has reached out to Pakistan to acquire "off-the-shelf" atomic weapons.

"There is no Pakistan-Saudi nuclear deal. We reject the report," Foreign Ministry spokesman Qazi Khalilullah told a weekly briefing.

The spokesman said that Pakistan's nuclear pro-

gramme was meant for self-defence and maintenance of a nuclear deterrence. "Pakistan supports the objectives of nuclear non-proliferation," Khalilullah said. However, the spokesman said that like oth-

er signatories of the treaty on the non-proliferation of nuclear weapons, Saudi Arabia has a right to peaceful use of nuclear technology. The *Sunday Times* said that the move by the Gulf kingdom comes amid growing anger among

Sunni Arab states over an agreement involving the permanent members of the UN Security Council and Germany, which they fear could allow their arch foe, Iran, to develop a nuclear bomb.—Kyodo News

Tax should not be a bitter pill for people to swallow

Tax has recently become the talk of the day throughout social media in Myanmar. The government has instructed local mobile operators to introduce a 5 percent commercial tax on all recharges from 1 June, sparking an unhappy response among the public.

This does not necessarily indicate people's unwillingness to pay taxes. Most want to be dutiful taxpayers, but only if they are kept in-

formed of how their money is spent. They have all heard and accepted that tax is an engine, not a constraint, for the country's infrastructural development.

Undeniably, our country is still dependent on foreign loans and aid, and obviously much remains to be done to minimize its dependence on external assistance. There have been hints of accusations that the country is tied to the will of its creditor countries.

The government, for its part, ought to view tax as a source of national development rather than a source of revenue. It must start to improve the process of taxation, making it more transparent to the public. Only then will Myanmar take a vital step forward as a developing country. What is important in this context is the establishment of taxation structures, the absence of which can be interpreted as concrete proof of

weak governance.

Tax is more important as a source of growth than a source of revenue. With this end in view, the government itself should be at the vanguard of the fight against tax evasion by persuading its citizens to pay taxes through transparent means, and by exchanging information on how their money is spent.

Keep our youths sober

It is widely accepted that alcohol does more harm than good to drinkers. Despite this general belief, consumption of alcohol seems to be on the rise in most societies. Even without research, it can be gauged from the huge crowd of drinkers at bars, restaurants, food stalls, parks and under overpasses, and the number of unsteady drunkard young men supporting each other, and in a few cases, young women supported by young men, on their way home late at night, that the consumption of alcohol has alarmingly increased in Yangon.

One can think of many reasons for the increase in the number of drinkers. The first is the widespread availability of alcohol. It will be noted that along with the huge increase in the number of shops in the city, the number of off-licence, and the number of restaurants and food stalls serving alcohol, legally and illegally, have also grown. All supermarkets have a separate section for the sale of alcohol and the newly opened 24-hour convenience shops found in most big wards all sell alcohol although they have a notice posted that it will not be sold after 10 p.m. In public parks like the Inya bund, there are vendors freely selling bottles of alcohol. In smaller towns, there are licensed alcohol serving shops, as well as illegal alcohol stalls that sell country spirit. In the countryside, there are shops opened at houses that sell home

brewed alcohol and wherever there is a grove of toddy palm trees, one can find a hut set up to sell toddy palm juice, an alcoholic beverage. Although legally, alcohol is not allowed to be sold to the under-aged, the attitude of most shopkeepers is that if they do not sell to them, others will, so they might as well do it too. The "don't ask, don't tell," system seems to prevail in most shops, and anyone who has the money to pay for it, including young teenagers, can walk into them and freely buy a bottle of alcohol without being asked his age. Alcohol sales are also being promoted using a variety of means. One that is used by many restaurants, food shops and stalls, is to employ girls to serve alcohol to mainly male customers to promote sale of particular brands. This is prevalent not just in big cities like Yangon, Mandalay and Nay Pyi Taw but also in small towns too. There is also the free distribution of alcohol ads printed on vinyl sheets which are used as sunshades by house owners in the countryside thereby unwittingly providing free advertising service to alcohol producers. Officially, alcohol ads have been banned on TV and in public places, but some devious alcohol producers have for a long time been using TV ads of purified drinking water and soft drinks that share brand names and logos with their alcohol products as surrogate TV ads. Consequently, more and more young people including females are forsaking coffee and tea

shops and are frequenting shops and restaurants that serve alcohol as their meeting places.

Affordability is another key factor in the increase in consumption of alcohol. A can of beer costs around 800 kyats, while a locally produced bottle of beer, whiskey or rum costs about 1200 kyats. They are therefore within the reach of many people. For those, who cannot afford them, they can always resort to country spirits, illegal brews and adulterated drinks which are much cheaper but can be most dangerous for health.

Why do people drink? There is no doubt that many people get seduced by the feelgood effect of alcohol, such as, making contact with people more easily, feeling more sure of oneself, being less bothered by guilt or shame, worrying less, getting to sleep easier, etc. as mentioned in www.lookatyourdrinking.com, just as humans had been seduced by various forms of alcohol for centuries. But the desire for this feelgood effect can become addictive and can cost one his health, lives, properties and even kingdom as in the case of a Myanmar king of the 16th century. Some who feel guilty about drinking make up various excuses, such as drinking to celebrate some occasion, to get through some miseries suffered, to overcome inhibition at social gatherings, to show the spirit of camaraderie, due to peer pressure, or because it is part of the job, etc., etc. Whatever the reason offered may be, from social drinking, one can gradually, and in some cases,

swiftly graduate to heavy drinking, binge drinking and become an alcoholic. Moreover, the bad example set by friends, seniors, and stars in movies, and advertisements, young people living away from home and away from parental guidance, increasing acceptance of lax behaviour by society, authorities and communities, deterioration of family cohesiveness and parental authority, and lack of education, all lead to increase in the number of persons drinking and the amount of alcohol consumed. In addition, nowadays, many people, including women, are no longer hesitant about being seen frequenting bars or restaurants serving alcohol, and drinking beer, which they declare is a nonalcoholic drink.

What are the adverse effects of drinking? These are too numerous to be listed here and only some major ones will be mentioned. The effects on health range from simple hangover, to more serious problems such as liver, kidney, and heart diseases, hypertension, and cancer. Binge drinking can also result in memory problems when one gets older. Another effect is laxity in behaviour and manners which results in development of bad habits that affect health such as chewing betel, smoking, and becoming addicted to certain drugs. Lack of a respect for customs and traditions also affect morality, such as, shameless behaviour in public, and loss of religious and moral values. Another effect is the harm caused to one's job due to decline in creative and thinking skills, loss of in-

Telenor plans expansion of education programme for child workers

YANGON, 21 May — Telenor Myanmar will expand a joint programme to provide education for children working in teashops to roughly 1,000 students by the end of this year, CEO Mr Petter Furberg said Thursday.

At a Telenor sustainability briefing in Yangon, Mr Furberg said the company launched the project in cooperation with the Myanmar Mobile Education Project (MyME) in late 2014, with the aim of improving the lives of children working in teashops who are unable to attend school.

Currently the project is delivering free mobile education services to over 100 children between the ages of 13-16 from Telenor-branded teashops in Yangon and Mandalay. Each child is provided six hours of lessons per week, he added.

Under the programme, MyME is preparing to boost education services to Yangon's suburban areas within the next two or three months, Director of MyME U Tin Maung Maung Aye said.

The free education services will also reach needy teashop workers in the capital Nay Pyi Taw, Patheingyi Region, Mawlamyine in Mon State and Magway Region this year, the director said.

MyME's teaching programme is classified into three levels—beginner level, level I and level II. The syllabus includes basic literacy, mathematics and computer skills. The young learners will also be taught basic knowledge of personal hygiene and social interaction in a safe environment.

Currently, between 350 and 400 children are pursuing their education at mobile schools of MyME established in early 2014.

There are about 25,000 teashops across the country. Ninety percent of school-age workers in Yangon come from poor families from other regions and states, U Tin Maung Maung Aye said. Telenor, a Norwegian mobile company, launched its services in Myanmar in September 2014 and has 6.4 million local users.—GNLM

USAID announces partnership to train aspiring engineers in Southeast Asian countries

YANGON, 21 May — The United States Agency for International Development on Wednesday announced it has entered a partnership with testing device and software maker National Instruments to train young aspiring scientists and engineers in the

Lower Mekong sub-region, including Myanmar.

USAID said it would work together with NI over the next five years to "create learning centers at universities and vocational colleges to enable students and professionals to access NI's embedded

and measurement devices, including software, hardware, training and technical support."

"This partnership involves developing curricula, training instructors and supplying lab equipment to these schools, start-ups and small and

medium-sized enterprises (SMEs)," USAID said in a press release.

NI has committed \$4.5 million to the partnership, and will provide its software and hardware technology platforms and support for regional projects, including the

USAID Connecting the Mekong Through Education and Training (USAID COMET).

"Two U.S. government projects — USAID COMET and USAID ACTI — will coordinate this partnership," USAID said. "Launched as one of the programs affiliated with the Young Southeast Asia Leadership Initiative (YSEALI) by President Obama in Myanmar in November 2014, USAID

COMET plans to help 100 universities and vocational centers increase the number of skilled workers in ASEAN-targeted fields."

The partnership will focus on providing information and skills development training to SMEs. Emphasis will be on greater economic inclusion of women and young entrepreneurs to advance regional economic growth in the Mekong sub-region.

money spent on drinks and one's valuable time which could be better spent on improving the quality of life of oneself and family.

What are some of the solutions? The most important is creating awareness of the harm that addiction to alcohol can cause to one's social, financial, mental and physical development since young, and ensuring that young people do not pick up this ruinous habit. This involves pro-

viding sustained education to young people in schools and universities about the dangers of alcohol by teachers, health authorities and religious and social organizations. The next strategy is to reduce exposure to portrayal of alcohol consumption in films, advertisements and public places so that young people do not think that it is an everyday normal behaviour. The third is to provide alternative social outlets and activities to young people so that

they do not resort to alcohol for companionship or to boost self-esteem. The fourth is to raise taxes on alcohol, restrict availability and production of alcohol and take legal action against drunk driving, cheap harmful drinks, sales to under-aged persons, sales without license and make the shops and restaurants that serve alcohol to limit the amount served to those who have been drinking beyond their limit. The fifth strategy is to set up an organization like Alcoholics Anonymous to help those

with drink problems overcome them.

Alcoholism usually starts with social drinking, moves to heavy drinking, followed closely by binge drinking and ends with becoming alcoholics. Two current trends should worry parents, authorities and society. The first is the consumption of alcohol in public by an increasing number of women, and the second is the increase in the number of teenagers below the legal age buying and drinking alcohol. Both these trends show that alcohol

consumption is no longer just the personal matter of a few individuals. It is also becoming an important social problem that affects the health and wellbeing of many citizens, family relations, and the future of young people. It is also a growing national problem that affects social harmony, economic productivity, and human resource development. It is therefore imperative that swift and appropriate action be taken by parents, families, and authorities concerned. In order to take effective action,

it is necessary to find out the causes, extent, consequences and seriousness of the problem in our country, and learn what action is taken and what support is provided to those with similar problems in other countries. Hence, it demands extensive research and study to understand the scope of the problem and to come up with the right solutions as well as to draw the attention of the community and the authorities in order to get their cooperation in bringing this rising public problem under control.

US, Cuba to focus on reopening embassies in Washington talks

WASHINGTON, 21 May — The United States and Cuba resume talks on Thursday aiming to overcome obstacles to opening embassies in each other's capitals and re-establishing diplomatic ties, the crucial next step in their historic detente.

Both sides have reported progress in closing in on a deal, part of an agreement clinched between US President Barack Obama and Cuban President Raul Castro in December. Once diplomatic relations are restored, the long-time adversaries will work on the more complicated task of normalizing overall relations. But Washington wants assurances that its diplomats will have more freedom of movement, while Castro this week reiterated Cuban concerns that dissidents are receiving "illegal" training at the US Interests Section in Havana.

US Assistant Secretary of State Roberta Jacobson assured lawmakers in testimony on Wednesday that Washington would not agree to the opening of an

embassy in Havana without its diplomats being able to travel outside the capital.

The two countries have interests sections rather than embassies in each other's capitals. Currently, US and Cuban diplomats cannot leave the capitals.

Jacobson, the lead US negotiator with Cuba, said Washington also wanted assurances that Cubans would be able to visit the US embassy without being harassed by police and that there would be an increase in US embassy personnel. She acknowledged, however, that any the embassy would likely operate under restrictions similar to those in other countries run by authoritarian governments. China and Vietnam could serve as models for new rules governing US diplomats movements in Cuba. One of the most contentious issues between the former Cold War adversaries is Washington's so-called pro-democracy programmes for Cuba, which Castro argues are "illegal" and in breach of international treaties on diplomatic

missions. The US Interests Section in Havana offers Cubans free courses on journalism, English and information technology, and also allows Cubans to use the Internet.

In November 2012, the Cuban Foreign Ministry is-

sued a statement accusing the US Interests Section in Havana of "serving as headquarters of political subversion" against Cuba by creating an opposition movement and fomenting instability.

The talks are the first

since Obama announced on 14 April that he had decided to remove Cuba from the US list of state sponsors of terrorism, which Havana had said was a necessary step for further progress.

The Cubans have signaled that any formal an-

nouncement on the re-opening of embassies would likely have to wait until after the 45-day Congressional review period for removing Cuba from the terrorism list. Cuba considers 29 May as the date when the review period ends.—Reuters

Ukraine wants roadmap to EU accession at Riga summit — minister

BERLIN, 21 May — Ukraine's foreign minister said his country wants assurances at a summit with the European Union this week that it is a suitable candidate for EU membership and its citizens will gain visa-free travel to the bloc next year.

Officials from the EU and its member states meet six of the bloc's eastern neighbours, including Ukraine, in the Latvian capital Riga on Thursday and Friday, with a political solution to the conflict in

Ukraine high on the agenda.

The EU has already agreed a free-trade pact with Ukraine, to be implemented from next year.

"Now we want concrete assurances in Riga that Ukraine is eligible for future membership of the European Union, and has the chance to become an accession candidate in the future," Foreign Minister Pavlo Klimkin told German daily *Die Welt*.

"We want to see light at the end of the tunnel," he said, adding that Ukraine

also expected a commitment at the summit to visa-free travel to the EU from next year for its citizens.

Ukraine, Moldova, and Georgia signed political and trade agreements with the EU last year and want to join the bloc.

The Riga summit with those countries, as well as the more pro-Russian Armenia, Azerbaijan and Belarus, will try to further deepen ties.

A tug-of-war for influence between Brussels and the Kremlin, culminating in

the Ukrainian conflict and Western sanctions against Moscow, has raised concern among some in the West about a new Cold War. Russia describes last year's toppling of a pro-Russian president in Ukraine by mass protests and the country's turn away from Moscow towards the EU as a Western-backed coup.

The loss of Ukraine was a blow to President Vladimir Putin's plans for a Eurasian Customs Union to parallel the EU.

Merkel — can't imagine Russia back in G8 until common values met

BERLIN, 21 May — German Chancellor Angela Merkel said on Thursday that there would not be any Group of 8 meetings with Russia as long as it fails to comply with basic common values of democracy and states based on rules of law.

"The developments in Ukraine are the reason that we will meet in Elmau as Group of 7 and not a Group of 8," she said in a speech in parliament, referring to the meetings in Bavaria next month without Russia's par-

ticipation.

"We see the G7 as a community of values. And that means working together for freedom, democracy, and for the rule of law.

That means respecting the laws of nations and the territorial integrity of nations." She added, "Russia's actions in Ukraine are not compatible with that.

A return to the G8 format is not imaginable as long as Russia doesn't act according to those basic values." — Reuters

UK's Cameron to unveil immigration curbs on eve of EU meeting

LONDON, 21 May — Prime Minister David Cameron will outline measures to stem near-record immigration levels on the eve of a European Union summit he wants to use to tentatively start renegotiating Britain's ties with the bloc.

Speaking in London on Thursday before flying to an EU Eastern Partnership Summit in Latvia, his first foreign trip since his re-election on 7 May, Cameron will say he plans to make illegal working a criminal offence and to give authorities the power to

seize illegal earnings.

Cameron is under growing pressure to cut rising immigration fueled by his country's strong economy. Official data released hours before he was due to speak showed net annual migration hit a near high of 318,000 in 2014.

Cameron's focus will be largely domestic, but the timing of his speech will be seen as a message to EU leaders about how important the issue is to him. Cameron is expected to remind them he wants the bloc to agree to allow Britain to sharply

restrict EU migrants' access to its welfare system.

"A strong country isn't one that pulls up the drawbridge ... it is one that controls immigration," Cameron will say, according to an advance text of his speech.

In a potentially hopeful sign for Britain, German finance minister Wolfgang Schäuble said he had invited Osborne to Berlin to discuss possible reform. Germany wants reform of euro zone rules, something that could potentially be done at the same time as Britain's renegotiation.

George Osborne, Cameron's finance minister accused the EU of sleepwalking out of the global economy. Britain's Europe debate has alarmed some firms and Airbus became the latest to say a British

EU exit would involve huge risks.

Cameron, who promised but failed to reduce annual net migration into Britain to less than 100,000 during his last term, has pledged to reshape Britain's ties with the bloc before holding an in-out EU membership referendum by the end of 2017.

He wants to force EU migrants to wait four years before accessing a range of welfare benefits and to win the power to deport jobless EU jobseekers after six months.

If the renegotiation is completed early, Cameron has made clear he might hold the referendum before 2017. But he is under pressure from some of his own Eurosceptic lawmakers to take his time getting what they consider to be a meaningful settlement.

Some EU countries, such as France, have ruled out the prospect of the bloc changing its founding treaties to suit Britain. But British officials say Cameron remains convinced he will need such changes.

Iraqi forces thwart third Islamic State attack east of Ramadi

BAGHDAD, 21 May — Iraqi forces said they thwarted a third attempt by Islamic State militants to break through their defensive lines east of the city of Ramadi overnight on Thursday.

Police and pro-government Sunni fighters exchanged mortar and sniper fire with the insurgents across the new frontline in Husaiba al-Sharqiya, about halfway between Ramadi and a base where a counter-offensive to retake the city is being prepared.

Ramadi fell to the militants on Sunday in the most significant setback for Iraqi

security forces in nearly a year, calling into question the US-led strategy to “degrade and destroy” the Islamist group. The militants are now seeking to consolidate their gains in the surrounding province of Anbar by pushing east towards the Habbaniya base where Iraqi security forces and Shi’ite paramilitaries are massing.

“Daesh is desperately trying to breach our defences but this is impossible now,” Police major Khalid al-Fahdawi said, referring to Islamic State. “We have absorbed the shock and more reinforcements have reached the frontline. They

tried overnight to breach our defences but they failed. Army helicopters were waiting for them.”

Habbaniya is one of only a few remaining pockets of government-held territory in Anbar, and lies between Ramadi and the town of Falluja, which has been controlled by Islamic State for more than a year.

Local officials say the militants want to join up the two towns and overrun the other remaining government holdouts, strung out along the Euphrates river valley and the border with Jordan and Saudi Arabia.

Ten killed as Libya’s rival governments take on Islamist fighters

TRIPOLI/BENGAZI, (Libya), 21 May — Ten people were killed and almost 40 wounded when Libya’s two rival governments clashed with Islamist fighters in two large cities on Wednesday, officials said. Supporters of Islamic State and other Islamist militant groups have exploited the turmoil in Libya, where two governments and parliaments are fighting for control four years after the ousting of Muammar Gaddafi. In the eastern city of Benghazi, nine soldiers were killed when fighting the Majlis al-Shura, an umbrella of mostly Islamist groups including Ansar al-Sharia blamed by Washington for the storming of a US diplomatic compound in 2012 which killed the US ambassador.

At least 30 soldiers

were wounded, a military spokesman said. Army forces allied to the internationally recognized government based in the east have been fighting since last year Islamist groups in the port city.

Backed by helicopters, army special forces took back several government buildings in Libya’s second-largest city previously held by Majlis al-Shura, said the spokesman.

The army has gained some territory but clashes continue almost daily despite repeated claims by top army commander Khalifa Haftar that his forces were dominating. In the central city of Sirte, Islamic State fighters fought with forces sent from the western city of Misrata allied to a self-declared government controlling the capital Tripoli,

officials and residents said.

Taking advantage of the security vacuum, just as Islamic State did in Syria and Iraq, Islamic State militants had seized Sirte, Gaddafi’s home town east of Tripoli, earlier this year.

One member of the Misrata-based Brigade 166 was killed and seven were wounded on Wednesday, Jamal Zubia, a spokesman for the Tripoli-based government, said in a message on social media.

Islamic State said in a Twitter message its fighters had seized a camp of the Misrata forces in southeast Sirte. The group published pictures purportedly showing its fighters at the camp, seizing several vehicles. A resident said the camp seemed to be in the hands of Islamic State.—Reuters

Islamic State’s Egypt affiliate urges attacks on judges — recording

CAIRO, 21 May — Islamic State’s Egypt affiliate on Wednesday urged followers to attack judges, declaring a new front in an Islamist militant insurgency in the world’s most populous Arab state.

The leader of the group Sinai Province called for violence against judges in an audio statement posted on a prominent jihadist website.

Reuters could not confirm the authenticity of the recording. A spate of attacks on judges suggests they are the latest targets of an insurgency centred in North Sinai that has killed hundreds of Egyptian soldiers and police in the past two years.

“It is wrong for the tyrants to jail our brothers,” cleric Abu Osama al-Masry said, referring to judges.

“Poison their food... surveil them at home and in the street... destroy their homes with explosives if you can.”

Any full-blown campaign against judges could spell trouble for President Abdel Fattah al-Sisi, who as army chief removed the Muslim Brotherhood from power in mid-2013 after mass protests against its rule. Sisi has only just managed to deliver a degree of stability to Egypt after years of political upheaval triggered by an uprising in 2011 that toppled autocrat Hosni Mubarak.

Although the judiciary says it is independent of the government and military, some of Egypt’s judges have drawn accusations of blatant bias by handing down lengthy jail terms

and mass death sentences against Islamists.

The recording appeared days after a court’s decision to seek the death penalty for Mursi and follows the state’s execution of six members of Sinai Province for an attack on soldiers in Cairo last year.

“The justices have been central to the repressive strategy the Egyptian government has pursued since the July 2013 coup,” said Steven Cook, Mideast expert at the Council on Foreign Relations in Washington. “The combination of the state’s repressive tactics, mass jailings, death sentences and now the insurgency’s call to kill judges makes it a toxic brew that will likely lead to an escalation of violence.” —Reuters

Islamic State enters ruins of Syria’s Palmyra after storming city

BEIRUT, 21 May — Islamic State fighters in Syria have entered the ancient ruins of Palmyra after taking complete control of the central city, but there are no reports so far of any destruction of antiquities, a group monitoring the war said on Thursday.

The offshoot of al-Qaeda has taken control of the city’s military air base and prison after storming them on Wednesday, Rami Abdulrahman, head of the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, said by telephone.

Islamic State said in a statement posted by followers on Twitter that it was in full charge of the city, including the military installations, and that the retreating

pro-government forces had left behind a large number of their dead.

Clashes since Wednesday had killed at least 100 pro-government fighters, said Abdulrahman, who bases his information on a network of sources on the ground.

It is the first time Islamic State has taken control of a city directly from the Syrian military and allied forces. The ultra-hardline Sunni Muslim group has destroyed antiquities and ancient monuments in neighbouring Iraq and there are fears it might now devastate Palmyra, one of the most important ancient World Heritage sites in the Middle East.

The major assault on

the city, which started a week ago, is part of a westward advance by Islamic State that is adding to pres-

sures on the overstretched army and pro-government militia, which have also recently lost ground in the

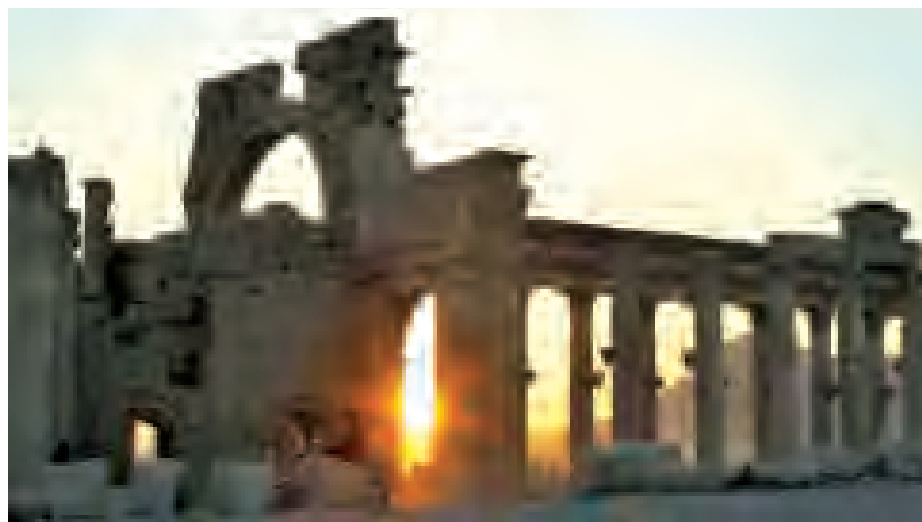
northwest and south.

The fall of Palmyra comes just days after the Islamic State seized Ramadi,

the capital of Anbar province in neighbouring Iraq, dealing a significant blow to US efforts to defeat the radical group. Islamic State now controls more than half of Syrian territory, the Observatory said.

The areas it holds are mostly sparsely inhabited. Syria’s main cities, including the capital Damascus, are located on its western flank along the border with Lebanon and the coastline and have been the priority for the government of President Bashar al-Assad.

Syrian state television said late on Wednesday that pro-government forces had withdrawn from Palmyra after managing to evacuate most of its civilian population.—Reuters

Tidal flat near Tokyo is rare oasis enclosed by cityscape

CHIBA, (Japan), 21 May — Surrounded by an urban landscape that includes an elevated expressway, high-rise condominiums and an IKEA furniture store, the Yatsu-higata wetland in Narashino, Chiba Prefecture is an unusual nature preserve.

Yatsu-higata, with an area size of around 40 hectares — slightly smaller than Tokyo Disneyland — is located in the middle of an urban area that is a half-an-hour drive from central Tokyo. It is close to Tokyo Bay and is connected to the

sea by two rivers. Yatsu-higata is protected under an international treaty on wetland preservation known as the Ramsar Convention. It has also been designated as a national bird sanctuary to which entry is restricted. A 3.5-kilometre-long promenade surrounds the sanctuary, providing good observation points to watch wildlife from.

The tidal flat is a resting place for migrant birds flocking from distant lands like Southeast Asia and Siberia, including sandpipers

and plovers. There are also shrimp-like creatures and other aquatic species. At high tide, floods bring sea creatures like rays and jellyfish there.

However, if you turn away your eyes from the wetland to the neighbouring area, a quite different world comes into view. You see a cityscape of modern buildings, including condominiums and shopping malls. There is also a horseracing track and a motorboat racing circuit as well as the IKEA store, which stands on a site

where a giant artificial ski slope used to project a towering presence over the area.

An urban wetland like this is said to be rare not only in Japan but around the world. On one morning early this spring, ordinary citizens participated in a natural life survey in Yatsu-higata. Guided by rangers of the wetland, participants waded into the swamp, which is usually off-limits, and observed a wide variety of wildlife from close by. Similar surveys are regularly conducted.—Kyodo News

Japan, S Korea to hold talks Fri on World Heritage listing

Tokyo, 21 May — Japan and South Korea will hold a meeting on Friday in Tokyo to discuss the proposed UNESCO World Heritage listing of historical industrial sites in Japan, the foreign ministries of the two countries said on Thursday.

The working-level meeting comes after South Korean President Park Ge-

un-hye "condemned," as Seoul media reported, Japan's bid in line with a recommendation by a UNESCO advisory panel to register the "Sites of Japan's Meiji Industrial Revolution," which represent Japan's industrialization in the late 19th to early 20th centuries, to the World Heritage list.

In the meeting, South

Korea plans to "reiterate our legitimate concern regarding the forced labour that took place at some of the facilities listed for registration and call for a sincere and serious attitude from Japan in order to stress a solution that reflects (this concern)," *Yonhap* News Agency quoted the Foreign Ministry as saying.—*Kyodo News*

Bollywood star Aishwarya Rai returns to cinema with 'Jazbaa'

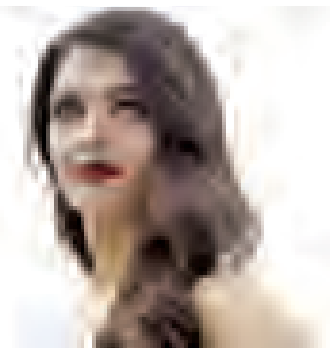
CANNES, (France), 21 May — After a five-year hiatus to embrace motherhood, Bollywood actress Aishwarya Rai Bachchan marked her return to the big screen by taking on one of her most demanding roles, playing a mother whose child is kidnapped in thriller "Jazbaa."

A former Miss World and one of the most successful actresses in Bollywood, Rai Bachchan said the film stretched her as an actress, with each day posing new challenges to overcome.

"Every day when I come to work I kept saying, how am I supposed to wrap my head around the situation like this, on any human level?" the actress told Reuters at the Cannes Film Festival on Tuesday where "Jazbaa" made its debut.

"That to me just seemed tough, demanding, grueling, challenging and, thereby, so interesting."

Rai Bachchan, 41,

was named Miss World in 1994, often features on "most beautiful" lists and is one half of a Bollywood supercouple with actor husband Abhishek Bachchan, son of Bollywood star Amitabh Bachchan.

Her prolific Bollywood career includes hits such as "Hum Dil De Chuke Sanam" and "Devdas," and she has also starred in Hollywood movies such as "The Pink Panther 2."

"Jazbaa" (Passion), directed by Sanjay Gupta, is the first acting project for Rai Bachchan after she welcomed her first child in 2011.

Gupta said the actress tapped into a "very raw" performance that drove the film, in which a lawyer and single mother (Rai Bachchan) "has to do the impossible" to get her kidnapped daughter back. "Life of Pi" actor Irrfan Khan also co-

stars.

At Cannes this year, the subject of women's role in cinema has been a hot topic. Rai Bachchan herself co-chaired a UN-backed panel to discuss the issue on the sidelines of the festival, where she has previously served as a jury member.

She said "Jazbaa" was a strong female drama, but didn't want that to distract from the main content of the film. "We don't want necessarily things being bracketed as female-centric — by doing that you are marginalizing the female protagonist, so don't label it, don't marginalize it, don't define it as being different," the actress said.

"Recognize it as being part of the broader cinematic experience. We all belong, all our subjects and stories too."

Hollywood stars, presidents join Letterman for final act

NEW YORK, 21 May — Hollywood stars Steve Martin and Tina Fey, comedians Chris Rock and Jerry Seinfeld and a host of US presidents joined the band Foo Fighters on Wednesday to bid farewell to David Letterman as the veteran "Late Show" host signed off for the last time.

The show as expected featured no sit-down guest interviews, relying heavily on clips of Letterman shows going all the way back to his 1980s morning show on NBC.

It opened with news footage of former President Gerald Ford intoning, out

of context: "Our long national nightmare is over," referring at the time to the Watergate scandal.

In succession, presidents George H and George W Bush, Bill Clinton and finally Barack Obama all repeated Ford's pronouncement verbatim, with Obama adding, "Letterman is retiring."

A bevy of top names turned up for one of Letterman's signature bits, the nightly Top 10 list, which was entitled "top 10 things I've always wanted to say to Dave."

Barbara Walters, Jim Carrey, Peyton Manning,

Julia Louis-Dreyfus, Alec Baldwin, Seinfeld, Chris Rock, Bill Murray, Fey and Martin took aim.

"I'm just glad your show is being given to another white guy," was Rock's contribution, a reference to Letterman's successor Stephen Colbert who takes over in September. Tributes also came from long-running television shows including "The Simpsons" and "Wheel of Fortune." Notably absent was longtime rival and former "Tonight Show" host Jay Leno, although Letterman quipped in his monologue "I'll be honest with you — it's beginning to look like I'm not going to get 'The Tonight Show.'"

More of his trademark self-deprecation followed when he observed that he had done more than 6,000 shows, then joked that noted physicist Stephen Hawking had calculated "It works out to about eight minutes of laughter."

The 68-year-old host, famed for his quick wit, sarcasm, offbeat humor, often snarky attitude and silly stunts, hosted top stars and presidents in his final

weeks, much as he did during 33 years on late night television at NBC and CBS. For his swansong, Letterman, who started in television as a weatherman in his native Indianapolis, dropped his edginess and instead thanked his staff, his audience and CBS executives, including president and CEO Les Moonves who was on hand.

Letterman even took a moment to introduce his wife Regina and son Harry as the lights briefly came up in the Ed Sullivan Theater in Manhattan's Times Square district.

The show, which ran long at more than one hour and 15 minutes, ended as Letterman told viewers "thank you and good night," turning the stage over to his favorite band Foo Fighters who performed "Everlong" to a montage of clips.

In a final image, he blew a kiss to the cheering audience.

"It was a heart-warming and heartfelt goodbye," said Victor King of Los Angeles, who flew in to attend the historic show.

Matri the unlikely hero as Juventus win Italian cup

ROME, 21 May — Substitute Alessandro Matri was the unlikely hero when he scored an extra-time winner to give Juventus a 2-1 win over Lazio in the Coppa Italia final on Wednesday, keeping them on course for the treble.

Matri, who has changed clubs in each of the last four transfer windows and been a fringe player since returning to Juventus in January, blasted the ball into the roof of the net in the seventh minute of extra-time.

It was a record tenth Coppa title for Juventus, although their first since 1995. Having already won Serie A for a fourth successive season, Juventus will attempt to cap their season by winning the Champions League in the final against Barcelona on 6 June.

Lazio took a shock lead

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Deceased councilwoman in Pittsburgh wins Democratic primary

PITTSBURGH, 21 May— A councilwoman who died earlier this month easily defeated the only other candidate on the ballot for the Pennsylvania county that includes Pittsburgh, results showed on Wednesday.

Incumbent Barbara Daly Danko, 61, died of cancer on 6 May but remained on Tuesday's ballot for the party's nomination for a seat on the Allegheny County Council.

She defeated her opponent, Caroline Mitchell, 5,575 to 4,015. There were

no Republican candidates vying for the seat, one of 15 representing Pittsburgh and the surrounding suburbs.

Mitchell, a retired chemical engineer and lawyer could not be reached for comment. "It was a sympathy vote for Daly Danko," said Nancy Mills, chair of the Allegheny County Democratic Committee, which endorsed Daly Danko.

The incumbent was an outspoken opponent of hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, in county parks. Backers of the controversial

technique for extracting oil and gas recently won a legislative battle to allow the practice. Environmentalists say fracking can contaminate ground water and trigger earthquakes.

"Clearly she was well-respected by her constituents, which is pretty much as good as it gets for an elected official," said Jared Barker, the county council's chief clerk and director of legislative services.

The county council is expected to appoint some-

one in the next month to fill Daly Danko's seat until November, Barker said. At that time, voters will pick someone to fill the remainder of her term, which ends in January.

By 15 August, Democratic officials in Daly Danko's district will select a replacement to appear on the November ballot, Mills said.

Pittsburgh, the second-largest city in Pennsylvania with a population of about 305,000, is the seat of Allegheny County.

GOLETA, 21 May— Cleanup crews fanned out across an oil-fouled California beach on Wednesday to scoop up gobs of petroleum spewed from a burst pipeline in what may be the biggest oil spill to hit the pristine but energy-rich Santa Barbara coastline in 46 years.

As much as 2,500 barrels (105,000 gallons) of crude oil was released in Tuesday's rupture, according to a "worst-case scenario" presented by the pipeline company, five times more than was initially estimated.

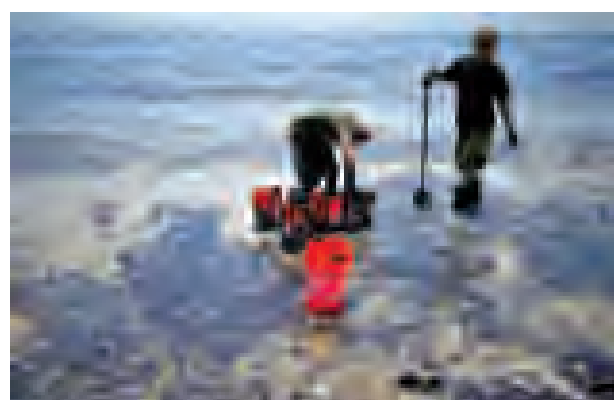
Plains All American Pipeline (PAA.N) said it calculated that up to a fifth of the total spill had reached the ocean.

The 24-inch-wide pipeline, which runs underground parallel to a coastal highway

west of Santa Barbara, inexplicably burst late on Tuesday morning, belching crude oil down a canyon, under a culvert and onto Refugio State Beach before it flowed into the Pacific, US Coast Guard officials said.

Plains Chief Executive Officer Greg Armstrong told an evening news conference that pipeline pressure irregularities were detected by control-room operators at about 11 am on Tuesday, and the line was shut off in about 30 minutes.

Company spokesman Brad Leone acknowledged that residual oil in the pipeline continued to drain for some period after the shutdown. The spill was discovered about an hour later, when people in the area noticed a petrochemical odor and alert-

ed authorities, officials said.

By Wednesday, a 4-mile (6-km) stretch of beach was blackened, and an oil slick spanned more than 9 miles (14 km) of the ocean, the Coast Guard said.

It appeared to surpass the size of an offshore rupture

in 1997 that dumped up to 1,000 barrels of crude into the Santa Barbara Channel, about 125 miles (200 km) northwest of Los Angeles, said Kevin Drude, deputy energy director of the county's Planning and Development Department. —Reuters

Chelsea's Fabregas has three-match ban reduced to one

LONDON, 21 May — Chelsea midfielder Cesc Fabregas has had his three-match ban following his bizarre sending off against West Bromwich Albion reduced to one game, the Premier League champions said on Wednesday.

The Spaniard was shown a red card in the first half of Monday's 3-0 defeat at the Hawthorns for unsportsmanlike conduct by referee Mike Jones. The official was in the

process of booking Chelsea striker Diego Costa after he tussled with Gareth McAuley when Fabregas, standing some 20 metres away, chipped the ball towards a crowd of players and it hit West Brom's Chris Brunt on the head, prompting Jones to walk over and brandish a red card. "The standard sanction would have been a three-match suspension," Chelsea said in a statement on their website.—Reuters

Forty-five minutes that could change soccer's world

LONDON, 21 May — When Sepp Blatter is not comparing FIFA to a boat in calm or choppy waters he often uses football analogies to illustrate his point so it might amuse him to think he faces a tricky 45 minutes at this month's Congress.

That is when he will have to sit back and listen to the three men challenging his right to remain FIFA president, with each being allowed 15 minutes to score, as it were, a goal that would send him crashing to defeat.

Michael van Praag, 68, the Dutch FA president, Luis Figo, 42, of Portugal, a former World Player of the Year, and Prince Ali Bin Al Hussein, 39, the outgoing vice-president of the Asian Football Confederation, are lining up against him.

Unless any of them decide to pull out beforehand, all three will address delegates from FIFA's 209 member associations when they assemble at Zurich's Hallenstadion on 29 May, with Blatter then offered the floor to defend

his position.

Unless the majority of the traditionally conservative and fiercely loyal Blatter supporters have a totally unexpected change of heart, he will be presented with the winner's bouquet once the votes cast in the secret ballot have been counted.

However, the 79-year-old Swiss, who has been president since 1998 and seen off opponents before, may not get quite the runaway victory he seeks.

For the first time since 1961, when Stanley Rous of England beat two rivals to win the presidency, the names of more than two men will be on the ballot paper.

While Van Praag, Figo and Prince Ali are unlikely to unseat Blatter, their presence and the fact they might muster enough votes to send the contest into a second round, would show that not everyone is happy with FIFA, or the way Blatter runs an organization with more members than the United Nations.

TOKYO, 21 May — Flyweight champion Kazuto Ioka and Juan Carlos Revenco were ordered on Wednesday to stage a rematch by the World Boxing Association.

Ioka took the title off Revenco last month in Osaka by a narrow decision, with one of the judges calling it a draw. Ioka is the second Japanese fighter to win three different weight divisions.

The two camps have 30 days to negotiate the fight.—Kyodo News

NAY PYI TAW, 21 May — Iran clinched title with a 3-0 victory over S Korea in the final match of the 1st Asian U-23 Man's Volleyball Championship at Wunna Theikdi B Gymnasium, here, on 20 May.

China (Taipei) secured the third prize by winning a 3-1 result over China.

Myanmar stood fifth on the standing table after playing against Japan with a 3-2 result (23-25, 25-22, 25-17, 19-25 and 15-13).

Purya Fayazidam Nabi (7) of Iranian team held up the best player of the championship.

Officials presented best player awards to the respective athletes and the second prize to S Korea and the third prize to Chi-

Resilient Sunderland secure Premier League safety

LONDON, 21 May — Sunderland secured their Premier League survival after manning the barricades to tough out a 0-0 draw at Arsenal, for whom a point was enough to all but seal third place and a spot in the Champions League group stage on Wednesday.

The battle to avoid relegation is now a straight shootout between Hull City and 17th-place Newcastle United, who are two points better off heading into Sunday's final round.

Hull are at home to Manchester United while Newcastle host West Ham.

Sunderland needed a point to ensure their top flight status and defended like their lives depended on it to move up to 15th, four points clear of Hull City in the final relegation place.

It was a frustrating evening for Arsene Wenger's Arsenal, who are now unable to catch Manchester City in second, but are three points clear of fourth placed Manchester United with a comfortably superior goal difference.

It was to be expected that Sunderland would arrive at the Emirates with a gameplan designed to stifle their opponents with bod-

ies behind the ball and it proved to be a remarkably well-executed strategy.

It took 29 minutes for Arsenal to have a sniff of goal as Mesut Ozil latched on to a chipped ball over the top from Alexis Sanchez but fired high over the bar, before Olivier Giroud flashed a shot wide two minutes later.

The France forward went close again 10 minutes after the break, drawing an excellent save from Costel Pantilimon by darting to the near post and steering a sharp finish back across goal that the Sun-

derland keeper did well to keep out.

There was a sense that it was not going to be Arsenal's evening in front of a largely muted home crowd when Kieran Gibbs had a header well saved, Sanchez had an effort blocked and Sunderland nearly grabbed a breakaway goal as Steven Fletcher failed to beat David Ospina when through on goal.

Fletcher then had arguably the best chance of the night but somehow failed to convert a Patrick van Aanholt cross from six metres out. Arsenal, however,

continued to pile forward with Theo Walcott beating Pantilimon only to see his goal-bound effort cleared desperately by a back-tracking Sebastian Coates and Sunderland's Billy Jones inadvertently directing a cross against his own post as Arsenal pressed in vain.

The final whistle prompted ecstatic celebrations from the Sunderland players as well as manager Dick Advocaat, who masterminded his side's survival after being appointed in March.
